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BCHS memorial trees moved for construction

Two Bethlehem families whose loved ones' lives the Bethlehem Central School District saw fit to honor with memorial trees after their passing, have suffered sudden loss again.

Between 10 and 15 memorial trees, along with one rose bush, will have to be replanted as a result of the \$92.9 million capital improvement project. But due to what school officials are calling an avoidable and regrettable lack of communication, two memorial trees were dug from the grounds of the high school without notifying the families first.

Some of the trees are too mature to simply replant, officials said. After it was determined that the trees had to come up because of utility and building issues, the project committee, made up of district residents, officials and faculty, decided to notify the affected families with letters explaining the situation. Memorial trees in the courtyard, memorial trees located to the left of the building toward the athletic field and memorial trees that follow along Van Dyke Road are affected.

"None of this was avoidable," said Director of Facilities and Operations Greg Nolte, of the replanting of new memorial trees. "What was avoidable was the failure to notify the families (before

the trees were uprooted). We will definitely be more cautious in the future."

Nolte said the two trees that were inadvertently removed are "long gone" though the memorial plaques were salvaged.

The district already has plans for a May 26 morning rededication ceremony for the approximately 12 trees planted in the memory of students, teachers and other staff that have passed away, Superintendent Les Loomis said.

"What I feel badly about is that the two trees were taken up before contacting the families," Loomis said. Loomis said Thursday he was in the process of notifying all the families whose relatives' trees will be affected

and declined to say what families are affected before he could notify them.

"We just met about the trees today because of the two trees that were cut down in error. (The families) should have been contacted in the way I'm talking about," Loomis said.

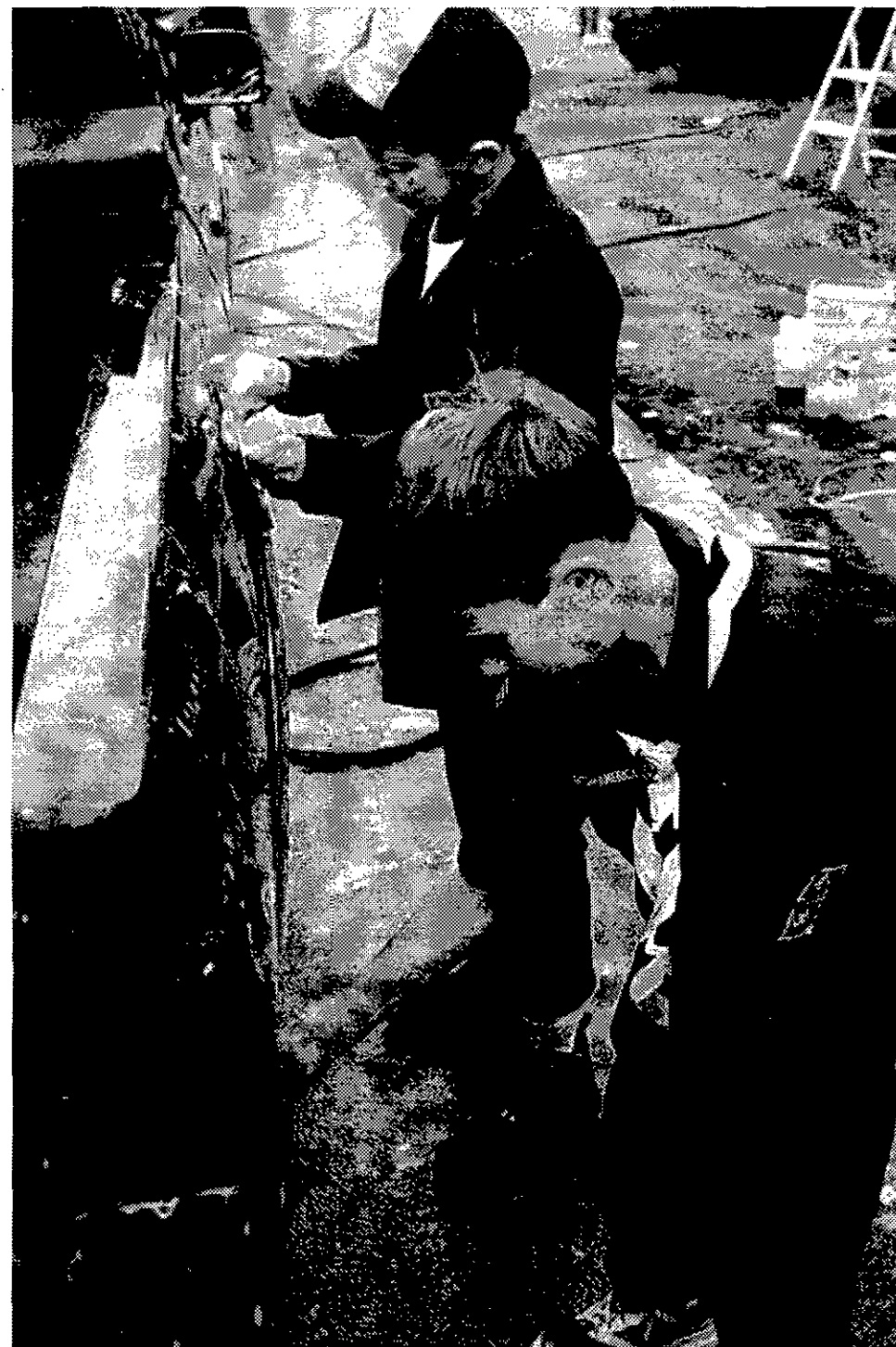
Relocation will be done where possible, Loomis said, but new trees of the same species will be planted to take the place of the older memorial trees that are too large to move.

Trees larger than about 4 inches in diameter don't transplant successfully, Nolte said. The trees will be relocated or replanted along a Delaware Avenue sidewalk that Loomis said will make it easier to visit or see the memorial trees.

"It's a beautiful location because it's very visible. The sidewalk is right there that people already use. The playing

Hamagrael celebrates 50th

The halls of Hamagrael Elementary School have been alive with the fashions, trivia tidbits and appreciation, perhaps, of the decades from 1990 on down over the past few weeks.

The activity is in anticipation of a 50th anniversary celebration, scheduled for Friday, May 13, at Del Lanes, of the Bethlehem elementary school, established in 1954.

The celebration spanning a number of weeks, according to Nancy Bielawa of the anniversary committee, will be divided into two parts; one for the children who are current students of the school and one for the adults who share fond memories of their elementary experience.

"It's all about Hamagrael," Bielawa said, "and celebrating the past and present and helping the future."

Current students are learning about the history of the decades

Senior residence is model of efficiency

Like the employees say to the residents who walk through the door and down the halls everyday, developer Henry Klersy welcomed state and town officials "home to Delmar Place" last Thursday.

Since opening in September, this was the first opportunity to have officials in one place to tour the energy-efficient, assisted-living facility that broke the mold for senior living in Delmar.

Klersy Building Corp., a Klersy family business, went from building high level subdivision homes to building a high level senior residence facility in one fell swoop, with Klersy calling the project an evolution.

Klersy worked with New York State Energy Research and Development Authority early and often, meaning if the projected savings pan out, Klersy could

be saving his residents about \$65 a month to live in a building that has nearly all the conveniences of Delaware Avenue in one two-story, 94-unit building. Klersy received a check last Thursday, in the courtyard of the building, in the amount of \$277,668 for his participation in the New York Energy Smart New Construction

Program.

"Henry did the most important thing: he called NYSEERDA early," said Constantine Kontogiannis, a senior engineer with Science Applications International Corp. (SAIC). Kontogiannis noted that a lot of times, by the time a new project's developers contact NYSEERDA about going the energy efficient route, it's too late and builders have already put bids out for portions of the project.

"Final drawings have been made, and it's too late. Henry had the foresight, that's what everybody should do,"

Voorheesville school board candidates vie to win two seats

Three candidates vie for two open seats on the Voorheesville School Board in the upcoming May 17 election, where voters also must also decide on a \$19.3 million budget.

Candidate David Gibson, a businessman who founded X-Ray Optical Systems Inc. in 1990, says the past board has done a good job and is fiscally responsible. He offers to focus on quality and frugality.

"We don't have to sacrifice to be cost effective," he said. "Great

schools happen because of involved students, teachers and parents." This is Gibson's second attempt for a seat on the school board.

He recommends making the most of the three years before new teachers gain tenure. "We owe it to the teachers to give them solid feedback as well as set true excellence as their goal."

Gibson said that the board needs to be willing to say no to those teachers who don't meet the standards, adding that the board must give them every opportunity to succeed. He also

urges for more parental participation in selecting teachers.

As creator of an internationally recognized high-tech industry, Gibson offers to tap into grants, partnerships and other ways to enhance the school program at little or no expense to the district. "That's what I do professionally. I find opportunities that benefit organizations. That is what I want to bring to the board," he said.

A graduate of Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Gibson has a Bachelor's Degree in Mechanical Engineering and a

Master's Degree in Management. After college, Gibson served in the U.S. Army.

Gibson serves on the University of Albany's Life Science Advisory Committee and the Advisory Committee for Science Research in High School.

He is a founding member of the Voorheesville Community and School Foundation, as well as a board member and past president of the Helderberg Aquatics Club. Gibson has four children in the Voorheesville schools, one each in kindergarten, elementary, middle, and high school.

Candidate Kevin Kroencke, a resident of the district for the past six years is making his fourth run for a seat on the school board. He says the board lacks representation of middle-class working families. "We have a lot of CEOs and business owners, but we need more wage earners active in the community."

If elected, Kroencke, 49, said he can offer a wide range of experience as a teacher, a state education department administrator and an active participant of several community organizations.

Kroencke is an administrative hearing coordinator for the New

York State Education Department's Office of Professions.

"I want to try bringing back some of the programs previously cut to get a budget passed," he said. Kroencke especially wants to strengthen the school's computer technology program as well as introduce full-day kindergarten. He also stresses that the school maintains its successful music program as well.

As a member of New Scotland's Residents Planning Advisory Committee, Kroencke

said that his involvement with both the school and the committee would enable him to find ways to encourage business

growth in the district. "This will provide jobs for students as well as ease the tax burden on homeowners."

In addition to the Residents Planning Advisory Committee, Kroencke is president of the St. Matthew's Men's Association and parish's pastoral council.

He is also Chairman of the Town of New Scotland Recreation Committee, member of the Voorheesville Area Ambulance Company and founding member of the Voorheesville Community and

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School Foundation.

A graduate of Washington University in Maryland, Kroencke has a Bachelors Degree in Political Science as well as a New York State teaching certificate from SUNY at Stony Brook and a paralegal certificate from Adelphi College.

Kroencke and his wife Eileen have one son attending Voorheesville High School.

Candidate Michael Snyder, 49, a resident of the Village of Voorheesville for the past two years, has held elected office in the past but this is his first run for School Board.

"Moving to this wonderful community of Voorheesville with the excellent school system that we have, I wanted to be a part of the continued progress that sets us apart from other smaller school district," Snyder said. "With the soon to be appointed new superintendent and a solid labor contract behind the board, it seems an opportune time to inject new blood into the system."

Presently, Snyder works as director of the Empire State Plaza Convention Center. Prior to that, he was a conference center manager for Marriot Hotels.

He is also a board member of the Voorheesville Community and School Foundation co-chairman of this year's auction committee.

A native of Buchanan in Westchester County, Snyder served on the village board there.

Snyder explained that his being new to the community should not be a deterrent to voters.

"My family chose Voorheesville in our decision to move," he said. "Leaving a community where one has lived for more than 20 years is difficult enough. Finding 'a home' in Voorheesville has given me and my family a reality check as to all the great things that a community offers and the opportunities that we must take advantage of."

Snyder lives with his wife Patricia and have two children, a boy and a girl enrolled in Voorheesville schools.

School board members serve five-year terms and receive no monetary compensation for their services.

All residents must present identification to prove both their identity and residency in the school district, before voting. Voting takes place Tuesday, May 17 from 2:00 p.m. until 9:30 p.m. at the Clayton Bouton Voorheesville High School, 432 New Salem Road.

Six run for three BC school board seats

Six candidates are vying for three open seats on the Bethlehem Central board of education, each of them hoping to bring something fresh to the table, so to speak.

Two of the candidates are current members of the board, while the other four appear to also have invested time and energy into the district.

Paul N. Black said he's been a "casual observer" since moving into the district about a decade ago.

"As I've watched my kids go through, I've seen little bits that I really like and little bits I don't like so much," Black said. "Most of it I like pretty well. There hasn't been, in any broad sense, any one particular issue that has made me step forward, other than my desire to participate in the overall administration of the school."

What could be improved upon in the district, Black said, is an integration of science, technology and math activities, especially in the younger grades, that expand beyond the general curriculum.

Black said he played an integral role in making Odyssey of the Mind an event that middle schoolers looked forward to participating in each year.

"You know, you're on your knees talking to first-graders about science, and you see that they're excited about what they're doing," Black, 49, said. "There are kids that do very well who take the (advanced placement) courses, and there are the others that are taking the Excel courses (designed for students needing assistance). It's the 60 percent of kids that are in the middle that I want to make sure we're engaging."

Black is a founding member of the Ordway Research Institute of Albany Medical Center, a not-for-profit freestanding corporation with specific research themes and a mission to translate basic science observations into therapeutics. Black has taken student interns from Bethlehem and said that with all of the Tech Valley initiatives becoming such a big part of the Capital District's commercial sector, this is a perfect time to engage students in science and how time consuming a process it is to "acquire new information."

Black has three children, all products of the Bethlehem school system, including one who will become a freshman at the high school next year. Black's oldest child is a 1999 BC graduate and is working in New York City and his middle child, also a BC grad, is studying electrical engineering at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute in Troy.

Black is married and he and his family have lived in Bethlehem since 1996.

He holds a bachelor's degree from the University of Colorado and a doctorate in zoology from the University of Vermont.

James Dering would like to

become involved in his daughter's education at an early age and touts his professional experiences as advisor to different town boards and with budgets to support his candidacy.

"It's important to have a parent of an elementary child on the board," said Dering, whose daughter just began kindergarten. "They will be better at identifying any issues popping up in the elementary schools."

Dering, 38 and a deputy general counsel at the New York state Department of Health, was reared and educated in the BC district, moving here when he was 3.

Dering noted the capital improvement project and the possible future construction of a new elementary school as important issues.

"The budget is always going to be an issue and the expense of providing an excellent education," he said. "There's going to be an increase in kids who need special services, and it's the question of how we finance that." Dering added that when working on diverse projects, having different perspectives helps.

Dering has completed his fourth season as a youth soccer coach, serves on corporate boards and is a former church trustee.

In her attendance at board meetings, candidate Susan Radosh has noticed a specific group of students whose needs are not, perhaps, being articulated.

Radosh, a parent with two children, a fifth-grader and a second-grader at Hamagrael Elementary, started the Committee for the Education of Unique Minds at that school, a group that meets monthly to discuss issues and sponsor educational forums. Radosh started the group because her fifth-grade daughter has Asberger's Syndrome.

"As a result of those monthly meetings and the parents that come in, we've become sort of aware that the district doesn't communicate very well with a portion of special needs children," Radosh said. "I'm very concerned that parents as a group are not being included in the process of what our programs look like. There's a potential to lose track of special needs students and tuck them away as opposed to including them."

Radosh, 47, noted that none of the current board members has a child in the elementary schools or with special needs.

"I'm not saying that every member of the board has to have a niche, but it would be nice to have a broader representation on

the board of members who have day-to-day experience in the lower schools," Radosh said.

Radosh and her family have lived in the area since 1992 and moved to Delmar about five years ago. For the past eight years, she has worked as a field representative for Public Employees Federation, and for eight years before that, she worked with a tenant organization in New York City.

Radosh said her experience with the district has overall been good.

"But we have needed to know what services we wanted to get,"

Radosh said. "My desire is to make every parent's experience a good one with the district. Parents of special needs children need a

voice at the table."

After being a teacher in the BC district for more than 30 years, Warren Stoker has been on the board of education since first running in 1999, finding it a "fulfilling" experience.

"The reason I first ran was because I knew education was the one thing I at least knew something about," said Stoker, 66. "You have to get back to the community you live in. I figured this was a service I can give."

Stoker is the oldest in this lot of candidates, but sees no end immediately in sight to volunteering.

"There's a time when some people say 'this has been enough,' but I'm not there yet," said Stoker, whose children made their way through the BC district and who now has grandchildren in the middle school.

Stoker said the board of education is an underused asset.

"One of the things I've found as a teacher was that we didn't go to the school board too much, which is a mistake. It's a very, very competent board in terms of wanting to know what's going on," Stoker said.

Stoker underplayed the relationship of having an elementary parent on the board with how much time is spent on elementary issues.

"We have close to 100 students in pre-school special ed, who we pick up at age 3 and continue with them, through the Early Learning Center, continually keeping track of what's going on everywhere," Stoker said. "This year, we had a big push on reading, especially in K through 2, to make sure they get a good start on reading."

Current board president Robin Storey has seen a few issues evolve since being elected to the board in 1999.

"One thing we're working on is bullying and harassment in

the schools, kindergarten through 12," said Storey, who is currently serving as board president and has been the board's vice president. "It's been a recent issue at the high school and really needs to be worked on. Unfortunately, it's a part of the world in which we all live."

Storey, 49, also wants to ensure a good working relationship between the school board and the town board. With open lines of communication, the school board could support an increase in the "opportunity for commercial development in town," a goal for which town officials have voiced their support and which could alleviate the tax burden on district residents.

Storey's youngest child is a high school junior. Her other two children are graduates of BC. Storey has been involved in the education of her children since they were little, having served on the Bethlehem Opportunities Unlimited for 13 years and been president of parent teacher associations.

Both Storey and Stoker said their current positions, and having been able to follow through with the capital improvement project from the beginning, give them an asset new candidates may not have.

If elected, Bonnie Turner plans on drawing from the experiences of her children who have been working their way through the BC system.

Turner, already president of the local quilt guild who travels on a "bit of a national level," said being on the board is important for her to show her support.

"My concern is the children that don't fit in so much academically," Turner said, noting that one of her children had some problems academically. "There are state and federal mandates, like No Child Left Behind, and there are other ways to provide for children and to understand where they fit in."

Children appear to play a large role in Turner's professional and home life.

Turner, 48, has a child in the sixth grade and one in the 10th grade. One has already graduated from the district, she said. Turner, who grew up in Bethlehem and returned after getting a nursing degree at Orange County Community College, is a pediatric nurse and has been PTA president and a member of the Clarksville parent teacher association for 17 years.

The quilting studio Turner and a partner own in Clarksville, Nine Between Us, refers to the nine children between her and her business partner.

Her business was formerly called The Quilter's Studio. Turner is also active in her church.

"I've always had that sense that it's important to be active in your children's schools, that it helps not only your child, but it makes you feel a part of that community," Turner said.

All candidates are running for at-large bids. Elections will be held Tuesday, May 17, from 7 a.m. until 9 p.m. at the middle school at 332 Kenwood Ave.

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Stress or acceptance, depends upon perception

The new mantra lasted about 24 hours.

It came as an epiphany that suffused me with a sense of peace as I fell into bed one night. "This is easy," something whispered deep within my soul. At last, I thought, the moment of clarity I've waited for all my life; the clear sense that God is guiding me; that I'll sleep easy and long and when I get up tomorrow morning, I'll move effortlessly through the day. This is easy, the whispering lulled me to sleep, this is easy.

Even as the peace filled me, the part of my brain that wants to always be a cynical and cagey New Englander suspected that it was really just exhaustion coursing through my veins, making a surrender to sleep feel like peace. This wasn't too different a feeling from the one that comes after overnight airplane trips push the total number of waking hours past 24. It was like the one that came when graying dawn put an end to more than one all-night bender when I was in my 20s. It was too clearly reminiscent of the feeling that came after walking the floor all night with a baby wailing from the pain of an ear infection. This feeling of peace might well have been an authentic religious moment; it might also have been the result of the bone-draining sort of exhaustion that comes from not having one minute in a day that somebody else can't claim.

Well, here's the thing, though. Maybe we're just borrowing the moments and our job is to share them with other people. Surely people raising children are forced to give in eventually to the harsh reality that time for oneself is either a hazy memory or a hope for a distant future.

That doesn't mean that there aren't a million moments of self-evaluation, for there certainly are. Raising children makes you constantly evaluate the way you live your own life. If you're trying to teach your children not to lie, you can't try to get out of a parking ticket when you deserve it. If you're teaching them about

doing their homework in a responsible way, you can't play hooky at your own job.

I'm currently trying to teach my children that there are very few things in life that can't be dealt with, even if that sometimes means finding the people who can teach you how to handle things.

The problem with this lesson is that it means I have to get a handle on things instead of flying off that handle. That's where one deep breath and the new mantra, "this is easy," could be really useful.

As a society, as a culture, as a community, as families, as individuals, we seem to put a premium on perceiving things as difficult; making them difficult; or staying in difficult situations a whole lot longer than we should. Then we talk about it non-stop, engaging in "I'm so busy" competitions with our peers.

The word "stressed" rapidly becomes the most over-used one in our world today. Here's who has stress: people still trying to rebuild their lives after last December's tsunami; mothers who don't know where their children's next meal is going to come from; people with grave illnesses.

It's important to set a line between "stress" and "busy;" to know the difference between when we're living lives of our own choosing and when life is choosing how we lead our lives.

"Do you have a lot of stress in your life?" doctors always ask at any kind of check-up. I wonder what in my expression or demeanor makes them ask that and I unfurrow my brow so that people's first impression of me isn't of a frowning, chaotic, angry person.

"I have a husband, two kids and I work part-time," I always say carefully. "I'm busy, but that's not

really stress, is it?"

That question is probably making therapists everywhere fall off their chairs, but leave me to my denial, please. I'm trying to replace being stressed with feeling grateful. After all, I'm busy because I finally have all the things I thought I always wanted: a great husband, cool kids, a cozy house, and work that I really enjoy.

Chris and I work hard to count our blessings, which are mainly the ones we've created together. When we come to the part at church where we give thanks for the blessings of our lives, it's my family that is at the top of the list.

In some settings, it's easy to count blessings instead of feeling stressed. In the quiet of a Sunday morning church service; on a long bike ride down a country road through fields greening with spring; or standing over peacefully sleeping children, it's easy to feel grateful and hear the quiet words, "this is easy."

When the world powers up, though, it's harder to feel that sense of gratitude and ease. When one of the greatest blessings of my life is protesting vociferously about how stupid it is to have to iron a pair of pants for homework, that's the time to draw a deep breath and say, this is easy.

He's just a kid, after all, testing his limits. I can totally relate: how many times have I stood in front of the washer, the dryer or the ironing board and ranted about how stupid laundry is. It turned out to be a kind of stupid that I missed when the washer broke. Suddenly, quarters were important in a way they hadn't been since we moved into a house 10 years ago. Regular trips to the Laundromat felt like another layer of complication in my life, not a blessing. "Now I have to go buy a new washer," I ranted to Chris, "which will cost too much money and take up time." He's better at this blessing thing than I am, and even if I suspect it's because he doesn't tend to all the details at home, his calming influence reminds me that life can be a lot easier than I make it.

"So buy the washer," he said sanguinely, "and let's be glad we

don't have to clean our clothes by smashing rocks against them in a river."

He's like a walking version of one of those things floating through cyberspace these days. Roughly, it says we should be grateful for the blisters on our hands because it means we've got work to do; we should be grateful for the children who need our constant attention because they are the future; that women should be grateful that men can't find the peanut butter jar RIGHT UNDER THEIR NOSES because it proves our superiority once and for all.

OK, the last part isn't in the Internet saying, but if believing that my singularly female ability to locate items in plain view makes things easier, I'm good with that.

As I kept trying to buy totally into my new "this is easy" motto, life tossed little tests at me that literally brought me to my knees. The broiler door on the stove broke as the salmon was cooking. "This is easy," I muttered, propping up the door with a squat can of tomato sauce.

With two enormous baskets of sodden clothes back from the Laundromat washers, I started drying them, only to have the vent pop off the back of the dryer. No problem, I thought, that's what duct tape is for, as I wiggled my arm behind the dryer to make

sure the family wouldn't get asphyxiated because of an improperly venting dryer.

"Mom," Christopher said as he hugged me goodnight, "there's like lint or something in your hair."

"That's easy," I said, brushing away cobwebs and dryer lint.

"I need a new folder," Cormac announced that evening, "and can you sign this field trip permission slip? Also, I don't feel good." This is easy, I muttered, hunting through the stack of papers where I know I put the pile of folders he would need during the school year and asking yet again if everything was OK at school since he'd been not feeling good a lot lately.

When the washer-less, found-folder day drew to a close, my own to-do list was still long, with articles yet to write, closets still to organize and dust bunny colonies still living under the side tables in the dining room.

I did what I could; I washed the dishes, set the coffee timer for the morning, got clean clothes for the morning and thought about what encouraging words might help a reluctant student feel confident in his abilities.

Then I flossed my teeth and collapsed into bed. "This," I sighed, pulling the down comforter up to my chin, "this is easy."

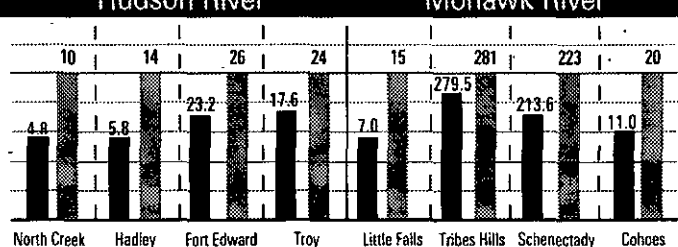

New food pyramid goal is to continue nutrition awareness

With obesity now a leading cause of death in the U.S., the United States Department of Agriculture is just in time with releasing a new food pyramid which more clearly defines nutritional guidelines with a color-coded chart, while also high-lighting exercise as a major factor in overall health.

"It incorporates the old philosophy of all foods fitting in, but with more grains and vegetables," said Karen Durr, a dietician at Bellevue Woman's Hospital in Niskayuna. "It's good that they have added exercise."

But whether a new food pyramid will really change people's habits remains to be seen.

Despite the efforts from those in the know, obesity is still a problem with epidemic proportions.

"People just aren't healthy in general," said Durr.

As a parent of a child in kindergarten, Durr said she can understand how healthy eating and exercising can take a backseat to getting it all done.

"I see how people get caught up with 27 million things they need to do during the week. A program needs to be realistic," she said.

Even though information is readily available, Durr said many people are still uneducated about a healthy diet.

Combined with sedentary lifestyles and significantly larger portion sizes, the combination can lead to obesity, a major cause of chronic diseases.

But a new and fine-tuned food pyramid will not single-handedly solve any problems.

"We use it as a guide," said Durr. "It's in the media, and it's

something the public recognizes, so we expand on that. But it hasn't changed the world to be any healthier."

Veronica Armbruster, a nurse practitioner with Delmar Pediatrics, said the new food pyramid is a product of research done on volunteers who followed the suggestions correctly.

"The new focus is on lowering risks of heart disease and other chronic disease," she said. "It's different because the emphasis is on whole grains, and there is less emphasis on meats. It's also more specialized. Every person can use it as a guide to individualize their own plan."

On the new pyramid's Web site, www.mypyramid.gov, users can type in their age, gender, and activity level and get a rough idea of how many calories should be consumed per day, and the kinds and amounts of foods to eat to ensure proper nutrition.

Both Durr and Armbruster have gone out into the community in an attempt to make people aware of good nutrition.

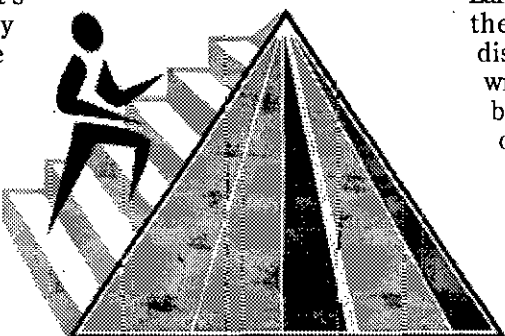
Durr said she has spoken at many schools in the Capital District, mostly in the Schenectady area.

"I have gotten a lot of positive feedback," said Durr. "When the

whole family is involved, they are very on board with it. The kids have such a knowledge base about food chemistry and label reading, they're like sponges. They are sometimes the ones teaching the parents."

Armbruster also works to educate people on proper nutrition.

She has volunteered time at elementary schools in the Bethlehem school district and has also

run the Healthy Kids Club at her office in Delmar Pediatrics for at-risk children. She said it's important to have guidelines but believes they are fighting a losing battle with all of the junk foods marketed to kids.

"There is more awareness now than in recent years, but there has still been a rise in childhood obesity in the last six years," she said. "This is a fast-food country, but there are better

choices. It's about changing the mind-set. Healthy foods can be just as easy to put together as fast food."

Schools have a responsibility to teach healthy eating habits, but unfortunately, school lunch programs, which are ever more geared toward the healthy and low-fat, are not all that popular with the kids who are their target market.

"High school students can leave the school and go get what they want to eat," said Roland Laffert, school lunch manager for the Scotia-Glenville school district. "We have salads and wraps, but we also sell pizza and burgers. But on the whole, a lot of kids tell me they eat healthfully."

Laffert said there are cafeteria committee meetings every 90 days, which the public is welcome to attend.

And although Laffert said that some parents like the school menu the way it used to be, with higher fat choices like chicken nuggets and hot dogs, a statewide program called Healthy School Initiatives will begin in September, which will really push school districts to reduce the fat and increase nutritional value of their food.

"It won't be much different

than what we are doing now, but it will be a tough sell," he said. "In a perfect world there would be bigger portions of salad, and smaller portions of pizza. But we have big kids who play football on the lunch line. I can imagine serving them a 2 ounce chicken patty. We would have a riot on our hands."

Laffert said its also tough because the state only reimburses the school for complete meal purchases.

The physical fitness program at the Burnt Hills-Ballston Lake school district has taken a varied, proactive approach to teaching physical fitness.

Kim Ferrie, physical education teacher at Pashley Elementary School, said the physical education program has changed to become more well-rounded.

"We're working to help kids understand about nutrition so they can make good choices for themselves," she said. "We're not so much telling them what to do as we are trying to help them understand."

Armbruster remains optimistic.

"If people pay attention to the new guidelines, then they can make a difference," said Armbruster.

Vote on May 17

School districts throughout New York will vote on annual budgets on Tuesday, May 17.

We encourage everyone to cast a ballot, which will determine the overall school district budgets for the 2005-06 school year.

Typically, it is an election that is largely overlooked by the majority of voters, unless there is a budget proposal in the double digits.

People generally express concern about rising taxes, but if they fail to register their opinion by voting in their own school districts, their objections will not be registered where it makes a difference.

One thing that might produce a larger turnout in this year's election is the fact that the state budget passed on time for the first time in 21 years. For the past 20 years, school districts were rendered powerless to come up with exact figures relating to state aid figures in time for the vote. This year, districts have a better handle on the total monies available for budgets.

Districts where school board seats are open will also vote for new or incumbent members. It's a healthy sign when towns have a number of candidates willing to dedicate a hefty chunk of time to the districts' business. School district libraries' budgets will be on the ballot.

School board positions are unpaid, and most boards expect members to take an active role in decision making in matters of importance to the district. What this means is that school board members must attend many meetings throughout the year and read numerous proposals related to district matters.

School board members often face harsh criticism for some decisions that some parent groups find not to their liking.

In addition, most school board members are expected to attend various functions — dedications, ceremonies, graduations and more.

In other words, being a school board member is often a demanding part-time, thankless job with many responsibilities.

But many of the community's finest are willing to make this commitment — some for the sake of their own children and some for the sake of all children in the district.

Over the years, we have seen school board members in our suburban districts make a difference by learning to view various positions from all sides. These are not one-issue members, rather people who can and do deal with many issues during their tenure.

Again, be sure to vote May 17.

School boards face tough issues

On Tuesday, May 17, Bethlehem residents, like New Yorkers across the state, will go to the polls to vote on next year's school district budget.

The school budget vote is an opportunity for citizens to voice their opinions about how their tax dollars should be spent. This fact is not lost on boards of education. As stewards of our community's public schools, we are committed to sustaining strong educational programs that support students' academic achievement and personal development.

School districts all around the state, including Bethlehem, face economic pressures from the same rising costs that are wreaking havoc with household budgets — and then some. People often wonder why school budgets increase more than the rate of inflation.

The fact of the matter is that schools are dealing with cost increases in major areas that are not tied to inflation: specifically, special education, health care and pension contributions. While the consumer price index this year is 2.7 percent, Bethlehem's spending in just those three areas is rising much more substantially.

At the same time, No Child Left Behind is raising expectations for schools and teachers to make sure that all students meet state and federal standards for academic achievement. In a community like Bethlehem, expectations run even higher to see our children exceed whatever minimum standard the state sets. Most of Bethlehem's students are already quite successful, but changing the culture from "most" to "all" does not happen overnight and will not occur without an investment of time and resources in determining what works and then cultivating that success.

It is a mandate, but it is also our

mission to provide the appropriate supports — whether in special education, academic remediation or accelerated studies — that students need in order to achieve academically. It is a mission that's directly tied to the quality of life in our community and the economic health of our state and our nation. Study after study shows that school district quality affects home property values — the better the schools, the more a home is worth.

In fact, according to one Forbes.com article, good schools can increase the value of a home by as much as 30 to 40 percent. And as the Capital District embraces its future as Tech Valley, the accompanying demands for a highly educated, highly qualified work force rest at our schools' doorsteps.

Contrast these realities with the fact that, since the 2001-02 school year, the total amount of state aid Bethlehem receives has grown, but the increase has been in so-called "spend-to-get" aid (e.g., transportation and special education) — you have to spend more money in order to receive more aid, and that aid only covers part of what you've spent. Meanwhile, Bethlehem's basic operating aid, which funds the day-to-day operations of running our schools, has decreased by \$2 million, or 26 percent, over the same three-year period.

As we began developing a proposed budget for the 2005-2006 school year, the board sought to develop a spending plan that would support our teachers' efforts to improve student performance on the state's high-stakes assessments; offer students help in overcoming the academic, developmental or emotional obstacles that may be preventing their success; and equip our support operations departments to run more efficiently and offer a higher quality of service.

To accomplish that, we took the same "continuous improvement" approach that has permeated the district — how can we do things better?

How? By taking a critical look at how we are currently spending taxpayers' dollars and proposing ways to direct those existing resources to more effectively achieve our goals. By restructuring some programs, shifting funding within departments and eliminating some non-instructional positions, we captured savings that almost entirely offset any new spending initiatives included.

The proposed budget that voters will decide upon seeks to:

- Add staffing to keep pace with growing student enrollment;
- Improve programs to help all students reach proficiency & more students achieve mastery;
- Meet students' counseling

and mental & physical health needs;

- Create better continuity of service for special education students; and

- Restructure, redeploy and reduce in order to improve efficiency while providing a better educational program for students.

Residents should also know about other ways we are committed to containing costs on an ongoing basis. Our schools' offices buy most supplies through a competitive bidding process to make sure we are obtaining the lowest prices available, and we instituted an expenditure freeze in December when we were confronted with unanticipated special education costs that we would have to pay this year.

The district also offered eligible teachers a retirement incentive this year that will save money in salaries and benefits years to come.

BC is in its third year of an energy management program that gets every staff member involved in finding ways to save on energy usage, whether it's turning off the lights when you walk by an empty classroom or keeping the thermostat settings a few degrees lower.

And the recently negotiated contract with our support staff employees includes a fair salary increase in exchange for changes to health care benefits that increase employees' share of premiums and co-pays. Health care will also be on the table when we negotiate a new contract with our teachers next year.

Bethlehem Central's current budgeted spending per pupil of \$11,449 is the second lowest among the 13 Suburban Council school districts and is well below the state average of an estimated \$13,638 (for 2003-04). And the district is working closely with the town of Bethlehem to support the expansion of the commercial base in a way that maintains the character of our community and the quality of life in our town. Expanding the tax base helps mitigate tax rate increases, and we are optimistic that there will be successful implementation of this long-term planning effort.

Every resident should have recently received the budget edition of the *Highlight* newsletter, which outlines the proposed budget in greater detail. The same information is available on the district's Web site (<http://bcisd.k12.ny.us>), and many residents took advantage of public budget presentations that were scheduled in April and May. Anyone who would like even more information is welcome to consult budget books that are available at the district office at each school building.

Whether we have struck the right balance is for each and every Bethlehem Central voter to decide. We hope that every resident will take a moment to learn about Bethlehem Central's proposed budget and will vote May 17.

person, I know of his skills as a middle school teacher. For 20 years, I worked as a school social worker at BC. Do your school and yourself a favor and vote for Warren Stoker.

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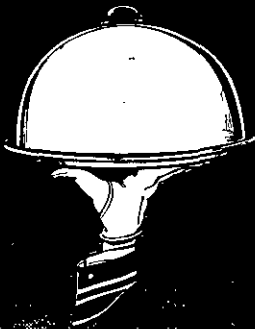
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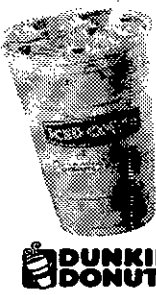

Banners, baskets to adorn corridor

For those who have yearned for years to put patriotic banners and hanging flower baskets along the Delaware Avenue business corridor, the wait is over.

With an unexpected boost from town, business and community leaders, along with veterans and civic improvement groups, the new project will launch on Memorial Day and extend through Labor Day. The thrust is to improve the appearance of Bethlehem's main business areas to make them more attractive to local and other shoppers. This effort augments the tree, daffodil and perennial

planting projects that have enlivened various areas throughout the community.

Initially, clusters of alternating twin flower baskets and banners will festoon utility poles at the Four Corners, Main Square and Veterans Memorial Park; the intersection of Elsmere and Delaware avenues and Delaware Plaza. Flowers in the baskets, which are grown by Verstandigs, will be similar to those used by the various Business Improvement Districts (BIDS) in Albany. Each basket set and each banner will cost about \$150.

Fund-raising for this volunteer project has already begun with the merchants and business people along the Delaware

Avenue corridor. However, Bethlehem residents and community groups are also invited to participate in this exciting project. As Albany BIDS people learned, frequent watering of the hanging baskets is necessary to guarantee success, but until April the means was lacking locally. In a key catalytic commitment, the town Highway Department agreed to water the plants five days a week for the season.

A long-term objective of this project is to expand the banners and baskets along the entire Delaware Avenue business corridor and to add such features as improved sidewalks, containers with other plants, benches, etc. Ideally, the concept would be repeated in Glenmont and Feura Bush and would become an annual event.

Parents Against Bullying decry BCHS incidents

Editor, The Spotlight:

As members of a local group, Parents Against Bullying, we commend the Bethlehem School District's response to the racial incidents at the high school and would like to respond to the editor's comment, "Why aren't more parents concerned enough to express outrage...?"

We are outraged with the racism in our schools and concerned with the all-encompassing problem of bullying. We are a diverse group of parents from a number of different schools within the district. During the past year, we have joined together to share experiences, learn more about bullying and advocate for a comprehensive bullying prevention program in the district.

Bullying takes many forms. Racism is but one. Children are also bullied because of their ethnic or religious background, disability, sexual orientation, for being overweight, smart, dumb, poor, not having the "right" clothes, being "unpopular," or just different. The incidence of

bullying behaviors has increased in recent years. Currently, 15 to 20 percent of U.S. students report being bullied with some frequency. Bullying can have serious and lasting effects on children, affecting mental health and school performance. Adults are often unaware of bullying or downplay the seriousness and intervene in relatively few incidents (less than 5 percent in one recent study).

The recent incidents at BCHS are not isolated cases. Since the conception of our group, we have been surprised by the number of parents who have approached us with accounts of bullying involving their children. The incidents take place in classrooms, in hallways, in lunch rooms, on playgrounds, on the bus, on computers at home, on fieldtrips. Bullying is a serious and pervasive problem that needs to be assessed and addressed by every school district.

Our group first approached the school district in July of 2004, to express our concerns about bullying and share resources. We discussed the federal government's "Stop Bullying Now" campaign and the elements that it considers critical to a comprehensive bullying prevention program. Details can be found at <http://www.stopbullyingnow.hrsa.gov>. In October 2004, Superintendent Les Loomis informed us that the district is planning to survey Bethlehem students using the anonymous Olweus bullying survey. We commend the district for taking this initiative. When the survey is administered and the analyses are completed, we believe that the district will give serious consideration to the results and develop a bullying prevention program.

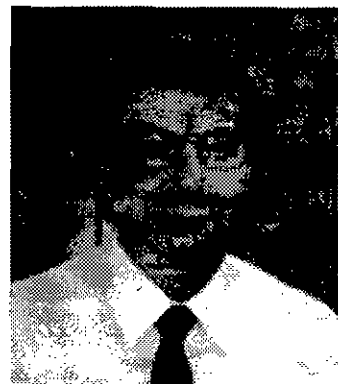

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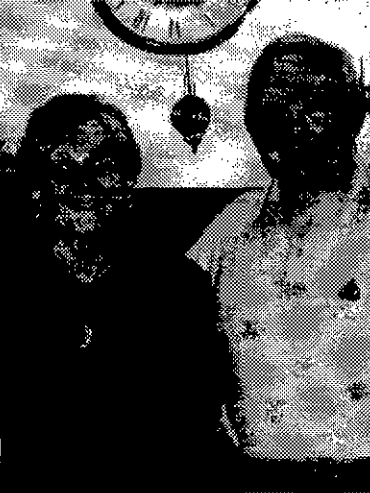

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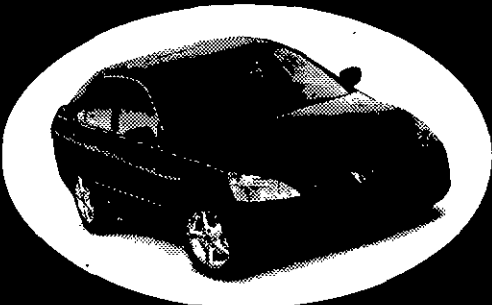


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Athletic association elects Trembley into its hall

John Trembley can add another honor to the long list of achievements he has had in his swimming career.

The Shaker High School graduate is one of two athletes that will be inducted into the third Hall of Fame class by the New York State Public High School Athletic Association Aug. 4 in Long Island.

Trembley, who graduated from Shaker in 1971, was surprised to learn of the honor.

"I don't feel like an athlete. I feel like a coach," Trembley said.

Indeed, it's been a long time since Trembley participated in a competitive race. These days, he's busy coaching the University of Tennessee men's swimming team — the program he swam for from 1971 to 1975 during the Volunteers' heyday as one of the nation's top collegiate teams.

"It is fun coaching collegiately, especially at one's alma mater," Trembley said. "Every day, there is joy in coaching."

Trembley's swimming career took off at Shaker. As a sophomore, he recorded the second-fastest time in the 50-yard freestyle with a time of 20.7 seconds. The following year, he set a national record in the 100 butterfly with a time of 50.5

Vestal High School outside Binghamton. "Of course with my training regimen, I train everybody in butterfly. John picked that up very quickly."

While at Shaker, Trembley began using a starting technique Bell — and later, Ralph Knowles — taught him.

Instead of simply leaning forward and keeping his hands in front of him or behind him, Trembley bent down and grabbed the starting block

to give him extra propulsion into the water. Considered revolutionary and controversial at the time, the "grab start" is now the standard starting stance for every swimmer.

For being the first to use it in a competition, Trembley was credited for developing the stance, and it was even named after him for a time. But, Trembley disputes his role as a swimming pio-

seconds at the Eastern Interscholastic Championships and finished second to eventual Olympic champion Mark Spitz — who broke Trembley's mark with a time of 50.3 seconds — at the Amateur Athletic Union (AAU) Championships.

"He came to me as a backstroker," said Roger Bell, who coached Trembley for two years at Shaker before taking a job at

with being a coach before the times," Bell said. "He may have said that I did (create the stance), but he was the one who introduced it to the world."

Trembley took the "grab start" and his incredible speed in the pool to Tennessee and quickly became a major cog in a string of undefeated teams at the Knoxville campus. In 1973, Trembley became the first person to win five NCAA titles at

neer.

"We tweaked it a bit (at Shaker), but I think there were others doing it at the same time," he said.

"John has always credited me

one championship meet, finishing first in three individual events (50 freestyle, 100 butterfly and 100 freestyle) and two relays (400 freestyle and 400 medley). By the time he concluded his collegiate career, Trembley had received 20

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All-American honors and was named the 1973 Swimmer of the Year by the Touchdown Club of Columbus, Ohio.

Trembley also swam in several international competitions during the early and mid 1970s, but he twice missed out on qualifying for the Olympics. In 1972, he was beaten for a spot on the U.S. team by .15 seconds in the butterfly, and in 1976, a head injury he sustained in an intramural football game that temporarily paralyzed the right side of his body and kept him from trying out for the national team.

When he recovered from the injury, Trembley focused on becoming a coach. He served under Tennessee head coach Ray Bussard for several years before taking a head coaching job at Mercersburg Academy, a prep school in Pennsylvania. There, he guided the boys swim team to seven national championships and six appearances at the Eastern Interscholastic championships.

After Bussard retired in 1988, Trembley took over the Tennessee program and quickly restored its national luster. In his first year, he coached the

Volunteers to the Southeastern Conference championship — becoming only the second coach in league history to do so. In 17 years in Knoxville, Trembley owns a 107-10 record in dual meets.

"He's a fantastic coach," Bell said. "He had a lot of different coaches, and you can see why he became a coach. But you also have to look ahead and try some

innovative things, and that's something he's also done."

Trembley said he drew a lot from his experiences as a swimmer under Bell, Knowles and Bussard when developing his coaching style.

"I have tremendously fond memories of Roger (Bell) and Ralph (Knowles) for what they've done for me," he said. "And in my coaching career, I try to do what

they did."

Trembley's athletic prowess has been passed on to his three sons, but for different sports. His oldest, John Michael, played golf for his college. Jeff, the middle son, is a pole vaulter and a co-

captain on the Tennessee men's track team, and Lee, the youngest, will be joining the UT track team next year.

"I think they fortunately decided to be their own people," Trembley said.

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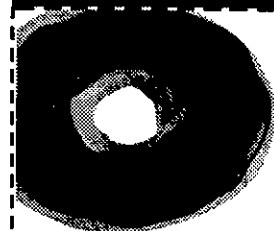
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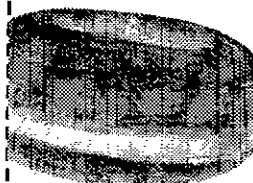

If you're buying a new car, why not consider donating your old one to Bethlehem Senior Projects?

Proceeds from the sale will help pay for the vehicles which the town's Transportation Service needs to take older, non-driving neighbors to doctors' appointments and to medical or therapy treatments every weekday.

The elderly or infirm also get a ride once a week to a local grocery store and every now and then to get a haircut or enjoy a social outing.

Bethlehem's Senior Transportation Service is what allows many of the regular riders to continue to live independently in their own homes. The service is available on a regular or intermittent basis to any town resident age 60 or older.

The Donate a Car program is one of the newer ways in which Bethlehem Senior Projects raises money to support the transportation service. There are benefits to giving a car through

this program also.

For one thing, you can avoid the hassle of selling your used car (or getting less than its real value through a trade in). You can also have the paperwork done for you by a Senior Services volunteer. And when tax time rolls around, you might qualify for a tax deduction.

Stephen Rucinski at Little Detroit Auto Sales, behind the Glenmont Car Wash on Route 9W, facilitates this program. Call 465-4127 to make an appointment and then drive the car there along with its registration and title.

Or, donors can call Senior Services at 439-4955, ext. 168, to have a volunteer handle the transaction.

After the car is accepted and sold at auction, the owner receives a letter with its sale price and IRS forms to be used for a tax deduction.

The Senior Services transportation fleet includes four 13-passenger vans, three of which are equipped with hydraulic lifts for wheelchairs, and three

sedans. Seven additional or replacement vehicles have been purchased in the past 12 years, which is an indication of how the program is used and growing.

Charles Tobin, president of Bethlehem Senior Projects, said he thinks the car donor program, which has only been in effect for about a year, is a wonderful way for people who have to put away their car keys to support a transportation program they can use.

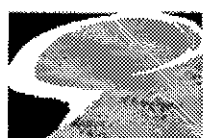
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Trustees, taxes headline Ravena Library vote on May 17

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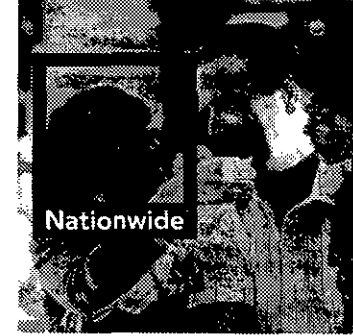

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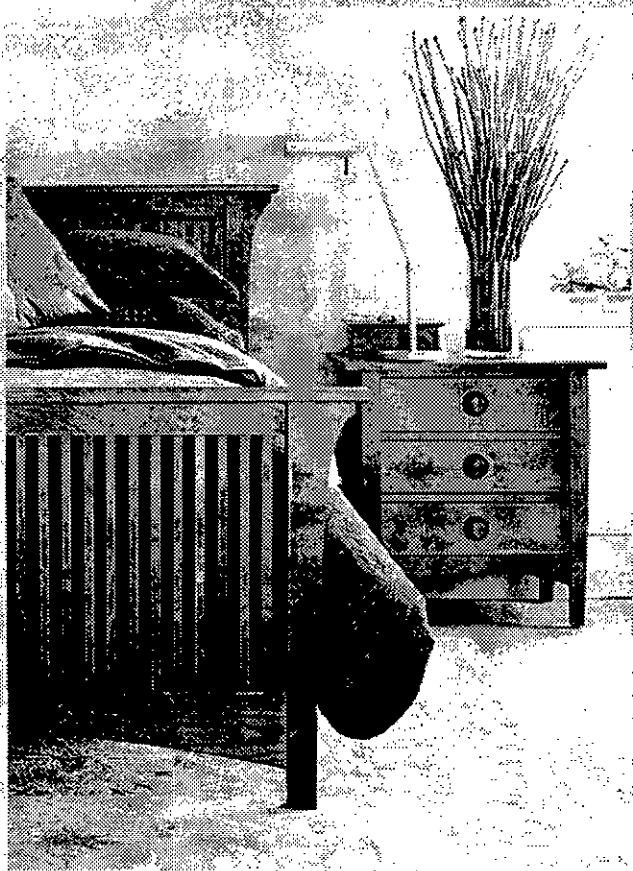

"I'm good for at least one gyro a day," Sokaris joked.

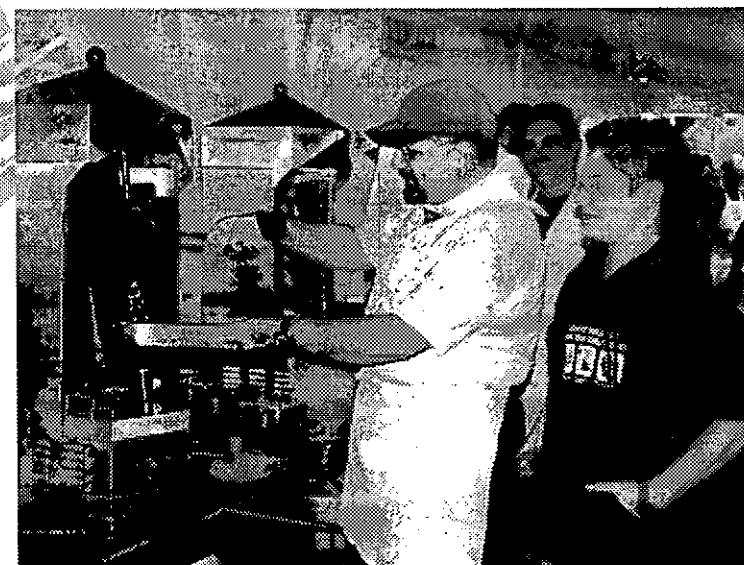

Bethlehem receives No. 2 seed in tourney

Eagles wrap up Gold Division title with victories over Shaker and Niskayuna

The field is set for the first Suburban Council baseball tournament, and if it goes like the regular season has gone, it will be full of surprises.

The championship division features three teams that have legitimate chances of winning the Section II, Class AA title — Blue Division champion Colonie, Gold Division champ Bethlehem and Blue Division runner-up Shenendehowa. Division II features two more Sec-

tional contenders, Columbia and Guilderland, along with a Shaker squad that was within striking distance of a Sectional playoff berth before losing to Bethlehem and Shen last week.

"Not making Sectionals the last two years and then to make Sectionals and win the (Blue) division, it was a good way to get back in," Colonie coach Greg Lanni said.

With its 13-1 league record, Colonie grabs the No. 1 seed and plays White Division champion

Mohonasen in Wednesday's championship division semifinal round. Bethlehem, which received the No. 2 seed after finishing the regular league season 12-2, plays No. 3 Shen Wednesday night at Clifton Common.

"We're just trying to keep the ball rolling," said Bethlehem coach Rob Helm, whose team shut out Averill Park 4-0 Monday to wrap up the regular season.

Both Colonie and Bethlehem were unexpected champions. Shen was considered the favorite in the Blue Division, but Colonie essentially secured first place by beating the Plainsmen twice in a five-day span in the middle of the season.

"That was big, but we still had a lot of tough games left and we had to play well," Lanni said.

Bethlehem was in a tougher division than Colonie and had fewer veterans than the Garnet Raiders, but the Eagles found the boost they needed from a trio of sophomores — Mike Carroll, Kevin Dumacich and Paul Loupe.

"The sophomores have really got us to this level," Helm said. "Mike Carroll has really pitched well, Dumacich pitched a complete game last week and Paul Loupe is now my everyday left fielder."

Columbia and Guilderland also had legitimate chances of winning the Gold Division, but some key losses down the stretch prevented them from keeping pace with Bethlehem. Guilderland in particular went into a major slump, losing its last three league games.

"We're as good as any team in

Niskayuna had been eyeing a Sectional berth as recently as last week before losses to Shen and Bethlehem eliminated the Silver Warriors from contention.

"Quite honestly, I'd rather be playing non-league opponents. We could be facing the very teams we could be playing in Sectionals," she said.

Still, Bethlehem would love to enter Sectionals as the Suburban Council Tournament champions.

"You want to try to win and play your best ball," Elmendorf said.

Lady Eagles keep rolling along

Eight-goal burst in first half carries Bethlehem past Saratoga in Suburban Council contest

The gap between the Bethlehem girls lacrosse team and the rest of Section II grows wider with each lopsided win.

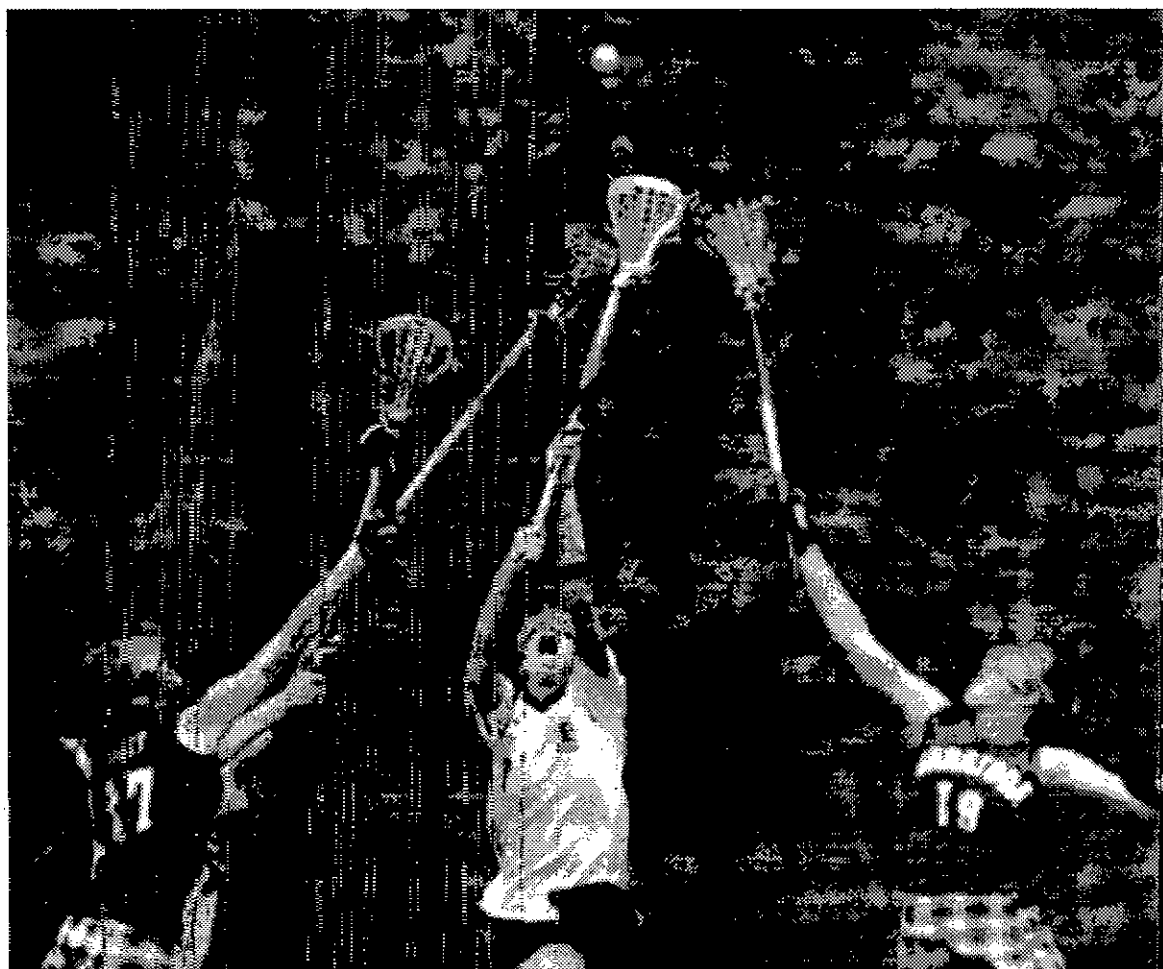
The Lady Eagles locked up first place in the Suburban Council with last Saturday's 11-3 victory over Saratoga in Delmar. Bethlehem is undefeated in nine league games and entered the final week of the regular season with a three-game lead over second-place Gunderland.

"I was extremely proud of the way our defense played against Saratoga," Bethlehem coach Dawn Austin said. "The thing about Saratoga is that they work the ball around on offense, and it can very frustrating for a team to play defense that long and see time running off the clock. What I've preached to the team is be patient and pressure the ball whenever possible."

The bulk of Bethlehem's scoring came in a 17-minute span of the first half. Utilizing their speed and stick skills, the Lady Eagles created several fast breaks that resulted in goals. By the time Saratoga finally got on the scoreboard late in the first half, Bethlehem already had eight goals.

Austin credited her defense for sparking the fast breaks.

"It doesn't just start with the midfield. It starts with the defense when they force a turnover," she said. "Everybody seems to know where they have to be on the field (for a fast break), and they make the cuts to get where they have to be. When we connect our passes and make our cuts, it

makes it that much easier for us to score."

Malinowski leads BC track at Colonie Relays

The Colonie Relays give area high school track and field coaches the chance to let their athletes have some fun — unless you're the coach of the host school. Then, the Colonie Relays are serious business.

"When it's your home meet, you put a little more emphasis on it than other teams," Colonie girls track co-coach Frank Myers said.

Myers' Lady Raiders edged crosstown rival Shaker for first place in the girls team standings 89-86, but Shaker grabbed the boys team title by a 15-point margin over Colonie.

"The 100 (meter dash) was the turning point. That's where we got 24 points" for sweeping the top three places, Myers said. "(Shaker) had trouble catching up, but it still came down to the last couple of events."

Stacy Gregory led the trio of Colonie dashers with a meet-record time of 12 seconds. Marissa Poletto was only two-tenths of a second behind Gregory, and Najala Singleton-McKinnon placed third in a time of 12.5 seconds.

"They're pushing Stacy," Myers said. "They're giving her



all she can handle, which is good. You want to have that healthy rivalry on your team. It helps them improve."

The 100 was one of only a handful of individual events at the

Colonie Relays. There were also a boys 1,600, a girls 1,500 and the first-ever steeplechase. Colonie's Bryan Murphy took the inaugural boys 3,000-meter event in a time of 9:47.6, while Bethlehem's

Emily Malinowski won the girls' 2,000-meter steeplechase in a time of 7:06.3, 32.4 seconds ahead of teammate Claire Luke.

"She wasn't too happy with her time, but there aren't too many who can run with her and it's hard to do it all by yourself," Bethlehem coach Dave Banas said of Malinowski, the defending Section II steeplechase champion.

Guilderland's Brian Rhoades Devey claimed the boys 1,600 in a time of 4:15.3, more than 11 seconds ahead of Bethlehem's Matt Shaffer, and Shenendehowa's Libby Babcock won the girls 1,500 in a time of 4:45.9.

"He's coming back from a knee injury, so that's pretty good for him," Banas said of Shaffer.

Other Bethlehem highlights include a new school record time of 10:49.8 in the boys distance medley relay, a second-place finish in the girls high jump relay and a third-place finish by Kristine Peck in the girls 1,500.

"They wanted to try to break some school records, and they did do well," Banas said of the group of boys he brought to the Colonie Relays.

Ravena's girls shot put relay team took first place to give the Indians 10 of their 17 points.

their school has been in existence in a way to which they can relate. Each week leading up to the Del Lanes celebration meant mostly for adults is assigned a different decade, from the 1990s down to the 1950s.

Morning announcements every day include historical facts.

"Anything from the styles of that decade, to the cars that were in existence, how much milk or a school lunch costs, all things the kids can relate to," Bielawa said. "The kids have been having a lot of fun with it."

Pam Dutcher, a member of the anniversary committee, has been picking out trivia facts she thinks the kids might find interesting, working backward as a way, she said, to build up interest in the school celebration on May 13.

Each week culminates with a dress up day for that decade.

"I told the kids at the beginning that we were going to be time travelers," Dutcher said, "and we were going to see what life was like for students in the 1950s. The kids have all gotten really involved."

Dutcher has organized display cases of what the children may consider "artifacts" from the previous decade, including rotary telephones, a transistor radio, eight-tracks and record players. Dutcher retrieved copies of *The Spotlight* from each of the decades, from 1994, 1984, 1974, 1964 and 1954 and posted them on the wall leading to the cafeteria, so students can see what the different prices were.

"When I first heard about it, I thought that it was such a great way to educate the kids about the last 50 years without them knowing about it," Dutcher said.

Students in physical education classes have all been learning dances from the decades, too, to perform at the May 13 assembly, Dutcher said.

At that assembly, a celebratory quilt will be unveiled. Third- and fourth-graders have been tying the three layers. Current students have signed the border of the 7.5-foot-by-6.5-foot quilt, which will include a photo collage of the current students.

Former Hamagrael students and faculty are having a blast escorting the younger students down their memory lanes.

"Elementary school is a nice age range. Sometimes, there's awkwardness in the middle school, adolescent years, but in elementary school, life is simpler for you," Bielawa said.

Some of the efforts to find former classmates and teachers have been difficult, Bielawa said, because once someone graduates from Bethlehem Central High School, they are simply an alum of Bethlehem and not necessarily of Hamagrael, Slingerlands or Glenmont, for example.

"It's many generations of Hamagrael alum," Bielawa said. "It's so nice to discover what fond memories so many people have of Hamagrael."

Current students will get a Power Point presentation of what the school was like then compared with what it is now served with a side of cupcakes in the shape of 1950 on the day of the golden anniversary.

Kontogiannis said.

To walk through the halls that bear the names of the most traveled streets in Delmar, one might not know the way the building was constructed will save approximately \$78,000 in annual electric costs and the energy saved — 683 kilowatt hours annually — could meet the energy needs of 100 homes in Delmar over a 10- to 15-year period. This is particularly remarkable in that Delmar Place comes complete with a small gym, a game room, a theater room, a living room and dining areas in each quadrant with kitchen tables that always have a puzzle going. The energy savings are most recognizable on days like the sunny but cool spring Thursday officials toured the building, Kontogiannis said. On days like that or on mild fall days, parts of the building are in both heating and cooling modes at the same time. On summer or winter days, most of the building is in one mode or the other.

"It takes rejected heat and uses it in another part of the building," Kontogiannis said, speaking outside the facility, near the quiet cooling and heating center that uses water to optimize its cooling capabilities. "It's a smart and simple system."

Energy is saved in every activity down to the doing the laundry, which is done in an on-site facility that includes horizontal loaded washers and dryers to save water consumption.

The "smart" water and hot water boilers, in the basement of the building, have varied speed drivers to modify the output speed of water, Kontogiannis said.

Sensors around the building

determine how much water is needed for whatever activity is being performed.

"It might be something you don't think about in terms of efficiency, but when these are in use about 8,000 hours a year, if you use something that's 5 percent more efficient," Kontogiannis said, energy is saved every day, all year. Klersy admits he gets attached to the people he sees in the building.

"It's every developer's dream to make a difference, to build something of great worth, to be remembered, respected and of service," said Klersy, who gets his hair cut at the facility's salon, which he says is booked solid every Thursday. "We've accomplished this at Delmar Place."

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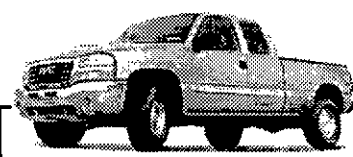

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
