Extensive electric power curbs include keeping interior lighting to a minimum, complete shutoff in areas not in use and shutting off all machines and appliances when not in use.

Also, outside signs at all offices of The Bank are shut off at 10 p.m., rather than midnight, and outdoor advertising billboards are to be turned off four hours earlier. Christmas lighting is also to be reduced.

Mr. Herzog said it is hoped that individuals can adapt many of these actions to their own use, to conserve energy.

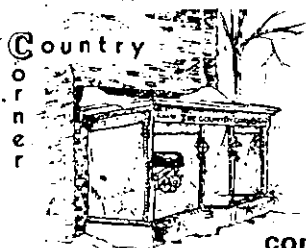

### The Turkey in New York

The turkey and Thanksgiving have been traditionally linked. This year it is fairly safe to say that a record number of New York hunters were able to go into the forest, like their Pilgrim fathers, and bring home the Thanksgiving turkey dinner. For every one that came home from the woods successful, there were 25 or 30 that had to go down to the market to get their turkeys.

Return of the wild turkey is one of the Cinderella stories of the wildlife world. Living throughout the portion of New York where chestnuts and oaks were found, turkey numbers dropped very quickly as settlers moved westward into

central and western New York. It is hard to pinpoint the wild turkey's "last date," but it was probably in the 1840's so for 100 years we were without this fine bird.

It was not hunting by settlers that caused its final departure as much as it was opening of the forest to cultivation. Even if hunting was a factor in pushing turkeys over the edge, continued clearing of land, which reached its peak about 1880, would have eventually eliminated them. As you drive through the wooded southern tier, it is hard to visualize this excellent turkey cover as open farmland. A look at some old-time pictures of the area will reveal field after field separated only by hedgerows, sugar bushes and small farm woodlots.

Fortunately, there were a few spots, such as rugged hills in Pennsylvania, where remnant turkey populations were able to survive. During the '30's, when there was a sudden increase in the amount of land going out of agriculture, these nuclear populations were pampered, and became the base upon which turkey hunting in the country is founded.

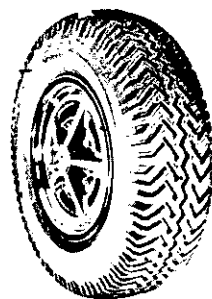

Arrival of a few turkeys from Pennsylvania in southern-tier woods, generated a lot of interest in restoring the turkey population. With rapidly increasing forest land suitable for turkey, the Conservation Department inaugurated a program to bring the turkey back as fast as possible.

In 1952, the Sherburne Game Farm was converted to raise 500 poults each year. Since developing a good breeding stock is a time-consuming and expensive task, arrangements were made with the Pennsylvania Game Commission to swap day-old turkeys for mallard eggs.

The game farm portion of the program was phased out in 1959 after 3,100 turkeys had been released in 22 counties. By this time the turkey population in Allegany State Park was strong enough to support a live-trap and transfer program.

Wild trapped birds have already been culled by Mother

Nature, therefore, these wild birds do not face a period of high mortality when they are put out in the wild as do hand-reared birds. Moreover, even where they survived the high initial release mortality, hand-reared birds were not successful in establishing flocks to spread into suitable adjacent habitat. Consequently, game farm production was halted and trap and transfer techniques substituted. This trap and transfer operation is still going on, leapfrogging birds from areas where there are good populations, to good but uninhabited range.

The first hunting season for turkey occurred October 5-7, 1959, in Allegany and Cattaraugus counties. It was a very cautious season with the cards stacked heavily in favor of the turkeys, to give biologists a chance to study the effect of hunting on turkeys. They proved they could take it.

When Catskill hunters were having their first three-

day season in 1963, those in Western New York were enjoying six days of hunting in four western southern-tier counties. Now 10 years later, turkey hunting in Western New York has expanded so that this fall there was a three-week season in 10 counties, including good turkey hunting within 20 miles of downtown Syracuse.

The ultimate in turkey hunting started in Western New York in May 1968, when a spring season was first opened on bearded turkeys. Undisturbed by other types of hunters, the spring hunter can try to call a gobbler during the early morning hours while the hen is sitting safely on her nest. This past spring hunters took 478 of them. Like the buck season, this has no effect on the year's production.

**Q. How can I use this Personal Injury Protection?**

A. To pay all medical and rehabilitation expenses, replace 80% of lost wages up to \$1,000 a month for three years, pay a housekeeper up to \$25 a day to perform services which would have been performed by an injured housewife for up to one year and pay all other reasonable and necessary expenses resulting from personal injury.

**Q. How much will this new insurance cost?**

A. Less than you are now paying for basic bodily injury liability and medical payments coverage. You will receive at least a 15% reduction in your premium for these coverages.

**Obituary notices sometimes carry a request that flowers be omitted and instead a donation be made to charity. Is this a universal practice?**

**Answer:**

This procedure has had limited acceptance in the Albany area. In his pastoral letter a Philadelphia clergyman recently said: "If you are going to be big hearted, don't wait for death to open up your heart to the needy and the sick. No matter what others may say, send me flowers and don't use my last mortal remains as a charity income tax deduction."

Flowers have always been an accepted mode of expression upon such occasions as Mother's Day, easter, weddings and birthdays. Traditionally flowers have also been an expression of sympathy and understanding at the time of a funeral. Because we recognize the importance of flowers we maintain a register of each floral piece received at the time of a funeral and give this list to the family.

The reduction will be 20% if you choose a \$200 in family deductible, which means you pay the first \$200 in family medical bills resulting from an accident.

**Will no-fault insurance cover damage to my car?**

No. The new no-fault insurance covers only personal injury. Damage to your automobile or other property will be handled as it is now. You will still need collision insurance for damage done to your car. If someone else is responsible for damaging your car, you will still have to file a claim against him to collect. Also, you still need comprehensive insurance to protect your automobile against such things as fire, theft and glass breakage.

**What will happen, then, if I am involved in an accident outside New York?**

First of all, your New York policy automatically will be extended to cover you for the minimum amount of liability insurance or no-fault benefits you are required by law to have in the other states or Canadian provinces. However, because in most cases these laws will provide you with substantially less protection than your New York no-fault benefits, you also will have the option, for a small additional charge, of extending your PIP to cover you out of state.

**When will I collect for medical bills, lost wages and other losses?**

You will be paid for your losses as they occur. The law requires that no-fault claims be settled within 30 days after you provide proof of loss to your insurance company.

**How long is my insurance policy good for?**

The law requires that auto insurance policies written between August 1, 1973, and July 31, 1974, remain in effect for at least three years provided the premium is paid and the driver does not lose his driver's license or registration. Any motorist is, of course, free to transfer his insurance coverage to another company, but if he does, he

gives up the guarantee of three consecutive years coverage.

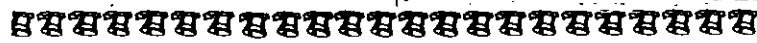

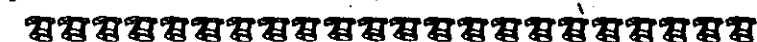

# LOCAL MAN SETS ANOTHER RECORD

Delmar's Bill Balfort has set another new record, this time in Shreveport, Louisiana. The following article, written by Medical Writer Margaret Martin, appeared in the Oct. 21 issue of **The Shreveport Times**.

William C. Balfort believes that a good salesman can, indeed, sell the proverbial ice boxes to Eskimos.

In a year when emphasis is on volunteers and citizens can pick and choose their niche from among hundreds of fields, his own job isn't much easier.

He is the new chief of Voluntary Service for the 464-bed Shreveport Veterans Administration Hospital.

His assignment was to pick up the sagging 100-member-a-month volunteer corps and

bring it up to between 300 and 400.

versity of Buffalo, Buffalo, N.Y., Balfourt turned down three teaching jobs and waited five months to go to work for the VA.

He came to Shreveport from the Buffalo VA Hospital where he completed a training program.

On the way to the job, though, he very nearly became a professional baseball player.

He was a pitcher from the Hudson Valley (two-year) Community College, Troy, N.Y., baseball team. When he graduated in 1969, both the Cincinnati Red Legs and the Boston Red Sox tried to get him to sign on.

Although he wanted to play for the major leagues, Balfourt also wanted to continue his college education. At Buffalo, he pitched the first perfect game in the history of the school. He broke the earn run average (.096) which was also one of the top earned run averages in collegiate baseball in 1971.

"I thought sure I would be drafted," he said. He wasn't.

But disappointment didn't turn into depression and Balfourt was anxious to turn the interview once again to the subject of volunteers at

the Shreveport VA Hospital.

To garner volunteers for the VA, Balfourt — the hospital's third chief of volunteer services in two years — first of all reconvinced some chiefs of services of the importance of free workers. (Volunteers do not replace paid staff members, Balfourt emphasized. "What volunteers do is extra and above board and is what helps the department function better as a team," he said.)

"The staff was just not used to volunteers," he said.

Then he began making speeches to anyone in town who would listen to him.

The result has been more volunteers manning the hospital stations.

For instance, he has placed eight premedical students in the hospital laboratory and is bringing up to 88 the number of volunteers in the nursing service. Many of these volunteers are part of the Youth Volunteer Program which Balfourt considers an important part of the department's new look.

In an effort to make the arriving VA patient feel welcome, the new official has instituted a coffee and visit-

ing service in the admission area.

Volunteers from several organizations serve coffee donated by the Elks Club.

He hopes through volunteers and coffee to alleviate patient anxiety and frustration.

# TIPS ON SAVING ENERGY



Heavy automobiles and appliances that need rich diets of gas and electricity aren't the only offenders in the energy crisis. Many persons unwittingly waste energy around the house without realizing what's consuming so many kilowatts.

During the heating season, aluminum storm windows will cut in half the heat energy that is needlessly lost through windows of a house. The National Bureau of Standards advises that an investment in storm windows (or thermally insulated windows) will pay for itself within a decade. You'll enjoy greater comfort in your home, and also save scarce fuel supplies.

Room air conditioners keep their cool better while

killing off fewer kilowatts when aluminum awnings are used to keep the sunshine out of the room they are cooling. (According to the National Bureau of Standards, awnings can reduce heat gain by as much as 80 percent.) Inside the house, window shades and draperies can reduce heat penetration through windows by as much as 50 percent. Storm windows during air conditioning season keep the hot outdoor air outdoors.

Clever cooks save gas and electricity by applying production line efficiencies to food preparation. They don't heat up a 30-inch oven to bake a pie. Four pies will bake in the same time and energy it takes for one. Surplus pies get wrapped

in aluminum foil and popped into the freezer during evening hours. They'll freeze while demand for energy is low.

Warped pots and pans heat the kitchen and the cook, wasting energy. They're a safety hazard, too. Manufacturers of gas and electric ranges recommend medium weight aluminum cookware because it conducts heat so well, saving food as well as energy. Match the size of pans to burners and heating units for efficient use of fuel. A cover on the pot keeps heat inside and speeds up cooking, too.

An innocent looking iron needs an ample diet of kilowatts to remove wrinkles. A shiny sheet of aluminum foil, placed between the ironing board pad and its cover, will bounce heat from the board to the garment. And when the iron's sole plate is made of aluminum, it heats quickly and evenly, lightens work, too.

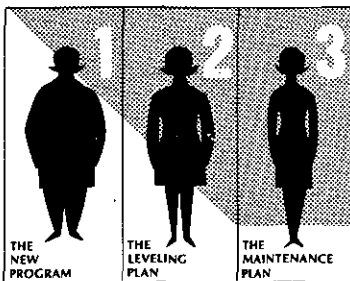

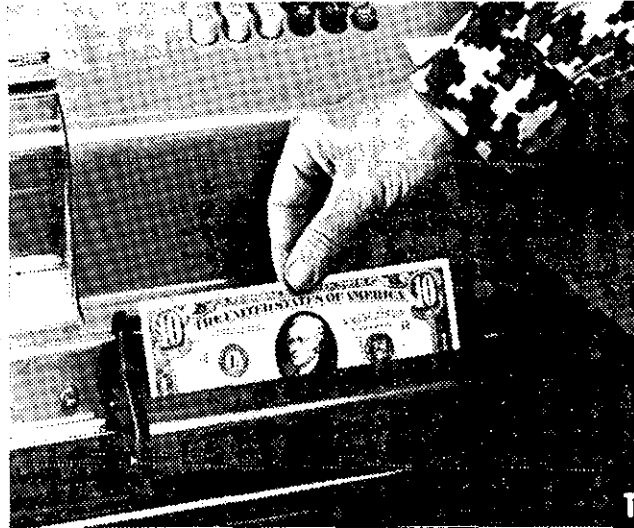

## How To Detect Counterfeit Money



One particular kind of "money" actually is the root of much evil—the counterfeit kind. Only the public is swindled by counterfeiters, and the small businessman and merchant must absorb the loss. For by law, the bank must confiscate the bad bills, and the merchant has lost his money.

Even if you're green at detecting it, however, you can become a dollar scholar by heeding these hints.

1. A good way to detect a forged note is to compare the suspect note with a genuine one of the same denomination and series. Look for the red and blue fibers in the paper. Sometimes counterfeiters attempt to copy these fibers by printing colored lines on the paper.

2. If the note that you question does contain these fibers, then compare its other features with the genuine note. Look for differences—not similarities.

3. The counterfeiter does not have access to equipment as sophisticated as the Government's; therefore, his notes are inferior. Most counterfeits are made by a photo-mechanical process. The printing appears flat and lacks the three-dimensional quality of genuine notes.

4. Many of the delicate lines in the portrait on a counterfeit note are broken and often are missing. The lines in the portrait background, if you look closely,

form squares and on counterfeits some of these squares are often filled in.

5. If you are a businessman, you can protect your business against bogus bills by getting a new device that fits on a counter. To check currency, you simply place the questionable bill in a slot and compare it with a genuine bill. If counterfeit, it will glow with a bright blue fluorescent color. # BETTER TIMES SEEN AHEAD FOR 10 MILLION AMERICAN WORKERS

An injured woman employe, who for two years had worked as an order filler at an automotive parts warehouse, developed her capabilities to get a more rewarding position. . . A disabled worker with limited background and education was rehabilitated and returned to society with better training and more opportunity for advancement than before the accident. . . A 42-year-old press machine operator who lost his arm while cleaning a hydraulic press was able to follow up his interest as an inventor by reaching an early and satisfactory settlement of the case.

These cases illustrate the type of care and rehabilitation which can be made available to some 10 million American workers who are now shortchanged when they are injured on the job, according to the Insurance Information Institute. These people are hampered by outdated workmen's compensation laws which fail to pro-

vide them with adequate wage benefits, medical care or rehabilitation when they are hurt at work.

After a year's study, the National Commission on State Workmen's Compensation Laws found widespread inequities in the protection provided. It found, for example, that in 15 states, less than 70 percent of employes were provided with protection.

"Inequity," the Commission determined, "also results because the employes not covered are usually those most in need of protection; the low-wage workers such as farm help, domestics, casual workers and employes of small firms." It found at least some shortcomings in the workmen's compensation systems of all states.

The Commission concluded that a workmen's compensation system operating under a modern state law is the best way to do the job of providing quick, complete, responsive financial

protection for injured employes. It set out recommendations which the states should follow, with the warning that if the states did not adopt changes then the federal government should intervene.

There already has been some progress, according to



the Institute, and better times will come for an increasingly large number of workers as state legislatures continue to improve their workmen's compensation laws over the next few years.

The improvements already made in some states can be attributed at least in part to an all-out effort on the part of legislators, employes, labor and the insurance business to implement changes recommended by the National Commission.

An estimated 500,000 employers throughout the country are likely to be providing workmen's compensation protection for their employes for the first time during the next two to three years.

Because of these improvements, more and more injured workers will be rehabilitated and returned to a useful, meaningful place in society.

Education is free. The student is trained for whatever skills he possesses. If he shows no particular aptitude, he is relegated to farm field work.

As it was taught, this seemed like a marvelous arrangement and way of life. For one thing, in such a society, the incentives for war seemed diminished to almost non-existence. It seemed to me that in a Communist society there would always be work for everyone, no poverty pockets, no ghettos, no class distinction. If this wasn't Utopia, it was certainly Utopia's little cousin.

The first few years after I had completed school, I dreamed of spending a few weeks or months in a Communist country to see whether what I had been taught was true. But somehow this never came about. The years went by; I became a wife and mother — and I learned that the kind of Communism we were taught, really doesn't exist at all. The Communist countries have a form of Communism all right, but hardly the Eutopian form we were taught.

The people in these countries are not free; they cannot openly criticize their government; they have no say in how their country is ruled. Yes, they vote — but there's only one name for each office. They are not free to choose a career. After some general schooling, students are given a series of tests which will put them into a training program for their life's work. Even emigration to another country is at the whim of the government.

As these past few years have gone by, I've come to realize just how precious our democracy is. I love competition; those who earn success, deserve it. Our country was built on the concept of competition. Our government was established to protect and aid the people — not to run their lives.

Most of all, I love the freedoms we enjoy. Even if some are abused, we still have something far more satisfying than what I was taught at one short period in my life.

**SHORT STORY ON THE ENERGY CRISIS** — I have a sister who lives with her husband and small daughter in Lockport, New York, just outside Buffalo. They decided to come home for Thanksgiving and so left Lockport early last Wednesday evening. Once on the NYS Thruway, Bob (her husband) settled the car to the 50-mile speed which is now supposed to be the limit — and the cars **flew** by — and the farther they went, the more the cars **flew** by!

Finally, Bob decided to join the pack, so he increased his speed to 60. There were no law enforcers, no one interested in conserving fuel — except — at one point there was a radar checkpoint, but the drivers were somehow rewarned and all slowed down to 50 — and once past it, they all resumed the 60 — speed.

Well, it didn't save much fuel (at least through the Thanksgiving weekend) when no one seemed to care. It's the public's lack of cooperation and the indifference of our state peace officers that may bring on Federal rationing of gasoline a lot sooner than we think!
