Porco appeal in the works

Filing an appeal to overturn a court decision is a cumbersome process, and decisions can be based on minute legal technicalities. Attorney Terence Kindlon, who represents Christopher Porco, has won many cases on appeal, and said he feels there is more than a good chance his client's murder conviction in August will be overturned.

"We think we have some very powerful arguments on appeal," said Kindlon.

Porco was convicted in August of killing his father, Peter Porco, and attempting to murder his mother, Joan, inside the family's Brockley Drive home in November 2004.

Kindlon said his appeal centers on Joan Porco's head nod. Prosecutors told the jury that, while gravely wounded, Joan Porco acknowledged to investigators that her assailant was her son Christopher.

During Porco's murder trial,

Kindlon said he felt the prosecution tried to elicit answers from Joan Porco that should not have been asked because she said she has no recollection of the attacks against her and husband Peter Porco in the early morning hours of Nov. 15.

"I fully expect the Third Department of State Appellate Court to decline the case because of a conflict ... of interest."

"The prosecution should not have been permitted to ask those questions during trial," said Kindlon.

Kindlon said he and his legal team are sifting through mountains of documents to present the most thorough appeals case on behalf of their client, who sits in the Albany County jail awaiting a Dec. 12 sentencing.

Town board readies budget for approval

The Bethlehem Town Board will meet Wednesday, Nov. 8, to adopt the 2007 budget, and with several options on the table, the meeting could take some time.

"It will take as much time as we need," said board member Kyle Kotary.

"Honestly, we are close," Kotary said.

Supervisor Theresa Egan said she believes the budget is already lean and further reductions could jeopardize services.

"I would love to sit here every year and give people taxpayer relief," Egan said. "What I have seen historically is if there is not a slow, consistent raising of taxes, that ultimately there is a spiking effect of double-digit taxes in one year."

Town board member Sam Messina agrees with Egan's assessment that the budget is barebones.


"What I think we have is a complete austerity budget," said Messina. "We are at an absolute minimum level," he said.

"What I have seen historically is if there is not a slow, consistent raising of taxes, that ultimately there is a spiking effect of double-digit taxes in one year."

The proposed budget totals \$36.5 million, with taxes to be increased 2.79 percent and appropriations up less than 1 percent.

Research has made gains in the treatment of juvenile diabetes, but there is still a ways to go

When Michelle Desimone was 12 years old, she fell ill while vacationing with her parents on North Carolina's Outer Banks.

Parents Cheryl and Michael Desimone, both physicians, initially thought their daughter's nausea and weight loss were the result of the flu. They were actually symptoms of type I diabetes, also known as juvenile diabetes.

"Ultimately, she collapsed in our arms. She was basically unresponsive," said Cheryl Desimone, an anesthesiologist at Albany Medical Center. "She was in a diabetic coma for days. From there on, life has never been the same."

November is American Diabetes Month. Throughout the month, various diabetes research and support groups encourage the public to learn more about the disease and the risks associated with it; groups like the Northeastern New York Chapter of the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation (JDRF).

Since Michelle's diagnosis, the Desimones have been members of the foundation, serving on its executive board and assisting in its mission to find a cure for juvenile diabetes.

Nearly 21 million Americans have diabetes, according to the American Diabetes Association. It is the fifth deadliest disease in the country and has no cure. Those diagnosed with it can only maintain the disease, said Cheryl Desimone.

Michelle, now 16, said she checks her blood sugar as many as a dozen times throughout the day. She checks her levels before and after each meal, before and after each activity and depending on how she feels. She has to avoid stress the best she can and monitor her diet. But it doesn't stop her from living a normal and otherwise active life.

The Academy of Holy Names junior is active in sports, a member of the school's soccer, softball and track teams. She also likes to ski.

Like many diagnosed with type I diabetes, she is confident that a cure is out there, and she continues to push for a cure and the funding and research needed to see it through.

"There is definitely a cure out there. They continue to develop new technologies," said Michelle.

In the United States, funding through organizations like JDRF has led to the development of an artificial pancreas that can monitor blood sugar levels and supply insulin when needed.

It isn't a cure, said Michelle. But, it's a step toward one.


The new device is especially attractive for active teenagers like Michelle and especially parents of teenagers with juvenile diabetes who can see the demands of college life on the horizon.

After years, the daily grind of life with diabetes becomes routine, said Michelle. Your responsibility is to yourself, and it's a responsibility you can't dodge, she said.

The result is independence. The independence of caring for yourself, whether at home, school, sporting events or away from home at college, she said.

Regardless, a parent of children and teenagers diag-



Wheels in motion in Bethlehem

Cyclocross event expected to bring 300 cyclists

You may already be aware that Delmar was ranked by Money Magazine as one of the best places to live in New York. You may not know that Delmar is now the home of the New York State Cyclocross Championships.

The demanding bike-racing event, organized by Slingerlands resident Chuck Quackenbush, will be held Sunday, Nov. 19, at the Town Park on Elm Avenue.

Bethlehem Chamber of Commerce president Marty DeLaney said the 300 cyclocross riders and their friends converging on Delmar for the event should have a positive effect on area businesses.

"We're excited as always when there is an event like this coming to town," said DeLaney.

Quackenbush said he wanted to have a race event like this close to home.

"I expect people will enjoy our neighbors and our good food and spread the word that Bethlehem is a good place," he said.

Cyclocross races consist of several laps over a short but difficult course between 2 and 4 kilometers. The course features

pavement, wooded trails, steep hills and other obstacles. Cyclocross riders often have to quickly dismount their bikes and carry them while trekking uphill across muddy inclines.

"We ride bikes that look like road bikes but with bigger tires because we ride off road," said Quackenbush.

Unlike mountain bike riding, which is all off road, cyclocross racing is a mix of on- and off-road riding that is done on an arduous loop for an average of 45 to 60 minutes.

Quackenbush said the 3.5-kilometer course will begin between the tennis courts and soccer field in the park before heading toward the pavilion past a narrow swamp toward the backstop of the softball field.

"We then go past the dog-walking park and race parallel to the Delmar bypass past the scoreboard toward the exercise trails descending through an orchard," said Quackenbush.

If that's not enough to wear the riders out, the loop continues up a steep hill back toward a gravel path before re-emerging at the bottom of the sledding hill before riders dismount and jump over an

18-inch barrier. With bikes on shoulders, riders then speed toward the volleyball and basketball courts before weaving through pine trees and emerging at the start/finish line to run another lap until the 45-minute clock winds down.

"Riders are red-eyed within the first mile," said Quackenbush. "It's grueling."

Quackenbush has been cycling since

the early '90s and first became interested in cyclocross around four years ago.

"Everybody should have a sport they can be so passionate about," said Quackenbush.

Three races in Schenectady's Central Park, Troy and Stephentown have already been held this year, and more area residents are joining in the sport.

"We have a growing community of cyclocross racers around here," said Quackenbush.

The winner of the State cyclocross event can compete in the national championships held Dec. 15-17 in Providence R.I.

"It's a win-win for the community to bring this kind of good, clean fun to Bethlehem," DeLaney said.

School board meetings make their small-screen debut

In a continuing effort to reach out to the community, the Bethlehem school board will televise board meetings at their Adams Street headquarters beginning with the one held Wednesday, Nov. 1.

"We want to give the community every opportunity to see what happens here," said school board president Stuart Lyman.

The meetings will be aired on TV-18 in Bethlehem at 6 p.m. Sundays.

The very first televised meeting of the school board began with Jim Yeara, a Bethlehem

High School English and theater teacher, showing board members how to relax before a live production. Yeara, along with several of the school's Shakespeare students, led the board in several tension-relieving techniques, including stretching, jaw exercises and scalp massage, all under the watchful eye of the new video camera and microphones at the board's front desk.

"People tell me they watch Guilderland school board meetings," said Lyman. "Part of our goal is to be open to the community."

When the presentation ended, the school board moved into the weightier items on the agenda, including a report by certified public accountant Ray Preusser, hired to perform an independent audit of school finances. Preusser said district finances are healthier now than they were last year.

"Your overall fund balance is up \$800,000," said Preusser. "That's because of maximizing revenues and going after every dollar the district can get."

Replenishing the fund balance is also having a positive effect on the district's bond rating receiving the Moody's A-1 rating.

"It was a very good audit," said board member James Lytle, also chairman of the new district

audit committee. "We were able to restore a significant level of our reserves."

As part of a recent mandate by the state, the district is required to have an internal audit service in place within the next several months. Options include sharing the expense with another district, hiring their own auditing firm or contracting with the Board of Cooperative Educational Services, who would have an auditing company on hand for area districts to hire.

"That seemed to us to be the better and most cost-effective approach," said Lytle.

Preusser said the firm will prioritize the district's highest risks, make recommendations and implement

plan of action.

"It's a whole new process," said Preusser. "They will look at the district in a managerial way, and nothing will overlap."

In other school news, Zandri Construction was the low bidder for construction work at Clarksville Elementary School. The bid of \$1.6 million came in \$263,000 lower than the rejected bid.

"We think this is a good, responsible low bidder," said Dave Rubin, president of SanoRubin construction.

The district still has a 5 percent contingency fund for the remaining \$93 million dollar school bond projects.

Ryan Rockmore, representing the high school student senate, updated the school board on conversations between students and principal Chuck Abba regarding the "no hats" school policy at the high school.

"We are trying to solve the problem by Nov. 14, prior to the next school board meeting," said Rockmore.

Students have been taking their caps off upon entering the high school since September after a code of conduct policy change by the district this past summer. Students have protested the decision and are trying to work with the district to have the policy removed.

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Today's PTA is not your mother's PTA

In the late 1960s, the song "Harper Valley PTA" hit the airwaves. The song's lyrics relate the fictional story of a single mom who receives a letter from the PTA criticizing the way she is raising her teenage daughter. The mom shows up at a PTA meeting and exposes the hypocrisy of its members by pointing out their various indiscretions. The song gave rise to a movie and a TV sitcom, both starring Barbara Eden as the miniskirt-wearing mom who runs for PTA president.

I heard the song on an oldies station recently, and it got me wondering: Why are so many people negative about the Parent Teacher Association?

You know the stereotypes. Many people assume the PTA is just a bunch of moms who sit around drinking coffee. They assume that there are only roles for women, and only women who don't work outside the home. They can't be bothered to get involved because they don't see it as worthwhile.

Maybe the PTAs need to bring Barbara Eden in as a guest speaker to dispel the myths and squash the apathy.

MYTH 1: Only women have a role in the PTA.

REALITY: The word "parent" is gender neutral. That

means both mommies and daddies belong in the PTA. You do usually see mostly moms, but there are certainly more fathers at PTA functions these days than when I was a kid.

MYTH 2: The PTA is just a coffee klatch for women.

REALITY: Each year, on the first day of school, the PTA in my daughter's elementary school holds a morning coffee. This provides an opportunity for parents to meet one another and find out how they can get involved.

MYTH 3: The PTA is just for stay-at-home moms.

REALITY: This myth is perhaps the most damaging myth. It is not true, but it's easy to believe.

I used to believe this myth. It was reinforced when my daughter was entering first grade, and I got the notice about the coffee meeting to be held at 9:30 a.m. on the day school started.

I became indignant and showed my husband the notice.

"Look at this," I told him. "I can't go to this. I need to be at work."

"The stay-at-home moms will go," he said.

"Yeah, the stay-at-home moms get to go. They get to have coffee," I fumed.

This was not about coffee. I don't even drink coffee. And I like going to work. This was about Mommy Guilt.

The reality is that anyone who wants to be a part of the PTA is needed and welcome. Other than that meeting on the first morning of school, all other PTA meetings are held in the evening.

I am grateful for any parents who take the time to make PTA programs happen. Stay-at-home parents can be just as busy as parents who work outside the home. Some may have more flexibility to participate in daytime activities. However, many stay-at-home parents have young children at home in addition to the school age children, and these parents must make arrangements for babysitters, much like a "working" parent needs to request time off from a job.

MYTH 4: All the PTA does is hold fundraisers.

REALITY: You'd be incredibly surprised at how much the PTA does for your school.

The PTA at my daughter's elementary school has over 30 committees. Many special events that I thought were arranged by the school district are actually PTA-sponsored programs.

Our PTA not only organizes the room parents (previously known as "room mothers"), it also brings children's authors to the school, arranges after-school enrichment classes, and coordinates family picnics. PTA members put together a school directory. They plant and weed the school gardens to beautify the grounds.

The PTA is concerned with

budget issues and curriculum development.

Our PTA makes an effort to teach our children to have a social conscience. Families are encouraged to collect school supplies for the needy and make Valentine's Day cards that are distributed to nursing home residents.

The PTA brings in speakers to talk to parents about raising the self-esteem of children, dealing with homework battles and the importance of good nutrition.

MYTH 5: The PTA is only for parents who can commit to the monthly meetings.

REALITY: There are so many, many opportunities to get involved with the PTA. It doesn't have to be at the monthly meetings. It doesn't have to be a monthly commitment at all. You could take a shift at the book fair or on field day. You could bring a few bottles of apple juice to a school party. You could flip burgers at a picnic. You could offer to talk to your child's class about a special hobby.

MYTH 6: PTA events cost too much, offer the wrong foods or activities, and are held too early (or too late) in the evening.

REALITY: It's easier to criticize than get involved. If you've got ideas about how to improve a program or event, then join the committee.

And please, offer your suggestions in a constructive manner.

Recently, our PTA volunteers put a zillion hours into planning a Halloween party. This included a DJ, pumpkin painting and other crafts, storytelling, pizza, baked goods and a haunted house.

Easily a thousand people attended the event, including parents, students and siblings.

Hungry and tired, I shuffled

along with the crowd to join my husband and daughter in line for pizza.

"This is a nightmare," I said to two dads I know. They smiled, and said, "Isn't it always?"

Then I wondered why I even made the comment. It was just fatigue and low blood sugar talking. I'm also slightly claustrophobic and didn't like squeezing through the mass of people.

However, we treated the party as a family night. It was inexpensive, and there was pizza and sweets.

Yes, it was a loud, crowded, chaotic party. And the kids were running around having a good time.

It's not about the parents; it's about the kids!

MYTH 7: PTA events are only fun for kids.

REALITY: At the Halloween party, our fifth grader met up with a friend and they ran off. So my husband and I headed out to the dance floor. Sure, it was mostly the youngest students and preschool siblings dancing. But that was OK, because we somehow still fit in better than the few times we've ventured out to grown-up night spots.

Hey, I got dinner, dessert and dancing, was home by 9 o'clock, and didn't have to pay a babysitter.

Granted, PTA events are less fun for the parents who put in countless hours planning and executing the functions, shopping for supplies, monitoring the Haunted House, standing behind the bake sale table and cleaning up. Quite often, it's the same small group of parents who volunteer over and over.

In the fictional Harper Valley, Mrs. Johnson wasn't intimidated by the PTA. In the song, she came to a meeting to speak her mind. And in the movie she decided to get involved.

I urge you to do the same.

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Albany County ceremony honors WWII veteran

Army major died from war injuries years after surviving the war's fiercest battles

Time after time, through his fighting in North Africa, Sicily and Normandy, John J. Kelly Jr. went above and beyond the expectations of American commanders in World War II.

He survived, some would argue, some of the toughest fighting of the war, never backing down from Axis defenses and counterattack after counterattack.

Kelly died in 1960 at age 39 after succumbing to wounds he suffered on the D-Day invasion of Omaha Beach in Normandy. He is buried alongside his wife at St. Ambrose Cemetery in Menands.

Last weekend, Kelly, an Army major and recipient of the Distinguished Cross, among many other service medals, was honored by Albany County for his service and sacrifice during the war at the Zaloga American Legion post on Everett Road.

It is part of the county's annual November Honor-A-Veteran Ceremony that features different American servicemen and service-women each year as Veterans Day nears.

Albany County Executive Michael Breslin, a veteran himself, was key in forming the ceremony more than 10 years ago.

"My family and I are thrilled. We always realized how much he had done... it's great to remember him," said James E. Kelly, one of Kelly's five children.

James Kelly lives in Garden City, Long Island. Like his four brothers and one sister, he has long been away from his native Loudonville.

In part, last weekend's ceremony was a family gathering for the Kellys. In the span of nine years, the family lost both their father and mother. An Albany family took them in.

Kelly was born in Albany, Nov. 5,

1920. A graduate of Christian Brothers Academy and Cornell University, where he earned a bachelor's degree, he answered the call to arms after graduating from college.

After training, Kelly was promoted to lieutenant with Army Infantry, F Company, 2nd Battalion, First Division. In August 1942, he set sail for Britain where extensive training ensued in preparation for what would become America's first major engagement with German forces.

Kelly landed on the shores of Algeria in North Africa as part of Operation Torch, Nov. 8, 1942. He was 22 years old.

Kelly was met head on by German Field Marshal Erwin Rommel who inflicted heavy casualties on American troops in the initial stages of the invasion. Within a week of their first engagement, Kelly's First Division joined other American and British regiments in pushing the German and Italian forces back. Eventually, more than 275,000 Axis soldiers would be captured a year after Kelly landed on African soil.

He was awarded the Silver Star for action in the Battle of Tunisia and the Bronze Star for action seen throughout the North African Campaign. He was promoted to captain and assumed command of F Company. He was the youngest captain to serve under General George S. Patton in Sicily.

Two months after leaving Africa, Kelly found himself storming German and Italian strongholds in Sicily as part of Operation Husky.

In the hills of Sicily would be where tales of Kelly's service would reach home. His accounts of battles were told in Time Magazine. He would become one of many to hold off German attacks while short on food and supplies in near 100-degree temperatures.

In August 1943, Kelly ordered his company to withdraw from their advanced positions in the hills overlooking the town of Troina. Kelly and a "runner" huddled in the bottom of a foxhole constantly under German fire as they radioed artillery

the positions of enemy strongholds, some as close as 50 yards to their own position.

Kelly and his runner would withstand German attacks for most of the day before it was safe for the rest of the company to join them. It marked the end of six straight days of constant fighting.

Kelly was awarded the Distinguished Service Cross.

He was sent to England to begin preparation for an invasion on Normandy. It was then he met Audrey Victoria Winks, a radar operator with England's Women's Air Force. The two became engaged to be married.

D-Day

"He and a group of four officers were standing around together looking at a map. A mortar went off right on top of them. The back of his legs and his back were severely injured," remembered James. "He was in the hospital for a year and a half or two."

Kelly had passed the barrage of artillery and German gunfire at Omaha Beach that struck down 2,400 Army Infantry and Rangers in the first few hours of landings. It was after the beach was secured and regrouping began at the top of bluffs that the fateful mortar would rain down on Kelly.

Home again

It was the loss of a kidney during operations in England that would eventually lead to Kelly's cause of death, kidney failure. Only 9 years old at the time, James Kelly's said he remembers his father walking about with steel braces on his legs. His friends recall him using a cane

to depress the accelerator pedal of his car.

Kelly returned to his home an honorably discharged and decorated Army major. At his side was wife Audrey.

Kelly enrolled in Cornell Law School in 1946. After graduation he practiced law with a New York City firm for nearly two years before moving to Loudonville.

A member of the American, State and County Bar Associations, Kelly joined the Albany firm DeGraff, Foy, Conway and Holt-Harris.

"He was a wonderful individual. In addition to a war hero, he was a great lawyer," said Frank Lasch, 74, who worked with Kelly at the firm while he was still in school.

While at Cornell Law, Kelly would occasionally make a visit and take Lasch out for a beer. They never talked about the war.

Lasch didn't know of Kelly's service and heroism until his son James told of his father's story in a book of love letters exchanged between his mother and father during the war.

During the 1950s Kelly became a successful trial lawyer, lobbyist and advocate for veterans. He was opposed to veterans credits and the laws providing veterans preference and special appointing authorities for veterans applying for work in the public sector. Despite his service, Kelly believed that just because you wore the uniform didn't entitle you to anymore than the next man, said Lasch.

Until his death in 1960 at Albany Memorial Hospital, Kelly served as counsel to the Civil Service Employees Association and was an active communicant of St. Pius X in Loudonville. His wife, Audrey, died nine years later.

Michael J. Fox was gracious in his reaction to Limbaugh's jabs, although Fox's mother was highly agitated by the remarks.

Basically, labeling a person with a serious debilitating illness as "acting" is ridiculous. But that doesn't seem to bother people who thrive on the outrageous, like many politicians in the recent campaign who produced slick messages on expensive paper, essentially lying about their opponents.

Re-enactment eerily realistic

As artillery batteries pounded away behind us, Col. Washburn ordered us to a halt behind the Heeter House.

Our battalion, nearly 100 men, from five companies out of New Jersey, Pennsylvania and New York, stood in the shade; a much-needed break after marching nearly half of the Cedar Creek battlefield in Virginia.

"Nervous?" the Pennsylvania infantryman next to me asked, as more than 1,000 rebels could be heard a mile or so off in the distance, shouting just on the other side of the ridge we were sure to charge.

"You can't die your first time you know," he said.

I checked my canteen, full. My cartridge box, check. Primer caps, yes. Bayonet, hat, rifle, OK. I guess.

As I looked down the line, men begin to light cigarettes, pipes and cigars. Still holding onto the 21st century, I wondered about safety concerns circa 1864, when 100 men, each with more than 80-grain charges of gunpowder strapped to their side, stood and idly pulled on lit cigarettes.

Then again, the men that stood and waited here 142 years ago were probably more concerned about facing a volley of 50,000 rifled muskets and countless cannon balls. This, on the other hand, was merely a re-enactment.

I was camped with the 125th NY Volunteers, a regiment originally mustered out of Rensselaer in August 1862. It was made famous for a gallant stand at Gettysburg, where it suffered many casualties. It did not fight Cedar Creek.

Today, the 125th is made up of teachers, professors, insurance salesmen, historians, and a ballet dancer. They march — or drive — up and down the eastern seaboard and points west

to re-enact some of the greatest battles of the American Civil War. When asked if I wanted to march beside them at Cedar Creek, I jumped at the opportunity.

"It's cops and robbers with better toys," my friend told me on the ride from upstate New York to Virginia.

I expected something like a Star Trek convention with married men who hold down jobs, dressed in Federal or Confederate uniforms, driven more by history than the Star Date in which Spock and Captain Kirk met in mortal combat.

I was sure some would linger and discuss which side had the better generals, as hundreds of men demonstrated the might of cannon, musketry and cavalry for spectators.

But, as I looked past the dilapidated Heeter House and spotted more than 800 advancing rebels marching in perfect form at the command of company commanders, I stood corrected.

"These guys are for real," I remember thinking.

"Battalion! Shoulder arms! Forward... march!" Col. Washburn belted out.

Our company commander reiterated the command.

Now sweating, packed shoulder to shoulder, the 25-yard-long battalion crossed the dry remnants of Cedar Creek. I looked across the battlefield and saw the large smoke rings bellowing from Confederate artillery. A thunderous boom followed, then the crack of more than a thousand muskets.

"There are hundreds of them," I thought then looked down the other half of the battlefield. "There's more than an thousand."

After exchanging several volleys with one Confederate battalion, several Confederate companies overcoming the extreme right of the Union lines took the Colonel's attention.

"Right shoulder shift," Col. Washburn yelled, ordering us to load and get into marching formation.

We slung our rifles to our left shoulder and grasped them tightly at the butt with our left hands. With rifles fixed tightly against our left breast, we double timed it behind the Union lines, who offered the occasional "give 'em hell."

Ordered back to firing lines, we looked down on more than 50 Confederate cavalry. Next to them, two battalions of surprised Confederates quickly prepared themselves for a massive volley.

"Firing by battalion," Col. Washburn yelled. "Ready, aim, fire." Perfect unison.

After the smoke cleared, the man I sighted in my rifle falls to the ground.

The next morning we awoke at 4:45 a.m. It was dark and cold. This, the morning tactical, was the coup de grace of re-

enactment.

Think "Cops and robbers meets chess with better toys."

Battalions jostled for position in the dark. The checkmate would be a flanking maneuver. You know you've lost when the sound of 60 or so clanking canteens becomes 60 or so muskets firing in unison.

The 125th is a member of the Mifflin Guard. It is revered in the re-enactment community, north and south, as one of the most historically accurate and effective battalions on the field. If the 125th had been thrown into the actual fight 142 years ago, you'd have probably read about them in grade school, or dodged reading the book to watch the movie.

We were ordered to load. Fumbling through my side pack, I retrieved a charge, tore it open with my teeth, poured it into the barrel of my US Springfield and set the primer charge. We aimed at the unsuspecting rebels who had managed to wedge themselves between us and another battalion that had scattered in confusion.

In unison we fired. Several rebels turned around in surprise and muttered, "Mifflin."

There was talk about it throughout the Union camps all morning. That is, until it was time to fight the battle for Cedar Creek.

Col. Washburn — my friend's father — and the captain of the 125th whose inability to attend spurred my invitation, were well-versed in most battles of the war, and all those that they re-enacted. It's the same for north and south commanders.

They are the directors of the battle. It's sheer acting knack to know when you must die, aside from some basic rules, like dying if you run out of charges or primers.

Each commander placed their respective companies, battalions and regiments where they needed to be for a proper re-enactment of the battle of Cedar Creek.

Unlike the first day, a large crowd had gathered for the second one. The Union soldiers were marched into the Confederate camps. Like the battles before it, it began with a barrage of artillery. However, this is "the battle." It isn't your average exchange. There is a bit more "umpff" in these discharges. You can feel it in your chest from nearly a mile away.

We are ordered to retreat by companies from the makeshift Union camp to give the appearance of a Confederate surprise attack. So we run, run some more, then turn to fight.

Rebels like to yell. Hence, "rebel yell." Reluctantly, with the urging of the company commander's sword, our retreat is halted as we are ordered to turn and fight.

Before we set out to re-enact this battle, the Colonel advised us after weapons inspections that battlefield personnel had found a live charge lying in the field.

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

live .577 caliber round out of his pouch. The corporal next to me, in an attempt to reassure me, told me that some guys hunt with their rifles.

After the first exchange between the Mifflin and the Confederates, we were ordered to retreat again and regroup on the other side of Cedar Creek. Calling on my acting skills, I was struck, perhaps in the left shoulder. The ball slightly spun me as I absorbed its force and fell to the ground.

"That's a good Yankee," a rebel woman in period clothing said as she tossed a green apple lollipop in my direction. No one told me that when you die you get a lollipop. Not that it would have made me feel easier about

potentially meeting my end by a forgetful hunter's rifle.

With three charges left, and a short rest aside some other dead Yankees, I returned to the ranks, to take part in Gen. Philip Sheridan's famous re-grouping of the Union to push the Confederates back to their ultimate defeat. Confederate Lt. Gen. Jubal A. Early, and whoever portrayed him this day, was through in the Shenandoah Valley.


Knowing the end was near, and the serious blow that the defeat at Cedar Creek gave to their effort, the Confederates mustered one last charge.

The scrappy bunch, numbering roughly 80, charged at what remained of the Mifflin Guard. We drew up our weapons and collided, engulfing each other. Everyone broke out in smiles, handshakes and hugs.

From the bottom of the valley where Cedar Creek once flowed, a bugler began to play. We "uncapped," placing our hats over our hearts, as "Taps" began. As one battalion bugler came to the middle of the verse, another bugler began the tune.


Now out of gunpowder, I lit my pipe. Checking for scrapes, cuts, or mine balls lodged in my chest, I sat my rifle on the ground, took a deep breath, and looked over the field of the dead as they eerily stirred, enjoying their lollipops.

This race was over from the start!

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CBS show turns spotlight on the Porco trial

Christopher Porco maintains his innocence in jailhouse interview

"I could never trade money for my parents' lives," said Christopher Porco in an interview with CBS correspondent Peter Van Sant for a "48 Hours Mystery" segment that aired Saturday, Nov. 4.

It's the first time Capital-District residents have heard from the 23-year-old since he was convicted of murdering his father and attempting to murder his mother with an ax in November of 2004.

"I was surprised how calm and subdued he was," said Christine McCarroll of McCarroll's grocery store, who along with many other Delmar residents watched the show.

The brutal attack of Peter and Joan Porco inside the bedroom of their home has puzzled and fascinated people, so much so that "48 Hours Mystery" covered the trial from start to finish to produce the one-hour special aired across the nation.

The show covered the crime from its beginning to the bitter end, when an Orange County jury in Goshen convicted Porco on counts of murder and attempted murder.

Interviewees included assistant district attorneys for

Albany County, Michael McDermott and David Rossi, along with the defense team of Terence Kindlon and Laurie Shanks. The show also featured interviews with veterinarian Elaine LaForte, who first hired Porco to work at Bethlehem Veterinary Hospital and allowed him to stay with her family at their Glenmont home from the time of the attacks until his conviction.

Albany County District Attorney David Soares and Bethlehem police Det. Christopher Bowdish were also prominently featured during the one-hour program. It was Bowdish who first arrived at the scene of the crime on Nov. 15, 2004, where Joan Porco was found critically injured in her bed. Bowdish and several paramedics said during the show that Joan Porco clearly nodded when asked if her son Christopher committed the attack.

But the spotlight for much of the program was on Christopher Porco and his answers to Van Sant's questions about the crime.

When asked before the

verdict if he believed the jury would find him guilty or not guilty, Porco said, "I certainly believe not guilty. It's about clearing my name."

When asked why he showed no emotion moments after the guilty verdict, Porco said he was told by Shanks not to.

Throughout the show, Porco reiterated that he did not commit the brutal crime

against his parents.

"If I was going to kill my parents, why would I take a big yellow car?" Porco said. "That doesn't make sense."

When surveillance cameras show Porco leaving the University of Rochester campus for the Thruway just hours before the attack, he said, "They don't show me going home."

Porco said his emotions did get the best of him when he saw his mother close to death at Albany Medical Center the night after the attack.

"I burst into tears and fell on the floor right there," said Porco.

When asked point-blank if he killed his father and attacked his mother with an ax, Porco responded, "Absolutely no. I would never do anything like that, especially to my parents, who I love dearly."

Joan Porco would not agree to be interviewed for the show. The only time she is seen during the program is on the witness stand and at a July birthday party for Christopher.

When asked about his father, Porco echoed remarks made by Joan Porco and his defense team during the trial.

"My father was a wonderful man," said Porco. "Family came first."

In the end, Porco said he feels the real murderers have never been apprehended.

"The real killers are out there," he said. "There's no doubt in my mind."

Porco, who is expected to be sentenced in December, faces a maximum sentence of 50 years to life.

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
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

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Voorheesville teachers map a learning course

In an effort to make classroom lessons more effective, the Voorheesville school district has instituted a program called curriculum mapping.

Teachers in the district are being asked to "map" what they are teaching, using software to create a chart outlining the questions that will be answered in each course, the course content, the skills and lessons taught, the assessments used, what resources are available and how the curriculum is in line with state

education standards.

Superintendent Linda Langevin said that the mapping process would allow teachers to more effectively set goals for their lessons, and then be able to evaluate their effectiveness in reaching those goals.

Teachers would begin with a question they would want their students to be able to answer, said Langevin.

For instance, she said, a teacher could start with the question: "Why was Pluto, as a planet, redefined?"

"Then the lessons are attached to that question, and the as-

sessments are attached to that question," said Langevin.

Curriculum mapping also lets the district's teachers know what is being taught in other classes in each grade level.

"This will be to ensure that all of our lessons, K-12, are well articulated," said Langevin, meaning that the lessons contain no overlaps or gaps.

Elementary school teacher, and president of the Voorheesville Teacher's Union Kathy Fiero said she thought the curriculum mapping would not have an impact on how effectively teachers are able to teach their

material. Instead, it would allow holes in the curriculum to be filled, she said.

If, for instance, a group of students all picked the same wrong answer on a multiple choice test, Fiero said that curriculum mapping can help teachers answer the question: "Why do we think that happened?"

In another example, Langevin said, mapping would prevent students from reading *Charlotte's Web* in both the third and fourth grade.

"You don't want that to happen to kids. They're very easily

bored," said Langevin. "It eliminates the redundancy and the overlaps in the teaching and learning."

According to Langevin, another benefit of curriculum mapping is participation in the Successful Practices Network (SPN), which lets Voorheesville teachers share their results with more than 700 schools across the country that are considered successful yet still want to improve. SPN will provide analysis and feedback on the results.

"They'll adjust them for better teaching and learning and then send them back to us," said Langevin, adding that the recommendations from SPN can be used to better improve lesson plans.

"This is going to be very important for our schools," said Langevin.

According to Fiero, the curriculum mapping is only at the beginning phases and teachers would begin by looking at textbooks to ensure they are in line with state standards. Fiero estimated it would take up to five years to fully implement the program.

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

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First of community conversations fails to draw a crowd

School officials outnumbered parents 5-1 at the very first Community Conversations meeting Tuesday, Oct. 31, with Bethlehem School District Superintendent Les Loomis.

The event was conceived as a way to foster better communication between the district and the community. However, after only one parent attended, it was clear even more communication is needed to spread the word out.

"I think this has been a good conversation," said Loomis. "It shows we need to publicize this

better."

At the forums, scheduled to run monthly through May, participants can offer suggestions, raise concerns and ask questions. The conversations take place at 7:30 a.m. in the superintendent's office on Adams Street.

"This is a hard time for parents home with children but a helpful time for working parents," said Loomis of the early morning meetings.

After district residents voted down their first school district budget in 20 years this past spring, the board decided to reach out to the public with informal coffees, Web site question-and-

answer exchanges, and now the Community Conversations.

"What we realize is we can't count on the media, and we can't count on district publications to get our word out," Loomis said. "Our board felt community outreach and a closer connection is what we need."

Board members Robin Storey and Lynne Lenhardt, along with assistant superintendents Steve O' Shea and Michael Tebbano were at the meeting to field questions.

One issue discussed was news coverage of school board issues, such as the district's new no-hat policy inside the high school.

Students met the policy with opposition when they arrived with their caps on the first day of school. They then showed up at a school board meeting in September with more than 800 names of classmates who signed a petition and presented it to the district to voice their disapproval of the policy.

When the one parent at the Community Conversation questioned the necessity of publicizing the district's hat policy, officials speculated on why media published accounts of the policy.

"They want to sell papers, and that's the reality of it," said Lenhardt.

Redistricting, district goals and better parent involvement at the middle school were other issues addressed.

Although the first Community Conversation was sparsely attended, Loomis and the board said it would continue the forum.

"You can never communicate enough," said Loomis.

"People seem to want this face-to-face," said Storey.

Future Community Conversations for 2006 are scheduled for Tuesday, Nov. 28 and Tuesday, Dec. 19 at 7:30 a.m. at the district office at 90 Adams St.

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Advisory group presents conservation report

The Citizens Advisory Committee on Conservation (CACC), with the approval of four of its seven members, submitted its executive summary on open space protection program funding and tools.

The report stated the town should "work with willing landowners to conserve quality open spaces throughout the town and create a network of open lands to provide wildlife habitat and potential recreational corridors."

Committee chairman John Smolinski presented the report at the Wednesday, Oct. 25, Bethlehem Town Board meeting.

"The framework for this report really comes out of the comprehensive plan," Smolinski said.

The report outlines why the advisory committee was formed and offers potential sources of funding for open space protection projects.

"We made a concerted effort to try and illustrate to you the advantages and disadvantages of all the funding mechanisms," Smolinski said.

Sources of potential funds include the State Environmental Protection Fund, the Clean

Water State Revolving Fund and the federal Farm Security and Rural Investment Act. Potential sources of local government funding highlighted by the group include the local sales tax, borrowing and general fund appropriations from the town budget.

"Any of these funding mech-

"We will have a discussion as to what is the next step," said Egan.

Board member Kyle Kotary said he is in favor of more community outreach.

"This is a great opportunity for the public, through your committee, to bring ideas to us," said Kotary.

Daniel Plummer, also a member of the town board, said he is not in favor of funding open space projects through the town budget.

"To appropriate general fund dollars would be difficult," said Plummer.

Respecting the concerns of town landowners was a theme discussed at every advisory committee meeting since its formation.

"We are a fast-growing town," said resident Katherine Daniels. "I encourage the town board to work on developing an open space plan that will attract high quality business as well as a

anisms gain strength and viability if there is a plan around them," said Smolinski.

Supervisor Theresa Egan said the report is a comprehensive reference tool that will take some time to review. She added the board would retain the final say about open space conservation issues.

The advisory committee also said the town should consider developing a comprehensive open space plan that includes public education and outreach to identify willing landowners who would like to in conserving property.

Presentation of the report was without its dissenters. Three members of the seven-member committee voted against presenting the document in its present form. They were Michael Waldenmaier, Valerie Newell and John Mead.

At the end of the town board meeting, a dissenting statement read by Mead said the task of investigating funding opportunities for open space initia-

tives is distorted.

"Use of these tools as an option, or even their inclusion in this report, can hardly be seen as working with willing landowners to conserve open space," Mead read.

Word of the dissenting opinion prompted economic development director George Leveille to respond in a letter to the board dated Oct. 27.

"CACC has provided a report that is fully compliant with the intent of the town board task that was assigned," Leveille wrote. "I believe that the CACC deliberations and its report are fully respectful of, and consistent with, the town's comprehensive plan."

AAA offers solutions for parental monitoring of teen drivers

Many parents rightfully worry about their kids being on the road on Friday and Saturday nights, but a new AAA analysis of crash data shows another time of the week — the after school hours — rivals weekend nights as the most deadly time for teen drivers. The data provide solid evidence that parents need to be just as focused on monitoring their teens' driving Monday through Friday afternoons as during the weekend nights they've been conditioned to worry about, according to AAA Hudson Valley Traffic Safety Services.

In analysis of crash data, AAA Hudson Valley found that nearly as many 16- and 17-year old drivers were involved in fatal crashes between 3 and 5 p.m. Monday through Friday as were

on Friday and Saturday nights between 9 p.m. and 2 a.m. Between 2002 and 2005, the totals were 1,100 and 1,237, respectively, for the weekday and weekend periods.

"First of all, there are a lot of teens on the roads during the after school hours — driving home from school, to after school jobs, to sports and other activities, and out driving with their friends," said Tammy Melo, spokesperson for AAA Hudson Valley. "You also find many teens doing dangerous things behind the wheel during these unstructured hours between the end of school and when parents get home from work."

AAA Hudson Valley also noted that during these afternoon hours there is lots of traffic on the roads,

with commuters and adults making other trips, which makes driving more difficult for new teen drivers.

While the implementation of night driving limits for new teen drivers in 44 states has drawn attention to these late night hours when teens' crash risk is highest, AAA Hudson Valley says parents should be just as diligent in monitoring their teens' daily afternoon driving as they would be on a Friday or Saturday night.

AAA Hudson Valley recommends that parents do the following:

- 1) Set very clear driving rules with your teen. Following the rules leads to a teen gradually increasing the driving he may do. Breaking the rules leads to fewer liberties. Parents can find a parent-teen driver agreement at www.aaa.com/publicaffairs.
- 2) Prohibit their new teen driver from carrying passengers during at least the first three

months of driving. Permit no more than one passenger for the rest of the first year of independent driving. Crash rates increase drastically for 16- and 17-year-old drivers as you add young passengers to a car. Thirty-five states limit passengers for new teen drivers. Every parent should do the same thing — regardless of state law.

3) Do not permit your teen to ride with a new teen driver. Carpooling seems like a sensible way for teens to ride to school, home and activities, but it can promote risky passenger behavior. Research shows that it is more dangerous for several teens to ride in one car than for them to drive individually in multiple vehicles.

4) Ban the cell phone. Teens have trouble managing distractions, especially while driving. Even if there is no law in your state, it should be a family rule.

5) Require your teen to wear a

seat belt every time he rides in a car. Teens have the lowest belt use rate of any age group, a tragic irony given that new teen drivers have the highest crash rates.

6) Make your rules known to other adults in your teen's life. A parent-to-parent agreement with your teen driver's friends can establish standard rules among a group of teenagers, making gradual licensure easier for everyone. Letting your neighbors know your teen's driving rules can give you extra sets of eyes when you're not around. You can also find a parent-to-parent agreement at www.aaa.com/publicaffairs.

"Parents should remember that 'there is no better role model than you,'" said Melo. If you speed, tailgate and run red lights, your teen probably will, too. Be a positive role model for your young driver and make sure your teen understands your family's driving rules."



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

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

AAA can help with passport rule

Starting Jan. 8, Americans traveling by air to Canada, Mexico, Bermuda, South America, Central America and the Caribbean countries will need a passport. The new requirements are part of the Western Hemisphere Travel Initiative, a provision approved by Congress in 2002.

As the deadline draws near, travelers can stop by AAA Hudson Valley's Albany office, 618 Delaware Ave. for assistance with passports.

Passport photos are also available through AAA Hudson Valley, and are ready in just minutes. Photos are \$6 for members, \$10 for non-members and free for *Plus* members. Under the new requirements, airline passengers from the U.S. and Canada traveling to countries in the Western Hemisphere will be required to present a valid passport for entry and re-entry in the U.S.

Through a partnership with Trivisa, a visa processing company, AAA members and non-members alike can get a new passport in as little as one

business day by paying an additional processing fee.

Travelers need only bring a birth certificate or naturalization certificate and have a signed letter of authorization from a post office or county clerk. AAA Hudson Valley can provide all the required forms and can help with the application process. Trivisa also processes travel visas for Americans and Canadians traveling overseas. This compares to the traditional passport application which involves downloading an application, paying for a passport photo and appearing in person at a local Passport Acceptance Facility. The traditional process takes from two to six weeks.





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“Ragtime” rocks the house at Cohoes Music Hall

Rarely, if ever, am I at a loss for words. Thus was the case Friday evening after leaving the Cohoes Music Hall having just witnessed the most outstanding production ever to be mounted by a local theater group in our environs.


Thirty-seven cast members, the largest cast ever assembled on the Music Hall stage, glided on and off stage with finesse and a poetry of motion usually only seen with national touring companies who pass through.

Based on E.L. Doctorow's novel, the stage adaptation of “Ragtime” by playwright Terrence McNally featured music by Stephen Flaherty and lyrics by

The enormous effort on the technical side of the show is evident in its simplicity and attention to detail. Jessica Costa's choreography moves the cast fluidly without ever making them appear cluttered on the stage. Musical director Michael McAssey has put together an amazing talent pool to often sound as one voice singing in the darkness. Director Jim Charles, the “C” in C-R productions, has taken on a monumental task and accomplished it with a sense of élan and style.

The cast is luminous. In a group of this size, there are bound to be weak spots, and there are a

few. So few, though, as to not worth mentioning.

Equity actors, Beth Thomson as Mother and Jerry Christakos as Tateh the immigrant, return to Cohoes to lead this amazing troupe. Their strong presence brings the cast to a level of professionalism rarely heard. Erin Willis as Sarah and Steven C. Rich as Coalhouse have two of the most pure, powerful voices. Jenna Cramer as Emma Goldman is emblematic of the strength of the supporting characters.

What truly makes this production reach the level of Broadway is the ability of the ensemble to perform so exquisitely together.

When one searches for adjectives to describe to a reader, something the writer has witnessed, one attempts to do it by creating pictures, and not sound corny or trite. Outstanding; superb, wonderful ... none of these do this performance justice. The loudest sound in the theater is the resounding

silence that occurs after the final blackout when the curtain falls and the audience realizes what it has just been a part of prior to the applause. The silence last Friday was deafening and totally deserved.

“We have to make a recording of the whole case, from the first day to the last, including the verdict and sentencing,” said Kindlon. “It will most likely run 3,000 to 4,000 pages when it is all put together.”

Post-verdict motions will be filed with the State Appellate Court in mid November and a pre-sentencing memorandum will follow. Kindlon said he fully expects his client to receive the maximum sentence from Judge Jeffrey Berry.

“Everybody who has been involved in this case from start to finish knew the stark reality of sentencing,” said Kindlon.

Porco is facing a sentence of 50 years to life.

“What that means is the prisoner has to serve at least 25 years before he or she can ever become eligible for parole,” Kindlon stated.

Once sentencing is handed down in December, the case will be heard by the Third Department of the State Appellate Court. Since Christopher Porco's father worked as the chief law clerk for the Third Department of State Appellate Court, Kindlon said he feels the appeal will be moved to one of the Appellate Court's three other departments.

“I fully expect the Third Department of State Appellate Court to decline the case because of a conflict, or a perceived conflict, of interest,” said Kindlon.

If the case is overturned on appeal, the prosecution has a chance to argue the decision before another trial is scheduled. If the case is not overturned, the

case would then have to go to the highest court in New York the Court of Appeals.

“We're hopeful for a reversal at the first level,” said Kindlon who just recently won an appeal on a court decision in Warren County.

“We do a fair amount of appeals work and see about two or three reversals a year,” Kindlon said.

Meanwhile, Porco sits in Albany County jail, convicted of murdering his father and attempting to murder his mother. In a recent “48 Hours Mystery” jail-house interview aired on CBS Saturday, Nov. 4, Porco maintained his innocence.

“I can't imagine attacking anyone, let alone my parents in that way,” said Porco.

savings from HAVA (Help America Vote Act) expenditures to go toward lowering the taxes. Town Comptroller Judith Kehoe said that proposal would eliminate the entire 2.79 percent tax levy increase and actually create a slight decrease in the town budget.

Although the fund balances in town are currently healthy, Egan said, she wants to look down the road three to four years.

The town is fortunate to have very little debt, but future capital projects to the infrastructure are inevitable according to Egan.

“One-third of the infrastructure in our ground is 80 years old or older,” said Egan. “It's going to break.”

“We certainly, among board members, have a difference of philosophy in where we need to be,” Egan added.

Kotary said he believes quality of service, combined with adequate fund balance and keeping taxes low are his three priorities for a healthy budget.

“Is there a magic number? No,”

said Kotary. “Would I like to see a tax cut? That would be ideal.”

The 2007 budget calls for across-the-board, 3 percent increases for employees.

Tech Valley High set to begin classes next autumn


The funding, executive board and administrators are set. All Tech Valley High School needs now is a permanent home.

Since first glimpsing the shimmer of a potential technology gold rush in the Hudson Valley years ago, state and local leaders joined with tech-based businesses to begin capitalizing on joint ventures and investments such as Tech Valley High.

In the fall of 2007, Tech Valley High will begin to hone the high-

tech skills of its first graduating class, and in 2010, the school will send the first class of techno-49ers on their way to strike it rich in the valley that by then will extend from Rensselaer to Malta.

"We have quite a list of goals. In one way, we are hoping to give students a truly engaging learning experience when they see from the beginning the relevance of what they are studying and how it relates to the rest of the world," said John F. Ebersole, president of Excelsior College, and head of the team charged with formulating the

high school's curriculum, teaching, student life and recruitment of students and teachers.

On Thursday, Nov. 2, Tech Valley High School held its first board of education meeting, during which it named its president and vice president, in addition to the school's principal.

Paul Puccio of Castleton was elected president, Jeff Bradt of Cohoes was elected vice president of the board and Dan Liebert of Delmar was elected principal.

They set the date to open the Rensselaer County school in September 2007.

The school is set to open with

a class of 60 students. For the time being, the classes will be held out of the MapInfo Corporate offices in Troy.

At the same time, the company's chairman, John C. Cavalier, who is also the chairman of the Tech Valley School Foundation, will begin the hunt for potential sites for the permanent school and the necessary funding to see it through.

"The foundation has been chartered to raise enough money to build the new high school," said Cavalier. "We do have to put together the capital plan to build the school."

Cavalier has been involved in the formation of the school since the beginning, from securing a grant from the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation to state collateral, he said. He would not disclose the amount of the grant or funding, saying only it was "a substantial amount."

Tech Valley High School will focus on math, science and technology.

In its initial stages, the school's curriculum will be project-based, said Ebersole. Students will work with leaders in local technology companies and educational institutions. Companies like Latham's

Plug Power, a leader in fuel cell technology, which is also involved in the formation of the school, can lend its resources for coursework, said Ebersole.

As the curriculum comes together, school administrators will work with participating school districts, community members and parents to gauge what direction Tech Valley High should take in its instruction, he said.

The school is a joint venture of Questar III Board of Cooperative Educational Services (BOCES) and Capital Region BOCES.

Together with 48 area school districts in seven counties, the school will extend cutting-edge, on-hand instructional opportunities to 124,000 students.

Students attending the high school will attend Tech Valley High for four years. They will have to meet state regents requirements and will receive diplomas upon completion of their work at the school through their respective school districts.

As part of the plan, each school district will pay per student it sends to the tech school, said Cavalier.

Everyone can take to the skies – for a price

Aviation group opens its hangar to pilots looking to share the costs of flying

First things first: flying is an expensive hobby.

There's fuel, insurance, maintenance, oil, storage and more fuel to pay for. Oh, and there's the plane too.

A group of pilots has found a way around the financial obstacles that can come between a person and his or her ambition to take to the skies.

Condair Flyers consists of 75 people who collectively own and share five planes and the cost of maintaining and flying them.

It still isn't cheap, members are quick to point out, but, comparatively, it's the best means possible to take up flight.

"It's a commodore of people who love general aviation," said longtime Condair member Bob Ellwood of Guilderland. "It's not cheap, but it's less expensive. The cost is spread over 75 members for a number of things that can happen in life."

Those things include wear and tear, damage and everything else required to keep a plane up and running.

Last weekend, Condair Flyers held its second open house to attract new members. Recently, the club moved its operation to Albany International Airport from Schenectady County's airport. Through the move, the club is hoping to bring in new members who have an interest in learning to fly or those looking to have greater access to a fleet of single engine aircraft.

With FAA certified mechanics working on the planes and heated indoor storage, Condair Flyers members said they believe the club's move to Albany will keep the wind under their wings. An added benefit is that Albany International operates 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

The nonprofit flying club has been in operation since 1966. In its meager beginnings, the club only offered the services of a single-engine Piper Cub. It was the first commercially available general aviation craft built, in part, to meet the demand of newfound flying fanatics who were awed by Charles Lindbergh's landmark 1927 solo flight from New York to Paris.

The club has since upgraded its fleet and has done the same with its base of operations at Albany International, said Ellwood.

The club owns the planes through an equity system. Upon joining, each member pays \$3,070 to buy into the fleet. That money, in addition to \$60 per month in membership fees and rates per hour for each flight, will get members into the air. From there, they can work toward pilot certification or, if they're already certified, use the fleet for day trips or weeklong cross-country excursions.

"I had a desire for many years to learn to fly. I joined the club without any experience and have been flying now for four years," said Chuck Zarriello, club president.

Zarriello uses the aircraft for business and personal reasons, he said. Members can use the planes for anything except commercial flight, in accordance with Federal Aviation Adminis-

tration laws, he said.

Over the past four years, the club has seen roughly 14 new members, he said. He said he hopes the move to Albany will help land new members to replace those who have expressed an interest in pulling out.

Insurance mandates that the club have one aircraft for every 15 members. If they lose one member, they lose an aircraft. So the push is on to bring new blood into the organization and continue to extend its service to flying enthusiasts. Once people who wish to leave can be replaced, they get the buy-in back, and the new member takes their place.

There is natural turnover in the club, Ellwood said, but it's a stable system. It continues to grow, and remains the best path to pilot certification and part ownership

of an aircraft, he said.

Center helps kids reach learning goals

On Saturday, Nov. 4, a new learning center celebrated its grand opening at Guilderland's 20 Mall.

The Kumon Math and Reading Center, one of 22,000 international after-school programs in 43 countries, officially opened its doors to students from around the region.

According to the head instructor, Opie Velagandula, the center features "individualized learning" that is determined by each student's original assessment test.

"The goal of the test is to find where the kid is comfortable — what are the good spots and what are the weak spots," said Velagandula.

Once a student's learning level is determined the student

begins "a highly organized and structured process" to give students complete understanding in each level of math or reading before moving on to the next level.

"The goal is so kids become masters at each skill level before they move on," said Velagandula. "We make sure each kid is learning enough at his own pace."

Velagandula said that students of varying levels of understanding and learning are often placed in classes together in school, but the Kumon Center offers additional learning based on each student's needs.

"There is not enough challenge for high IQ kids and not enough time for the kids who are lagging behind," Velagandula said of school systems.

There are no time limits and

no age limits on any of the levels of instruction, he said.

There is junior Kumon instruction for ages 3 to 5, which offers pre-reading and math classes. The rest of the levels are offered to students up through and into high school.

The twice-a-week instruction on Mondays and Thursday, is accomplished through classwork and homework.

According to Velagandula, students would be given assignments to complete at home, which would then be corrected by their parents.

"They do the work themselves," said Velagandula, but added, "If they get stuck, we will help."

Velagandula, who holds a doctorate in engineering, has volunteered in the past to teach kids in after-school programs

for Math Olympiad, Math Counts, spelling bees and more.

"It's so important for them to really learn as much as they can while they're young," he said.

An enrollment fee of \$35 is required for each student, and the after-school program is \$80 each month per subject.

According to its Web site, Kumon was started 50 years ago in Japan by Toru Kumon, a teacher and parent who wanted to help his son do better in school. The instructional method was so successful that Kumon's son was able to do calculus in the sixth grade.

Kumon's belief is that "every child possesses untapped abilities, and the potential to excel remains central to our philosophy. In short, there's nothing a child can't do."

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

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

Entertainment *in the* Spotlight

In an era when thong underwear seem to be perpetually peeking out of the top of women's low-slung pants, it's hard to imagine that undergarments could elicit more than a raised eyebrow.

But at Capital Repertory Theater, laughter is the reaction caused by "The Underpants," a play centered on a fictional event in which a woman in 1910 Germany stands on tiptoe to watch the king pass in a parade — and inadvertently drops her drawers.

"The audience will be surprised at how much they'll laugh," said Kurt Zischke, as he took five in a rocking chair in the Pearl Street lobby of the Albany theater.

Zischke plays Theo, the bureaucrat husband in "The Underpants" whose wife's wardrobe malfunction has made her a celebrity. His concern that he will lose his job over the incident leads him to try to rent a room in their house — which is sought after by men who witnessed the bloomer bloop.

"The show has outrageous, funny and cleanly etched characters," Zischke said. "There's also an undercurrent of depth — the play will resonate with you."

"The Underpants" is an updated version of a German play called "Die Hose" by Carl Sternheim, whose writings regularly addressed the state of fixed-minded, mid-level bureaucrats. The update comes from one of America's more popular comedians — Steve Martin.

"It's still set in 1910 Germany, but there's a nod toward contemporary things," Zischke said. "It's more about celebrity and less about class struggle."

The play's director, Michael Haney, said Martin brought more of a feminist angle into the play.

"Louise, the wife who loses her underpants, is young and innocent at the beginning," Haney said. "She grows and learns a lot about her own power, and blossoms into a modern woman." Zischke praised Haney's "deft hand" in presenting the play, and on the day after the first preview, both men were working to incorporate the audience's reaction into their presentation of the show.

"I'm the audience's surrogate," Haney said of the rehearsal time. "The actors are savvy and smart, and they know what's funny and what's not. Still, the first audience's reactions were so large, we're tweaking the sound cues we couldn't hear over the laughter."

Haney, the associate artistic director at the Cincinnati Playhouse in the Park, is in Albany for four weeks. He was

last here to direct "The Syringa Tree," also at Cap Rep. He recently directed "The Clean House," which just opened at Lincoln Center.

"It's interesting to work in a different space," he said. "I like

comedy taking place. "This is a good play for Cap Rep," Haney said. "The intimate theater is effective; it lets you see the subtleties of the piece."

Haney also had high praise for the cast.

"It's always nice when a cast gets along," he said. "This cast is first-rate, and is bringing a lot of great energy to the stage. I hope the audience falls in love with them." Zischke said he was surprised to not know any of the other cast members in "The Underpants," but "it turns out we all have the same friends," he said with a grin.

Zischke and his wife, Victoria Adams Zischke, live with their 2-year-old daughter, Alexandra, in Beacon, Dutchess County. Adams Zischke acts, too, which means "our bedroom is in Beacon but the United States is our living room," Zischke said. The Zischkes take their daughter with them when they're performing, and hire a nanny in the town where they are performing.

"She's 2 and has been to 25 states," Zischke said. He has also led a peripatetic life, born in San Francisco and moving to New York City after going to Stanford University. There, he studied with the acting teacher Sanford Meisner, and was his assistant. Today, Zischke works "90 percent in theater, and some

film and television," he said.

This is his second go-round as Theo in "The Underpants." "I last did it five plays, or about two years ago," Zischke said. "I like that Theo is unassailable in his own convictions, whether they're right or wrong. A lot of the jokes are at his expense." Zischke said the play is fine for people 11 years old and up. "It leaves most everything to the imagination," he said.

"The Underpants" opens on Wednesday, Nov. 8, and will run until Saturday, Dec. 2. On Tuesday, Nov. 14, Cap Rep will host a socials night with complimentary hors d'oeuvres from downtown Albany restaurants, and pre-show entertainment at 6:30 p.m. On Wednesday, Nov. 15 and 22, there will be a post-show

discussion after the 7:30 p.m. shows. On Thursday, Nov. 15, the Skyline restaurant across the street from the theater will host Thursday Night OUT, an event for the gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgendered community, for an extra \$25 to be paid with ticket purchase. On Sunday, Nov. 26, there will be a discussion and complimentary continental breakfast at 1:30 p.m., before the Sunday matinee.

Blackbirds claim class C crown

The Voorheesville cross country program continues to make strides.

One year after the girls team won the Section II title, the boys team earned a state meet berth by winning the class C championship at last Friday's Sectional meet at Saratoga Spa State Park.

"We had a lot of young kids move up this year," said junior Macky Lloyd, who led the Blackbirds with a second-place finish in a time of 16:14.2. "I knew some of them had it in them to do well, but a couple of them surprised me."

"We incorporated a lot of speed work this time, which I think was lacking before," said McHale. "We also run a structured practice, which gives them structure in their running."

Following Lloyd's second-place performance, Voorheesville packed its next four runners between 12th and 21st place. Freshman Conor Cashin led the way with a 12th-place time of 17:06.2, followed by sophomore Ian Powell in 16th place, junior Ryan Allison in 19th place and junior Tommy Pasquali in 21st place.

Voorheesville advances to Saturday's state meet at Warwick Valley, where it will battle Section III power Tully and 10 other regional champions for the class C title.

Greenwich runs away from field

In the girls class C race, Greenwich placed seven runners in the top 15 to dominate the field. The Witches finished with 25 points, 92 points ahead of runner-up Fonda. Voorheesville was third with 123 points.

Grace Giampaglia's 11th-place finish led Voorheesville, which ran without Hilary Edmunds for the third consecutive race. Edmunds suffered a hip flexor injury two weeks ago and missed the Colonial Council Championships and the Troy Invitational.

"It makes a big dent in the program without Hilary, but the others stepped up," said McHale.

Chantal Little (23rd place, 20:52.3) and Kali Votraw (24th, 20:53.5) also finished in the top 25.

Eagles end 19-year drought

Stern leads BC to Section II swimming title

It was a day 19 years in the making.

The Bethlehem girls swim team received strong performances from several individuals to claim its first class A title since 1987 by 78 points over Saratoga at last Saturday's Section II Championships at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute.

"It's been a long time coming," said Bethlehem coach Doug Gross.

Senior Becca Stern continued

her dominance at the Section II meet. Stern won the 50- and 100-yard freestyle races and anchored Bethlehem's winning 400-yard freestyle relay team to earn her second consecutive Most Valuable Swimmer award.

"I'm just trying to do well," said Stern, who has lost only one individual race in her four-year Section II career. "I love to go to practice because the girls are so good. They make me work harder."

Stern set personal records in the 50- and 100-yard freestyles. She broke the 24-second barrier in the 50 freestyle for the first time with her time of 23.97 seconds, and she pulled away to a two-second victory in the 100 freestyle with a time of 52:52 seconds.

Stern wasn't the only Beth-

lehem swimmer who had a big day. Molly Howland and Katie O'Donnell qualified for the state meet in two individual events, two Lady Eagle divers earned All-American consideration and Elise Walsh qualified for states with a second-place finish in the 100-yard breaststroke.

"The whole team improved so much this season — not only in their performances, but also in their attitude," said Gross. "They expect to do well."

O'Donnell provided the first individual victory for Bethlehem by pulling away for the 200-yard individual medley title with a time of 2:11.23. She later placed second to Shenendehowa's Kara Zebrowski in the 100-yard backstroke with a state meet-qualifying time

of 59.10 seconds, 1.05 seconds faster than her preliminary time two days earlier.

"She is such a tough swimmer," said Gross. "Every time she goes up against someone who should beat her, she winds up winning."

Howland took first place in the class A 500-yard freestyle with a time of 5:06.04 and finished second to Zebrowski in the 200-yard freestyle with a state-meet qualifying time of 1:55.31. Zebrowski won with a time of 1:54.90.

Walsh came close to earning a class A title in the 100-yard breaststroke. Walsh challenged Shen's Kelsey Barbour all the way to the finish, with Barbour claiming the

Diabetes: some clarifications

There are three kinds of diabetes: type 1, known as insulin-dependent or juvenile; type 2, non-insulin-dependent or adult-onset; and gestational diabetes.

Type 1 diabetes (juvenile diabetes) can occur at any age, but most commonly is diagnosed from infancy to the late 30s. In this type of diabetes, a person's pancreas produces little or no insulin. The pancreas is a gland behind the lower part of the stomach that is about the size of a hand, which produces insulin, glucagon and enzymes that aid digestion. Insulin is a hormone produced by the beta cells of the pancreas in response to increased levels of glucose in the blood. When the body cannot make enough insulin on its own, a person with diabetes must inject insulin from other sources.

Although the causes are not entirely known, scientists believe the body's immune system attacks and destroys the insulin-producing cells in the pancreas. People with type 1 diabetes must inject insulin several times every day.

Type 2 diabetes typically develops after age 40, but can appear earlier, and has more recently begun to appear with more frequency in children. In this form of diabetes the pancreas still produces insulin, but the body does not produce enough or is not able to use it effectively. Treatment includes diet control, exercise, self-monitoring of blood glucose and, in some cases, oral drugs or insulin.

Gestational diabetes occurs in about two to five percent of pregnant women, who develop high blood sugar during pregnancy. Although this type of diabetes usually disappears after the birth of the baby, women who have had gestational diabetes are at high risk of developing type 2 diabetes later in life.

Warning signs

Type 1 diabetes carries several warning signs. They are:

- extreme thirst
- frequent urination
- drowsiness or lethargy
- sugar in urine
- sudden vision changes
- increased appetite
- sudden weight loss
- fruity, sweet or wine-like odor on breath
- heavy, labored breathing
- stupor
- unconsciousness.

There are several myths surrounding diabetes. The Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation's Web site clarifies some of the misconceptions about diabetes.

Myth: Taking insulin "cures" diabetes.

Fact: Taking insulin keeps people with type 1 diabetes alive, but does not cure the disease. At this time, there is no cure for diabetes. Nor does insulin prevent the development of complications, which can

include kidney failure, blindness, limb amputation, heart attack, stroke and nerve damage.

Myth: With insulin, people with type 1 diabetes can live a "normal" life.

Fact: While children and adults with type 1 diabetes strive to live as full and active lives as possible, a "normal" life for them includes constant vigilance, a daily effort to achieve metabolic balance, frequent finger sticks each day to check blood sugars, and multiple daily insulin injections. Even with the greatest care, it is not always possible to achieve ideal blood sugar control. Low blood sugar levels (hypoglycemia) can lead to serious reactions, and, over time, high blood sugar levels can result in life-limiting and life-shortening complications.

Myth: Diabetes is caused by obesity, or eating too much sugar.

Fact: While obesity has been identified as one of the "triggers" for type 2 diabetes, it has no relation to the cause of type 1 diabetes. Scientists do not yet know exactly what causes type 1 diabetes, but they believe that genetic and environmental factors are involved. Eating too much sugar has not been shown to be a factor.

Myth: With strict adherence to a specific diet and exercise plan, and multiple insulin injections each day based on careful monitoring of blood sugar levels, a person with type 1 diabetes can gain tight control over his or her blood sugar levels.

Fact: While the above strategy is certainly recommended as the most effective way to achieve and maintain tight control of blood sugar levels, which is key to preventing the complications of type 1 diabetes, it is not always successful. Good blood sugar control can be very difficult to achieve. Many factors, including stress, hormone changes, periods of growth, medications, illness/infection, and fatigue can easily cause blood sugars to swing out of control. Teenagers, in particular, may be susceptible to this problem, as their bodies go through the many changes that occur during adolescence. Also, some people with type 1 diabetes are termed "brittle," meaning that though they strive for tight control, and are in good compliance with their meal plan and insulin schedule, they still experience rapid fluctuations in their blood glucose.

Myth: People with diabetes can never eat sweets.

Fact: Limiting sweets will help people with type 1 diabetes keep their blood sugar under control, but, with advice from their doctor or nutritionist, sweets can be fit into their meal plan. And, if the blood sugar level drops too low, sweets (or juice, or soda) must be consumed to raise it, and prevent the onset of hypoglycemia.

Myth: People with diabetes can never drink alcohol.

Fact: Alcohol contains calories but no nutrients. Adults with type 1 diabetes do not necessarily have to rule out drinking alcohol, but they should talk with their doctor or nutritionist about how it fits into their meal plan, and about alcohol's effects on the body. For example, if a person drinks alcohol on an empty stomach, it can make his or her blood glucose level fall too low.

Local assistance

An organization that's working to find a cure for diabetes is The Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation, which supports diabetes research. JDRF is the No. 1 nonprofit, nongovernmental funder of type 1 diabetes research worldwide.

JDRF was founded in 1970 by parents of children with juvenile diabetes. Since then, JDRF has awarded more than \$900 million to type 1 diabetes research (including more than \$98 million in the fiscal year 2005).

nosed with juvenile diabetes won't rest easier, at least until the cure is found.

"The first six months (after a diagnosis) is such an emotional roller coaster. I decided to put all my negative energy toward something," said Laura Caponera.

Caponera's daughter, Kristen, 19, was diagnosed with juvenile diabetes when she was 8 years old.

Ten years ago, Caponera started the annual JDRF Gala to raise funds to find a cure. In its first year, the event raised \$31,000. Last year, it raised \$420,000 for research and development for a cure for JDRF. On Saturday, Nov. 11, the Caponeras will be hosting the JDRF's 10th annual gala at the

Marriott on Wolf Road. They hope to raise \$500,000.

"As much as this is a negative and sad disease, we channel our energy to make a difference," said Caponera. "Not only are we getting closer to a cure, but we are keeping our children healthier as we do it."

Caponera said she made a promise to Kristen, a sophomore at Syracuse University, that juvenile diabetes would never become bigger than her, and it hasn't.

Diabetes Month is key in getting the word out about how teenagers and children, like Michelle and Kristen, live with their diseases, said

Desimone. It's important for the public to learn that that diabetes is not only an adult disease, she said. It's also important to know that research has made major improvements in treatment of the disease and continues to draw closer to a cure.

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
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
