

Increased requirements increase teachers' work loads

he heart of teaching has not changed dramatically since the early 1990s, but what is required of a teacher before he or she can be in charge of a classroom has.

Starting at the college level, those studying to enter the world of teaching are feeling the pressure of increased expectations and standards.

"The pressure on the K-12 teachers and school leaders to accomplish more has increased over the last several decades, particularly in associations with more systematic assessments of student performance as required for the last decade or so - in New York state and with the No Child Left Behind Act," said Connell Frazer, dean of the school of education at Russell Sage College in Troy.

Frazer said that the state now requires colleges to seek accreditation for all teacher preparation programs. There are three accrediting organizations. They are the Regents Accreditation of Teacher Education that reports to the Professional Standards Practices Board, the Teacher Education Accreditation Council, and the National Council for Accredit-



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State awards medal to soldier killed in action

Family of Thomas Robbins spoke of a life of honor and heroism

He had dreams one day of becoming an artist, but for Thomas D. Robbins, a 1994 Bethlehem High School graduate. those dreams were cut short in Iraq where he was killed in action Feb. 9, 2004. At a ceremony Monday, Oct. 2, sponsored by Albany County's Honor-A-Veteran program, the state posthumously awarded Robbins the New York State Conspicuous Service Cross, one of the state's highest honors for a soldier.

Robbins' mother, the Rev. Charlene Robbins, his sister, Deborah, and grandfather Joseph Dean were present at the ceremony held in the Cahill Room of the Albany County office building.

Robbins was killed in a mortar explosion while collecting confiscated ammunition from enemy forces.

"His was a life all too brief, but a life that was lived in simplicity, in passion and honor," said Charlene Robbins. "He always encouraged the discouraged and bolstered morale while taking his job very seriously.'

Robbins saved the lives of five men in his regiment, the Stryker

Brigade's 1st Squadron. He also as a cavalry scout in both Korea and Operation Iraqi Freedom.

"The explosion was imminent, but he tried to pull his comrades away," said Charlene Robbins. "To all of us, Tom is a hero, and his loss cannot be measured."

U.S. Rep. Michael McNulty, D-N.Y., echoed a common theme of military leaders, soldiers and the families of fallen veterans when he said, "Freedom is not free."

"We pay a tremendous price for it, and that price is visible today," said McNulty. "We are deeply grateful for the sacrifice he made, and we shall never forget."

Albany County Executive Michael Breslin said Robbins made the ultimate sacrifice for all of us.

"Tim was the kid who always did the right thing and did it the right way," said Breslin. "He cared about everybody and he showed it. He truly was a hero."

Robbins was 28 years old when he was killed. He grew up in Clarksville and attended Bethlehem Schools before going on to Morrisville State College and the State University at Cobleskill. He played soccer, ran track and played the trumpet while in school. His mother and sister said Robbins designed the first eagle logo that was made for School the Bethlehem newspaper.

Cyclists ride in memory of police detective

Regular cycling partners Jody Ference and Mary Gillespie-Yalaju were friends of the late Bethlehem police detective John Cox Sr. and his family. After Cox lost his battle with leukemia this spring, the two decided to put their bike riding skills to good use by raising money on behalf of their friend for the New York-Vermont chapter of the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society.

"This is a good way to honor his memory," said Yalaju, who had just finished a 40-mile bike ride in two hours and 20 minutes. "There was a good wind out there.'

In November, Ference and Yalaju will take part in the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society's Team in Training program in Tucson, Ariz., to help them reach their goal of riding 111 miles in the Tour de Tucson on Nov. 18 and raise \$8,400 collectively to participate.

"Team in Training" is billed as the world's largest endurance sports training program and provides expert trainers and professional athletes to help volunteer participants take part in endurance competitions, including

long-distance bicycle rides, whole or half marathons and triathlons to raise money for the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society.

'The event began in New York City in 1988 when a man raised \$350,000 and ran in the New York City Marathon on behalf of his daughter who had leukemia," said Robyn Haberman, Team in Training coordinator for the local chapter.

Haberman said Ference and Yalaju have been assigned a coach who assists them each weekend in their preparation for the long bike ride. '

"Their cycling coach is Ler Putnick," said Haberman. "We will support them as much as we can with training and encouragement."

"When he (Cox) died, we decided to make the commitment," said Ference. "I just can't believe he's gone."

Dentist renews his push for fluoride in water

Delmar dentist-Joseph Hart has been pitching a fluoridated wate: supply for the community for the past 11 years in front of several different Eethlehem officials.

"I'm known as the old geezer who comes around every few years," Hart said, as he renewed his plea at the Wednesday, Sept. 27, Town Board meeting, urging them to seriously consider putting in one part per billion of fluoride in the town's water supply to help prevent tooth decay.

"This is a very minute amount of fluoride," said Hart. 'Flouride reduces tooth decay.'

The local dentist has been seeing patients for more than 30 years and said he is tired of defending himself to new residents when they ask him water, but Supervisor Theresa Egan made it clear that fluoridated water will not be making an appearance any time soon:


"We're a long way off from making that decision," said Egan. "There is a lot of information that needs to be digested."

The detractors of fluoride believe that, if taken in high concentrations, fluoride could be toxic and cause death.

"If you take this-issue seriously, you will have opponents saying fluoride is a poison," said Hart.

The estimated cost of putting fluorice into the Bethlehem water supply is around \$300,000.

Town board members Kyle Kotary, Sam Messina and Tim Gordon all weighed in on the discussion. "I think this is one issue that at the right time the town board will have to consider seriously," said Sam Messira, adding that he believes the fluoride issue should be moved forward and settled one way or another. Kotary said he grew up in a community with fluoridated water, and the issue has its pros and cons. "We need to get a sense of balance here and listen to both sides," said Kotary. Many Bethlehem high school students in a participation in government class were at the meeting, and Gordon informally asked them how many had no cavities or one cavity in their mouth. A few students raised their hands each time.



The two Slingerlands residents have already biked 70 miles together one Saturday, traveling through many areas of the Capital District they had never before seen.

"We started in Burnt Hills and biked through Milton and Rock City Falls, training and trying to get ready for the ride," said Ference.

The two friends have been regular cyclists for years, and they ride between 80 and 100 miles a week.

"That team on its own raised thousands of dollars," said Birkett-Layman.

"It was a ver v emotional night." said Yalaju, who recalled that Cox walked in the event last year but wasn't with his family this year.

"Sixty-six percent of community water supply is now fluoridated," said Hart. "I have kep: close tabs on this, and there is still no reason why we shouldn't have done it."

The American Dental Association has been endorsing the use of fluoride in water for decades. Studies indicate fluoride reduces tooth decay when children receive it at an early age. Hart said there is a benefit to seniors as well.

"It's a lifetime benefit, and this is well documented," said Hart.

Falling for the festivities of an autumn holiday

I was climbing up the ladder, holding the small bunch of branches from the catalpa tree. As I climbed, I thought to myself: What would happen if the ladder fell?

I reached forward and slightly to one side to position the branches on the top of the structure. That's when the word sukkot. ladder fell.

were assembling a sukkah, in preparation for the Jewish holiday of Sukkot. Jeff and hanging were Rachel decorations on the inside, while I was adding the foliage that covering should be sparse creates the roof.

"Help!" I cried, clinging to the two-by-four that framed the back edge of the sukkah.

OK, so I wasn't really that high off the ground, but it still felt scary, and I didn't want to jump or fall down onto the ladder. It probably would have made a funny photograph funny to those not pictured dangling.

Sukkot, which began this year on Oct. 6, commemorates the 40 years the Hebrew people wandered in the desert, living in temporary shelters, following their exodus from Egypt.

word sukkot The. (pronounced sue-COAT) is the Hebrew word for booths. To celebrate, it is customary to



build a sukkah (a booth or hut), which is the singular form of the

A sukkah must have at least My husband, daughter and I three walls. Its roof covering must be made from something that grew from the ground and was cut off, such as tree branches, two-by-fours, corn stalks, or bamboo reeds. The enough so that the stars can be seen, yet dense enough to provide more shade than sunlight in the daytime.

> Each family's sukkah is made unique by the materials used in construction and by the way it is decorated.

> Our sukkah is framed with two-by-fours held together by brackets that are screwed into the wood. Each year it is a tradition for me to strip a few of the screws with the power screwdriver. The walls of our sukkah are plastic tarps held to the frame by plastic ties.

> We built our first sukkah when our daughter was 3, using ideas we got after searching online. We don't start from scratch each year. Instead. we assemble and dis-assemble the

sukkah, reusing all parts that are still in good shape.

Since the sukkah is only up for a short time each year (the holiday lasts seven days), it has fairly good lasting power. Of course, it always rains at some point during Sukkot, so the sukkah does get exposure to the elements.

Rain during the holiday also makes it a challenge to meet the Bible's commandment to "dwell in the sukkah for seven days." Our ancestors in the desert obviously had a higher threshold for discomfort than my family does. We manage to eat some meals in the sukkah, but at the first sign of rain, cold or darkness, we all make a beeline for the house.

Sukkot is a joyous holiday. We invite friends over. Our friends dwell in our sukkah long enough to check out our decorations.

The decorations include paper chains (made from colored fliers saved throughout the year), an assortment of plastic fruits and vegetables (squirrels would eat the real stuff), and a welcome sign with a cornucopia design. We also hang photographs of friends and family who have come to celebrate Sukkot with us over the years.

Every year I wait until the last minute to assemble the pho-tographs from the previous year. I arrange them on multiple sheets of paper, add captions and slip each presentation into a two-gallon plastic bag with a zipper top. My husband secures the seal with duct tape. We apply a threehole-punch and then slip string through for hanging in the sukkah.

I like to display the photographs in a particular order. First the building of the sukkah, next the decorating phase, and finally scenes from the party. I number the backs and include the year on the front to help with the ordering.

Our parties are informal. Friends contribute appetizers and desserts and we order pizza. Since Sukkot is also a

Our party was indoors, so we created a sukkah-lke atmosphere in the dining room, with plastic fruit hanging from the chandelier and the strings of photographs taped to the walls.

Along with the sukkah, there are four species of plants used during the celebration of Sukkot. They include a palm branch (in Hebrew, lulav), two willow branches (aravot), three myrtle branches (hadassim) and an etrog. The etrog (in English, citron) is a citrus fruit similar to a lemon native to Israel.

The paim, willow and myrtle branches are bound together and referred to collectively as the lulav, because the palm branch is the largest part. Holding the lulay and the etrog

The four plants represent different parts of the body. The If the weather permits, the long straight palm branch kids play football or softball in represents the spine. The myrtle leaf, which is a small oval, represents the eye. The willow leaf, a long oval, represents the mouth. The etrog fruit represents the heart. The idea is that all of these parts should join together to perform good deeds.

One example of a good deed would be to use common sense while climbing ladders. I sure wish I had asked someone to spot me that year I ended up dangling from the sukkah.

After my husband had lifted me down to safety I turned to my daughter.

"This is why you must never climb a ladder unless a second person is holding it steady." I told her, as if my foolishness had actually been a planned demonstration of ladder safety.

"OK, mom," she replied. Then we worked together to add the finishing touches to our holiday hut.

Voorheesville ambulance service holding volunteer drive

Due to an aging volunteer base, the Voorheesville Area Ambulance Service is holding a membership drive throughout the month of October.

The ambulance service, currently made up of about 25 volunteers, is looking to add some youth to its staff and hopes to do so by offering a rewarding volunteer experience.

We rarely get to do things that feed the soul," said Kathy Odell, a member of the ambulance service for 22 years. "I get a strong satisfaction in what I do."

One of the service's younger members, Dan Reilly, agreed with Odell and said the experience is a fulfilling one, and something he said he thought anyone would be capable of.

"You're always nervous initially but you get over that quickly," said Reilly, a volunteer since 2001. "It wasn't an unreasonable learning curve."

The primary responsibility for Reilly, certified in CPR and first aid, is as a driver but said he quickly learned the ropes by learning all facets of the job through executing

the various responsibilities, monthly educational sessions and heading out on calls.

Employed full-time as a consulting engineer, Reilly, a father of three, is on call every Wednesday from 6 p.m. to 6 a.m. Reilly credited. his role as a father in how he came to be a part of the ambulance service.

"One of the reasons that I realized I could join was that it never occurred to me, prior to having kids, that I. could get up in the middle of the night to do something useful for someone else," said Reilly, whose oldest child is 6. "I quickly realized, through my experience as an early father, I could do that."

Volunteers are required to donate at least 24 hours each month to the ambulance service, much of the time spent on call.

According to Odell, while on call volunteers must remain in the area and be available at any point in the shift to respond. As long as volunteers are in the area, they can go about their daily lives. Odell said it is not a situation where someone would need to sit by a phone for the entire length of the shift. Reilly said the opportunity to choose the length, days and times for each shift is convenient.

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

Get ready before the winter storms blow in

The telltale signs are everywhere - crunching leaves, changing colors, a chill in the air, so much so that the heat kicks on at night. Happily, unlike last year, the gloom and doom of the season of black and white isn't being exacerbated by predictions of outrageous heating costs of fuel oil and natural gas.

Still, it's time to batten down the hatches in a manner of speaking. Chores related to the house,



the car, the family's wardrobe and anything else affected by winter should be attended to now.

First and foremost, the home heating system should get its annual checkup and cleaning. This is a safety issue, but also one of saving money with a heating system tuned to run as efficiently as possible. It's time to buy filters for the system that should be changed at least once a month. It's also time for the annual check for possible leaks around windows and doors and caulking up those sites. Remember your mother's admonition: we can't afford to heat the great outdoors. When it gets really cold, it's time to layer up with clothing.

Candles are charming, but when left unattended deadly. Several serious fires in the region happened last year that could have been avoided. Keep your home free of fire hazards.

In addition, any weather-related machines ---like snowblowers ---should be checked and serviced. And locate the tools you use - is that snow shovel buried somewhere in the depths of a too crowded garage or, worse yet, somewhere in a remote corner of the basement? It's even a good idea to check to see if your tools are still able to make the grade. If not, replace them now, not after the first storm when anything winter-related sells off fast.

The car is another important priority and it should be winterized and checked for maximum performance in the cold weather. It should be easy to get an appointment at your garage at this time of year. Waiting until later could means delay and frustration and, of course, more costly garage bills.

Avoiding the tedious tasks of winterizing before winter — can be very costly and even dangerous. Don't get caught with your antifreeze down.

People of all abilities are brought together to experience new ways to recreate in the outdoors. Every activity and exhibit is designed to have a universally understandable component. In addition to introducing people with disabilities to adaptive equipment and the accessible environment at Five Rivers, the event has become an educational experience for people without disabilities who are also invited to participate.

This type of experience builds upon what the U.S. Congress had in mind when it designated October as Disability Awareness Month --- to advance attitudes of consideration and respect for people with disabilities through events that foster their abilities and skills. Approximately one in five Americans has a disability, and in spite of that large percentage, much needs to be done[•] to enable people with disabilities to fully participate in our communities. The event at Five Rivers is one of "We All Chase The Same Dreams" campaign, promoted by a local team consisting of individuals with disabilities, community-

based organizations and state agencies including the DEC. The idea for a specialized event relating to outdoor recreation arose from the need to get the word out about accessible areas and facilities on state lands.

In recent years, the DEC has created wheelchair accessible campsites, fishing piers, picnic

platforms, trails and waterway access sites across the state and has increased efforts to make all programs and services inclusive. This universal design approach invites people to become active in. outdoor recreation, which in turn supports a healthy quality of life. Many people with disabilities have not traditionally sought the benefits of outdoor recreation because they have been deterred by its challenges. By attending an outreach event at an accessible facility, people can discover for themselves the enjoyment and ease of access that universal design provides.

Five Rivers was selected as it contained all the necessary ingredients for a universally accessible event. The center has ample designated parking, accessible restrooms and two of its nine trails are designed to be wheelchair accessible, which also makes them perfect for families with children in strollers. There are many benches along the trails for resting and the Woodlot Trail has a handrail. Wheelchairs and an electric scooter are available as well as trail guides in Braille, large print and audio versions. In addition, the education staff at Five Rivers has received training to make them aware of the needs of people with various types of disabilities. The Outdoor Recreation Day made use of all of these amenities, as a wide variety of activities took place throughout the day. The student naturalists at Five. Rivers presented sensory-focused tours on the wheelchair accessible trails and acted as sighted guides for the blind. A sign language interpreter accompanied the deaf, and each exhibit contained inclusive elements. Staff from the DEC demonstrated how to set up a typical campsite, and provided information on the many new accessible areas on state lands for people to visit and enjoy. The Adaptive Sports Foundation, an organization that provides outdoor activities for people with disabilities, brought handcycles and a tricycle for people to try. The Y-Knot sailing group, which operates on Lake George, displayed two beautiful sailboats this year to entice people to learn to sail.

Inside the Visitor Center, there were educational exhibits with tactile elements such as the table draped with the skulls and skins of common wildlife. A taste of honey was available at the seethrough beehive and drawings of different tree species were mounted on posterboard and outlined with beads of glue. The drawings contained a reference point with the height of an average person near the trunk.

The first person to discover the height of a full-grown oak

with this new reference remarked, "You've got to be kidding me." As a person who is blind, she had not imagined the height of the trees she found on the trail.

A popular exhibit featured wildlife that was unable to be returned to

areas, equestrian mounting the wild due to injury or disability. The animals, now having a new purpose in life of providing education, conveyed a silent message to the children and adults who handled them, that life after injury and disability goes on and provides new opportunities.

> Columnist and lifelong birder Chris Keefer was the featured speaker for the afternoon and presented an animated introduction to birding with beautiful slides and personally provided amazing bird song and sound imitations. Birding is a wonderfully inclusive hobby as identification may be done by ear by those who cannot see and by eye for those who cannot hear. Birdwatching can easily be done from a stationary position because if you are patient, the birds will come to you.

> The sign language interpreter, who volunteered for the event, invited her parents who are both deaf and had never visited Five Rivers before. They were impressed enough by Five Rivers that they discussed creating a presentation for their senior citizens group in hopes of arranging a field trip for the group in the future. They remarked that they had learned much throughout the day.

> From the smiling faces of the families and other visitors that happened into the day of inclusive events, it appeared that people also learned about one another in keeping with the theme of the Disability Awareness Month campaign, "We all chase the same dreams, but we have different ways to get there." By recreating together, we take steps toward a more inclusive society, separating the person from the disability in our minds. Remaining Disability Aware-ness events during the month of October include the National Disability **Employment Awareness Awards** Luncheon at the Albany Marriott on Tuesday, Oct. 31, and a film festival offering free showings of various movies about disability with facilitated discussion at the following locations: WAMC Linda Norris Auditorium on Thursday, Oct. 12; Schenectady County Community College on Thursday, Oct. 19; Hudson Valley Community College on Wednesday and Thursday, Oct. 25 and 26.



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Your Opinion Spotlight Legislators: Rail Trail is on its way

Editor, The Spotlight:

We know many people have been wondering where things stand with the Rail Trail (along the former railroad tracks) and are eager to see it open. As the lead Albany County legislators sponsoring resolutions to acquire this valuable asset, we too are eager to see the 9-mile stretch of the old Delaware & Hudson Railroad between the Port of Albany and Voorheesville open to the public.

Rest assured that the moment appears close at hand. For those of you who would like a bit more information, we've prepared the following summary from a status report our conservation & improvement committee requested from County Executive Michael Breslin's office.

In response to the abandonment of the rail line by its owner, Canadian Pacific (CP Rail) in May 2003, Albany County filed a "rail banking request" with the Federal Surface Transportation Board to both preserve the corridor (prevent its piecemeal break-up) and to establish Albany County as the sole party negotiating with CP Rail for the acquisition of the rail corridor for trail use.

Scenic Hudson agreed to a public-private partnership with the county in a successful grant application to the state Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation. The county was awarded \$350,000 from the state matched equally by Scenic Hudson to reach the estimated \$700,000 acquisition price. The county submitted another application for \$350,000 in support of actual rail trail development costs, but this award is on hold pending actual conveyance of the corridor to Albany County. Federal funding is also anticipated based on a successful request made in the mid-1990s that was withdrawn when CP Rail temporarily withdrew its earlier abandonment plans.

Addressing environmental issues, all aspects of the project were subject to State Environmental Quality Review (SEQR) as well as compliance with the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) in the event that project financing included the Federal Land and Water

Other before year's end if not sooner. regulatory requirements (e.g., stormwater management regulations) that become apparent in the engineering and design phase will be completed at the appropriate time. It has been of paramount concern to the county to identify any hazardous waste before acquisition proceeded so that our taxpayers don't get stuck an expensive with and unexpected clean-up project.

Other concerns include structural engineering and other design concerns, such as the safety of the numerous bridges, paving, access, trail marking and safety, to name a few. Also, what is to become of the numerous rail bridge overpasses and the roads passing beneath them that flood blocking emergency vehicles, or, as recently happened in Slingerlands, snarl traffic with stuck trucks? And what will be the County's long-term county ownership and maintenance responsibilities?


Agreement has finally been reached on a mutually acceptable purchase price based on three appraisals of the corridor. The thorny issue of the establishment of the east terminus of the trail was also resolved to ensure clear access. Based upon these agreements, the County Attorney and counsel for Scenic Hudson jointly prepared a formal purchase agreement and submitted it to CP Rail's attorneys. We are awaiting CP Rail's response, which is expected at any time.

Again, we know many of you are anxious to get out on the trail to begin enjoying this tremendous resource. Unfortunately, this has not been a priority of CP Rail, and, frankly, there have been many i's to dot



Budget deliberations have already begun on the town's 2007 proposed fiscal plan calling for a 2.75 percent tax levy increase.

"This is great news," said Egan. "I am truly appreciative of the county executive willing to entertain our thoughts and offers of compromise."

Egan was one of many town officials who felt earlier county estimates regarding election charge backs to municipalities were excessive.

"I am very grateful the county is willing to step up and share the burden this time around," Egan said.

Also part of the HAVA A public hearing on the budget regulations, all counties in New York will be furnished next year with new voting machines paid for

Counties will incur the burden of extra costs, including more staff, storing of machines and complete oversight of county elections. A portion of those costs will be charged back to each municipality based on their assessable property.

The state Board of Elections is testing 13 different voting machines for certification and will be finished with their testing at the end of the year. Counties have until Jan. 5 to decide which machine they will use. Options include DRE's, or electronic voting machines, and optical scan machines.

Colonie's election costs from the county will now be \$220,000, down from \$680,000. Albany County will still use a charge back formula based on full taxable property value and not population.

Community leaders who lobbied for changes to the election charge back costs included Albany Mayor Jerry Jennings, Egan, `Colonie Supervisor Mary Brizzell, Guilderland Supervisor Kenneth Runion, and mayors Robert Carlson and John McDonald III of Watervliet and Cohoes.



Firehouse opens doors

Hundreds of people turned out on Sunday for the Delmar Fire Department's Community Days open house, featuring a live burn demonstration and plenty of activities for children.

"This week is Fire Prevention Week, and today is about education and trying to deliver that message in a fun atmosphere," said Chief James

Eighty-three dedicated men and women who volunteer as firefighters or trained emergency medical services personnel make up the Delmar Fire Department. The volunteers handle a total of more than 2,000 fire and ambulance calls each

The Adams Street fire station has been around since 1950, with building additions in both the '60s and '80s to accommodate the department's growing needs.

"The firehouse was originally designed for smaller apparatus and for a total of 60 people," said Kerr. "We are just cramped beyond belief."

Residents defeated a public referendum last year to move the firehouse down the road on Delaware Avenue.

"This is the most motivated group of firefighters ever, and we really want to share that with the community," said firefighter Steve Krull, who also handles the department's public relations.

. The fire had started in the garage and was spreading quickly.

"Fortunately, they just put new smoke detectors up," said Bastiani.

Kerr said this is the time of year that people should check their smoke detectors and replace them if necessary.

'Smoke detectors have a 10-year life expectancy," said Kerr. "After that, they may not be effective."


Kerr's wife is a member of the women's auxiliary and his children, Eric and Jennifer, are both firefighters.

Jennifer Kerr has been a firefighter for a year and a half, but has seen the inside of the Delmar fire station since she was very young. Her first action as a firefighter occurred this past year.

"It was a huge adrenaline rush," she said. "You have a hundred things running through your mind, but you take it step by step, and then it's not too bad."

Bastiani said she decided to volunteer when she moved back to the area from college, thinking the community service would be temporary. Eleven years later, Bastiani still enjoys her work .



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

added bonus, said Smith, because it wasn't the driving factor in deciding to go solar.

"The real reason is, I feel it is the right thing to do," she said. "We're reducing our pollution a great deal."

The fact that oil is of finite supply, and that the United States is reliant on foreign oil to supply its energy consumption are two reasons Smith said people should consider using natural energy resources.

"From a humanistic standpoint, we should do it for the wellbeing of future generations," she said.

Converting to solar power is often just the first step in operating a more energy-efficient home. Many times work needs to be done in the home to conserve the energy that's being generated.

On hand at the Smith's home was Dan Gibson, founder of Home Energy Advisors. Gibson's company counsels homeowners on how and where energy can be conserved in the home.

"My No. 1 goal is to reduce the use of energy," said Gibson.

According to Gibson, homeowners don't realize just how much energy they could save or how to take advantage of modern methods to make their homes more efficient. According to Gibson, homes built in the 1960s or 1970s were adequate at the time when energy consumption wasn't a primary concern for the typical homeowner, financially or environmentally, but those same homes are often no longer efficient enough for 2006.

More people, said Gibson, are making sacrifices — such as lowering the temperatures in their homes — to be able to afford energy costs. Homeowners like the Smiths are adapting to the changing financial and environmental landscape, through the use of solar power and energy conservation in their homes. "Absolutely, I recommend it," said Smith.

Delight" opened the New York State Robert E. Sherwood's Pulitzer Theatre Institute's (NYSTI) 31st

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season this weekend.

In the play, written in 1936, the border between Italy and Switzerland has been closed due to the World War II bombing of Paris, stranding an international conglomeration of characters in a hotel in the Italian Alps. The incredibly large cast of characters (24 in total) moves deftly throughout the show. The show focuses on how the

Overall, the actors are well cast. The universal drawback is the use of accents that hinder them all. John Romeo, in particular, was impossible to understand. It takes the better part of the opening scene to adjust to the actors' various dialects: Italian, German, British and even American. The mix of over-the-top, bad and

travelers, and their interaction with mangled accents are the greatest each other reveals who and what downfall of this ambitious production.

Joe Quandt and Mary Jane Hansen hold this well-seasoned troupe together.

The script itself is the second problem. The show attempts to tackle almost as many things as there are cast members. It meanders and never fully finds its direction.

On the flip side, the technical aspects of the show are outstanding. Victor Becker's set design is both bold and subtle in its multi-tiered design of beiges and taupes. Charlie Eble's sound design, along with Will Severin's original music, are perfectly suited to the drama of the story. They fill in many of the gaps the script creates, and often feel like a movie score from the golden age of Hollywood. On the same track are Brent Griffin's stunningly beautiful costumes.

The show, however, is all about Ed. Lange, NYSTI director who retired after Saturday night's opening. Lange has been with NYSTI for 25 years, and chose this play specifically as his swan song. Lange has done the best that could be done with the material he had to work with. Fittingly, after Saturday's curtain call, the cast gave him the accolades he so richly deserved.

"Idiot's Delight" runs weekdays at 10 a.m., Oct. 11, 12, 13; and at 8 p.m. on Friday, Oct. 13 and Saturday, Oct. 14. Ticket prices range from \$10 to \$20.


there has never been a better time to bring your family to The Children's Museum of Science and Technology (CMOST) located in the Rensselaer Technology Park in Troy. After being closed for the entire month of September for the completion of major renovations, the hands-on children's museum kicked off its grand re-opening earlier this month.

"We've added quite a few new exhibits," said Laurie Miedema, director of member and guest relations for CMOST. One of those new exhibits is called Go Power, which allows children to learn about energy and its pathways.

Like all the exhibits at CMOST, kids are encouraged to play an active role in learning by becoming energy investigators, following the paths of various energy sources through the walls, floors, and cupboards of a kitchen. The exhibit teaches children about the meters used to calculate both energy usage and dollars, and explores alternative fuels that can be found in the home.

Miedema said the museum is as much about parents learning with their kids as it is about the kids having fun while learning.

"Parents are kind of intimidated," she said when it



CMOST has expanded its Weather Front exhibit by working with Capital News 9 and green screen technology. This allows the kids to create and broadcast their own weather forecasts. Children are able to watch

themselves on screen and see replays of their weather report after wards. Another component of this exhibit is the tornado chamber, in which visitors can see how tornados are formed.

"Kids have a good time, but they are learning at the same time," said Miedema. We talk to a lot of teachers about what the needs are in the schools. We're trying to be a resource to teachers and parents." CMOST


