Delmar man dies following house fire

A Delmar man died Saturday of injuries sustained in a house fire on Borthwick Avenue, the cause of which remains under investigation.

Paul A. Peterson, 53, of 18 Borthwick

Ave. was pronounced dead Saturday at Westchester Memorial Hospital, where he had been transported the day before for treatment of severe burns on the upper half of his body suffered in the Friday, Dec. 7, fire at his home. Peterson was alone in the home at the time.

The fire was reported to Bethlehem police at about 2:45 p.m. Friday by a bus dispatcher for the

Bethlehem Central School District, alerted by the driver of a passing Bethlehem Central School District vehicle flagged down by Peterson, who had run from the home.

According to Bethlehem school Superintendent Les Loomis, the driver, after reporting the incident, entered the home.

"There was some fire in the house, but no one else present at the time," Loomis said. An aide remained on the bus with the lone special-education student aboard, who apparently slept through the incident, Loomis said.

responding at the scene found Peterson, severely burned, kneeling on the lawn of a home across the street from his residence. He was transported by Delmar Ambulance to Albany Medical Center Hospital, and then flown to Westchester for treatment in the hospital's burn unit,

Delmar and Elsmere firefighters brought the fire under control within a half hour. The house sustained substantial interior damage.

Investigators from the state Fire Investigation and Prevention unit and Bethlehem police determined that the fire originated in a bedroom, but the specific cause remains under investigation, according to Bethlehem Detective John Cox.

Three major development projects top the agenda for tonight's final regular meeting of the year of the Bethlehem town board — including consideration of the Final Environmental Impact Statement (FEIS) for the Bethlehem Town Center project in Glenmont.

The planning board voted unanimously last week to recommend that the FEIS be adopted.

Also up for consideration is a request to rezone a parcel on New Scotland Road in Slingerlands, clearing the way for construction of a professional office building there, and a fresh start for a long-debated residential project on Blessing Road.

The Town Center FEIS has drawn the most attention of the three. A draft EIS was the subject of a public hearing before the town board in May, and the final version of the document outlining likely environmental impacts and planned steps for their mitigation has been under review ever since by the planning board, the town's engineering consultants on



the project at Vollmer Associates and Sear Brown Associates, design engineers for Town Center developer Nigro Companies.

On Dec. 4, the planning board adopted a resolution finding that the FEIS is complete and recommending that the town board concur and accept the document.

"Considerable attention has been

"Considerable given to the concerns of residential and commercial property owners in the vicinity of the project site, and of the Bethlehem Central School District," wrote chairman Douglas Hasbrouck in

a memo communicating that recommendation to Supervisor Sheila Fuller.

If the town board concurs, it would clear the way for the planning board to complete a statement of findings in accordance with the state SEQR law and act on a building project application aired in an October public hearing.

Town Planner Jeff Lipnicky said last week that his department received revised site plans from Sear Brown on Nov 30 "Our next step is to sit down with those revised site plans, go over them thoroughly and provide (Nigro) with comments," he said. "Their job would then be to respond to those comments."

The planning board could consider site plan-approval as soon as its first meeting in January, he said, depending on the outcome of tonight's town board action.

Police arrest clerk for embezzlement

For the second time in two weeks, an employee of a Stewart's store in Bethlehem has been arrested and charged with embezzlement.

Anna M. Sutton, 23, of 498 Kenwood Ave. and an employee of the store, turned herself in to Bethlehem police on Wednesday, Dec. 5, after learning of a warrant for her arrest. She was arraigned before Bethlehem town Justice Kenneth Munnelly on a grand larceny count, a felony, and released in her own recognizance, pending a date in Town Court on on Dec. 18.

The warrant followed an investigation by a Stewart's loss prevention officer into more than \$3,000 in missing cash over the past year at the Delmar store,

based on internal audits.

Sutton is charged with theft of more than \$1,100 over the past six months. Investigation of the remaining losses by Stewart's investigators and Bethlehem police is continuing.

Sutton's arrest came barely a week after the arrest of Cynthia Anne Bush, 45, of 124 Buck Ranch Road, Coeymans, an employee of the Stewart's store at 1344 Route 9W in Selkirk, charged with theft of more than \$1,900 in cash and merchandise from that location.

Grandy investigated the apartment after a complaint from a neighbor, who heard animal noise and contacted police, concerned about the welfare of the dogs. The neighbor reported it had been roughly three weeks since any human had been seen coming or going from the apartment.

pit bull was found in a closet with three puppies, without food and with only a contaminated toilet for drinking water.

excrement, reeking of urine. Scar was found, alone, in a nearby laundry room, so weak he had to be carried out. Kearney said it did not appear the adult female was Scar's mother.

"Why anyone would have multiple puppies in an apartment they don't even inhabit is beyond me," Kearney said. "It appears they didn't even come to walk the dogs. They defecated and urinated right in the apartment."

"We are seeking to speak to a couple of individuals and have not been able to do that just yet," Bethlehem detective John Cox said on Monday. "It's under investigation."

The apartment was apparently rented by a 20-year-old woman reportedly living with a 24-yearold Albany man. When Grandy arrived with the landlord at the apartment last week to investigate, they found that the lock on the apartment door had been changed, allegedly without the landlord's knowledge, and had to be drilled out.

According to police spokesman Sgt. Thomas Heffernan; no chain of ownership of the unregistered dogs has yet been established. Nor have police determined why the dogs were being kept, unattended, in an apartment.

But Kearney speculated that it might be related to the growing trade in pit bulls — reportedly prized by street toughs and drug dealers for their fierceness, 'and

sometimes even raised for fighting.

You don't think about this sort of thing happening, pit bulls being raised for fighting, in the town of Bethlehem," Kearney said.

Grandy said the dogs bore no physical evidence of being involved in fighting - but that Scar and the other pupples were too young in any case.

"In general, my understanding is, they don't actually start that kind of training until they are much older," Kearney said.

The other dogs found with Scar were taken by Grandy to the Mohawk-Hudson River Humane Society shelter in Menands.

"In theory, unless the animals are in a life threatening situation, they have to go to Mohawk-Hudson when they're seized," Kearney said. "But this guy was in such dire straits, so emaciated, and with wounds that were so catastrophic, that George brought him here.'

"The prognosis for his recovery is excellent," Kearney said. "He's going to have some horrific scars, but he's going to recover very well. He's young and has tremendous regenerative

Kearney said he has to be An adult female, taken to the shelter for proper adoption proceedings. There, he and his fellows face an uncertain fate. With local police, especially in the city of Albany, cracking down recently on dog fighting, The shelter has had an overwhelming increase in the number of animals surrendered to them or having been seized, animals used for fighting or for drug protection," Kearney said.

He estimated that some 70 percent of dogs in the shelter lately have been pit bulls, causing a dilemma for shelter officials. With their fearsome reputation, pit bulls are difficult to place for adoption - particularly if they are infested with parasites or have become imprinted with bad habits like defecating indoors.

State law requires that an animal shelter hold an unlicensed dog for five days. But with overcrowding at the Menands shelter, Kearney said, he has heard that unclaimed, unadopted pit bulls are generally euthanized immediately after that.

Attempts to confirm that with shelter officials. unsuccessful.

As for abusive owners, Kearney said, "One of the scary parts of all of this is, even with a more aggressive Buster's Law, probably nothing bad is going to happen to these folks."


"Theoretically, (offenders) could go to another county and adopt another animal almost immediately," Kearney said.

The sympathy of would-be adopters may well give Scar a better chance of avoiding euthanasia.

"I'm confident he will get a home," Kearney said. "I'm more worried about his brothers and

State grant to 4-Corners will help develop plan

The check should soon be in way to the town of Bethlehem to underwrite a development plan for the Four Corners.

Last month, the Governor's Office for Small Cities announced the award of 25 Technical. Assistance Grants municipalities, totalling \$434,000, from among 54 applications under a program funded through a Federal Housing and Urban the Quality Communities spearheaded the proposal. Program, designed to provide funds for strategic planning of community development initiatives.

Two weeks ago, the town board authorized Supervisor Sheila Fuller to sign an agreement with the state office to release the funding, which will require a \$10,000 match in either dollars or in-kind services by the town.

The grant originated with an application presented in September by Bethlehem Chamber of Commerce President Marty DeLaney on behalf of the Four Corners Merchants Group, and endorsed by the town board. DeLaney outlined the merchant an urban-village context for the core business district in Delmar.

The grant proposal included the mail for a state grant on its funding to aid in development of a vision statement; assembling and analyzing zoning and tax mapping data; developing standards for new zoning requirements, architectural and design standards; and outlining future funding strategies and other steps to implement the plan.

With the agreement now signed, the state will release the funding to the town, which in turn will distribute the money for the various stages of the project upon receipt of appropriate vouchers.

The town, the chamber and the state are all now partners in this, which I think is wonderful," DeLaney said. "It will improve the appearance of our Four Corners, and that helps the whole community, not just the Four Corners."

There are so many Winnie-the-Pooh ornaments that the whole tree has been "Pooh's Hotel" for a few years. This year, each ornament had to check in before heading off to its own branch. Six little Chinese men that friends sent from Hong Kong dangle from the bottom branches, where Cormac sometimes lies on the floor and plays with them.

to encompass my husband and children. When I was a very little girl, my family spent Christmas with my grandparents. Grandma and Grandpa's house was always marvelously quiet, and very, very clean. In the front room, they had a silver Christmas tree, decorated with red balls, and with a color wheel that gave the illusion of four different otherworldly hues. 



Coping with grief over the holidays

Grieving a terrible loss can be especially difficult when everyone all around seems to be throwing a party. The message to smile and celebrate smacks up against the suffering person's urge to hide away and cry. Guilt and resistance are common experiences as the holidays grow near and expectations arise. Family traditions, once anticipated and enjoyed, may now turn to dreaded events that create upsetting levels of stress for the grieving person. It can be hard to believe at times like this that grieving is a natural and healthy human response to loss.

At its best, grieving is a painful and awkward process. One must survive the feelings that accompany unwelcome news and dire events, including desperation. anguish, anxiety and depression. At the same time, they must adjust to the disorientation of their life created by the loss. The idea of 'returning to normal,' however, is a myth; by definition, a major loss implies the need to develop new skills and new ways of doing things. Both of these major tasks, 1) emotional healing and 2) the adaptation to the loss. require courage, counsel, support, trial and error, and time.

Most of us can remember a time when we were physically ill or incapacitated and simply not up for celebrating an event. Grieving is similar. The author C.S. Lewis once noted after the death of his wife that no one ever prepared him for the sheer exhaustion of grief. In the early months of profound loss, people will also describe the disconcerting experience of being 'mugged' by their own emotions; in other words, overwhelmed by grief at the slightest provocation and without warning.

The thought of such a thing happening in the midst of a happy celebration can be worrisome and embarrassing. If grieving people are pushed, or push themselves, to meet some standard of the 'perfect holiday,' it is akin to

Hosting events at this time of year usually requires tremendous energy and concentration. Making the shift from that of an organizer to that of a guest is an example of how a simple change can make a profound difference. As a visitor, the grieving person has the security of knowing they can keep things 'short and sweet' if they choose (a wise rule of thumb) without the responsibility of attending to everyone's needs.

It is also easier to make your getaway' from someone else's home! Grieving people are always advised to pay attention when their need for company gives way to their need for quiet and solitude. If one wants to

shoulder the task of hosting an event despite these challenges, they may want to consider pot lucking, delegating more than usual and asking for help.

For some, asking for help when appropriate can be difficult. but it is one of the important adaptations to loss

that people need to learn.

How can one make a grieving person feel welcome?

It might be helpful to exchange the traditional message of "Come have a good time and be happyî with a message of 'We love you. Bring your sloppy self on over here. Cry. Laugh. Tell your stories. Remember. Forget. Stay as long as you like. Leave whenever you need to. It's all

Don't strain to take away hurt that is deep and real — people will often 'grip their grief' if they sense this is happening. Simply bear witness to their pain and honor their struggle with loving compassion. Listen.

The grieving relative who avoids the mall shopping scene by telling her nephew, 'I want to foot the bill for the next three movies you see' makes the teen happy and takes care of herself at the same time. 



We feel they handled the situation not professionally, courageously. The driver, I think, did everything he should have done, and more." He declined to identify the driver and aide.





CDs or deferred annuities: Which one is right for you?

inflation, and longer life expectancies, today's decisions could dictate tomorrow's retirement lifestyle.

Bank certificates of deposits (CDs) and deferred annuities are two popular vehicles that individuals have used to accumulate wealth. Both are highly effective tools with their own unique strengths and weaknesses. For that reason, it's important to choose the one that best meets your financial goals and object-

Risks and rewards

CDs and deferred annuities are considered low-risk, conservative investments. CDs are usually issued by banks and, in most cases, insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. (FDIC) for up to \$100,000 per depositor. If the bank should happen to fail, the FDIC guarantees CDs up to this amount. CDs also offer a guaranteed rate of return for a specified period of time. The rate of return you receive varies depending upon current market conditions and the length of time until maturity.

Insurance companies issue deferred annuity contracts which, unlike CDs, are not insured by the FDIC. Deferred annuities are backed in their entirety by the financial strength of the issuing insurance company. Because of this, you should make sure the issuing company is financially secure before you purchase a deferred annuity.

Deferred annuity rates are sometimes higher because they are designed to encourage people to leave more on deposit for the long term due to the tax-deferred feature. A guaranteed interest rate is usually locked in for aninitial period, ranging from one to three years. After the initial guarantee period, rates may be adjusted periodically.

As an added advantage, most deferred annuities offer a minimum guaranteed interest rate that extends beyond the initial period. Regardless of what happens in the market, the annuity will pay at least the minimum guaranteed interest rate established at the time of purchase.

The effect on taxes

Current tax law treats the iterest earnings of CDs and deferred annuities quite differently. If taxes are a concern, a deferred annuity may prove to be a better option for several rea-

- Earnings on CDs are taxable in the year the interest is earned. Also, you do not necessarily have to withdraw the earnings from the CD to pay the taxable amount. Rather, you usually pay the tax due out of current income or with-holding from other income sources. This re-duces spendable income today and may also reduce it in the future, when it is needed most.
- · With deferred annuities, taxes on earnings are deferred until the earnings are withdrawn. This allows more of your money to work harder and gives you a measure of control over when

Your money earns interest on the principal, interest on the interest, and interest on the money that you would ordinarily pay in current taxes. The tax deferral feature is one of the advantages of deferred annuities.

• In addition, the tax-deferred earnings are not used in the calculation to determine the current income taxes due on Social Security benefits. But with CDs, interest earnings are used in the calculation to determine taxes on your Social Security benefits. As much as 85 percent of Social Security can be subject to taxation, depending on income level.

Investment horizon

When deciding between a CD and a deferred annuity, the time you have set aside to save for a specific goal — your investment horizon — is a key factor. In the short term, a CD may prove to be the better choice because you can select a maturity date that can

Given the impact of taxes, you pay taxes and how much you be as short as one month or as continuous need. long as several years.

Keep in mind that if you need access to funds prior to the maturity date, you may have to pay an interest penalty, ranging from 30 days to six months interest. To avoid this pitfall, you can invest in several CDs with staggered maturity dates.

If you are taking a long-term approach, a deferred annuity may be more attractive. The ability to compound earnings on a tax-deferred basis could help you accumulate assets for retirement. And, should you need additional income, most insurance companies provide you with the ability to access the accumulated cash value in the

Some companies will allow you to withdraw a portion of your deferred annuity's account value, usually up to 10 percent a year, with a surrender charge. Withdrawals can be made in response to a one-time cash need or can be set up to take care of a



Dr. John Kiley

Dr. John E. Kiley, 81, of Slingerlands died Tuesday, Dec. 4, at Good Samaritan Lutheran Health Care Center in Delmar.

Born in New York City, he was one of the country's first nephrologists and was an internationally recognized expert on kidney disease.

In 1949, because of Dr. Kiley and three associates, Albany Medical College acquired the nation's third artificial kidney, one of the first hemodialysis machines. Dr. Kiley co-authored the first scientific paper describing the operation of the artificial kidney. It was published in the Journal of Clinical Investigations and is still cited widely today.

He graduated from Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute and received his medical degree from Harvard Medical School.

He was an Army veteran of World War II, serving as a captain in the Medical Corps.

After the war, he was stationed in Fulda, Germany, and was selected to attend the University of Vienna Medical School.

In 1962, Dr. Kiley performed peritoneal dialysis on five infants who were mistakenly given salt in their formula instead of sugar. In the March 23, 1962, issue of *Time* magazine, it was reported that he had worked on five babies for 36 hours with only one hour's sleep, and all but one of the infants were taken off the critical list.

Dr. Kiley was professor of medicine and head of the division of kidney diseases at Albany Medical College from 1960 to 1977. He was program director of Albany Medical Center's general clinical research center. He was certified as a specialist in internal medicine by the American Board of Internal Medicine and was a Diplomate in the subspecialty of nephrology by the American

Board of Internal Medicine.

In 1977, Dr. Kiley became professor of medicine at the University of Mississippi Medical Center. He returned to the Albany area in 1991, where he continued his work at the Stratton Veterans Administration Medical Center Hospital.

He was a member of Sigma Xi, the American Federation for Clinical Research, the American Society for Artificial Internal Organs, the American Association for Study of Liver Disease, the American College of Physicians, Renal Section and the Council on Circulation, the International and American Societies of Nephrology, and the Great Lakes Interurban Club.

Dr. Kiley was an avid tennis player and skier.

He was a communicant of the Church of St. Thomas the Apostle in Delmar.

Survivors include his wife, Catherine Walsh Kiley; a son, Edmund Kiley of Bainbridge Island, Wash.; four daughters, Elizabeth Kiley Kinder of Providence, R.I., Dr. Catherine Kiley of South Dartmouth, Mass., Mary Ellen Henderson of Fairlee, Vt., and C. Abbie Kiley of Troy; and eight grandchildren.



The show begins on a faraway planet, as astronauts Mickey, Minnie, Donald and Goofy introduce the story. Just as Mickey and his gang depart, Buzz enters to battle his nemesis, the dark-helmeted, heavy breathing, Evil Emperor Zurg. The accompanying alien forms, laser lights and pyrotechnics are just

pyrotechnics are just the beginning of the fun.

Famous for special effects, Disney on Ice loads "Toy Story 2" with innovative props and stunts, including an airport sequence that lands a full-scale airplane wheel on the ice and a 16-car traffic jam which climaxes in the toppling of a 30-foot-long, 10-foot-tall tractor trailer filled with toothpaste.

The ice show remains true to the popular movie. Andy's toys fly into a panic when they discover Andy's mom is planning a yard sale. Wheezy the Penguin is nearly up for sale but Sheriff Woody saves him. In doing so, Woody puts himself in danger and winds up abducted by Big Al, the nefarious proprietor of Al's Toy Barn.

Big Al knows the modest sheriff is really a highly valued collector's item and plans on selling Woody for a big price. At Big Al's apartment, Woody meets up other collectible toys, Jesse the Prospector and Bullseye. Turns out they're all old friends from Woody's Roundup, a 1950s children's television show; Jessie was Woody's sidekick, Bullseye, his faithful steed, and the seemingly friendly old Prospector.

As Woody discovers his roots, the intrepid Buzz Lightyear is planning Woody's rescue. But when Buzz's plastic posse finally finds and rescues Woody, the straight-shooting sheriff is uncertain as to where he truly belongs, with his TV show friends or back in Andy's room.

"This production explores profound issues of friendship, loyalty and identity," said Jerry Bilik, vice president of creative development for Feld Entertainment, producer of Disney on Ice. "At the same time, the story is entertaining for both parents and children. One of the really big challenges is creating a sense of scale. We want to make the audience see the

world of Big Al in human scale and then switch to see the world from a small toy's perspective. To accomplish this, we've included lots of oversized sets and scenic elements designed to make the audience feel tiny."

The show features an international

team of world-class figure skaters. Choreographer Barry Lather helped the skaters interpret their characters.


"I think the challenge is that many skaters are more athlete than actor, so you have to find out what their strengths are," Lather said. "For example, Woody requires all of it — he has to be a good actor, he has to be musical, and he has to have good skating ability."

Lather has choreographed ice shows based on "Grease," "The Jungle Book," "Tarzan" and "The Lion King."

Lather's credits also include choreography for music stars Janet

Jackson, Paula Abdul and Sting, as well as Olympic figure skating stars Nancy Kerrigan and Kristi Yamaguchi.

"It's about making a connection," Lather said. "The audiences respond to the skaters' display of happiness, sadness, fear and courage on the ice."

And, as always, the musical score will get you moving in your seat.

Good family entertainment that will hold the interest of everyone from the baby to grandma and grandpa isn't always easy to find, but this production delivers. "Toy Story 2" will be in town for five days with eight performances — Dec. 12 to 14 at 7 p.m., Dec. 15 at 11 a.m., 2:30 and 6 p.m. and Dec. 16 at 1 and 4:30 p.m.

Cap Rep stages elf-exploration

n the wide world of holiday entertainments, from "Nutcrackers" to fairy-taleish movies, there is nothing quite like "The SantaLand Diaries," now playing at Capital Repertory Theatre in Albany.

The world-premiere adaptation with music of David Sedaris' acclaimed radio monologue is a hilarious behind-the-scenes look at the SantaLand at Macy's/Herald Square.

Sedaris, now a successful writer of very funny short stories, was unemployed, too interested in "One Life to Live," and practically broke as his first Christmas in New York approached. To survive, he applies for a job as an elf at Macy's, and the fun begins.

Through the "David" character, we get a sardonic look at the hiring and training of elves; their ridiculous costumes; the layout and mercenary purpose of SantaLand; his fellow employees, from dirt-dumb to taking themselves way too seriously; the relentless hetero- and homosexual flirting; "the "forced merriment" that elves must

project; and the wide range of Santa fans, both young and old, who brave the hour-long lines for their brief time and photo with the big guy.

As David, John Plumpis looks and sounds much like the original, bringing Sedaris' sense of ironic detachment to life on stage.

Derrick McGinty and Evy O'Rourke are wonderful as the supporting singer/dancers "He" and "She." O'Rourke is particularly effective in the hilarious "What Little Girls Want" and "I'll Show Him," and McGinty stops the show with his hellish Santa romp in "The Santaniclaus Blues."

Herbert Kaplan, who composed the music, also is on stage as the piano player and sometimes singer.

The set works well, as a kind of Christmas-tree-theme nightchib, with piano and three stools for the performers and a tinsel curtain backstage.
