

However, with the recent departure of Theresa Egan, Democratic town supervisor, and the possible appointment of Albany County Legislator Jack Cunningham, D-Delmar, as interim supervisor, Bethlehem Republican Party chairman Art Scheuermann said he believes the a full slate of candidates will be on the ballot this November.

"There has been more interest in members of the party to run since Terri resigned," said Scheuermann, who has been chairman since 2005. "More people are becoming involved and interested because they don't like things the way they are go-

ing."
The Bethlehem Town Board currently has two Democrats, Kyle Kotary and Daniel Plummer, and two Independents, JoAnn Dawson and Sam Messina. Cunningham, who is expected to replace Egan, is also a Democrat, and would serve through the end of the supervisor's term, which is up for election in November.





Truck goes topless in town

Driver misjudges bridge clearance. shears top off trailer

"This happens all the time," said nearby Mullens Road resident Bill Bray. "I usually hear it first."


This time, Bray heard a loud screeching noise he said sounded like nails on a chalkboard but much louder. Then from his vantage point

Eagle swoops in under bid

Estimated costs for new school are \$330,000 below expected

The eagle may fly high, but contract bids for the newly named Eagle Elementary School in Bethlehem came in well below the anticipated price tag.

Of the nine bids received for site work, general construction, and other interior work, the total cost came to about \$7.5 million. That figure is well below the anticipated \$7.8 million original price tag.

"The overall project came in \$330,000 under budget," said Rudley Lewis, Sano Rubin construction manager overseeing the entire \$90 million dollar Bethlehem Central School District construction. "We're quite pleased."

The new school includes a twostory building with a two-station gym, full-size cafeteria and kitchen to accommodate future expansion, and a library and media center. The front of the new elementary school that will consist of brick masonry will face the entrance of Van Dyke Avenue across the street from the Bethlehem High School football field.

Superintendent Les Loomis said both Collins/Scoville architects and the Sano Rubin construction team has been an excellent fit for the overall districtwide project.

"We have had exceptional

construction managers from start to finish," said Loomis. "We have been able to deliver projects ahead of schedule.

The new school is being built to accommodate the growing district, which has-seen steady enrollment increases the past two decades. A contest to name the new school was held last fall with students across the district settling for the name Eagle Elementary, based on the eagle school mascot.


Sixty-one total bids were reviewed for the school with nine contracts awarded. LeChase Construction was awarded the general construction contract with a \$3.27 million bid. M. Sullivan construction will handle the site work for \$969,000. The building will also be environmentally friendly with some of the materials recyclable.

"Windows will face due north and south instead of east-west to control light, glare and heat buildup," said Richard Peckham of Collins/Scoville.

Skylights will be placed in the lobby to bring in natural light and a "daylight harvesting" project may also be included in one of the bid packages.

"Daylight harvesting includes a photo sensor in each classroom. and when more sun comes in during the day the sensor will automatically turn off the indoor lighting," Peckham said.

Work on Eagle Elementary will begin as soon as the weather permits. The new school is expected to be ready to be occupied by the beginning of September 2008.





Voorheesville board discusses cost of Tech Valley High

52 percent of district's costs for a student will be reimbursed

At a meeting on Monday, March 26, the Voorheesville Board of Education heard a presentation from Dan Liebert, the principal of Tech Valley High School, which will open its doors to 40 ninth-grade students in the fall of 2007.

The board discussed the merits of approving \$18,000 into the 2007-2008 budget to finance the attendance of student Mackenzie Campbell, one of 40 students selected from 38 different districts to go to the school. The board voted 4 to 1 to include the \$18,000 in its 2007-2008 proposed budget. Approximately 52 percent of the ipfront costs would be reimbursed the following year.

For its first year, Tech Valley High, a venture between Questar III and Capital Region BOCES, will hosts its 40 students in office space obtained from the MapInfo corporation.

According to Liebert, the school will focus on teaching students fundamental skill sets that are valued for employment in the field of technology. Those skill sets include group collaboration, presentation, defending work, thinking across varying disciplines and creativity. Liebert said the school would focus on "interdisciplinary thinking."

To start, the school will employ four teachers, all of

The new high school program would be the first of its kind in New York, and would look to add 40 more students next year, and eventually expand to 400 students. Liebert said the school would look to add additional space in 2009.

Liebert called the school "an opportunity for the region" and said it would contribute to professional development in the Capital District.

Even in today's secular world, we seek leaders. In New York, we watched state government closely last week, wondering if Gov. Eliot Spitzer could lead

people to an event so rare in the Capital District that it might be considered a miracle: an on-time budget.

Our elected leaders kind of hit the mark. But the budget that passed has a lot of kinks to be worked out, and came with a lot of "messages of necessity," features that let items get approved without spending the required time in legislators' hands.

The passing of this year's budget also makes us question some aspects of leadership style. Character education and anti-bullying programs are the order of the day in our schools, but our leaders sometimes behave in ways we instruct our children to avoid.

We've heard stories of verbal threats, screaming matches and, what's late winter in Albany without the usual round of backroom deals among the state's top leaders?

Do the ends justify the means? Does the good done with an on-time budget beat the ill will incurred in crafting the state's fiscal document for the coming year?

With a budget in place, roads can get built; school districts can properly plan their tax rates for the coming year; and the people's business can get done efficiently.

We in the Capital District – many of whom earn a living in state jobs - take Albany behavior for granted.

But don't forget that we the people choose our officeholders. While election season may seem a long way off, it's never too soon to know how our elected representatives are working for us.

In this online era, it's easy to keep track of our representatives and be in touch with them. Google your town to find out who your town board members are, and how to reach them. The state Assembly is online at www.assembly.state.ny.us. So is the state Senate, at www.senate. state.ny.us. If you don't know who your representatives are, both Web sites let you find them by entering your ZIP code. You can also look up legislation on the Web sites.

There's no need to feel resigned to matters. Pick up the phone, or hit the keyboard. Let our leaders know what you think, whether it's good or bad.

Teach your baby the sign of the times

Have you been in a public place and heard a parent say to an adorable infant who has become a screaming, crying baby, "I just don't know what you want?" Maybe you have even been that frustrated and embarrassed parent. Does the baby need a diaper change, to eat or are they hurt? Wouldn't it be great if the baby could just tell his or her parents what's wrong rather than cry out in frustration? Well, they can! Using American Sign Language to communicate with pre-verbal hearing babies has become one of the fastestgrowing parenting trends in North America.

Research has shown that long before infants can talk, they can use sign language to express their needs and wants. Research from Dr. Joseph Garcia in 1986 demonstrated that infants who were shown signs as a part of their daily routine could then use these signs as a way of expressing themselves as early as 6 to 12 months of age.

I wish someone had told me about this research four years ago. My son had a speech delay and at age 2; he could only say two words. Because of the frustration he felt from his inability to tell me what he wanted or needed, he had severe temper tantrums. They would last so long that we would both sit on the floor and cry. We had no way of communicating with each other. Had I known about Dr. Garcia's research and book "Sign With Your Baby," I would have had a tool to help us both. Since then, he has started a national

company called Sign2Me, which works to spread the word about using American Sign Language as a tool to communicate with babies.

Think of the possibilities of having more people knowing how to communicate through American Sign Language. Children, adults and the elderly could communicate with their doctors, nurses and family after having a procedure that has eliminated their speech while in recovery. The elderly would have a way to communicate with family and friends even though they are losing or have lost their hearing due to age. Schoolage children who are having trouble learning can learn much easier with the visual and kinesthetic emphasis incorporated by using sign language, which helps to increase their interest in learning as well as their self-confidence. Children with Down's syndrome, speech delays, apraxia of speech, and other learning or developmental delays, can have another tool to communicate. Adopted children from other countries or children who speak another language can also communicate much easier this way.

Laura Biggs from Austin, Texas, used American Sign Language with their adopted daughter and found success.

"We just brought home a beautiful 2-year-old girl from China. We began using a few signs one day after we had adopted her (while in China), and we have had a blast communicating in this way. She picked the signs upvery quickly, and we believe we have avoided a lot of frustration using them," said Biggs.

Garcia and other researchers have shown that communicating with babies and toddlers through the use of American Sign Language has significant benefits. They can communicate before they can speak, experience less frustration, and have accelerated verbal language development (which means that using signs does NOT delay a child's speech development).

Toddlers who can sign actually have larger vocabularies (50 more spoken words than non-signers at the age of 2), they have temper tantrums less often, and can be understood by their parent even if their speech can't be deciphered.

Kelli Goble, from Tracy. Calif., said she was grateful that signing helped her know that her daughter was in pain.

her ears were fine. I insisted that she was signing P-A-I-N by her right ear. He thought I was nuts, but ran some further tests ... and found that 90 percent of her inner ear was full of fluid, causing a 35 percent hearing loss. Without her ability to sign to us, the specialist said we would not have known about the fluid in her ears," said Goble.

Childcare centers benefit from using American Sign Language as well. Signing helps to lower noise levels, it minimizes stress and frustration for caregivers, it significantly reduces problems with biting (as children use signs to solve their problems), and signing adds fun to daily routine, circle time, and music activities.

With all of these benefits, especially for children, why doesn't everyone use the third most used language in the United States? Although signing with hearing children has been gaining in popularity, a large part of the parenting population still hasn't heard

I only learned about it six months ago while looking through books about infants at the library. Another hesitation is that some people think that they will have to learn an entire new language to be able to sign with their child. But Garcia encourages parents to use single signs to reinforce single words as they are spoken. For example, if you say to your baby "Would you like more?" all you have to do is sign "more" as you say the word. Even if you've had no prior experience with ASL, it only takes a minute or two to learn a few signs. Once you get comfortable using those signs, you can learn additional signs at a pace that works for you.

If you're interested in signing with your baby, toddler or child, check out "Sign With Your Child" playgroups, workshops and presentations in the Capital District. Attendees are taught the benefits of signing, how to begin and continue with signing, as well as some basic signs. At 2, my son could only say two words to me (one of which was "mama") At 10 months of age, my daughter is now signing two words to me ("all done" and "more") and is saying mama. I have better communication with her already. In my opinion, if I can give my child the gift of any of the above mentioned benefits, then it's worth the minimal effort it takes on my part to try.



Town encourages use of special needs registry program

The Albany County Sheriff's Department has a program designed to assist the special needs community during an emergency, manmade or natural, within Albany County.

Registrants should be physically or mentally unable to evacuate themselves from their residence without assistance.

Applicant information is entered into the County's E-911 system for retrieval during an

emergency. Local police departments will have the information, as well, and this information allows emergency responders to instantly identify the special needs of callers from their residences. Prior medical knowledge of the needs of the caller enhances the response time and efficiency of medical care.

"Currently, we have about 1,000 people registered in the program," said Garry G. Horne, director of community and emergency services with the Albany County Sheriff's Department.

"The unique thing about our registry is that it is the first in the state that incorporates information about people with disabilities into the E-911 system. Emergency workers will have valuable knowledge about the person before they arrive, which could be life-saving."





state?" asked Stoker.

Answers to that question were mixed, depending upon point of view. Board members Richard Svenson, James Dering and Stoker said they believe the new state aid windfall means next year's overall base state aid for the district will increase by that \$900,000 figure, resulting in a lower projected tax increase for 2008-2009 than expected.

However, Loomis cautioned that the district should not be spending more money than it may receive.

"You never want to be expending more in the fund balance than you can replenish," said Loomis. "Poorly managed districts get tempted to do that to drive taxes down in one year."

The board ultimately decided to use \$300,000 of the extra state aid to offset any tax increase in the 2007-2008 budget and set aside the remaining \$600,000 for the 2008-2009 budget. The district is projecting the 2008-2009 budget will be harder to balance because of debt service and a new elementary school that needs to be staffed.

"The 2008-2009 year is the toughest hurdle to cross, and we are projecting a 7 to 8 percent increase," said Loomis.

Average tax rates in the Bethlehem school district over the past 10 years have been about 5.12 percent. Loomis said the overall financial picture is more stable for the district after 2008-

"The future is bright, debt service goes down, staffing for the new school will be set and enrollment levels out," Loomis

Board member James Lytle said each year is a unique for state legislators when passing a budget, and expecting the unexpected is more probable.

"It's a year-by-year decision," Lytle said. "The Legislature is free to go in a completely different direction next year."

Gala to benefit Equinox

Nonprofit agency uses fundraiser to bridge the gap in grant money

Famous for its Thanksgiving Day Community Dinner. Equinox is not just about turkey. Throughout the year — day and night - its staff and volunteers help people in crises.

Equinox is a human services agency providing shelter, counseling, advocacy prevention services. nonprofit organization will hold its annual gala fundraiser, the Equinox Celestial Celebration. later this month. Called "All That Jazz," the event will take place Plaza in Troy on Friday, April 20.

"It's the major fundraiser of the year," said Chari Leader, community itself. who is on the board of directors for the agency and co-chairs the event with past-president and her husband - Larry Kelley. Because Equinox is "pretty much a grant-funded organization," unrestricted funds from the gala help sustain operations between grant cycles.

Leader said she expects about 300 people to attend, including volunteers, financial contributors, community leaders, college faculty and chamber of commerce members. "The community is very responsive. It's a very nice mix of people," she said.

Kelley agreed. "It's a way for people to help out, to give back, to support the mission of Equinox."

The co-chairs said they hope to surpass last year's event, which netted \$70,000. The money comes from tickets, which range from \$80 to \$125, a silent auction, and corporate sponsors. Excelsior College is donating \$10,000 and Media Logic and Hannay Reels, Inc., are each putting up \$5,000.

Up for auction will be roundtrip airfare, a weekend at a country lake, time-share accommodations, and a trip to Ireland. Leader emphasizes that many of the items up for donation are from local businesses, especially restaurants.

> "We target domestic violence, we do youth outreach, and we have counseling programs that assist families and people struggling with alcohol and drug addiction," she said.

Kelley mentioned some statistics to illustrate Equinox's impact on the community. For problems with addiction, the organization held 720 group sessions and nearly 2,000 individual counseling sessions last year.

In addition, Equinox provided safe shelter to 223 women and children escaping domestic violence situations and "bed nights" to 167 teens, often adolescents who have been kicked out of their homes.

With Equinox's new 18-room shelter that opened last October, said Kelley, "We can provide safe haven for those living in fear dayto-day."

And still, the numbers on

"The organization reaches out counseling sessions or shelter stays don't tell the whole story, said Kelley, because staff members are also fielding phone calls from women in crisis, as many as a dozen a day.

"It's not unusual for a 13-yearold girl to knock on the door in the middle of the night to escape a violent situation," said Leader. In such cases, Equinox provides shelter and helps clients gain access to help and resources from other agencies.

"The advocacy element can't be overstated," Leader said, stressing that Equinox has good working relationships with social service agencies. "It's an important resource."

The gala is geared toward fun with live music provided by the New York Players and a dance floor. The fundraiser is more about celebrating than networking.

People are very friendly at Equinox events, said Leader, whether it's the Thanksgiving Day dinner or the gala or the awards dinner.

"You can meet people and feel like you belong," she said.

Safety Bug demonstrates the perils of impaired driving

Car crashes are the No. 1 killer of teens in the United States. At Bethlehem Central High School, the students of Students Against Destructive Decisions club (SADD) are doing their part to

increase teen awareness to the dangers of unsafe driving.

On Wednesday, April 18, students will take part in "Lookin' Out Day,"

during which they will have the opportunity to gain real-life exposure to the perils of impaired driving - without being put at risk themselves.

Throughout the day, nearly 300 students (100 licensed drivers and 200 passengers) will drive and ride in a custom engineered car called the "Lookin' Out" Safety Bug. A trained mentor in the front passenger seat controls settings, which causes the car's steering to lose its finesse and prompt braking mechanisms to become unpredictable. The result is an unsettling experience for the teens who gain a firsthand glimpse of what it feels like to drive under the influence and to be a passenger

in a car with an impaired driver.

Initiated by Bruce Whiting of Whiting Insurance Agency in Glenmont, "Lookin' Out" is a national safe teen driving awareness program that is sponsored by Erie Insurance Group. Funded by a \$2,000 grant from Erie Insurance, the "Lookin' Out" program is part of a yearlong effort by the students

> to continually remind their peers to drive responsibly.

Driving costs are the same this year as last

onsumers feeling pinched by increases in day-to-day living expenses can take some comfort in AAA's annual study of driving costs recently released. According to the nation's largest organization for motorists, the cost of owning and operating a new vehicle in 2007 remains basically unchanged from a year ago at 52.2 cents per mile, or \$7,823 per year, when driving 15,000 miles annually.

"While costs for some items such as insurance and financing increased

from the start of 2006, a low er cost for fuel at the end of last year offset these expenses, resulting in no net increase in the average

driving expense for 2007," said Tammy Melo, spokeswoman for AAA Hudson Valley.

The average fuel price dropped slightly from 9.5 cents per mile to 8.9 cents per mile compared to one year ago. Fuel prices in the study are based on the fourth quarter 2006 U.S. price for regular grade fuel, which averaged \$2.25 per gallon as tracked in the AAA Fuel Gauge Report, www.aaafuelgaugereport.com.

"The costs of maintenance and repair, tires and depreciation remain unchanged from one year ago. However, minor increases in the costs of insurance, financing and licensing, registration and taxes offset any savings consumers might have realized from lower fuel costs," said Eric Stigberg, spokesman for AAA Northway.

AAA's "Your Driving Costs" looks at operating and ownership costs of five top-selling models in three popular size classes: small, medium and large sedans. The results clearly show that consumers do have an opportunity to save substantial sums of money by switching from larger models to smaller vehicles.

For example, AAA's research shows the average annual cost of driving a small sedan is \$6,219 per year, while a large sedan costs almost 50 percent more to own and operate at \$9,373 per year. Smaller, but still significant, savings can be realized by driving a minivan instead of a larger, more expensive and less fuelefficient SUV. AAA estimates the annual expense of owning and operating a typical minivan at \$8,639 per year based on 15.000 miles of driving. An SUV driven the same distance costs an average of \$9,997 per year, AAA reports, which is more than 15 percent higher.

AAA's estimated average driving costs are higher than the Internal Revenue Service's allowance for 2007 business mileage of 48.5 cents per mile.

associated with automobile ownership and use. AAA first began publishing research on driving costs in 1950.

AAA's study calculates the average costs of all expenses associated with owning and operating a vehicle over five years and 75,000 miles of driving using small, mid-size and large sedans. Covered expenses include fuel, maintenance, tires, insurance, license, registration, taxes, depreciation and finance charges. Driving costs in each category are based on average costs for five top-sell-

> ing models selected by AAA. By size category, they are:

 Small sedan: Chevrolet Cobalt, Ford Focus, Honda Civic,

Nissan Sentra and Toyota

 Medium sedan: Chevrolet. Impala, Ford Fusion, Honda Accord, Nissan Altima and Toyota Camry.

• Large sedan: Buick Lucerne, Chrysler 300, Ford Five Hundred, Nissan Maxima and Tovota Avalon.

Though not part of the AAA composite average, SUV and minivan information has been included to help buyers estimate operating costs for these types of vehicles.

Smelling up the road

Scented tires will remind you to pay attention to the place where the rubber meets the road

'ow often do you check your tires for wear and proper air pressure? If you're like most Americans, not often enough. A September 2006 survey by the Rubber Manufacturer's Association (RMA) found the majority of motorists are not paying enough attention to the only component that keeps a car on the road: the tires.

According to the survey, only 15 percent of drivers properly check their tire pressure regularly, inflating them to the vehicle manufacturer's recommended pressure; 26 percent of drivers mistakenly believe the best time to check their tires is when they are warm after being driven several miles; and only 36 percent of drivers know where to find the recommended tire pressure for their vehicle. That information is in the owner's manual, and also usually printed on a tire information decal attached to the driver's door jamb.

In an effort to raise awareness and promote driving safety, Kumho Tire USA of Rancho Cucamonga, Calif., recently launched a line of aroma tires. The tread of the Ecsta DX tires are embedded with heat resistant oils to ensure lavender remains in the air for thousands

Get an insurance policy that suits you

ust as there are many differences between makes of cars, there are many differences between auto insurance policies, although you have to look more closely to spot them. Choosing a low-cost auto insurance policy may end up costing you thousands of dollars, for instance.

Familiar money-saving pitches obscure complex coverage issues that may have you paying much more in the end.

Your liability exposure

Many auto insurance policies have low liability limits, which don't reflect an individual's true worth. In fact, in several states, the recommended limits are as low as \$25,000. Because every auto insurance policy is different, it's best to read your policy carefully and make sure you're not part of the up to 50 percent of drivers who are under-insured. If you are in an accident with someone who is uninsured

or underinsured, you could personally be responsible for medical expenses, lost income and other damages.

"Using a cookie-cutter approach is simply not appropriate for buying auto insurance, especially if you have significant assets to protect or specific needs," says Don Soss, chief under writing officer for Fireman's Fund Insurance. "You need a custom assessment of your risk profile when selecting car insurance. It's critical to go through an agent who understands and can respond to your individual

situation."

Sales reps vs. insurance agents

An independent insurance agent will be able to give you details on what a policy covers, and make recommendations on what is best for you, based on your lifestyle. This differs from a telephone sales representative who is often working from a script, and is only able to quote prices, not make recommendations. When talking to an independent agent, it's important to discuss the extent of your assets and net worth; your views about asset protection and insurance; and your expectations if you have a claim.

The replacement gap

Many carriers often fall short in insuring full replacement value for your car in case of a total loss. They usually pay settlements for total losses based on the actual cash value

of your vehicle, not on the replacement cost of the original. If you want to purchase a comparable vehicle after a total loss, you'll probably have

to cover the gap out of your own money. A few policies feature coverage, which protects you against depreciation in case of a total loss. Such a policy pays the full purchase price for your car, including taxes and license fees, if you total the vehicle during your first year of ownership. Even the deductible is waived. Each year thereafter, the company locks in the car's value as determined by the industry's



standard "Blue Book."

Multi-car owner penalty

Car owners who have more cars in the family than drivers can be shortchanged by massmarket insurers.

"Most insurers don't expect customers to have additional cars that aren't regularly driven by a household member," says Soss. "Most insurers assume that those extra cars are being driven by undisclosed teenage drivers who would otherwise cause the customer's premium to skyrocket."

In reality, many people acquire additional vehicles for recreation or collecting that actually are not being driven on a regular basis. In that case, it's best to find an insurance company that can customize rates, offering deep discounts for additional vehicles that other insurers can't match.

"In effect," adds Soss, "massmarket carriers penalize their clients for additional vehicles, whereas specialized insurers reward clients."

Small things add up

The items covered - or not covered - by the fine print in a low-cost policy may appear small when you first sign up, but they can assume a larger significance when you have a loss. For example, mass-market coverage for repairs often provides incentives for policyholders to use "in-network" repair shops, while more specialized insurers allow you to pick the repair shop you want without a cost penalty. Which do you choose? If you're not sure about the extent of your current auto coverage, look at the declarations page of your policy. Your agent can also help you decipher the fine print and make a true comparison between your current coverage and a more comprehensive product.

Since an independent agent is not employed by a single carrier, his or her first responsibility is to the client. Your agent has a legal and fiduciary responsibility to provide proper

coverage.

Additives

Regardless of the base oil used, chemicals must be added to give motor oil the characteristics needed to do its job. Typical additives that may be added to base oil include detergents to reduce the formation of residue, defoamants to deter absorption of air, anti-wear agents, antioxidants and others.

Although additives are typically only 15 to 25 percent of motor oil, they can impact a lubricant's performance much more than the base oil. For instance, mineral based motor oil with a very good additive package can easily outperform synthetic motor oil with

a mediocre additive package.

There is no easy way for a consumer to determine the quality of motor oil's additive package. Price is often an indicator of quality since the more advanced additives cost more to produce. Performance is the ultimate measure of additive package quality.

Advances in lubrication

Some of the biggest technological advances in lubrication are now coming through advancements in chemical additives. These breakthroughs have been developed by a handful of companies that specialize in high-performance lubricants, as opposed to major oil companies whose primary focus is refining and selling crude oil by-products like gasoline and other fuels.

What to choose


The easiest way to select motor oil is to follow the good, better, best model:

• Good: Mineral-based (regular) motor oils. These are the cheapest and most widely available oils. They typically use standard additive packages that provide minimum levels of performance and protection.

• Better: Synthetic motor oils. These man-made oils are more expensive than mineral-based oils but are still widely available. Their performance advantages come predominantly from the synthetic base oil used. They have a longer service life and offer some improvements in protection. They typically use the same additive packages found in mineral-based oils.

• Best: High-performance synthetic motor oils. These motor oils are the most technologically advanced oils. Although they significantly outperform mineral based or synthetic motor oils, they are about the same price as standard synthetic motor oil. They are typically only available through auto parts stores and select oil change centers. These oils primarily differ in their use of more advanced, proprietary additive technologies.

Still confused? For a used car with little life left in it, stick with the cheap mineral-based motor oil. For a car you plan to keep for a few years and want to get a little better performance from, you should at least upgrade to synthetic motor oil. To get the most performance out of your car, truck or RV, or to protect a vehicle you really care about and want to last, upgrade to a high performance motor oil.





Cars need to get in shape for spring

hen cold weather begins to warm, motorists may think their driving cares have melted away with the winter ice and snow. Not so.

"Spring brings its own set of challenges for safety-conscious drivers," says Jim Sinclair, vice president of service for Subaru of America, Inc. "Many drivers underestimate the need for control that all-wheel drive provides in slick rainy conditions - after the snow and ice have melted."

Just as you winterized your car with an eye to safety last fall, it's time to begin work on your spring automotive safety checklist. Here are some hints for ensuring your car is in top condition for safe spring motoring:

• Rain is a common spring driving hazard. While most people think of ice or snow when cautioned about slippery roads, the truth is, wet roads can be just as slick. Tires can hydroplane on a layer of water, losing contact with the road and causing the vehicle to skid. Rain lifts oil and other slippery fluids, dripped by passing autos, creating a slick layer on the



blacktop. Flooded roads can flood out engines. Slow down on wet roads. Consider buying a vehicle with features like all-wheel drive and electronic stability control.

• Start out with a safe car. Studies show that all-wheel drive and electronic stability control significantly reduce the risk of being involved in a crash. Automakers are beginning to offer the technologies on more models. Subaru offers both as standard equipment on models like its B9 Tribeca that has earned the top safety ratings from industry watchdogs such as the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (www.safecar.gov) and the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety (www.iihs.org).

• Replace worn tires. Your tires are what keep the car on the road. Worn out treads provide less traction and greater chance to slide. Likewise, make sure tires are inflated properly according to your vehicle's owner's manual.

• Spring showers bring May flowers, but let this be a reminder to also check and replace worn wiper blades. Poorly maintained windshield wipers



can hamper visibility in poor weather. After a long winter of salt and other road residue on the windows, wiper effectiveness is greatly enhanced by cleaning the glass with a strong glass cleaner that can remove the oily film. And don't forget the inside of the glass. Removing the film on the inside can help the defroster clear faster and reduce moisture build-up.

As part of its National Car

checking tire treads and
windshield wiper quality in
preparation for spring driving
conditions.

"In our research of vehicles brought in for their April check-up, close to one-fifth of vehicles (17 percent) had front windshield wiper failures and 12 percent of vehicles needed service on their rear wipers and/or washers," says Rich White, executive director of the Car Care Council.

Spring rain can also dampen visibility so it is important to check all vehicle lighting including headlights, taillights, back-up lights, turn signals, parking lights and brake lights. These lights are important not only because they help you to see, but also serve as a way to help you communicate clearly with other motorists.

Take advantage of safety resources. Throughout National Car Care month, many dealerships offer free safety screenings to motorists who drive the brand of car sold at the dealership. For example, starting in April and continuing through spring, participating Subaru dealers will conduct free professional diagnostics on all Subaru models. 

Safe cars can mean safe teen drivers


arents, are you protecting your teen driver when she gets behind the wheel? Traffic crashes result in 44 percent of teen deaths, the leading cause of teen fatalities in the U.S., according to the National Safety Council. But driving and insurance experts agree that parents can play a big role in helping their teens stay safe.

"Parents should monitor their teen's driving habits and the condition of the vehicle they drive because drivers are responsible for the lives of their passengers and everyone else on the road with them," says Charles Valinotti of General Casualty.

Boring can be safer

Putting your child in a safe vehicle helps protect her and

could also lower your insurance rates. Valinotti recommends teens drive slightly older, sturdier vehicles in good condition and



old come with standard safety features, such as airbags, head restraints and anti-lock brakes.

Avoid vehicles with performance features such as turbo-charged engines and high-performance tires, which encourage more aggressive driving.

Maintain a safe vehicle

"A lot of teens don't realize vehicle maintenance is just as important as its make and model," says John Blodnick of Unigard Insurance Company. "It's your job to make sure the vehicle is running properly - not just to give them gas money."

In addition to routine oil changes, Blodnick says, pay special attention to these items to keep your teen driving safely:

 Tire condition. Make sure tires have good tread, especially in the winter months.

 Tire pressure. Check pressure

regularly, especially in colder weather. Air compresses one



pound per square inch (PSI) for each 10-degree temperature drop. Check tire pressure when the vehicle hasn't been driven and fill to the PSI levels listed on the tires.

 Brakes. Test brakes regularly. Educate your teens about warning signs, such as squeaking, the need to apply more pressure to stop, or longer stopping time.

 Window washer fluid and blades. A clean windshield increases visibility. Make sure fluid levels and wiper blades are adequate, especially during snowy conditions.

• Headlights and taillights. Check to ensure they're clean and functioning. This increases visibility and can help avoid traf-

fic citations or accidents.

Put it in writing

Before you hand your child

the car keys, Valinotti recommends discussing responsibilities and drawing up a driving contract containing their responsibilities for vehicle maintenance and driving safely, including:

 Obey the speed limit and traffic laws.

 Wear a seatbelt and ensure passengers buckle up too.

 Do not drink or use drugs or ride in a vehicle operated by someone under the influence.

· Follow applicable graduated licensing laws that limit the number of passengers.

· Don't be distracted by cell phones, iPods and loud music.

• Tell parents where you're going and when you expect to return.

 Budget enough travel time. Call to let parents know you're running late instead of speeding and risking an accident to make

 Obey the nighttime driving curfew.

Also, discuss the consequences if the rules are broken. These could include loss of driving privileges and paying fines or repair costs. Both parents and teen should sign and date the contract.

"Laws help teens drive safely. but parents can help ensure their kids obey them," says Valinotti, "You can set a good example when you're driving and set appropriate limits to ensure safe driving.'

Safety leads to savings

Following traffic laws and avoiding citations also help keep insurance rates down. Your teen's insurance will increase — even double or triple — if she is ticketed for driving under the influence. General Casualty, Unigard and other providers offer savings of 10 to 20 percent if your child gets good grades and maintains a "B" or 3.0 grade point average (on a 4.0 scale).

If your child is involved in an accident that damages your car, your insurance rates could increase and end up costing more than the repairs, so keep this in mind when reporting a fender bender. If you can afford to pay for the repairs yourself instead of reporting the claim, you may save money in the long run.





A ccording to the National Highway Safety Administration, motor vehicle accidents in the U.S. resulted in 2.9 million injury cases and 42,636 deaths in 2005, the most recent

• If you'll be doing a lot of highway driving, it is important to keep the gas tank at least one-half full at all times. The fuel reserve will be important to avoid being stranded in heavy traffic.

• Examine the tread on your tires once per month and before every long trip. Your tires should have at least 2/32 inch of tread depth. You can easily determine if your tires are due for replacement with the "penny test." Insert a penny in several spots on the tire's tread, Lincoln's head down. If you can see the top of Lincoln's head in any of those spots, the tread is worn and the tire probably needs to be replaced. Have it checked by a tire professional.

• Tires can lose one pound per square inch of air pressure

for each 10-degree drop in temperature. Improperly inflated tires will lessen the gripping action because the tire tread will not meet the road surface as it was designed to do.

• Prepare for inclement weather by storing emergency supplies in the trunk. Important items to have on hand in case of a storm are: a properly inflated spare tire, flashlight, blanket, extra clothing, candles/matches, bottled water, snacks, any necessary medication and a cell phone with a car charger.

Stability Control (VSC) to help enhance a vehicle's handling, particularly when there's a loss of traction control during a turn.

For example, the VSC in Lexus' new RX works in tandem with Traction Control to sense the onset of a loss of traction in a turn and react immediately. Responding to input from sensors that analyze wheel speed and steering angle, it detects when a wheel may be spinning too fast and helps apply the right amount of brake pressure to the specific wheel that needs it, or reduces the throttle if necessary. In effect, it reacts to danger before you can.

To see or not to see

Good visibility is a significant factor in preventing accidents. It's no wonder that the auto industry has been focusing on headlamp innovations. Among the most advanced front lighting systems is Lexus' available Adaptive Front Light System (AFS). isn't where the typical headlamp casts its light. The automaker has addressed this issue by offering headlamps that rotate and cast more light in the direction of the turn. The system takes into consideration the car's speed and position of the steering wheel to calculate up to a 15 degree rotation for the left headlamp and up to 5 degrees for the right headlamp in the direction it is turning.

Rain, rain go away

The minute those rain drops pelt your windshield, know that your visibility will be immediately affected. An often underappreciated feature on any car, a good windshield wiper system can help ensure a safe trip during bad weather. Today, blades are made to last longer and do a better job cleaning your windshield, vastly improving visibility. So when buying a new car, try out the wiper blades and make sure they function properly and work at various speeds. Lexus has taken wiper blades one step further by developing an available rain-sensing system that detects and automatically responds when water drops accumulate on the windshield. On the RX 350, for example, a rain sensor located behind the rearview mirror detects the presence of rain on the windshield. When it senses moisture, the sensor activates the wiper blades at the appropriate speed. When the rain intensifies or diminishes, the sensor adjusts the wiper speed accordingly.

The pressure's on

According to a poll conducted by AAA, 85 percent of motorists do not know how to check their vehicle's tire pressure. But the amount of tire pressure greatly affect how your car grips the road. So over- or underinflated tires can impact vehicle performance in acceleration. handling and braking, all the things that need to be at their peak to help avoid accidents. Make sure the car you're looking for comes with a tire pressure system that is proactive. Sensors in each tire should constantly monitor the air pressure and transmit the information to the onboard system's computer and alert the driver when pressure is critically low.





uit blaming the groundhog for the weather. The baby animals at Indian Ladder Farms prove that spring is here.

Indian Ladder's annual spring event, Baby Animal Daze, not only brings smiles to visitors' faces, but also represents the beginning of the farm's growing season: It's a welcoming of new life and a promise of earth's bounty to come.

It's also a favorite with area families.

"It gives kids the experience to get close to animals, to pet the animals," said Liesl Bailey, special events coordinator at Indian Ladder Farms. Animal guides are there to assist, holding the animals for kids to touch.

For first timers — kids who haven't experienced baby chicks or bunnies can be "really special," said Bailey. So much so, that kids who've come in the past insist on return visits.

The babies this year are bunnies, pigs, calves, goat kids, lambs, and assorted poultry chicks. Even turkey chicks, "which are really, really cute," said Bailey, before they grow up and become, well, rather ugly.

Another building hosts a Farm Animal Learning Center with hands-on exhibits about domesticated animals and products that come from them, as well as how to feed and care for animals. Bailey said it's "where you can learn about the co-dependence between animals

and people." **Baby Animal Daze** runs through Sunday, April 22, with special events on the weekends. Also on weekends, pony rides and horse drawn wagon rides will be available.

Companion animals will be featured during the weekend of April 14 and 15. A local adoption agency will bring dogs and cats looking for homes. A new

addition to the pets' weekend will be Musher Vick and his Second Chance sled dogs, adoptees trained to work as a sled

team. The Blessing of the Animals will take place Sunday,

April 15 at 2 p.m. Visitors are welcome to bring their own pets to the ceremony. A procession around the farm will allow the farm's own animals to be blessed.

Earth Day will be celebrated during the weekend of April 21 and 22. Worm composting, recycling events, and nature walks will be featured, said Bailey, "and Kelly Martin is bringing her raptors."

Another new attraction from April 21 to 22 is a weekend camp, called Wigwam Weekend and led by naturalist and native peoples educator Vince Walsh of the Kawing Crow Awareness Center. Kids enrolled in the camp will learn to harvest tree bark and weave it into the structure using the methods of northeastern woodland peoples, like the Irogouis. Tuition is \$85 for the two-day camp, including lunch.

If it's just the baby animals you want, however, Bailey said



Proponents of public water say accountability is key

Ever wonder where your water comes from and how it gets there? When you pay your water bill, ever wonder where it goes?

For most Capital District residents, their water system is run by the local government, which uses taxes and user fees to pay for its maintenance and upkeep. The local government taxes its residents to pay off the debt to build the system and charges a user fee for any resident hooked to the system.

For example, residents in Guilderland who are hooked up to the municipal water system pay a user fee per 1,000 gallons used, and any-

one who lives in the water district pays an Ad Valorem tax equaling \$1.01 per \$1,000 of assessed property value. The Ad Valorem tax is used to pay off the debt that was incurred while building the water system's infrastructure.

Those in favor of municipally run water systems cite their many benefits, including the fact that those systems are governed by elected officials who are accountable to the residents.

Guilderland water and wastewater Superintendent William West said a privately controlled water system is not a good idea.

"When you have a private company, they are for profit. Private companies are only accountable to

the stockholder, and the customer doesn't have any recourse if they aren't doing a good job. The town board is more accountable to the public and the public can show its displeasure through public hearings and voting," West said.

According to Ballston highway and water Superintendent Joseph Whalen, another benefit to publicly run systems is that the local government knows exactly what it is getting; where the water lines are, exactly what goes into the ground and who is responsible for checking it.

Saratoga County Supervisor Anita Daly, a Republican, one of Clifton Park's representatives on the county board, has publicly spoken out against using private water.

Daly has said her research shows that privatizing water in Clifton Park would be detrimental for the town.

The Saratoga County water plan would draw water from the Hudson River in Moreau State Park and pipe it along the Northway to the southern end of the county. The plan will cost \$67 million and depends on a \$4.8 million loan from the county general fund. Saratoga County taxpayers will be paying for the system regardless of whether their municipality buys water from the Saratoga County Water Authority.

Clifton Park Supervisor Philip Barrett said his town makes up 20 percent of the county, so a large chunk of that money will be coming from Clifton Park residents.

Charlton town Supervisor Alan Grattidge, also on the Saratoga County Board of Supervisors, supports the county water plan even though Charlton has no plans to hook up to it.

"This is a much better plan than the private plan the town of Clifton Park was floating. This is going to be county-wide water, which will take care of the Northway corridor of the county for the next hundred years."

Grattidge said water should be under public control.

"Water is a utility that is beneficial to be under the control of the public sector. It is one of these essential services you aren't trying to make money with it you are trying to provide a service to your people," Grattidge said. "A private company is trying to make the most out of the product and make a profit. You might get savings on the initial investment but they are there for the purpose of making profit, while we are there to produce and essential service at the lowest possible price."

Barrett said he isn't against using a private company like Veolia Water North America to get water to Clifton Park from Schenectady.

"Everything comes down to bucks," Barrett said. "However the water authority can get the best product at the best price is the right decision."

Forest campus in Malta. The state and AMD in March signed an agreement that would see a \$3.2 billion plant constructed between 2007 and 2009, but the company hasn't signed a water purchase contract.

A few dissenting voices have come out against a countywide water system.

In Clifton Park, town Supervisor and Saratoga County Board of Supervisors chairman Philip Barrett has entertained the possibility of having a private company supply water to Clifton Park.

Veolia Water "Basically, North America approached the Clifton Park Water Authority a few months ago and said, We know you are looking at options, and we'd like to make you an offer," said Barrett.

The water company offered to supply water from the City of Schenectady, where the company already runs its treatment plant. No deal has been put on the table, Barrett said, but it is one of several options the town

is looking at.

'An unexpected option came about - something that is promising enough that the authority decided to take a serious look at it," he said. "The only thing that I've ever said to the county water authority is I want the best product at the best price."

Since The Clifton Park Water Authority heard Veolia's presentation, fellow Saratoga County Supervisor Anita Daly has announced that she backs the county's water plan and does not support her town's efforts to purchase water from Veolia.

Daly said research led her believe that privatizing a water supply would be detrimental for Clifton Park in the long run and mentioned several activist groups that are against putting public water systems in the hands of private companies as she made her case against Veolia. Private water companies, she said, have a history of safety and quality concerns.

This is a health and safety issue," said Daly.

Barrett said some people are simply afraid of privatization.

"We aren't afraid of privatization nor should anyone be," said Barrett. "We live in an area so dominated by government that folks get scared with privatization. If the price is right, if they can do it, if it ends up being best product at best price and we can structure an agreement that would help Clifton Park,

we aren't going to shy away because it's a private company. If the price is good, then there is certainly no reason to fear privatization'

Daly's health and safety concerns are unfounded, Barrett

"We have plenty of control over the water system. The City of Schenectady is supplying the water, and it comes from the same source they have been using for God knows how many years. It is a proven water source, which is regulated by Schenectady and other agencies," said Barrett. "The City of Schenectady would make sure the water they are providing is good, and Veolia's only involvement would be the management of the pipeline."

Barrett also said that with a publicly funded water system, the taxpayers foot the bill whether it fails or prospers.

"If anything goes wrong, the county has to go in and make up any shortfalls," he said.

But privatization of the water supply hasn't been so cut-anddried for some municipalities.

The village of Coxsackie, in Greene County, is a former customer of a private water company. A few years ago, village officials opted to turn over management of their water filtration and treatment facilities to U.S. Filter, now Veolia Water North America, the country's largest water provider, located in Houston, Texas.

"It was purely a matter of said then-Mayor Diane Ringwald. "They said they could do it cheaper than if we did it ourselves.

Ringwald said she spoke with nearby village of Athens officials, who have had Veolia Water North America operate their water and wastewater treatment plants since 1992.

"In a rural community like Greene County, you talk to your neighbors," said Ringwald. "Athens has had a wonderful experience with a private water company, so we decided to check it

Problems with turbidity and overall water quality led the village to annul its five-year contract with Veolia in the second year. Ringwald said the annulment wasn't necessarily a result of Veolia's poor management but a lack of familiarity with the village's water system. Ringwald lost a reelection bid in March due in part, she said, to fallout from the water issue and said that Coxsackie's water system was bordering on antique at the time, with wooden pipes found in some sections of the system.

The village now has a sole, village-employed water operator with a working knowledge of the system's history and quirks.

Ringwald said this brings up another issue3: Do you want a little government in your private water?

In Coxsackie's case, water system workers were employed and paid by the village and the village was reimbursed by Veolia. This was a unique situation, Ringwald said, because most municipalities with a private water system, the operators and employees are employed by the water company.

"It was hard to get anything done," she said. "It was very hard to work when our operator had ideas and their management had ideas.'

The situation also complicated things when Coxsackie terminated their contract with Veolia, Ringwald said. According to the former mayor, Veolia did not reimburse the village for the last six months of payroll expended to the water system. The Village of Coxsackie is now suing the water company for cause and breech of contract to the tune of \$149,000.

Veolia officials would not comment on the litigation, but, like Ringwald, pointed to accomplishments made in nearby Athens as an example of their good work. When 1993 sampling revealed that the water plant had exceeded U.S. Environmental Protection Agency regulated levels for lead in Athens, they said in a written statement, Veolia developed and implemented a program that successfully lowered the lead content. The firm also engineered an automation/ alarming system for all the major processes at the treatment facilities, which reduced power and chemical consumption and prevents power outages that would cause extended interruptions of service.

Barrett said he isn't concerned that Veolia, an international company, has a lawsuit against it.

"I don't know of any large companies that don't have lawsuits against them," said Bar-

He gave as an example his own municipality.

"We always have a lawsuit against us, whether it's from someone tripping or what have you," said Barrett. "If we're only going to do business with large entities that don't have a lawsuit against them, I'm not sure we're going to be able to do business with anyone."
