

Delmar fire dept. wants new \$5M home

Delmar firefighters have outgrown their house of 65 years. After battling insufficient parking and storage space, the department is proposing a move to a new building on Delaware Avenue.

The topic will be the subject of a public informational meeting, scheduled for Wednesday, Nov. 17, at 7 p.m. at the current firehouse at 145 Adams St.

The department, which answers 1,600 medical emergency calls and 300 fire calls a year, has just about doubled its membership in about 27 years, to 85 strong now.

The Delmar department is proposing construction of a \$5 million joint facility for the rescue squad and the fire department, possibly where Verstandig's retail business stands now. Department officials said the project should have a minimal tax impact.

"We've outgrown the current facility, which has already been expanded three times," said John Smith, a Delmar Fire District commissioner. "There are more vehicles than space we have to put them."

Pilot shares war and peace stories

Voorheesville Elementary School students got a chance to observe Veterans Day a bit early this year. On Oct. 21, they gathered to meet and honor Army Capt. Kevin Burns, a hometown hero who many of the students got acquainted with last spring.

Burns, a 1996 graduate of Clayton A. Bouton High School, is a Blackhawk helicopter pilot on a 14-month deployment in Iraq. Together with his fellow troops from the 1st Aviation Battalion based in Germany, Burns

spends his free time helping build a new school in the small farming village of Al Hamra, 15 miles west of Tikrit.

"Every unit stationed in Iraq has a partnership with a community helping them improve their standard of living," Burns said. "As a result, we feel more welcomed. Right now they need

our help, and we are making a difference." Burns added that the Iragis look

S'lands teen lends helping hand Boy goes extra mile for injured man

Who knows what could've brought 14-year-old Brian Jubrey II out for an afternoon bike ride on Oct. 28, except perhaps a timely curiosity.

The two-mile-plus bike ride took the Slingerlands teen farther than he'd ever been along the old railroad tracks and to an injured man who needed help.

The area has been controversial lately, with town officials cautioning residents that although the tracks have been taken up, they are still private property and any people back there are technically trespassing.

The town is looking at making the

former railroad bed into a connective recreation trail.

"I've always wondered how far I could ride my bike back there," Jubrey said. "I kept going a mile or two, and I ended up in places I didn't even know where I was. And I kept

going."

Jubrey couldn't explain why he went so far, except to say that perhaps "Everything" happens for a reason," which was his first question to his father when he got home

later that evening, about four hours after he first left.

"I saw this guy, sitting up on the ground, just bleeding, bleeding. He had a bike, a bag of newspapers and a bottle of vodka next to him. I asked him 'Are you OK?," Jubrey said. "He said he was fine."

Jubrey said the man was even alert

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Soares, Breslin score impressive election wins

It's been settled.

A divisive district attorney's race full of nasty political rhetoric and, at times, questionable campaign tactics, is over, with Democrat David Soares winning against the Republicans and his former boss

The race that, at first, pitted two attorneys who share the same ZIP code, against each other, was like a game of Chutes and

Ladders, from a Sept. 14 primary Breslin said of his campaign for upset to a solid election night win. his fourth re-election.

Soares, a Delmar resident, made his way up a ladder to beat I was concerned they were trying incumbent District Attorney Paul Clyne in the Sept. 14 primary, having established among voters Rockefeller Drug Law reform as the top issue.

Clyne, also a Delmar resident, ran on the Independence line until hitting a chute, dropping out of the race days before the election to throw his support to the Republican challenger, Roger Cusick, a Loudonville attorney.

When Wednesday came, Soares had 69,779 votes to Cusick's 53,941. Despite dropping out, Clyne garnered 4,334 votes.

Registration in the county favors the Democrats by about 2-1.

Rockefeller Drug Law reform makes an annual appearance in Gov. George Rataki's State of the State address. Though the issue has not been resolved among lawmakers. Soares is confident that his election will be a catalyst for legislative action.

"I was fairly confident all the way through,"

Town gets big response to survey

Bethlehem residents clearly care about the town's future, judging by the response to a new comprehensive plan.

Town officials have deemed the survey effort, designed to extract ideas about future development from a random sample of residents, a success, with a nearly 47 percent response rate.

In sending out 1,600 eightpage surveys, town officials and Saratoga Associates, the firm contracted by the town to help shape its comprehensive plan, hoped to get about 400, or 25 percent, filled-out surveys returned.

"It's fabulous," said Bethlehem Industrial Development Agency Chairman George Leveille of the 751 surveys that were returned.

Saratoga Associates staff have been scanning in the results, hoping to put together a summary of responses in time for the next Bethlehem Planning Advisory Committee meeting, scheduled for today.

Public Works, said the town looked briefly at the returned surveys, though he said it was tough to get a sense of anything by looking at a series of circles on pages.

"(These surveys) will be a major basis for future planning in the town," Leveille said.

The town is nearing the end of the comprehensive planning process, with this survey designed to supplement focus group sessions on development in different parts of town and the "We got a really great response philosophy of development the

> Areas discussed included commercial districts, including the Route 9W corridor; greenways and trailways and how they pertain to recreation; rural and agricultural lands; and the riverfront.

Another survey effort is in the process of being completed, with rural and agricultural landowners having one more week to respond to a survey specifically designed to address their concerns.

Leveille said the town has received about 60 of those back so far. That survey was much smaller in scope, but Leveille said that effort is on track.

BPAC has been developing a draft comprehensive plan to guide development over the next 20 or 30 years, largely through amendments to the town zoning law.

Town officials have said the plan will be submitted to the town board, which has the final say on any zoning changes.

A townwide meeting has been scheduled Nov. 18, where the draft comprehensive plan will be unveiled.



I also have to take my lumps and can't call for a verbal truce unless I promise to mend my ways and never again attack the

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
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America isn't a wish for a politically inactive one, though.


debate and still listen to each 4 other?

Although there are currently no plans for new multiple housing unit projects in Voorheesville, the village board of trustees is discussing how laws should be drafted should the board be faced with such a proposal.

At a recent meeting, the board postponed voting on an amendment to regulate such units to allow for further discussion.

According to Building Superintendent Gerry Gordinier, multiple housing is defined as apartment buildings, condominiums, multiple dwellings, cooperatives and senior housing.

"We hope these proposals will help maintain the integrity of our neighborhoods," said Gordinier. "Permanent garage sales create traffic problems from congestion and people turning their cars around in other people's driveways. We're trying to fine-tune the laws to everyone's best interest."

"We don't have anything on the books. We need to set parameters for multiple housing units," said Mayor John Stevens.

Of main concern, Gordinier said, is possible leakage from septic systems into the aquifer from which the village gets its municipal water supply.

To prevent this, Gordinier suggested that all proposed multiple residences be linked to the village's water and sewer.

He also proposed a 100-foot setback between new complexes and single-family homes.

Gordinier added that he explored zoning laws in other towns and modeled the proposal after Guilderland's law.

"Guilderland requires a 100foot setback for multiple housing units as well as municipal water and sewer service," he said. "I thought the setback ought to also include parking lots because of lighting and petroleum leakage."

Stevens asked if the setback included the road. After some discussion, board members agreed to revise the proposal to allow a 50-foot setback from the road.

Speaking as a resident, Village Justice Ken Connolly voiced concern that this change might allow future development, particularly on property owned by St. Matthew's, to encroach on residents' property. "I don't think we should change the law because we anticipate somebody doing future development," he said. "Let's protect the people already living in the neighborhood." Connolly said he prefers that the land behind St. Matthew's remain vacant but he would be in favor of senior housing if it is done right.

I had heard this rumor over the summer and contacted the fire district to find out more


In my subsequent discussions with fire commissioners, I have learned that the current proposal is to build a new firehouse with an attached eight- bay structure for fire and ambulance vehicles. The cost of this project will be passed along to the taxpayers of the Delmar Fire District. This would be in addition to the proposed increase in Albany County taxes. Preliminary estimates indicate the bond issue would be at least \$8 million. I am not aware what the term of the bonds would be or the interest rate, so cannot begin to estimate the per household tax assessment.



Smith said most neighbors seem in favor of it. At the open house, "they could see the building had outlived its usefulness," Smith said.

The department will use a bond to finance the project. Smith roughly estimated \$3.5 million for the firehouse portion and \$1.5

A feasibility study has already been done, Bastiani said, to determine how much office, storage and training space was needed.

The department is looking to build an approximately 29,500square-foot facility. The current firehouse is about 14,000 square feet, Bastiani said.

Bastiani said that, for year, the department has had to buy custom-made apparatus built to a smaller size than what is normally made, resulting inextra costs.

When the company first moved into its current home in 1939, it only had two fire trucks.

The existing building was built to house one ambulance, Bastiani said.

Now, the department parks two ambulances for the rescue squad and three different fire trucks, including a ladder truck.

We've actually increased the medical and have had to cut back on the fire," Bastiani said.

As if that weren't enough, department members say there is no space for members to park when they respond to calls.

Member Lars Allenson said the parking situation "is not the

The department shares some parking with a group home and other offices on Delaware Avenue, but Allenson said the department is allotted "just a small portion" of that space.

"Most members park on Nathaniel Street or sometimes in the Methodist church parking lot. Then there's an indentation for four to five cars on the Adams Street side," Allenson said.

Compounding all of that, Allenson said, "You have to leave room for the trucks to get out."

He added that the parking situation is "slightly hazardous."

Space for equipment is also a pressing issue. Both Smith and Allenson noted the stacks of equipment in small spaces not necessarily designed for storage.

"Every storage room is filled. What was going to be the training room for paramedics now has stacks of equipment," Allenson said. "Periodically, we pull it out and clean it and check it, but there's nowhere to put it but back where it was. You have to be able to get to it, but there's no easy access."

Bastiani said being able to get to stored apparatus is a matter of safetv.

"You have to walk sideways in front of one engine to get from one bay to another. The side compartments of the ladder truck are not accessible when it's parked in the bay," Bastiani said. "We have serious space concerns. Very serious."



enough to tell him he would end up in Albany if he continued on his path.

Judy Lasher heard a knock at the door, was told it was a stranger and told the door-answerer to tell him she was busy. Jubrey was persistent.

Lasher's initial response is a reasonable one, even Jubrey's father admits, given the stories of residential assaults and robberies in the local news lately.

But Jubrey was convincing. He led Lasher through briar bushes with thorns and burrs until she finally saw the man in need.

She said she was impressed Jubrey's maturity.

"He was very gentle with him, telling him help was on the way," Lasher, a teacher, said.

Paramedics and police arrived, placing the man on a stretcher and taking him to the hospital. Lasher said he's since been released.

Lasher said the gash looked like a horseshoe. Jubrey characterized it as a bite, noting that the man probably didn't fall because his handlebars and wheels were aligned, the bike was just placed on the ground, and there were no scrapes on the man's hands.

Jubrey's father, also named Brian, said he is proud of his son for probably saving a man's life.

"The fact that he prayed, took a path he hadn't taken before and then showed all the values I've tried to teach him: caring, compassion, concern and courage. The extent he went to for a stranger's concern. The way he saw it through and stayed with him until help came," Jubrey's father said.



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He admitted that until he received a call from Lasher, he "didn't think much of it," and later realized the temperature had dropped down to near freezing that night.

As an afterthought, after hearing Lasher's side of the story, Jubrey called her actions a "leap of faith," and said she should be commended too, for trusting a stranger, though he knows his son is trustworthy.



McNulty easily beats Redlich for house seat Challenger cites lack of funding

Guilderland's representative in the U.S. House, Michael McNulty, D-Green Island, will return for a ninth term to a Republican-controlled and partisan Washington.

As expected, McNulty easily beat Guilderland native and Republican Warren Redlich, 88,491 to 31,679 in the 21st district in the Nov. 2 election.

McNulty was out of the

country on congressional business and could not be reached. for comment.

McNulty ran on his record of obtaining funding for local projects including the new

He said during the campaign that the most important issues to voters this year were the war in Iraq and the growing deficit.

Redlich said he was happy with the results of the election.

"I didn't expect to win, and I hoped to break 40,000," Redlich said. "I feel I did reasonably well under the circumstances.'

The major problem, Redlich added, was that he did not have the financial support of state Republicans to help get his name



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and ideas to the voters.

"I think the message worked. It clicked with the voters. But it didn't get to enough voters,' Redlich said.

He got between 4 and 6 percent more of the vote than the last seven challengers who faced McNulty, he said, and he spent only about \$40,000, primarily from his own pocket.

Several friends and family members also offered their support.

Locally, he also wanted mass transportation to be improved and to see greater economic development.

salaries," Fisher said in a phone interview before the October board meeting.

The library board "owes it to taxpayers to do a staff evaluation analysis to see the actual needs at the management level and to see possible ways to save money,' he added.

David Moore, a librarian who ran unsuccessfully for the board of trustees twice, agreed, saying a few members on the board, along with administration, have created a "culture of secrecy."

Power was grossly abused in the first expansion plan for the library in 2000, said Moore, who also spoke at the October board meeting.

"They went through this procedure of holding public meetings which weren't really They meetings. were presentations, like they had already made up their minds, and it went down in flames," Moore said of the defeated expansion proposition.

That was the same year Moore decided to run for the board. when he saw the library acquiring property for a parking lot he felt it didn't need. He lost by 12 votes.

"They assumed this big project was going to go through, and they discarded books, weeded out the collection, stopped periodical subscriptions," Moore said. "They were going to move twothirds of the collection to one site, obviously trying to pare it down to a manageable size. It's not good librarianship, not worrying about the content that's offered.

Moore, who lives near the library, said he supports the current expansion project, calling it "less grandiose."

Beyond his own observations, Fisher said that his position as a board member put him in the position to hear complaints by library employees against library management, especially Library

Director Nancy Pleri. "There is a great consistency

to th∈ir claims, Fish∋r said, adding he had been approached by "more (employees) than you could count on on∈ hand."

Moore said he saw Fisher as "the only board member at that time" to reach out to him and the community.

"From what I observed with the library bcard and the administration, it is not what you'd expect from a public board.' Moore said. "They are secretive and insular. They didn't know, care or attempt to know what the community wanted."

Fisher made a number of allegations against Ebrary management regarding "excessive control and coercion," employees facing the fareat of demotions and a lack of open communication. He also criticized library management in business and financial areas, as well as what he characterized as a "leadership struggle of the board."

supported the critics.

In a telephone interview, Bill McDowell, who worked in the children's section for about five years, cited "autocratic rule" at the library as being a problem.

"Everybody's afraid to say anything. It kills any incentive for suggestions," McDowel said. "I frankly think (Pieri) should step down, but I dor't think that's going to happen."
