Cont'd. from Dec. 14 issue THE TRIAL OF JOHN HEN-DRICKSON, JR., FOR THE MURDER OF HIS WIFE,. MARIA, BY POISONING, AT BETHLEHEM, ALBANY COUNTY, N.Y. ON MARCH 6, 1853.

(Note: The above title and what follows below are parts of a published work concerning the court proceedings in the trial of John Hendrickson. The book was compiled by David M. Barnes and W. S. Hevenor and published by Weed, Parsons and Co. in 1853. There are four more books concerning this trial, all available at the New York State Law Library, State Education Building, Albany, if our readers would like to research this matter in more depth. This trial was historically significant in view of the fact that it was one of the first times that a medical verdict had great significance in a court of law.)

Mr. Van Dusen, we find him at a ball at Veeder's Tavern exchanging rings and giving a daguerreotype likeness of himself to a young lady (Maria Schoonmaker) to whom he had been engaged before his marriage with the deceased. Hendrickson's wife had also found him stealing a bottle of liquor and he appeared home at one time with a buffalo robe and she charged him with stealing it and he immediately cut ip up in strips. She also charged him with gambling, at Clarksville and other places, as at his father's where he and his brother and Charles Haswell played cards and gambled.

Within three days after Hendrickson's imprisonment in Albany County jail, he was seen dancing negro breakdowns, and other hilarious dances and also it is known he gave a note to a prostitute, for delivernace to Charles Haswell.

The trial of John Hendrickson was begun in July 1853 and twelve jurors were picked from Albany County to sit on this case. After all the evidence for both sides had been heard during the trial of three weeks, the jury deliberated 24 hours and returned a verdict of guilty. The prisoner still maintained that he was not guilty. Nevertheless he was sentenced to be hung by the neck until he was dead on August 26, 1853, between the hours of 10 and 3 and within the walls of the prison of the County. Judge Richard P. Marvin was the

O. Schoonmaker were the Associate Justices.

Relatives and friends of the prisoner planned an appeal and the sentence was not carried out on August 26, for the life of the prisoner was protracted for 8 months after the date first fixed for his execution. During this period his relatives were indefatigable in their efforts to influence executive action in his favor. appealing at last to the Governor of the State. The case was taken to the Supreme Court for review but this court too affirmed the judgment of the lower court. It was then taken to the Court of Appeals, but that court also affirmed the judgment and Hendrickson was executed on May 5, 1854. Although the case is enveloped in considerable mystery it is not more than enshrouds hundreds of cases of sudden death. The investigations conducted in anatomy and chemistry by eminent physicians testifying for the defense and prosecution presented new reasons for research in those departments of the sciences, which were still in elementary stages in the 1850's. The case will stand to this day as a precedent in medico-legal questions that may hereafter come before our courts.




HERE IS THE LATEST on Federal Revenue Sharing as released to Town officials by NYS Comptroller Arthur Levitt's office on December 20:

At a meeting held at the Hyatt House December 20, 1972, sponsored by State Comptroller Arthur Levitt and attended by local government officials of this area, all presently known information and facts on Federal Revenue Sharing were discussed. Comptroller Levitt, in his opening remarks, reminded all present that Federal Revenue Sharing Funds were a trust and should be dealt with with extreme care.

Officials conducting this meeting were all in agreement that guidelines and formula now being used by the federal government were temporary and subject to change. They were also cautious in their appraisal as to amounts of the second payments due in January, since there had been some confusion regarding checks received recently by municipalities. It was pointed out that the basis used for the formula for the distribution of these funds could be changed by both the federal government and the state government, the latter, though, only by an act of the Legislature.*

The law under which Federal Revenue Sharing Funds have been made available is a law which calls for the distribution for the next five years; this law, however, could be amended or repealed any time. Those attending the meeting were advised that funds so received should be used only in priority areas and not used merely to reduce taxes**, the primary purpose of the funds being to help local governments to stabilize current tax rates and using the revenue sharing funds in such a manner as to hold the lax line. Funds must be accounted for separately and expenditures charged directly against those funds. Following

is a quote from accounting instructions issued at this meeting:

"FRS NOT INCLUDED IN 1973 BUDGET ESTIMATE

Because firm FRS estimates were not available at budget time, many municipalities have not included an estimate of this revenue in their 1973 budgets. In such cases the question arises: When and how may this revenue be used?

The general laws provide that federal grants may be appropriated at any time by the governing board. Therefore FRS funds may be appropriated at any time; but the appropriation must be for either current priority expenditures, or authorized and necessary capital expenditures."

Therefore, many localities which did not include these funds in their 1973 budget estimate now find themselves in a much better position to apply these funds to the proper priority areas, since the law does not require the expenditure of these funds immediately but allows twenty-four months from the receipt of the check to decide on priorities and effect expenditures.*** Those conducting the meeting also indicated that the federal government, upon request, would consider extending that time limit under certain circumstances. It was also mentioned that misuse of the funds could result in loss of fund, and other penalties.

Town of Bethlehem officials attending this meeting came away with considerable information regarding use of Federal Revenue Sharing Funds and will apply this knowledge and be guided accordingly as they consider the uses for which they can apply this money.

We have 3 points that we must impress on you, our readers: *In the Wandering and Wondering column of December 14, we pointed out the \$49,000 check received thus far by the Town of Bethlehem is NOT a guarantee that another \$123,000 will be forthcoming: **we also said that Federal Revenue Sharing funds should NOT be included in the budget to reduce taxes: ***and finally, we pointed out that our Town Board was much wiser than Albany, for example, because it had refused to put any solid figure in the budget when the amounts to be received are \$till ethereal at best.
