Saving A Child

of the Cherokee Tribe, through Save the Children Federation. an international child welfare organization of Norwalk. Connecticut, it was announced today by Dallas Johnson, Director of the organization's American Indian program... The sponsorship will help provide funds for the clothing, school supplies. personal books and spending money which will enable the child to take part in school activities. The average Indian youngster leaves school before the eighth grade, often for lack of these bare essentials.

Part of the sponsorship contribution will be pooled with funds donated by other sponsors to help the members of the tribe accomplish self-help projects of their own choosing. Indian men, women and young people are contributing all the labor to such projects as building health clinics, libraries and community centers. To combat the language barrier which is considered a major reason why Indian youngsters lag two years behind their non-Indian classmates in school, the Federation often helps tribal communities secure supplies and school materials for kindergartens where English is taught to five-year-olds before they enter first grade.

Design features and facilities of the Americana Inn, he pointed out, are "unmatched" by any other motor hotel in the Albany region.







The Official 1973 United States Bicentennial Medal and Stamp Commemorative

Available July 4-July 31, 1973



This may be your *only* opportunity to own the official 1973 Bicentennial Philatelic-Numismatic Commemorative (PNC)—four postmarked stamps and a bronze medal.

Revenues derived from the sales of the Bicentennial medals will be used to provide matching grants to state, local, and non-profit groups to finance specific Bicentennial projects.

The American Revolution Bicentennial Commission: in cooperation with the United States Mint, is offering this PNC only through July 31, 1973.

The medal, second in the national series, is authorized by the Congress and approved by the President of the United States. It was struck by the U.S. Mint in honor of Samuel Adams and Patrick Henry, who were largely responsible for the formation of the Committees of Correspondence which began to appear in 1772.

The four 8¢ stamps, accompanying the undated bronze medal, each represent a vignette of the Boston Tea Party and together form a composite print of the incident. Each PNC is postmarked in Boston on July 4, 1973, the first day of issue of the Tea Party stamp.



THE URBAN MEDIA HAS CARRIED so many stories about the "so-very-poor-record" of Owens-Corning at its plant in New Jersey that we thought it only fair to present the picture from the point of view of Barrington, New Jersey's first citizen, the mayor. Here is that letter:

Dear Mr. Kohinke:

It has come to my attention that, in connection with an interest on the part of Owens-Corning Fiberglas Corporation in locating in Bethlehem Township, a number of negative comments have been made about the Barrington, New Jersey plant. I feel an obligation to offer my views on the association which our community has with Owens-Corning.

As both a resident and Mayor of Barrington, I feel that from an overall community standpoint, we are fortunate to have Owens-Corning in our area. The plant has been a constructive force in the community, and the company has demonstrated that it recognizes its responsibilities as a citizen of the community. Their employees participate in community activities. The plant management is receptive to community requests, and the plant does more than its share to help meet local needs.

Like many plants in New Jersey which were designed and built before today's more rigorous environmental standards were in effect, the Barrington plant and the State of New Jersey have had differences to resolve. However, the inference should not, I repeat, should not be made, that the Barrington plant has been unresponsive to its environmental responsibilities as a citizen in our community.

As community environmental standards have been tightened over the years, the Barrington plant has spent many millions of dollars to install equipment to improve their environmental performance. I know it to be a fact that, in many cases, the company has had to develop its own type of control equipment in order to make these improvements. I also know it to be a fact that the local plant receives ongoing support of technical personnel from the Corporation's research facility in order to further refine and improve the plant's environmental performance.

As such, the Barrington plant deserves to be cited for its responsiveness to its environmental obligations. There has been no degradation to the immediate environment as a result of the plant's operation. The attitude of the community is over-whelmingly favorable toward the company. I know that when important changes are scheduled to take place, the plant activates a program of special visits to its nearby neighbors in order to explain these changes and their effect.

If my experience as Mayor of Barrington is typical, Bethlehem Township is indeed fortunate that Owens-Corning has chosen to locate there.






