Porco trial begins

Prosecutors present grisly pics


When Third Appellate Division Court Officer Captain Michael Hart drove up the driveway of 36 Brockley Drive in Delmar on a sunny November morning in 2004, he had no idea from looking at the peaceful pristine outside of the Porco family home, what deadly carnage lay quietly inside.

Hart told the jury which will decide if 22-year-old Christopher Porco is guilty of murdering his father and the attempted murder of his mother, that he was asked by Judge Anthony Cardona's chief of security Frank Costello to see why law clerk and friend Peter Porco was late for work. It was 10:30 a.m. on Nov. 15, 2004 and neither Costello nor Cardona received any calls from Porco indicating he was sick or that he would be late for work.

"It wasn't like him not to call," Hart said.

When court officials tried to contact the home there was no answer. At one point, Julie Cannizzaro, a friend of the Porco family and Judge Cardona's administrative assistant, offered to drive to the home but Costello said it would be safer if Court Officer Hart drove to 36 Brockley Drive instead.

"I arrived at 11:25 a.m. and there were no cars in the

driveway," Hart said. He then tried to contact Peter Porco two separate times on his cell phone while outside the home to see if anyone was inside. Jurors were shown a photo of the home that morning, revealing sun shining through bare November trees on a cool crisp morning in a quiet suburban neighborhood.

"No one answered the phone," said Hart.

Jury hears Christopher's calls to police

In one of the few times jurors may hear from Christopher Porco during his trial for murder, prosecutors on the second day of testimony played two recorded telephone exchanges between Porco and a dispatcher with the Bethlehem police department in the hours following the attacks on his parents.

The first call came in at 3:09 p.m. on Nov. 15, 2004, approximately four hours after his parents, Joan and Peter Porco, were discovered brutally attacked in their 36 Brockley Drive home.

"My name is Christopher Porco, and I am calling to find out if my parents were found dead," Porco stated calmly to Bethlehem Police Department Emergency Dispatcher Brianna Tice. Tice did not answer the question and instead placed Porco on hold before returning to the line to ask where he was calling from. Porco said he was calling from his dorm room at the University of Rochester and that he had been contacted about the death of his parents by an Albany newspaper intern.

Reaction from farmers about the program's benefits seem mixed.


One farm that said is has benefited significantly is The Flying Pigs Farm, in the Washington County town of Shushan. Co-owner Jennifer Small is a big fan of the

Normanskill mattress ride creates tense scene

Police, fire agencies converge on creek in search of two men

Three Delmar men are lucky to be alive today after taking a rapid river raft excursion on a small inflatable mattress in the Normanskill early Thursday Morning.

Joseph Clyne, 20, of Delmar, and Patrick Barnes and Patrick McNally, both 21 and also from Delmar, decided to take a mattress out at 3 a.m. and place it in the waters off of Blessing Road

and Route 85 on one of the rainiest weeks in the last several years in the Capital District.

Bethlehem Police received the initial call from an employee at the Good Samaritan Nursing Home. The person stated that a man came in and said two of his friends were capsized and he was not sure where they were.

Bethlehem Police immediately contacted both Albany City and County police, and the Delmar Fire Department. A State Police helicopter was put on notice

as well.

"The men rode the rapids down to the Normanside Country Club where they capsized," said Bethlehem police Lt. Thomas Heffernan. "One individual then climbed to the shore to the nursing home where he asked someone to

call police to find his two missing friends."

Police then checked the area around River Road to find the men. A command post was also set up along the Delaware Avenue Bridge along the Albany side.

"At 5:15 a.m. a Sargeant en route to the command post spotted the two missing males walking along the bridge,"

said Heffernan.

The men were brought back to the command post and had survived the journey uninjured. "It was a raging rapid river in some parts," said Heffernan.

Heffernan noted the men were drinking alcohol before they jumped into the water, but were not charged with any crime. Police did warn the trio to not to try the stunt again. "They could have ended up in the Hudson River," said Heffernan.

Several dozen police and fire officials responded to the call on June 29.

Two charged with burglary of abandoned Selkirk business

Bethlehem Police charged two men from Schenectady County with felony burglary for trying to steal copper from

an abandoned Selkirk business. Michael J. McCormack of Scotia and Kenneth Pleickhard, 28, of

Glenville were charged with burglary and possession of burglar tools. The two men tried to break into Selkirk Ventures Inc., on June 19. A police officer who appeared on the scene noticed a car in the parking lot of the vacant building previously occupied by Daisytek. The suspects told police they were working inside the building. Officers noted that the door to the

building had pry marks and protection plates were broken. A yellow back pack with tools, cutters and flashlights was also found on the scene. McCormack admitted to police after some questioning that he was in the building trying to steal data cable wires for copper. The two men will appear in Town Court July 18.



The jury is chosen

Judge's written ruling on evidence still outstanding

Wednesday, June 28, was the final day for jury selection in the murder trial of Christopher Porco. By late Tuesday, five women and two men had been chosen, and another five jurors and six alternates were picked Wednesday.

The jury selection began on Monday with over 200 people slowly being weeded out to the final 12 now hearing the case in Orange County Supreme Court in the town of Goshen. Judge Jeffrey Berry is presiding. Opening statements took place on Wednesday, and the first witnesses appeared Thursday. The trial has recessed until Wednesday, July 5. Heavy publicity in Albany County forced the trial to be moved to Orange County, where there is little if any

local media coverage on the trial. A group of Capital District electronic and print media have been following Christopher Porco since the crime occurred, and they are continuing their vigil at the Orange County Courthouse.

Porco is accused of killing his father and attempting to murder his mother with a fireman's ax in the family's Brockley Drive home in Delmar in November 2004.

Evidence that will be allowed in the murder trial includes Porco admitting to staging a burglary a year prior to the attacks at the family's Delmar home. Defense Attorneys Terrence Kindlon and Laurie Shanks, along with chief prosecutor and Assistant District Attorney Michael McDermott, have all been echoing the same phrase — they would all like to see a fair trial. Potential jurors have been screened all week long to see if they can be fair and impartial when evidence on the

Defense hits hard in opening statements

Judge instructs jury that Porco doesn't have to prove anything

The eight women and four men seated as jurors during opening day arguments in the murder trial of Christopher Porco were, in Defense Attorney Terence Kindlon's own words, "riveted" as they listened to Assistant District Attorney Michael McDermott present the people's case against Christopher Porco.

"The man you see before you entered his childhood home while his parents were in bed asleep, and repeatedly struck them with an ax, splitting his father's skull open 12 times, then splitting his mother's skull and then left them for dead," said McDermott.

"How could this happen, why did this happen?" asked McDermott. "Those are the questions we will be spending the next several weeks proving."

Kindlon said the murder of Delmar residents Peter Porco and attempted murder of Joan Porco is shocking and horrific, brutal and probably sadistic.

"We do, however, tell you that our client Christopher Porco is not guilty of this horrible crime. There is not a shred of evidence to connect Christopher Porco to this crime, nothing, nothing, nothing," Kindlon stressed.

Albany County's chief prosecutor handling the case

continued with his statement as the friends and family of Christopher Porco looked on, as did McDermott's boss, Albany County District Attorney David Soares, seated inside the Orange County Courtroom where the trial is being held.

"Christopher Porco was a very popular young man but a terrible student," said McDermott. "Ten months prior to the crimes, the University of Rochester told him to take a year off to get his head together." McDermott then laid out a scenario alleging that Christopher Porco began a series of lies, which continued to build. The lies included forging school transcripts, lying to his parents about why he left the University, lying to school officials about tuition payments, lying to his parents about his personal finances, and forging his father's name on two separate loan applications totaling \$48,000, then telling his parents he was receiving a semester of tuition free.

"Christopher Porco was living on borrowed time, ladies and gentlemen," McDermott said. "How long did he think he could go before Peter Porco would wake up and see what is going on?"

McDermott said the lies continued until 10 days prior to the attacks when a flurry of e-mails exchanged between Christopher and his parents.

"You can see the e-mails back and forth like a crescendo, building, mounting, the pressure all coming to a head," said McDermott. McDermott said the e-mails indicated that Peter Porco was going to file forgery affidavits against his son Christopher, and both Peter and Joan Porco sensed their son was having a mental breakdown and demanded he come back home.

"Deception, deceit, a house of cards begins to crash in November of 2004," said McDermott.

Kindlon, on the other hand, said McDermott's accusations and the year of work leading up to Porco's arrest amounts to "60 boxes of nothing and six tons of wishful thinking."

"Christopher Porco has no history of violence at all," said Kindlon. "We're supposed to believe suddenly on Nov. 15, 2004, a big Frankenstein monster switch got thrown into his head and he became a homicidal maniac striking his parents with an ax."

Kindlon indicated to the jury the Bethlehem police department, which investigated the crime, is a small staff used to

The prosecution, the defense

Two legal teams square off in Porco case

The difference between a verdict of guilty or not guilty in the Christopher Porco murder trial may rest in the hands of the attorneys.

Criminal defense lawyer Terence Kindlon and his partner in both practice and in life, wife Laurie Shanks, are the defense team for Delmar native Christopher Porco. Porco is on trial for allegedly murdering his father Peter Porco and attempting to murder his mother Joan.

Kindlon will attempt to present a case showing that Porco was not given a chance to represent himself legally when being questioned by Bethlehem Police the night after the attacks. He will also explain to the jury that the prosecution has offered no physical evidence linking Porco to the crime on the night of Nov. 15, 2004, when the attack occurred inside the family's Brockley Drive home.

"I've been handling murder cases since the 1970s and they are the most intriguing cases," said Kindlon. "The downside is that the consequences are the most grave. A person could spend the rest of his life behind bars. In this trial I expect to hear a loud and clear not guilty verdict twice."

Kindlon has tried more than 150 cases to verdict and has represented a number of men facing the death penalty in both state and federal court. Kindlon is no stranger when it comes to facing death. He served in the U.S. Marine Corps and was awarded the Bronze Star and Purple Heart for serious wounds received in combat. He credits his staff and legal team for much of his recent success and notoriety.

"I've got a very good team of lawyers who work here," said Kindlon, a graduate of Albany Law School.

One of those lawyers is his partner and wife, Laurie Shanks,

who is also representing Porco. Shanks is a graduate of Arizona State Law School and is also a faculty member at Albany Law School. Shanks frequently serves as a trial consultant to criminal defense lawyers throughout the country.

Albany County assistant district attorneys Michael McDermott and David Rossi are presenting the people's case against Porco. McDermott has handled over 30 homicide cases, and has presented hundreds of cases to Supreme and County Court grand juries. The case against Porco is largely circumstantial relying on the fact that Porco was heavily in debt, failing in school, and had forged his father's name on a \$30,000 loan application. Another key piece of evidence the prosecution hopes to use is a nod by Porco's mother Joan to police the morning after the attacks when she was asked if Christopher had committed the brutal crimes against her and her husband Peter.

McDermott is a 1989 graduate of Albany Law School and has been chief assistant prosecutor since 2002. McDermott won the 2004 Arson Prosecutor of the Year award in recognition of his work in closing high-profile arson cases.

The Christopher Porco murder trial is one of the most costly and high profile murder trials in the history of Albany County. The trial is being held in Goshen, Orange County, because of the heavy media exposure for close to two years leading up to the case. The trial is expected to last anywhere from four to six weeks. Judge Jeffrey Berry, a Supreme Court judge in Orange County, is presiding over the case.

Eating icy cold summer treats is great fun for children, especially when they get to buy them from the ice cream truck.

Children eat ice cream all year long. They have it at birthday parties, it comes with meals at kid-friendly restaurants, and they get it after ball games. There is probably ice cream in your freezer.

The driver is just making a living. And, as my husband Jeff says, the driver has a route and the truck has to end up on somebody's street at dinnertime.

The ice cream truck almost never comes down our road. We often hear the music, but

sightings are rare. And if we do see the truck, it's at the end of our block rolling down the cross street.

Several years ago we chased the truck. This was not a good idea.

The truck went by the cross street, about 100 yards from our house, and my daughter took off after it. Then I took off after her. My husband, the faster runner, was nowhere in sight. He had previously disappeared around the corner at the opposite end of our block, where we usually see the truck.

There were a lot of kids out playing in their yards that evening. I thought for sure some of them would stop the truck. But no, none of the children were getting ice cream. No one even seemed to notice that we were running after the truck, so no one flagged down the truck for us. Apparently the driver didn't look much in the rear or side view mirrors, which is a bit of a safety concern. After all, we cannot have been the first people to chase after an ice cream truck!

It was disappointing to lose the truck after being so close. But

then Jeff appeared on his bike. He tracked down the truck and came back with the Fudgsicle for our daughter.

Luckily, this seemed to satisfy Rachel. She didn't get to hand over the money, but at least the ice cream came from the truck.

As any child will tell you, truck-bought ice cream is superior to whatever you have in the freezer in your kitchen. It

Well, the truck does have very cool items, like the fudge-coated vanilla ice cream bars shaped like Snoopy.

Recently, my family had dinner at a local fast food taco joint; my husband and I each had our own car. On the way home, I heard and saw the ice cream truck just as I entered our neighborhood. Of course, I was alone; Rachel had decided to go in Jeff's car.

Of course, if it's dark or raining or winter, then the truck comes down our road.

Actually, that suits me fine. Let the truck disappoint the children by not showing up. That way the parents don't have to say "No" to ice cream.

When my daughter was younger, we saw the truck more often.

"Oh, that's a MUSIC truck," we'd say, quickly shooing her into the house.

And the truck does play music. In slow motion, "Camp Town Races" descends upon us. We can never tell from which direction that sound is coming. And we rarely see the source.

Some kids will stand out on their driveway, convinced the truck is getting closer.

"Come inside, we have ice cream in the freezer," the parents will say. "It's getting late," we warn. "Choose something from the house, because if you wait too long it will be bedtime, and there will be no dessert."

But, still, it's hard for the kids to give up on the ice cream truck.

I have learned it does not make sense to chase after the ice cream truck, at least not on foot or in a car. It's better to send your spouse out on a bike. He'll come back, ice cream in hand, and your child's face will light up, eyes sparkling like fireworks.



The news that a multi-billion dollar chip fab firm has decided to move into to Malta and Stillwater is nothing short of mind-boggling. It is bound to be a boon to Upstate New York and the entire Northeast.

Although we've taken our shots at politicians — especially on the state level — this is one instance where we have to give credit where it is due.

Clearly, state Senate Majority Leader Joseph L. Bruno, R-Brunswick, is the champion of the day in helping to attract Advance Micro Devices to the region.

New York, which has become the target of many critics for a number of reasons, has finally gotten some good press as Luther Forest Technology Campus will be the home of AMD, which is predicted to attract 1,600 jobs at the site and thousands of ancillary jobs throughout the region.

Last week, Gov. George Pataki called the AMD decision a move to make New York the next Silicon Valley.

Bruno and Pataki shared the limelight with Assembly Speaker Sheldon Silver, D-New York, who shared the dream of attracting firms like AMD to the region.

In a sense, the project must be like General Electric's presence was to the city of Schenectady many years ago.

But in terms of today's dollars and the importance of technology in our lives, the move will impact the entire region. It can be likened to what the Industrial Revolution meant to the country in the early 20th century.

According to results of a generic environmental impact statement, created and submitted by the owners of Luther Forest Technology Campus, which was accepted by the towns of Malta and Stillwater, the traffic impact of the Luther Forest chip fab plant will be mitigated somewhat by new Northway exits and roundabouts.

However, given the scope of the project, we think the state should also be involved in future planning involving traffic impacts on the entire region.

The immediate concern is to be sure that a formal agreement is reached, whereby AMD will be bound to its intent of locating here.

For now, we are optimistic about what this project could mean for our entire region. It's an opportunity for all of us, and it could be a way to keep our younger people in the region. That means that in addition to addressing the infrastructure needed to keep drawing places like AMD, we need to address our education and training opportunities, so that the next generation is prepared to meet the high-tech world that's arriving in our backyard.

The green, green grass of home

Our private par 3 golf hole was fun, a lot of bogies and a couple birdies, but now it's time to move on.

In the morning sun, the lushness of the cross-cut bent grass neatly manicured, freshly raked white sand trap, and kidney-shaped fairway bunker made the private golf hole adjacent to our Menands home a pretty sight and a very unique property. We loved it.

But what do we do now, when it comes time to sell it?

It seemed like a great idea almost 18 years ago when we worked with two architects to design a layout that worked with the environment and also didn't over power the property.

I have always loved the art of golf course architecture. It's like walking through a wonderful garden; it seems to lift the human spirit; it's just fun. I have almost 4 acres here, so at the time I had them design another par 4 hole all to USGA standards that ran up further into some tall pines at the end of our property. But my wife Barbara talked me out of that idea. She is a lot brighter than I am...

When we moved here more than 30 years ago, we thought this would be the last home we would ever buy. We never thought about downsizing then. It's a great neighborhood; no one has ever left for a better one. But after raising three sons — all golfers — and having them move all over the country, it's a lot more home than we need. Our priorities have changed and we are looking for something easier, with fewer maintenance responsibilities and more time to travel.

In a perfect world, we would love to sell it to a family that loves golf. In reality, we know someone may buy the

house and tear out the golf hole, build a tennis court or put in a pool. And our memories of family golf matches, and golf parties with friends around the green will be lost.

For many years we had players from the Futures Tour stay with us when the tournament is in town. One year we had four players here, and no one has yet got a hole-in-one on the 135-yard hole. I don't call it a par three. Because it's my hole and par is whatever I want it to be.

I had the house valued by an appraiser who has done over 6,000 local appraisals. He said that homes with unique features like this are very hard to value. He said: It's a great property, it's a great location with bridges and waterfalls, running and walking trails and a fishing pond next door. But whether the next buyer will want those amenities or want a golf hole is hard to say. That wasn't of much help.

For Sale by Owner President Rob Balanger is a very bright guy, but he wasn't of much help either. He said, "In this market I don't think a home like that, with its location will be on the market very long. A golf hole is very unique, but no one is going to walk away because of it. It's not like a tennis court that someone would have to rip down, or a pool that you have to fill in. With a golf hole, if they don't love it, they can simply let it grow in and have a beautiful lawn."

I guess it's like a double-edged sword. Like everybody, we built things for our kids and our own enjoyment, never thinking about what the next owner might think.

In our case, we know it takes years for a golf hole to mature. A golfer would understand that and appreciate the value. A non-golfer might look at it and say, "that's stupid."

The maintenance is also something you either love or hate, like a swimming pool, or a large English garden. Beauty is always in the eyes of the beholder.

If you are considering adding a unique feature to your home, there is no clear answer on its resale value. We're not worried yet. We still have months of work ahead of us. With three sons, we still have an attic full of old sports equipment and crayon-drawn artwork that used to hang on the fridge to throw out.

We know that as far as value goes, we might make or lose a little on our house. Our

real problem is getting rid of our STUFF. We need a boss and we need one now.

We have a cellar, an attic and closets full of STUFF. We have been married for more than 30 years, and like most relationships that make it, we know and live with one another's strengths and weaknesses. Like — I can pick-up heavy things, and she knows where the heavy things have to go. I drive really well, but she tells me where to go. (No pun intended). It's OK; it has worked out pretty good... so far. I'm good at some things, she's good at others... except, we both are terrible at throwing stuff away, terrible. We need a boss, like a storm trooper boss.

We are in the attic sitting on the dusty floor trying, really trying, to separate our stuff. I look over at her and she is misty-eyed looking at a toboggan. Come-on, who would ever get misty-eyed thinking about a used toboggan? Now this old and stiff baseball glove, the one my second son wore when he hit a home run, his only home run in midget Little League, remember... who wouldn't get misty eyed about a glove?

We are also struggling with the casing on our kitchen door. Because that's where we made the growth marks and wrote their names on the kid's birthdays. Kids love to get measured. I'm not sure why, but they love that. So I have to tear down the casing around that door and take that with us — those memories I can't leave behind. I'm sure there will be a perfect place for it in the new condo or townhouse.

So our passages continue; gratefully, we are not being forced or rushed like it seemed when we were in our 30s or 40s. We have time to linger with our Grateful Dead T-shirts, and boxes of photos we will someday organize. We have read about the smart and efficient way to get through this downsizing process. What smart steps to take to find a new place, how to clean out your home, fix it up to make it more appealing for the potential buyers. Somehow at this stage, it seems that smart... is way over-rated.

We like lingering with our stuff. The stuff that is generations old; "remember when we bought this toaster?" Stuff that is so richly full of our family's cherished memories. We will get to it, we always have. Maybe not the smartest way, but remember, we are they same couple that built a spectacular USGA designed 135-yard golf hole on our property.

Smart can be way overrated.

Three join Bethlehem Hall of Fame

A doctor, a judge and an Oscar-winning actress were honored as the newest inductees into the Bethlehem Central School District Alumni Hall of Fame.

The late Joseph R. Cannizaro, Richard Jadick, and Eva Marie Saint were inducted during Bethlehem High School graduation ceremonies June 23 at the University at Albany's Recreation and Convocation Center.

Cannizaro was a 1972 graduate of Bethlehem High School and a state Supreme Court Justice. Cannizaro was an active member in the community as well as a Little League coach, religious education instructor

and a member of Albany City School's PTA. Cannizaro died in 2005. His widow, Julia, and their sons Patrick and Kevin accepted the award in his honor.

Dr. Richard Jadick is an osteopathic physician who recently completed a tour of duty in Iraq as a lieutenant commander in the U.S. Navy Reserve. He was assigned as a battalion surgeon and is credited with saving the lives of more than 30 Marines who were wounded during combat in 2004-2005. Jadick was awarded the Bronze Star earlier this year for his heroism and was profiled in a cover story in *Newsweek* magazine.

Most people know Eva Marie Saint for her Oscar-winning role opposite Marlon Brando in "On the Waterfront." She also starred in many other motion pictures, including "A Hatful of Rain," "North by Northwest" with Cary Grant and "Exodus." She is a 1942 Bethlehem High School alumna. Saint also has two stars on the Hollywood Walk of Fame. She is involved in charities such as the Epilepsy Foundation.

This is the second year the district has inducted alumni into its new Hall of Fame. The school plans to display plaques honoring its inductees in the high school lobby once renovations are complete.

AAA warns motorists about flood damage to cars

A car damaged by flood water should not be started, or even cranked, until a thorough inspection and cleaning has been performed by qualified automotive technician, AAA Hudson Valley warned.

"Flood water is a corrosive and abrasive mixture of water and dirt that can force its way into every seam and crevice of an automobile," said Tammy Melo, AAA Hudson Valley's public relations manager. If a car has been completely or partially submerged, many mechanical components will require thorough cleaning and lubrication before the vehicle is put back into operation.

"Most vulnerable are the engine, transmission and drive axles, along with the steering, braking and fuel systems," says Melo.

"Water in the cylinders can cause severe mechanical damage if the engine is turned over without first removing the spark plugs. And, unless completely removed, dirt and other contaminants will cause premature wear of vital components and shorten vehicle life."

After a torrential rain storm has passed and vehicle damage is being surveyed, AAA Hudson Valley recommends that car owners:

Contact their insurance company to determine the extent of coverage before seeking repairs.

Prior to cranking or starting the engine, have a qualified auto technician inspect the engine, transmission and axles, along with the steering, brake and fuel systems for water contamination

Drain flood water from contaminated mechanical systems and flush out any other contaminants with clean water or a solvent, as appropriate.

Drain and replace all contaminated fluids, such as oil, engine coolant, transmission fluid, axle lubricants, power-steering fluid, brake fluid and gasoline or diesel fuel.

"The car's electrical system also is vulnerable to the damaging effects of flood water, and water-sensitive components may need to be replaced," Melo said. "Engine computers and other electronic devices can sometimes be salvaged, but corrosion,

oxidation and failure may occur weeks or even months after the components are cleaned."

There are many parts of the car that are difficult to clean and dry because they are virtually inaccessible. Door locks, window regulators, wiring harnesses, heating and air conditioning components and many small devices are tucked away in hidden spaces. These items may fail at a later date because of contamination by dirty water.



"Were you able to hear the phone ring?" asked Albany County Assistant District Attorney Michael McDermott.

"No, sir," Hart answered.

"I saw a single key inside the front door lock with two or three rubber bands tied around it," said Hart. "There was a red smear on the doorknob and two or three drops of blood on the front porch."

Jurors were then shown the first photos of the inside of the Porco home after the attacks. They listened to Hart intently.

"I walked to the garage door and tried to pull it open," Hart said. "The door was locked so I went back to the front porch."

Hart then called his boss, Frank Costello, to tell him there was blood on the doorknob. Hart agreed to step inside. As Costello and Hart spoke through a speaker phone, Hart told him a dog was barking inside. It was the Porco family dog Barrister who was in the basement behind a small gated doorway.

Costello and Hart continued to speak as Hart began to open the front door.

"I opened the door about a foot then went inside the residence," he said. Hart had his gun in one hand and his cell phone in the other talking to Costello.

"When I stepped inside, a bi-fold closet door was on the ground with big red stains on it," Hart said.

Hart looked right and saw Peter Porco's body lying at the base of the stairs.

"He was on his right side, shirt pulled up, eyes locked open and face covered in blood, dark blood," Hart said. He then told Costello that the Porco home "is a crime scene, call the police." Hart approached Peter Porco to see if there were signs of life, but he was dead. The stairs carpet was heaved up as if someone was struggling to get up. Hart then went to the kitchen and saw blood

on the sliding glass door, items on the floor, a cordless phone with a red light continuously beeping and the phone charger to the side of the door.

"My boss told me to step outside and wait for police," Hart said.

The first officer who arrived on the scene was Bethlehem police Officer Craig Sleurs.

Both officers went into the home and drew their weapons. They combed through the kitchen and the basement and saw Barrister the dog wagging his tail in a friendly manner. There was no sign of struggle downstairs.

A second Bethlehem police officer, Charles Radliff, then arrived and the three quietly went up the inside staircase, stepping over the dead body of Peter Porco at the base of the stairs.

"I noticed that all the doors to the upstairs were closed, and the only light was natural light," Radliff told jurors.

"We searched two rooms, walked down the hallway to the last bedroom (the master bedroom), and walked straight ahead into that bedroom," said Sleurs.

That's when officers saw a person lying lengthwise on the bed and that person was Joan Porco. As officers entered, Joan Porco raised her hand to indicate she was alive.

"I told Det. (Chris) Bowdish there's a second victim and she is still alive and needs EMS," said Sleurs. "I then stepped outside and put police tape around the scene."

Paramedics Kevin Robert and Jim Regan arrived on scene and were swiftly sent upstairs to try and save Joan Porco's life.

"Joan Porco was laying across the bed with very severe trauma to her face, and was moving her arms and legs a bit," Robert told the jury.

Paramedics tried to put an oxygen mask on her to assist her labored breathing but could only hold the mask close to her face because her wounds were so severe. They called a regional

emergency doctor on call for life-threatening matters so they could give Joan Porco special medication to ease her pain and get her to the hospital. They also performed a quick assessment to see if Porco could understand what was happening.

"I asked her to keep her legs still and she did," Roberts said. "I asked her to keep her arms straight and she did that." They then performed a test to score Porco's eye, verbal, and motor abilities. Though she could barely see out of only one working eye that was covered in blood after the

attack, Roberts indicated that she could see and her motor response was good. She could not, however, speak.

Defense Attorney Laurie Shanks questioned Roberts' assessment of Joan Porco because of her poor physical condition at the time due to her injuries from the attack.

"They called and said my parents are dead," Porco stated. Tice told Porco she would get more information and have someone call him back. Porco did not say whether he had spoken with anyone else, including family members.

About an hour later, Porco placed a second call to the Bethlehem dispatch center.

"This is Christopher Porco, and I'm calling back to talk to a detective, I don't remember his name, he never called me back," Porco said. Tice transferred the call to Bethlehem Police Det. Charles Rudolph and immediately began to inquire about Porco's strained relationship with his father, Peter, who was killed in the attack.

"We have been e-mailing about some college loan stuff," Porco said.

Rudolph then told Porco that his mother was being treated in Albany Medical Center. "When you come, I will be there to see if there is anything I can do for you," said Rudolph.

Laurie Shanks, Christopher Porco's attorney, repeatedly asked Tice why she never told Porco the condition of his parents and instead placed the call on hold to find a detective.

"You knew there was an all points bulletin out on Chris-

"You are not a doctor," said Shanks.

"No," said Robert.

"You're not a neurologist," said Shanks.

"No," Robert again replied.

"The bleeding on her eye, face and jaw were not controlled," said Shanks.

"No," Robert said.

"She had such severe pain and low blood levels that she could have been disoriented," Shanks stated.

"That's correct," said Robert.

Shanks went on to say that Joan Porco's left eye was not visible and her right eye was not responding.

Shortly after the assessment at the scene from paramedics, Bethlehem Police Det. Chris Bowdish entered and there seems to be confusion about whether Roberts and Bowdish asked Joan Porco who committed the crime, or whether only Bowdish asked questions. EMS unit commander Dennis Wood testified that he was present when Bowdish began questioning Porco.

"He asked who did this to her and if one of her sons had done this," said Wood. "She nodded yes and shook her head yes."

When asked if Christopher Porco committed the crime, Wood said "she shook her head yes."

Whether or not Joan Porco was coherent when paramedics and officers arrived at Brockley Drive is a key component to the prosecution's case. It is their contention that Joan Porco nodded in the affirmative when she was asked if her son Christopher committed the crime. Christopher Porco could face life in prison if he is convicted on both counts.

The trial will resume again on July 5.

topher Porco, did you not?" asked Shanks.

"I don't recall," said Tice.

"Did you know this young man's father was dead and his mother was in Albany Medical Center?" asked Shanks.

"Yes," said Tice.

Shanks continued to pepper Tice with questions and statements wondering why Tice placed Porco on hold and allowed a detective behind the scenes to decide what to do next.

"What you did was give Det. Rudolph his phone number so Det. Rudolph could talk to Christopher Porco unrecorded," said Shanks.

The brief recorded phone conversations of Porco talking to police officers could be the only time in this trial the jury hears from Porco. It is not likely Porco will take the stand in his own defense, and a six-and-one-half hour videotaped interrogation of Porco by Bethlehem police has been ruled inadmissible.

Porco is accused of murdering his father Peter Porco and the attempted murder of his mother Joan in their Brockley Drive, Delmar, home in 2004. The trial recessed on Thursday for the Fourth of July holiday and will be back in session Wednesday, July 5.

DWIs and telling teenage skateboarders to stop skating near the church, but not experienced homicide detectives.

"Their detective unit has four detectives and no homicide squad," said Kindlon. "There have only been three homicides in the town of Bethlehem in the past 30 years. They are not the FBI or Scotland Yard."

Porco, according to Kindlon, "is one of those guys everybody knows."

"He makes a lot of good decisions, he makes a lot of bad decisions, but everyone who knows him likes him," Kindlon said.

Christopher's mother, Joan Porco, will be called to the witness stand by both the defense and prosecution during the trial.

"She knows Christopher better than anyone, and she knows he is incapable of the kind of violence inflicted on her beloved husband and herself," Kindlon said.

Not according to prosecutor McDermott. He believes Joan Porco indicated to police that Christopher Porco committed the crime by nodding "Yes" when Bethlehem Police Det. Chris Bowdish posed the question as she lay in a pool of blood on her bed with the murder instrument, the ax handle, visible by her side.

"Forcefully, adamantly, she indicates to him and paramedics, yes, it was Chris who did this," said McDermott. "The evidence will show Joan Porco was right and Christopher Porco was her assailant."

Joan Porco has no recollection of that night. The head nod is expected to be a crucial piece of evidence that Judge Jeffrey Berry will include in the trial.

"We can live with it," said Kindlon.

"She was sound asleep in her bed when she is hit with an ax," Kindlon said to the press outside the courtroom when the first day of the trial had concluded. A six-and-one-half-hour videotaped interrogation of Christopher Porco made by the Bethlehem police department the night after the attacks has been ruled inadmissible by the Judge.

"It would have been more convenient to use that tape

during the trial," McDermott said.

The first witness to be called by the prosecution on Thursday will be Michael Hart, a court officer in the office of the Albany branch of the state Appellate Division where Peter Porco was a law clerk. Hart was the first person to see the aftermath of the carnage that occurred at 36 Brockley Drive in Delmar.

"He sees blood on the floor, blood on the door, blood on the filing cabinet and Peter Porco's body lying on the landing of the stairs, legs dangling off the landing, face saturated

in blood," said McDermott.

Prosecutors believe Peter Porco was alive for several hours after the attack, and even tried to dress, walking around the house from the kitchen to the garage and back before finally succumbing to his fatal injuries.

"He used towels, tissue, and toilet paper trying to stem the wounds from his head," McDermott told jurors.

"That's how all the blood gets all over the house."

Judge Berry reminded the jury, "the entire burden of proof always remains on the people."

"The defendant has pleaded not guilty and doesn't have to prove anything," Berry said.

case is made public. Jurors chosen by last Tuesday included a teacher, a paralegal and a bus driver.

McDermott said last week that Joan Porco, the mother of Christopher Porco who survived the brutal attacks, will be called as a witness for both the prosecution and the defense. Joan Porco has no recollection of the attack and has publicly stated that her son is innocent of the crimes he is accused of.

The murder trial is expected to last four to six weeks. Christopher Porco has been escorted into the courtroom daily by his mother Joan, and a few close family members and friends including Lynn Polster, the wife of attorney John Polster, who was considered to be Peter Porco's best friend. John Polster was at the Bethlehem police station the night Christopher Porco was questioned by police. Polster stated in pre-trial testimony that he was representing Christopher at the time of police questioning and wasn't allowed in to see him. Christopher Porco, at the time, however, denied having an attorney.

The six-and-one-half hour interrogation by Bethlehem police was videotaped, and parts were

shown during Porco's pre-trial evidentiary hearings. Berry has not revealed in writing to the public what evidence will be allowed or thrown out for the trial, but the lawyers have been told that the videotape will not be allowed. Berry has made his rulings on most of the evidence, except for the Thruway toll ticket prosecutors believe Porco's fingerprints are on when he allegedly drove from the University of Rochester to Albany and then back again to the Rochester campus the night the crime occurred.

Another potential witness in the trial is Courtney Arduini, the youngest daughter of the late Bethlehem Police Det. Anthony

Arduini. Defense attorneys believe Courtney Arduini and Christopher Porco dated at the time of the attacks, and that Det. Arduini may have allegedly tampered with evidence because of his distrust of Christopher Porco. The Arduini family has since hired an attorney to stop defense attorneys from potentially slandering the late detective's name. Bethlehem's PBA has since defended detective Arduini as an honest and hard working cop whose name should not be slandered by an attorney who is trying to profess his client's innocence.

Porco remains free on bail until the outcome of the trial is decided.

Cool ideas for saving energy this summer



Electricity demand in New York State continues to grow. Once again this summer, when hot weather places even greater demand on New York's electric grid, supplies may be tight, especially in New York City and Long Island. Statewide, the New York Independent System Operator (ISO) forecasts that we should have enough electricity to meet demand. It projects that New York's 2006 peak demand will be 33,295 megawatts (MW), 1,220 MW higher than last summer. Add another 5,993 MW for the required cushion, and the total need for 2006 is 39,288 MW.

In the past few years, new generating plants have come on line, improvements to older plants have been made, and demand reduction programs have been implemented that are helping meet the need. But if we have a prolonged heat wave, the margin between peak demand and available supply could be tight.


What to expect

This summer, you may be asked to help ensure system reliability and the availability of electricity by conserving energy. Your efforts can make a big contribution to the plans of utilities, large-use customers and New York State that go into effect during a heat wave. If everyone reduces the amount of electricity they use just a little, it can make a big difference.

Adequate supply and reliability

On an extremely hot day, New York's electric utilities may take steps to maintain system reliability. Utilities may:


- Issue public appeals to residential customers on the radio and TV.
- Ask large customers to reduce their consumption.
- Ask customers to voluntarily reduce consumption.



What you should do

Using less electricity or shifting usage to off-peak hours will help ensure that there will be an adequate supply for everyone and can help lower your bills.

- Use major appliances early or late in the day.
- Turn off your air conditioner when you leave home or set the thermostat at 78 degrees or higher.



- Use an electric fan to bring in cool air from outside during morning or evening.

- Close curtains or blinds during the day to block out heat from the sunlight.



- Shop for the ENERGY STAR® symbol for energy efficiency when you're in the market for a new air conditioner or major appliances.

Protect your appliances

Using dedicated surge protectors can help protect your appliances from power surges. In the event of a power outage or voltage reduction:

- Disconnect your personal computer, VCR, DVD, TV, microwave and stereo.
- Turn off other appliances that were on to prevent blowing fuses or tripping circuit breakers when power is restored.

Protect yourself

To protect your health and safety if your electricity goes out:

- Check to see if your neighbors have power.
- Notify your utility of the outage.
- Keep a battery-powered radio, flashlight and batteries on hand.
- Have at least one phone in your house that does not require household electricity.
- Have a list of emergency numbers available.
- Keep refrigerator and freezer doors closed as much as possible.

- Register special needs customers (blind, elderly, disabled) with their utility so they receive priority attention.
- Follow all safety precautions for operating portable generators.

During an energy alert, your actions can help maintain the system. If an energy alert is announced, make every effort to reduce your electricity use. Turn off




all non-essential electrical devices, lights and appliances.



New, integrated school hits capacity in its first year

Pre-school has room for everyone - including football hero

After its first year in business, one Delmar woman is pleased to see the fruits of her labor pay off for young children. Her efforts began last September with six students enrolled at the Spotted

Zebra Learning Center in Colonie. The integrated school offers an array of educational programs for children ages 3 to 5, with or without disabilities.

In March, the school reached full capacity with 36 students. The school recently hosted former professional football player Doug Flutie, who was in town performing at Alive at Five in his family band, The Flutie Brothers. Flutie

has a child with autism.

As children end their first year, or choose to continue on through the summer, parents are praising the center, and its founder and Executive Director, Sheri Townsend.

"She has had an extraordinary explosion in vocabulary. Her speech was delayed at an early age, now she doesn't stop speaking," said Wendy Kowalczyk of her daughter's progress at the school.

Kowalczyk enrolled her 5-year-old daughter, Emma, at the Spotted Zebra last year. Ear infections at an early age impaired Emma's ability to develop her speech. After searching of the area for pre-schools, Emma landed at the Spotted Zebra. It was an act of karma, said Kowalczyk.

Twice a day, five days a week,

Emma gets hands-on assistance with her speech from certified teachers and educational therapy professionals. It's that hands-on special education program that Kowalczyk was looking for and couldn't find anywhere else in the region.

Dozens of parents have come to the Spotted Zebra for that reason, said Townsend.

"It's a full day pre-school, day care and has the capacity to serve to kids with special needs," she said.

It also serves the hectic schedules of working parents.

The center provides therapy and education to children with a number of disabilities from 9 a.m. to 5:30 p.m.

From attention deficit disorder to autism of all levels, Townsend's endeavor was to integrate all children in one early learning

program to give them an edge as they move into their respective public school districts.

That's what Townsend sought for her son Alexander. It was her inspiration for starting the Spotted Zebra Learning Center.

Alexander, 4, is autistic. Since his case is mild, Alexander's condition isn't noticeable as he carries on conversations with fellow students and teachers. He addresses them politely, looks them in the eyes and shakes hands. They are things he was unable to do before many children became his classmates, said Townsend.

He shares his success stories with a number of children enrolled at the school.

"The best way for a child that is dealing with autism to learn is to increase (their) relationships with role models," said Townsend. "We worked to create a atmosphere that promotes relationships."

Julian Kintz, 4, was diagnosed with attention deficit hyperactivity syndrome. Julian's mother, Anna, followed her son's speech therapist to the Spotted Zebra, who was hired by the center last year. Allison Woodhouse, 4, "a very typical child," according to her mother Lynn, and is one of Julian's friends at the center.

"Because my daughter is in an environment where there are children with special needs, people (would) ask; are her needs being met?" said Woodhouse. "The school does a fabulous job and the atypical child has their needs met as well."

Allison asked to attend speech therapy with her friend, Julian. Lynn agreed. Allison's speech is getting better, and she enjoys the many activities that go on at the center throughout the day, said Woodhouse.

A staff of 17 teachers and therapists is at the core of the center's success. With a 4-1 student-teacher ratio, children are guided through their individual academic experiences. A typical school day addresses emotional growth, social skills, verbal communication, intellectual awareness and physical capabilities.

As Townsend looks to begin the school's second year, she is looking into establishing a nonprofit arm of the center. Ideal pre-school environments for special needs children are few and far between and costly, she said.

She hopes that in time she will be able to offer financial assistance through the center.







Staying cool doesn't have to burn your wallet

New mascot will offer energy-saving tips

So that people can keep cool in a cost effective air-conditioned house, one brave volunteer will be sweating it out as a state agency mascot next week.

The New York State Energy Research and Development Authority is sending "Socket Boy" on tour. He will make two stops in the area as NYSEERDA wages war on high energy bills this summer.

It's part of the authority's continuing Stay Cool program. Originally called Keep Cool, the program began in 2001 as a program that awarded cash bounties to New Yorkers who turned in their energy-eating air conditioners for state-of-the-art Energy Star certified units.

Scores of people collected on the \$75 cash offer in the first years of the Keep Cool program.

"After two years, we decided not to do it anymore because we began to create a market shift," said NYSEERDA spokesperson, Colleen Ryan. Ryan will be at Socket Boy's side as he makes stops at a Valley Cats game at the Joseph L. Bruno Stadium in Troy on July 10 and at Alive at 5 in Albany on July 13 to spread the word on reducing utility costs.

The program has shifted its focus since 2002. Although its major goal of weeding out old air

conditioning units remains, the focus now is on public outreach. The campaign so far has been successful.

"They (Energy Star air conditioners) are doing pretty well this year. People are just looking for more energy-efficient products and most of our air conditioners are Energy Star," said Guy Jordan, salesman with Earl B. Feiden Inc. on Loudon Road in Latham.

Jordan is the appliance company's manager for the Energy Star program. Monthly, he submits reports of Energy Star sales to NYSEERDA.

This summer alone, Energy Star sales have accounted for 90 percent of the air conditioners sold, he said.

According to NYSEERDA, a new Energy Star room air conditioner uses at least 10 percent less energy than a new non-Energy Star model and cools just as well. By replacing a room air conditioner that is 15 years old with an Energy Star unit, consumers could save up to \$56 per year on utility bills.

The store has been stocked with the most recent NYSEERDA brochures as it kicks off Stay Cool this summer and Socket Boy's tour of the Capital District.

NYSEERDA will be handing out brochures, and making various public appearances this summer to get information out on how New Yorkers can save on utility bills, aside from purchasing

Energy appliances, said Ryan.

By following the energy-saving tips, people could save up to 30 percent on energy bills each month, said Ryan.

Using appliance late or early in

the day, shading rooms, using programmable thermostats and insulating homes are just a few of the recommendation NYSEERDA's Socket Boy will be making next week.






NYRA prepares for another Saratoga season

New York Racing Association officials were looking forward to this year's Saratoga Race Course season at last Monday's press conference in Colonie, but they were also keenly aware that the non-profit organization's hold on the historic thoroughbred track was in jeopardy.

NYRA's contract to operate Saratoga — as well as Aqueduct and Belmont in New York City — ends on Jan. 1, 2008, and president and CEO Charlie Hayward acknowledged it will likely need outside help to put together a successful bid.

"In order to raise the capital we need, we would have to partner with a for-profit entity — a gaming or tote board company," Hayward said.

NYRA contends that it owns the land that Saratoga, Aqueduct and Belmont sit on, while the state claims that it holds ownership, which is why it has put forth a request for proposals in advance of NYRA's contract expiration

date. Bids for the next contract will be accepted as early as the end of July.

"We don't have a specific strategy in place," said Hayward. "One of the things we're dealing with is a tight time frame."

"We all want to protect and preserve the Saratoga we know and love," added NYRA vice president Bill Nader. "If a for-profit organization runs it, we might lose that."

While that process continues, NYRA is focused on the six-week Saratoga season, that begins July 26. Several changes are in store, some of which won't be noticeable to regular track patrons.

The most significant change is the addition of another full-time barn to NYRA's security barn system — which limits race-day contact with horses to trainers and stable employees — and the ripple effect it creates. Barn 29 will now join barns 27 and 28 as race-day housing for horses, giving NYRA 82 permanent stalls.

"We didn't do those (security barns) as well as we could have last year, and (the media) were

quick to point that out and we were quick to remedy that," said Hayward.

Adding a third barn takes away more precious stall space from the many trainers that want to bring their horses to Saratoga. According to NYRA racing secretary P.J. Campo, the number of requests far exceeds the stall space at the track, even if security barns weren't there.

"I get anywhere from 2,300 to 2,500 horses that want to be stabled here, and we only have 1,800 stalls," said Campo, who is entering his second Saratoga season. "Luckily, our local horsemen are willing to share their stalls."

Saratoga Gaming and Raceway — located across Nelson Avenue from the track — is also willing to share its stable space, and that in turn is giving the harness track an unprecedented simulcasting deal. NYRA will house thoroughbreds at the harness track's barn 5, which has room for 47 horses, and the raceway will have live simulcasts of the races taking place across the street for the first time.

"We're good neighbors, and we learned, I think, a really good lesson when the VLTs (video lottery terminals) opened up (at the raceway)," said Nader. "We're not going to lose anything because people are not going to give up the live (racing) experience."

Another significant change involves the stakes races schedule at Saratoga. NYRA has moved the Grade 1 Woodward Handicap from its fall Belmont schedule to the final Saturday of its Saratoga schedule Sept. 2. The Forego will be run the same day as the Woodward.

"It's a pretty strong closing weekend," said Campo.

NYRA also announced that one of Saratoga's prominent stakes races, the Test, will be sponsored by Darley — an international horse breeding and racing operation owned by Dubai ruler HH Sheikh Mohammed bin Rashid al Maktoum. It's the first time a Saratoga stakes race has been sponsored by a company outside the United States.

"I think it's a good deal," said

Nader. "They (Darley) do things in a first-class way, and I think we need to do more of that (race sponsorship)."

Purses will be up across the board at Saratoga. Claiming races will see a \$1,000 increase, while allowance and maiden races receive a boost of anywhere from \$4,000 to \$7,000.

This year's list of giveaways was also announced, as well as a way for track patrons to avoid the long lines associated with the promotions. Among the items that are offered this year are a Todd Pletcher bobble-head doll (July 27), a Saratoga baseball cap (July 30), a Saratoga T-shirt (Aug. 6), a Saratoga sports bag (Aug. 13), a Saratoga travel mug (Aug. 20) and a Saratoga stadium blanket (Sept. 3).

However, if patrons aren't interested in any of the giveaways, they can enter the track through a special "express lane" that will be set up at the East Avenue gate. Vouchers for the promotional items will not be handed out in that line.



well in front of their parents and their community."

The inclusion of a British team continues the tournament's tradition of bringing in European clubs — a tradition that started by chance in the mid 1980s.

"This guy called me up one day to chit chat, and I asked about what. This guy apparently ran a tour company for European soccer clubs," said Clinton. "He had started bringing teams over here — (working) more with Danish and Swedish teams — and they were going to tournaments in places like Disney World (in Orlando). Of course, when they were given these brochures to those places, there were pictures of nice green (soccer) fields. But when they got there, he told me they were like cow pastures. So they were looking for other tournaments to come to, and when they came here, they were impressed with our facilities.

"We also had a connection with a Poughkeepsie club that would go over to Germany for a week every year around Easter," he continued. "They then brought those German clubs over for a

week during the summer, and since the Poughkeepsie club came to our tournament, they started bringing the German teams with them.

"It just grew with personal contacts and little bit of luck," Clinton added.

Getting European teams to come to Clifton Park has gotten more difficult in recent years, though. "We're seeing a decline in this kind of international travel," said Clinton.

Still, with so many outside teams coming into the region for this weekend's tournament, area hotels are being used to house the players and their families. The Gladstone team will be housed at Russell Sage College in Troy.

"We used to house the players with area families, but we gradually phased that out because players want to stay with their families," said Knizek.

The tournament will crown boys and girls team champions in the under-12, under-14, under-16 and the under-17/19 divisions. The under-8 co-ed and under-10 divisions will be non-competitive, with all teams playing an equal number of games and receiving participation certificates.

duty as responsible parents to report this to their school's athletic director or their school board and get rid of the offending coach.

Now, I can understand parents going to an athletic director, a principal or a school board with a complaint about a coach if it has anything to do with physical or verbal abuse against their child. That can't and shouldn't be tolerated at any level. But when it comes to playing time, parents need to remember that high school-level coaches aren't in the business to make everyone happy. They are in the business of winning games and making certain their athletes are fulfilling their academic requirements. That's it.

It would be nice if these school administrators could tell parents as much, but they can't. They must hear every complaint and address them with the coaches in question. That is part of being a responsible administrator. However, how a coach allots playing time should never lead to that

person's dismissal, and school administrators should make it clear to parents that on-field decisions are at the coach's discretion.

Ultimately, parents must remember that as with all things in life, sports are not always fair. Some gifted athletes will have to sit on the bench for a year or more because the coach feels there's

someone more talented on the team playing that same position. The proper thing to do is to accept it, and convince your child that it's equally as important to be a good teammate as it is to be a good athlete and student.

Demanding that a coach play your child or risk being fired is not being a good parent.

Ready for the world again

Preparations begin for annual soccer tournament

What started as a small one-day tournament 30 years ago has grown into one of the oldest and biggest soccer festivals in the United States.

The Rose & Kiernan/Clifton Park International Soccer Tournament returns to the southern Saratoga County town this weekend with more than 120 teams from three nations participating.

"I marvel at how well it's organized and how well it functions today," said Clifton Park Soccer Club president Peter Clinton, who

was one of the three original organizers of the tournament along with Karl Gerstenberger and Pete Sand. "We sit and wait for something to go wrong, and it never seems to go wrong."

The games will once again be spread out between the Shenendehowa school district campus and neighboring Clifton Common. Twenty-two fields are in the process of being set up to accommodate all the action, which starts with preliminary games Friday night and continues in earnest Saturday and Sunday.

"When we first started, the Commons didn't even exist. We had all of our games at Shen spread out all day," recalled Clinton.

Most of the participating clubs

hail from the Capital District, central and southern New York, Vermont and western Massachusetts. There will be six clubs coming from the Canadian provinces of Ontario and Quebec, as well as an under-19 boys team from Gladstone, England, just outside London.

"In speaking with the folks over there (in Gladstone), they feel they have a pretty strong team," said tournament organizer Rick Knizek. "I don't know how they'll compare with the other teams (in their division) because we've had European teams come over and do well in the past, and we've had other teams come over and not do so well."

"The competition has improved a lot since we first

started," said Clinton. "(The club programs are) much better organized than they first were. They were basically high school teams from places like Burnt Hills and Clifton Park that were hastily organized back then."

Gladstone will have to contend with under-17 and under-19 teams from Clifton Park Soccer Club and Clifton Park Premier — all of which are looking to keep the tournament title in their home town.

"Over the years, the highlight for the Clifton Park kids is the Clifton Park Tournament," said Knizek. "It's the last tournament of the competitive season for a lot of the kids, and they want to do

Playing time is not a parent's concern



There was a time when high school coaches could do their job without having parents question their decisions.

Sadly, that time ended somewhere around 1990.

That became clear last week when the Brittonkill school board voted 4-3 with one abstention to not renew Tamarac girls varsity soccer coach Craig Gilbert's contract. Somehow, one of the nation's all-time winningest coaches couldn't keep his job because someone apparently complained about the lack of playing time one of his daughters was receiving.

In case you've been living un-



der a rock, this isn't the first time a coach has come under fire from parents for being unfair to his players. Usually, it comes from a small group of parents who see their children as being the next Peyton Manning, Michael Jordan, Derek Jeter or Mia Hamm, and yet they're not playing because the coach doesn't agree.

The simple and correct answer is, they're not playing because it's the coach's decision, but these

parents aren't satisfied with that. They want their child to be given an equal opportunity to play.

What these parents don't realize is that equal playing time ends when the child enters high school. Coaches may say they don't care about wins and losses as long as their teams improve, but the bottom line is their success is at least partially tied to winning percentage. If a varsity or junior varsity coach doesn't win many games, that person may not be around the following year. So even though effort is valued, as Heron Edwards famously said, "You play to win the game."

Therefore, coaches have to make hard decisions as to who plays and who sits. You might not

think it's fair, especially if it's your child that is on the bench, but a coach must evaluate the talent he/she has and put together the best team out of that group of athletes. If the coach thinks someone else is better at a certain position than your child, that's who plays. And usually, if a coach does a good job of explaining it to your child, that athlete will accept his/her role and do what's best for the team.

Still, that's not good enough to satisfy some parents. They see that coach's decision as an indictment against their child and a deliberate attempt to prevent their offspring from receiving a college scholarship. Therefore, it's their

Finding local flavor

Area restaurants seek New York products for their tables

From pasture to plate, as state agricultural initiatives expand, area farmers and wholesalers are getting wined and dined with their own products.

This year marks the 10th anniversary of the state Department of Agriculture and Markets' Pride of New York program.

The program was developed to promote and support the sale of agricultural products, as well as food products processed, within the state. Since starting the program, Pride has enrolled more than 1,000 farmers, processors, retailers, distributors, restaurants and related culinary and support associations. Its goal in 2006 is to land another 1,000 members, bringing its membership up to 2,006.

After years of bolstering an entirely in-state food chain, program directors are now finding that Pride has grown roots of its own. And, area chefs are moving more of their menu away from imported meats and products in favor of foods grown and raised locally.

"We are sitting in the middle of some of the richest farm land

in the country and the restaurants here have Sysco trucks sitting out in front of them," said Dan Spitz, head chef of the Beekman Street Bistro in Saratoga Springs.

July 14 marks Spitz's Bistro's one-year anniversary. The 31-year-old moved to Saratoga's Beekman Street art district from Oregon and from the beginning he set out to use locally grown and raised meats and produce. His menu includes select grade pork raised at Flying Pigs Farm in Shushan, Washington County, in the Battenkill River valley, produce from Denison Farms in Schaghticoke, and 18 other local farms.

"I use 85 percent local products. All of my stuff comes from within 50 miles of Saratoga Springs," he said.

Spitz is one of a growing number of chefs who have become members of the pride program in the last year seeking locally grown goods or offering their expertise.

Other programs, such as Cornell Cooperative Extension's Farm-to-Chef Program, have been linking chefs with local growers for years. But the state pride program pairs Washington and Saratoga producers with New York City chefs and restaurants. Trucks roam the North Country gathering its seasonal bounties, and shipping them downstate.

The program has been met with great success.

Locally, it's more of a grass roots effort. Spitz, other chefs and produce wholesalers have been looking to locally grown produce under their own steam.

Jerry Decker, of Decker's Produce Co. Inc., packed away 25 boxes of locally grown berries last Wednesday morning. His wholesale markets cover three points of the state. He sells to distributors who in turn sell to farm stands, markets and restaurants.

He often eats at the Springwater Bistro on Union Avenue in Saratoga Springs. Like the Beekman Street Bistro, Springwater utilizes locally grown meats and produce in its dishes, some of which are distributed through Decker's market in Albany. The restaurant bases its daily changing menu on what is available from local farms, according to the restaurant.

"I'm a big promoter of locally grown products. That's the way to go, when it's in season," said Decker.

Nearly 10 years ago — the same year the pride program kicked off — Decker distributed his products to more than 250 restaurants in the area. He opted to go wholesale when the daily grind of delivery became too much. Now, with pride in full swing, he sells locally grown and statewide-marketed goods to distributors and restaurants — like Springwater — which are more than willing to buy. Some

even demand local produce.

"Most of the people are up beat about it (Pride)," said Decker. "A lot of restaurants don't care if it's homegrown or California leaf lettuce. However, there are other restaurants that, if they can buy local foods, that's how they like to do it."

In 2006, Pride is making an effort to reach out to more local chefs as the program looks to expand the locally grown food chain, said Jessica A. Chittenden, state Department of Agriculture & Markets spokeswoman.

"We are allowing them to utilize our database of members to

get a variety of meats, dairy and flowers for center pieces, the whole gambit," she said. "We have a wide range of members, and all utilize the program differently. You don't have to fit into that cookie-cutter mold."

Spitz has offered his services as a Pride member and connoisseur of locally grown products by featuring dishes and demonstrations at local markets using local foods. When Pride has the opportunity to bring in chefs like Spitz to prepare dishes, it typically encourages other restaurants to make changes in their menu to include locally grown produce, said Chittenden.

farmers by providing professional help with marketing and advertising that builds awareness of their goods to help expand market share. She said their promotions are valuable because farmers are usually outside performing farm-related work and lack experience and time for marketing, which needs to be done.

"I think the Pride in New York label is a quick way to distinguish food grown in New York, if they want to buy local," Small said, adding that many vendors around the state want to buy New York products. "When people eat a great apple and realize it is from New York, the awareness of New York as an agricultural state grows."

Small also pointed out that the program combats the perceptions of people who don't realize that agriculture is an important part of New York's economy.

"Many people downstate don't immediately think about New York as an agricultural state," Small said. "It's amazing because I think the quality of New York state agricultural products is exceptional."

The Flying Pigs Farm sells rare breed pork, eggs and roasting chickens. Small said the pride program helps her sales in New York City, where her farm competes against farms from around the country.

"Let's take some of that money being spent in those restaurants and keep it in New York," Small said. "If Pride of New York links them, it's really going to help the upstate economy. The more we can

keep in the state, the better off we are."

Some farmers don't directly benefit because they do not have the same need to market their products.

For example, most dairy farmers around the state, such as Cobleskill's Richard Bates, sell their milk to co-ops. There is little to be gained from advertising milk since the federal government regulates prices.

Other farmers also noted that they don't realize much benefit from the program because they sell their products at roadside stands or in local farmers markets. People shop those markets expressly because the goods are locally grown, so advertising to them is like preaching to the choir.

Cobleskill farmer Judy Pangman said her Sweet Trees Farm has been a member of the program for seven years, but she and her husband do not do too much with the state program.

"It has not done too much for us, but that is because we have not done too much with it," Pangman said. "It is more because we have not had to do a lot of advertising because the market we go to does a lot of advertising."

Pangman sells grass-fed beef, pork, eggs and maple syrup at the Troy Farmers Market each week.

What began as a part-time occupation for the Pangmans has grown enough that her husband was able to quit his other job to concentrate on being a full-time farmer.

"You can't make tons of money farming," Pangman said. "But we're happy. It's a good life."
