AS A VOTER, DO YOU HAVE ANY IDEA of what you face at the polls this November 6? Usually there are 3 or 4 propositions and/or amendments to be voted on; these are cross the front, high up on the voting machine — just

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high enough, in fact, that our bi-focals have considerable difficulty. That's bad enough — but look at this: On Nov. 6 you'll have **ONE** Proposition, **TEN** Amendments and **ONE** Local Law to be voted on before you even consider the candidates — and if you wait until Election Day and then attempt to read each one as it appears on the voting machine, this could be the longest election in history! In order to justly consider these **twelve** items, we suggest that you read each one long before Election Day 1973.

In the Town of Bethlehem, the Republican Party has had a 16-page brochure printed in which all twelve appear with a brief explanation of each.

We have a brief word about one of the Amendments: the Transportation Bond Issue. We haven't read all of the provisions in this one but John M. Galvin, president of the NYSAAA, has and he finds some rather startling parts.

This one was passed by the Legislature in Special Session and is a \$3.5 billion package that provides \$2.1 billion for mass transit (including what amounts to a subsidy for **New York City** mass transit users), \$1.4 billion for highway improvement.

According to Mr. Galvin, the present NYS administration has kept the final price tag a large secret — so no one knows the actual, final cost and also a secret is **how** it will be paid for. Mr. Galvin claims that this \$3.5 billion package could reach a staggering \$13.3 billion over the next 20-year period. How does that slap you in a year when everything is priced too high for your pocketbook?

There's more - much more!

We just paused for a moment to let the first part sink in. Mr. Galvin also claims that, again, unknown to the voter, passage of the bond issue would be the first step in implementing the NYS Master Transportation Plan, a highly controversial 20-year blueprint to regulate and change existing travel patterns. Not one voter in 10 has ever heard of this Plan or has any idea of how it would work. And you're not about to be told!

There is more!

Among the other offensive provisions of this monster, according to Mr. Galvin: (and this first one is a dilly! 1. A NYS take-over of all local ZONING powers to encourage high density development of living quarters for people which would be conducive to mass transit; 2. completely inadequate provisions for future highway needs.

It's not a police state proposal exactly — but it's getting close when the government tells you that you'd better not have any acreage because that makes it harder for them (the State) to get you to and from your work — and even if you work at home, you'll have to pay your share of \$13.3 billion to get your neighbor to work and back home.

This is the year we'd like to be able to pull the **NO** lever a million times!

And remember, this is only **one** of **twelve** cuties, some good, some bad, that will be there ready for you on November 6! (continued)

ON THE OTHER SIDE OF THE COIN: One of the topics of conversation at a recent Grange meeting in South Bethle-hem was a decision by the NYS Department of Transportation to replace the bridge in that hamlet with a brand new structure a full two lanes wide. The old bridge, made mostly of wood, has been a scary thing for years and dangerous because it is so narrow. It spans a 45-foot deep valley over an abandoned Penn-Central Railroad spur. For the past several years, trucks and school buses have found ways around it — for safety reasons.

This should be good news for everyone in the South Bethlehem-Selkirk area — that finally the ugly old structure will be replaced with something safe and a lot more pleasing to the eye.

And another thing: if you've driven 396 very often, you know what a feeling it was to approach the bridge on a frosty morning and try to slow down on its plank flooring. It was like hitting a greased skid. This will be a good miss, too.
