

THE HOMECOMING

by Larry Martone

The Slingerlands Players' performance of Harold Pinter's "The Homecoming", on opening night in Unionville, was an absolutely superb display of the new British drama. The story of a North London family of men, and one woman, was competently directed by Ed Lange, a native of Unionville. The real trigger for the play's success, however, was the better than brilliant acting of Sydney Turner. who played Lenny, North London's pimp extraordinaire. Mr. Sydney presently teaches drama, speech and theater at BCHS.

Red Sutton delivered an enthusiastic portrayal of Max, the boisterous, aggressive father of the clan. Surprisingly, Max

drew quite a few laughs from the audience, laughs which were probably unintended by the author but which evolved quite naturally through this particular performance. Teddy, the "Doctor of Philosophy" brother who comes home from America, was smoothly played by Richard Walsh, the Renaissance Man of local theater. Dick McGrath was convincing and amusingly true to character as Joey, the wouldbe boxer. Mary Eagle, as Ruth, handled a difficult part rather nicely. Her continual transitions from restraint to harsh candor. and eventually to wild abandon, are made with a certain clarity which makes her, indeed, the central figure of the play.



Jack Ryan played Sam, the ineffectural chauffeur. The part was acted quite well, though at times, through no fault of Mr. Ryan's, Sam appeared to be more of a beleagured uncle to Max, instead of a younger brother.

The unusual comedy found in this performance of "The Homecoming" would seem to exclude the play from the Theater of the Absurd genre. Pinter's dialogue of disparities, wherin water is the equivalent of whiskey, was closer to wit than to the empty expressions of, say, "Waiting For Godot." The "naked truth" cheeserool incident, marvelously developed by Mr. Turner and Mr. Walsh, is a prime example of Pinter's characters' ability to grasp a trifle and mold it into a great moment of suspense.

The scenery, designed by Jay Deanehan, successfully revealed a seedy family life-style. The lighting, handled by Dick Rosenberg, significantly maintained the flow of the play.

This reviewer had expected an evening of abstract conflict on stage, but was introduced instead to a refreshing view of human

life in free rein. Thank you, Slingerlands Players.

The play continues nightly through Sunday, May 13.





Question:

I was married for several years until divorced recently. My former husband died shortly after our divorce. Do I qualify for any death benefits?



Apart from any divorce settlement involving insurance and property which are not considered death benefits you may qualify for a Social Security annuity:

1. If you are responsible for the care of your husband's child under age 18.

2. If you are over age 60, were married at least 20 years before your divorce, and were receiving support, or you were entitled by court order to receive support, from your divorced husband

Only if you paid the funeral costs are you entitled to receive the lump sum Social Security death benefit. If you were responsible for these costs and they have not been paid you may assign this check to the mortuary.






