It's time again for the facts — in hopes that they will answer some questions about activities in the Children's Room of Bethlehem Public Library. If there are further questions, please call Mrs. Harris, the Children's Librarian, at 439-9314.

The Pre-School Storyhours which are on Wednesday and Thursday mornings require registration. The Kindergarten Day does not necessitate registration, and any kindergartner may come on Tuesdays at either 10 A.M. or 2 P.M. for 45 minutes of stories, games, songs and films. There will be three 8-week sessions beginning October 1, January 7 and April 1. Mark these dates on your calendar.

The 45 minute Storytime for first and second graders begins. October 3 at 4:00 P.M. 

Touhey on Property Tax

The state must ease the burden of property taxes by picking up a larger share of school costs, Carl E. Touhey declared Friday as he launched a series of "walks" through the 42nd Senate District (Albany and Greene Counties), which he seeks to represent as the Republican candidate.

His remarks came as he met homeowners along Hackett Avenue in Colonie

"Property laxes in this area and throughout the state have passed the saturation point," he said, "and the prime reason is the local cost of education.

"As the cost of public elementary and secondary education has more than doubled in New York State in the past six yours, the state share has slipped from 50 cents on the dollar to 40 cents on the dollar," Touhey explained.

As a state senator, Touhey said, "I will work to see that at the very least the state returns to its percentage sharing level of six years ago so that a property owner can see some relief in sight."

Noting that in the infant days of this country Chief Justice John Marshall warned, "The power to tax is the power to destroy," Touhey declared, "Everywhere I go, people tell me it is harder and harder to afford to live in their own homes or they cannot afford to paytaxes on homes they would like to buy."

"It is fairer and makes more sense for the state to assume its equitable share by using its broader revenue base than for the costs of education to keep piling up at the doorstep of the home owner," Touhey remarked. When the D&H Plaza still looked like this, West End Federal was already paying the highest interest rates. in Albany.

"Those renting also find their housing costs spiralling as the result of school property tax rates, and such increased costs to the business property owner get passed on to the buying public."

The situation, Touhey said, also places local school boards in the "unenviable position, more often than not, of either having to ask the homeowner for more and more money or limiting educational programs and opportunities."

"Further hikes in school property taxes are unacceptable," Touhey concluded "Boththe individual home owner and, the housing market already have been seriously hurt by the dramatic increases of the past few years and can tolerate no further financial damage."
