Here's Some Answers

The following question-andanswer information has been submitted by Ann Treadway, Director of Public Information for the Bethlehem Central School District, to provide district residents who haven't attended public Board of Education meetings with answers to some questions which have been raised.

Q:: What is the Board of Education's top priority in developing a budget?

A.: To provide as good an education for our children as we can. All of the present Board members have, or have had; children in Bethlehem schools, and we are dedicated to maintaining — and improving — the quality of education for which this district has long been known.

Q.: Won't the quality of education at the Middle School be impaired by cutting the staff there by eight teachers?

A.: We are convinced, after months of deliberation, that the staff cuts reflected in the proposed budget will not adversely affect (and will in some waysimprove) the educational program to be offered Middle School pupils. Class size and teacher-pupil ratios will remain virtually the same. (The teacherpupil ratio will go from 1-14 to 1-15). While the size of each team will be increased from about 100 pupils to about 120 pupils, there will be five instead of four teachers assigned to each team. The fifth team. teacher will be an exploratory arts teacher, (art, music, homemaking, etc.) which will allow for better integration of the curriculums in these subjects with, the four core subjects.

Middle School teachers will be spending more classroom time with their pupils than during this year, but there is no extension of their school work day.

• **Q.:** We can expect some residents of the community to vote, against the budget simply be-, cause it does call for a tax rate increase, but now you will have people voting against it because it cuts staff and they don't think this should be done. Haven't you proposed a budget that makes you vulnerable from both sides?

A: We have adopted a budget that is an honest representation of what we believe will maintain high quality education at the lowest possible cost to taxpayers. This is the first time in three years we have proposed a budget calling for any tax increase, and this year's increase is a lower percentage than the increase in the Consumer Price Index.

Without cutting staff, we would have had to ask voter approval of a tax rate increase of about \$15 per \$1,000, instead of about \$8 for Bethlehem residents. While some persons would willingly pay more in taxes, we are well aware that we represent the entire com-

munity and we have tried to be fiscally responsible to all segments of our community.

Q.: What will the Board do if this budget is defeated?

A.: When a proposed school budget is voted down by district residents, a Board has three options: Re-submit the same budget for another vote, adopt and submit a different budget, or adopt an austerity budget and give residents the opportunity to vote on non-State-mandated budget items such as equipment, inter-scholastic athletics and library books. The Board has not discussed which option it would choose, but believes this budget is as realistic as possible and the resubmission of another budget is not a strong possibility.

All voters should understand that when a budget is defeated, for whatever reasons people vote against it, these are the only options available. Reinstatement of the eight Middle School teaching positions could only come about by a successful vote on that as a separateproposition. As of May 31, no one had petitioned the Board to put thin on the ballot as a separate item.

Q: Many of us who are parents feel that discipline standards in our schools are not what they should be, and that small numbers of disruptive pupils are harming the others academically and socially. Can we help the school staff in an attempt to set up some firm and effective guidelines relating to discipline?

A.: Any suggestions from parents on this topic are more than welcome. This is a complaint being heard these days throughout our society, but we recognize your concern and appreciate your input. (This response came from Dr. Zinn.)

Q.: Will there be a Boys' Glee Club at the Middle School next year?

A.: Yes. (The Board made this decision after the question was raised at the May 22 meeting).

School District residents who have other questions are urged to call the Hotline, 439-4921, Ext. 268, any weekday morning, or any member of the staff who would be most knowledgable on the specific subject. All residents are also invited and





urged to attend the Annual Meeting on Tuesday, June 11, at 7:30 p.m., at the High School, to receive more information and ask questions.

fast, according to Parks and Recreation Commissioner Alexander Aldrich, an accomplished boatman.

As anyone who has ever fallen while water skiing knows, water is pretty solid stuff - and pushing a boat or dragging your body through it uses a lot of energy, particularly when you are moving fast. Reducing a boat's speed can save a lot of gasoline. In fact elmost a quarter of the fuel can be saved by running at the most economical speed (only a few miles per hour less) rather than at full speed. On this basis the saving boatman could make five trips for the price of four.

So the most important fuel saving advice is to avoid high speed operation. Throttle back to the most economical speed, usually just above planing speed.

Other hints for saving fuel (and reducing costs) are:

Use tides and currents to maximum advantage. Plan your trip so the current is with you, if possible.

Distribute the passenger load to permit the lowest possible planing speed.

Do not idle engines for any extended periods of time when not necessary.

Keep engine tuned for peak efficiency, air filters clean, and use the proper grade of fuel for your engine.

Check the boat's bottom for marine growths which slow operation and waste fuel.

Keep fuel tanks' full as possible (avoiding evaporation' and condensation).

Director Robert Altman's (Mash) entry in the Bonnie and Clyde sweepstakes, is inventively directed, visually striking and marvelously acted. It's about a young bank-robber and his girl as he pursues his craft a step ahead of the police.

Thieves Like Us recaptures precisely the sleazy, downat-the-heels quality of life during the depression. Radio commercials are used instead of background music and the inarticulate girl says "that's pretty good" to express wild enthusiasm.

The movie is so well done, that we feel surprising sympathy for these two empty people.

Love and Anarchy

A new Italian film about a terrified would-be anarchist, and the few days he spends while preparing to assasinate Mussolini.

Most of the action takes place in an Italian bordello. One of the prostitutes is a dedicated anarchist, and she helps him, sandwiching his problems between her regular chores. It is, of course, earthy and profane but not explicitly sexual. It's also surprisingly funny.
