Democrats call for public forum on issues

Bethlehem Democratic leader Kenelm R. Thacher has identified five major campaign issues for the municipal elections in November, and has declared a need for "regional debates" in four sections of the

In a press statement over the weekend, Thacher charged that Bethlehem's entrenched Republican administrations over the years "have not been on the level" with townspeople. The text of the statement indicated Thacher, who heads his party's local ticket as its candidate for supervisor, will concentrate on the Peter Fish police issue, the town's water supply, establishment of a youth bureau, zoning and fiscal management as the

prime issues in the current campaign.

In his statement, Thacher said the administration:

- Was "less than candid in handling the difficulties within the police department."
- "Misled" townspeople on questions of water supply and pressure during the 1977 local election.
- Had state approval of plans to establish a youth bureau, but "still has not set one up."
- Talked about setting up an architectural review board, but has taken no action.
- Claims it is "fiscally conservative but town budgets have gone up an average of 30 percent over the last 10 years."

Thacher declared that "com-

mercial zoning regulations for years have cried out for revisions... Just look what has happened to Delaware Ave. under Republican control of this town."

Thacher questioned the operations of the police department ID program, which he termed well-intentioned. "One wonders if a youth bureau, operating with the schools and police department, could have detected and developed programs to combat the problems of youth and alcohol," he said.

Thacher stated that "it would be very positive if some organization would set up regional debates in Elsmere, Delmar, Slingerlands-North Bethlehem and Glenmont-Selkirk."

Supervisor Tom Corrigan, Thacher's Republican opponent, said he would be "delighted to debate any time, any place."

Named Merit scholars

Five students from Bethlehem Central High School and one from Voorheesville High School are among 20 secondary school students from Albany County named as semifinalists in the 25th National Merit Scholarship competition. Winners include David H. Brickman, Lior Evan, Robert K. Heineman, Jim H. Peak and Susan P. Steinberg of Bethlehem and Suzanne P. Johnson of Voorheesville. There were four semifinalists from Shaker High School, Latham, three from Guilderland Central High School, three from Albany High School, and one from Academy of the Holy Names, The Albany Academy, Colonie Central High School and Mercy High School, Albany.

BÉTHLEHEM

Primary turnout a boost for GOP

Bethlehem's first primary election in more than a decade, involving Republican and Conservative party voters, has buoyed campaign hopes for GOP leaders.

Candidates and committeemen were cautious in their optimism, but sideline observers pointed out these plusfactors in last Tuesday's balloting:

- A turnout of 2,200 Republican voters indicated substantial political interest in the local elections and support on Nov. 6.
- Peter Wenger's victory over challenger Harry Rezzimini in the contest for town justice was interpreted as a solid endorsement of the incumbent GOP administration and town chairman Bernard Kaplowitz' sealed-ballot policy in committee voting on selection of candidates.
- Wenger's win by a 2-1 margin at the polls last Tuesday bolstered Republican hopes in the upcoming contest with Michael Breslin, considered the strongest candidate on the Democratic ticket.
- All seven GOP candidates for town offices and of Bethlehem's three Republican candidates for the Albany County Legislature won designation on the Conservative Party line on the November ballot.
- The Conservative campaign provided much of the behind-the-scene excitement in the three weeks leading up to last week's primary. Bethlehem's approximately 40 reg-

istered Conservative Party members were courted vigorously--and in some cases overly so--by both Republican and Democrats. The Republicans worked hard to persuade Conservatives to write-in the names of GOP candidates instead of marking the box for the Democratic candidate endorsed by the county committee, while the Democrats campaigned to keep the Conservatives "in line"

- The results: 32 Conservatives went to the polls, a turnout exceeding 75 percent. The most significant result was Wenger winning the ballot line, 18-14, over Breslin. The lone Democrat victor in the Conservative confrontation was John Terence Mitchell of Delmar, an Albany attorney whose name will be on the Conservative line rather than that of Sue Ann Ritchko, Republican candidate for the county Legislature seat from the 34th district in Delmar.
- W. Gordon Morris and Edward Sargent, Elsmere Republicans running for reelection to the county Legislature, won Conservative designation, Morris by-a total-of-4 to-3,...

In the Republican primary, Wenger polled 1,472 to 748 for Rezzimini.





NEW SCOTLAND

Write-in buovs Republican hopes

An overwhelming response to the New Scotland Republican's 11th-hour appeal to voters for a write-in campaign in the Sept. 11 primary has given the party a major lift.

Party chairman Fred Edmunds had no comment on the lopsided "victory" scored by Voorheesville attorney Kenneth J. Connolly, candidate for town justice, over William E. Seymour, who quit the post on July 31 without warning, but other party leaders were enthused.

Of 348 voters—a remarkably high turnout for a primary that usually produces yawns from the electorate-298 wrote Connolly's name in the small box provided by the "Opportunity to Ballot" clause in the state Election Law. Unofficial totals had 44 ballots voided, mostly for misspelling Connolly's name or writing in the wrong place. There were only nine ballots for Seymour. Two ballots had other names written

"The response to our last-

minute appeal to voters was really great," one town official said last week. "We have a hard campaign ahead of us, and this is a good sign."

Seymour's surprise resigna-

tion, one day after the deadline for placing names on the ballot and less than 48 hours before the deadline for petitions for a write-in box on the paper ballot, caused a hectic scramble among GOP workers in New Scotland to get Connolly's name on the November ballot in place of Seymour's. Party leaders theorized that if uninformed New Scotland voters marked their ballots for Sevmour thinking they were doing their political duty, Seymour's name would be on the November GOP line. In such a situation, party leaders figured, all votes for Seymour, a noncandidate, would be wasted and the election would be "handed to the Democrats on a platter."

BETHLEHEM

Town plans sale of 6 properties

Addition of 40,000 square feet of floor space in the former Delmar Elementary School now being renovated as the new town hall has caused the town of Bethlehem to declare six of its buildings as surplus.

The town board is expected to authorize at its regular session next Wednesday the sale of the Bethlehem justice building at 118 Adams St., the Bethlehem Community Center at 125 Adams St., the town hall annex at 397 Delaware Ave., the water district garage on Hudson Ave., the rear section of the present town hall at 393 Delaware Ave. and an unoccupied structure on Jericho Rd. formerly used as a town garage.

A town hall source indicated the properties, with the exception of the section of the present town hall, would be offered via sealed bids. The six properties, along with a number of other town-owned buildings, were appraised earlier this year.

Supervisor Tom Corrigan said the rear portion of the present town hall, which fronts on Adams St., probably will be sold to the Delmar Fire Dept., which has requested the property to house its new ambulance.

All town offices in the pressent town hall and the annex next door will soon be moving to the new facility two blocks west. The police department and the justice court are scheduled to move to the new quarters sometime next week. Corrigan said the gym at the former school would be converted into an accommodation for the Senior Citizens organization, blood pressure clinics and other events now being held at the community center, often called the Bethlehem "coffeehouse."

Sale of the properties, which presumably will revert to the tax rolls, is expected to partially offset the \$750,000 expenditure for the new town hall, Corrigan said, as well as

relieve the town of the fiscal burden of heating and maintaining the buildings.

The radio antenna at the rear of the justice building now being used by the police department will be offered to any prospective purchaser of the building, Corrigan said, adding that if the tower offer is not accepted, it will be sold separately.



Pharmacy sold in Voorheesville


Harvey Goldstein and Bill Candido, both longtime residents of Voorheesville, were classmates at Albany College of Pharmacy two decades ago.



Fumble is fatal for Blackbirds

A controversial fumble on the opening kickoff that meant the difference between victory and defeat was the key factor in Voorheesville's 14-8 opening loss to Albany Academy.

The scrappy Blackbirds got their act together a little too late on their sun-splashed field before a large crowd Saturday, scoring with less than three minutes remaining and pulling off an on-side kick, but the clock did them in.

Academy, a big, well-drilled team that has lost only once in two years, got its big break in the first minute of play when Voorheesville bobbled the kick-off return on the Blackbirds' 25. The Cadets scored in seven plays, Dave Reed of Delmar going in.

"We feel the fumble was a questionable call," Voorheesville Coach Tom Buckley said later. "When the whistle blew, the ball was in no one's possession, and it should have been our ball. It was the key to the game."

It was a well-played game,

especially for an opener. There were few penalties and relatively few breakdowns. Except for a 55-yard touchdown drive in the third period, the Blackbirds held the bigger Academy team in check most of the afternoon.

"We moved the ball pretty well," Buckley summarized. "Our pass blocking was not as good as I'd hoped, but that will come. They got to us on several pass situations, and we called two wrong pass plays, but I felt we had a good game against a very good team."

Trailing 14-0, the Blackbirds put on a 50-yard drive late in the third period that ended inches short of the first down on the Academy 9. In the fourth, junior quarterback Greg Picard directed Voorheesville's only scoring drive of the day, carrying the ball over himself from the 5 and pitching to Joe Traudt for the two-point conversion.

Picard was 16 for 36 for 136 yards, with two interceptions.

The Blackbirds have a Saturday date at Ravena this weekend, the last non-league tussle before the Southern Conference slate gets started.
