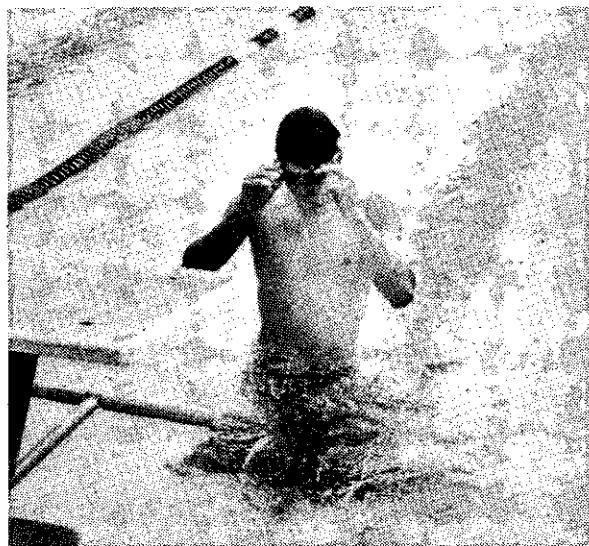

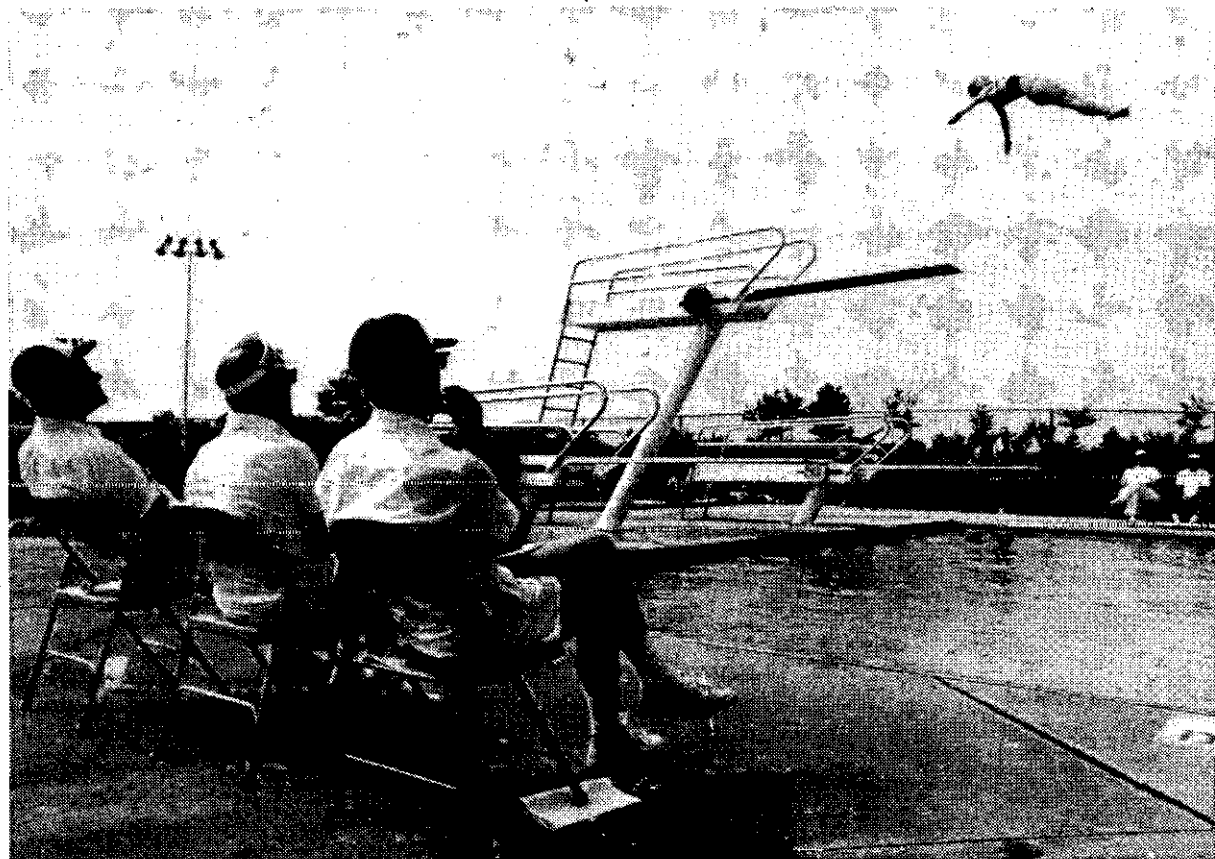

Wallace promise: 'There will never be another one'

Fears of New Scotland residents that there will be repeats of the Aug. 2 Hulla Baloo rock music festival at Sunset Park have been put to rest by the town supervisor.

"There will never be another one, I can tell you that," said Supervisor Steve Wallace after 20 constituents voiced complaints at last Wednesday's town board meeting.

The rock bash, which drew a crowd the promoters said was 2,000 to the pavilion and grounds on Orchard Hill Rd. a week ago Sunday, was hastily organized at the New Scotland site after the sponsors reportedly were turned away from other towns, including Clifton Park. The New Scotland town board granted a permit for the event

at a special unpublicized morning session July 15 at which there were two items on the agenda: to apply for federal funding of a water system in Feura Bush, and act on the Hulla Baloo application. Both were approved.

At the time, the upcoming rock music festival was viewed as the first test of New Scotland's new public assem-

bly law, adopted by the board after an advertised public hearing May 27. At the July 15 meeting, however, it turned out that the ordinance could not take effect until 10 days after publication of the text in a legal notice. That notice was rushed into print on July 24, with the new law becoming effective 10 days later. That date was Aug. 4, which meant that legally the Hulla Baloo shindig took place two days before the ordinance took effect.

In any case, New Scotland officials are adamant that there will not be a repeat of last week's assemblage, which brought angry protests from local taxpayers. Most of the complaints centered on the loud noise, the lateness of the hour and the general atmosphere created by the crowd. All agreed, however, that with the exception of one incident, the throng was well behaved.

That one incident, a fight which led to a stabbing and a fractured jaw, is still under intense investigation by state police at Selkirk. "It's something that's going to take awhile," said Investigator James Dolan Monday.

Dolan and other investigators spent all last week interviewing witnesses to the incident. On Saturday, they brought in the stabbing victim, Keith Snare, 21, of Schenectady, after he was released from Albany Medical Center Hospital, where he had been admitted in serious condition the day after the concert.

Snare was arrested on a third degree burglary charge

English visitor adapts quickly

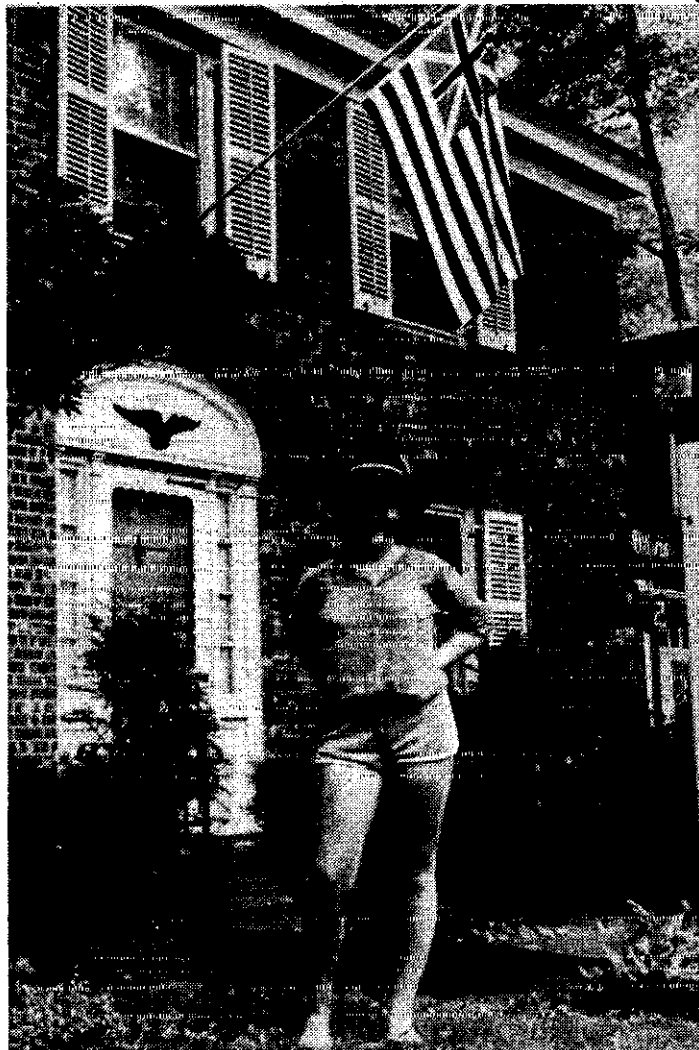

warrant issued by Schenectady police, who saw his name in the newspapers after the concert.

Dolan said investigators have also learned that a second man, Charles Buycz, 29, was also injured in the incident. Buycz was treated at St. Clare's Hospital in Schenectady Monday for a fractured jaw and released.

"I would like to see a committee appointed to see how these things are stopped in other communities," said Mrs. Marion Raymond, New Scotland South Rd. "If we can't stop them, we should make an effort to find out why."

Observed Robert Allen, a farmer whose land, purchased

in 1760 from the Patroon, adjoins Sunset Park: "New Scotland is the only place in any direction from Albany that hasn't been exploited. . . I resent the fact that I was awake at 1 a.m. when I had to get up early in the morning."

Allen blamed most of the unruly behavior of rock fans on those who "tried to sneak in without paying." Some invaded his hayfield, he said, looking for an obscure place to crash the bash.

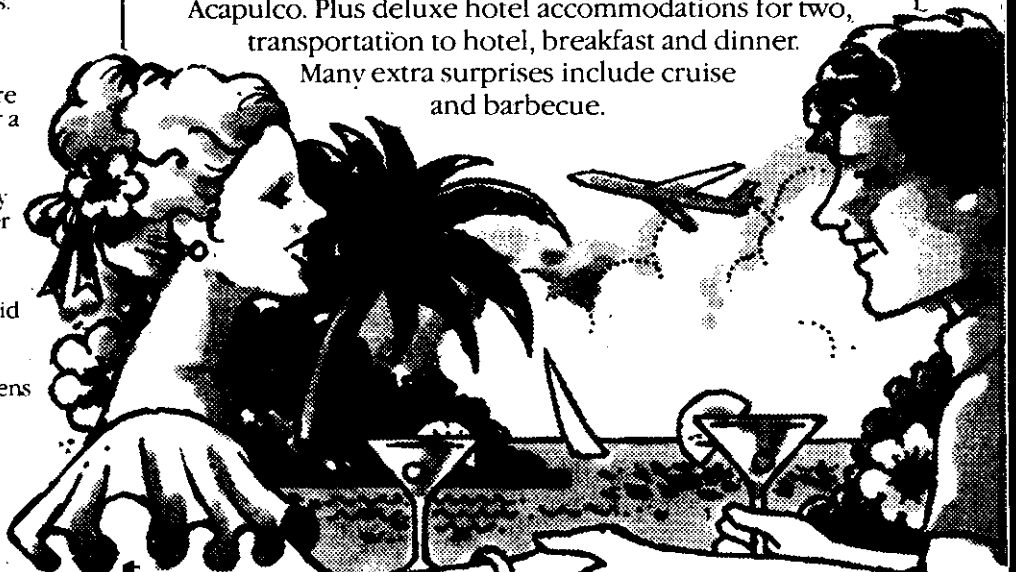

centered on the blaring amplifiers of the rock bands and the loud language heard over the sound system. "If I played my stereo loud enough to have my neighbors call the police (I would get a summons)," said Jeff Pfeil, who lives on Spore Rd. a mile from the park. Pfeil also complained that the festival promoters stationed an attendant at the Spore Rd. intersection at Delaware Tpk. a mile and a half from the site who "drank beer all day and stopped motorists" and tried to sell them tickets. "How can someone commandeer a public road like that?" he asked.

Five of those at the Wednesday meeting said they had called state police and sheriff's deputies Sunday to lodge complaints, a total of seven calls. On the day after the event, a spokesman at the sheriff's patrol office in Voorheesville said the office had received one call, and state police at Selkirk said there had been no calls.

Board members responded favorably to Pfeil's suggestion that the minimum attendance for a gathering requiring a permit be lowered from the present 1,000 to 250, and require an earlier closing hour. The board also agreed

to hold a public hearing on any future applications.

Wallace adjourned the meeting after nearly an hour of discussion. As the crowd, largest to attend a board session in several years, dispersed, he told a reporter that "you won't see another one of these in our town, as far as I'm concerned."

BETHLEHEM

Parents question board policies

The parents were upset. The board was patient. Nobody changed anybody's mind.

The Bethlehem Central Board of Education's agenda, as it usually does, contained dozens of important items last week—teacher appointments, purchases, tax rates and the like—but what took the board's attention was the protests of six parents. Four of the parents are from Clarksville and don't want their kids to go to Elsmere for Kindergarten. One doesn't want her child to be in a combined first and second grade class next fall. And the parents of a precocious child

wanted to know why the district won't allow their youngster to start Kindergarten early.

All important matters to the parents involved. But also, it turned out, important to the board, because the complaints involve policy questions affecting the education of many other children.

"A common thread runs through all of these problems—the misapprehension that we're being arbitrary," said board member Robert Ruslander. And Chairman Bernard Harvith repeatedly stressed the board's continuing effort to get the most education per taxpayer dollar.

In Clarksville the issue is class size and the neighborhood school. Six Clarksville families have been notified

that their children probably will be going to Elsmere for Kindergarten because 29 children are now signed up. The district's limit for Kindergarten is 24, and there seems to be little hope that enough new registrations will happen before September to justify another class, said Superintendent Lawrence Zinn.

This sort of problem happens at the district's other four elementary schools, but more frequently at Clarksville because it is the smallest. But the smallness is also what makes the parents balk.

"In Clarksville it just doesn't work," said Mrs. Betty Geurtze. She said she fears that her child will be an outsider when she comes back to Clarksville for first grade.

"What we have tried to do is make sure the children have

a small class size for Kindergarten," explained Harvith.

"We're talking about numbers . . . I'm worried about the psychological effect on my daughter," said Mrs. Geurtze.

"So are we," replied Zinn. The board's judgment, he said, is that small class size at the Kindergarten level far outweighs the impact of changing schools. "Children that age are remarkably resilient," he said.

Clarksville Principal Dorothy Whitney, who will also teach the Kindergarten class, agreed: "Five-year-olds are just coming out of their own little worlds . . . they're not forming close friendships at that age." The issue, she said, is not whether she could handle larger classes—she has no doubt she can—"but 29 will get less of my time than 23."

The case of Mr. and Mrs. Philip Teumim, whose youngster is not quite old enough to go to Kindergarten, involves the same kind of limit. The

Teumims had presented to the board test results and a psychologist's report indicating that their child, with a birthday in December, is ready for Kindergarten, even though she doesn't meet the district's Dec. 1 cutoff point.

The Teumims said the board should have a more "flexible" policy. Zinn replied that the "question is not as simple as it seems," because flexibility implies a rather elaborate appeals policy, which implies time and money for the district. Also, he said, changing the cutoff date would alter class sizes and create other problems.

"You can't have equality and total flexibility," said Harvith.

Earlier, the board had breezed through a lengthy agenda which contained these items:

- A 20-cent increase in the price of school lunches, necessitated by decreasing federal subsidies. Elementary school lunches will be 75 cents this year, middle school lunches 80 cents and high school lunches 85 cents. Milk goes from 12 cents to 20 cents. "Even though we have to raise it, we are still not up to what other schools are charging," said board member John Clyne.

- Established a special "repair reserve" fund with the \$70,000 proceeds from the sale of the old Bethlehem Center school building.


- Established final tax rates for 1981-82 based on completed assessment figures for Bethlehem and New Scotland. The school tax increase for Bethlehem is \$6.57, and for New Scotland \$28.21. Both figures are within pennies of the rates presented to the voters last March. Tax rates for the Bethlehem Public Library, which is an independent body sharing the same taxing district, are \$10.62 for Bethlehem and \$16.23 for New Scotland. The board set Aug. 19 at 8 a.m. for a special meeting to sign the tax warrants.

Selkirk truck stop draws opposition

Privacy, security, noise pollution and preserving the integrity of the surrounding area — those were the issues raised last Wednesday night at a public hearing before the Bethlehem Board of Appeals concerning a proposed truck stop on Rt. 144 in Selkirk near the Thruway.

The proposed truck stop will include a restaurant with a serving capacity of 150 people, a motel with accommodations for up to 60 and four gasoline and five diesel pumps with a total fuel storage capacity in the neighborhood of 80,000 gallons.

Once in operation the truck stop would create 100 to 125 full time jobs, according to

co-developer Edwin King, who said the goal would be to hire local employes for the 24-hour, 7-day-a-week facility. Frank Parillo, King's partner in the venture, owns a similar operation in Wilton. The developers are from Troy.

The project would include construction of a new sewer district — at the developers' expense — which would eventually be hooked up to existing town sewer mains; either going north from the project under the Thruway, or heading east and making the hook-up on the other side of Rt. 144. The sewers would become town property once the connection is made.

and their attorney, Roger Fritts who is also a Bethlehem town justice, only one person at the hour-long hearing spoke in favor of the project. That was Harold Vincent, owner of a business near the site, who said he thought the sewers and the creation of jobs was beneficial to the area.

The opposition was much more vocal. One area resident complained that a proposed parking lot would be 10 to 12 feet from his daughters' bedrooms. Another maintained that the project would ruin the area's rural quality — which was what he'd come to Selkirk for in the first place.

Richard Endreny, who lives one half mile from the proposed site, read a three-page statement concerning noise pollution, citing various state laws concerning the operation of trucks and permissible noise levels. Developing the site, he maintained, would not only subject his neighbors to the continuous

rumblings of diesel trucks, but would also eliminate much of the foliage which is presently the only acoustical barrier between their homes and the Thruway.

Another resident said she wasn't exactly thrilled with the possibility of hitchhikers and other vagrants hanging around her neighborhood.

Parillo and King gave assurances that they would do everything in their power to ameliorate the side-effects of their truck stop. They would leave standing as many trees as possible, construct earthen berms, plant hedges, put up six-foot stockade fences — even move their parking lot back ten feet.

"If there are hitchhikers

coming in with truckers," Parillo said, "my experience shows that they'll also be leaving with truckers. I don't think we'll have many people hitching rides to Selkirk." Under the proposed plan passenger cars will not have access to the truck stop from the Thruway: they'll have separate entrance and exit lanes on Rt. 144, as well as separate parking and fueling facilities at the site. Trucks will be able to enter and exit from the Thruway.

"No problem," King said as each objection was raised. "We're not some big oil company," he told Endreny after the meeting, "if something is bothering you, pick up the phone and call me. I'll

run down to see you, I'm just up in Troy."

"Do you think we could get all these things down in writing?" Endreny asked.

"No problem," King replied.

The developers estimate the project will take some five years to complete.

In other business, the board granted a special exception to Frank Bunnell, of Rt. 144 in Selkirk, so that he might move some pigs he owns from one side of his property, which is zoned for such use, to the other side, which is not. His neighbor was complaining of the smell.

The board's next scheduled meeting is Aug. 26.



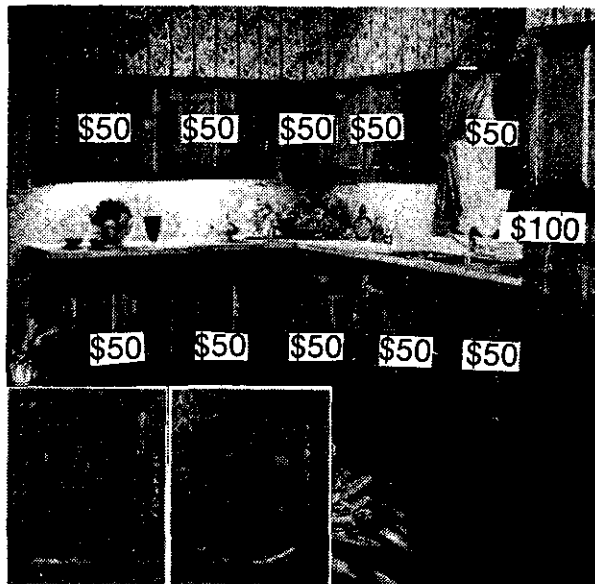

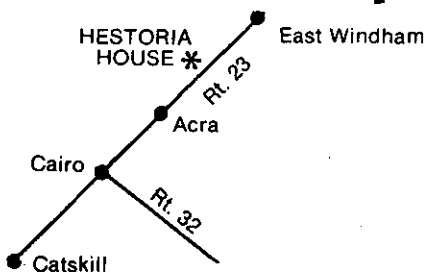

NEW SCOTLAND Board declines to fill vacancy

New Scotland officials have decided to wait until after the November election before making an appointment to fill the unexpired term of the late George P. Hotaling.

Supervisor Steve Wallace told townspeople at last Wednesday's town board meeting that the board had offered the appointment to Edith Hotaling, widow of the councilman, but she had declined. Hotaling, 71-year-old Voorheesville civic leader who had been nominated in May by town Republicans for reelection to a second four-year term, died July 29. The present term expires Dec. 31.

"We're going to operate as a non-partisan board until the election," Wallace said to scattered chuckles from the audience. "We will appoint the election winner to George's seat."

Over the weekend, Anne Carson, vice chairman of the New Scotland GOP committee, was selected as the replacement candidate for Hotaling's seat in the Nov. 3 balloting. Mrs. Carson, whose nomination was announced by town GOP chairman Fred Edmunds after a telephone poll of the committee, will be replaced on the 12-member committee by Mrs. William (Pat) Hotaling of Voorheesville, the late

councilman's daughter-in-law.

Meanwhile, the town board voted to honor Hotaling by erecting a memorial plaque at the town park softball field, a project on which Hotaling worked many hours.

Woman nominated for town board

A 49-year-old Voorheesville volunteer worker plans a strenuous run to become the first woman to be elected to the New Scotland town board.

Anne Carson, 34 Scotch Pine, has been nominated by the Republican town committee as a candidate for the town council in the November elections, replacing George P. Hotaling, the incumbent who died July 29 after suffering a heart attack.

"I'm really excited about running for office," she said this week, still a little shaky from a weekend bout with a virus that brought her fever and nausea. "I like the direction the town has been going, updating zoning, getting public assistance (like Feura Bush water) when they need it, keeping our park functional, and keeping in touch with the people. I hope to have the opportunity to continue these things. As a bookkeeper at town hall I see where all the dollars are going."

A vivacious blonde with an abundance of energy, Anne Carson has pledged herself to

"go out and work and meet as many of the people as I can." A native of Oneida, she has been married for 26 years to Charles R. Carson, an attorney with the State Dept. of Law, and has lived in Voorheesville for 20 years. In that time she has put in thousands of hours for the PTSA (as calendar chairman and room mother coordinator), for the FISH organization when it was active in the Voorheesville area, as a Brownie and Girl Scout leader, and many years with the Red Cross Bloodmobile in the village. Currently she is serving on the village recreation board, a seat she has held for 10 years, and is active in the Helderberg Business and Professional Women's Club. She and her husband are parents of three daughters, Jan, 25, of Washington, D.C.; Tricia, 23, of Sunnyvale, Calif.; Susan (Mrs. David Condon), 22, of Voorheesville, and one son, Mark,

21, a senior at RPI.

Her place on the Republican town committee will be taken by Pat Hotaling, wife of William Hotaling, village public works superintendent, and daughter-in-law of the late councilman. Mrs. Hotaling, one of eight daughters of the late Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Scoons, grew up near Wally's Farm on New Scotland Rd., then a part of Bethlehem and now in the city of Albany. She is a graduate of Milne High School, attended comptometry school in Albany, and worked at the GLF plant, now Agway. She has been a crossing guard at the grade school, writes a local news column for the Altamont *Enterprise*, is a member of the Helderberg BPW, and is active in the First United Methodist Church. She and her husband are parents of three children, Brett, 14, Paige, 11, and Chad, 7.
