Plans are underway for the renewed annual Town of Bethlehem community memorial church service for its townspeople who gave their lives in the wars in which our Nation has been involved.



It was explained that the manufacture of fiberglass insulation is a clean process and that any emission released into the air would be less than 5%. After the facts were presented, there was a period in which anyone could speak pro or con. There were many who favored the zoning change in order to permit Owens-Corning to build and operate the plant - those who objected, based their argument on the fact that broadening the tax base to avoid future rise in taxes is good — as long as the plant is built somewhere else. There were those who questioned the credibility of the less than 5% pollution statements even though similar Owens-Corning plants have been carefully checked and the results recorded. Some objected on the grounds that their experience with emissions from the GE plant are objectionable. What they did not realize was that almost coincidentally with the date of the meeting, GE put into operation several additional phases of anti-pollution equipment and from now on the odor-emission has been and will be nil. A complete picture story of this operation is scheduled for a future issue of the Spotlight. Owens-Corning has promised that same kind of anti-pollution cooperation.

In his new position, he will be responsible for administering the health services program for all State employees.



tee to green, but it was sure true at the Sealy. I noticed it especially because I had to keep it straight or else hit someone. They were three or four deep."

The comparison between her 1971 and 1972 record ha a Cinderella-like flavor. In 1971 she earned \$2,203,33. And in 1972 - \$47,528.84. She rose from 47th to fourth place in the official money lists and was named LPGA "Most Improved Played of The Year" by Golf Digest Magazine.

And not all of her travail has been on the golf course. Not long after reluctantly turning back the mink for cash in early 1971, she bacame victim of a serious hyperactive thyroid condition.

'It could have been fatal if I had continued playing's: Betty said.

"Actually, I was fortunate to be alive when my doctor discovered the thyroid condition. My heart beat was 125 at rest -- I don't mean sitting, I mean when I was sleeping."

Surgery took care of the condition and Betty rejoined the tour in late 1971 after borrowing \$500 from a friend. She placed in the money in the last two LPGA tournaments of the year.

But in Palm Springs, Calif., came the genesis of Betty's spectacular comeback. There she spent the entire winter working with famed golf teacher Johnny Revolta, financing her study by working as a clerk in a liquor store. Her game was rebuilt, right from the bottom up. "I played more than 110 rounds of golf in less than five months."

With her strong game (she was recently voted the LPGA's longest driver), the 26-year-old strawberry blonde from Canaan, N.Y., soon will be able to afford a whole mink.

Her immediate aim now, as she tunes up her game in California with mentor Johnny Revolta, is to win the \$100,000 Sealy-Faberge in Las Vegas next May 31 - June 3.

"And I feel I can. The Desert Inn course is made for my game, and I have a deep personal ambition not only to be the first two-time winner of the event, but also to be the leading LPGA money winner in 1973. With a \$25,000 first prize in the Sealy-Faberge, I'll be well on the way toward that goal!

Robert Hoffman of the Kiwanis Club explains that the program involves the marking of valuables with a special engraving tool that his club will make available to local residents without cost. The engraving tool has been made available to the Kiwanis Club by the Insurance Co. of North America.

Marking of valuables in this way acts as a strong deterrent to burglars and makes positive identification of stolen items much easier.

"We're naturally interested in any plan that can help stop the alarming increase in burglaries today," Mr. Hoffman said. "This program is the best idea we have ever seen to stop burglaries, and it is very simple plan to put into operation."

Similar programs have been extremely successful elsewhere. Burglaries have declined dramatically in many cities where the idea has been tried.

Mr. Hoffman says that the New Scotland Kiwanis Club will lend engraving tools (\$5 deposits to individuals and businessmen on a "first-comecome-serve" basis. After two days, the tool must be returned so the next person can use it. The deposit will be returned.



in this way will be very difficult to sell to a "fence". Even if the goods are stolen, positive identification is much easier.

"It's like an engraved invitation to jail if the thief is caught with the goods in his possession," Mr. Hoffman said. "Thieves aren't as dumb as you might think," Mr. Hoffam went on. "They may be dishonest, but at least they can read the decals."

The idea originates in California. In one city, among 4000 participating homes, only six burglaries have occured. Among 7000 non-participating homes, in contrast, over 1800 burglaries were committed. This figures out to less than 2/10 of a percent for participating homes, as compared to over 25 percent for the non-participating homes.

TAKE ZEST OUT OF THE PEST

Many recent agronomical studies are in agreement about one thing: strong, healthy vegetables seem to be the least tempting to most destructive insects and diseases. So the



first thing to consider in pest control is that well-tended, organically grown vegetable crops put you halfway home in your battle with pests.

As to the other half, there are ways and means of battling nuisances--if you are consistent. One way to be consistent is to use a very effective. insecticide called Spectracide, which is a broad-spectrum. nonpersistent chemical containing diazinon that can be used not only for vegetables, but flowers, fruits and lawn pests.

Here are some anti-pest precautions for vegetable growing:

1. Use crop rotation in your vegetable garden.

2. Choose disease-and insect-resistant vegetable plants varieties wherever possible,

3. Always remove dead or diseased vegetables.

4. Cleanliness is vital, Keep the vegetable garden free of trimmings and waste.

5. Dust or spray with an insecticide every two weeks during the growing season, up till 10 days before harvesting for most vegetable crops.





ONE OF THE AREA'S FOREMOST EDUCATORS at the college level says that he believes that foreign languages are a waste of time in high school unless they are to be actively used later in life. And, according to him, the study of Latin is therefore a waste of time since it is neither written nor spoken in our world of today.

We have to disagree with his theory completely. We know that our English vocabulary and word usage would be a lot less had we not studied Latin and French — yet we use neither per se. We happen to believe that the study of these two languages was basic in our striving to put words together that others might read. From Latin, the student finds the entire basic structure of English, and French helps to enlarge that understanding.

We agree that Latin is a "dead" language but when our own tongue is so dependent on it, we believe that anyone who has occasion to write anything from a business letter to reporting will certainly do a better job because of a study of other languages.

In our own household, our youngest daughter is the only one of our children to find languages at all bearable. Her math may not be her top subject — but her English vocabulary and word usage is a joy to behold. Instead of fighting the study of languages, she finds them a stimulating challenge. And both her writing and speaking prove our point. Students there are who find the study of words a bore — but there are many who thrive on it.

We simply cannot see why the study of languages should be eliminated from the entrance requirements of the college that has journalism or writing courses.

has celebrated some 70 birthdays is still available on a 24-hour a day basis for an emergency. He will make room during his busy day to aid a sufferer from a toothache and he will get up any time of night to help anyone in pain. For something less than an emergency, he will give a patient an appointment not more than two or three days away. He's a truly remarkable man and he will tell you that he has never refused help to anyone at any hour. Our medical doctors also are equally helpful.

Hardly a day goes by, though, that someone doesn't tell us of having to wait two, three or four weeks for a dental appointment or an equal wait to receive routine medical care.

Again this week we refer our readers to the "It's My Turn" column in Newsweek magazine. In it a young doctor writes of the flaws in today's approach to medicine and why a patient becomes a statistic rather than a human being with problems. He explains the procedures in today's Emergency Room and why the policy followed is so disastrous. He believes that many of today's basic attitudes, patient-doctor relationship and policies long in force must be changed or modified in the struggle to help the ill.

Nearly everyone is familiar with the long years of sacrifice, dedication and near-poverty that each medical student faces before he can begin to earn a comfortable living. The author of the column sincerely believes that the system is breeding the kind of doctor to whom statistics are. all-important. And he suggests solutions which could change all this.
