



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

GE unveils \$11.5-million pollution control facility

General Electric's Noryl Products plant in Selkirk broke ground today (Thursday) on an \$11.5-million wastewater treatment plant described as incorporating the most advanced pollution control technology available.


The ceremonial first-shovel was scheduled to take place with company executives, government officials and civic leaders participating in front of newspaper and television cameras.

A GE spokesman said the company has "made the commitment to proceed with this facility now" in compliance with all county, state and federal requirements. The statement added that "construction today will insure continued future compliance and will demonstrate maximum environmental control for the growing Noryl business."

The facility, the spokesman said, "will be well ahead of present industry standards."

The Noryl wastewater will be treated by a multi-step process that includes biological waste reduction similar to that occurring in nature. This removal is, however, greatly accelerated by a process called "activated sludge" which optimizes and controls this natural biological process, the company said.

Two additional steps are provided to eliminate pollutants that might not be removed by the biological process—activated carbon absorption followed by tertiary sand filtration. This two-step operation removes dissolved pollutants and particles and is very similar to the treatment nor-



mally only used for drinking water purification, the statement declared.

The facility also incorporates several other advanced technologies including computerized control, spill detection and containment and solids destruction, the company said.

General Electric in 1966 began the worldwide commercialization of Noryl thermoplastic resin with the construction of the Selkirk plant. This one-of-a-kind plant produces a plastic molding compound that is used to manufacture a broad spectrum of household, consumer, and industrial applications, such as automobile parts, television components, business machine parts, hospital furnishings and household appliances.

Construction of the new treatment facility will be completed by the end of 1980. The project will add ten new, permanent jobs to the community.

A motorist wanted in two Western states was arrested by Albany County sheriff's deputies on the Voorheesville patrol after being stopped on Rt. 85, Slingerlands, Saturday morning.

Yves P. Stamenov, 44, a native of Bulgaria with U.S. citizenship, was charged with being a fugitive from justice after a routine check of his Oregon license plates revealed charges pending against him. Deputies said he was wanted in Oregon for theft of services and in Kansas for violation of parole.

Deputy Thomas Travison, Jr., who made the arrest, said Stamenov gave an Albany address. He was remanded to Albany County jail to await extradition.


DELMAR 4 teens indicted on vandal counts

An Albany County grand jury has indicted four Delmar teenagers on three charges stemming from the Memorial Day spree of vandalism at the Bethlehem Central Middle School.

Mark T. Hines, 19, of Rose Ct.; Joseph M. Paigo, 17, of 60 The Crossway; Christopher P. Elliott, 17, of 46 Montrose Dr., and Michael Ganley, 17, of 10 Woodridge Rd., pleaded innocent to two felony counts and one misdemeanor at their arraignment Monday before Judge John J. Clyne in county court. Clyne continued each in the \$5,000 bail set at their arraignment in Bethlehem justice court.

The four were charged with second-degree criminal mischief and third-degree burglary, both felonies, and petit larceny in sealed indictments handed down last Thursday. Hines and Paigo were arrested by Bethlehem police 24 hours after the daytime spree in the school. Elliott and Ganley were arrested five days later.



same materials, siding and color of the house.

This week the controversy was resolved when Goltz notiied Flanigan he was altering he design to comply with the four-foot limit. The board, which had scheduled a public hearing for July 11 and had the required legal notice in type, immediately cancelled the hearing and pulled the notice from the Spotlight calendar and legal section within hours of presstime. The house, which stands out starkly in a neighborhood of Williamsburg Colonials, is situated on the corner of Darnley Greene and Murray Ave. In one architect's drawing filed with the board, the landscaped courtyard on the Darnley Greene side—or possibly the front—is shown as embracing an "outdoor pool/spa." but on a smaller diagram the feature is labelled an 8x4 "redwood hot tub" on a sixinch concrete slab.





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DELMAR When is a fence not a fence?

On the Bethlehem board of appeals, applications for a variance from provisions of the town's zoning ordinance are routine and are handled, after due consideration, by routine procedure.

Not so in the matter of a new dwelling at 6 Darnley Greene, Delmar, an architectural exponent of the "mod" contemporary design, currently nearing completion. The architect and the town's building department last week found themselves at odds on a structural interpretation, leaving the board to decide which one is correct.

The controversy centered on

22-foot L-shaped extension of a 6-foot-high wall constructed of 2-by-4s. In the elbow of the extension the architect has designed an open-air courtyard that accommodates a pool, which in itself is open to a technical interpretation.

The architect, Lawrence H. Goltz of 9 Brookview Ave., Delmar, considered the wall an extension of the house. The head of the town's building department, John Flanigan, considered it a fence.

Therein lay the legal problem: under the town's zoning law, the maximum height for a fence of solid construction is four feet, five feet when it protects a swimming pool. A six-foot fence must be of the see-through variety, such as a chain link or a loosely constructed picket fence.

When Flanigan made a formal determination that it was a fence, Goltz filed for a variance from the building inspector's decision. That in itself is an unusual occurrence for the board of appeals.

Goltz contended that the barrier was an extension of the house itself because it is attached to the house and has the

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


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UNIONVILLE Carnival to aid new fire truck


NEW SCOTLAND Long to rebuild after fire loss

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

On the other hand, some residents have vigorously protested the program. Several have warned the town that if any of the spray lands in their yards, they will take the town to court.


