LIBRARY NOTES

THE FINAL FILM in the three-part Bethlehem Public Library mystery and suspense series will be shown Sunday, February 25, at 2 P.M. in the Large Community Room of the Library. Joan Fontaine, who won an Academy Award for her performance in this movie, and Cary Grant, star in SUSPICION. This film, produced by the master of suspense, Alfred Hitchcock, is one of his later works.

BEHIND the quiet facade of the Bethlehem Public Library hums a veritable beehive of activity. The Library presents a placid face to Delaware Avenue, as most of the comings and goings occur through the parking lot entrance (which is off Borthwick Avenue).

On an average day, the Library charges out between 700 and 800 items (that's over 20,000 a month). Most of these items are books, but some of them are records, jigsaw puzzles, framed pictures, pamphlets, and filmstrips. About 200

applications for library cards are processed each month, and about 30 books are secured for borrowers from the Inter-Library Loan System in which the Library participates.

There are eleven story hours and clubs for young-sters of pre-school age through eighth grade which meet regularly in the Library—most of them weekly, a few of them bi-weekly. These usually keep the Children's Room Staff busy planning new activities for each group every time they meet.

And then there are all the people who use the Library without even checking materials out: the students doing research, challenging the Reference Staff with some of the strangest requests for information that you could imagine: the regulars who stop in to check on the Stock Market or to read the latest magazines or newspapers; the people who use the microfilm readers or the record players and headsets; and the people who come in just for a few minutes to use the photocopier or to see one of the displays. Also, there are the many local organizations which use the two community rooms for meetings—in January, for example, 40 groups used the rooms. Some days, as many as 4 organizations use the community rooms. That's a lot!

In addition to all the preceeding, the Library itself frequently sponsors programs: puppet shows, film presentations, the Evening on the Green Series in the summer, Bizarre Bazaar in the Fall, etc. All of these are well attended by members of the community.

So, you see, the Library is well used, but it isn't used to capacity, there's room for many more. If you haven't been to the Library lately, drop in and join the hum of activity yourself. We'd love to have you!

Ross. "The team concept for better school management utilizes the talents of many board of education, chief school officers, supervisors, central office administrators, and the building principals," he explained.

Dr. Ross referred to the principals as "the man on the firing line" and pointed out that his knowledge and expertise should be tapped to greater degree in school management."

demy for Educational Development would sharpen and update the principal's administrative skill so that he could do an even better job on the team," he said.

RALPH ATWOOD, Delmar Place, Delmar, is a volunteer driver for the Albany Area Chapter, American Red Cross, and transports children and adults to community health and educational facilities for needed care and treatment.

He drives Mondays and takes individuals to places like local hospitals, speech and hearing center, Association of the Blind, Association for Retarded Children and the Cerebral Palsy Treatment facility. In all, the Chapter's Motor Unit made over 26,000 individual pick-ups and returns last year, covering 175, 000 miles.

Ralph has been driving for 3 years with the Chapter's Motor Unit, which began in 1941 with just one station wagon and a few volunteers. Today, this all volunteer program is manned by 60 volunteer drivers. Another 7 officers of the day schedule appointment and assign drivers for each request; much like a taxi cab dispatcher.





"DUKE ELLINGTON... We Love You Madly!" For weeks we had looked forward to what should have been the highlight of this very mediocre TV season. Here is a man who is a legend in his own lifetime, a man who has given the world more than 2,000 musical masterpieces. Therefore, this tribute should have been one of the greatest television programs ever. And what was it? To put it mildly, it was horrible. Only four of the "mad" lovers of the Duke had respect or love for his great contributions to music: Louis Belson, Sammy Davis, Jr., Count Basie and President Nixon. (The president's part in the program was an old film segment of the presentation of the highest civilian award to the Duke.)

The others who were supposed to love the Duke madly and only succeeded in one of the biggest "put-downs" in history included: Peggy Lee, Ray Charles, Roberta Flack, Aretha Franklin, Sarah Vaughn, Chicago (really bad!), Billy Eckstine, Paula Kelly and Joe Williams.

After 1-1/2 hours of madness, the Duke finally appeared and did 8 minutes of his more famous and familiar songs with the Ellington orchestra augmented to four or five times its normal size and led by Quincy Jones.

Eight minutes of the real Ellington was hardly worth the agony of the rest no matter how "madly" they may love the lovable Duke.


