TOWN SUPERVISORS

There has been a hassle underway in the Town of Bethlehem over a proposal that the term of office of town supervisor be extended from the present two years to four years.

The matter has become a political issue with the Democrats arguing both against the proposal and against the procedures used in putting it to a referendum in the November election. The Republicans, long in the majority in Bethlehem but also noting the growing strength of their Democratic opponents, argue the benefits of a fouryear term but might be expected to be aware, also, that to elect a supervisor for four years could keep the job more safely in the party fold.

But every town, and not Bethlehem alone, would do well to think twice before opting for

four-year terms for their supervisors. These are more often but not always part-time jobs that, reasonably often, provide full-time pay. They are jobs intimately concerned with the immediate needs of people of a community. They are the kind of jobs in which a four-year term could lead to lethargy. A supervisor suffers no great hardship in having to run for office every two years. In the intimacy of a town he actually should be running for office every day by providing his constituents with services they need at prices they can afford.

For towns to adopt a four-year term for a supervisor would be for their residents to give up a little more of their control over their own affairs. A two-year term keeps town government close to the people, which is where it belongs.

That same newspaper had addressed itself to this question on July 17, 1972, in an editorial titled "Keeping a Tight Hold" in which it said, "Running for town office is not a long or costly affair. A two-year term gives a local official an opportunity to prove himself. And, most importantly, two-year terms give voters a speedy opportunity to get rid of local officials who prove less than competent.

The local scene is one of the few places where the electorate can keep a tight hold on their office holders. This is no time to loosen it."

Haste May Waste A Child's Life

PLAYWRIGHTS' Theatre is one of those dreams people carry around for years waiting for the right combination of time and place to make it happen. It stems from the unique problem of the unknown writer of plays who finds, unlike any other kind of writer, that the natural outlets for his work are a series of dead end streets. Publishers are not interested in scripts until they have been produced. Reputable agents, as a rule, will only handle professionals

and the way to achieve that standing is through production. Producers and directors, who can make possible that coveted production, are unwilling to look at unsolicited scripts. Having been turned down by all the big time avenues, the playwright might turn to Community Theatres, only to find that they, loyal to the pleasure of their audiences, will most often favor the well known hits of the professional stage. The unknown playwright without a production

is like a composer without an orchestra whose talent is destined for limbo (which is playwright-talk for "bottom desk drawer").

It was one of those "desk drawer dramas" that brought to focus the need for a Playwrights' Theatre in Albany. It was sent to Joan Jamison who liked it well enough to mail it on to Times Union Drama Critic Martin P. Kelly. who had been promoting in his column the idea of local production of new scripts. Kelly offered to direct the show and the Tri-City Council on Community Theatre agreed to supply personnel, with one group offering the use of its stage. A cast was selected and arrangements were well under way when a scheduling conflict arose with the theatre. A search for other facilities was fruitless and the plan was dropped ... but not the dream! Surely, somewhere in the area there must be one stage with time to give to unknown playwright.

Three years later the Rev. William D. Small, Headmaster of Saint Agnes School, was explaining to his new Director of Drama that he'd

like to see something new in the program, something with a little more challenge How would he like to try a new script? With a cast and crew of experienced Community Theatre players as well as Saint Agnes students who would have the opportunity to work with seasoned performers in the creation of a new play. .Yes, he would like that. The right combination of time and place had come about and the new Drama Coach, Joan Jamison, suggested that Martin P. Kelly be invited to become Artist-in-. Residence for the production of the play he'd just completed. "THE AWAKENING" later showcased at the Lambs' Theatre in New York with the orginal Saint Agnes cast, resulting in an offer to run weekends in a private club on East 62nd Street. With that kind of success, Kelly was invited to do another play. His "BY THE PEOPLE," a political play, will be premiered on the Saint Agnes stage on November 10, 11, 12 and 17, 18, 19.

Meanwhile, the concept of a Playwrights' Theatre has been welcomed by Saint Agnes. Playwrights throughout the





needs to know. If they are restless through humor then the bit needs work. If they are restless through a particular scene, the scene lacks impact. Their response to a certain character tells whether the characterization has been clearly enough drawn. Even their posture speaks volumns. An attentive audience sits upright, while a bored one tends to slump. All these things a playwright takes to his heart and then goes back to burn the midnight oil, rewriting where necessary.

A new play is a fragile thing, requiring flexible actors willing to put in extra work on script changes, a perceptive director able to stage it to its best advantage, an objective writer capable of making improvements at the expense of parting with some of his original ideas, a backstage crew willing to adapt at a moments notice and most of

all, an audience willing to support an unknown quality. All of these people have a hand in the final product, which hopefully, having survived that struggle of birth, will go on to find open doors in the professional world. That's what a Playwrights' Theatre is all about.

"I'm sure Boy Scouts are

eating better pancakes these days, but the expectation of instant solutions to problems both large and small rubs off," she said. I'm not advocating 'scratch' pancakes for every one, just a realization that there is not a pre-packaged instant mix for life."

AN EXPLANATION OF PROPOSITION #1

This is a proposal to increase the terms of office of the Supervisor, Town Clerk and Superintendent of Highways from two to four years. The terms of office of the other elected Town officials, Town Councilmen, Town Justice and Receiver of Taxes and Assessments are four years and have been for many years. 



Herm and Helen Rasker have been our friends for more than 15 years — ever since they brought their Town and Tweed to Delaware Plaza when it opened. We watched them over the years as they expanded to satisfy public demand; we saw them open the Village Shop with its exquisite gifts and finally The Village Store, with its array of tasteful furniture, at the Four Corners.

All through these years we have seen the art work created by Herman, the merchant-artist, whose paintings and sketches have often been of greater skill than his very successful 3-store operation. And that's saying a great deal!

We received a notice for the Calendar that announced an exhibit of his sketches at the Unitarian Church on Washington Avenue in Albany. The notice didn't strike us as anything unusual — but somehow we couldn't get it out of mind. So last Friday, mostly out of curiosity, we made a trip to the Church to see them.

When we entered we stepped into the middle of a set-

up for a huge rummage sale which was held on Oct. 28. People were running around finding places to display a variety of merchandise. We asked a man and woman where we might find Mr. Rasker's exhibit. And faces turned red. They explained that most of the exhibit had been removed so nothing would happen to the sketches during the sale hours. We were told that those sketches which were beyond the reach had been left up and we could go into this room and see them. So, midst thousands (literally) of sale articles, we picked our way to the end of the room where what was left of the exhibit was still intact. And we were assured that long before you read this, the display would once again be in place.

We admit to being pretty dumb about art — but we know when we like something and here among the few remaining sketches there was a LOT to like! The entire display was created in 1972; almost all are outdoor mood pieces which are recognizable Cape Cod scenes. As you look at them they become as familiar as your own yard. The subject matter includes snatches of sea, ships and boats of all shapes and dimensions, rock formations, etc., all with the Cape Cod flavor and background. As you look, you can almost smell the sea, the tar on the boats — they're that good!

We went a little closer to see how they were done. All are on rather dark paper. The sketching was done with charcoal and then a white chalk added for highlight and shadow accent. We understand that it's a very old medium, one that isn't used very much any more. Perhaps it's because it isn't in common use plus the absolutely perfect rendition that makes them almost breathtaking.

Anyway, we think they're just about the best we've seen and we are just a little taller after seeing this exhibit by a man we call a friend.

If we have made you curious and you'd like to see what we're cheering about, we'd advise that you call the Unitarian Church to make sure the exhibit is still there and the hours it can be viewed. It's worth it, believe us!


