Question:

When a deceased person is entitled to both a Social Security and Veterans death benefit allowance, how is the distribution made?

Answer:

The lump sum Social Security death benefit is paid to the veteran's widow without regard to funeral cost, if she was living with her husband. The \$250 Veterans burial benefit usually is paid to the mortuary.

If there is no widow, or the widow was estranged from her husband, Social Security will pay as a death benefit only the difference between the Veterans allowance, and the cost of the funeral. The maximum payable under these circumstances may not exceed the Social Security entitlement; this is usually \$255.

jected in the range of \$1.30 to \$1.40 per share, compared to \$1.81 last year," he noted. Haehl pointed out that rate relief has been requested to increase annual gas revenues by about \$10,000,000. A decision is expected very shortly in this case. An electric rate hike to produce \$35 million annually was applied for in March 1973, coupled with a request that \$12 million be allowed as a temporary increase. "The company will renew

its request for temporary relief as soon as possible under price controls," Haehl said.

In recent testimony in the electric rate case, James F. Morrell, controller for Niagara Mohawk, explained the decline in earnings for the first five months. He attributed about \$2 million of the drop in earnings to a decline in gas sales of about 5,000,000 mcf primarily as a result of the warmer winter weather. Morrell said that labor costs in-

creased \$4.6 million, taxes other than income taxes climbed \$2.4 million and interest costs net of allowance for funds used during construction rose \$2.3 million.

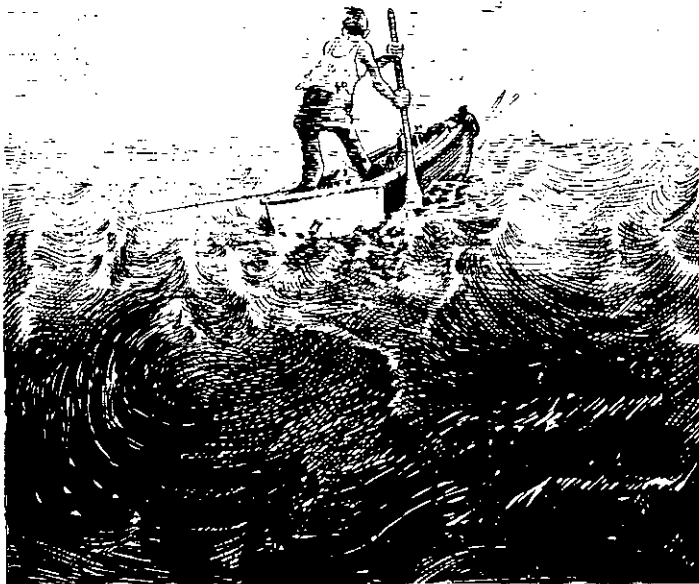
Morrell attributed the increased interest costs to financing non-revenue producing pollution control facilities and other environmental

protection expenditures made by Niagara Mohawk. The stockholders, rather than consumers, are bearing the fixed charges (depreciation, taxes and capital costs) until these expenditures are allowed in the rate base as filed in the pending electric case, Morrell explained.

CONSERVATION COMMENTS

White Perch

The Region 7 Fisheries crew returned from Jamesville Reservoir the other day with a bucket full of white perch. Like most Central New Yorkers, I hadn't paid too much attention to these fish, even though they are extremely abundant in some of our waters. As little as just two decades ago, only a few had ever been seen in Central New

York. They were considered a tidal-brackish water fish of the Atlantic Coast from the Carolinas to Nova Scotia, and were common along Long Island and in the lower Hudson River.

During the 40's and early 50's this adaptable fish swept up the Mohawk-Hudson Valley and through the canal system to Lakes Ontario and Erie. Much of this may have been on their own, but they may have been given an occasional boost by some self-appointed "improve of the fishing" who thought that he was transferring the very similar looking white bass to new waters. It first appeared in the Mohawk River in 1934, by 1950, it was in Oneida Lake, in 1951 it had found its way into the Seneca River north of Auburn, and the next year it was in Cross Lake. Probably with a little human help, it showed up in Lake Erie in 1953.

The white perch now inhabits most waters connected with the canal system, and is not confining itself to just one type of habitat, though it thrives best in waters where the summer temperatures exceed 75 degrees. In many waters populations have so increased that stunting has

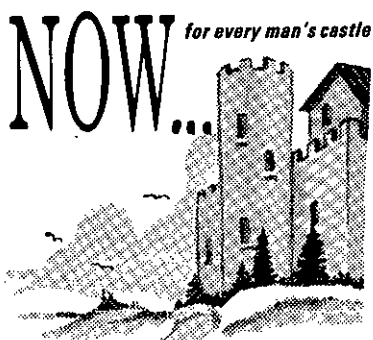
occurred. Other more popular native fish have also suffered from the heavy competition. This experience indicates that all care should be taken to see that they are not released in waters where they are not already present.

Massachusetts has made some interesting observations about the numbers and habitat choices. In sandy ponds with little or scant cover, they have reached excellent average size, while in ponds with rubble bottoms and extensive cover they have often become overabundant and stunted.

Since the average female may lay as many as 40,000 eggs, it is easy to see how a pond which offered reasonable protection to fingerlings and fry might become overpopulated. There is no overt effort, other than laying many eggs, to encourage survival of the young, for the eggs are simply laid and fertilized freely over sand and gravel bars where they settle to the bottom and adhere to the substrate. If this is a weak link in the life cycle, it doesn't last long, for in about 48 hours at water temperatures of 63 degrees, the eggs hatch. The little fry isn't very much, about 2-1/2 mm long, with no mouthparts

or pigment, but it does have a big egg yolk and an oil globule under its head. In another five or six days the egg yolk is absorbed and pigmentation begins to develop. By the end of the first summer they are 2-1/2 to 4 inches in length.

Size variation for white perch is truly remarkable. In estuaries and large rivers their maximum size may reach six pounds. In nearby ponds their average length may be only eight or 10 inches and weight less than a pound. In lakes where crowding has not occurred some may weigh

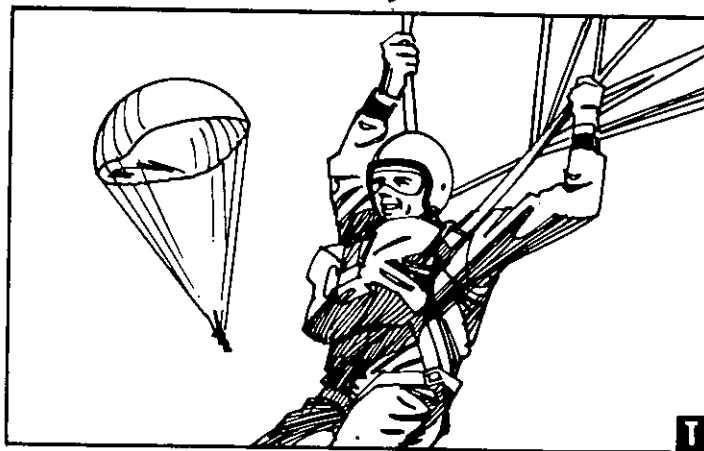

three or four pounds, but where crowding has developed they are small enough to be ignored by fishermen.

Though there are scale counts in New York showing that they may live to be 15 years old, their populations may vary considerably over a period of just a few years, showing a marked dependence on year class strength. The best fishing isn't always on the big year class, for it is these that find too much competition for food and become stunted. With the right breaks, the poorer year classes may actually produce the best fishing.

Often large numbers can be caught at dusk and dawn when they come in close to shore to feed on insects or small fish. During the day they are normally in deeper water. Since they travel in schools, once the action starts, you can be pretty busy.

**NEW BUILDING —
NEW PROBLEMS?**

Is your firm in the process of adding a new building to your business complex?

If so, says the Insurance Information Institute, keep in mind that new construction can be especially susceptible to fires — from an assortment

of flammable materials or dangerous equipment such as acetylene torches used by workmen.

Like other structures, says the Institute, unfinished buildings also can be damaged by windstorms, lightning, vandalism and malicious mischief, among other perils.

The Institute warns businessmen against making the mistake of assuming that any damage to the unfinished building will be borne by the builder. It advises the businessman to check his insurance coverage carefully to be sure that he is properly protected in the event of a loss involving new construction.

There are three standard forms of builder's coverage to insure against such losses available to businessmen, says the Institute.

One is the "reporting" form which allows you to pay for insurance only as you require it. It works this way. On a monthly basis, you report on the value of the work completed and the materials at the job site. The overall premium cost is adjusted in line with

the values reported from month to month and the time needed to build. Any loss is covered, up to the final value of the building, no matter how much the value has increased since the last monthly report.

Another is the "completed value" form. Under this policy, you insure the building for the full contract price and it is covered for its actual value at any given stage of construction. You do no reporting unless it appears that the completed value will be higher than originally estimated. Besides eliminating any paperwork, this type policy removes the risk of under-reporting value during construction. There is a reduction in premium rate to compensate for the fact that the full amount of insurance is not at risk during the entire term of the policy.

The third is a "building" form which can be added as an endorsement on a standard building form fire policy — if the construction work is relatively simple and is likely to be completed in a relatively short time. For example, the

addition of a wing on an existing structure. Under this coverage, the full premium is paid from the beginning and the insurance continues on the finished building.

27. Everything has its price. You pay a monthly premium charge for some types of phone equipment, in addition to monthly charges for telephone service and extension telephones. If you prefer, you can eliminate this monthly premium charge by making one lump-sum payment. How long you keep the equipment determines which payment plan costs less. This chart will help you decide:

28. An extra-long cord? If your apartment is too big for one phone but too small for two, maybe a 9 or 13 foot cord would be a happy compromise. The one-time charge is \$6.15, but you save the monthly extension charge of \$1.23. A \$12.50 connection charge applies either way.

29. Convenience has its price. A telephone credit card is a handy item to have, and we're in favor of them. But credit card calls are charged at the higher operator-assisted rate.

30. Every little bit helps. If it's convenient, pay your phone bill in person at one of our public offices to save postage and checking costs. Or pay at an authorized agency—there is no charge for this service. Look for the one closest to you in the front pages of your phone book.

31. Take it out for free. There is no charge to remove telephone equipment or service, or to replace a color, Princess or Trimline phone with an ordinary black phone.

32. Cheaper after ten. Need a lot of color telephones? For 11 or more, the one-time charge drops from \$6.15 to \$4.31 each.

33. Free number-change cards. If your telephone number is changed or you move, your business office representative will be happy to supply number change cards so you can notify your friends. And if you are informed about a friend's new number, jot it down.

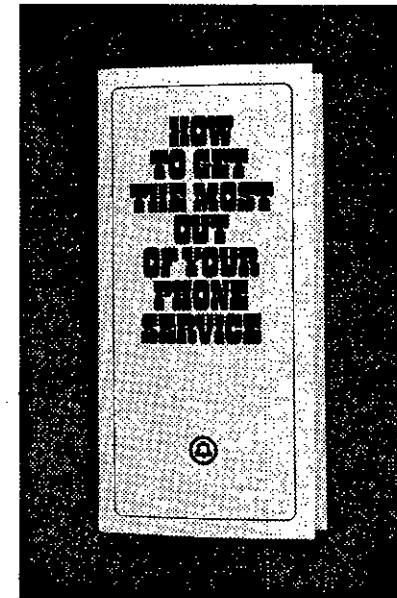
34. If you lose your dime. Although pay phones generally are working well these days, there's a chance you might lose some money in one sometime. If you do, dial the Operator, give the number of the coin phone, your name and address. A check for the refund will be mailed to you.

35. Plan your calls. Jot down the things you want to talk about, and mark them off as you go along. You'll be able to cover more conversation in less time. It will help keep down the cost of long distance calls.

36. Reduced rates for overseas. Long-time users of overseas service are generally familiar with rates. But for those who don't know, reduced rates to many points apply during certain night hours, Sundays and holidays. For details, dial "0" (Operator) and ask for the Overseas Operator.

37. Advice from the phone company. The service representative is trained to help you decide just how much telephone service you really need. And businessmen can get help from communications consultants, PBX service advisers and building industry consultants.

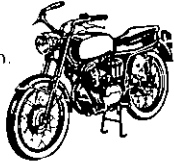

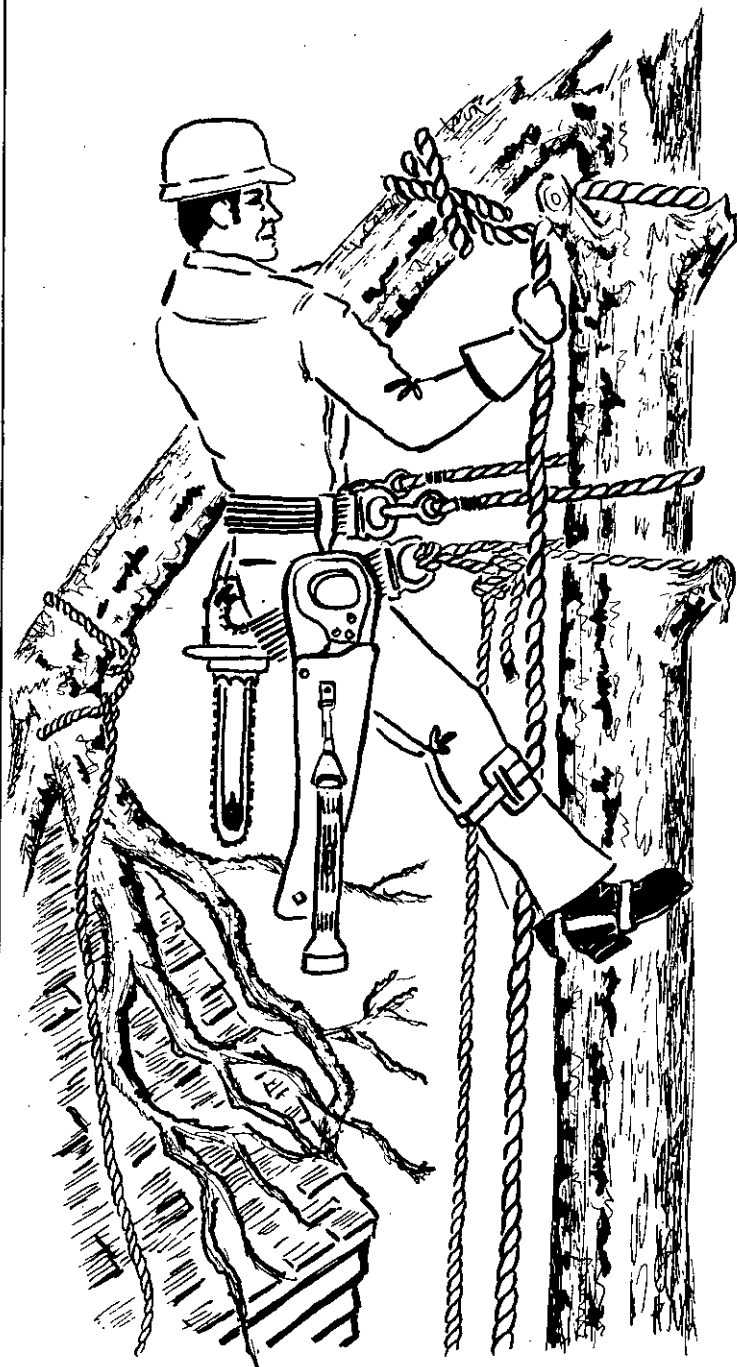

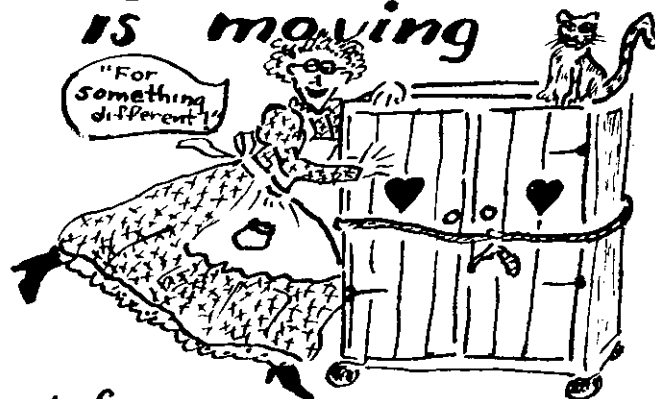
