Tri-Village Directory notes 50th anniversary

It was 50 years ago this fall that a small group of Delmar churchwomen took the first steps toward putting out a directory of all residents and community institutions of Delmar, Elsmere and Slingerlands.

Thus was born the Tri-Village Directory, a household institution in itself, an invaluable handbook, guidebook, a desktop "must." Cities have their standard directories, but the Tri-Village version is unique in comparable communities. In its comprehensive 6-by-9-inch format, it is irreverently but popularly called "The Snoop Book" by almost everyone in town and in downtown Albany, where it is part of the office furniture in law firms, county and state offices, banks and businesses. "You may know the commissioner, but you don't know his wife's name," commented one Al-

bany civic leader. Furthermore, there aren't many other ways to find out when the library opens on Sunday.

This amazing little booklet, which is not so little anymore, was the brainchild of the late Mrs. Alton C. Rowe, Sr. (rhymes with "now"), wife of a former town supervisor and fire official who owned the Delmar Lumber Co. Mrs. Rowe came up with the idea in 1930 when the Ladies Aid society of the First Methodist Church of Delmar discontinued the annual bazaar that had for many years prior to the Great Depression served as the principal fund-raiser for the church.

The directory project, designed as a fund-raising replacement for the bazaar, involved the Ladies Aid Society and other groups in the church. Ads were solicited to defray the cost of compiling the name, occupation, home

and business address of each resident in the "settled" communities, printing the book and distributing it to each household and local business.

In its five decades, the directory has undergone several administrative reorganizations, the most recent one this spring with the appointment of Howard R. Gmelch of Delmar as manager. It has, however, remained a church project, and continues to be based in the church offices on Kenwood Ave.

As happens with many embryonic publications, there were growing pains. The first issue was scheduled for publication in 1931, but records show that it was delayed by the printer and was not distributed until late 1931 and early 1932. In March, 1932, Mrs. Florence Holmes, president of the Ladies Aid Society, reported receipts from the directory of \$417.15.

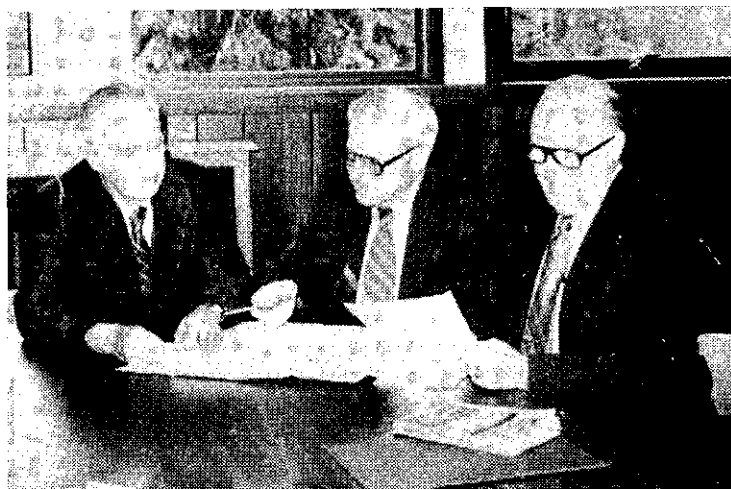
force behind the first four issues, and when she asked to be relieved, Rev. Leon Adkins, then pastor of the church and father of the present pastor, appointed Mrs. Hilda Merselis to head the project. He also advised that the men of the church solicit the advertising.

"The men were not very successful in securing advertising," recalled L. L. Clough some years later, "primarily because the work had to be done evenings and weekends. It was therefore decided that it would be necessary to employ outside help to solicit advertising."

The task of finding an advertising representative fell to Mrs. Merselis' husband, who soon became so involved in the work of the directory that he was asked to become its business manager. By 1940, the Tri-Village Area Directory Assn. had been formed, a contract signed with an advertising agent, and a separate contingency fund established to supplement the working capital fund. The association, which by this time had taken over the financial management from the women's association, also agreed to donate \$500 each year to the women's association for obtaining the names and directory listings and for delivering the completed books.

From time to time the directory association found itself in a position to finance needed church projects, and made donations for stained glass windows for the sanctuary, a curtain for the stage in Fellowship Hall and other projects.

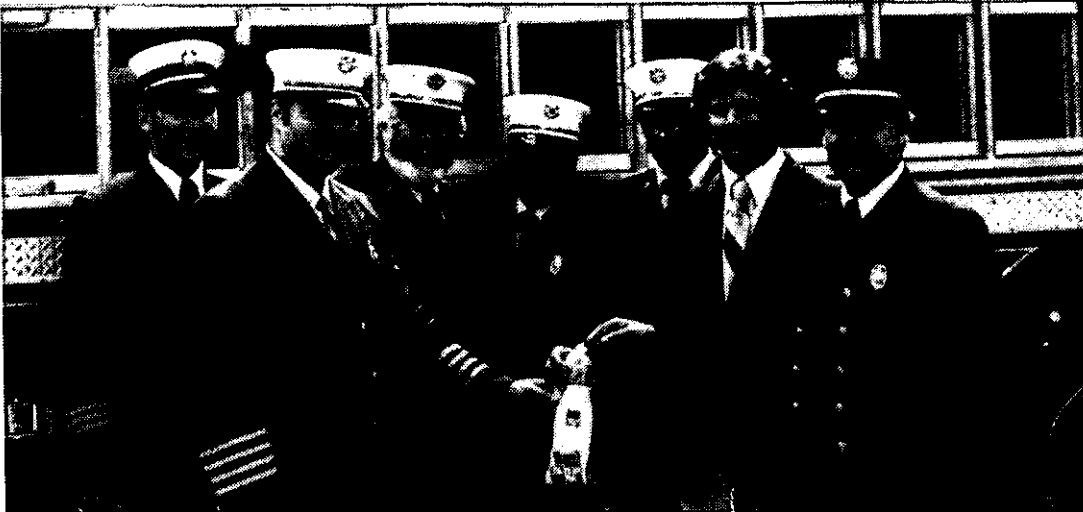

edition gets underway this week, Gmelch, a retired management professional, finds himself supervising some 330 people in the framework of a new organization chart. All contribute their time and energy to the project except for one paid advertising agent. With an experienced staff of volunteers, Gmelch sees in his new responsibility "an interesting challenge."

He also adds a sobering footnote: "In looking back at the 1932 issue, it is interesting to note that the donation fee indicated (for recipients) was \$3.50. Now, 50 years later, it is \$5."

Owens-Corning, strikers set talks

The first talks since the 237 members of the Glass Bottle Blowers Local 77, AFL-CIO, went on strike at the Delmar Owens-Corning plant in mid-May are scheduled for today (Thursday).

The strike is basically over monetary issues, according to the union's recording secretary, Tony Drexel. The union wants parity with other Owens Corning plants, Drexel said.

Beginning workers at the plant now make \$5.85 an hour, as compared to beginning workers in Newark, Ohio, who get \$8.86 an hour after a recent settlement, he said.

The company has taken the position that the settlements at other plants reflect local conditions, including cost of living and agreements on working conditions, he said. Prior to the break-off of negotiations, the company offered a 43 cents an hour cost of living adjustment, and pay increases of 10.5 percent for the first year, 8.5 percent the second year and 8.5 percent the third year.

The Feura Bush plant makes home insulating materials. During 1976 and 1977, the height of the energy crisis, the plant employed as many as 336 workers, but employment had leveled to 237 at the time of the strike.

Burglary solved

Bethlehem police cracked a pair of residential burglaries last week with the arrest of two Cherry Ave. youths, but reported three other home burglaries during the week.

Det. Fred Holligan and Officer John Corbett of the youth bureau reported arresting the two youths June 2 and recovering a quantity of items, including a carbine rifle, 19 magazines of ammunition, jewelry and eight record albums, stolen in two burglaries the week before at a Delmar residence.

Names were not released

because of the defendants' ages.

But there were these other developments:

- On Friday, a Delaware Ave. resident returned home to find his home searched. A piggy bank containing \$2,000 in \$2 bills was taken.

- Also on Friday, a residence on Font Grove Rd., Slingerlands, was burglarized and the owner reported the loss of sterling silver candlestick holders worth \$200 and \$250 to \$300 in coins.

- A Morningside Drive, Elsmere, resident reported the theft Saturday of 50 pieces of jewelry and 40 silver dollars.

Gambit for climbers

Thieves who stole an antique metal weathervane atop the residence of Mayor and Mrs. Erastus Corning II on Corning Hill on the evening of May 26 used a 30-foot extension ladder and then had to scramble up a steeply pitched roof, according to a Bethlehem police report. Detectives said the intruders moved the ladder to a more suitable place after it failed to reach the roof on the first try. Value of the weathervane was placed at \$1,000.

Car totaled in crash

An Albany man was issued a ticket for failing to yield at a stop sign after his car was involved in a collision early Saturday morning on Rt. 9W at Elm Ave.

None of the four people involved in the crash required hospitalization although state police said it took about an hour to pull Ralph Ortiz, 28, the Albany driver, out of the wreckage. Ortiz was attempting to make a left onto 9W when his car was struck by a car driven by William I. Flynn, 18, of West Coxsackie. Passengers in Ortiz' car were Kathleen Cuff, 22, and Linda Flath, 27.

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'Revival' set for drug committee

A "revival" meeting of the committee formed in 1979 to tackle the problem of drug and alcohol abuse among Bethlehem Central students has been called for June 16.

The committee, formed by the Bethlehem Central High School Parent-Faculty Organization, has not been heard from since a large September, 1979 meeting, but there have been a number of developments in the meantime. Among them are the arrival of a satellite office of Project Equinox, scheduled to open in the next few weeks on a limited basis, new interest by other community organizations, and indications that the Bethlehem Town Board is considering

use of the old town hall for some youth-oriented activities.

The June 16 meeting, to be held at 8 p.m. at the Bethlehem Town Hall, was called by Town Supervisor Tom Corrigan and Bethlehem Central School Superintendent Lawrence A. Zinn. "We, on behalf of our respective boards," they say in a letter to the original committee members, "are interested in reviving that spark of interest we all shared at the initial meeting."

After the initial meeting, the PFO committee split up into subcommittees, and a number of meetings were held. At an April 14, 1980 meeting, Karl Gohlke, who had assumed the chairman-

ship of the larger committee, reported that "a lot of groundwork was done and 'someone' needed to assume responsibility to carry on."

At the June 16 meeting, Corrigan and Zinn said, Gohlke will report on what has been done and what should come next. "Others will report on some other headway. Then we will need to decide our future direction."

Interest in the drug and alcohol abuse situation was renewed last fall when a letter published in The Spotlight claimed that members of a sorority at the high school were using amphetamines. That was followed by a number of news stories raising questions about the scope of drug use at the school.

Since then, community

groups ranging from churches to the Bethlehem Chamber of Commerce have discussed ways they can help, but have been hampered by lack of overall direction.

One positive action was taken by Zinn, who followed up on an early recommendation of the PFO committee that a drug counseling organization such as the Albany-based Project Equinox be asked to come in. As a result, Equinox will open a satellite office in a facility offered by the town within the next several weeks.

Equinox Director Mark Yolles said Monday that for the summer the Delmar operation will be "low key," open by appointment only to persons who call the Albany Refer Switchboard number. By next fall, Yolles said, he hopes the facility will have regular hours, but the first step is to establish a presence and credibility.

Equinox will not be associated with either the schools or the police, but will welcome referrals from those organizations. Yolles said several Bethlehem residents have agreed to serve on an advisory committee, and Equinox will also be looking for young persons to serve as advisors.

The question of providing activities for young people in the town is an old one, and interest had waned after the closing of the old coffeehouse. But recent discussion on the town board has centered on possible uses of the old town hall as a potential site for youth activities, to be run by the town's Parks and Recreation Dept. Corrigan said still more discussion is needed because no one is interested in a facility which will not be used, or misused.

"We've been down that road a couple of times," he said.

Board mulls appeal

An overturned decision by the Appellate Division of State Supreme Court was discussed last week by the Bethlehem Board of Appeals.

If the board decides not to appeal to a higher court, North Shore Equities of Northport, L.I., will be permitted to develop an apartment complex on Feura Bush Rd. and Rt. 9W behind the Center Inn, with reasonable conditions imposed by the town.

In other business, the board granted Eleanor Tarof and Margaret Holbriiter of Rt. 144, Selkirk, a special exception and a variance to keep six ducks, three horses and seven dogs on the property with the conditions that no commercial ventures are started, that animal wastes are contained and removed in a sanitary manner, and that the animals are properly fenced.

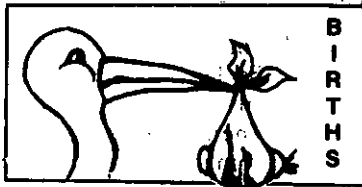

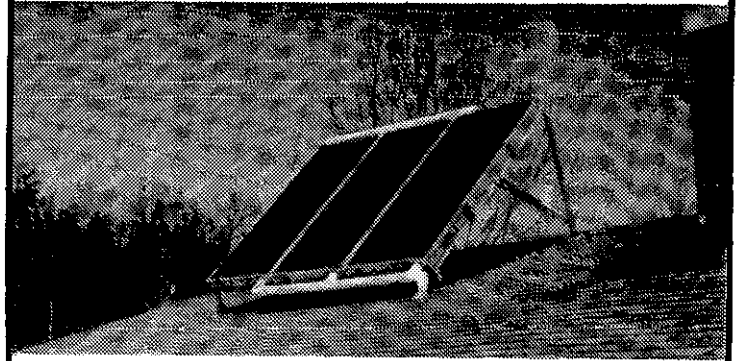

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Planners stalled on more changes

Up until last week, the massive reworking of Bethlehem's zoning code had gone with remarkable smoothness. But the express went off the rails last week, at least temporarily, in a heated planning board meeting that raised questions about future town growth.

The focal point for the disagreement was whether the board should recommend changing the classification of three areas presently zoned B-Residential to the recently

instituted AB, a move that would preclude the possibility of developing multi-unit housing complexes on the sites. AB zoning would limit development to dwellings of four units or less.

Board chairman Edward Sargent, spearheading the move for the revision, talked about the "commitment" and "obligation" he feels the town has to protect residents of the areas in question, specifically Hudson Ave., Delaware Ave. near the Delaware Plaza, and

the Asprien-Glenmont Rd. area. Sargent said it was fine to make provisions for the town's future, but current residents deserved the changes to preserve their "peace of mind."

Sargent, a county legislator, admitted to being particularly sensitive to the needs of the residents in these areas because he represents them. But he argued that the proposed revisions are in keeping with those previously recommended by the board. The emphasis, he said, had been toward insuring lower densities, and he saw no reason not to continue in that fashion.

A spirited discussion followed, during which board members questioned Ed Kleinke, the planning consultant who first recommended the changes, as to the specifics concerning the sites involved. Several members questioned the advisability of limiting development in areas which may, in fact, stand to benefit from such development. Asprien Rd.-Glenmont Rd. was cited as an example of one such area, particularly since fewer are planned there.

When Sargent proposed a vote on the revision, Al Worth, the town's long-time

engineering consultant, interrupted to say he was opposed to taking action at the present time because some members might not be familiar with the areas in question. Sargent reminded Worth that there was a motion on the floor and proceeded to call for a vote; the motion failed when two members abstained.

Obviously angered, Sargent picked up his papers and prepared to leave the meeting, mentioning the possibility of his resignation. He remained to finish the meeting.

"Yes I'm displeased," he said after the meeting. "They're acting by not acting." Several board members, however, said later they thought Sargent overreacted. "His reaction caught us all flatfooted," one said.

Later in the week, Sargent said he plans to continue to push for the rezoning. "Maybe I reacted a little over-enthusiastically because one of those areas (Delaware Ave.) is where I've lived for 26 years," he said.

In addition to the stress of protection versus development issue, the board is the center of a gradual change in the town's planning procedure. Kleinke, the town's first

professional planner, is gradually taking on some of the duties Worth has performed for many years. Sargent himself is retired and took on the board chairmanship specifically to usher through the code changes.

In other business, the board set July 14 as the date for a second public hearing for Harry Gochee's plan to build two multi-family buildings on Kenaware Ave. at Dawson Rd. The proposal has already received approval from the board of appeals, but now needs planning board approval because the lot must be split.

The board also reviewed an application for the construction of a truckstop at Exit 22 of the Thruway in Selkirk, deciding after some deliberation that it needed more information concerning the environmental impact of such a proposal. The board agreed to ask the State Dept. of Environmental Conservation to oversee preparation of the study. *Vincent Potenza and Tom McPheeters*

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School board faces new dilemmas

With its 1981-82 budget just approved, the Bethlehem Central School District will have to find nearly \$47,000 in it to make up for expected federal funding cuts that will affect two programs.

The school board last Wednesday was unwilling to cut back the district's remedial

reading program (Title I), but made a small retrenchment in its physical education program for handicapped children.

So the district will make up the cost difference, forecast by Assistant Superintendent J. Briggs McAndrews as nearly \$47,000.

Sheila Fuller apparently summed up the board's feelings, saying the district should support these programs "regardless of what the federal government does."

The exact numbers are unknown, but the state Education Dept. has told districts to plan on about 30 percent less from Washington.

McAndrews said the district's Title I Parents Advisory Council had reviewed the impending cuts and had asked that all schools in the district share equally in the burden.

However, the board rejected any Title I cuts, and voted to continue service at the present level, at a cost to the district of \$34,199.

The program that provides physical education and aides to handicapped students will see a staff cut of .16 (a fraction of one teaching day). The cost to the district of maintaining this program after federal cuts is projected at \$12,530.

While waiting for the ax to fall in Washington, the board also voted to renew its participation in the National Lunch and Special Milk programs for next year. These programs

are administered by the state, but severe cuts in federal financing are forecast.

MacFarland Builders of Latham was awarded a \$78,180 contract for removal of asbestos-containing material in walls and ceilings at the high school and at Clarksville and Glenmont elementary schools. New sheetrock is to be installed, district Business Administrator Franz Zwicklbauer said, with the work to be done over the summer.

Board President Bernard Harvith said he is "immensely in favor" of removal of the asbestos material, rather than covering it, which was originally the district's plan.

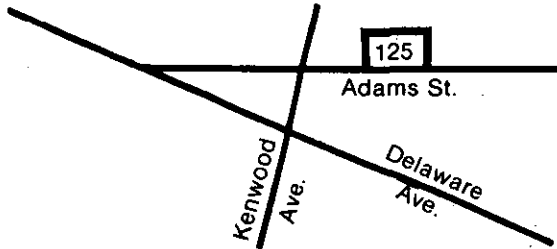
Another proposed contract generated more discussion.

This was a request for \$9,060 to complete a computer study of district bus routing.

Under a state Energy Research and Development Authority grant, Roger Creighton Associates of Delmar had undertaken a study of bus routing to determine if savings could be realized by using a computer. Two Bethlehem schools were involved

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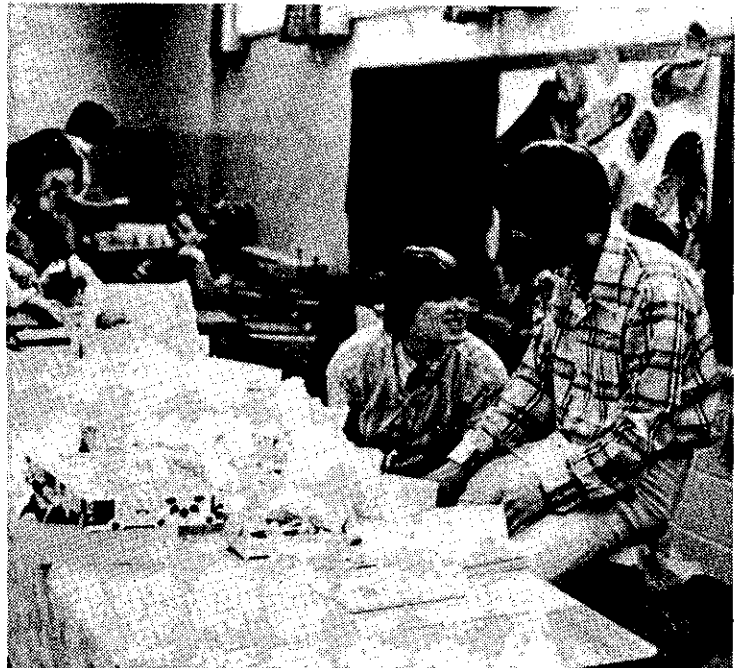

in the study, but the grant expired before all data was used, administrators said.

Zwicklbauer said the study saw the possibility of eliminating use of three buses at the high school, and that he would like to see the study completed.

The board had some questions, though, chiefly concerning terms of the original study. "I thought the grant would cover all our schools," said Robert Zick.

"That's what we thought, too," Superintendent Lawrence Zinn responded. "Apparently they (Creighton) satisfied the grantor."

Bertold Weinberg said, "There is a question whether they fulfilled their obligation to us...can we wait?"

"I don't want to put you in a corner," Zwicklbauer replied, "But the data are needed (by Creighton) by June 15th" in order to have routes ready for September.

The \$9,000 contract would cover routing for the 1981-82

school year, with a cost of about \$5,000 for an annual update, Zwicklbauer said.

Under the contract, he said, Creighton would locate all pupils, designate those within walking distance, do routes and maps, and help load buses efficiently.

Zinn said bus drivers would have lists of all pupils who were to be on their buses.

"For this relatively modest amount of money, we ought to go ahead and finish the study," Harvith urged.

Marjory O'Brien asked, "Could we (the district) take over the routing in the future?"

Zinn wasn't encouraging: "That's dependent on equipment we don't have and don't intend to buy."

John Clyne moved that the board authorize hiring Creighton Associates, and the vote was 6-1. Weinberg opposed.

The district would have to provide half the funds for the work.

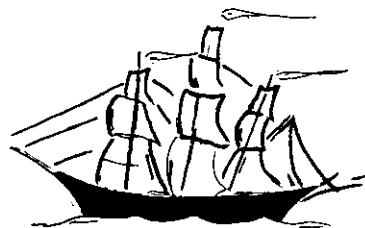
A decision from the state Energy Office was expected by June 1. If favorable, the applications would then go to the U.S. Department of Energy, which is expected to render a decision in September.

Park purchase
is now official**

A resolution to purchase the 22-acre tract in Feura Bush for a park and recreational area was approved last week by the New Scotland town board.

The action makes the proposed purchase official, a \$20,000 transaction with the owner, Lyle S. Van Dyke. The land, sharply hilly in places, fronts on New Scotland Ave., a short side street in the hamlet that is no relation to the main road in Slingerlands bearing the same name.

Wallace said the first priority would be to build a baseball diamond on the site and install some basic playground equipment. Further development of the property has been left open, and will presumably be studied with the help of citizen input.

In other actions at the regular June session, the town board:

- Appointed George Saba of Voorheesville to the three-member assessment review board. Saba, a New York Telephone Co. employee, will fill the unexpired term of William Munyan, former mayor of Voorheesville, who died last month. The term runs to March 31, 1984.

- Raised the fee for marriage licenses from \$3 to \$7.

- Authorized the supervisor to petition the State Dept. of Transportation to establish a 35-mile speed limit the full length (1.3 miles) of Spore Rd. in compliance with the request of residents. The present speed limit is 40 on the south end, and 55 at the north end, which is near Murray-Jennex Sunset Park.

- Set June 15 for a special session to discuss Indian Ladder Estates, a proposed residential development off Altamont Rd., and to update the town zoning ordinance adopted earlier this year.

Trash pickups put out for bid

New Scotland is taking another major step toward shifting its trash and garbage collection setup to Albany's ANSWERS project. The town board is putting the weekly pickup procedures out for bid by private contractors, and has set the bid opening for July 1 at 8 p.m., the date of the next regular town board meeting.

Supervisor Steve Wallace said that one condition of the contract will be a requirement that the successful bidder purchase the town's refuse compactor, the crushing vehicle the board bought in 1978 for \$60,000.

Step One in the conversion process from a municipal operation to a joint venture with other cities and towns in the ANSWERS project is closing the New Scotland landfill on Upper Flat Rock Rd. A bulldozer has been working at the site for more than a month, grading the landfill with fill and gravel. No date has been set for the official closing.

State and county health officials last year ordered the site closed when a study determined effluent was leaching into nearby streams.

A transfer station is too expensive for the town bud-

get, Wallace said, so the town will set up a facility for an alternate town dump, possibly at or near the present site. Presumably the town will continue its policy of picking up trash and garbage once a week on a year-round schedule, but the collections will be made by a contractor rather than the local highway department.

Bethlehem, which is also scheduled to join the ANSWERS project at a future date, picks up garbage, but residents must go to private contractors for trash collection.

Under the ANSWERS setup, trash and garbage from the city and nearby municipalities are processed at a collection center on Rapp Rd. in the Pine Bush and trucked to the Sheridan Ave. steam generating plant where it is used to fuel boilers that heat public buildings in downtown Albany.

In a separate but related action, the board turned down an offer by Thomas Monroe of Upper Flat Rock Rd. to purchase the landfill site exclusive of the dump for \$2,000. Board members agreed to put the land up for bid at \$5-plus per acre, the exact price to be determined.

- Approved a mileage reimbursement increase for village employees from 18 to 20 cents per mile, and

- Voted to donate \$365 to the American Legion for the Memorial Day parade.

There was a lengthy discussion concerning sidewalks in the village, and whose responsibility they are: the village's or the homeowner's. More research will be done on this issue.

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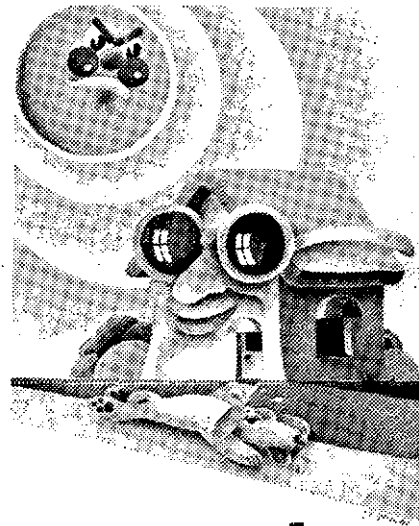
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The gypsy moths have arrived

The gypsy moths are here, and while some parts of Bethlehem and New Scotland are experiencing only light infestations, other areas are crawling—literally—with hairy hungry caterpillars.

"Last week on one day we received over 100 calls," said Carolyn Steadman, a master gardener with the Albany County Cooperative Extension in Voorheesville. "People were reporting caterpillars crawling all over their houses, dropping out of the trees and making a squishy mess on the sidewalk."

Local spray operator Douglas Lee, owner of Concord Tree Service, reports making up to 40 sprays to local properties on a good day. "I'm starting at sunup and coming home at sundown," he said. One of the hardest hit, according to Lee, is the Glenmont area. "The other day a man called me from Feura Bush Rd. to look at his 12 foot Blue Spruce which had been completely defoliated. There's nothing you can do to bring a beautiful mature specimen like that back."

Both Albany County and the Town of Bethlehem decided not to do area-wide spraying programs this year, following state advice that the problem would be localized. Town Supervisor Tom Corrigan said Friday he is still getting four to eight calls a day from people asking if the town will spray.

The answer is still no. And reflecting the controversy spraying has caused in other area towns, Corrigan notes that at least one town resident has threatened to take the town to court if it does spray.

In addition to defoliating trees, shrubs and flowers, the U.S. Forest Service has confirmed reports that contact between the hairy caterpillars and humans can cause allergic reactions in the form of skin welts and rashes. This reaction is not the result of bites, as the larvae prefer foliage to



people, but is the result of the tiny hairs that cover the insect's body and can trigger an itchy reaction that can last for up to six hours.

"The question we hear most often," said Mrs. Steadman, is, "Is it too late to do something?" The answer is definitely no." The recommended physical controls, described in an earlier *Spotlight* article, include the burlap skirt and tree tanglefoot that can be seen on many trees in the town. Diligent homeowners will attest to the fact that many caterpillars may be squashed every afternoon when these traps are checked.

And spraying is also still effective. Lee is just wrapping up his first round of spraying and is getting ready for a second. Although the Sevin-Malathion insecticide combination he uses effectively kills most of the larvae it hits, reinfestation occurs as the mobile larvae swing between trees on silken threads blown by the wind. Since the ever-growing caterpillars will eat voraciously for another month, a lot of damage can still be incurred, necessitating the second spray treatment.

On the bright side, Lee reports having noted what he believes to be evidence of a caterpillar wilt-virus disease attacking the pests. This natural disease can control an infestation if it attacks the larvae before they pupate and become fertile moths. If this natural control has indeed appeared on the local scene, perhaps the outlook for next year is a bit brighter. If not, with the numbers of larvae still out there munching their way to maturity and the egg-laying moth stage, Bethlehem gardeners can look forward to another battle with gypsy moths next year.

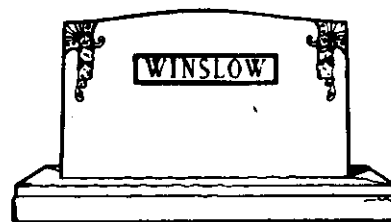

There are real estate agencies, insurance offices, a host of retail stores and businesses ranging from ice cream and

dry cleaning to an auto agency and big chain outlets. Plenty of parking is available, and the merchants, sales clerks and office people are friendly and helpful, just what you would expect in a town of good neighbors.

Between the viaduct at the city line and the Delaware Plaza area, where we left you last week, there are several

places worth a mention. Andrianos II restaurant and cocktail lounge features seafood, pizza and Italian foods, a nice, clean place to eat. Next door is the Gloria Stevens salon, which is constantly busy with women trying to get—or keep—in shape. They have an introductory offer of six weeks for \$25 which should not be missed. This is a place for women (they have them from 11 to 70) for fitness and weight control.

There's a Discount Outlet next door owned by Bumby's Bakery. They have special discounts on bread and delicatessen items. We found an excellent buy in corned beef this week. The next building has several services: an insurance firm of Olof Lundberg, Tucker-Smith, Bethlehem Video, ADT Security Systems and the Hevenor School of Dance. There is a Radio Shack here, too.

Moving past the Hartford Building, we come to the Lincoln Hill bookshop, a very special place, an oasis after a shopping trip! Here in a quiet atmosphere Michael and Barbara Aike specialize in children's and gardening books. They also have best sellers, both in hard cover and paperback, but mainly this store offers unusual books for the gardener, horticulturist, artist or photographer, and many how-to books and cards as well. Do stop in and meet the Aikeys... and be sure to take the children. They'll find just the book to intrigue them into becoming a reader!

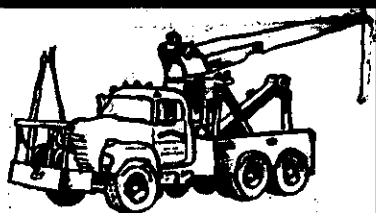
Further up the avenue and across the street is a group of

At the corner of Lincoln Ave. in a remodeled residence is the Craft Corner. Bobby Burrows has had this shop for over a year and a half. It is

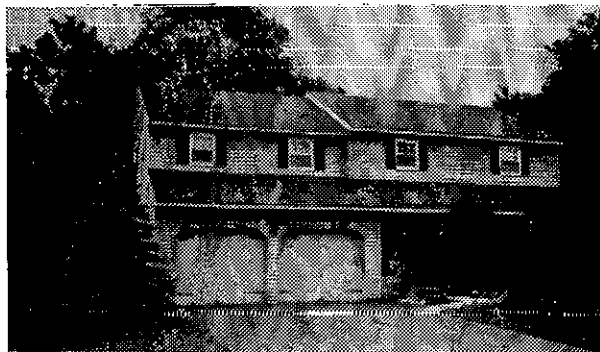

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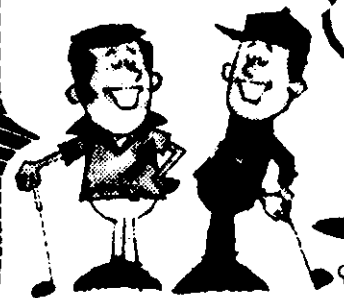
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TENNIS Seeds hold up in net tourney

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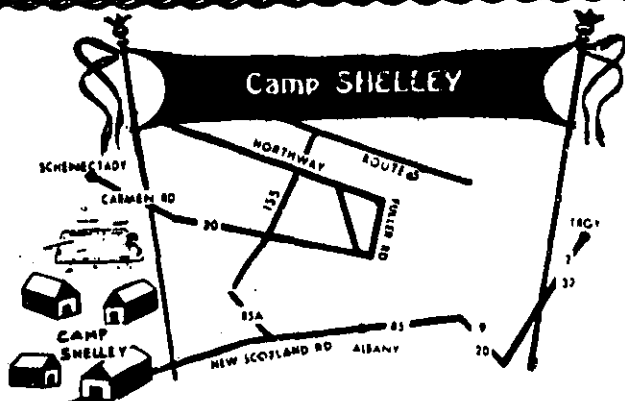

In the event of retirement, death or adjudication of insanity, incompetency or bankruptcy of a General Partner, any remaining General Partner or, if such remaining General Partner declines to do so, the Limited Partner shall have the right, but not the obligation, to elect to form a new Partnership to continue without interruption the business of the Partnership. In the event that such election is exercised by any remaining General Partner, any remaining General Partner shall promptly give notice to the Limited Partner stating in substance that the remaining General Partner has elected to continue the business of the Partnership. In the event that such election is exercised by the Limited Partner, then the Limited Partner shall, as speedily as possible, proceed to select an individual who shall agree to be the Substitute General Partner or Substitute General partners, as the case may be, and shall make proper arrangement and provision for the liabilities of the Partnership. Upon the election of the remaining General Partner to continue the Partnership business, or upon the selection of the Substitute General Partner or Substitute General Partners, as the case may be, written notice of intent to purchase their interest in the Partnership of the withdrawing General Partner shall be served by any remaining General Partner or the Substitute General Partner, or each of the Substitute General Partners, as the case may be, on the withdrawing General Partner, or on the executor, administrator, or personal representative of the withdrawing General Partner in the case of the death or adjudication of insanity, incompetency, or bankruptcy of the withdrawing General Partner.

No part of the net earnings of the corporation shall inure to the benefit of any member, trustee, director, officer of the corporation or any private individual (except that reasonable compensation may be paid for services rendered to or for the corporation, and no member, trustee, officer of the corporation or any private individual shall be entitled to share in the distribution of any of the corporation assets on dissolution of the corporation.

No substantial part of the activities of the corporation shall be carrying on propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation (except as otherwise provided by Internal Revenue Code Section 501(h), or participating in, or intervening in (including the publication or distribution of statements), any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office.

2. Such other matters as may be properly brought to the attention of the corporation at this time.

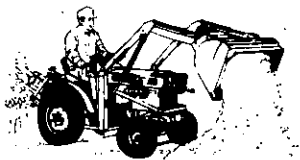
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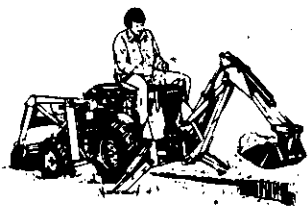
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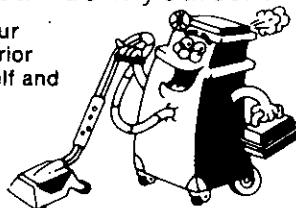
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The student planners

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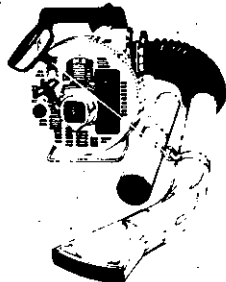


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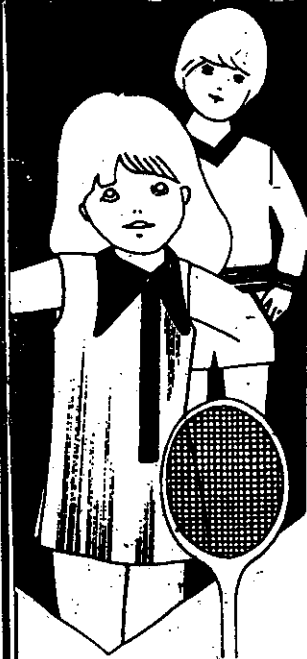
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Tank battle continues

For two reasons I respectfully submit a rebuttal to Lee Faulkner's view of my last letter, in the May 29 issue of *The Spotlight*. Firstly, I was surprised to be deemed, of all things, pompous. Another shot fired

I am writing in reaction to Mr. Faulkner's letter concerning the National Guard tank which appeared in the Bethlehem Central High School parking lot several weeks ago. To begin with, I feel that it is necessary to defend Mr. Parsons' letter. Mr. Faulkner suggested quite bluntly that this letter was a "pompous exercise." The fact is that pompousness is irrelevant to the issue. Mr. Parsons was unquestionably successful in presenting his viewpoint and the arguments supporting his stand.

On the other hand, Mr. Faulkner's tactics of name-calling and questioning where

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such subversive ideas could have originated in this Great and God-Fearing Community of Ours and hardly effective methods of articulating a point of view. Furthermore, Mr. Faulkner's "better dead than red" attitude is a bit trite and has fortunately been out of fashion since the days of Senator McCarthy.

Such Cold War sentiments are becoming increasingly common, one factor that has contributed to the growing militarism in this nation. One place where this militarism has been concentrated is the public school. Few adult residents of Bethlehem truly appreciate the extent to which the military has dumped its propaganda on the high school. For example, virtually every classroom has its own Air Force calendar hanging conspicuously on the wall; a large portion of all textbooks have covers generously provided by the Army that depict a glorious career in the Armed Forces; the guidance office is cluttered with Navy pamphlets, Air Force leaflets, Army magazines, and so on.

Thus, the appearance of a piece of heavy artillery in the back parking lot came as no great surprise to me; it was just one more propaganda stunt to gain recruits. The obviously intended effect was successful: Students could be seen playing on the tank all day, climbing childishly on it

as if it was one fantastic jungle gym. Naturally, leaflets and bumper stickers were free and in great abundance.

Although I oppose this misleading method of presenting information about the military, I realize the futility of trying to prevent the National Guard from parking their tank at the high school.

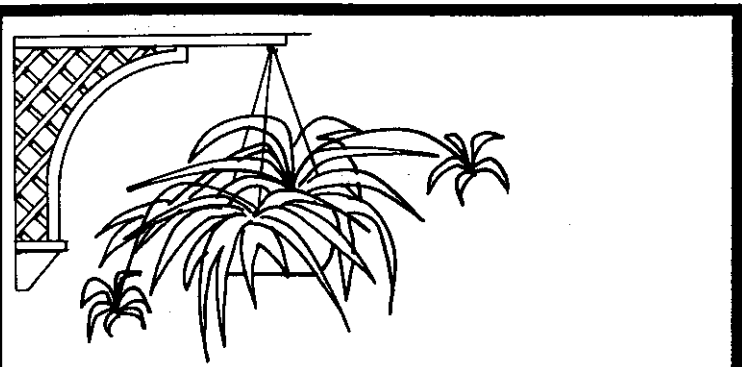
However, I do have one serious grievance concerning the matter. That is, no students were notified that the National Guard was coming prior to its arrival. As a result, only one viewpoint was propagated concerning the military; specifically, that war is good, that life in the armed forces is not only safe but is actually fun, and that the maintenance of an aggressive military establishment is absolutely necessary.

No attempt was made to allow those who do not share these opinions to voice their beliefs regarding war — that war is not as glamorous as the Army would have young people believe; that the reality of war is murder, rape, misery, beatings, torture and death; and that a lasting peace is not only desirable but is in fact quite achievable.

My request therefore is that in the future the administration will have enough consideration and enough sense of fair play to give notice prior to an event such as this one.

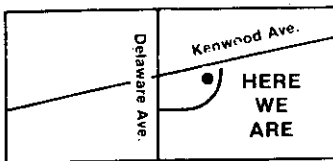
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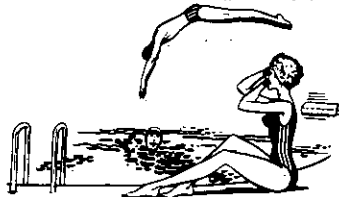
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
