Businesswomen's club celebrates 50th

When the Bethlehem Business Women's Club got its charter in 1951, it was as a branch of the New York State Federation of Business and Professional Women, and in its early years, had about 25 members.

"It was more tea with white gloves," immediate past president Kristy Reynolds said. "Today, we have 107 members, 21 of whom are new."

"In the old days, it was more slow and easy-going," said Dorothy Brown, one of the earlier members and president in the 1970s. "The young people today are very gung-ho, and doing a lot with computers and Web sites."

The club ended its national affiliation in order to channel its money directly into the town of Bethlehem. Its mission remains the same as it always has been.

"We want to be involved in community activities, foster a caring spirit, and create opportunities for our members," Reynolds said. "This is a group of women focused on being active in the community."

The Bethlehem Business Women's Club helps adopt families through schools and the town at the holidays, contributes to the Adopt-A-Highway

program, the New Day Art Institute in Albany's South End, and the Bethlehem Festival Fund. Each year, they give \$1,000 scholarships to two graduating high school seniors from the town of Bethlehem. To provide this funding, the club conducts various fund-raisers throughout the year.

"We've sold flower bulbs, held craft fairs, fashion shows and card parties,"

Currently, the Club's best-known fund-raiser is the Bethlehem throw it designed and started selling two years

"We spent a year designing it," Reynolds said of the blanket featuring different Bethlehem locales, "and

working with a company in North Carolina to produce it.'

Beyond its community contributions, Reynolds said, is the club's role as a place for women to network.

"It's exceedingly important for women to do this," Reynolds said, explaining that the club defines business in the broadest terms.

Reynolds is a registered nurse at Albany Open MRI, and current president Kathryn Schimanski is a secretary at Glenmont Elementary School.

Ages of the members are as diverse as the careers, ranging from women in their 20s through senior citizens.

"You don't have to own your own business to be a member," Reynolds said. "You only have to be associated with a business to be a member, and what do we have around us that's not businessrelated?"

The club maintains a networking board, a place for members to post business cards and announcements, to help facilitate networking.

Lanahan tapped as parks chief

Less than two weeks after the departure of her predecessor, longtime Bethlehem Parks and Recreation Administrator David Austin, for a job in state government, the town board last week provisionally appointed assistant administrator Nan Lanahan to fill the chief administrative post.

Lanahan has been acting administrator since Austin's departure on July 13 to assume a position as advocate for business with the state Workers' Compensation Board.

"I'm really excited about the new challenge," said Lanahan about her appointment. "It's kind of the same, but new. I'm doing many of the same things I've been doing over the last 13 years, with new responsibilities for facilities management, an area I'm still learning about.'

Lanahan, 43, followed Austin into the assistant administrator's post after his appointment to head the department in 1988. Her responsibilities in that role included developing special events and programs for the department, overseeing budget and personnel matters, scheduling and interaction with the Bethlehem schools, whose facilities are used for various public recreation programs.

In a memo to the board from Supervisor Sheila Fuller recommending the appointment, Fuller called Lanahan "an ideal candidate to assume the position of administrator. Nan has demonstrated her abilities to manage the vast number of recreational programs and associated staff, and is well poised to assume the added facilities

Tower plan gets lukewarm reception

Two projects recently referred by the Bethlehem town board to the planning board for its recommendations were the subject of the planning agenda on Tuesday, July 24.

And judging from the outcome of the meeting, it may be some time before either project — a residential development in Glenmont and a proposed telecommunications tower in Slingerlands — returns to the town board for further consideration.

Independent Wireless One, an Albany-based network affiliate of cell-phone carrier Sprint PCS, proposes to build a 100-foot "monopole" telecommunications spire behind Price Chopper Plaza in Slingerlands to provide cellular phone service in an underserved area along New Scotland Road.

Constructing a new tower, Hasbrouck told the IWO representatives, will be "a battle for you, without question. If you can find other options which are less of a battle, you'll be an awful lot ahead.'

Hasbrouck and other board members also raised an issue already cited by the town board" the tower's appearance as seen from the proposed Slingerlands Bypass, that is likely to carry Route 85 behind Price Chopper to link up with Cherry Avenue.

Stockman conceded that IWO had not discussed the likely footprint of that extension with the state Department of Transportation, which has the project on its short-term Transportation Improvement Plan schedule for the coming few years.

That raised red flags for board member Joe Rooks.

"What you see today is not what we hope you're gonna see in a few years after they finish building the highway," Rooks said. "It feels to me very unreasonable not to consider where that highway's going to go."

Some procedural matters remain to be resolved including what role the zoning board might play in reviewing another piece of the tower proposal, the special use permit the project will require.

Hasbrouck said he is in date to identify possible discussion with the zoning board on that issue.

> Rosen said the townhouse project is targeted at "empty nesters — the owner who doesn't desire a large traditional-style home with a large lot, but still wants a single-family type of development without the maintenance of a large home and large

> But planning board members and town engineer John Fenzl raised numerous issues about the proposed development's configuration, the proximity of several proposed lots to a steep slope down to the Dowerskill, and whether several roads proposed in the preliminary site plans meet state safety standards.

Board member Daniel Odell also suggested the small size of the ability of homeowners to build decks and patios on their townhouse units.

The town board, in referring the matter to the planning board for review but retaining lead agency status for itself, specifically sought a recommendation from the planning body on both the rezoning to a PRD and on environmental quality issues.

For now, the planning board tabled the matter pending further review by the developer and the town's engineering and planning departments.

Another potentially controversial residential development issue will also be headed to the planning board soon.

The house is currently retaliating for the fact that the detritus of daily family life covers easily one quarter of it. Mysterious signs of wear and tearappear seem to be appearing randomly — and nearly daily.

First, there was the china and crystal fiasco, when two glass shelves in the china closet broke and my idea that I am "not a thing person" was as shattered as all the treasures that lay in shards, wedged in the doors of the china

While Chris reminded me that the important thing was that nobody was hurt. I learned that spontaneous china closet shelf collapse wasn't sufficient reason for an insurance company to replace our treasures.

To prevent a recurrence, we wedged the china closet into a less-traveled place near the dining room table, making that part of



Sign off on rumor.

Last week, The Spotlight received an unsigned letter viciously attacking a community business person. The anonymous writer urged us to probe into the matter.

As we state every week in our letters policy boxes, unsigned letters are never considered for publication. And unsubstantiated attacks on individuals are taken as rumor, not worthy of consideration.

We wonder if these types of letters would ever be written if the writer knew his or her name would appear in print.

It's easy to vent a gripe when you remain anonymous. People's private lives, however, deserve more consideration and respect than that.

The Spotlight makes every effort to report local news and every effort to avoid targeting individuals who have not been charged with wrongdoing.

When that happens, it may be libel and certainly is irresponsible, illegal and reprehensible.

It's alarming to think that someone would expect that a community newspaper would participate in a personal vendetta. That's not our job and never will be.

Protect the developmentally disabled

The rapid development of

medical technology has resulted in a clash between what medical technology can do to prolong life, versus what medical technology, tempered by hum-



anitarian and ethical considerations, should do to allow life to end without intervention.

This conflict was highlighted in the case of Karen Ann Quinlan, which was decided by the New Jersey Supreme Court in 1976. Quinlan was comatose, on a respirator and in what was called a "chronic and persistent vegetative state, existing at a primitive reflex level."

The court granted Quinlan's father's request that he be appointed her guardian, with the understanding that life support would be terminated if her physician concluded (and a hospital ethics committee agreed) that there was no possibility that she would ever emerge from her condition.

The court based its decision on a fundamental, constitutional right of individuals to choose to decline medical treatment. The court determined that this valuable right should not be discarded because Quinlan's condition prevented her conscious exercise of that right. The court held that "the only practical way to prevent destruction of the right is to permit the guardian and family to render their best judgment" as to whether she would exercise that right under the circumstances then existing.

Court cases and legislation since then have simplified the ways in which individuals can exercise this fundamental right. In 1990, the New York Legislature passed the Health Care Proxy Law, which requires that physicians and hospitals follow the directions of a substituted

decision-maker, identified by the patient in a health care proxy, if the patient is incapable of making medical decisions.

The health care proxy can only make decisions about withholding treatment at the end of life (such as withholding nutrition or hydration, or withdrawing mechanical assistance) if the patient clearly expressed his or her wishes as to how he or she wants to be treated in those circumstances. The patient can express his or her wishes right on the health care form or in another document such as a living will. Without this direction, the person appointed as a health care proxy cannot make these critical end-oflife decisions.

This limitation on the power of a substitute decision-maker is based on decisions from New York's Court of Appeals. Unlike the New Jersey court, which said. that the guardian of Karen Quinlan could exercise his "best judgment" as to what Karen Quinlan's decision would have been under the circumstances of that case, New York courts have consistently required "clear and convincing evidence" of how the patient would have decided, if he/ she had the capacity to make the decision.

This requirement of New York law is one compelling reason why all competent adults should execute living wills and health care proxies.

Although this requirement seems fair on its face, in fact it discriminates against a small and very vulnerable segment of the population. The requirement that there be clear and convincing evidence of how the patient would wish to be treated under extreme circumstances presumes that at one time, the patient had the ability to contemplate, understand and clearly express what their decision would be.

If an individual is born with mental retardation or a developmental disability, however, they may never have the capacity to make an informed decision about how they would wish to be treated if they were in a terminal condition. Under New York law, the courts must presume that the individual would wish to be kept alive under all circumstances

This issue gained national attention with the case of Sheila Pouliot in Syracuse. In March 2000, Pouliot lay dying in the hospital, in pain, with her intestines and other bodily systems failing. Eight physicians favored terminating a hydration tube and the judge agreed.

The state attorney general challenged the judge's action, stating that "While we obviously feel tremendous compassion for this patient, what the judge seeks to do is unlawful."

State Supreme Court Justice James Tormey took the unusual step of visiting Pouliot in the hospital before reaching a decision. After the visit, the judge challenged the attorney general to come to the hospital to visit important legislation.

Pouliot before deciding whether to appeal his order.

The attorney general did not visit and did pursue an appeal. Pouliot died before the appeal could be heard.

Since the Pouliot case there have been at least two other cases in which persons with mental retardation have been kept alive, with forced hydration, against the wishes of caring family members.

New York law requires this treatment even if a legally appointed guardian wishes to pursue other treatment, and even if this "treatment" causes pain and prolonged suffering. Until the law is changed, it is inevitable that there will be more such cases.

Fortunately, there is a solution on the horizon. This spring, legislation was introduced in both the Assembly and the Senate that would give legally appointed guardians of persons with mental retardation the right to make all critical health care decisions.

This law would require that every person with mental retardation should receive medical care and attention based exclusively on what is in the best interests of the person. The law would permit individuals appointed as guardians to make decisions to withhold or withdraw life-sustaining treatment, but only if specific conditions and notification requirements are satisfied. Specifically, treatment may be withdrawn or withheld only if two physicians agree that the patient has certain medical conditions, and then only if life-sustaining treatment would impose an 'extraordinary burden" on the individual.

In June, this law, the Health Care Decisions Act for Persons with Mental Retardation passed the Assembly by a vote of 143-0. The Senate version, Senate Bill No. 4622, sponsored by Sen. Kemp Hannon, R-Long Island, awaits action by the Senate. Advocates for the legislation hope the Senate will act soon on this critical legislation.

All competent adults have the right, under New York law, to make advance decisions about the circumstances under which they would wish to have lifesustaining treatment withdrawn or withheld. An individual born with severe mental retardation does not have this right. The Health Care Decisions Act provides a limited and careful means for ending this discrimination against the most vulnerable members of our society. Anyone who wishes to support this important legislation should write to his or her state senator and urge its passage.

Twenty five years ago in the Quinlan case, the New Jersey Supreme Court acknowledged that the only way to prevent the destruction of the right to choose to decline medical treatment for a person who had not issued an advance directive was to permit a caring guardian to exercise his or her best judgment.

The Health Care Decisions Act is the way to provide this important right for persons with mental retardation in New York. Please support the passage of this





"I'm an old-fashioned grandma," Zini said. "I'm really indulgent to my grandchildren, immensely so.'

Indulgence, it seems, runs in the family. Zini went into business in 1998 thanks to the prodding, and financial underwriting, of her late husband, Frank Zini Jr.

A New York City native, Korean War veteran, and, beginning in 1964, a resident of Delmar, he carved out a diverse career as Pontiac salesman, lecturer on alcohol and substance abuse, and a longtime counselor with the state Division of Veterans Affairs. A widower, he married Colonie native Rhonda in 1989.

An avid woodworker, Frank prompted Rhonda to enter, and win, craft competitions, in crochet, woodwork, flower arranging, at the Altamont Fair.

"They were great years, those last 10 years," Rhonda recalled. "He spoiled me rotten."

And he challenged her. "One day he told me, it was time to put up or shut up," she said. "It was time to either open a shop or quit fooling around."

She joked, "I think he just got tired of so many crafts just lying around the house." ...

A put-up-or-shut-up kind of guy, Frank used some of the proceeds of a half century of careful stock investments, bequeathed to him by his mother, to finance Northland Granny's, now at 427B Kenwood Ave.

But in December1998, just months after the store's opening and a few months shy of his 10th anniversary, Frank died of a heart attack.

Rhonda suddenly found herself in a new role: executor of Frank's will - which contained a few surprises.

"I'm in culture shock," said Rhonda. "We didn't live like millionaires."

But that's what they were: Frank left healthy sums for his surviving family — and two highly personal bequests of more than a half million each.

For years, Frank held steady, blue-chip stocks. "He did some shrewd investing and got it to grow. It more than tripled his inheritance," Rhonda said.

Out of his carefully marshalled wealth, Frank willed \$560,000 to the Mohawk & Hudson Humane Society, from whom he and Rhonda had adopted numerous animals over the years, including King, Rhonda's partner in childminding. An identical bequest creates a unique special fund for the Hospice at St. Peter's

Hospital, to provide terminal patients a little dignity in the form of creature comforts - cosmetics, hair stylists, manicures.

Two and a half years of probate later, the tortuous process of carrying out Frank Zini's last wishes is nearing its end. Attorneys for St. Peter's and the humane society in June finally signed the necessary papers that clear the way to execute the will.

"It's almost done," Rhonda said. "Within a few weeks, hopefully. Enough is enough. It's time to let Frank rest in peace."

The delay, she said, stemmed from the datedness of Frank's will drawn up before their marriage — and, ironically, the specificity of his wishes.

The care of dying cancer patients and the welfare of returned the favor. unwanted animals, she said, were matters close to Frank's heart.

Frank's first wife Ruth Marie was a patient at St. Peter's before her death from cancer in 1981.

she was dying, to be able to look good, to have a cosmetician around, to have her hair done," Rhonda said.

Delmar student killed in V'ville car crash

A Bethlehem Central High School graduate, home from college on summer vacation, died in the early morning hours of Saturday, July 28, in a Voorheesville accident under investigation by the Albany County Sheriff's Department.

According to reports by sheriff's deputies, David B. Maher, 22, of Delmar, was killed when the car he was driving northbound on Crow Ridge Road at about 3:24 a.m. failed to

Maher's vehicle struck a guard rail and then a tree before coming to a stop near Voorheesville Elementary School.

Maher was pronounced dead at the scene by Albany County Coroner Philip Furie. A passenger in Maher's vehicle. William J. Bush, 23, a college student from Littleton, Colo., suffered head injuries in the accident, and was transported by Voorheesville Ambulance to Albany Medical Center Hospital, where he was treated and released.

Police interviewed Bush at the

Undersheriff John Mahan said: accident. 'Speed was definitely a factor. We've made measurements at the scene and we're doing ourcalculations right now as we speak" about how fast Maher had been driving.

Investigators are also seeking to determine whether alcohol may have been a factor in the Friday night.

But it may be as much as a week before toxicology reports are available for analysis, he said.

Maher, a student at Buffalo University, and Bush, an acquaintance, were both on summer vacation and had reportedly been visiting friends
