





#### A church divided: after anguish, renewed hopes

For Bethlehem Lutherans the first services in their separate churches since the emotional split at the synod level became finalized at the congregation level were a mixture of sadness and joyful relief. The anguish of choosing between two factions was over at last: for the dissidents who have formed their new church it's the time to solidify and build, for those remaining with their torn but beloved parish it's a time to unify and rededicate faith.

Last Sunday, on a day as beautiful and cloudless as Easter Sunday a year ago, Lutherans turned out in Easter numbers. More than 100 men, women and children were in the beautiful church on the bend of Elm Ave, in Delmar when the blue-robed choir, 18 strong, filed in at 11 o'clock. The worshipers rose to sing No. 352 in the Lutheran hymnal, "O Savior, Precious Savior," as the sun flooded through the tinted windows. Outside the parking lot was full, but many familiar faces were missing.

A mile down Delaware Ave.. in the National Commercial Bank parking lot, a group of children tossed snowballs at a fence and at each other. Their parents were downstairs in the bank at a coffee hour preceding the inaugural service of Faith Lutheran, Delmar's newest church. When Lynne Reville, seated at an electric organ donated by a friend of the congregation, played the opening chords of Hymn 39. "Praise to the Lord, the Almighty, the King of

creation," four pastors took their places at a temporary altar, the communion vessels borrowed from Troy. The room was full, there were two rows of extra chairs. Many of these faces, too, were familiar: they were the ones missing from Elm Ave.

For months members of the Bethlehem Lutheran Ghurch have been agonizing on a matter of conscience. They have been caught at the parish level, both as a church and as individuals, in the split in the Missouri Synod, the governing body for more than 6,200 churches across the nation and one of several Lutheran synods. At the root of the controversy are the ordination of student ministers, liturgical interpretations and teaching interpretations that led a group of synod leaders to form a new churchbody, the Association of Evangelical Lutheran Church-

For more than 100 families in the Bethlehem church, the rift in the hierarchy 1,000 miles away confronted them with a deeply personal choice: remain with the established synod or affiliate with the newly formed East Coast Synod of the AELC. For many communicants, the issues provided a penetrating evaluation of personal religious convictions and beliefs in addition to a commitment to the conflicting interpretations of the topechelon breach. Adding to the anguish on Elm Ave. was the timing: only last Oct. 22 Bethlehem Lutherans gathered at Blanchard Post for a farewell dinner honoring their pastor, Rev. Paul H. Gassmann retiring after 38 years in the ministry and 11 in Delmar. Since November the congregation has been served by an interim pastor, more recently by visiting pastors on a rotating basis, while the breach was widening.

On Feb. 27, more than half of the church's adult members gathered in the gracefully designed seven-year-old structure to choose between the new and the old synods. The ballot was whether to bring a proposed amendment to the constitution to a floor vote. Passage would require a twothirds majority.

When the ballots were counted, the vote stood 56-56. A week later, on March 6, the members returned for another try, this time by a floor vote: shall the constitution be amended to disassociate from the Missouri Synod and become independent pending further decision on affiliation? This time a majority favored the change, but the vote fell short of the required two-thirds.

Shortly after the balloting David Reville, president of the Bethlehem church, and three others resigned as officers but not as members of the congregation. Four nights later, 44 parishioners gathered at Reville's house in Delmar to form a new church. They also elected their first slate of officers to serve until the inaugural congregation meeting April 17. Michael Krugman was elected president, Carolyn Bennett vice president. Doris Rowland recording secretary and Dr. Peter Kuliberg treasurer. A financial secretary, Pauline Ouderkirk, was chosen later.

On the following Sunday, March 13, at a congregational meeting in the church on Elm Ave., James W. Bowersox of Voorheesville was elected president to succeed Reville. The other three vacancies also were filled: John Gold as vice president, Mrs. Norrine Cooke

as recording secretary and Robert Greenman as treasurer. Paul Stracke of Slingerlands continues as financial secretary.

Rev. Robert Mursch, pastor of Our Savior's Lutheran Church, Troy, who has been serving as interim pastor since November, conducted inaugural communion of Faith Lutheran Church in the bank's meeting room on Delaware Ave. Dr. John Damm, dean of Seminex and a national Lutheran leader, was guest speaker. On Elm Ave. Rev. Joe Schruhl, pastor of St. Matthew's Lutheran Church, Albany, and district representative for the Missouri Synod, led the service. Rev. Gordon Rakow of Latham, circuit counselor, is handling hospital' and shut-in calls temporarily, and other Lutheran pastors have set up a rotation of nearby pastors to serve the Bethlehem pulpit.

Present indications are that approximately 30 families numbering just under 100 persons are affiliating with the new church, with about two-thirds of the original congregation remaining on Elm Ave. The rift has caused tension among close friends and neighbors, between people who have worked closely on committees in the past, has separated young friends who played together in the nursery and Sunday school.

But it has also given churchgoers on both sides a reason for rededication. In the bank meeting room the mood was jovial, enthusiastic, as though a burden had been lifted. The new officers are negotiating to use the Masonic Temple on Kenwood Ave, for their services later in April. There is already talk of finding a site and building a church. On Elm Ave, the mood is more reflective: a growing congrega-

tion has been decimated but a solid nucleus of committed communicants remains. There are some problems, such as the spectre of the mortgage along with other financial obligations that now have fewer people to shoulder. "Our faith is strong," one communicant whispered as the choir, lead by steadfast Irma Rappe, moved through the pews singing the recessional, No. 123, "Our God, our help in ages past, our hope in years to come." Later, as the members emerged into the parking lot, there were youngsters, throwing snowballs in the 50-degree sun on the fifth Sunday of Lent, with all the joy of Easter--The Resurrection--just days away.



## A new service for widowhood

A volunteer service to lend emotional and supportive aid to newly widowed persons was started in the Capital District. The volunteering is done by widowed persons for widowed persons. Ruth Pohl and Jean Vogel of Delmar and Dorothy Hartman of Slingerlands are among the 25 trained volunteers working with the recently widowed.

Widowed Persons Service of the Capital District, Inc. assists newly widowed persons through a variety of services. Volunteers visit the recently widowed person and discuss on a one-to-one basis adjustment to the problems of widowhood. There are also informal group sessions for the volunteers and newly widowed persons to discuss adjustment problems and to provide mutual assistance. The service will use public service agencies and the media to call attention to the needs of the widowed and services available to them.

To provide these services, there is a need for more volunteers who have been widowed for two years. Also needed are financial support and referrals of newly widowed persons. For information call 434-1414.

#### A quick passage for games permit

It took just 12 minutes for the New Scotland town board to conduct a public hearing and approve an ordinance to permit licensing non-profit organizations to run games of chance.

The board set Tuesday, May 3, for a townwide referendum on the proposal that would authorize games-of-chance at fire department carnivals, church bazaars and other such events.

Fewer than a dozen volunteer firemen made up the audience. There was no opposition. The fire fighters represented the three fire companies in the town -- New Salem, Voorheesville and Onesquethaw.

Most of the \$25 fee goes to the state and to the county when they "police" the license. The license runs for a year, and restricts the holder to a maximum of 12 nights a year and 5 percent of the "take."

The balloting in May will be from 12 noon to 8 p.m. at the town hall.



SOUTH ALBANY

#### For 21 families: the water's fine, but oh! the red tape

If a stranger were to ask directions to get to South Albany, few Delmar residents could probably tell him how to go. Even fewer would know that South Albany, in a small pocket of Bethlehem, has its own private water system, and a very good one it is.

But it wasn't always that way, and therein lies a tale. The story has an interesting past, a frustrating present and hopefully a bright future.

The straight news story, which may or may not be reported in the Albany papers before a public hearing comes up April 27 in Bethlehem town hall, would read something like this: a group of residents have petitioned the town to establish a South Albany water district, an engineering survey has been made and the town is considering the matter.

The real story goes deeper than the fine well that an

Albany land developer drilled in 1925. His name was Brate, first name lost to history. No Brate listed in the Albany phone book, including Mrs. Anna Brate, 86, is related to him or even knew of him.

More than a half century ago Mr. Brate, a wealthy Albany investor, saw an attractive business opportunity in connection with the large railroad yards the New York Central was building in the sparsely settled countryside at the southern end of the town of Bethlehem. 
Jericho Rd. meets what is now called South Albany Rd. He built 21 dwellings before the Great Depression shut down most everything around.

In 1927 Brate established the South Albany Water Supply Co. to serve the 21 homes. The developer maintained the system as a private corporation until 1960, when he sold it to several elderly couples who bought the company against the advice of the community's younger leaders, Francis Currey, a World War II hero and holder of the Congressional Medar of Honor, and Ed Arnheiter, Voorheesville office manager for the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture. The senior citizens paid \$900 for the system, which had seriously deteriorated.

A decade ago the deterioration almost proved fatal. The survivors among the aged owners had difficulty keeping up with the billing and maintenance, and came to Currey, Arnheiter and Jack Orme, an airline executive who has since moved to Boston, for help. Thus the South Albany Water Co. acquired a volunteer administration from its own clientele. But it needed more than that: the whole system was near collapse.

Appeals for town, county and federal help fell on deaf ears until Congressman Dan Button arranged a \$17,000 loan and an \$8,000 grant from the U. S. Farm and Home Administration. These funds financed a substantial renovation of the system, including the addition of a 10,000-gallon storage tank, a dry well and electrical improvements. After that, recalls Currey, "we had a good system but pretty terrible water."

Continued pursuit of government agencies meant a mountain of red tape, but there was always hope. Once again, with quality and quantity fading, it was the local Congressman who came to the rescue, this time in the person of Rep. Samuel S. Stratton who had succeeded Button in the 29th District. Stratton obtained an \$11,000 grant for South Albany. That meant a

new well, which went operational a year and a half

"Now the water is beautiful," says Currey, "but there's no one to help with the endless paperwork." With Orme gone, it remained for Currey and Arnheiter to file all the reports. required by the state Public Service Commission, Albany County Health Dept. and state and federal tax agencies. "It's impossible," said a weary Currey. "You wouldn't believe the red tape. It's frustrating. The only thing worse would be to have no water, and if it wasn't for Sam Stratton, there'd be some homes here without water."

Through it all the water company has stayed afloat financially. The bills go out quarterly to 21 families, 18 on the south side of First Ave., three on the north side. One other house has its own well. The customers pay an average of \$120 a year for their water.

But it can't go on this way, and last week a petition bearing 17 signatures was submitted to the Bethlehem town board requesting the town to establish the South Albany system as a town water district.

The wheels are beginning to turn. There are state and county procedures to follow, and the town has set April 27 for a public hearing as Step No. 1. If and when it becomes a bonafide water district, the town will take over the operation, administration and maintenance of the existing system, but the cost will be borne by the users.

Connecting with the main Bethlehem system is a long way

off. The nearest hookup would be Speeder Rd., Selkirk, but that's on the other side of the web of tracks in the Conrail yards near the Agway building. The cost of going over or under the tracks would be astronomical for so few families.

"We are watching the growth of the town very carefully," says Paul Wagner, director of operations of the Bethlehem Water Dept. "South Bethlehem wants water, too. We will just have to wait to get more valuation to make it economically feasible."

Adds Francis Currey: "It's been a hell of a headache."

#### Test your dog

It is time to have your dog tested for heartworm, says the Capital District Veterinary Society. The disease is spread by mosquitoes. In the newly infected dog the heartworm develop in the tissues, then penetrate into blood vessels and move to the heart where they mature into adula heartworms that are often 10-14 inches long. The adult female heartworm then gives birth to a new crop of heartworms that circulate freely in the dog's bloodstream waiting for a free ride to another dog via the mosquito. A word of caution: do not use preventive medication which you may have left over; from last year until your dog has been rechecked.






#### March 30, 1967


