

A trial's silent witness: the yellow Jeep

A yellow Jeep Wrangler owned by Christopher Porco was spotted by neighbors racing through the Brockley Drive neighborhood months before a brutal ax attack left Peter Porco dead and his wife, Joan, severely injured.

The same yellow Jeep was observed by toll collectors before and after the Nov. 15, 2004 crime, and a neighbor said he saw it in the family driveway the morning of the attacks.

Was the yellow Jeep that Porco purchased in the spring of 2004 the beginning of his undoing?

Already on ballot, pair vie for Independence Party approval

In the September primary, Independence Party voters in Bethlehem will get an early chance to vote for the candidate of their choice in the race for town justice.

Democrat Ryan Donovan and Republican Brian Murphy are the major party candidates on the ballot this November. Both candidates are also trying to win the Independence Party nod Sept. 12.

Donovan was appointed to the town justice seat in June, replacing Frank Milano, who was appointed to the State Court of Claims by Gov. George Pataki.

"It was a great honor to be appointed town justice," said Donovan, who calls his new job "fascinating." "You truly have a chance to make a difference in a person's life," said Donovan.

After hearing more than 100 criminal cases in one day as Town Justice, Donovan hit the campaign trail for a few door-todoor visits with voters.

"I won't lose for a lack of trying," Donovan added.

Milano defeated Donovan in the last election for the justice seat. The town board appointment for Donovan was not unani-



Developers pitch housing proposal for Slingerlands

Bethlehem's new reassessments are having little effect on new housing development in

Ed Kleinke of Kleinke Associates met with the town's development and planning committee last week to update the group on an application for 19 new single-family homes near Couse Lane and

Stockbridge Road in the Slingerlands Fire District. The homes will be in the Bethlehem school district and will use the town water and sewer services.

The new home lots, if constructed, will be an average of two acres each spread out over 64 acres of land. Kleinke said much of the overall acreage is unusable.

"Some of our struggles include limited access, a lot of topography, a significant ravine and limited access to Couse Lane," said Kleinke.

Thirteen acres are considered wetlands, and about 10 acres are on a steep slope, leaving a total of 38 usable acres for development. There will be a 50-foot buffer setback for any proposed subdivision to keep the new properties away from wetlands.

"We have been looking at different ways to approach this subdivision," said Kleinke.

One of the options the group Kleinke..

is considering is a "clustered conservation approach."

Another concern brought out at the committee meeting was emergency access for police and fire vehicles to the new proposed site.

"Full access for emergency response should be considered for everything," said Slingerlands Fire Chief Jason Tice. "It's important not to have any type

of limitations in there."

One of the main concerns is to avoid the use of Couse Lane for direct access to the new proposed development.

The property is currently owned by Rose Watkins. The next step for the developers will be to move into the formal review process.

"We'd like to keep moving ahead with this," said Kleinke.

Many permit approvals are still necessary, including formal town approval for the project, before any construction can occur.

A host of new candidates from Averill Park to Slingerlands will be squaring off in both the September primary and the November general election for the 108th District Assembly seat being vacated by Pat Casale, R-Troy.

Kenneth Preston, Tim Hammond, Ronald Coalts and Martin Reid are all vying for the seat. Except for Reid, who will be on the November ballot as a Republican, all six candidates are attempting to gain other major and minor

In the Democratic primary. Hammond, Reinhardt, Gordon and Preston will be squaring off. Reid and Reinhardt are both

"This district fits me very well," said Reid.

Keith Hammond is another Renssalaer County Legislator running for Assembly. Hammond operates a 103-acre farm in Poestenkill and is serving his second term in the legislature. His list of accomplishments include calling for a repeal of the sales tax on gasoline and introducing a Right to Farm Law to encourage local farming.

William Reinhardt has been campaigning and putting signs up throughout the district the past several weeks. He is currently a member of the Averill Park school board. Reinhardt said seeing the state budget process and how it affects his school district back home is one of the main reasons

he decided to run for the Assembly seat.

"I've watched people in the legislature mandate we spend more, and then choke us by not giving us any more money," said Reinhardt. "This puts districts in a bad spot."

Reinhardt said area state legislators are also to blame for the district's woes.

"(Sen. Joseph) Bruno (R-Brunswick), hasn't been an advocate for us, and Casale hasn't been an advocate for us," Reinhardt said.

The other candidates for the 108th district include Hammond. an Averill Park resident; Preston, who resides in Slingerlands; and Coalts, who lives in Troy.

Primary day is Sept. 12. The 108th Assembly District comprises 14 towns and parts of four counties including Albany, Columbia, Rensselaer and Greene. The towns of Bethlehem and Coeymans in Albany County are in this district.

Candidates Hammond and Coalts could not be reached in time for this story.



Our sympathy goes out to both the Arduini and Cox families. We would also offer sympathy to Joan Porco and her elder son, Johnathan. We sincerely hope they will now be able to rebuild their lives.

We also hope Christopher Porco is able to receive some help during his prison stay, which could be up to 50 years to life, when he is sentenced Oct. 25.

The Porco case rocked this sleepy suburban community to the core. No one likes to believe that patricide and potential matricide would happen in a community like this.

Peter Porco was a highly respected law clerk for Judge Anthony Cardona, and Joan Porco was a speech therapist for the Scotia school district. Both Porcos had strong ties to the community and were highly regarded in turn.

Castro's failing health sparks memory

When he walked into a room in 1959 New York, Fidel Castro looked like, well, Fidel Castro.

Béarded, tall, dressed in combat fatigues and sporting a Havana cigar, he looked like a successful athlete who had just thrown a 20-game season.

In the Pulitzer room, with its stained-glass ceiling, he wore the authority of a guerrilla leader who had won his war and taken over.

It would be terrific to say that I had met the man and smoked a cheroot with him. Makes a great anecdote, but it's not true.

There were about 80 of us, students at Columbia journalism school, and we gathered to ask questions, many of which had already been asked.

He kept the field hat on for a while as he told us about his fight against Fulgencio Batista and how "12 men with 12 rifles" had formed the core of the revolution, which he led from the Sierra Maestra.

He also told the world and us that he was the leader of a socialist movement and a socialist government. He spoke to us in Spanish and one of his uniformed staff translated into English.

He promised free elections, the desire for good relations with America and the rest of the world.

Fidel had come to New York to speak at the United Nations, talk to the world and the New York press, and, at the behest of his New York Times friend, reporter Herb Matthews, speak to a class at Columbia

He sat erect in his chair at the seminar table. His voice, in retrospect, sounded like Robert DeNiro's when he played young Vito Corleone in "Godfather II."

He was a dark-haired presence, his eyes focusing intently on his student interrogators. Many of the women found him attractive. But, of

course, he was preaching to the choir—a then self-styled liberal and socialist, delivering his message in one of the bastions of academic liberalism in America.

At that time, still wearing his socialist halo atop his military fatigue heat, he said he wanted to walk up New York's west side, home to many Hispanics, and talk to the people.

That's when Herb Matthews of the New York Times, who had gone up into the mountains when Fidel was a wanted man and reported on his determination to defeat Batista, called a halt to the proceedings. Herb was one of the many New York editorial writers and reporters who had bought into Castro's idealist, messiah act. For a brief time, he enjoyed journalistic admiration because he had an inside relationship with Castro.

It took about an hour, our meting with Castro and the future "running dogs of capitalism," as Chinese communist dictator Mao Tse Tung termed the American and western press.

Like others, I shared the socialist hero perception of Castro.

But, as we were to learn, his commitment to true freedom for his country was an illusion.

It was only two months later, in July of 1959, according to news accounts, that Castro's chief intelligence officer, Ramon Valdes, contacted the KGB in Mexico City. This triggered the subsequent arrival of 100 Spanish-speaking "advisers" in Cuba.

We fast forward here: February 1960, "Cuba makes a deal to buy oil from USSR." "U.S. refuses to refine Russian crude oil." "U.S. severs relations with Castro government." "Cuba signs deal to get extensive economic and military aid from Soviets."

I was working in Rhode Island at the time, and reading the headlines in The Providence Journal, I shared the general surprise and disgust at Castro's surge to the far left.

June 1960: "Eisenhower cuts Cuban sugar import by \$7 million." "Cuba seizes \$850 million worth of U.S. properties and businesses."

Talking to Columbia classmates, we agreed that the socialist movement had indeed been a ruse and Castro was becoming everything he and we had despised: a Banana Republic dictator.

The metamorphosis continued, and the headlines told the story.

"Castro nationalizes industry and properties owned by Cubans and non-Cubans." "Castro collectivizes agriculture and enacts policies to benefit the people." "A million Cubans emigrate to Florida."

And, Jan. 3, 1961: "Eisenhower breaks all ties to Cuba."

And so it went. My ex-Marine and J-school buddy, Chuck Daly, told me, "To think I considered joining this guy in the mountains when he was fighting Batista!"

By 1961, President Kennedy's government was engaging in a semisecret campaign to remove Castro from power. In April of that year, CIAtrained Cuban exiles invaded their homeland at the Bay of Pigs. Their expedition failed after Jack Kennedy changed his mind and withheld American air support. Four hundred of the exiles were killed in the fighting. One thousand were captured.

The "Bay of Pigs" invasion turned into a disaster, and Castro reveled in his triumph. He had stood up to "Yankee imperialism" and won.

His people cheered the victory and united behind him. We thought at the time that Kennedy had missed a big opportunity by calling off the American fighters and bombers.

Then the inevitable march to genuine Communist dictatorship culminated in a typically long speech by Castro.

On May 1 — May Day in Moscow and elsewhere in the Soviet bloc — Castro announced to thousands in Havana that Cuba was a socialist nation and abolished free elections. So much for the statements made to the United Nations, the world and a class at Broadway and 116th Street in New York City in 1959.

The following Dec. 2, Castro declared that Cuba was a Marxist-Leninist government and that his country was adopting Communism.

The reaction here was one of

great sadness. The conservative editorial writers were crowing: "We told you so!"

I guess I felt more disappointed than betrayed.

The beautiful island country, with all of its tragic history, including colonization by the Spanish, the dominance of western sugar companies and brutalization by an unending series of tyrants like Batista, was still under the yoke, even though the people remaining after the middle-class exodus, still regarded Fidel as a hero.

I thought then of Jose Marti. He was the 19th-century Cuban patriot, journalist and poet known as the apostle. He gave his life in the struggles with the Spanish. I thought then that in some celestial place for poets and patriots, Marti must have suffered yet another disappointment because of the lost opportunity embodied in Fidel Castro's betrayal of a great cause.

Like others who watched the Cuban tragedy unfold, I had bought into the "socialist" hero perception experienced that day in 1959 in a classroom in New York and had come away impressed.

I remember thinking that day as Castro was leaving to walk up Broadway to shake hands with and light up occasional cigars for Latinos: "He is 10 years older than most of us. He's young, committed and cares about his people and their freedom. Sort of like Jesus in fatigues and combat boots."

You would think a guy from a sensible place like Vermont would have known better.

But I didn't. And neither did Herb Matthews, whose professional star plummeted as Castro became our enemy.

These things came to mind recently when Havana reported Castro as stepping down "temporarily" at age 80, to undergo surgery for a serious problem.

You know, I have always wanted to have a drink in Havana.

Maybe a Cuba libre.



Voorheesville tackles the issue of growth

Voorheesville is a small semirural village sandwiched inbetween sprawling suburbia. At a board meeting last Tuesday, residents came out in force to try to keep it that way.

Residents of Locust Drive and the adjoining Scotch Pine development voiced concern at the Aug. 15 sessionregarding the construction of the Colonie Country Club housing development.

"The concern is that the property lines for the proposed homes are directly on the property lines of the adjacent homes on Scotch Pine, and the plan shows absolutely no green space whatsoever," said resident Michael Canfora.

Early last month, the town of New Scotland had agreed to move toward a renewable water contract with the developers, which would allow them to buy up to 20,000

petition with 80 signatures was presented, calling for the village to not grant water to the proposed development unless the builder leaves a buffer between the new homes and the existing homes along the Locust Drive-Scotch Pine corridor.

The board said the village had no knowledge of being approached by the town to purchase water, but pointed out that an approximately \$50,000 shortfall in revenues could be made up by the selling of water.

Many of the residents said they would rather pay higher water bills than have new development thrust upon them.

"I am also concerned that if you do that and open up or create a precedent where you're giving people outside of the village water, when will you stop giving water?" said Canfora, who said more residents would also put a bigger burden on local schools.

This is the first time that any of us has heard anything about this," said Mayor Robert Conway. Conway said that when the developer came to the village requesting water, they were told then that they were expected to have at least a 50-foot buffer between their development and existing back yards.

Trustee John Stevens added, "They are talking over there, but they are not talking to us. This is your town not talking to your village."

Conway added that until the town comes to them with specific drawings and plans, they cannot initiate any action, but he said he appreciates the concerns of the petitioners.

"I understand many of you bought your houses because of the vistas and privacy that your homes afford. Although we can't

> Another petition, signed by many of the same residents as the first, stated concerns about a possible extension of Locust Drive, which currently ends in a cul-desac. The petition asks that the village not permit the extension because of concerns about safety and increased congestion.

David Moreau, who owns the land on the other side of the basketball court, has requested seven water taps for new-home construction. The village has told Moreau that he must go to the town of New Scotland, which will work with the village to establish a water district.

Moreau has an easement on the village property and is permitted to drive around the basketball court and on to the cul-de-sac at the end of Locust Drive. Some residents have voiced concern for the children who play at the end of the street.



Fuel of the future? Governor's legislation ushers in ethanol era

With gas prices on the rise, all evels of government are earching for a means to limit ependency on foreign oil arough legislation promoting research evelopment of alternative fuels. On July 31, Gov. George E. ataki signed legislation that will

iake renewable fuels more vailable at gas stations across ie state, placing New York at the refront of a movement to get way from the United States' ependency on foreign oil.

The new law will exempt enewable fuels from the prosions of franchise agreements etween fuel providers and retail ervice stations. Before the law, ervice stations were not allowed purchase or sell fuels from ources other than their main disibutor. Since most major fuel s-tributors do not offer E85 or ther renewable fuels, the ontracts the service stations ntered into prohibited them om offering renewable fuels to ieir cus-tomers.

The bill will allow gas station wners such as Christian King, wner of three area Mobil ations, to sell alternative fuels, ich as E85. E85 is the term for otor fuel that is made of 85 ercent ethanol and 15 percent

In the United States, 90 percent of ethanol is produced from corn.



Farms to fuel: Ethanol plants could up demand for state crops

With multiple ethanol-producing facilities planned throughout New York, the state's agricultural industry could be on the brink of an economic boom in the years to

The New York State Farm Bureau had been working to create an ethanol-producing industry in the state for more than a decade said Peter Gregg, spokesman for the farm bureau.

"And all of a sudden it's exploded over the past year," said Gregg, "thanks to \$3-a-gallon gas."

Ethanol is a renewable biofuel produced by the fermentation of plant sugars, typically produced by corn and grain products. Ethanol can be mixed with gasoline to be used in specially adapted vehicles. About 200,000 vehicles in New York can run on E85, a fuel mixture

> Recent New York legislation has been promoting the research, production and use of ethanol. Gov. George Pataki recently signed into legislation a bill that would allow service stations to purchase or sell fuels such as E85 from sources other than their main distributor. Since most major fuel distributors do not offer E85 or other re-newable fuels, the contracts the service stations enter into prohibit them from offering renewable fuels to their customers.

> The legislature's 2006-07 budget included a \$5 million tax credit for the production of biofuels by companies and also for \$20 million in funding for the con-struction of a pilot cellulosic ethanol plant. As opposed to normal ethanol, produced from sugars and starches, cellulosic ethanol is derived from cellulose found in urban, agricultural and forestry waste.

Two Amsterdam businessman recently applied for a grant to fund the construction of a cellulosic ethanol plant in Montgomery

Along with the Shelby plant, plants planned for Fulton and Seneca Falls would be eligible for the tax credit based on the amount of biofuel they produce. 





People in Capital District make use of energy technologies

the gas station when you can make biodiesel at home for 80 cents a gallon? Why pay for electricity from National Grid, when you can become a mini-energy producer yourself?

These are the types of things that some local residents are doing to conserve energy and do their part to save the environment and cut costs.

Residents choose to become more energy conscious for a variety of reasons, including the rising cost of energy, a love for energy-saving technologies, or even anti-war sentiments. They are doing everything from switching to more efficient light bulbs and installing insulation to making biodiesel and using energyproducing solar panels.

Edward Stander lives in Delmar Why pay \$3.50 for diesel fuel at and teaches environmental technologies at SUNY Cobleskill, His dream is to live "off the grid" by creating his own power resources from things like wind generators and solar panels.

> There are alternate ways of doing things. I hate being a part of a large grid," he said.

> Stander said he has successfully converted a lab room and office at SUNY Cobleskill to run totally off the grid.

> Stander has been able to cut energy costs in his home by installing some unusual devices. He has a tankless water heater, which works by heating the water as it flows through the pipes. This way the water is not being constantly heated in a tank.

"It never leaks, it takes less

energy to run and way less room," making biodiesel. he said.

Stander also has an inverter in his home that charges large batteries, which could provide his home with electricity for three days in the event of a power outage. Eventually, he wants National Grid to allow him to run his home on batteries during peak hours to save money.

Stander said he has the most energy-efficient furnace and air conditioner in the world, he drives the first hybrid Toyota Prius sold in the Northeast, which gets 45 miles per gallon, rides an electric scooter that goes 23 mph and gets 30 miles on a charge, and uses an electric lawn mower.

Stander said he started doing these things not to save the environment, but to save money. "Turns out they go hand in hand,"

Stander doesn't think he is doing anything that weird. "My feeling is anyone who wants to can solve the energy crisis simply by doing the right thing.'

Vischer Ferry resident Joanne Coons is also doing her part to help solve the energy crisis. Coons and her husband, Paul, make biodiesel in an old barn and are the owners of some very high-tech equipment.

Coons, who is an earth science and living environment teacher at Shenendahowa High School, has two sons and is against the war in the Middle East. She said she wanted to do something to decrease this country's dependence on foreign oil, so she bought an old diesel car for \$350 and started

"The first diesel engine in 1890 was made to run on peanut oil, so I'm not doing anything weird here," Coons said.

Coons and her husband go to Chinese restaurants every Sunday night to collect discarded oil. She then starts the process of making the fuel by filtering the oil and mixing it with methanol and lve and heating it.

Coons said it takes about three hours to make a batch of biodiesel, and it is a labor-intensive process. The jugs of ingredients are heavy and the chemicals are fairly unsafe.

"I want to stress than not just anyone can do this. Safety is very important. These chemicals shouldn't touch your skin or be extensively breathed in," Coons said.

The Coons have already made about 200 gallons of biodiesel. One problem with this type of fuel is that it congeals in the winter, so it can't be used in colder months.

Coons said it cost about \$2,000 to set up their operation, but they never have to go to the gas station except in winter months, and their fuel costs about 80 cents per gallon.

Besides making her own fuel, Coons has solar panels on the roof of her barn that heat her water. There is a back-up tank in the basement that turns on when it senses when the water in the solar tank isn't hot enough.

Coons also has two huge photovoltaic panels built in the back of her 2-acre property. The panels are not visible from her home because of the trees.

The power company buys the excess energy created from the photovoltaic panels and gives users a credit. In essence the homeowner becomes a small

power supplier, said Coons.

"Seventy-five percent of our power comes from these panels.' Coons said.

The panels cost \$20,000 to install and were paid for in part through tax rebates and a grant from the New York State Energy Research and Development 'Authority.

Spokesman for NYSERDA Ray Hull said there are many programs that provide incentives for people looking to make their homes more energy efficient. Two of them are the Get Energy Smart program and the Power Naturally program.

The Power Naturally program is designed for people, like Coons, who are looking to install an alternative energy source. Hull said NYSERDA would substantially cut the cost of those installations through this program.

Hull said the first step in the Get Energy Smart program is having licensed professionals conduct an energy audit on the home for about

"Every bit of the home is looked at, from the foundation to the attic, and every mechanical device in between," Hull said.

The homeowner is presented with a list of recommendations such as more insulation, updating the HVAC system, and caulking places where air goes in and out of the home.

The homeowner can do everything or nothing on the list, and NYSERDA helps with the financing. NYSERDA has a loan program that gives homeowners a low rate and provides a 10 percent discount for people who are writing the check themselves. If the homeowner meets the state's lowincome guidelines, NYSERDA will pay for half of the cost.





Porco appeal is under way

BY JIM CUOZZO

Attorneys for convicted killer Christopher Porco expect to file an appeal to overturn his murder conviction by the beginning of next month.

"We are moving with deliberate speed here," said Terence Kindlon, Porco's attorney since his client was first investigated by Bethlehem police in 2004.

An Orange County jury delivered a guilty verdict, Aug. 10, against the 23-year-old for murdering his father, Peter Porco, and attempting to murder his mother, Joan, inside their 36 Brockley Drive home in Delmar on Nov. 15, 2004. The verdict was reached by jurors in less than six hours following a trial that stretched over more than seven weeks.

"We are assembling a motion to set aside the verdict,"

Although overturning murder convictions is quite rare, Kindlon said he first believed he had information from a reliable source that, if proven. would almost guarantee a granting of the motion.

"The silver bullet appears to testimony until jurors be an illusion," said Kindlon. "It turned out that the information could not be confirmed."

> Despite the setback, work toward an appeal continues, and preparations for pre-sentencing memorandums will be filed prior to Porco's sentencing date of Oct. 25.

> Porco's attorneys are also poring over thousands of pages of trial transcripts to work on their client's appeal. Kindlon said he is planning to bill the

county for the cost of the transcripts.

"Chris is an indigent," said Kindlon. "He has no money of his own."

Kindlon said he believes the cost of the transcripts will be close to \$12,000.

Chip Dott, executive deputy comptroller in Albany County comptrollers office, said the cost to Albany taxpayers for prosecuting the Christopher Porco case is already at \$71,000,

which doesn't include the \$12,000 bill to cover the cost of trial transcripts.

'We haven't seen those bills yet," said Dott.

The latest estimate also doesn't include the cost of hotel rooms in Goshen during the month of August for prosecution witnesses and members of the Albany County district attorney's staff.

Meanwhile, Kindlon's client is serving his time inside the county jail.

"I have other lawyers in the office who have been out to see him," said Kindlon. "He is doing well, as can be expected under the circumstances."

Porco could face anywhere from 50 years to life in prison, if given the maximum sentence by Orange County Supreme Court Judge Jeffrey Berry.



Jefferson Parish sees baseball field as a haven

Two days later, their lives were turned upside down by Hurricane

Now, many of those same players are in Clifton Park this week trying to become the first team to win both the 14- and 15-year-old division championships. And though their lives are still not

what they once were, the players stuff that could blow away ... are happy to be back together.

"Katrina hasn't affected our baseball team in any way," said pitcher/infielder Harold Toscano. We're not back in our houses, but baseball-wise, everything's fine. We're just back to normal."

Jefferson Parish had a lot of success last year. Not only did the 14-year-old team win the World Series, but the 15-year-old division team coached by Bill Babin also claimed the national title.

Babin's team was home from its championship run in Abbeyville when Katrina began bearing down on the Louisiana-Mississippi coastline. Meanwhile, the 14-year-old division team was making its run to the title.

when the coach called me and told me they had won the 14-yearold World Series," said Babin.

As the hurricane drew closer, flights were no longer allowed to land at Louis Armstrong International Airport, which is located in Jefferson Parish. So, the 14-yearold All-Stars were diverted to Dallas, where they watched the destruction of New Orleans on TV.

"They were showing around Lake Ponchatrain, which we don't really live by," said catcher Mason Katz. "So, we really didn't think it was all that bad until we got home and realized that we couldn't go home."

Like most of the New Orleans metropolitan area, Jefferson Par-"I was home pulling in all of my ish — located west of downtown

New Orleans - was heavily damaged by Katrina. However, it was spared the worst of the flooding because it was located far enough away from the levees that breached along the canals in the city. That allowed its residents to begin the cleanup process earlier than those in neighboring par-

"Jefferson Parish was the first one that was hit that was really back up and running," said Babin. "So most of the people were able to get into their homes, get FEMA trailers and put them in their front yards or live on the upstairs while they were trying to get their downstairs redone."


Life's lessons are on a baseball diamond

While the Bureau of Labor Statistics cite the median annual earnings, including tips and

commission, as \$19,800 for hairstylists and cosmetologists, several school owners said that number was very low. Cosmetology is typically a cash-based business, and there may be a discrepancy between actual salaries earned and those reported.

Paul cited a New York pubstylists earned \$20,000-\$30,000 a

year, and said that figure has possibly doubled. Cook talks of a colleague who earns a six-figure pay-check. Both warn that, while there is money to be made in the field, dues must be paid and a steady clientele developed.

"There is no limit to Another major draw to the field what you can do. If you put in 100 percent, then that's what you'll get out of it," said Cook. "It is a lucrative business but not day one." She added that, to be successful, those working in the field need to be willing to put in the hours, hone their skills and stay abreast of the constant changes in the industry.
