Within about a minute after phoning the Bethlehem Police, my wife and daughter had the help of Patrolman Martin. The volunteer ambulance arrived almost immediately after the police car, and our baby was taken to the hospital. (Sometime before locking the front door on the way out, Patrolman Martin made sure the range was turned off, had me phoned, and reminded my wife to bring her keys and purse to the hospital!)

The baby is fine now, thanks to all who were involved. Our family is so grateful to you all for helping avert what could have been a tragedy. The police department and the volunteer ambulance service have our heartfelt thanks!

REPUBLICANS MEET, SELECT NOVEMBER CANDIDATES

When the Town of Bethlehem Republican Committee met last week only one new name appeared on the roster of candidates chosen for the November election: Bernard Kaplowitz was named for the newly-created third county legislative district for the town. His running mates will be incumbents Edward H. Sargent, Jr., running for a third term, and Earl J. Robinson for a second term.

Heading the town ticket and seeking his 8th consecutive term as Town Supervisor will be Bertram E. Kohinke. Also named: Harold L. Williams and Tom Corrigan, Councilman; Marion T. Camp, Town Clerk; Martin J. Cross, Jr., Superintendent of Highways; Robert H. Rice, Town Justice.

At the conclusion of the meeting, Mr. Kohinke said, "It is very gratifying to be on the same ticket with these people who have given so much to our town; their experience in office and the service they have rendered Bethlehem residents stand as a record, that

everyone can be proud of. Bernie Kaplowitz, the only new name for an elective post, has been Counsel to the Bethlehem Board of Appeals since August 1969 — all the rest are incumbents in Town offices."

Bertram E. Kohinke can well be proud of his past terms in office which cover a decade and a half. As a "doer" and "if it's good, let's get it done" Supervisor, he has headed some great steps forward in Bethlehem, among them: Town water lines have been extended into almost every area; a giant new sewer complex is reaching completion; two town parks will be in operation this summer with one of the finest recreation programs in this area; took over all Town recreation costs; developed exceptionally fine Police and Justice Departments; new parking lots; tax exemption to qualified property owners over 65; brought new business and industry to the Town. The list doesn't end there; it is endless.

This year, Harold L. Williams will have been a member of the Bethlehem Town Board for 10 years and a member of the Selkirk Volunteer Fire Department

for more than 40 years. Thomas Corrigan is the other candidate for Councilman. As he enters the race for a second term, he celebrates 32 years with the N.Y. Telephone Co. and 10 years as Republican committeeman in the 12th District. He was Commissioner of the Delmar-Elsmere Sewer District 1963-64.

Marion T. Camp, candidate years as deputy in that office and has been Town Clerk since 1971. That she runs a most efficient office is almost as well-known as is her friendly smile and greeting when you enter Town Hall.

One of the toughest jobs in Town is that of Superintendent of Highways — the responsibility is a 24-hour a day, 365 days a year job. Martin J. Cross, Jr., is making his second bid.

Four years ago Robert H. Rice was known throughout the town as a successful attorney and a past president of the Tri-Village

Little League. Today he is also known as a fair and impartial judge who has upheld the law, handed out the penalties required — but he has also retained his ability to be a great humanitarian with it all. He will be seeking a second term.

Of the candidates running for county legislators, Earl J. Robinson will be seeking a second term, Edward H. Sargent, Jr., his third and Bernard Kaplowitz his first. Mr. Robinson has been a resident for more than 20 years; he's a top Kiwanian; his first term has earned him respect and support. Mr. Sargent has also lived here more than 20 years; his first two terms in the County Legislature have been marked by several milestones considering that the GOP is in the minority. Mr. Kaplowitz, at 36, has a knowledge of local needs and legislative procedure that should make him an outstanding member of the County body if he succeeds in his bid.

Question:

I am employed by the Federal Government. Is it possible to have my Civil Service Death Benefit assigned to you for my funeral?

Answer:

You may do this by contacting our office. If you are eligible we will complete the Civil Service standard form 2808 for you and file it with the Civil Service Commission.

Anyone employed by the Federal Government who is subject to the Federal Retirement Act and has more than five years of civilian service may have one of two kinds of death benefits: (1) a survivor annuity benefit which is payable in monthly installments to a widow and dependent children or (2) a lump sum benefit.

If you have been employed more than five years and have a dependent wife or children you are ineligible to receive a lump sum benefit. If you have no dependents a lump sum is payable.

Although you may be ineligible at the present time to receive a lump sum benefit this situation could change in the future. It would seem prudent now to name a beneficiary to act in your interest if necessary.
