

Teens accused of gang assaul

Four teenagers were arrested for a gang assault that occurred at Glenmont Job Corps in Glenmont Tuesday, April 18.

The assault occurred April 17 at about 7:15 p.m., police said. Police arrested Carlos R. Figueroa, 16, Dennier W. Thomas, 18, Joel Marchene, 16, all of St. Croix, Virgin Islands, and Jaleem A. Charles, of St. Thomas, Virgin Islands.

The 18 year old victim, also a student and resident of the Job Corps, was hospitalized with a head injury,

internal bleeding, and lacerations. He was released last week and will face the Job Corps review board to determine his involvement with the

"If a student here is involved in a fight, they face the review board and possible termination." said Rose Walker Cook, Job Corps director. "The other four have already been dismissed from the program."

The four teens have been

charged with gang assault in the first degree, felony, and criminal possession of a weapon in the fourth degree, a misdemeanor. All four were arraigned in Bethlehem Town Court and were taken to Albany County jail without bail.

Corners.


Pisanello has taught music at Bethlehem for 19 years. He studied at the University at Albany, The College of Saint Rose, and in New York City.






A call for pilots

National initiative seeks to put more people in the cockpit

Don't call it a crash course in front of your teacher, but that's just what it is.

The Aircraft Owners & Pilots Association (AOPA) has pushed a national initiative full throttle in efforts to get more people behind the controls of personal, single engine aircraft.


Named "Project Pilot," the new flight training initiative has met with success in flight schools across the country.

Richmor Aviation, a flight school operating out of airports in Schenectady, Poughkeepsie, Hudson and Saratoga has been taking beginner pilots of all ages up for their first "discovery flight."

"Beginner flight lessons are kind of like drinking from a fire hose," said Richmor chief flight instructor at the Saratoga County Airport Jim Morzillo. "It's a lot of information at first.'

Morzillo had five flights scheduled for Thursday, April 20. The low winds and clear 75 degree Fahrenheit weather had beginner pilots looking over the tarmac eagerly awaiting their turns.

First is a half-hour or so tour of the Cessna 172S four-seat single engine plane's components. The checklist before the prop turns is 46 items long. The fuel is checked. on board controls, elevators, stabilizers and wheel chocks are given a once-over. The retired sixth-grade science teacher caresses every rivet of the aluminum body. It's better to find the problems on the ground than at 2,500 feet, he said.

A call to the control room marks the radio channel to be used for communications. Other planes are made aware that he will begin to tari the plane and soon lift off.

"Clear," Morzillo yells out the window as the 180-horsepower engine wakes up. A few sputters, some adjustment of the fuel mixture, and the prop springs to life. The feather-light aircraft shakes. In idle it already wants to gc. In seconds it breaks the 50 mph mark, and lifts off Morzillo settles the plane into a 100 mph cruise at 2,500 feet.

From this point on it's the basics of Lying; Bernoulli's equation of fluid dynamics does the rest. A plane wasts to ily, said Morzillo. It's around this point in the flight when he tells the pilot "You have the controls."

Vehicle's recommended 10-and-2 hard configuration upon the wheel, Mcrzillo promotes a one-handed appreach to flying. He constantly checks to make sure fingertips aren't turning white from gripping the yoke steering wheel — too tightly.

It's an expensive hobby. The Cessna 172S is considered the staple of airplanes. It's simple, small and contenient — and costs more than \$75,000. But, flying isn't just for the rich, and many won't be left grounded with a pilots I cense with no plane to afford or fly, he said.

"as far as being realistic, it's on the same level of someone skiing, golfing or snowmobiling," he said. Typically, from the discovery flight

to Federal Aviation Authority certification, lessons will end up costing between \$5,000 and \$6,000 by the time a pilot earns his or her wings, he said. It is a price that many can afford. It can be done overtime. It's not uncommon for some of his students to take up to two years or more to earn a license.

On average, pilots clock 67 to 70 hours of flight before they receive their licenses, said Morzillo.

Richmor Aviation's introductory the ground. A quick ascent and flight cost \$75. However, through the AOPA Project Pilot, prices are steeply discounted and depending on the plane and location, introductory flights can cost between \$49 and \$89. In every lesson the student operates the plane.

Access to small single engine planes has opened dramatically Unlike the Department of Motor in the last several years. In 2004, more than 600,000 Americans held a personal pilot's license. Programs like Project Pilot, with the ability to rent out planes, has given pilots their wings and the planes to hone their skills. Even if someone just wants to fly a plane every once in a while they can through the lessons. Each flight will go toward his or her hours of operation in the skies, and basic knowledge of the principles of flight.

Leaving fear behind

It doesn't take the iron nerve or fimsy reasoning of those kinds of people that will do most anything not deliberately designed or intended to kill them in a moment's notice to fly a small plane.

On the scale between sheer impulse and common sense, taking flight in a small plane is right about dead center. Overcoming fear will be an issue for some. And, for those that lend themselves to impulses, you will be satisfied.

When you're airborne, a small plane is actually quite pathetic. It has the horsepower of a 1960s Volkswagen bus, with similar aerodynamics to the "bug."

Its only intimidating factors are a slew of gauges and an assortment of clicks and whistles tacked along the dashboard, most of which aren't even used until you get deep into pilot courses.

Aside from the height, there n't much to it. Trust your pilot when he tells you "It wants to fly," He is correct and the gauges can back his claim.

Think of it as a 100 m.p.h crawl 3,000 feet up, when and if you ever make it up in a small four-seater

Ask yourself: "Would I go 100 mph in anything on the ground?" The roar, shake and wiggle of a grounded vehicle reaching those spe∈ds will certainly leave you white-knuckled and green in the face That is not the case with piloting a small plane.

The controls are simple. Most cars today boast features similar to the onboard controls of NASA's early Apollo shuttles, Cars are equipped with sophisticated, and sometime computer-assisted. electronics, hydraulics and

gneumatics.

A single engine Cessna's controls are similar to a boxcar racer. They are a series of pedals and cables. They are simple and leave little for the pilot to do but make sure the engine is humming, the propeller is turning, you're even with the horizon and you are in the air.

A turn of the yoke and depression of the respective rudder pedal, and the plane lists to one side. You are looking down at the ground below out of the side window. The door is latched securely. The scenery is spectacular.

In the plane's terrestrial cousin, the scenery would be that of the car next to you, its operator talking on the phone, reading, changing the radio station and pushing the dog back into the rear seat, while careening 75 mph through rush hour traffic. Are they paying attention, did they legally obtain their inspection sticker, are they on prescription cough medicine? These questions don't come up while in the air.

Up there, a 10-degree turn of the head and you have looked from the Helderberg Escarpment to the city of Albany. Another list of the plane to the left and Saratoga Lake is below and the Green Mountains are in the near distance. The cars below, and their questionable drivers, idly trickle up and down Interstat∈ 37 like ants from one anthill (Albany) to the next (C:fton Park).

The abrupt lift from a thermal, affoating stomach and the place's sudden fall from it only serve to remind you that you are in fact far from the daily grind below. The stomach tucks back into its abdominal cradle, your instructor taps your hand and tells you to relax and a smile stretches across your face.



Group seeks to increase playground's offerings

People in Bethlehem take their recreation seriously.

While still under construction, Maple Ridge Park will have a large playground separated into separate play areas in addition to the basketball court and picnic area already there.

But parents who live in walking distance of that park don't think it's enough. So they got together and talked about what they wanted to see in the park. The result is a fundraising campaign that just recently got under way.

Neighbors to the park called the town parks and recreation department to find out what was going to be there. Nan Lanahan, director, invited those neighbors to help select playground equipment for the park. The town budgeted \$35,000 for the equipment, but as the neighbors realized it wouldn't be enough for what they wanted.

"I thought that money would be adequate at first," said Lanahan. "But we still need a lot of things, like a walking path, fencing, and other things."

The group asked Lanahan what would be going in there, and that's how the idea for a fundraiser came about.

"There are 374 families in walking distance to the park,' said Amy Elkovich, coordinator of the group. "When we looked at the park, we thought having two separate playground areas was good but thought more equipment was needed. So the

group got together to plan a fundraiser to raise \$15,000. increasing the playground equipment budget to \$50,000 overall."

"It's been tremendous," said Elkovich. "The enthusiasm and energy from the neighbors just blew me away. People really want to help."

The group just recently began its fundraising efforts. So far, they've produced a flier soliciting donations, and it has been successful so far, Elkovich

"Some families have already donated in excess of \$100," she said. "We figured out that if 300 families whose children would use the park would donate \$50, then we would be able to reach our goal."

About 15 families are involved in the fundraising effort. The group plans to solicit from businesses and corporations as well as area families.

There is no cut-off date for donations, but the group would like to be able to purchase and install the playground equipment by July 4.

"It's a very family oriented and younger community, and there are many children," said

Included in the park will be a recognition of those who dontated money. A name board or bricks are a possibility, she said. Also, an event will be planned for later this summer, but details have not been worked out yet.



Pump up progress

Last week, Robert Seroka Jr., president and CEO of Hudson Valley AAA wrote a letter suggesting that the state Legislature could and should do something to alleviate the gasoline tax burden on New York resi-

-One of the reasons Seroka says it's possible is because the way the law is now administered, we're already paying taxes on taxes.

It would be nice for a change to see the state Assem-

bly and Senate do something that would actually help New Yorkers get by.

It might also be a way for the Legislature to chip away at its not-so-pristine reputation of being the most dysfunctional state body in the country. It's an uphill battle, but one that should be waged.

Frankly, we the citizens of New York, deserve better than this. People continue to leave the state for less costly climes, and the reason is largely due to the high cost of living here.

We would like to think that our lawmakers could make this connection and rededicate their efforts to make some much-needed changes in our overly taxed and beleaguered state.

But the Legislature's record over the last 20 years isn't an indication of a group with a type A mentality. An on-time state budget has only been a reality for the last two years. It seems our lawmakers excel at thwarting the members of the opposite party rather than enacting any significant change.

But what the people of all political parties really want is change and effective leadership. State residents, by virtue of the pitiful numbers that show up to vote on Election Day, are sending a message to politicians that do not inspire confidence. When precious little gets done, it's understandable that Jane and John Q. Public stay home.

So the cycle of lethargy and apathy continues both with the legislators and with voters.

We seem now to be caught in a rut, spinning our wheels going nowhere.

This could be a perfect opportunity for legislators. to actually do something to begin to move the state forward again. Certainly, taking away some of the pain at the pump would be a giant step in the right direction.

Put energy bucks back in your pocket

The Home Performance with Energy Star program uses a Building participating Performance Institute (BPI)certified Home Performance contractor to perform a comprehensive, high-tech assessment of the home, make recommendations for energy improvements and provide a cost estimate to do the improvements. They can even do the work.

The Home Performance contractor can identify a variety of home energy efficiency problems, including poor insulation, air leaks through cracks and gaps, inefficient cooling and heating systems, and ineffective moisture control by performing a home assessment.

A certified Home Performance contractor will arrange a time with you, the homeowner, for the Comprehensive Home Assessment (CHA), which generally lasts two to three hours. 

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
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Senior citizen outreach coordinator to retire

She's looking forward to catching the big fish in the lake, and spending time with her grandchildren.

That's what Caroline Worth has planned for her retirement so far. The senior citizen's outreach worker for the town of Bethlehem will retire Thursday, April 27, after 19 years of

"I will truly miss this job," she said. "It has been absolutely wonderful."

The people she's met and been able to help are the parts of the job Worth will miss the most. Making a lot of friends in the town and trying to help people unravel their problems creates relationships with people, she

"You can't not get involved," she

Worth said she "stumbled" into the job in February 1987.

"I had just gotten a business license for Gofers, and I went into the senior services office and handed them the card," she said. "They asked me if I would be interested in doing some work for them, and that's how it started."

Back then, the town didn't have an actual outreach program. Worth

designed the position in a way that she thought would work.

The job of an outreach coordinator has changed over the years, she said. It used to require more home visits to people who had more dramatic problems. Now, much of the work is referring people to the right places to get the services they need.

"Some of the crisis-type issues that would happen 20 years ago wouldn't happen now in part because of the amount of help we've been able to give to people over the years," she

Worth is also well regarded by her co-workers and will be missed.

Karen Pellettier, director of senior services, said Worth's services were a great gift to the community.

"She has helped thousands of seniors remain independent," she said. "She had a great sense of humor, and a lot of compassion and patience."

Worth started in the early 1960s as a visiting nurse. She received her bachelor's degree in nursing and then became a supervisor for visiting nurses. After taking a few years off to have children, she returned to the nursing profession and trained home health aid workers. In her town position, she gave information and referrals.

"But it becomes more than that,"

The senior outreach center has a food pantry, an equipment loan closet, and a meal program for the elderly. Worth has also put on health fairs in town and blood pressure screenings.

Nationally ranked player to head Albany club

Who among us wouldn't like to just chuck the job and play tennis all day? But we have bills, and probably aren't good enough tennis players to make any money at it.

Not true for Larry Yakubowski.

A Delmar resident for almost 18 years, he's taken his tennis game from an enjoyable hobby to a career.

He's competed in men's singles for the United State Tennis Association East, headed area clubs, and coached the game at Siena College, the University at Albany and Doane Stuart School

in Albany. He's won about 20 USTA titles since beginning competition in 1995, and currently holds the among northern competitors in the Men's 45 Singles category for last year.

So, to Yakubowski, tennis is a way of life.

Building relationships between players is his primary goal and what he is most proud of, and now, he'll be able to do that on a wider scale. Yakubowski was just named head of the Albany Tennis Club at 316 Partridge St. in Albany.

Taking on that position is a continuation of the work he's done already at public parks and private clubs, he said. Increasing the comfort level of his clients and eliminating fear of competitive games is a challenge he enjoys.

"I believe that regardless of your level of experience, you should have the opportunity to compete,' he said. "We cater to men and highest eastern section ranking women of all ages, and I am region especially proud of the number of women who have begun competitive tennis."

Yakubowski was an accountant before beginning his summer job teaching tennis for Bethlehem Parks and Recreation 18 years ago. The tennis seed was planted as a senior in high school, and the summer job with Bethlehem was the next step.

"He has quite a following," said Nan Lanahan, director of Bethlehem's Parks and Recreation Department. "He's really devoted to promoting tennis in the community. even though it's not as popular as it was 30 years ago. It's great to have him working with us.

From there, Yakubowski has progressed to competing at increasingly high levels and coaching the game. Tennis coaching also led to a position as a math and physical education teacher at Doane Stuart School, where he still is today.

"He's wonderful with kids of all ages," said Lisa Brown, associate head of Doane Stuart. "He's very patient and involved, and he's a great role model for the kids in terms of exercise and participation in sports. And he has a great sense of humor."

Proof of this could be Yakubowski's proficiency at riding the unicycle, something Brown says he does very well.

That's rare," she said. "He's got a combination of serious and humorous, and it's an interesting combination."

In terms of tennis, Yakubowski considers himself a good ambassador for the sport.


"I really care about the growth of the game, and I care about people enjoying it," he said. "I like to help build a community. I want people to know where I am and to continue helping them."

"Not all teaching pros take the risk," he said. "There is a fear of losing, but if they don't compete, then they don't grow as players."



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
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Gramps with amps hit the Linda stage on Sunday

James Lytle

Incumbent board member Lynne Lenhardt James Lytle is seeking his second term. His goals for the coming term will be to continue to make the education process both on the board and at the administrative level more accessible to district residents.

"We've been really trying to encourage community involvement, not just during budget time but throughout the year,"

One of his concerns is the perception that the board and administrative staff is unresponsive to district residents, and Lytle will continue working to make the process more transparent.

"I would recommend holding meetings more frequently and at more locations, so more people could attend," he said. "I also think we should be televised. I want to continue to examine ways to make it easier for people."

Lytle is also concerned with scrutinizing the annual budget more carefully and finding more ways to reduce spending.

"I'm not sure how we'll do it better, but I want to try and examine other potential efficiencies throughout the year, not just at budget time," he

Day-to-day student life is also a concern.

"You're only in second grade" once," he said. "I want to make sure all issues are addressed right away, and not years out. I

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want every year for students to be as good as we can make it."

Lytle is a partner in the Albany law office of Manatt, Phelps & Phillips LLP, where his practice is focused primarily on health care law. A district resident since 1983, he and his wife, Lisa, have three children, all BCHS graduates.

Lynne Lenhardt, a substitute teacher and private tutor, is seeking her seventh term on the board. A district resident since 1972, Lenhardt and her husband, George, who served on the Bethlehem town board, have two children, both graduates of BCHS.

Lenhardt serves on the Capital Region BOCES Board and the state School Boards Association board of directors.

"There is still a lot of work to do," she said. "I'm a strong advocate for education, and even though my kids are out of school I still feel that it's the community's responsibility as a whole to educate our children.'

Lenhardt said also that it's important to represent the many residents in the community who don't have children.

Ways to cut spending in the budget remain a priority with Lenhardt, especially with this year's reval.

"This can hurt the senior citizens the most," she said. "It's tough. It's important that the district economize and find more efficiencies. We have been trying to do that, but it doesn't happen overnight. Something has to give."

In addition to cutting costs, Lenhardt's 18 years on the board and involvement with education on the state level bring out of area knowledge to the board. She represents 70 school districts in 7 counties

"I'm aware of problems in other areas, and knowing what's going on elsewhere can help us here in Bethlehem," she said. "I can look at the big picture."

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

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
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

n advance directive is a written instructions telling your doctor, family and others what kind of care you want in the event you are unable to make medical decisions for any reason. Advance directives usually only go into effect when you become incapable of making decisions about your care and treatment. Each state has different laws concerning advance directives.

A living will is a form of advance directive that takes effect when you are terminally ill or permanently unconscious. Usually you are considered terminally ill if you have six months or less to live. You are usually considered permanently unconscious if your brain is severely damaged and/or you are in a vegetative state. A living will conveys your wishes as to whether you want your life prolonged by certain medical measures if there is no hope of recovery.

A durable power of attorney for health care is another type of advance directive. You name a person as your agent who can make medical decisions for you if you are unable to make those decisions for yourself. A





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

The sad fact is that a mere 53 percent of American workers are offered traditional or 401(k)-style pension and only

42 percent participate. Don't make the same mistake. The 401(k) is now the mainstay of most employers' retirement plans, and many will match some or all employee contributions, meaning that investing is equivalent to giving yourself a tax-deferred raise.

Once the money is there, capital gains and dividends compound tax free until you reach 70.5 years of age, when you have to start taking the money out.

The other big advantage of the 401(k), the 403(b) and the IRA is that they give you a tax-free way to rebalance your portfolio when necessary. That's because you can move assets inside them without generating taxes. Sell winners outside a retirement account, and you'll be hit with a

minimum of 15 percent capital gains taxes.

While employer matches make most 401(k)s a good deal, expenses can be problematic; mutual firms usually run the plans and charge participants retail rates. That, and individuals' propensity to follow

investment fads, explains why self-directed retirement plans return two percentage points less per year on average than do managed professionally traditional plans, a huge difference over time. Put \$100,000

into one account averaging a 6 percent return and the same amount in another averaging 8 percent per year. After three decades, the former account is worth \$574,349 and the latter, \$1,006,266.

The best way to maximize your returns is to avoid chasing hot stocks or sectors and keep. costs down. If your employer offers it, consider a self-directed brokerage account inside a 401 (k). This will allow you to pick from a wide range of low-cost funds or equities. If your doesn't match employer contributions and runs a costly plan, max out your IRA before

investing in the 401(k). With accounts. IRAs, you decide who manages your money. When you change jobs, roll over your 401(k) into an

Insurance companies push hard to get investors to put fixed, variable and equity-indexed annuities into their retirement accounts. Don't do it. While the salespeople earn commissions of money, you pay through the nose for products whose main draw is tax deferral in accounts that are already tax deferred. Amazingly, the insurance industry has still sold \$679 billion of variable annuities alone into retirement

If you like the idea of receiving monthly annuity payments in retirement that you can't outlive, invest your IRA in stocks or lowcost mutual funds while working. Then when you retire, buy an immediate annuity, a product that begins making monthly payments right away while avoiding the costly bells and whistles that as much as 10 percent on your. make deferred annuities a retirement saver's nightmare.

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


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Don't let common ailments keep you grounded

making it so difficult to pass that straining occurs. Other symptoms include feeling bloated, uncomfortable or sluggish. Sufferers may find they spend hours in the bathroom, only to

have an unsatisfactory result. In some people, constipation is chronic and can last 12 weeks or more. In other words, constipation is not something you want to deal with either on vacation or

"Constipation, particularly if it's chronic, can hinder quality of life because of the unpleasant symptoms associated with it," said Douglas Drossman, M.D., professor of medicine and psychiatry and co-director of the University of North Carolina (UNC) Center for GI Functional and Motility Disorders in Chapel Hill. "As such, it is important for people who are affected to openly discuss this with their doctor, because there are solutions."

Constipation is more common than you may think. It affects 30 million people in the United States and is the cause of 2.5 million visits to physicians and 92,000 hospitalizations annually.

Traditionally, treatments for constipation included increasing fiber intake, drinking enough water and using laxatives or stool softeners. However, these treatments are not always effective, and in some cases, may actually make the problem more severe. This can lead to increased bloating or gas, or carry a risk of dependency on laxatives. Additionally, laxatives, stool softeners and even fiber therapies purchased in pharmacies could be bulky and hard to transport.

Researchers are studying the use of new medications and behavioral techniques to treat constipation. For example, research has focused on activating the Chloride Channel, a pump that maintains intestinal fluid secretion.

Whether you are traveling or just being bothered in daily life, if experience chronic constipation, you should take the important step to visit a doctor. A doctor will be able to accurately assess the problem and provide treatment recommendations.

"You think you know Joan, but you don't," Hansen said of the martyr who insisted she had a mandate from God to drive the English out of her native France. "Joan was a soldier for one year, a prisoner for another, and was on trial for a few months. She held her own against a courtroom of 19 men." "The Lark" depicts Joan's trial, but does not end with her death. Both Hansen and NYSTI's **Producing Artistic Director** Patricia DiBenedetto Snyder, who's directing the play, said that it ends on a more positive

something to look to. There are political and religious overtones to the play. I tried not to focus on those, but on the belief and hope Joan offered."

DiBenedetto Snyder is on NYSTI's selection committee, and what that committee liked about "The Lark" was how much it has to teach.

"It's the story of a courageous woman, in a conflicted time," DiBendetto Snyder said. "It takes place during the Hundred Years War; the Roman Catholic Church had three popes; the English wanted control of France; and this young lady wanted to see her country saved.'

DiBenedetto Snyder se lot of parallels to today, which she described as a time of conflict and puzzlement.

"You'll see the polarization between the secular and the church," DiBenedetto Snyder said. "England represents the secular and France the clerics" DiBenedetto Snyder doesn't think that people should shy away from "The Lark," even if it brings up serious issues. The cast of 25 portrays the courtroom drama well, and while the show is not a musical. it does have a musical score, and there are characters who provide moments of humor to the show.

But Joan is always at the center of the play.

"There are other heros and heroines that we put on stage, like kings, cueens and presidents," LiBenedetto

Snyder said. "What I like about The Lark' is that we all get to make our own decision. We all need to dc a little soul-searching sometimes. This play was written from the records of the trial. One question it definitely raises is why we don't learn from our own mistakes.'

Hansen said that playing Joan has been "the most important thing I've done so far."

"There's so much beauty in the role," she said. "Joan's simplicity, her unbreakable character, and her unshakeable faith – those have been great to step into.

Hansen agreed with DiBenedetto Snyder that the play will appeal to a broad audience.

"The way Joan spoke about mankind and humanity is inspiring," Hansen said. "The play doesn't so much give answers as ask questions, and like good theater, it gives you hope. I'm confident that people who see it will be glad they

its effects.

"Essentially it is a community about alcoholism and healthrelated issues and may serve as a trigger to recovery," said a written statement from the NCADD.

Highway Traffic Safety Administration's National Center for Statistics and Analysis, 5,896 people between the ages of 16 and 20 were killed in the year 2004. Out of these people, 29 percent had a blood alcohol content of .08 percent or higher.

"Alcohol related crashes fell by 2.4 percent in 2004," said Eric Bolton, public spokesman for the NHTSA. "We also have the preliminary data for 2005 which is probable to change. It shows an increase in alcohol involved fatalities."

Driving while intoxicated is a serious problem that does not seem to be going away. According to the NHTSA 2004 report, the age group with the highest percentage of drivers to be involved in fatal crashes where the driver had a blood alcohol level of .08 percent or higher is the 21-24 age group. Since this group follows the 16-20 age group, many programs are implemented in the high school age range as a preventative measure. This is not only to take a proactive impaired approach to drinking and

driving, but also to prevent these young people from putting themselves in the same danger as those just a few years older.

"We certainly don't want consciousness-raising effort teenagers who are inexperienced drivers exacerbating this by drinking and driving," said Bolton. "It's really not a good idea."

tissues, bone, cartilage, almost every part of the body. One body can help up to 50 people. According to Messina's statistics. approximately 90,000 people are on organ waiting lists. Another person is added to that list every 14 minutes, and 17 people will die every day from a lack of organs.

The Messinas allowed Matthew's organs to be donated, and even met two of the women who benefited from them. They keep in touch.

Messina started volunteering at the Center for Donation and Transplant a few months after his son's death. As he became more comfortable with his knowledge, he began speaking out to the community about its importance.

"There is a great need for this," he said. "I have a bumper sticker on my car that says, 'Don't take your organs up to heaven - heaven knows we need them here."





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
