

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





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Wandering & Wondering .

NO ONE DEPLORES THE HIGH PRICES of consumer goods any more than we do. But we don't whine about them — and when it's something we can't afford, we try to substitute or wait for a better day. Yet periodically, on TV and in the printed news media, we see and read about housewives who whine and bellyache about prices, especially the choice, expensive cuts of beef. We can remember several periods during those years when we were raising our large family that hamburger, the meat loaf, the less expensive cuts of beef were all we could afford — and at that time, good hamburger was only 49¢ a lb.

So you see, it isn't the price of an article that makes it a bargain or prohibitive — it's how many dollars we have and how far they will go. We'd like to see all retail prices come **down** — but when they do come down, don't forget that income will also shrink — perhaps shrink even faster than the reduction of prices. That would be infinitely worse than what we now have.

THE DECREE CUTTING THOSE BILLIONS from the Federal budget with President Nixon battling a furious Congress sort of pains us too.

In 1972, governors, mayors and supervisors all begged the President to return some small part of the horrendous Federal bureaucracy to local governments and let them administer some of the failing Federal programs cheaper and more effectively at the local level. When the revenue sharing was slow in coming, these local officials berated President Nixon (mostly) and said that the only hope for local government was for them to be allowed to spend some of the Federal "fat" where it would do more good. Well, revenue sharing came about and the locals received nice slices of the juicy and tasty pie.

Congress, never seeming to know or understand that the sum of the parts still equal the whole, kept right on appropriating money for these **same** programs that the

local governments should now be assuming. When the President decided that the pie had only so many slices and the taxpayer was already suffering — yep, right then, Congress raised its stupid head and objected to the fact that the billions can be spent **only once**, not twice.

If you watch Channel 6 News at 6 each evening, there will be **at least** one story every night telling us how unfair it all is. People are actually complaining that taxes **aren't higher**; they are complaining that the billions are **not** being spent twice, simply because Congress said they were there to spend — when everyone, except the Congressmen, knows that if you have \$1, it cannot be spent to buy 2 one-dollar items just alike.

• The whole thing gives us a rather sour-bitter taste and reminds us of the following true story in the State of New York where expedience and votes must come ahead of spending the taxpayer's dollar sensibly. This is just the reverse of the preceding story.

There's a department that for many, many years had a man whose biggest job was to set a few words in press-on type each week. When he retired, the department head replaced him (now get this!!) with two full-time men, upgraded the position and gave them fancy titles. Now there were **two** trying to find something to do. In the meantime, there was a cutback in the essential working employees so that some of the hardworking sincere people had to double-up on their productivity.

So it goes in the political arena. It seems to us that every year those in political power commit additional asininities that bring us ever closer to some kind of political evolution — or revolution.

Why?

Why is it that these over-paid, under-worked people in power keep agitating the voters? Don't they realize that suddenly, probably with no warning, a change will come — and because it will be spawned in unrest and agitation, it could be much worse than what we now have. In all probability, we'll not live to see it — but behind us are our children and our grandchildren. They may have to pay a horrible price for the Roman circus our contemporaries are running.
