PDQT Meets


A meeting of the "People Deserve Quiet Trucks" (PDQT) group in Selkirk was held on September 16, to map progress toward a vehicle noise control program for the Selkirk area. The area has unusually high truck traffic, on the order of 100-200 heavy-duty truck trips per day through the residential section of Maple Avenue alone. and the noise generated by a small segment of this traffic stands out as an intrusion on many aspects of life in the community. "PDOT" seeks to locally apply reasonable truck noise control standards, as now done in other parts of the country, in order to recognize. a current need of the community and encourage continuing improvement as commercial advancements allow.

The meeting, at Mr. and Mrs. Richard Endreny's home, reviewed recent surveys of noise patterns in Selkirk and an opinion poll on how people living adjacent to Maple Avenue view the problem. The surveys, showed that a small but meaningful 10-20 percent of heavyduty traffic is emitting noise in excess of legal and commercial standards while a large majority of residents rated truck noise as a community problem worthy of adequate correction efforts by industry and local government.

The "PDQT" as a result of. the September meeting, is preparing to petition for a broad local enforcement program along Maple Avenue using existing legal authority in residential speed zones as a basis, for action. The group is also basing its appeal on imminent Federal truck noise standards... developed under the Noise Control Act of 1972, which can be properly adopted as local ordinance. The group is optimistic that the time is right for official recognition and control of the unique truck noise problem in Selkirk and sees relat-, ed noise reduction resulting for surrounding residential areas.


"Octobersing"







Preceeding the demonstration will be the club's promotional examination for up-grading students to higher belt levels. Those wishing to attend the examination are welcome.



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
