## COST OF GOVERNMENT

### Towns hold line on taxes, but county bite is deep

Next week brings that annual New Year's greeting from elected officials entrusted with running municipal government on the county and town levels. Most local property owners will have their tax warrants with Wednesday's mail, and the envelopes carry bad news from state and county elevations. Property taxes are due Jan. 31.

The biggest wallop comes from the Democratic-controlled Albany County Legislature, which last month steamrolled a 1978 budget of \$124 million that boosts property taxes an average of 23 percent. Because of varying assessment rates in the county's 10 towns and three cities, the equalization rates vary in direct proportion: in Bethlehem the state and county bite is up 33.3 percent, in New Scotland, 23.7 percent.

For the most part, town governments this year have either held the line or kept the increases to a minimum. The

local tax rate in the town of New Scotland is down 3 cents per \$1,000 of assessed valuation. In Bethlehem the rate is up \$1.37, an increase of 5.7 percent compared to a jump of \$7.79 or 33.3 percent in the county levy.

The jump in the county bite has swung the pendulum in Bethlehem from an approximate 50-50 ratio between the town and county-state shares to 55-45.

In Bethlehem the total 1978 warrant is \$6,454,628.23, compared to \$5,641,380.79 a year ago. There will be 8,706 individual warrants going to the post office next week, up

more than 300 from last year's total, a figure that underscores the town's steady growth. Tax Collector Kenneth Hahn has hired eight temporary clerks for approximately two weeks, an annual procedure to process the tax rolls to make the mailing deadline of Jan. 10 required by law. Hahn said last week there was a possibility of his staff mailing the notices by Monday, a day early.

Bethlehem residents also have until Jan. 31 to pay their annual assessments for various sewer and water extensions. The rates vary by sections, the formula based on the cost and extent of the facilities involved. Fire district taxes also are levied at this time.

### Board to hike chairman's pay

One of the items on the agenda for the new Bethlehem town board's first meeting is a proposal for raising the salary of the chairman of the town planning board.

Currently William R. Weber, the present chairman, is paid at the same rate as the other six board members, \$1,961.98 per year. The board meets weekly the year round, and with a rising volume of

reports, paperwork and procedural meetings with developers and state and county agencies, the chairman's job has become increasingly time consuming. The chairman of the town's zoning board of appeals, Charles Fritts, is paid \$1,787.17 while the other four members of the board draw \$1,388.63. The appeals board meets three times a month when the agenda warrants.

The salary question presumably will come up when the town board holds its regular session next Wednesday. There was no indication of when the raise would be effective or how much of a boost it would be.

Donald S. ### Town reshuffles attorney posts

The resignation of Justice Donald N. DeAngelis a week before the New Year caused a reshuffling of appointments to two town of Bethlehem posts as the Corrigan administration prepared to take office at 393 Delaware Ave.

In quick succession, the town board accepted the resignation of DeAngelis midway through his second four-year term, appointed town attorney Harry B. Rezzemini to replace DeAngelis on the bench at 118 Adams St., and named Bernard Kaplowitz town attorney. The latter two appointments were

announced at last Wednesday's town board meeting, the final session under Supervisor Harry H. Shaeffer, and activated at the annual organizational meeting of the new board late Monday afternoon, the first under Supervisor Thomas V. Corrigan.

DeAngelis, a resident of Delmar for 20 years, said he was stepping down because of the pressure of his private law practice as a partner in the Albany firm of Hinman, Straub, Pigors and Manning. He was elected town justice in the 1971 November elections and reelected in 1975. From

1967 to 1971 he served as Bethlehem's police prosecutor. He is married and the father of six children. He is a graduate of Cornell University and Albany Law School and is president of the Albany-Schenectady Magistrates Assn.

For Rezzemini the appointment means a return to the post he held for eight years and in which he succeeds the man who succeeded him six years ago. Rezzemini was elected town justice in November, 1963, served two four-year terms with Justice Harold White, and has served three two-year appointments as town attorney. His interim

appointment is for one year. He will be on the ballot in November as a candidate to fill the remaining 12 months of DeAngelis' term, which runs through Dec. 31, 1979.

As town justice, Rezzemini will serve with Roger M. Fritts, who was elected to a four-year term in November to succeed Robert H. Rice, who is returning to private practice. Rezzemini, a resident of Delmar since 1950, is a graduate of Colgate University and Albany Law School. He is married and has three children.

Kaplowitz, who succeeded Bertram E. Kohinke as town Republican chairman in April, 1976, led his party to an overwhelming sweep of Bethlehem's six elective offices in the local elections last November. He is a graduate of the University of Pennsylvania and Albany Law School and is a member of the Delmar law firm of Walworth, Harding, Welt and Stockton. He is married and has four children.

All three posts are part-time positions.

### Board renames 2 panel members

Bethlehem's town board, organizing for a new two-year administration under newly-elected Supervisor Thomas V. Corrigan, despatched a routine agenda at its first meeting Monday afternoon after swearing in two new councilmen and other town officers.

In addition to naming a new town justice for an interim term and appointing a new town attorney, the board reappointed Earl Robinson of Delmar to a five-year term on the zoning board of appeals and John LaForte of Delmar to another seven-year term on the planning board. The town board, which accepted the resignation of Edward Mocker of Glenmont from the planning board at the final meeting of 1977 last week, took no action



Start is near  
for Lyndhurst**

Only a few formalities stand in the way of clearing the first building site for Lyndhurst, the vast residential subdivision planned for a rolling, wooded tract in Slingerlands. But one of them is pivotal: approval by the Albany County Dept. of Health, which currently is holding up approval for large residential projects in Bethlehem because of an alleged long-range water shortage.

With 162 building lots projected on the surveyor's charts, Lyndhurst is the largest of several major subdivisions planned for the town of Bethlehem. Residents of Slingerlands have vigorously opposed the project, citing traffic problems and residential density that they feel would substantially change the character of the hamlet.

Apart from the possible snag at the county health



department, developers John B. Wheeler and Wolf Kramer need only routine endorsements for electric and telephone systems and a drainage plan, plus a state soils report before applying for the first building permits on Section I. The first section embraces 34 lots on extensions of Surrey Mall and Middlesex Dr., Slingerlands, and a proposed new street to be called Eustice Ridge. The basic plan was approved following a public hearing on July 8, 1975.

The developers' plans for the remaining 128 lots have been revised five times and probably will require further revisions before the planning board sets a date for another public hearing. This time the hearing will consider the remainder of the sprawling tract and a subdivision layout that connects Section I with Font Grove Rd. and bridges a deep ravine on the property. Preliminary approval has been delayed by several board members who take a dim view of "keyhole lots" and cul-de-sacs. Section II plans include five keyhole lots, three cul-de-sacs, a pumping station and access road to LaGrange Rd. The board also requested the developers to widen to main road through the area from 50 to 60 feet. The road has not been named.

### GLENMONT Hearing slated for subdivision

Bethlehem planning board has scheduled a public hearing Jan. 17 on preliminary plans for a four-lot subdivision on Beacon Rd., Glenmont, adjacent to the large Bicentennial Woods development. The proposed subdivision, to be known as Kilworth, is opposite Michael's Estates. Principals are D. Lee Miller and Sharyn R. Miller of Beacon Rd.

In an unrelated action, A.T. Zautner and Son, a local developer, withdrew preliminary plans for Glen Manor, a 35-lot subdivision proposed for the south side of Feura Bush

Rd. abutting Calvary Cemetery, Glenmont. The developer indicated to the planning board that he would submit revised plans at a later date.

### Delmar school a priority item

In the eyes of Supervisor Thomas V. Corrigan, the Bethlehem town board has no more pressing piece of business than the conversion of the vacant Delmar Elementary School building to a combination of town offices and a community center. The town took title to the 51-year-old structure this week, completing the \$65,000 transfer from the Bethlehem Central school district.

Corrigan, who has been in the forefront of the move to renovate the facility as a town resource, led local officials on a walkthrough last Saturday morning. For Edward Mocker, the impromptu tour two days before he was to take a seat on the town board, and Bernard Kaplowitz, newly appointed town attorney, it was the first opportunity to inspect the vacant building.

After the walkthrough Mocker was enthusiastic. "The potential is tremendous," he commented. "I don't think we could have had a better break for the town than to acquire this building."

### VOORHEESVILLE New directory due next month

Publishers of the "Little Phone Book" for the town of Guilderland and village of Voorheesville have extended the deadline for advertising and directory copy from Dec. 30 to Jan. 13, and now expect to have the press run complete by mid-February.

The Voorheesville-Guilderland edition will be the seventh in a series of 15 pocket-size books the publishers call "resource directories." The project's foundation is a listing

of a community's non-profit service organizations, and will be updated annually. It will be distributed free to households and businesses, with the financing coming from yellow-page advertisers.

The idea was conceived by Jim Olsen, a vice president of the Williams Press, Inc., a giant Albany printing company, but the implementation has come from two students of American history who just happened to be in the right place at the right time. Barbara Brody of Elsmere and Chris Karpiak of Albany were hired by Williams Press for a history research project when someone found

473 steel engravings that had been stored in a basement vault for more than 100 years. The students established that the plates had been used to illustrate literature and history books in the 1850s.
