



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

### Meeting Report

The counselors at Bethlehem Central Senior High sponsored the annual "Junior Parents" Meeting on Tuesday, March 5, with a large audience in attendance. Speakers were Har-vey Huth, Financial Aids Officer at State University at Albany and Mrs. Louise Wise, Associate Director of Admissions at Skidmore. Mr. Huth discussed the National Direct Student Loans, the New York State Higher Education Loan program, the Regents Scholarship, and Incentive Award program, and the importance of the Parents' Confidential Statement (PCS) being filed before any college or school could evaluate the need; of financial aid. The PCS reflects the taxable income of the family, a formula is applied to this sum, and an amount is determined that a family can afford to pay for the education of any student. The difference between

this amount and the cost of the college or institution of higher learning is the amount of the "financial package" a student receives. This package seldom is outright scholarship money but rather is a "mixed" package, perhaps including some outright aid but more often loan approval and/or work study opportunities. Students were urged to study the regulations governing the particular schools to which they were applying because many schools had financial aid applications in addition to the PCS form. Mr. Huth drew attention to "special"<sup>4</sup> scholarships in such fields as nursing and law enforcement.

Mrs. Wise directed her remarks to the changing college scene, pointing out that students had greater choice than a few years ago. Some reasons were a decreased birth rate in the 50's, institutions having expanded during the "crunch" years and now having many places for a lesser number of applicants, students electing to defer training, and the higher cost of education. Mrs. Wise recommended a student visit the schools to which he was applying and that he not only have an interview with an admissions counselor but also talk to students, talk with a professor in his chosen field of study, observe the student body in action. She discussed the student interview terming it a "conversation" rather than an interview. Both Mrs. Wise and Mr. Huth directed their remarks to any students seeking higher education. "College" was the term they used, which can mean a 4 year school, a 2 year school, a vocational school, or a proprietory school - the financial and admission picture applies to all forms of higher education.


