



The Seder menu may vary, but some of the food elements are high ritual and must turn up on the table; a small roasted lamb shank bone, symbolic of the ancient, Paschal sacrifice; a hard-cooked egg to symbolize persistence of life even during grief; bitter herbs (usually horseradish), a reminder of the harshness of slavery; charoseth; a mixture of grated apple, nuts and wine, in remembrance of the mortar made to hold together the bricks that the Jews produced while in slavery; a sweet herb (usually parsley) for springtime, renewal and hope; and salt water to symbolize the tears of the people enslaved. A wine glass is placed at each setting and an extra wine glass is put out for the prophet Elijah, as a sign of hospitality. Three matzos are each covered separately and placed on a dish at

Registration for all children in the Ravena Coeymans Selkirk Central School District who will enter kindergarten in September 1974 will be held Thursday, April 4th.

All children who will attend kindergarten in the Ravena School will register at the Ravana Elementary School, Mountain Road, Ravena during regular school hours, 9 A.M. to 11:15 A.M. and 1:30 P.M. to 3:30 P.M. Those who will attend kindergarten in the Jericho School will register at the A.W. Becker School from 9 to 12 noon and from 1 to 3:30 P.M.


To be eligible to enter kindergarten this September, a child must have reached his 5th birthday on or before December 1, 1974.

The school nurse will be present during registration to meet and talk with you. Please bring your child's birth certificate or baptismal certificate for verification of age and any records of immunization that you may have. Each child must have been immunized for (1) polio, (2) diphtheria, (3) measles, (4) rubella (German measles) The Public health law requires that all pupils entering school must have immunization against polio, measles, rubella, and diphtheria (triple vaccine). The law also states that the child SHALL NOT BE PER-**MITTED to attend the school** without providing, as evidence of immunization, a signed statement from the parent, guardian or physician.

We would appreciate your passing on this information to any parent who has moved into the community and who has a child eligible for kindergarten.





WHAT Á MULTITUDE, OF CIRCUMSTANCES — ALL BAD! It must be one of the most difficult decisions of his political career: First of all, he's a relatively "poor" man. His very honesty has prevented him from lining his pockets with gold from the crooked political tree. He doesn't have any foundation to loan him millions or rich relatives who can advance millions for his cause: His "big business connections" are nil as far as campaigh financing is concerned. Because he's spent so many years in Washington, this man has no hand-picked organization to go to bat for him.

Sad situation? You bet it is because to our way of thinking, this man represents the only hope for a better New York State if he can be elected Governor in November. With so many things on the negative side, it's no wonder that Congressman Sam Stratton hesitates to announce his candidacy. The politically smart boys say he can't be nominated without the wholehearted backing of the New York City Democrats — and they probably want not only an arm and a leg but most of Sam's blood as well. And Sam is not about to sell out to the NYC Dems.

There are so many Democrats trying to get the nomination that one can't even remember all the names. Front runner of the pack seems to be Howard Samuels - and of course, he's from down NYC way which gives him an immediate advantage. He's a wealthy man — and that helps. He has many of the right "connections" for raising campaign funds and he's New York. State's best known big-time gambler. THE PHONE CALLS AND MAIL WERE BOTH FILLED with comments on our abortion column. No single piece of writing we ever did created so much favorable comment. But right on the heels of that column for reaction was the paragraph we wrote about the State Senators and Assemblymen who made it possible for them to buy gas on Sunday when it was unavailable to the common herd: you and me.

We suggested that it might be a good idea if every incumbent was voted out of office this fall. It seemed a bit preposterous when we wrote it — and it still looks like a completely impossible job. But here's what happened:

We had a phone call from a lady in Selkirk who has been a very dear friend for many years. She is a dynamic person who can organize and then follow through on any project she chooses to back. Her suggestion was to organize (not another political party) people who would work to vote out the incumbents. She is completely serious and she may just do something about it. If any of our readers have any ideas or suggestions in this direction, we'd certainly like to hear from them.

Here's a part of a letter from a man who is very interested in local politics and for that reason he asked that we not use his name:

Dear Mr. Fuller:

I just wanted to tell you that there are many more people than you realize who plan to vote against ALL incumbents because they are fed up with the way things have been going in the (state and) nation. Loss of confidence in our leadership ... leads one to the conclusion that all are equally guilty! I know this is not the right way, but as you pointed out, you get so damned mad you just want to get back at everyone.

We have to take exception with our writer on one point: we actually BELIEVE that all are equally guilty. There are two kinds of sin: **com**mission and **o**mission. If we are to believe the President that he knew nothing about Watergate and the dozen other dirty scandals, then he is a fool and guilty of the sin of **o**mission. If it is proven that he was a part of it all, you already know the answer. Likewise, when the State Senators and Assemblymen were given secret sources of gas, the relative few who took advantage of it must have been known to ALL the others. So why try to make an exception of ANY of them? They're all equally guilty and ALL deserve to be returned to private life without benefit of special privileges, special "lulus" and all the rest of the spurious, illegal benefits and special considerations they've voted for themselves.

WE HAVE A "DOWN" ON THE WHOLE Washington scene the same as many millions of Americans — but we had to smile at the "hot potato" Senator Buckley bit into when he elected himself judge and jury and told the President to resign. The Senator's voting record isn't that impeccable that the same demand couldn't be directed at him.

THAT'S ABOUT ENOUGH FOR ONE WEEK on what has developed into the shabbiest profession in America: politics. A few honest, upright men enter it and it either turns their heads toward shabby practices — or they get smeared by the rub-off from the others. Or they stand idly by and let the dishonest perform more dishonestly. There must be a way to change it. We still think that a complete housecleaning would be a beginning. After that, who knows whether we'd drift right back into the old habits and corrupt the newcomers?
