





Owens-Corning dedication: a plant ready to grow

Few industrial plants are as ideally located as Owens-Corning Fiberglas Corp.'s new complex on Feura Bush Rd. (Route 32) hardly a mile south of Delmar. The setting is strictly rural despite its proximity to one of Albany's most popular residential suburbs, the terrain is just starting to roll a bit on the way to the hills and ridges of the Helderberg escarpment beyond the Conrail yards, and there's plenty of acreage - 200 - for future growth.

Today Owens-Corning's top executives are in town to dedicate the new multi-milliondollar facility, with help from State Commerce Commissioner John S. Dyson and community leaders. Officiating at the noonday ceremonies will be W. W. Boeschenstein, presi-

dent and chief executive officer of the corporation headquartered in Toledo, Ohio; Richard Grant, vice president of production for the seven Owens-Corning plants that manufacture building materials; Guy Mabry, vice president of the insulation operating division, and Walter Reed, Delmar plant manager.

On the day's agenda are a press conference and plant tour followed by a buffet luncheon under canvas for officials, newsmen and guests. From 3 to 6 p.m. there will be an open house and picnic for the plant's 250 employees and their families. A pre-dedication hospitality program was to be held Wednesday evening for the immediate neighbors in the Meads Lane-Waldenmaier Rd.

area. A public open house for the entire community is scheduled for Saturday, Aug. 21.

Inside the plant, a low-profile sprawling one-story factory with enough floor space to accommodate five football fields, ultra-modern automated production lines are turning out the equivalent of 25 truckloads of Fiberglas products a day. The product: building insulation in roll and batt form for pouring and blowing wool for houses, mobile homes and commercial buildings. Modern electric furnaces melt raw materials into a syrupy molten glass that is centrifuged into glass fibers that are sprayed with a resin binder to form the finished product.

In full operation the plant is expected to maintain an annual payroll of nearly \$3 million and pump \$4.5 million into the local economy. From a June 14 startup the plant, according to Boeschenstein, "is performing at production levels that are normally not reached until after eight or nine months of

getting the bugs out." Added Reed, the chief architect of the smooth startup and so credited by his company president: "This accomplishment is due directly to the skill and enthusiasm of our employees. They've worked hard and learned quickly."


Reed comes to Delmar from Owens-Corning's Santa Clara, Calif. plant. He has been with the company since 1962. Overall Owens-Corning has 17,000 employees in 20 manufacturing plants in the U.S., plus development laboratories and sales offices. Its 1975 sales were close to \$900 million, making it the world's largest producer of glass fiber products. Those same products are compatible with the current push for energy conservation: insulation plays a key role in cutting down homeowners' fuel bills, a role in which Delmar, located in the heart of the nation's strongest home-heating market - the energy-gulping northeast henceforth will be playing a significant part.

PLANNING BOARD

Gould Park mired by EnCon ruling

A ruling by the State Department of Environmental Conservation declaring a third of the proposed Gould Park industrial subdivision as wetlands has made things sticky for the developers and the Bethlehem planning board.

EnCon's action, reclassifying three acres of the nine-acre

parcel on Rs. 9W in Glenmont under the Fresh Waters Wetlands Act, has given ownerdeveloper Walter Gould the options of proceeding with previously approved plans on the reduced acreage or starting from scratch with an entire new subdivision plan. The planning board last spring granted conditional approval for seven warehouse sites on plots averaging 40,000 square feet.

Under the wetlands act, filling land within 100 feet of the edge of the wetland's area is prohibited. Compounding Gould's frustration is EnCon's letter to land surveyor Lindsay Boutelle notifying him that storm water on the surviving lots cannot be discharged into the wetland area. "There appears nowhere else for it to go," commented Boutelle, "so we'll have to do some negotiating on that."


The proposed subdivision is located between Rt. 9W and Asprion Rd. just south of the Dairy Queen.

School artists go wall-to-wall

"Select a public site that could be added to aesthetically, design a plan to improve the site's appearance and present it to the site's owners, then install the design."

This was the mission 15 Bethlehem Central High School students accepted when they signed up for art teacher Stanley Reich's two-semester "Aesthetic Environment" course. By fall eight "missions accomplished" will testify to the students' success.

All of the classes 10 proposals — each the culmination of nearby two-thirds of a year's work - were approved by the town, the school, the Delaware Plaza Merchants Assn. and

other site owners. "We were surprised at the (number of) acceptances," Reich said.

The site owners funded the material costs, in most cases paints, masking tape and brushes. Then the 15 students set to work "aesthetically improving" the high school's girl's locker room walls, a school, cafeteria wall, an exterior wall of the Bethlehem Coffee House and several other walls and entranceways throughout Delmar and Elsmere. Eileen Pohlsander's project, an abstract mural, occupies a wall in the waiting room of Albany Medical College.

Reich said the class wanted to "plunge right in" and resisted



preliminary exercises leading up to their final projects.

While students Sue Harding and Karen Austin hedged at calling it the "most enjoyable" art course they agreed it was "one of the most valuable art courses offered." It was like a course in interior design or architecture, they said. Lessons in drawing to scale and construction of scale models were included in the course.

Sue and Karen stood by their almost finished wall display across from the Paul Mitchell's Men's Store at Delaware Plaza. Behind them on the ochrecolored wall were seven larger-than-life wooden silhouettes of people; two more will be added before it is finished. Bushes and plants will be placed in the stone trough beneath the mural, they said.

Sue said friends posed for some of the figures; the rest were done from imagination. Her parents and Reich were among those who posed. The project cost between \$100 and \$150, she said.

One exterior wall of the Bethlehem Coffee House now boasts a semi-abstract painting of purple mountains, blue sky and a multi-colored rainbow. Debbie Longabaugh and Sue Sheridan are almost finished with the mural. The town of Bethlehem sponsored their project. Other class projects include Sue Harding's low relief of cut wooden fragments in the Elm Ave. offices of the town's Dept. of Parks and Recreation; Corrina Ripp's and Karen Austin's treatment of an entrance to the high school in golds and browns, with a decorative wood relief to go above the doors; and Darcy Lenden's bold, hard-edge stripes along the entrance to the high school library.

The course will not be offered next year but Reich hopes the following year there will be enough student interest to offer it again.

After all, the Coffee House still has three ugly walls left.

Citizens awaiting Job Corps action

A second private roundtable session conducted by Rep. Samuel S. Stratton of New York's 28th Congressional District scheduled for 1 p.m. Wednesday included for the first time representatives of the Glenmont neighborhood association formed to unify community opposition to the proposed establishment of a Job Corps center in a vacant seminary along the Hudson River.


Town officials and Bethlehem civic leaders picked by Stratton for a steering committee in the controversy met three weeks ago with Stratton and U.S. Dept. of Labor administrators. Stratton, critical of the federal agency's slipshod handling of the procedure and sensitive to outspoken opposition by a segment of the community, has been acting as an impromptu mediator in an effort to wheedle information from Job Corps officials.

Meanwhile things were quiet at the 240-acre Our Lady of Angels seminary in the semirural sparsely populated area between Rt. 144 and Van Wies Pt. Most of the Vincentian fathers and seminarians have left, and apart from an occasional employment interview and contractors' surveys, there is little traffic in the security office manned by Burns Detective Agency guards while the uneasy truce motivated by Stratton lasts.







Board explores bike path plan

Bethlehem's seven-member board of education has unanimously "expressed interest in the concept" of granting a bicycle path easement on high school property.

Town of Bethlehem bicycle safety council member John Nyilis, representing the council, drew up and submitted the easement request. The proposed path would run between the sidewalk and the school's athletic fields parallel to Delaware Ave. and then run parallel to Elm Ave. between the fields and private homes. The school board is not being asked to fund the project, only to allow its construction on school property.

A letter requesting specific information on the proposal is being sent by the school board to the bicycle council, which acts as a citizen advisory group to the town of Bethlehem.

The legal requirements of such a path will be explored by the board, School Superintendent Lawrence A. Zinn said. According to school board attorney Roger Fritts, the matter






