



#### , Home Free

A pilot program, "Home Free," is being initiated in the "Home Delmar Elementary School District. It would provide children with temporary assistance in an emergency or in other times of personal necessity. Adult volunteers and their homes would comprise the core of the program. Children, when approached by strangers, those who sustain an accident. or those who become ill, often times need assistance when they are away from home.

Volunteers would place a "Home Free" sign in their window and would generally adhere to the following guidelínes:

- A. Try to be available at times when children are going to and from school.
- B. Provide safety and comfort for the child in need.
- C Assist the child by con-
- tacting the parent and/or the Police Department in case of emergency.

One would not be expected to apply first aid, transport or feed the child.

The following information is so important to every dog owner in our area that we decided to make it the entire column for this issue.

A Warning to Dog Owners

Until recently canine heartworm disease was a condition foreign to this part of the country. Working its way north and west, it has invaded the Capital District in numbers sufficient to alarm dog owners and veterinarians -

In 1973, 553 cases were diagnosed and treated by area veterinarians. Six percent of all animals checked were found to be infected:

Last spring, 25 per cent of the blood samples examined in southeastern New York contained baby heartworms (microfilariae) This was unusually, high for New York State

The disease infects dogs, primarily. It can be fatal. If

left untreated it will appreciably reduce a dog's life expectancy. • .

Signs of heartworm disease include lethargy, coughing, decreased tolerance to exercise, and weight loss. Not all animals show these signs when first infected.

As far as is known, the disease is transmitted only through the bite of an infected mosquito. Ninety-four species of which can spread the disease. Three are common to this area. They have a flight range up to 20 miles.

One of these mosquitoes becomes a carrier when it bites an infected dog and ingests blood containing baby-(microfilariae) heartworms Within 14 to 21 days these microfilariae become infective larvae within "the mosquito. A dog can be infected if it is bitten by an infected mosquito. .: Once in a dog, the heartworm larvae burrow under the skin and develop in the tissues for 90 to 120 days. They then penetrate the blood veins and move to the heart where they mature into adult heartworms. They live in the heart and adjacent large blood vessels (pulmonary arteries).

A mature heartworm often

Adult female heartworms give birth to new microfilariae which circulate freely in a dog's bloodstream, waiting for a mosquito to carry them to another dog.

Microfilariae in a dog remain active for a year or more, but they do not mature into infective larvae until ingested by an intermediate host — the mosquito.

The prevention of heartworm disease is based upon breaking this cycle.

A veterinarian can perform a test to determine whether or not microfilariae are present in a dog's bloodstream. If the blood test is positive, medication that will kill the adult heartworm can be prescribed. Another medication to kill the microfilariae will be prescribed five to six weeks later.

This treatment can be hazardous. The dead adult worms can cause severe pulmonary reactions.

If the tests shows no microfilariae in the bloodstream, a preventive medication can be prescribed. It is given daily throughout the mosquito season and 60 days thereafter. The mosquito season is coming. All dogs born prior to October 1973 should be checked for heartworm infection.



#### **Utilities Pool Efforts**

Utilities serving 98 percent of electric consumers in New York State have signed a memorandum of understanding concerning the formation of a jointly sponsored electric generating company. The company will own and construct most of the new generating facilities expected to be needed in the state during the 1980s, it was explained by John G. Haehl, Jr., president and chief executive officer of Niagara Mohawk Power Corporation when announcing the action today.

Other utilities participating are: Central Hudson Gas & Electric Corp.; Consolidated Edison Company of New York, Inc.; Long Island Lighting Co.; New York State Electric & Gas Corp.; Orange & Rockland Utilities, Inc.; and Rochester Gas and Electric Corp.

"The purpose of the proposed generating companies to assure the timely construction and operation of necessary generating facilities through 1991 on a coordinated basis and at the lowest possible cost to the state's electric consumers," according to William A. Lyons, chairman and chief executive officer for

#### You Can Save Money

Between now and June 1 the Voorheesville Public Library will be holding a special drive to allow cardholders to pay off their debts and still save money. Many people are not aware that records of unpaid fines are kept. #### Exercise "Bead Coral"





#### Donor Age Lowered

A recent change in New York State law brings good news for young people and the Red Cross Blood Program, according to Dr. A.F.H. Britten Director of the Northeastern New York Program.

The new law, which lowered the permissable age for blood donors from 18 to 17 will give more young people an opportunity to share their good health with those who are sick and injured, Dr. Britten stated.

While young people have sponsored bloodmobiles at high schools throughout the Northeast region in the past, the lower donor age will allow more student participation in the actual donation of blood, the Blood Program Director noted. This was most evident at the recent bloodmobile at Bethlehem Central High School where 160 units of blood were collected, including seventeen units from 17-year olds.

Such enthusiastic support augurs well for future high school bloodmobiles and for blood collections during school vacations, particularly in the summer, when blood collections tend to fall off, Dr. Britten noted.

The lower donor age substantially broadens the eligible donor base because there are





The new world that people are demanding requires a new concept of man, a spiritually scientific concept, Catherine H. Anwandter, C.S.B., said here Saturday, April 6.

"People are protesting," Mrs. Anwandter said, "against the establishment, against war, against pollution and racial discrimination. There are marches and strikes, even revolutions. All are looking for answers, for justice, for solutions to the problems of communities, cities, minority groups and individuals."

And answers are available, she asserted. "This new world demands a new concept of man — a scientific concept that will unite us and lift us

out of archaic poverty, ignorance, disease and hatred, into freedom and dominion," she declared.

A Christian Science lecturer and teacher from Santiago, Chile, Mrs. Anwandter spoke in Albany Institute of History and Art, 125 Washington Avenue, at the invitation of First Church of Christ, Scientist, Albany, New York.

Speaking of the subject "The Science of the New Man," Mrs. Anwandter held that real selfhood isn't constituted of physical characteristics.

'Man isn't to be defined.' she declared, "by political or personal views, but by spiritual values. Goodwill love: outgoing sympathy iustice and wisdom, a reliable sense of goodness and capacity these are some of the spiritual values that really define a man. The living of qualities like these gives us freedom, health, and happiness. In fact, it's really spiritual qualities that constitute our true being."---It is a false concept of man

that is the basis of all fear and limitation, the lecturer said, maintaining that Christ Jesus proved this. "He turned thought away," she said "from the world of

she said, "from the world of disheartening failures and sorrow and ushered in a new sense of man, radically different from the old. He lived and explained the spiritual understanding of man — an understanding which brings full freedom from discord and suffering and even from death."

Mrs. Anwandter emphasized what this means for people today in need of regeneration.

"The Christ," she said, "is the divine Truth of your being that fills your thought with gentleness and peace and selfless purity."

Expressing it in another way, she said: "The Christ is the spiritual fulness and completeness of your being that expresses itself as health and freedom and joy and the tender understanding that this is the truth for all men."


**TROUT TIME!** New York's April 1 trout season opening prompted the remark by Commissioner of Environmental Conservation James L. Biggane that he has a little good news and a little bad news for anglers. "The good news is that most streams will be in better shape this spring than usual, The mild winter and generally early thaw means that water levels should be lower and streams should be clearer than we usually expect for opening day,' he explained.

"The bad news is also weather-related," Commissioner Biggane continued "Rainbow spawning runs in the Finger Lakes tributaries may have peaked before opening day, due to the warmer weather."

Commissioner Biggane also reported that the mild winter had permitted stocking operations to be carried out earlier than usual in many waters. He said that the Department will be stocking 7.4 million trout and salmon during 1974. The Department stocks 700 lakes and ponds with trout and salmon as well as 4,400 miles on 1,100 trout streams.

Total stream mileage in New York is about 15,000 miles with 10,000 miles managed for wild fish and 600 miles of larger streams supporting adequate trout levels by natural spawning.

Generally, Department fisheries biologists across the State report that conditions are expected to be better than usual
