#### The American Farmer

(Editor's note: This is the fifth and final article in a series on the American farmer. The articles, furnished by DEKALB AgResearch, Inc., were written to help increase the public's understanding of the American farmer and the importance of agriculture to our economy.)

Efficiency is the name of the game. The gap between costs and prices represents profit. It's this gap that every farmer tries to keep as wide as possible.

The farmer has little control over the prices he receives. He can protect himself by hedging in the futures market, but this market, in itself, reflects a totally free supply-demand situation. Another alternative is to contract for sale of his crops, but when he does this he often trades off opportunity for top profits in favor of security.

Since the market doesn't respond to the farmer's wish, the most practical means of is to keep his production costs as low as possible. This is hard to do when the costs of his inputs keep rising. For example, between 1957-59 and 1969, farmers were faced with a 77 percent increase in hired wage rates, a 33 percent increase in the price of motor vehicles and a 106 percent increase in taxes.

Faced with a situation like this, farmers have been forced to seek efficiency — or else stop playing the game!

Even with recent increases in prices of agricultural commodities, the average income of the American farmer is still below that of his urban neighbors. In 1972, disposable income per farmer was still only 78 percent of that enjoyed by nonfarmers. It's ironic that this is the way the American farmer is rewarded for

his increase in productivityan increase that far exceeds the increases in productivity of both his blue-collar and white-collar neighbors.

The cost-price squeeze is making it difficult for young farmers to get started. A recent study in Illinois found that nearly 20 percent of the farm boys who entered farming during the period 1945-54 failed to make it in that vocation.

Food prices have been drawing headlines recently. But, compared to income and increased prices of other products, food is still a bargain.

Given recent increases in food prices, it is a fact that these prices are lower now, in proportion to expendable income, than ever before in history. For example, consumer income increased 63 percent in the 1960's while the food expenditures were up only 31 percent during the same period. Income less food expenditures was up \$960 or 73 percent. Still, someone has to absorb the blame when prices do climb.

The farmer is seldom the cause of such increases, and he seldom benefits from an increase. He receives an average of 40 cents out of each dollar spent on food at the grocery store—the remainder goes for processing and marketing. Compare this 40 cents to the 50 cents he received from each food dollar in 1947-49.

Because of the many steps involved in food production, perhaps no one segment can be saddled with the blame when food prices rise. keep in mind that the farmer does not willfully cause food prices to increase, He does not set the price on his goods at the marketplace. What he sells for a profit today may bring him a loss next week because of the simple economic law of supply and demand. How many other segments of our economy are willing to settle for that kind of security?

He's likely to continue to decrease in number unless the rules of the game change. The relentless pressures of economies of scale, increasing technological complexities, high "start up" costs, and his minority political position combine to suggest that farms of the future will be fewer and bigger. But he's not going to be driven off by big, vertically integrated conglomerates. He's too tough a competitor, too flexible, too dedicated, for them.

He's important to America. He has made it possible for Americans to eat the best food at the lowest price in the world, and he is by far our biggest producer of foreign exchange. He's tired of being criticized because government duction controls are necessary to avoid disastrous overproduction. Instead of being appreciated because he produces food at the lowest cost in the world, he hears demands for price controls when the price of his product starts moving upward for the first time in 20 years.

The United States faces a national policy choice: To continue to encourage him, to help him survive as the world's most efficient food producer; or, by shortsightedness, to force him into the control of conglomerates marketing through the ruthless economic pressures of disastrous overproduction.

Many in agriculture, including DEKALB AgResearch, strongly support national policy that (a) helps him avoid overproduction and unfair prices, (b) helps him get credit on reasonable terms, (c) makes new technology available to him and (d) encourages the development of readily available, competitive markets for his products.

Let us all salute the American farmer ... the world's most important businessman. His amazing ability to produce has been a strong and positive force in the world economv.







gram for Albany, Rensselaer and Columbia Counties and has a current Scout membership of about 11,000. It operates two, year-round camps; Camp Stratton a 2,000 acre wilderness area in the Green Mountains of Vermont and Camp Rotary, a 1500 acre facility in Rensselaer County.

quite understandable that they plan to schedule their instruction prior to the hunting season.

These 4,200 instructors work closely with the Department of Environmental conservation to help insure that a uniform program is being given but they are strictly on their own when it comes to scheduling classes. In most cases, it is an activity of a local sportsmen's club, so if you do not see announcements

of hunter training classes in the local newspaper contact your nearest sportsmen's club. The local environmental conservation officer has no official activity in these courses but through contact with the organizations, most know of classes. He certainly can give you the names and addresses of key sportsmen in the community who could answer your inquiry.


When the hunter training program started in 1949, it


applied only to those who were age 17 or younger. The marked reduction in hunting accidents that occured following the inauguration of the course prompted many other states to develop similar ones. New York has now expanded its program.

When the program first started, it was strictly a hunter safety program. Many instructors were distressed at the steady increase in the amount of posting of private land caused by hunters who did not have the traditional hunting ethic of respect for the landowner, the land, other hunters and the game itself. They began incorporating some of this into our program and it spread until it is now a vital part of the course. Safety is in no way downgraded but it is stressed that the hunter without a good hunting ethic is the hunter who is causing the posting

which could mean an end to the hunting in much of the more populated areas of the northeast.

Many people are not aware that the Penal Law sets forth the basic regulation governing the use of firearms by those under 16 years. With two exceptions, it clearly states that it is unlawful for anyone to sell or give any firearm, air or spring gun or ammunition thereof to any person under 16 years of age.

The Penal Law permits 12 to 16 year olds to receive instruction from duly qualified adults on a regular rifle range using rifles no larger than .22 calibre rim fire. It is this authority that makes possible the firearms programs given at many summer camps, schools and sportsmen's clubs.

The other exception is Section 11-0929 of the Environmental Conservation Law. This permits 14 and 15 year olds who have successfully completed their fourhour training program to obtain a hunting license. license must be signed by the minor's parent or guardian before the issuing agent. It is valid in the field only when he is accompanied by his parent or guardian who holds a license to hunt or is accompanied by a license holder of at least 21 years of age who is designated in writing by the parent as being responsible for the minor's supervision.

Safe hunting habits are not acquired in a four-hour class. Safe practices may be learned but it takes many days in the field with careful practice before they become safe habits. The adult accompanying the young hunter should always be close enough so that he can give the proper supervision. It is not only an ideal learning situation for the minor but is an opportunity without equal for father and son to work together and get to know each other better.

#### Learn to Sew with Knits

Whether you have a basic knowledge of sewing or are already an accomplished seamstress, you now have an opportunity to learn the special techniques that make knit sewing simple and thereby reduce the time ordinarily reguired to construct knit sew-During this 10-week course, you will learn to make trim-fitting pants, a T-shirt, dress, suit jacket, pull-over and cardigan sweaters, vest. Classes will be primarily demonstrations with work sessions interspersed.

Classes will be taught through the Bethlehem Central Adult Education program at the Middle School.

You Can Beat Jack Frost

Gardeners faced with a killing frost and vines loaded with unripened tomatoes may be able to salvage some of them for later eating, advises a Cornell University specialist.

After all the green tomato pickles and relishes have been made, additional green tomatoes can be picked and stored for later ripening, says Prof. Leonard D. Topoleski of the vegetable crops department at the N.Y. State College of

Agriculture and Life Sciences at Cornell

Green tomatoes should be picked before the first killing frost and should be stored in a dark place at a temperature of about 55 degrees. Then, as needed, a few of the tomatoes can be moved to a 70 degree temperature for ripening.

"With luck, fresh tomatoes from the garden may be served with Thanksgiving dinner," Topoleski said. "Sometimes, they make it to Christmas," he added.

Winter squash and pumpkins don't present the problems that tomatoes do, Topoleski said, but they should be picked, also, before a heavy frost. The secret of long storage with these vegetables, he said, is to cut the stem from the vine as fruit without a stem will not store well.

They should be harvested after they have developed the appropriate color for the va-



Onions are mature when the tops fall over. After pulling them from the soil, they should be left in the sun for seven to 10 days for further drying and curing. After cutting off the tops, the onions will keep for several months if stored at temperatures above freezing but as cool as possible.



regular auto insurance.

The Insurance Information Institute advises that, in terms of insurance coverage, car poolers probably have nothing to worry about. However, a few words of caution and explanation are in order.

Insurance on a privately owned, pool-shared vehicle is placed in jeopardy only if the pool is operated for a profit. In the situation where everyone in the pool uses his car an equal amount of time there is, of course, no problem.

The problem most often arises when one of the car pool participants does not share in the driving chores and thus pays a regular fee.

To preserve insurance coverage, the Institute points out, any car pool fee should not be more than the fair share of the gas, oil and general depreciation on the car. A simpler way for the non-sharing passengers to reimburse the pool members is to give a gift sometime during the year to the drivers.

This divorces the concept of "fee" from the privilege of riding in a car pool and leaves the insurance protection intact.

In the case of car pools in-

volving children, the Institute stresses the importance of wearing seat belts not only to protect the children in the case of an accident but also to prevent the kind of antics that (continued)





might distract the driver's attention.

As an example, says the Institute, limits of \$300,000/ \$500,000 would provide up to \$300,000 coverage for one injury in an accident with a \$500,000 per accident limit.

Medical payments is another important coverage. If written with limits of \$1,000, each person in the car can receive up to \$1,000 for medical expenses incurred within one year of an accident regardless of who is at fault. The Institute emphasizes that because the dollar limit applies to each passenger separately, there is no need to increase the limits in order to cover additional passengers.





I sent my nephew back to my car for my orange raincoat and more flares and I was at that intersection for over two hours diverting traffic until the flood water receded. While there, I could see a Bethlehem Police Car and at least eight flares lit and constantly replaced, on the Delaware Ave. side of the underpass. However, in spite of a man, flares and traffic cones, I had motorists drive over the flares and argue why they couldn't drive through.

You state in one paragraph that "the roads were hazardous both because of the flooding and wind-felled trees and tree limbs" (you forgot to also mention power lines down) and in another paragraph dealing with the underpass you ask "Where were the Police?" They were very busy taking care of the roads that were hazardous from

Twice, while I was diverting traffic away from the flood water, the Police on their way to other calls stopped to ask if I was all right and if I needed anything.

I feel we have a damn good Police Dept. in the Town of Bethlehem, and think they should be complimented for their work rather than knocked.

We will go along with most of Mr. Rapp's letter — except where he is in error. Let's take them one at a time.

The point of disagreement centers on one word: time. When Mr. Rapp arrived on the scene, three cars had already been victims of the flooded area. This first one had been towed away before the next two hit the water — and at this time, there were no cones, no flares — and no police. We did not say that no one showed up. We said that there was no warning until after three cars had been victims. The difference here being that the police **knew** of this hazard and therefore should have been of immediate concern. Power lines and trees must necessarily be reported because there is no way of telling where they'll come down — but during the past 35 years, Elsmere Avenue underpass hasn't moved an inch — and it has been a continual hazard.

ANOTHER LETTER RECEIVED this week was written by Al Kellert and is directed to the many, many area bike riders:

Dear Mr. Fuller,

Do you like "Get Well Cards?" Or perhaps, if you try real hard, you might even earn a sympathy card for your family. There is a guaranteed manner in which anyone can get: one or two broken arms, one or two broken legs, a broken neck or a broken back, a ride in an ambulance, a room in a hospital, a doctor, a nurse, a cast, tons of pain and suffering.

Here are the simple rules. First you must be a BIKE rider, must own a BIKE and be extremely careless how you handle your BIKE. For example, barrel out of the driveway as fast as possible. If you do not have a driveway, then pedal quickly as possible from whatever starting point you choose. When you enter the street, road or highway, never, never look left or right to check traffic. Just keep going, preferably with eyes closed.

Once on the highway: ignore all traffic lights, stop signs at intersections and always ride your BIKE on the wrong side of the road even if you know where the right side is "Hiding" out of sight.

Race as often as possible with other friendly BIKERS, especially down-hill. While engaging in this fascinating port, try "No Hands." That's cool, man. And a real winner.

Be absolutely certain your BIKE does not have a rear eflector, a front light, a horn or good brakes. Especially good brakes.

If you see a car or truck coming at you or behind you, pay no attention to that vehicle. Just close your eyes and pump away. The point is to keep going without precaution.

Never ride your BIKE slowly. That would take the fun out of BIKING, would protect your health and well being, would give you a good muscle-buildup and most important of all would keep your BIKE under control. Who needs it?

Try to hit a few pedestrians now and then. That's great port and a good way to test the ability of your BIKE to withstand a face-to-face confrontation with human flesh. You might even be lucky and send an elderly person to the lospital. Of course, the sidewalk, where BIKES don't beong, would be a good hunting ground.

Never, never allow a car or truck to pass you. Always ig zag in and out in front of the vehicle. That's great fun always irritates the operator of the vehicle. He should not be on the road anyway.

Look for rocks, wood, bumps on the street or in the oad. Try to hit'em or run over'em. This is always sureire sport and usually throws you off the BIKE, on the pavenent and may even render you unconscious.

Leave your BIKE anywhere, anytime and never, never pck it securely. You might get lucky, lose it to a quick hief and in that case you'll never make the hospital in the irst place.






