





Over the past several years the job of editor-publisher has grown into two fulltime jobs. His arrival will bring a new vitality to this newspaper."

Ahlstrom has purchased a controlling interest in the corporation and will coordinate the projected move of the Spotlight's newspaper and commercial printing operation to the former Bethlehem Community Center building (the "coffeehouse") at 125 Adams St., Delmar. I am delighted to have Dick Ahlstrom coming into the *Spotlight*. Besides his outstanding professional qualifications, Dick will bring a warm personality and a strong contribution to our community.

Over the past several years, the job of editor-publisher has grown into two full-time jobs. Dick's arrival will bring a new vitality to this newspaper. By assuming the day-to-day management of our newspaper and commercial printing operations, he will relieve me of those responsibilities and enable me to concentrate on the news, editorial and pictorial coverage of local developments, events, organizations, people and items of interest. That is, of course, the basic commitment of a local newspaper to its readers and advertisers.

Those of you who have read the news story on this page surely must be impressed, as I am, by Dick Ahlstrom's background and experience in newspaper technology and management. On one of his many recent visits to Delmar, I asked him why a man of his stature in the industry and his achievements that have brought him wide recognition would invest his energy and capital in a small, intimate weekly paper. Here is his answer:

"For a number of years I have had a yearning, like many newspapermen in urban centers, to have my own paper, and apply my technological experience to a small operation rather than a large corporation embracing a wide geographic area. I have looked into several areas, and this area (Bethlehem and New Scotland) struck us as being an ideal place to live and work."

Sargent named planning chief


Edward H. Sargent, a retired State University professor serving his seventh two-year term in the Albany County Legislature, is slated to become chairman of the Bethlehem planning board next week.

The Bethlehem town board was scheduled at its regular meeting Wednesday night of this week to appoint Sargent to the seven-member town planning board to fill the vacancy created by the resignation last month of William R. Weber.

Weber, a member of the board for two decades, was chairman for four years until he resigned in July, stating he no longer could take the time from his family and business commitments. The post carries a salary of \$3,354.75 a year.

Planning board members presumably will elect Sargent chairman as the first item on the agenda when they meet Sept. 2 for the first of three regularly scheduled sessions in September.

Sargent, an outspoken member of the county Legislature's Republican minority, holds bachelor, master's and doctor's degrees from Cornell University and taught at the university's School of Industrial and Labor Relations





Court upholds building sale

A State Supreme Court decision has given the Bethlehem town board a green light for the sale of the Bethlehem Community Center building, and has upheld the board's action in rezoning the property for use as a newspaper printing plant.

Justice Harold E. Hughes handed down the ruling last week, stating that the town's extension of the single-C commercial zone to include the parcel at 125 Adams St.,

The board took the action after agreeing to sell the building to Nathaniel A. Boynton, editor-publisher of the Spotlight, last November to enable Boynton to consolidate the local newspaper's office and production facilities at the site. The property formerly housed a commercial printing business, the Caslon Press. Boynton was the only bidder at \$42,300 in sealed bids received by the board last fall. The board's action followed discovery that the town had offered the property for bids without realizing it was in a double-C

The action was challenged by George D. Cochran, a Delmar attorney who operates a printing business in the building next door at 121 Adams St. Cochran filed an

Article 78 proceeding against the town seeking to nullify the sale and the zoning change.

In a seven-page opinion, Hughes rejected Cochran's argument that the board action was "spot zoning." Hughes said the action was in the public interest by "encouraging location of a new enterprise in a neighborhood already containing similar business, by promoting the location of a local newspaper within the town to serve the community, and by placing the premises on the tax rolls." He also stated that the zone change did not conflict with the town's overall zoning

Town Attorney Bernard Kaplowitz had contended that the former community center was the only building facing on Adams St. between Kenwood Ave. and the D & H track that was not zoned Ccommercial. He pointed out that the town board adjusted the zoning after receiving a recommendation from the Bethlehem planning board and being notified that the Albany County planning board approved the change.







SOME THOUGHTS

A few selective comments relative to widely held equities are provided below. More specific information is available upon request.

AMÉRICAN TELEPHONE & TELEGRAPH'S long-term EPS growth outlook has improved, causing us to raise our per share dividend growth rate estimate from 5.5% to 6.6%. We now expect increased amounts of rate relief and high allowed rates of return. At current prices, T provided a prospective long-run total return of 16.5% and looks moderately undervalued.

FORD continues to be a troubled, poorly positioned company, and we remain convinced that Ford common will, over time, significantly underperform the market. However, favorable publicity surrounding the introduction of the Escort/Lynx this fall could stimulate temporary speculation in the stock during coming months.

JOHNS-MANVILLE offers the prospect of a highly leveraged earnings turnaround through 1982, producing well above concensus EPS results. The company has a strong competitive position in insulation products, and we expect investor fears of Johns-Manville's health-related lawsuit exposure to subside during the next two years.

NATIONAL GYPSÚM is a cash rich company which we believe will experience a sharp cyclical earnings recovery through 1982. Redeployment of National Gypsum's excess cash could add materially to earnings, and the company could have some takeover appeal. This low multiple, above average yield stock looks quite attractive (as does Johns-Manville) despite the uninteresting outlook for the housing industry as a whole.

Under sail: sloop with a mission

Denise Woodin of Delmar, a Houghton College journalism sophomore who has had a summer job writing for the Spotlight, tells of her experience aboard the sloop, Clearwater.

"You sure are a pretty sight on a morning like this!" Through the rain that pounds on the deck and the wind that fills Clearwater's huge, white mainsail, a tugboat's admiration comes over the radio. I stand at the tiller, my cold, wet hair whipping across my face, as Capt. Peter Willcox gives me directions to steer the 106-foot sloop toward South Street Seaport in Manhattan.

The Clearwater, launched at South Bristol, Me. on May 17, 1969, had left Huntington, L.I. the previous afternoon, where we had done two environmental education programs a day with school children. Now we headed for

South Street for the same purpose.


As a volunteer for the week, I learned with the kids about water chemistry, sailing maneuvers, environmental issues and the right way to coil a line. I learned to tie knots and to jump when the captain velled, "Hands to the mainsheet!" or "Stops out of the main." And in between the sailing and kids, the singing and making new friends, I talked to the hundreds of visitors on Clearwater, explaining our goals and patiently answering, "No, this isn't Pete Seeger's boat.'

Actually, the idea of Clearwater evolved when a friend of Pete Seeger's lent the folksinger a book on Hudson River sloops. Out of admiration for these Dutch sailing boats, a love for the river and a desire to preserve them both, the Clearwater was built. In the early days, the people who sought grants and held bake sales, shad bakes, concerts and sing-a-longs to raise money for the boat. called themselves the Hudson River Sloop Restoration. Although they came together for different reasons, they all shared one hope—to restore and preserve the Hudson River. From that beginning grew the several thousand member non-profit organization call Hudson River Sloop Clearwater, Inc., eight local sloop clubs, and the boat, a floating classroom that sails the Hudson between Albany and Long Island Sound.



percent accurate replica of the more than 400 sloops that carried cargo and passengers up and down the Hudson River in the 1700 and 1800s," our two on-board educators tell the kids. "Can you guess which parts are different?" They usually spot the motor. rarely used, first. Then we point out that dacron sails have replaced canvas ones and plexiglass instead of real glass covers the captain's charts.

One of the kids' favorite stations in our three-hour program is the cabin tour, where we show them the wood stove we cook all our meals on, the icebox and our sleeping quarters. Some can't believe we live on the boat. "How do you live without a .TV?" Then we talk about alternate lifestyles and how the 16 or so crew members entertain themselves by singing, talking, doing chores, reading or by just sitting on the wooden deck and enjoying the peacefulness of sailing. It's a lifestyle that's busy, yet simple. There are no telephones, newspapers, televi-



Blackbirds have strong nucleus

This is the time of year when Tom Buckley comes alive. Buckley, the resident strategist of New Salem, is starting his 19th year as administrator of Voorheesville's football fortunes with three three-year varsity veterans, four other lettermen and a spirited squad.

He also tries to tone down his generic happiness and optimism as he drives his 30 varsity hopefuls through two sun-baked drill sessions a day on the rich green behind the school. Buckley, a stickler forconditioning, feels the wind sprints, push-ups and assorted calisthenics in August wins football games in September and October.

But this week his perspiring Blackbirds put on the pads and got down to play formations in preparation for a rugged campaign in a new league. Playing in the old Colonial Council as part of the newly merged Capital Conference, Voorheesville will face larger schools, including Lansingburg, Watervliet and Mohonasen, along with such rivals as Albany

Academy, Rensselaer, Coxsackie and Ravena.

Just how the Blackbirds will fare in this company is hard to figure. Buckley's 1980 edition is short on beef but long on spirit, loves to hit and has fair speed. Greg Picard, the hero of the 1978 Sectional champions, is an inch taller and 20 pounds heavier than he was then, and will be perhaps the league's most experienced quarterback at 5-10 and 156. Joe Traudt, the team's only experienced running back, is light but tough at 5-7 and 143. Art Merkley, last vear's starting center, is 6 feet and 192, one of the best football players on the field. This is the third varsity year for this trio.

Other returning varsity players are Chris Clark, a 6-2 209-pound forward who was moved from tackle to end halfway through the 1979 season; Mike SanGeorgi, a 5feet-5 speed merchant who was a defensive back and backup quarterback last year: John Kiernozek, a 225-pound defensive tackle, and Glenn

Haberland, a cornerback last

Clark and SanGeorgi will be the Mutt and Jeff of the receiving corps. Both have good hands. Clark is a good target, and SanGeorgi. moving this year to wide receiver, is fast enough with quick moves to give the guys covering him apoplexy. Kiernozek, bulwark of the defensive line a year age, will go both ways this time. Haberland, quick and a gard-hitter at 5-8 and 144, may be the 1980 fullback.

Six other seniors have a

good chance to make the starting lineup, four of them reserves on Buckley's 3-5-1 Blackbirds of a year age. They are Chris Kimmey, Bob

John Minozzi, a 5-11, 182 pound tackle, has a good shot as s starter on the offensive line, and Chris Zautner will get plenty of playing time up front.

Karl Dedrick, a JV starterfor two years, leads a promising contingent of a juniors moving up to the varsity. Dedrick, John Donato, John Furlong and Eric Sickinger will be given lots of work in the front trenches. Buckley calls Sickinger his "secret weapon" --- at 134 pounds he

is the second lightest on the squad, but, would you believe, is marked for duty as a linebacker. "He likes to mix things up," says Buckley with that wide Hibernian grin.

Mike Fields, a junior trying. football for the first time, may see action on the line along with Brian Dollard, a lineman; up from the JV. Jayvee graduates, all juniors, trying for end slots are Dave Albright, Paul Jones and Joe Sapiensa. Blackfield candidates are Erik Dedrick, Karl's twin brother, John Franchini, Mike McKaig and Tim Murnane.

"I'm very excited, very optimistic," says Buckley. "I've, been looking forward to this all summer. We may not win any pennants in our first year, in this league, but they'll all know we're around, you can count on that."

FOOTBALL

BC: light, thin, but better than '79

To say that Bethlehem Central's football team will be better than last year isn't saying much, but BC Coach Gene FitzPatrick has a lot more to build on than he did a year ago.

"We're pretty thin in manpower, and we're unusually small for this class of ball," says FitzPatrick, "We're going to have to hit hard and be quick, but we're gonna hurt somebody before we're finished."

FitzPatrick, starting his second year on Van Dyke Rd., has 10 lettermen returning and is hoping for two more, but there isn't much beef on the hoof. Most of the line will have to go both ways, and Larry Soeller, a senior up from the jayvees, is the only 200-pounder on the roster. The backfield is also small. but it has speed.

A healthy Mike Lawrence could make a lot of difference. Lawrence, a fine running back at 6-3 and 190, is a question mark with a knee injury suffered in basketball last spring. Even if he can play, there is a question as to how effective he will be. Says FitzPatrick of Lawrence: "He is the franchise."

A year ago at this time,

FitzPatrick had only three men with varsity experience. That team went 2-7, dropping all its Suburban Council games and winning its two "outside" contests with Ravena and Whitesboro, but it showed a strong improvement in the last half of the schedule and gave several of the league powers a real battle.

Without Lawrence, the Eagles probably will go with a starting backfield of Steve Malone at quarterback, Lou Concra at fullback and Jimmy DeAngelis, Dave Toussaint or Bill McHugh at halfbacks. They're all seniors.

Malone is the smallest signal caller BC has had in years. At 5-6 and 160, he is quick and runs the option very well, according to Fitz-Patrick, but he has trouble seeing over the linemen and that could hurt. DeAngelis isn't as big as his brother. Mike, who was the battering ram of Bethlehem's 1978 Council champions, but at 170 pounds is tough and fast. Toussaint and McHugh played in the defensive backfield last year, and McHugh has exceptional speed." Toussaint has been lifting weights this summer, but got sick and

lost 15 pounds, reporting in at only 170, but has good speed. Concra is a light fullback (160), but according to his coach, is "a tough kid."

Also working at quarterback are Tom Dexter and Steve Radzyminski, both juniors up from the '79 jayvees, and Dexter probably will see regular duty at safety. Up front it looks like Henry Field and Dave Languish at guards with help from Tom Valentino, Brian Wagner and Soeller at the tackles, and Jeff Yelich at center. All are seniors, and all but Soeller have varsity experience, but

the guards are small. Languish, who was out all last vear with a leg injury, is 5-6 and 160, Field 5-5 and 150, and Valentino 5-8 and a wraithlike 135 pounds, down from last year. Wagner, who is mending from a back operation, is slated to play tackle both ways.

FitzPatrick also has "two or three kids up from the JV who will help us, but it's too early to tell how much."

The receiving should be better this year. Jeff Bennett, a letterman, and Tom Burdick, a junior out for football for the first time who has

Don't wait until September to plan energy conservation measures for your home. Be an energy saver—visit the Bethlehem Public Libary's Information Center today. Whatever your particular information need, there's something there for you. The Energy Information Center has information on energy conservation, insulation, home energy, solar energy, wood energy and tax savings through energy conservation.

The range of information on energy conservation is extensive—from basic guides. to technical manuals. You might want to begin with some general books. The Home Energy Saver by Irene Cumming Kleeberg offers a wide variety of information on heating your home, cooling your home, saving hot water energy, energy-saving appliances and lighting. The Energy Savers Catalog, by the editors of Consumer Guide, includes chapters on insulation, weatherstripping, caulking, storm windows and doors, draperies, and hot water heaters. Detailed diagrams are supplied. 350 Ways to Save Energy (And Money) In Your Home and Car by Henry K. Spies and others is another good_-all-around book with specific chapters on room air temperatures, humidifiers, home appliances and residential heating systems. Home Energy For The Eighties by Ralph Wolfe and Peter Clegg discusses solar energy, wind power, water power, wood heat and general home energy conservation. Specific pieces of equipment are included with addresses? and detailed information on each piece. You can pick up a copy of the free pamphlet. "Tips for Energy Savers," published by the U.S. Dept. of Energy, which briefly describes basic enerby conservation measures.

For those planning to build a new home, there are many books which will assist you in building a more energy efficient home. Alex Wade's 30 Energy Efficient Houses... You Can Build discusses hill-side houses, underground and passive solar-tempered houses. Floor plans for the houses are included as well as a discussion of the design and building principles involved

Much attention has been given to passive solar energy. Among the many books on this subject, *The First Passive Solar Home Awards*, published by the U.S. Dept. of Housing and Urban Development, is recommended.

Wood stoves have been very popular ever since the energy crisis began. John Vivian's The New, Improved Woodheat explores the basic concepts of heating with wood, building fireplaces and chimneys, using wood stoves, cooking with wood heat and selecting wood. Wood Energy: A Practical Guide to Heating With Wood by Mary Twitchell deals with fireplaces and wood stoves and covers stove location, installation and operation.

If you're not building a new home, you'll want to a make your present home as energy efficient as possible. How To Insulate Your Home And Save Fuel, prepared by the U.S. Dept. of Housing and Urban Development, tells you how to evaluate your home to determine precisely which energy-saving steps would be the best for you to take.

Among the free pamphlets available at the Energy Information Center are a series of 28 "Energy Facts" sheets from the N.Y. State Cooperative Extension and two energy workbooks, "How To Save Energy and Money in Your Home" from the New York State Energy Office. A slide/tape show developed by the Delmar Progress Club on energy conservation measures in the home is available in the Media Center.




