Developers lose bid to bypass moratorium

Two developers seeking exemptions from the yearlong residential moratorium in Bethlehem have failed to successfully clear the first hurdle of the review process.

Developers of Hamden Woods, a 32-unit single-family subdivision off Elm Avenue, and the developer of a proposed 216-unit senior citizen complex in Delmar, appeared before the planning board on June 1 to plead their cases.

To qualify for an exemption, a developer must meet a strict set of requirements that include proving delay of the project would result in "unnecessary hardship." An applicant must show

that the project would not alter the essential character of the neighborhood and provide financial evidence citing a lack of return on the property, should it be delayed. A project must also not adversely affect the purpose of the moratorium. Applications for exemption from the moratorium are sent to the town board, which refers them to the planning board for a recommendation. The town board has the ultimate decision about whether to grant the exemption.

Van Dyke Spinney developers sought an exemption for its proposed \$15 million senior citizen housing complex on Van Dyke Road in Delmar. To build the housing, the developers had requested the creation of a senior citizen residence district, which will allow only residents age 62 or older. The zoning change would have to be approved by the town board, after being reviewed by the planning board. Before the moratorium went into effect, the planning board had recommended that the project receive the

zone change.

"There's an assumption that we're included in the moratorium," said developer Rex Ruthman of Van Dyke Spinney. "Consider whether or not we are really before you with a matter that pertains to the moratorium," he said, arguing the matter is one of zoning.

Although the developers have invested more than \$50,000 in fees to engineers and planners, the board determined that the project did not merit a waiver.

In a recommendation to the board, Town Planner Jeff Lipnicky found the project would alter the essential character of the neighborhood and that

granting a waiver would adversely affect the moratorium.

"I think this is a project that could benefit the town and seniors," said board member Thomas Cotrofeld. "I think it's extremely difficult, if not impossible, to satisfy all three criteria," he said.

Initially proposed in 1998 by CB Development Associates, Hamden Woods has been before the planning board for several years and modified a number of times.

Developers contend they've invested hundreds of thousands of dollars in the project, and its viability will be challenged by further delays.

"This application has been around for quite some time," acknowledged Lipnicky.

As for the economic hardship endured, Lipnicky responded: "It's the same type of hardship that is being suffered by everybody else who is caught

World War II veteran visits D.C. memorial

For Delmar Army veteran Frank Murphy, witnessing the long-awaited dedication of the National World War II Memorial in Washington was more exciting than having seats at the World Series, Super Bowl and the Kentucky Derby combined.

Nearly six decades after the war, he was among thousands of veterans gathered for the May 29 ceremonies.

"We're among a small percentage of World War II combat veterans left to share this honor," he said. "We never

thought about it for all these years until after the Vietnam and Korean War memorials were built."

Located on the National Mall between the Lincoln Memorial and Washington Monument, the 7.4-acre memorial honors 16 million Americans who served in uniform, among whom more than 400,000 died during the war. Also honored are the millions who supported the war on the home front. Of the 16 million service members, fewer than 4 million remain.

Veterans on hand for the ceremonies were treated to a week of receptions,

banquets, film tributes and speeches by notables such as actor Tom Hanks and former Sen. Bob Dole. Many, including Murphy, received commemorative medals, books and other mementos of gratitude for their sacrifice.

"You would have to be there to know how it felt," Murphy said. "Everybody shook our hands, smiling and thanking us for our service. I felt so proud to be an American."

Murphy, a veteran of three wars, served with the 339th regiment of the 85th Infantry Division in Italy during World War II.

On what was dubbed "The Forgotten Front, Allied forces took on seasoned German units long before the Normandy D-Day invasion.

"So much is said about D-Day and the Battle of the Bulge, but in Italy, we endured some of the toughest fighting

against the fiercest soldiers Germany could send," he said.

A native of Albany, Murphy joined the Army in June 1943 and trained at Camp Croft, S.C., as an infantryman. After further training at Fort Dix, N.J., his regiment departed for North Africa where they honed their combat skills in the mountains outside Algiers.

Suddenly, orders came to pack up and ship to Italy. On March 5, 1944, they arrived in Naples. Coming ashore in the middle of a night bombing raid, the soldiers immediately advanced to the front to relieve American and British units at Castleforte and Minturno.

"They rushed us to the front lines before we could even take a break," recalled Murphy, just 18 years old at the time. His company remained there for 60 of their first 65 days before breaking

Convicted sex offender arrested on repeat charges with minor

A convicted sex offender from Glenmont faces a new slew of charges after police arrested him for attempting to meet a minor at the Bethlehem Wal-Mart store to engage in sexual acts.

Stephen Wieland Jr., 27, of 9 Weiser St. in Glenmont arrived at the Route 9W store Tuesday evening expecting a rendezvous with a 17-year-old boy he knew.

"They met each other at McDonald's in Glenmont," said Bethlehem Police Detective Supervisor Michael McMillen, adding the boy and Wieland had each worked at the store at one

engage in sexual acts. Wieland also allegedly took nude pictures of the boy in a suggestive manner.

McMillen said Wieland took the pictures "under the premise that his aunt owned a modeling agency, and he was going to show

time. "They've known each other for about a year and a half," he said.

Police said Wieland had propositioned the boy in person and over the Internet to

engage in sexual acts. Wieland also allegedly took nude pictures of the boy in a suggestive manner. McMillen said Wieland took the pictures "under the premise that his aunt owned a modeling agency, and he was going to show

her the pictures."

The boy eventually told his father, who reported the incidents to police. Detectives, posing as the boy, spent four weeks conducting online conversations with Wieland and arranged the Wal-Mart meeting.

When he arrived, detectives arrested Wieland and charged him with four felony counts of disseminating indecent material to a minor; two counts of failure to register as a sex offender, a misdemeanor; four counts of endangering the welfare of a minor; and one count of forcible touching.

He was arraigned in Town

Court before Judge Frank Milano and ordered to Albany County jail without bail.

Last May, Wieland pleaded guilty to second-degree attempted sodomy for attempting to engage in sex with a 13-year-old boy. He was sentenced to 10 years' probation and ordered to register as a sex offender, which he initially did, police said.

"He failed to register yearly as he's required to do," said McMillen.

At the time of his arrest Wieland was employed at Andriano's pizza shop in Delmar.

Representatives from the U.S. Attorney's Office met with

Bethlehem police Friday, and additional charges may be filed, stemming from Wieland's alleged possession of child pornography. He is scheduled to appear for a preliminary hearing in Town Court June 7 at 5 p.m.



BC students display inventions to board

From a heated snow shovel to a plan to dredge the pond in back of the high school, Bethlehem students from the engineering, design and development class and the environmental club shared their ideas with the board at last week's meeting.

Engineering and design is the capstone course under Project Lead the Way. The course is primarily an independent study under the guidance of teacher Lou Jada.

"Students involved in this year-long course must research and develop their own independent project," he said. "They must also fund them independently."

Students work with area engineers and engineering professors, he said.

Tomer Danon showed off his idea to imbed a device at each handicapped parking spot that would alert authorities if someone not authorized to parked in the spot.

"The system detects whether or not the car in the handicapped space should be there by using radio frequencies," he explained. "The car disrupts the frequency emitted from a coil in the pavement in the space."

A car with a handicapped plate would be outfitted with a device that would "speak" back to the coil and turn it off. If that doesn't happen, Danon said, "After three minutes, the circuit will call the police or ideally, it would be hooked up to a camera and take a picture of the license plate."

Kevin Perazzelli invented a platform that can be attached to a walker so senior citizens would not have to bend over to put their shoes on.

Paul Secor created a device that would dispense food and water for a dog or cat and Bryan Polovina designed headphones to help reduce injury to hearing by leaving the ear canal open.

Dan Keefer's ergonomically designed heated snow shovel made a big hit with the board that applauded the concept.

"It actually makes it sassier to shovel — theoretically. I haven't had any snow lately to try it out," he said. Noting that the shovel might reach 400 degrees, Keefer quipped that one could "shovel,

then cook a beef patty on it."

Matt McVoy invented a module that could be put on window shades that would open and close the shades to assist in heating and cooling homes.

Matt Unright designed a global positioning system panic button that would alert the police and send the location of a person in trouble.

"This course was so much fun," he said. "We spent so much time pondering and thinking about problems and solutions. In the beginning of the year, I didn't know what I wanted to do, and now I'm going to RPI for computer engineering."

Three members of the environmental club attended the meeting to ask the board to support their plan to reclaim areas in the back of the school.

Seniors Tom Hackman and Chris McFarland, along with junior Diane Shepard, made the presentation.

"We don't want to see this area underutilized," said Hackman. "We would like to see the board take some action to preserve this area and make it a better educational resource for the school and community."

The group's short-range objective is to clean litter and turn the informal trails on the cross-country course into more formal trails by widening and clearing them and putting up signs.

The students would seek guidance for the project from EnCon and experts at Five Rivers Environmental Center, Hackman said.

They asked the board to have maintenance crews remove concrete and asphalt debris near the maintenance buildings.

Their long-range goal includes dredging the pond, which has filled in over the years.

"It was created in the 1970s as an educational resource; it was great for biology and ecology classes," Hackman said. "Over the years it has filled in, and it is no longer the same ecosystem that it was."

The students asked if dredging could be part of the bond project work. Superintendent Les Loomis said he and several students had met with architect Richard Peckham to discuss the plan.

"I am very impressed with the proposal the environmental club has come up with," Loomis said. "We would like to do everything we can, provided the board of education is in agreement, to support this."

Board members voiced their support and challenged the students to marshal the resources to accomplish their goals.

"This is a very creative opportunity to bring other groups together to accomplish this," said board member Stuart Lyman.

Y taps 24 for advisory committee

A board comprised of business and community leaders has been selected to help launch the creation of a Bethlehem YMCA.

The 24-member community advisory board will offer guidance to the Capital District YMCA management team as it converts the BIG Arena in Bethlehem into a full-service Y.

"Each of the members appointed to the board lives in Bethlehem, Delmar or Glenmont," said YMCA President John Flynn. "They are familiar with the needs of the community, so that the YMCA's presentation of services and activities represents the wishes of the residents of the area."

The board will help determine what services should be offered and assist in fund-raising efforts, said Flynn. The Y has already announced plans to renovate the arena at 900 Delaware Ave. in

Delmar. A health and fitness center is slated to open in September, along with one of the arena's two ice rinks. The other will be renovated to include an eight-lane pool and double gymnasium. The facility will be the 10th YMCA branch in the Capital District. Once converted, the Bethlehem Area Y will be 95,000 square feet, the largest within the association.

Heading up the board will be New York State Public Service Commission Chairman William Flynn of Glenmont. Flynn has lived in the area for more than a decade and volunteered as a member of the board of managers for the Guilderland YMCA.

McDonald's manager guilty of sex offenses

A former McDonald's manager has been found guilty of inappropriately touching two teenage girls who worked for him.

Oscar Turpin, 39, of Oak Brook Manor, Ravena, worked as a manager at the Glenmont McDonald's from the summer of

2002 until February 2003, when he was arrested on misdemeanor counts of forcible touching, endangering the welfare of a child and third-degree assault.

In a non-jury trial held in Town Court, Judge Frank Milano found Turpin guilty of forcibly touching one of the victims while taking a ride home from a co-worker in November 2002.

Albany County Assistant District Attorney Renee Merges prosecuted the case.

Turpin was also found guilty of

punching, biting and squeezing the buttocks of another female employee under age 16 in 2002. Turpin was convicted of two counts of forcible touching, two counts of endangering the welfare of a child and one count of assault, and was cleared of charges in a third case.

Milano ordered Turpin to the Albany County jail in lieu of \$25,000 bond, which he later posted. He will be sentenced Aug. 3 and faces a maximum of two years in county jail.

Lesson of D-Day

The 60th anniversary of D-Day, the Allied invasion of France in World War II, got a lot of attention last weekend for several reasons.

First, the D-Day invasion of Normandy was the largest amphibious operation in history and was essential to the defeat of Nazi Germany.

Second, surviving veterans of that battle are few, and will be even fewer still when the 70th anniversary rolls around, so this was essentially the last chance for most of them to participate in such commemorations.

And third, the decennial celebration nearly coincided with the opening of the World War II Memorial on the National Mall in Washington, which was also proposed and built in 10 years with an eye to thanking World War II veterans while they're still here.

The grandpaternal veterans, the youngest in their late 70s, are, now more than ever, telling their stories, in best-selling books, major motion pictures, on the History Channel and other TV shows and in local oral history efforts like the Colonie Veterans Project.

We have not forgotten them.

Nor should we forget what they endured in the crucible of combat.

If you've seen the first 30 minutes of "Saving Private Ryan," you know a tiny bit of what combat veterans, at Omaha Beach and elsewhere, have experienced.

The late historian Stephen Ambrose, who wrote several books about D-Day and the subsequent campaign in Europe, explained simply, "The most extreme experience a human being can go through is being a combat infantryman."


Charles MacDonald, in his war memoir "Company Commander," tells the story of a reporter who asked front-line veterans "cheerful questions like, 'What would you like best from the States about now?'"

One G.I. replied, speaking for thousands of his brothers in arms: "I've got something to say. Tell them it's too damned serious over here to be talking about hot dogs and baked beans and things we're missing. Tell them it's hell, and tell them there're men getting killed and wounded every minute, and they're miserable and they're suffering. Tell them it's a matter more serious than they'll ever be able to understand. Tell 'em it's rough, serious business. That's all."

And that's the lesson of D-Day — war, even one as victorious and necessary as World War II, is hell for those who are there, and those who are now, and have never been, anywhere near the front lines should be wary of glorifying this hell on Earth.

ALS center helps angels on Earth

"They were my voice when I couldn't speak, provided a wheelchair when I could no longer walk, listened when I was afraid and gave me hope when little could be found," said an ALS patient.

When people are suffering from Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis (commonly known as Lou Gehrig's Disease), the ALS Center at St. Peter's Hospital is the only specialized source of help and hope across 14 counties in upstate New York.

ALS is a progressive, neuromuscular disease affecting motor nerve cells in the brain and spinal cord. Typically, the first visible signs of ALS are weakness in the hands or legs or slurring of speech. Eventually, the disease leads to paralysis of the "voluntary" muscles with loss of speech, swallowing and breathing capabilities.

ALS can progress rapidly or

can plateau for unpredictable periods of time depending upon the location and extent of damage to the nervous systems. Through the course of the disease, the mind remains alert. Vision, sensation, hearing, taste, smell and the muscles of the eyes are generally not affected.

There is currently no cure, although research continues.

Once considered a rare disease, ALS is estimated to affect more than 30,000 Americans at any given time. Of all Americans alive and apparently well today, 300,000 will die of ALS. At least one in 20,000 upstate New York residents has ALS. Men are affected more often than women, usually between ages 35 and 70. The average survival from diagnosis is two to five years.

The ALS Regional Center at St. Peter's Hospital in Albany was established in 1988 to provide people with ALS and their families with a comprehensive blend of medical and emotional services including support groups, education, symptom management and equipment loaning.

The mission of the center is to help maintain dignity, independence and quality of life to those living with this devastating illness. Services are provided free of charge.

The ALS Regional Center is staffed with a coordinator who works closely with an ALS interdisciplinary team comprised of representatives from the hospital's medical staff, the hospice and St. Peter's Rehabilitation Center. The team includes a psychiatrist, neurologist, pulmonologist, gastroenterologist, psychiatrist, social worker, nurse, physical therapist, occupational therapist and speech pathologist.

On another note, one of our ALS friends, Jane Goewey, wrote a heartfelt song for her mom, Rose Ann Bailey, who was stricken with ALS six years ago.

When given the devastating news that her mother had this illness and that there was no cure, she felt she could not just sit back and accept this prognosis; she also knew, however, that she could not find a cure.

So Goewey turned to her heart and wrote the song "You Are An Angel on Earth" as a tribute to her mother and in hopes of making a difference for these angels afflicted with the horrid disease.

From this song came the development of Project Angels on Earth, a nonprofit organization with a mission to make a difference for patients with ALS. The goals of Project Angels are to raise funding for ALS research and patient care; foster awareness of ALS; create a compilation CD to raise funds for research; and find a cure.

The song has been recorded by a local woman, Lilly Wolfson, and the Angel single can be purchased at the following locations, with 100 percent of proceeds going to the St. Peter ALS Center: Stadium Café Restaurant in Saratoga, Mayfair Jewelers in Latham and Scotia, the Bookmark in Latham, Team Goewey Dodge in Latham and Team Goewey Kia at the Latham Circle Mall.

No one is asking Israel "to turn the other cheek," as Mr. Goldstein writes. Israel is being asked to leave the Occupied Territories per United Nations Security Council Resolution 242.

Town should get second opinion

Editor, The Spotlight:

The town of Bethlehem should obtain a second opinion to confirm the \$17 million cost to repair and upgrade the Vly Creek water system. The town's sub-standard distribution system should be redesigned, considering the fact that Albany will eventually be the prime source of drinking water for the town.

It may be cheaper to use pumps, backed up by diesel generators, to increase the pressure provided by the Vly system as opposed to the high expense of a new larger pipeline.

The \$17 million does not include the cost of providing security. Albany provides guards and watershed inspectors at its Alcove Reservoir to prevent acts of terrorism and to protect the watershed against discharges. What will it cost to provide equal security and protection at the Vly Creek Reservoir?

In the 1950s, Schermerhorn Island was rejected as a source of drinking water because of the high iron content of the ground water. The Vly Creek reservoir was built, but it has a small watershed area. In 1978, Schermerhorn Island was again studied in much greater detail. Once again, it was rejected because of the iron. In 1978, the town entered a contract with the city of Albany to provide supplemental drinking water to the rapidly expanding town population.

In 1994, two design engineers promoted 12 million gallons per day (MGD) of excellent quality drinking water with two 1,000-foot long infiltration galleries on Schermerhorn Island as a source of ground water. The town board approved \$13.9 million for six MGD and had one infiltration gallery built. The new Clapper Road emergency reservoir combined with standby diesel generators for the pumps were to be the start of major improvements to the town's substandard water system. After two years of operation, the yield was only 0.8 MGD because the infiltration gallery clogged with iron. The town filed a lawsuit.

A settlement was reached. Earth Tech, representing the two design engineers, has supposedly

fixed the new drinking water system by installing 11 new wells. Earth Tech assumes the iron clogging the wells can safely and economically be removed with hydrochloric acid. Routine acid treatment will not work. Three engineers employed by Earth Tech withdrew from the project after I explained the faulty engineering.

The town will have to buy

additional water from Albany, and the lawsuit will be resumed for \$20 million in damages.

The monies eventually obtained from the lawsuit can be used to upgrade the town's sub-standard distribution system based on Albany being the prime source of drinking water for the town.





Your Opinion Matters

Hints on how to take a garden tour

Editor, The Spotlight:

On Wednesday, June 16, Bethlehem First and the Bethlehem Garden Club will host the eighth Garden Tour in the town and surrounding area.

Each year, five to six gardens are visited by about 300 visitors, who come from a 50-mile radius.

This year, three gardens in Delmar and two estate gardens in Feura Bush will be featured.

The five gardens collectively represent color, architectural design, arbors, water gardens and ponds, use of trees, rock formations and hills, sunny and shaded areas and special walkways.

Both the expert and beginning gardener will find much to learn from.

I want to share some expert advice from the Garden Conservancy's "Open Days Directory" on what to consider when visiting a garden.

When approaching the house, is it clear which is the appropriate door to enter? What signals lead you there?

What is the relationship of materials used on the exterior of the house to those materials used in the garden? Do you see the repetition of brick, stone or wooden surfaces in both?

Are the proportions of beds or paved sitting areas near the house, relative to the proportions of the house itself?

In terms of the overall property, are all parts linked together by paths flowing from one area to the next, or do separate garden areas appear as isolated islands in a sea of lawn?

Do different garden areas have different functions? How do light and shade change from area to area?

Notice when straight and curved beds edges are used. How do lawn shapes relate to bed shapes? Do some areas feel too big, too small or too confining?

When looking at a bed, what are the structure plants — the dominant trees, shrubs or large perennials — that are repeated in a garden area? What plants fill the spaces between those structure plants?

Are you focused on a certain bloom period or color scheme? How are trees used in the garden? What is the level of maintenance?

Is there an ease about the way it is kept up? Before making a judgment, try to understand the owner's purpose and style.

Some things not to do during the tour are to take cuttings, seed heads, fruits or berries.

It is also improper to ask to use the facilities in the house or to take photographs without asking permission.

However, it is OK to ask questions and take notes and, of course, to thank the individual

homeowners for opening their gardens.

If you join us on June 16, tickets will be available in Price Chopper Plaza in Slingerlands from 4 to 6:30 p.m. Tickets are \$10 per person.

You will receive a driving map along with a description of what to look for.

If it rains, bring an umbrella and shoes for wet grass.

All proceeds are returned in the form of beautification projects for the town.

Island Treasure

At the point where the Hudson and Mohawk rivers meet, tucked between the village of Waterford in Saratoga County, and the town of Cohoes in Albany County, sits Peebles Island State Park, a 158-acre piece of land full of stories of the past and plans for the future.

The park is made up of three islands, a portion of a fourth island, two bridges and a piece of land in Waterford. Throughout the park are miles of hiking trails, opportunities for fishing, cross-country skiing and picnicking, and a handicapped-accessible picnic pavilion.

Thousands of years ago, glaciers receding from the Hudson Valley left deposits of gravel and clay in Waterford and Cohoes, making the land suitable for

occurred, but many of the earthen fortifications that were built in preparation remain today.

Going over the bridge from Waterford into the park, one of the most famous of these defenses — the breastworks — greets visitors to the island.

The design is attributed to Polish engineer Thaddeus Kosciuszko.

Cluett, Peabody and Co., a Troy-based shirt manufacturer, bought the island in the 20th century. The factory was in operation for close to 70 years, before closing in 1972. The state then bought the land, and today the park is the headquarters of the state Bureau of Historic Sites and the state Bureau of

place, to wile away the afternoon — had access to the island. The bridge that connects the village to the island was originally constructed in 1835, but closed in 1984 when the state Department of Transportation discovered that the structure was deteriorating. Mahoney said for more than 10 years he worked to have

the bridge re-opened, and in December 2003 Waterford residents once again regained their connection to the park.

"It took 10 years and seven months, but it finally re-opened," Mahoney said. "It's part of our community and we had no way to get there."

A spokeswoman for the state Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation, Cathy Jimenez, said the state has also received a \$275,000 land conservation fund grant from the National Park Service, which the state has matched, to help convert the old Cluett Peabody factory complex into a visitors center that will be ready next spring.

"It's been ongoing development,"

Jimenez said about the work that the park has seen and will continue to see.


"It's there for the residents; we're making people aware that it's there. It's a beautiful little island."

The 10-year plan for the island includes plans for camping and skiing possibilities, as well as a bike path, Mahoney said.

With the headquarters of the Erie Canalway National Heritage Corridor on the island, he hopes there can be several reasons for people to want to visit the island. Since Peebles Island is the place where the "water fords," Mahoney is pleased that the bridge again links the town and the island.

There is a \$6 vehicle use fee to enter the park, which is open all year. Jimenez said guided tours are available by appointment.

farming for the Native Americans who were among some of the first to settle on the island. During the 1630s, the Mohican Indians took advantage of the water sources and used the island as a fishing village.

The island's history does not stop with hunting and fishing. During the 17th century, Revolutionary War heroes Philip Schuyler and Goosen Gerritsen von Schaick acquired the island, along with von Schaick's house on van Schaick Island in Cohoes, which is included in the park, became the headquarters for the northern department of the Colonial Army during the war.

At the same time, British General John Burgoyne was advancing from Montreal, and the colonials began to prepare Peebles Island for a last stand before Burgoyne reached Albany. Because the Americans defeated Burgoyne's army in Saratoga Springs, a battle on the island never

Last year, Gov. George Pataki announced that the island would be the location for the first kiosk on the state water trail, a 158-mile stretch from Waterford to New York City that will provide several access points on both sides of the Hudson River.


Village of Waterford Mayor Bert Mahoney said the people of Waterford pushed the state to buy the land.

"People in our community were very involved in promoting the idea of that becoming a park," he said. Today, Peebles Island is a valuable piece of land for the residents who live just outside the park's boundaries.

"We're proud of our whole community, and the island is a big part of it," Mahoney said.

Mahoney worked to make sure that residents — and tourists looking for a nice



Bethlehem's streak ends in state semifinals

A young band of Bethlehem girls lacrosse players returned to familiar grounds last Friday afternoon, in search of the program's first-ever state Class A championship.

But when the Eagles left the field at SUNY-Cortland in the wake of a 16-8 loss to Section III champion Fayetteville-Manlius, they were in a state of bewilderment.

Once up 5-2 midway through the first half, Bethlehem was shoved to the ground by the Hornets, outscored 14-2 the rest of the way by a faster, deeper and more experienced F-M squad.

"This was going to be a learning experience," said head coach John Battaglini. "Our inexperience showed, and F-M did a great job taking advantage of our mistakes."

Going into the game, the Eagles were a perfect 18-0 and owned the state's no. 1 Class A ranking. Having thumped the Section II crowd, Bethlehem arrived in Cortland with plenty of confidence — but also plenty of youth. Only one senior, defender Caitlin Schreffler, is on the roster. The superb group of seniors who took the Eagles to the brink of the 2003 state title before it lost a heartbreaking overtime final to West Genesee was gone, so many Bethlehem players were feeling the heat of state final four pressure for the first time.

At first, that didn't seem to matter. Spreading out F-M's defense and creating successful one-on-one opportunities, the Eagles got two goals apiece from Katie Rowan and Kelly Hughes, plus tallies from Halley Quillinan and Emma Strachman, to give Bethlehem a 5-2 lead.

F-M, a senior-heavy squad who had suffered through three consecutive Section III Class A final losses to that same West Genesee powerhouse prior to

2004, did not panic.

"We were tentative and flat," said F-M head coach Kathy Taylor. "But we didn't change a great deal. I told them that we would stick to our game plan and push the ball up the field, but still wait for the good shots."

What followed was complete domination by the Hornets. After Quillinan's second goal, with 6:05 to play in the first half, Bethlehem would not find the net again until the final minutes of the second half — a drought of more than 30 minutes.

Aided by sloppy Bethlehem passing, F-M's attack turned relentless and more accurate. Three goals in the last 2:05 of the first half, capped when Kristen Taylor score with 14 seconds left in the half, gave the Hornets a 9-7 lead at the break.

All through the second half, Bethlehem could hardly forge an attack, thanks to bad passes forced by F-M's close and tight defense. That, combined with the Hornets' speed, proved to be fatal to the Eagles.

"We started throwing the ball away too much," said Battaglini. "We don't have the midfielders to keep up. As soon as it started going back and forth, we knew we were in trouble."

Kristen Taylor caused a lot of trouble with her game-high six

goals, to go with one assist. Courtney Farrell set up most of those goals with four assists, and she added three goals of her own.

The young Eagles took lots of lumps as its streak came to an end. But while there was a sense of disappointment at game's end, it was nowhere near the sadness and hurt of last year's state final. Part of it had to do with the fact that Bethlehem lost to a great team. A day later, F-M won the state title with a 13-7 victory over Section V champion Brighton in a game more lopsided than the score would indicate.

Mostly, though, Bethlehem had absorbed a lesson, as Battaglini put it. And with every-

one except Schreffler coming back in 2005, the Eagles will be heavily favored to come back to

the state final four — where, at long last, it might come out on top.





The Tax Implications of Selling Your House

Most of my clients profit from selling their homes, and they often have questions about the effects of capital gains tax.

When you sell your home, generally you are not taxed on your profits if (1) the home you have sold is your primary residence and (2) your gain does not exceed \$250,000 as a single taxpayer (or \$500,000 as a married couple filing jointly) — as set forth in The Taxpayer Relief Act passed in August of 1997. Whatever your age, you are free to invest all of your gain, any part of it, or none at all in another home without further tax consequences.

Different rules apply to the sale of income property. If you sell one property then purchase another, you are liable for taxes for the year the sale occurred. If you held the income property for a period longer than one year, the gain will be taxed at the lower capital gain rates (15% for sales after 5/6/03). On the other hand, if you arrange to exchange one investment property for another, you can defer the capital gains tax to another year. This rule applies as long as the transaction qualifies for a like-kind exchange and no other (not like-kind) property is received as part of the transaction.

Although these transactions may not be as complicated as they sound, you will need professional help. Many Realtors and attorneys specialize in helping their clients achieve these 1031 tax-deferred exchanges.

in the moratorium."

The board voted 6-1 on both applications to recommend denial of the exemptions, with Brian Collier casting the sole vote in favor of the waivers each time. The matter will be referred to the town board, which has the final say in granting exemptions, for a possible public hearing and an eventual vote.

Developers argued the application was vague and guidelines for meeting an

exemption weren't provided until after their applications were submitted.

"I think the town has done a poor job with the application of the moratorium and the standards that we are being held to," said attorney Albert Hessburg, on behalf of CB Development Associates.

Planning Board Chairman Parker Mathusa said the applications will be amended in the future in order to be more clear.

Second Wind Productions' Monday concerts at the Washington Park amphitheater in Albany may be on its last legs, but will still provide a variety of top-notch, rarely-seen-around-here, acts this year.

Second Wind impresario Mona Golub said this year will be the last for her production company, which has put on free shows on Sundays at the Music Haven stage in Schenectady's Central Park since 1990 and on Mondays in Washington Park since 1993.

"I'm choosing to spend more time with my son and focus on my personal life and my job at Price Chopper, where my responsibilities have increased significantly," said Golub, who heads public relations for the family-owned supermarket chain and is also a Schenectady County legislator.

Golub said she got started in free concert promotion because she "was traveling outside the area to see bands from around the world and I thought, why not bring these bands here. So I set out to figure out how to do that."

Golub noted that most of the bands Second Wind has booked, like those that play African, Latin, New Orleans, Irish and folk music, are not featured on FM radio or MTV like such genres as gangsta rap and teen tart pop.


"These are artists at the top of their game and not playing anywhere near here, yet what they have to offer is fabulous," Golub said. "And the audience often gets a cultural experience that goes beyond the music."

Golub said she will still work, as artistic director, on programming for the Music Haven, for which she chaired the task force that got it built.

"I'll be working to make the Music Haven the best it can be, a fabulous outdoor venue for the whole Capital Region to enjoy," she said.

But the Monday night in Albany, which is the dark night for the Park Playhouse musical, would revert to the city, which had programmed local bands prior to Second Wind.



through the German's Gustav Line on May 11. "We were under constant pressure, not to mention enemy fire. On the front line your home is a muddy foxhole with no bed or bath. You eat very little and sleep less."

As the war progressed, Murphy's unit advanced up Italy as Allied forces took Rome and

broke through scores of heavily defended German positions.

"We destroyed four divisions of crack German troops," he said. "We didn't know it at the time but the Germans called us the elite assault division."

Never injured in battle, Murphy admitted to sleeping through his nearest brush with fate. Exhausted from carrying wounded men off a mountain, Murphy collapsed on

a bed in an abandoned farmhouse. There was no mattress, only springs, but that was good enough. While he slept, - German shells exploded everywhere in the vicinity. The next day, soldiers were amazed to find him sound asleep unaware that an attack had just taken place all around him.

"When I said I didn't hear any bomb bursts the previous night, they told me to walk over and look into the next

room. I couldn't believe it. A shell had ripped into the house reducing the room to rubble as I slept only a few feet away."

By May 1945, his unit crossed the Po River and reached the Brenner Pass in Austria. The war was over. "We celebrated for days," he said. Afterward, he traveled in Italy and Switzerland before going home.

Murphy never lost a day of service to his regiment while fighting in Italy. He later rejoined the Army to fight in Korea and later Vietnam. Murphy earned the Combat Infantry Badge with a silver star device for his service as an infantryman in World War II and Korea and two Bronze Stars for service in World War II and Vietnam. He retired as a platoon sergeant in March 1969 and later worked at the Watervliet Arsenal until 1992.

With World War II veterans dying at the rate of almost 1,100 a day, less than five percent of Murphy's regiment and only five people from his company remain. He, along with his friends, Rocco Telese and Tony Francadilla of Massachusetts were the only three members of the 339th Regiment he knows of to attend the memorial dedication.

"Until recently, we never thought about the war and never kept in touch. But as we got older we started looking back," he said, adding, "I'm lucky to have kept a lot of pictures for me to keep remembering."
