Thousands mourn trooper

On Wednesday, May 2, in the town of Bethlehem, Trooper David Brinkerhoff was remembered as a hero.

Church bells rang as the beat of slow, heavy drums played outside Bethlehem Lutheran Church where services were held for the sixth state trooper to be killed in the line of duty in New York within the last 13 months.

"Trooper Brinkerhoff was one of our best citizens," said Gov. Eliot Spitzer, who attended the service alongside Lt. Gov. David Patterson and State Police Superintendent Preston Felton.

"He embodied everything it

means to be to be a great New Yorker and he reminds us of the incredible bravery of all officers," said Spitzer.

About 1,000 people attended the funeral inside the church. Another 4,000 to 5,000 police officers from as far away as California and as close to home as the Bethlehem police department stood in the church's parking lot and along Elm Avenue.

"Dave was a very committed, very dedicated father, husband, and trooper, and he truly will be missed," said Bethlehem police Officer Rico Fiore, a friend of the fallen officer. Fiore and Brinkerhoff first met at the officers' police academy. They each enjoyed jet skiing

Staying in bounds

Some local municipalities
give hiring preference
to locals

In an annual springtime rite that comes with the warming temperatures and blooming flowers, thousands of college students throughout the Capital District prepare to graduate. And once they have marched in their caps and gowns, many will begin the hunt for work. If they want to stay close to home, lock in job security and start a career in public service, newly minted graduates may turn to careers in local government.

The first stop for them could be a county or town personnel office where they can view job announcements detailing the requirements for positions ranging from library clerks to sheriff's deputies and public health nurses. State law gives

military veterans a leg up for public employment through bonus points that are added to their scores on written exams. But in a little-noticed provision being used by municipalities throughout the Capital District, community residents can also get an added boost when they apply for a job in the area where they live.

Known as a residency rule, the idea first came into vogue when political leaders in New York City sought to require police officers, firefighters and other city employees to live where they worked.

In the Capital District, the concept is drawing fire from policymakers who believe it flies in the face of efforts to bring a more regional

School budget vote nears

Effort being made to
encourage residents
to support numbers

In May 2006, more than 5,800 Bethlehem residents turned out to vote on the school budget. With 3,473 votes cast against it, the district's budget was defeated for the first time in 20 years.

On Tuesday, May 15, residents will again decide the fate of the budget.

The \$77.16 million budget for the 2007-2008 school year includes money for two new middle school teachers; two new high school deans; two house leaders; three custodians; one technology specialist; one payroll clerk; and an additional \$684,000 in special education staffing. The budget raises taxes 3.98 percent for residents of Bethlehem and 0.19 percent for those in New Scotland. According to a calculator on the district Web site, a Bethlehem resident with a home valued at \$200,000 and with a basic STAR exemption will pay \$2,891.51 in school tax under the new budget.

"I would hope the community feels this budget merits their support and gives them really more

Police nab 3 on drug charges

A routine traffic stop by Bethlehem police resulted in the arrest of three people on a variety of drug charges, including possession of crack cocaine.

Michael S. Walker, 39, of West Cossackie; John Krause, 43, of Ballston Lake; and Lisa Celello, 38, of Ravena were each charged by Bethlehem police with felony criminal possession of a controlled substance third degree, criminal possession of narcotic drugs fourth degree and criminal possession of a controlled substance.

Officers pulled over the vehicle on a muffler violation on River Road in Glenmont, Friday, April 27. Police then approached the vehicle, driven by Walker, and noticed a glass

pipe on the floor. They also found a silver switchblade with Krause.

A check of Walker's driver's license revealed he had four active suspensions, all for failing to answer a summons. The Albany city police department's K-9 unit was called to the scene, and a check of the car revealed two bags of crack cocaine with a total weight of 6.55 grams. A check of Celello's license showed she also had an active suspension for failing to answer a summons. Krause also had his license revoked for several DWIs.

Krause and Walker were arraigned and transported to Albany County jail, with each held on \$20,000 bail. Celello was held on \$15,000 bail.

Ravena man charged with DWI

Bethlehem police charged a 33-year-old Ravena man with misdemeanor driving while intoxicated. Richard Margiasso II, of 42 Wendell St., was charged with DWI, driving with more than .08 percent blood alcohol content and aggravated DWI.

Margiasso was pulled

over by Bethlehem police on Kenwood Avenue in Delmar after his vehicle was tracked by radar going 60 mph. He was then charged with DWI after police conducted field sobriety tests. He was released and will appear in Bethlehem Town Court Tuesday, May 15.

discuss the natural history of snakes commonly found in the Capital District area. Some live native snake species will be available for participants to view up close and learn how to identify them.

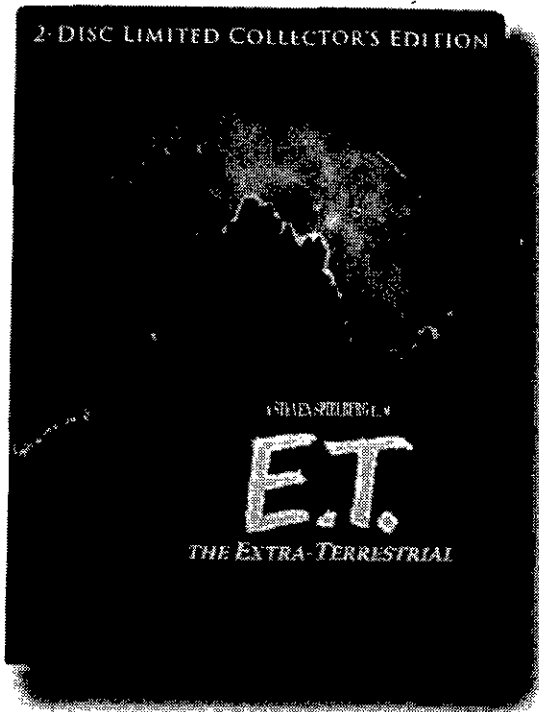
The three venomous natives

Governor adds his signature to Jonathan's Law

Parents pushed for change on behalf of autistic son, who died in February

Following the death of 13-year-old Jonathan Carey in February, his parents, Michael and Lisa Carey of Glenmont, have fought hard to bring reform to a system they believed failed their son, who had autism.

Their advocacy was rewarded by a phone call from Gov. Eliot Spitzer on Saturday, May 5.

"He called me personally at 7:30 on Saturday night," said Michael Carey. "He wanted us to be the first to know he signed Jonathan's Law."

The law ensures that parents and guardians have access to records pertaining to allegations and investigations of mistreatment of children in residential care facilities. "It is critical that parents and guardians of children housed in state facilities for the treatment

of developmental disabilities and mental illness have access to records related to abuse allegations and other incidents," said Spitzer. "This bill allows them to better monitor the care their children receive."

The Careys began their fight for the new legislation prior to their son's death. They have charged that their son was abused while a resident of the Anderson School in Dutchess County. Following an investigation by several state agencies, determinations of the extent of the alleged abuse were inconclusive. The Careys were denied the records of those state investigations on which the findings were based. After the alleged abuse occurred at the Anderson School, the Careys pulled Jonathan out, eventually enrolling him in the O.D. Heck Facility in Schenectady.

Jonathan Carey died while being transported by two employees of O.D. Heck when he was allegedly restrained inappropriately while riding in the backseat of a van traveling

on Central Avenue in Colonie on Thursday, Feb. 15.

"I know Jonathan's Law is going to make a tremendous impact on many people's lives," said Michael Carey. "This is going to be a really great starting point for reform to the mental health care system."

In addition to making investigative records available for parents, the law mandates telephone notification to the parent or guardian of a patient when an incident occurs. It also requires the state Commission of Quality Care to notify the parents or guardians when there is credible evidence of alleged abuse or mistreatment, and establishes a Task Force on Mental Hygiene Records to study and make recommendations on additional legislation regarding access to patient records and reports.

"This is a great victory for every child under state care, but this fight is not over. We must continue to be the voice for children who cannot speak

for themselves," said state Assemblyman Tim Gordon, I-Bethlehem, who sponsored the legislation. "Working with the Careys to get this legislation passed, has been an inspiration they have turned the most tragic incident into a cause for hope for all parents of special needs children."

The Careys have been actively involved in the process of passing this law, lobbying on behalf of Jonathan, and others like him. Michael Carey has said in the past that his hope would be that Jonathan's Law would bring sorely needed change in how the state cares for its disabled residents.

"The current mental health care system is unsafe and must be changed immediately," said Carey. "Many of the developmentally disabled cannot speak or defend themselves. The parents and legal guardians are the voice and advocate for their own children. Access to important information regarding their

children's care is crucial for the safety of their children. Jonathan's Law is about access to these needed records."

Carey said he and his wife would continue to advocate for the rights of the disabled.

"Right on the heels of this we're hoping to work with numerous senators and assemblymen for reforms for the mental health care system," said Carey, two weeks ago. "Lisa and I are committed advocates for the reform to the system to help developmentally disabled adults and children."

On Tuesday, April 24, the state Senate passed legislation that elevates endangering the welfare of an incompetent or physically disabled person from a class A misdemeanor to a class E felony. The legislation awaits approval from the Assembly.

"There are many problems in the system that need to be changed," said Carey. "A lot of people want to do the right thing. ... We're just trying to point them in the right direction."

Library budget up for vote

Levy increase reflects renovation bond payments

It's been another busy and successful year for the Bethlehem Public Library, according to Director Nancy Pieri.

The library budget is up for vote Tuesday, May 15, and Pieri said she can't remember a time when the community has not supported it.

The 2007-2008 budget totals about \$3.4 million, which would result in an overall total tax levy increase of 2.58 percent. Although the levy is up, Pieri said, overall spending is down by \$100,000.

"The tax levy is slightly up only because we have debt service due to our renovation bond," said Pieri.

The bond is in the fourth year of a five-year plan with a \$320,000 principal and interest payment coming due this year. The overall renovation bond approved in 2003 totals \$1.6 million.

"We completely rehabbed the inside of our building," Pieri said.

The next major construction project for the library could be a new roof.

"We are anticipating the need for a roof at some point because this roof is well into its 23rd year," Pieri said.

The library board of trustees set aside \$100,000 in capital reserve in the budget proposal to pay for a portion of the roof repair costs.

"We have been focusing on streamlining and trying to keep the budget as low as possible," said Paula Read, president of the library board of trustees. "Taxpayers are under a lot of pressure, and we want to be sure

we keep that in mind."

Salaries and benefits account for \$2.55 million of the library's budget.

"We have about 75 people on the payroll, and many of those positions are part time," Pieri said.

Along with a vote on the budget, voters will also choose one of two individuals running for a five-year term on the library board of trustees. Incumbent Michael Zalob is running for re-election and is being challenged by newcomer Yolanda Caldwell.

There are currently seven trustees on the board who serve five-year terms with

staggered term expirations.

In a recent *Footnotes* newsletter, the board of trustees said it is committed to the plan of service goals for the library,

which include information literacy, access to popular materials, learning support, cultural awareness and the library as commons.

"It's been another excellent year, and we are doing what we do best," Pieri said.

Ongoing community programs in May and throughout the spring and summer include the Big Read program, which promotes shared reading among the community. This month's selection is "Their Eyes Were Watching God" by Zora Neale Houston.

Events celebrating the Big Read selection include hosting jazz guitarist Kevin McNeal Sunday, May 13, and a discussion with journalist and critic Christopher Ringwald on Wednesday, May 23. For information on these and other events at the Bethlehem Library, call 439-9314.

A family's reading caper draws to a close

The school principal was holding the microphone. He asked if I was ready.

"I can't do it," I said, eyes welling with tears.

"Yes, you can," he said. His voice was very reassuring, but I still made no move to accept the microphone.

I stood with my back to the crowd, trying to gather myself.

No, this isn't a memory from my youth. This exchange happened a few weeks ago during my last evening as co-chair of the CAPER program at Hamagrael Elementary School.

CAPER, or "Children and Parents Enjoying Reading," is a PTA-sponsored program. One evening each month, families gather in the gym to listen to stories and poems. The readers are students who have signed up in advance with the librarian.

My family's been attending CAPER for five years. For the past three, my husband and I and our friend Deborah have been the co-chairs.

Getting involved with CAPER was an easy choice. CAPER provided an excellent opportunity to volunteer in an activity related to my daughter's school. The program is held after dinner, fits in with my work schedule, and is all about my favorite "sport" (reading!).

But now my daughter is moving on to middle school. She's aged out of CAPER, and, by default, so have I.

A few months ago I was picking up my daughter at her after-school program. Another mom picking up her son approached me.

"I want to introduce myself," the woman said, "I'm replacing you next year at CAPER."

"Nice to meet you," I replied, my heart sinking.

My daughter was in first grade when she expressed a desire to read at CAPER.

"You want to read a book in front of a group of people?" I

asked her. She assured me that she did.

The sign-up form asks parents to make sure their children practice and to ensure that the selected reading lasts no more than about five minutes. My daughter picked "Owl Babies" by Martin Waddell.

At CAPER, audience members sit on blankets (brought from home) and listen to the readers. The readers sit on a small couch at the front of the room. Readers can bring helpers (friends, siblings and/or parents) to the couch. The helper can hold the book or the microphone, or just sit next to the reader for moral support. There's also a student announcer who keeps the action flowing by introducing each reader.

I remember the night my daughter, at age 6, read at CAPER for the first time. I had butterflies in my stomach as I watched her walk up to the front of the room.

Rachel chose her daddy to assist her. He sat next to her and held the microphone.

Her expression was focused and serious, her soft voice amplified by the microphone. One of her legs carelessly bounced up and down.

I was unbelievably proud of her. And my pride extended to all the children who read at CAPER. These kids are basically reading in front of strangers. Maybe they know some of their schoolmates, but probably not the parents. It's a way of introducing young children to public speaking in a non-threatening environment.

Most of the children who read at CAPER are excited about sharing a favorite story, some enjoy the spotlight and all love the chance to win a new book.

Each child who comes to

CAPER, whether as a reader or a listener, gets a free raffle ticket for a chance to win a new book. At intermission, refreshments are served and the new books are raffled off. Kids can also bring a gently used book from home and take home a different one out of a "book swap" box.

So strong is the pull of this program that one first-grader gave up his wrestling night to read at CAPER. And a fourth-grade girl had no qualms about missing an outing to the mall.

Beginning readers are encouraged to participate in CAPER. The entire atmosphere is casual and supportive.

When I thanked the school librarian for promoting CAPER, she gave the credit to the students. Not surprisingly, students who have been to CAPER provide the best advertising.

All the readers get a certificate signed by the school principal. The principal and the librarian have opted to attend the program each month, and classroom teachers have also come in support of student readers.

The CAPER program requires only a modest budget. Parent volunteers bring cookies and juice). The program coordinators are responsible for posting fliers, submitting the text for the morning announcements and the school newsletter, providing a sign-up poster for the library door, soliciting volunteers to bring refreshments (and reminding them), and showing up to welcome the crowd and monitor the book raffle.

The only monetary expense is to cover the new books that are raffled off. I see the book raffle as an investment. Giving away books is a simple way to keep kids reading. Reading will build their vocabulary, open their minds to new ideas, and help them throughout their school years and beyond.

My husband was in charge of the raffle table. He would unpack the books and arrange

them across the folding table at the back of the room. The kids who won the raffle would run to the table with big smiles to make their selection.

"You'd think we were giving away chocolate," he told me.

But now Jeff and I are being replaced. Someone else will get to greet the new readers, someone else will hear the squeals of excitement as the raffle ticket numbers are called, someone else will watch the expressions on the faces of the proud parents.

I fell in love with CAPER the first time I attended and so do many of the children and their parents. CAPER builds a love of reading and a sense of community.

On three occasions, when less than a full slate of kids had signed up, I took the opportunity to read a story. Once I brought one of my favorite books, "Amos: The Story of an Old Dog and His Couch." Another time I borrowed a book from the raffle offerings. It was a comedic, rhyming version of the Rapunzel story, where Rapunzel can't hear the prince all that well so she tosses down everything other than her hair. I have a soft spot for funny, rhyming books, especially when reading

out loud to children. Plus the Rapunzel story had the word "underwear," which is always a crowd-pleaser.

The last time I read, it was the opening chapter of "The Phantom Tollbooth," a book of which I am completely in awe for its clever use of language, phrases and idioms.

At the CAPER finale there was no need to fill in. There was an extra-full slate of readers, and we ran over time. I wouldn't have been able to read anyway, I could barely speak.

"Welcome to CAPER" I heard the principal say. Yikes, that's my job, I thought, and I turned to face the audience. Mr. K. took the opportunity to thank Jeff, Deborah and me for our work with CAPER, and he let the crowd know that it was a bittersweet night for Jeff and me, with our time at the elementary school drawing to a close.

Finally, I was able to take the microphone, and do my job, one last time.

"Who is at CAPER for the very first time?" I asked the crowd, and several hands shot up, many belonging to first graders and their families. I smiled broadly, though not without envy, at the many CAPERS in their future.

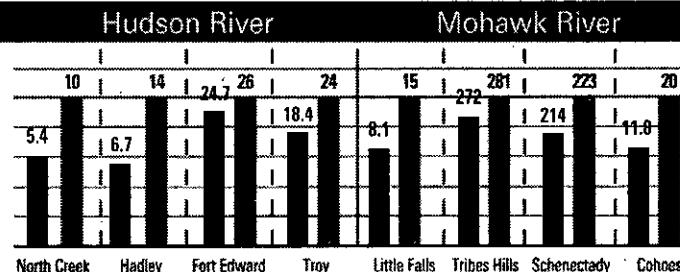

School board hopefuls make their cases at forum

A crowd of 50 people including school board members, the PTA and residents, listened to responses from four candidates running for two seats on the Bethlehem school board.

The candidate forum

held at the Bethlehem middle school on Monday, May 7, and sponsored by the Albany County League of Women Voters included Lisa Allendorph, Laura Ladd Bierman, Duane Bowman and Diane Giaccone Stever. Each candidate gave opening and closing statements and up to two-minute answers during the 75-minute presentation that was taped for a local public access channel.

Stever said she is one of seven children with three children of her own enrolled in Bethlehem schools. She said it is time for her to give back to the community.

Bierman, who served on a school board in Illinois for several years before moving back to Delmar, said she will call on her experience in community service if elected.

"To have an excellent school district, we have to invest in our teachers," said Bierman, who added that "teachers are the backbone of the district."

Bowman said he is running because he is concerned the district budget is growing at a rate two to three times faster than inflation.

'Weird Al' coming to Palace Theater

"I would like to be proactive and take a look at the numbers and see our spending to improve efficiencies," Bowman said.

Allendorph, the middle school PTA treasurer, believes the next three years in the district will be "exciting and challenging."

"We have a new school to build, redistricting to consider and the possibility of full-day kindergarten to address," said Allendorph.

Budget questions took up most of the debate from the audience from prioritizing needs to accountability to town residents.

"There are always competing demands for money," said Bierman. "School boards have to sort that out and decide the best use of money."

Each candidate said academics is the main priority. However,

Bowman, who works for the state Dormitory Authority, said there are inefficiencies and waste in all levels of government.

"This school district is a bureaucracy and finances can be tightened by making different choices," Bowman said.

Allendorph said the board should continue to open channels with the community as it decided to this year with the newly formed citizens budget committee.

"I'm a firm believer in community involvement, and we should reach out to seniors and those who do not have children," Allendorph said.

Candidates were asked a curveball question about an automated service calling residents in town and telling them to vote no on the budget.

"I found out about this today," said Stever, who supports the new district budget. "I think the budget

looks good."

Parents and faculty members who received the automated "No" vote call did not know the source of the calls.

"This is the first time I have encountered it," said Superintendent Les Loomis.

The Bethlehem School District budget vote is May 15 at the middle school from 7 a.m. to 9 p.m. This year's school board debate is being televised cablecast on TV-18, Wednesday, May

9, at 10:15 a.m.; Friday May 11, at 11 a.m., and Sunday, May 13, at 6 p.m. The \$77.1 million budget raises taxes in Bethlehem by 3.98 percent.

The top two vote getters will serve three-year terms on the board beginning in July, replacing outgoing members Stuart Lyman, the current board president, and Richard Svenson.

Wonders at the earth's bottom

The writer is a Clifton Park resident.

On Jan. 19, a group of Clifton Park travelers embarked on a 21-day trip to Antarctica, arranged through the local travel agency Custom Travel.

Why Antarctica? You may ask. Because fewer than 250,000 people have ever stepped foot on this incredible continent. Antarctica is the coldest, windiest, and highest continent on the planet. It is the fifth largest continent, larger than the U.S. and Mexico combined. Plant life is almost completely unknown. Antarctica was once known as Terra Australis Incognita ... Unknown Land of the South.

Don't let the cold part turn you off. In December, January, and February, it's summer down there. It was in the 80s in Chile and Argentina and 30s and 40s in Antarctica — compared to minus 50 in the winter.

We took off from John F. Kennedy airport and landed in Santiago on Jan. 21. There we took a half-day trip touring the city, which was well worth it. The next day we took a day tour high in the Andes Mountains to Portillo Ski Area. The trip up to 9,500 feet consisted of 26 hairpin turns. This world-renowned ski area receives about 20 feet of snow yearly. The valleys on the way up took us through large Clementine and avocado orchards, as well as wine growing areas.

Day three took us to Valparaíso where we boarded the MV Discovery Cruise ship. Our first port stop was Puerto Monte where we took a tour of the Osorno Volcano, which is 2,652 meters above sea level. Then off to the Petrohue Falls, which amounted to turquoise water cascading from above 1,000 feet. Through various falls over lava rock and on the way back we sighted llama, alpaca, and rhea (Emu family) farms.

After another day and night at

sea we stopped at Punta Arenas where we took off to see Magellanic penguins at the Otway Sound Penguin Rookery. These little guys, who do not fear humans, burrow in the ground to nest. It was funny to see a field along the sea with these nesting penguins everywhere.

In the afternoon we took an Andean trekking tour, which turned out to be a very strenuous journey. We were also given a ski

lift ride to the top and back down.

All the way down the Chilean fjords we would see large salmon farms along the coast. Thirty-five percent of the world's farm-raised salmon comes from Chile. Check out your local supermarkets next time you're buying fish.

The next day we cruised the Beagle Channel and headed into the Drake Passage, the rough-churning water passage between South America and Antarctica. We were very lucky and only encountered 15-foot waves. It seems we were able to slip through two storms where the seas were in excess of 30 feet. We arrived off King George Island and headed into Admiralty Bay. This area is the site of Arctowski Station, a Polish station with about 8 to 15 residents. We landed in Zodiac rubber rafts and spent time with Adelie penguins and huge elephant seals, weighing in between 2,000 and 7,000 pounds and measuring up to 15 feet in length.

The next day we cruised Antarctic Sound and Hope Bay. This area is known as Iceberg Alley. The glaciers range in size from a large piano called growlers; to house sizes called "bergy bits" to the size of the city of Albany. About one-eighth of an iceberg is above water. Icebergs are tracked and numbered. For instance, B17 is approximately 80 x 12 miles, the size of Rhode Island. We continued through The Gerlache Strait.

The next day we cruised Paradise Harbor and the Lemaire Channel while seeing whales, penguins, seals and various birds including the famous albatross that has a wing span up to nine feet. As a note, the only living thing to inhabit both the Arctic and Antarctica is the Arctic turn, which flies from the Arctic summer to Antarctica's summer.

Penguin rookeries are protected and walking is only allowed in special areas. You are not allowed to feed or touch the birds. They have the right of way, even if it takes them 10 minutes to cross your path.

Back on ship, some of us went into outside hot tubs with glaciers and icebergs all around. It doesn't get better than this. It was 47 degrees and sunny.

The next morning we landed in Ushuaia Argentina, known as "The End of the World," where it snowed and the wind was about 50 mph. Here, the beautiful

landscapes of Tierra Del Fuego are at your doorstep. Then we flew to Buenos Aires for three days. A Buenos Aires city tour let us marvel at the architecture while traveling down South America's widest boulevards, into the La Recoleta Cemetery, which holds the mausoleums of the Peron family and rich families of days gone by.

In the afternoon, we toured the Parana River Delta and took a river cruise through this giant delta, which covers an area larger than the Netherlands.

Argentina is known for its hospitality and steaks. My wife Judy and I walked down the street and across from the Sheraton Hotel we found the Las Nazarenas Steak House with a full fire pit in the front window. It was decorated in Old Argentina (Gaucha) décor with two levels and a very comfortable feeling when you walk through the door.

My steak (640 grams or 1.4 pounds) was a "demonic" at 460 grams, or 1 pound, was a sirloin. Both were the best we've ever had. Our whole meal came to about \$30. The next night we took 12 of our fellow travelers and we were welcomed with a bottle of Champagne. All 12 raved about the Las Nazarenas and would have gone back the next night, but time was running out and we had to return home.

Of all the tours around the world, this Antarctica trip was the most tranquil and serene. Every moment was filled with new sights, which you can only envision by being there.

Yet, we keep looking ahead ... we hope to travel to China this September, Tahiti in 2008 and Africa in 2009.

"Just the facts, ma'am, just the facts," to quote a famous TV detective. So what about the Bethlehem Central School District and the upcoming budget vote? Our school district is consistently among the highest performing districts in statewide testing year after year.

Last year, 97 percent of the students entering high school four years earlier graduated. Our community provides our students a high quality, wide-ranging educational experience.

The cost per pupil is 13 percent lower than the average cost in New York. Among the 12 local Suburban Council Schools, seven districts spend more per pupil than we do. The instructional staff pay scale is fourth. The administrative budget per pupil ranks 10th.

This year's expected tax increase is 3.98 percent for Bethlehem and 0.19 percent for New Scotland. This amount includes the cost of construction debt for the school expansion projects that started three years ago that account for one-third of this increase.

So the facts suggest that our community provides its young members with an appropriate, high quality education at a cost that is reasonable by state and local standards.

This year's budget proposal continues this tradition. And for these reasons, I believe the community should support this year's proposed budget with their votes next Tuesday, May 15, at the middle school.

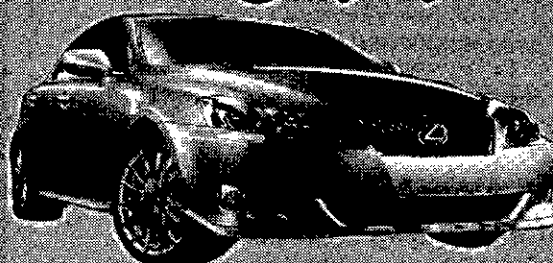

Local lawyer appointed to state incarceration panel

Group to review sentencing procedures

Michael McDermott of Delmar has been appointed to the state Commission on Sentencing Reform, which was recently formed by Gov. Eliot Spitzer to review the state's sentencing structure and practices.

McDermott, a former assistant Albany County district attorney who was the prosecutor

in Christopher Porco's murder trial last summer, has been working in the law firm of O'Connell and Aronowitz since the fall of 2006. He is among 11 members on the panel.

"I'm pleased and very thankful to again be able to serve the public," said McDermott.

The state appointment to the Commission on Sentencing Reform is an unpaid position that carries several duties with it.

"Right now the sentencing structure in the state is a hodge podge," McDermott said. "The commission will review current sentencing, alternatives to incarceration, recidivism, and the whole sentencing structure."

The commission will evaluate the impact existing sentences have on the length

of incarceration and community supervision, and the impact of early release, before making recommendations. Findings will likely be made before September with a final report submitted by next March to the governor and state leaders.

"The commission has a very broad mandate and represents a wide spectrum of knowledge and experience," said Denise E. O'Donnell, state Division of Criminal Justice

Services commissioner. "As chairperson, my objective is for the commission to make a meaningful contribution to the discussion about New York's sentencing structure and to make sound recommendations to the governor and legislature."

Appointments to the Commission on Sentencing Reform are made by the governor, State Assembly Speaker Sheldon Silver, D-

Manhattan, or State Senate Majority Leader Joseph Bruno, R-Brunswick.

Other recent appointments to the commission include Anthony Bergamo, vice chairman of MB Real Estate and chief executive officer of Niagara Falls Redevelopment; Michael Green, Monroe County district attorney; Cyrus Vance Jr. of the law firm Morvillo, Abramowitz, Grand, Iason, Anello and Bohrer; and Juanita Bing Newton, administrative judge for New York City Criminal Court.

McDermott has also served as senior associate and partner in the law firm of Bouck, Holloway, Kiernan and Casey and as chief assistant district attorney in Rensselaer County. He is a graduate of Albany Law School of Union University.

Town encourages use of special needs registry program

The Albany County Sheriff's Department has a program designed to assist the special needs community during an emergency within Albany County, whether manmade or natural.

Registrants should be physically or mentally unable to evacuate themselves from their residence without assistance. Applicant information is entered into the County's E-911 system for retrieval during an emergency.

Local police departments will have the information, as well, and this information allows emergency responders to instantly identify the special needs of callers from their residences. In situations like this, prior medical knowledge of the needs of the caller enhances the response time and efficiency

of medical care.

FEMA helps those with flood damage

Albany added to counties to receive assistance following April nor'easter

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has announced that Albany

County is being added to the list of 12 counties in New York receiving disaster assistance due to the early spring snow and rain storms that drenched Albany and surrounding areas in mid April.

The heavy rains between April 15 and April 17 caused flooding to several homes in the Capital District, according to Albany County Director of Emergency Management Terry Ryan.

"We are in the beginning

stages of talks with FEMA," said Ryan, who is working in conjunction with the county executive's office to implement an outreach program to assist residents in registering for federal aid.

"Our goal is to work closely with New York to help communities recover from nor'easter damage," said Marianne C. Jackson, FEMA's Federal Coordinating Officer.

Albany County is one of six counties eligible for individual

state or federal aid assistance to homeowners, renters and businesses. The program includes grants for repairs and for rent of alternative housing, low-interest disaster loans from the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA), and grants for other needs.

At the request of Gov. Eliot Spitzer, President George Bush signed a major disaster declaration for the state on April 24 following the storm. The initial designation was for Orange, Rockland and Westchester counties. Since then, nine more counties have been included. They are Albany, Columbia, Dutchess, Essex, Greene, Putnam, Schoharie, Suffolk and Ulster counties.

Additional aid to local governments for emergency work is also available through FEMA under public assistance. Certain private nonprofits that provided government assistance are also eligible. FEMA funds 75 percent of costs. Spitzer announced that

the state would assume the full share of local costs amounting to 25 percent.

"This storm put a tremendous strain on our local governments as they responded to the needs of our residents as a result of the flooding," said Albany County Executive Mike Breslin.

"I thank Gov. Spitzer and FEMA for recognizing the damage we sustained and providing us the resources to make the necessary repairs," said Breslin.

A meeting will take place with FEMA for local government representatives on May 15 at 10 a.m. at the Albany County Sheriff's Department, Critical Incident Emergency Management Unit, 75 Remsen St., in Cohoes.

Residents in Albany County whose property or income was damaged by the nor'easter and subsequent flooding may register for assistance by calling (800) 621-3362 (TTY 800-462-7585) between 8 a.m. and 8 p.m. daily, or online at www.fema.gov.

and Fiore attended Brinkerhoff's wedding at the Lutheran Church.

"It really hits home when someone as close as Dave is killed in the line of duty," Fiore said. "I'm still in shock."

Felton said Brinkerhoff is a true hero, unlike the false celebrity hero worship that many in our society succumb to.

"David stood at the face of danger, not just this time but many times before," said the emotional Felton, who said Brinkerhoff served all New Yorkers.

"He paid the highest price anyone can pay and his actions saved lives that day."

Brinkerhoff leaves behind a wife, Barbara, and his 11-month-old daughter Isabella. In an open written letter for the church funeral program, Barbara Anne Brinkerhoff said David was her strength, her love, her best friend.

"I remember thinking how lucky Isabella and I were to have you in our lives," wrote Barbara during difficult challenges the couple faced after their daughter was born.

ter was born.

"You told me that team Brinkerhoff would get through this. You touched so many lives and I know you will always be with us and will protect us," her letter read.

Investigator David Atkins knew Brinkerhoff before they both entered the police academy and were roommates living in Albany.

"He made me a better per-

son," said Atkins. "If he were still here he would tell me to pick my head up and be positive."

Brinkerhoff was killed in the line of duty on Wednesday, April 25, by a bullet believed to have been shot by another officer in the MRT Elite Mobile Response Team that stormed a farmhouse in Margaretville, Delaware County, that day looking for 23-year-old shooting suspect Travis Trim. Brinkerhoff was shot once in the chest by Trim and once in the back of the head by a .223 tactical round. Authorities believe the shot from Trim did not kill Brinkerhoff, who was wearing a chest protector, but that a bullet from a state trooper's weapon did.

Members of New Jersey state police, and officers from Rhode Island, California Highway Patrol, Canada, and Florida all attended the funeral for Brinkerhoff. He was 28 years old at the time of his death. Roads in the town of Bethlehem were sealed off for several hours the day of the funeral.

"We are family and we will get through this together," said the pastor of the Bethlehem Lutheran Church, the Rev. Mark Mueller.

for their tax dollars," said Superintendent Les Loomis.

School officials said a town-wide reassessment that left Bethlehem residents feeling financially pinched was the No. 1 reason the budget was defeated last year. After the initial defeat, district supporters rallied their forces and the second budget was easily approved in June.

Angie Randles, co-president of the Slingerlands PTA, said the group is taking nothing for granted this time around.

"We are making plans to get out the vote," Randles said.

Those plans include having students design posters, which will be distributed throughout town. Palm cards will also be handed out at different events prior to the vote, and lawn signs are likely to sprout up over the next several days.

"A lot of people told me last year they would have voted 'Yes' but did not come out to vote the first time around," said Randles. "I do feel that people will come out this year."

Members of the school board, led by president Stuart Lyman, have tried to improve communication between the community and the district in light of last year's budget defeat by televising meetings on the public access channel; holding monthly community conversations with the superintendent; regularly updating the district's Web site and creating a 40-member citizens budget committee to assist the district in crafting this year's budget.

"I think our budget and our spending is right in line," said Lyman. "We are educating kids, and our overall spending says we are doing it as well as any other district in the state."

In an informational handout sent to the community reminding them to vote, the district lists several factors for the 3.98 percent tax increase.

Debt service related to ongoing school construction, energy costs, regulatory expenses, computer replacement, social security costs, and salaries for staff are among the reasons.

The new budget is \$4.7 million

more than last year's, with \$1.77 million going to salary increases for staff. Salary contracts district-wide are up 4.5 percent, with teacher salary contracts increasing 5 percent.

"The key to the quality of education here is our teachers," said Loomis.

Lyman said if you factor in annual STEP, or Secondary Teacher Education Project, increases and givebacks in health insurance, the actual salary increase for teachers is around 3.5 percent.

Spending per pupil in the Bethlehem district is \$13,944, compared to the state average of \$16,044 per pupil.

Other highlights of this year's budget include restoring funding for varsity hockey, gymnastics and cheerleading, as well as for field trips and non-league athletic trips.

"I think it was really hard on those sports to fund-raise, and everybody at the BCAA (Bethlehem Community Athletic Association) is very happy the funding is back in the budget," said Theresa Barrowman, president of the association.

A school bus purchase proposition defeated in last year's budget vote is back this year. If approved, the proposition will allow the district to purchase 15 new buses for an amount not to exceed \$1.134 million. Five of those buses will transport students to and from the new Eagle Elementary School. Construction on the new school off Van Dyke Road is expected to be complete by the beginning of the 2007 school year.

"This year's budget moves programs ahead and accomplishes major goals," said Loomis.

Four candidates are also running for two open seats on the school board to replace outgoing board president Stuart Lyman and board member Richard Svenson.

Duane Bowman, Diane Giaccone Stever, Lisa Allendorph and Laura Bierman are the candidates. The top two vote getters will each serve a three-year term on the board beginning in July.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 9 p.m., Tuesday, May 15, at the Bethlehem Middle School on Kenwood Avenue.

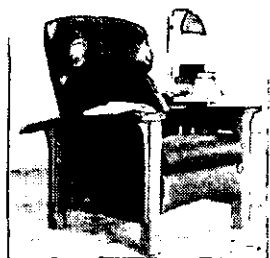

Teach kids the beauty of nature

As the school year winds down, summer is the perfect time to rediscover the outdoors. Experiencing nature's wonders firsthand -- admiring a garter snake slithering in the grass, planting flowers in the yard or devouring strawberries picked fresh from the garden -- can prove as captivating as anything on the TV or video-game screen. So begin today to get your kids to celebrate and capture summer outside.

Parents searching for inspiration don't have to look far to identify great outdoor activities that are nearby, easy and fun.

"In nature, a child finds freedom, fantasy and privacy: a place distant from the adult world, a separate peace."

And the benefits are enormous, studies reveal. Active kids do better academically. They score higher on tests of concentration and self-discipline.

"Unlike television, nature does not steal time; it amplifies it," said award-winning journalist and child advocate Richard Louv, whose book "Last Child in the Woods" coined the term "nature-deficit disorder" and also triggered a nationwide "No Child Left Indoors" movement.

"In nature, a child finds freedom, fantasy and privacy: a place

distant from the adult world, a separate peace," said Louv.

Not as many children today are discovering the outdoors. In a typical week, only six percent of children ages 9 to 13 play outside on their own, while a typical child in the U.S. watches more than three hours of television daily. The decline in outdoor adventuring is cited as one reason why the obesity rate has more than tripled during the past three decades, to 17 percent from 5 percent, for children ages 12 to 19.

But getting your kids off the couch and out into the neighborhood for memorable adventures is easy and enjoyable.

"We realize it can be a challenge for parents to identify outdoor activities that kids will consider fun," said Jennifer Hanley, outdoor living and gardening expert at The Scotts Miracle-Gro Company. That very premise inspired the National Gardening Association -- in conjunction with ScottsMiracle-Gro -- to feature guides to creative, outdoor activities on www.kids-gardening.org. The site offers a wealth of ideas on how to get kids outside and in tune with their natural surroundings this summer.

Hanley's nature and garden-related suggestions include a stroll around the yard or the neighborhood park to introduce children to the six basic parts of plants and their functions; planting perennials that live and bloom year after year; and designating a day for immersing children in nature -- without TV, computers and video games.

Whenever a child laments, "I'm bored, there's nothing to do," rec-

ommend any of these options and add enthusiastically that you will be glad to join in the adventure:

- Starting a learning garden in the backyard or neighborhood plot. This helps kids learn about taking care of plants (and the animals drawn to the plants) and respecting the environment and nearby nature. Your kids can take photos of the garden as it grows and produces whatever they've planted.

- Bird watching and identifying trees and plants that appear in the yard. These activities often entice older kids, especially if they understand that a periodic bird or

plant census helps detect any significant shifts in their populations.

- Recording sight, hearing, smell and touch observations on walks in your neighborhood, which helps kids hone their sensory-observation skills. They can log the information they gather using a scientific approach and even make drawings to chronicle their observations.

Janet Fouts, a West Virginia environmentalist, invented nature games with her daughter, Julia. In one game called "The Sound of a Creature Not Stirring," they would listen for sounds they couldn't

hear -- an apple ripening, dew on the grass, an earthworm moving through the soil, and a spider weaving its web, among others. Fouts maintains that this attention to nature's details helped in her daughter's speech development, writing, artwork and keen attention to detail.

By making outdoor activity fun, parents play an integral role in helping children appreciate the beauty of nature in their surrounding areas and understand the importance of being environmental stewards, starting in their own backyard.

A single tree, shrub, bush or container will help the environment," says McCoy. "It's one of the easiest ways you can make a difference. Imagine if we all planted just one new plant every year!" Trees and other plants remove carbon dioxide from the air during photosynthesis. This improves the quality of the environment by cleaning and oxygenating the air and removing CO₂. Plants also help prevent soil erosion, control water cycles, and moderate temperatures. It's the balance of nature at the most basic level.

• Start with healthy soil

Pesticides and fungicides aren't safe for people, pets or even the planet. Eliminate the need for harmful garden chemicals by pampering your plants with healthy, nutrient-rich soil from the get go. "Healthy soil, rich in minerals, nutrients and 'good bugs,' maximizes a plant's own healthy immune system to let it naturally resist pests and diseases," says McCoy. Compost your own or look for organic potting soils.

• Reduce fertilizer use

Overfeeding is not only unhealthy for plants; it also causes excess nutrient runoff that pollutes our streams, bays, rivers and other watersheds. "Plants can only absorb so much fertilizer before the excess nutrients run off into the groundwater," says McCoy. Fertilizer runoff contaminates drinking water, kills fish and other sea creatures and causes problems like Red Tide. Reduce overfeeding by using environmentally respon-

sible feeding practices, like the new slow-release fertilizer Dynamite (www.dynamiteplantfood.com). This nine-month plant food releases nutrients to the plant when the plant needs it most, never over or under feeding so there is minimal waste and runoff. Plus, it's low in phosphate making it a nutritious yet earth-friendly plant food option.

• Water responsibly

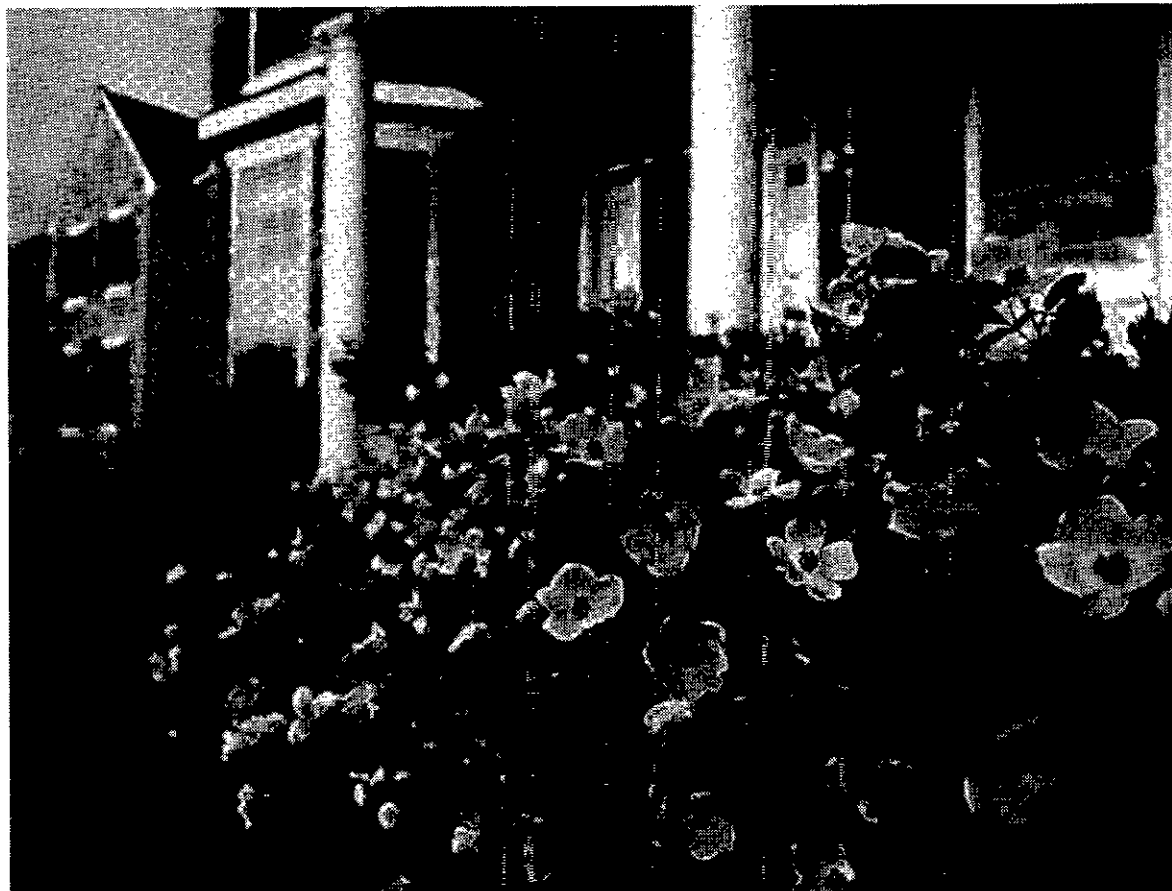
If you don't need to water your plants as often, you'll save gallons of time and money. But more importantly, you conserve water and protect the environment. "Substitute older cultivars with new and improved varieties bred 'to drink responsibly,'" says McCoy. "Updated versions of classic plants like Knock Out shrub roses (theknockoutrose.com) require much less water than older cultivars while still offering the same great look gardeners love."

• Be grass green

According to Ethne Clarke, garden editor of "Traditional Home," "Most gardens have lawns, and in some cases the lawn is the garden." She suggests mowing less frequently and cutting the grass longer so the top growth protects the roots. And water less frequently to force the roots to go deeper, which keeps them cooler and less susceptible to dry spell damage. She recommends using cornmeal or diatomaceous earth as an insecticide and pulling weeds before they set seed. For tough lawns, use a soil conditioner with good micro-organisms and aerate to encourage soil health. Try LazyMan Liquid Soil Aerator or Soil Conditioner for an easy spray on solution without back breaking work, available at outsidepride.com.

• Be kind to flora and fauna

After pouring hours of time, effort and in most cases their hearts into the garden, no one wants to wake up one morning to find that their begonia bed served as a late night snack for the neighborhood wildlife. 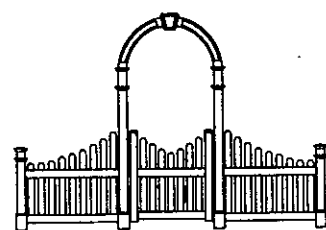

"Healthy soil, rich in minerals, nutrients and 'good bugs,' maximizes a plant's own healthy immune system to let it naturally resist pests and diseases," says McCoy. Compost your own or look for organic potting soils.

• Reduce fertilizer use

Overfeeding is not only unhealthy for plants; it also causes excess nutrient runoff that pollutes our streams, bays, rivers and other watersheds. "Plants can only absorb so much fertilizer before the excess nutrients run off into the groundwater," says McCoy. Fertilizer runoff contaminates drinking water, kills fish and other sea creatures and causes problems like Red Tide. Reduce overfeeding by using environmentally respon-

sible feeding practices, like the new slow-release fertilizer Dynamite (www.dynamiteplantfood.com). This nine-month plant food releases nutrients to the plant when the plant needs it most, never over or under feeding so there is minimal waste and runoff. Plus, it's low in phosphate making it a nutritious yet earth-friendly plant food option.

• Water responsibly

If you don't need to water your plants as often, you'll save gallons of time and money. But more importantly, you conserve water and protect the environment. "Substitute older cultivars with new and improved varieties bred 'to drink responsibly,'" says McCoy. "Updated versions of classic plants like Knock Out shrub roses (theknockoutrose.com) require much less water than older cultivars while still offering the same great look gardeners love."

• Be grass green

According to Ethne Clarke, garden editor of "Traditional Home," "Most gardens have lawns, and in some cases the lawn is the garden." She suggests mowing less frequently and cutting the grass longer so the top growth protects the roots. And water less frequently to force the roots to go deeper, which keeps them cooler and less susceptible to dry spell damage. She recommends using cornmeal or diatomaceous earth as an insecticide and pulling weeds before they set seed. For tough lawns, use a soil conditioner with good micro-organisms and aerate to encourage soil health. • Be kind to flora and fauna

After pouring hours of time, effort and in most cases their hearts into the garden, no one wants to wake up one morning to find that their begonia bed served as a late night snack for the neighborhood wildlife. "Keeping my hydrangea from becoming deer food was a big problem as we live in the woods in southeastern Pennsylvania," says McCoy. That was until she

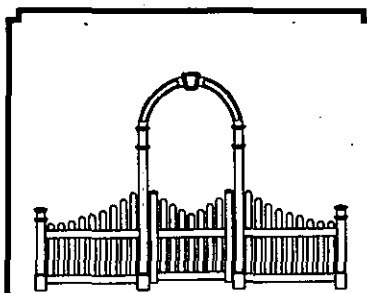

Welcome your feathered friends

In today's highly interactive and short attention-span society, the backyard increasingly beckons to us as that accessible personal space in which to rest from life. And life has become increasingly defined as the flickering space of a television, computer screen, personal digital assistant or smartphone. Obviously, these ever-present devices are easy to take anywhere, even our backyards. But taking them there is one thing. To disengage is to realize the natural interactivity all around, just waiting to enliven our "backyard experience."

Also, momentarily forget the other entertaining elements for backyard enjoyment to be open to the one of the most entertaining, soothing and natural of backyard activities - birding.

The allure of birding can be found anywhere in a range from infrequent to dedicated pursuit, with your backyard serving as the stage. No matter how you decorate or "accessorize" your personal outdoors, keep in mind you're doing it to create a haven for birds.

So what are the building blocks for enlivening your outdoor stage to attract the little winged actors?

Trees and shrubs

For birds, trees and shrubs are elements of security within your yard. The types and densities of your trees and shrubs have a direct bearing on the amount and types of birds that visit your yard. For example, just planting shrubs in groups rather than a line and not closely pruned afford covered ground access attractive to colorful robins, blue jays and cardinals. Single plantings or groupings of pine and fir trees provide year-long insulation, cover and nesting perches. Wildflowers

Wildflowers are natural magnets for attracting birds. They require minimum maintenance once the initial planting is complete. Not pruning or "deadheading" blooms is best for attracting birds through their remaining seed pods.

putting up any house will gain residents. For certain types of birds, follow specific birdhouse structures. Details such as floor area, house depth and rise of entry hole above the floor, are a few dimensions that

Birdfeeders

Feeders come in general types: tube feeders, wall feeders, hopper feeders, sock feeders, suet feeders, tray or platform feeders, lantern feeders and variations on all of these. A tube feeder with a tray attracts cardinals, crossbills, finches and sparrows while a suet feeder attracts woodpeckers, chickadees, nuthatches and wrens. Feeders near the house call for a window feeder while an open area requires a tube feeder mounted on a pole. And then there are add-ons. The most common are squirrel deterrents such as baffles or cones. For information, visit the National Wildlife Federation's site at www.enature.com or the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service Web site at www.fws.gov/birds.

Bird food

If you put the right food out, the birds will come. In fact, bird food is the most affordable and effective birding lure. Whether sunflower, safflower, white millet, cracked corn or thistle seeds, knowing which seed

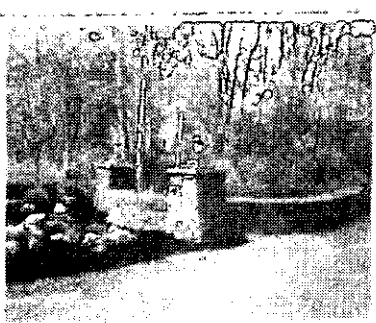

Buying higher-quality mixes versus mixes with fillers can ensure complete consumption, as well as minimize ground or patio debris from uneaten fillers. Filler debris attracts unwanted rodents under feeders or near your home. "Knowing the bird you want to attract, the quality of seed used and the ease-of-use in the packaging are the ABC's of an enjoyable birding experience," says Tony Vahedian, vice president and general manager, ScottsMiracle-Gro Wild Bird Food division. The big beetle battle

Japanese beetles can't bite people because their jaws aren't strong enough to break through human skin. However, Japanese beetles chomp on everything else, including 238 different kinds of foliage. Hot keys to stay cool

When the temperature outside begins to climb, many people seek the cool comfort of indoor air conditioning. Like your furnace or hot water tank, your air conditioning unit is something you may see everyday but seldom pay attention to, until you need it...or it breaks.

• The refrigerant charge (the amount of "cooling gas" in the system) should match the manufacturer's specifications. Inadequately trained service technicians often fail to find refrigerant charging problems or even worsen existing problems by adding refrigerant to a system that is already full.

• If the refrigerant leaks, simply adding refrigerant may do more damage. A trained technician should repair any leak, test the repair, and then charge the system with the correct amount of refrigerant.

Annual maintenance, including changing dirty filters and cleaning air conditioning coils to avoid premature failure of the compressor or fan, will allow the air conditioner to work at peak efficiency, and save potential financial headaches. Airflow is key.

• The compressor and fan's electronic controls can wear out, especially when the air conditioner turns on and off frequently. Because corrosion of wire and terminals is also a problem in many systems, electrical connections and contacts should be checked during a professional service call.

Lotion helps to keep green thumbs supple

Now that winter has faded and warmer temperatures have finally arrived, one of America's favorite pastimes is once again taking center stage. 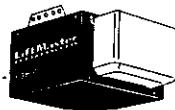

Keep your deck a safe place to hang out

As prices are on the rise again, the number of people traveling is down and families are choosing to spend more time at home enjoying their decks. With so many accessories available that make the yard an oasis -- from solar fountains and fire pit tables to stainless gas grills -- the deck extends the living space and creates an at-home vacation spot.

Whether for entertainment, family time or just quiet enjoyment, a well-built deck offers a safe haven for outdoor living. A deck offers increased square footage and better pay back than a kitchen or bath remodel. As with any sound investment, it's important to do proper maintenance to preserve the integrity of the deck.

The number of deck failures and resulting injuries has been increasing at an alarming rate. Between August 2004 and December 2005, the U.S. news media reported 225 injuries and one fatality from deck collapses caused by ledger connection failures. Many more deck failures -- with and without injuries -- went unreported in the media.

In an effort to save lives and prevent injuries, the North American Deck and Railing Association, Inc. (NADRA) declared May as the first Deck Safety Month in 2006. Now in its second year, the purpose of the promotion is to increase public awareness of the necessity for regular inspection and maintenance of existing decks, and proper installation of new decks.

Reasons for a deck collapsing range from age of the deck, poor maintenance, exceeding load capacity to improper building methods. Deck failures can be avoided. It's a matter of making the consumer aware of the necessity of choosing a professional deck contractor, regular maintenance and inspection, and knowing the limits of the deck structure.

Mike Beaudry, executive vice president for NADRA states, "A simple, annual deck inspection doesn't take long or require special tools, but it's a great investment. It can help prevent unnecessary ac-

cidents, and keep a deck a safe place. Each May, we will encourage homeowners to get an annual deck inspection, with the goal of reducing the number of deck injuries suffered each year."

"May is a great time to make a deck-check," Beaudry continues, "especially in locations where there's a lot of snow and ice, as a deck could develop a trouble spot over the winter. A professional inspection will examine every inch of a deck, evaluate the deck's capacity limits, identify problem areas and provide a map of what to keep your eye on in the future."

Researchers at Virginia Tech University, in cooperation with the International Code Council, have produced a "Manual for the Inspection of Residential Wood Decks and Balconies." The manual is intended for use by homeowners, home inspectors, contractors, engineers and builders interested in the inspection of residential wood decks. Frank Woeste, a deck-safety expert of Virginia Tech, who helped develop the inspection manual, notes, "I'm aware of deck collapses with no one on them, further demonstrating the need for homeowners to get involved and interested in their deck's structural integrity." For more information or to purchase the inspection manual, go to www.nadra.org.

Checklist can help with deck inspection

NADRA has available a 10-point checklist on its Web site, www.nadra.org. Here is a sampling of what to look for when you inspect your deck:

- Split or decaying wood — Check ledger board (deck connection to the house), support posts and joists, deck boards, railings and stairs for cracks, soft or spongy wood, insect holes and other signs of damaged wood.

- Fasteners — Check the entire deck for loose or corroded fasteners including nails, screws, or anchors in the ledger board. Tighten any loose fasteners, and pound in any popped up nails and, if a fastener appears rusted or corroded, consider replacing it.

- Railings and banisters — These should be secure with no give when pushed. Rail height should meet codes. Rails should be no more than

four inches apart to keep small children and pets from squeezing through.

- Flashing — Be sure the flashing is sound and firmly in place to direct water away from sensitive areas like ledger boards.

- Stairs — Make sure railings, handrails, risers and stringers are securely attached and not decayed. The opening behind the stair treads should be no more than four inches high. Always keep stair pathways clear of planters, decor, toys and other items that can present a tripping hazard.

- Cleaning and protecting — Clean away any leaves and debris that can be slippery and promote mildew. If needed, apply a new waterproofing coating to help prevent split, decayed wood and loosened fasteners.

outlets and appliances are up to code, in good condition and childproof if necessary.

Test all deck furniture for sturdiness. Childproof storage boxes and benches. Store all dangerous

products safely away from children, including barbecue lighter fluids and matches. If you have trees surrounding your deck, look for decaying or broken limbs that could fall on the deck.

Light the way in landscaping

Landscape lighting used to be simple. A few recessed cans lining the front path, a couple downlights tucked in the trees, and you were done. Not anymore. When it comes to the great outdoors, homeowners have seen the light.

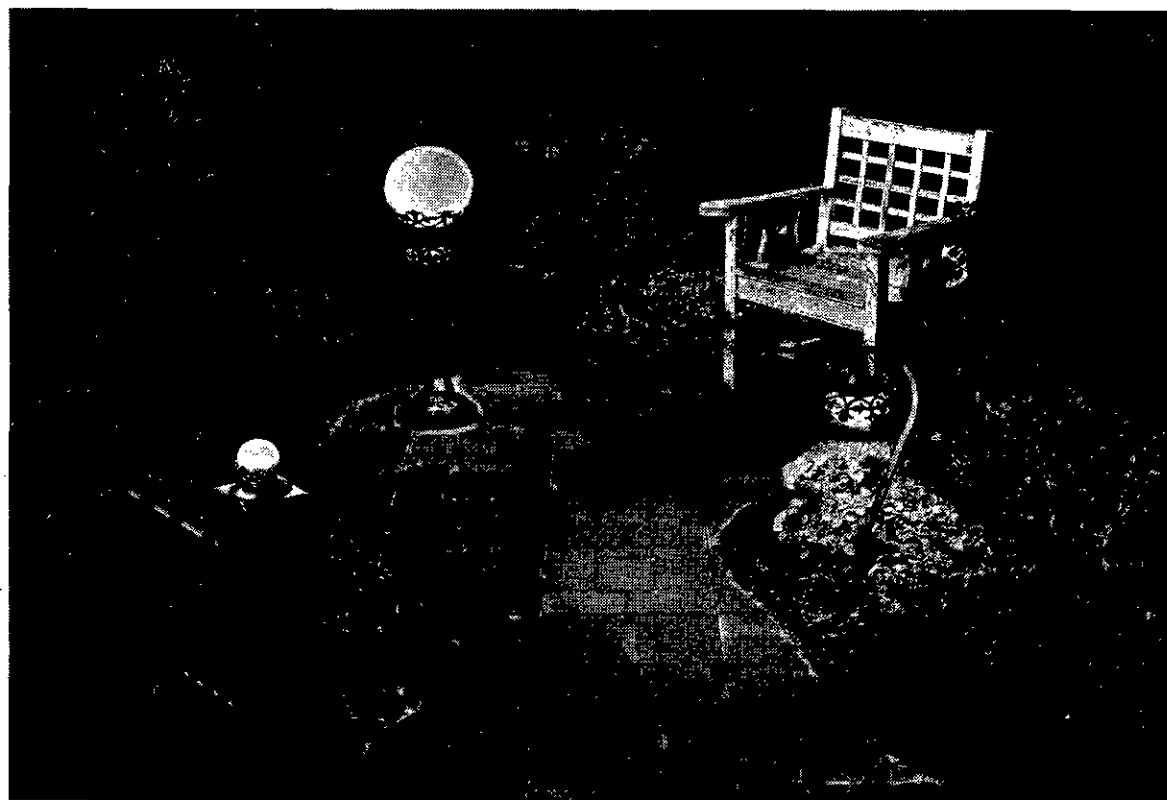
"Today, people aren't just lighting up the walkways so they can see their way to the door at night, and putting floods near the garage. They're finding ways to illuminate the landscaping they've spent so much time and money on so they can enjoy it at night," says Joe Rey-Barreau, education consultant for the American Lighting Association and associate professor at the University of Kentucky.

Rey-Barreau tracks the latest trends among lighting dealers and designers and says, "This spring, we're going to see a lot of changes in outdoor lighting practices. Landscape lighting is now being used as a means to extend living space so people can enjoy the best of both the inside and outside worlds. I see the focus this spring being on techniques that bring light closer to the house, and make the space more aesthetically pleasing in an unobtrusive manner," he says.

Gone are the days of the big, bold lanterns that used to line people's walks. Rey-Barreau says this year, the hottest trend will be to instead decorate with light from non-visible sources. Among the options for this: uplighting, downlighting and shadowing.

Uplighting is produced by shining a light up on a tree, statue or bench in the yard to highlight to give it definition, texture or even dimensionality. Downlighting is created by hanging the light source in the trees or from the rooftop and shining it on the area below. This technique is often used to improve visibility for security reasons. And with shadowing, you use spot or flood lights placed at ground level, or in-ground fixtures placed in front of an object to throw its shadow on a wall behind it as a decorative feature.

Richard Lentz, president of Lentz Landscape Lighting in Dallas, Texas, says people's desire to enhance their outdoor living space has played a big role in his business in recent years. "People have come to realize it's a shame to just ignore all those great spaces they've created outdoors because it's dark outside, so they're hiring us to come up with ways to in-

corporate the landscape into their night life," says Lentz.

Two examples of how Lentz

uses lighting to transform a space for his clients:

- Creating a moonlighting effect.

For a courtyard off the dining room, kitchen or even a bedroom, it is possible to create a moonlight effect that makes it seem like the courtyard is part of the space. "In this situation, we would install a Mercury Vapor light that casts cool light high in a tree to create the effect of moonlight, and complement it with a halogen lamp that lights up a fountain, sculpture or bench in the courtyard," says Lentz.

- Lighting the way.

One of the most popular ways

to light a walkway is with a runway effect where there are lights on both sides of the path, but Lentz says that distracts from the environment. "I prefer to filter light through the trees above to light up a sidewalk or steps. It gives you a real nice, natural effect."

While expanding living space and decorating with lighting are popular reasons to put in landscape lighting, security is also an important factor. Chris Primous, product manager for Progress Lighting says he's seeing a trend towards people installing lighting that will keep their homes bright and visible from the road.

"Just because the purpose of the light is security doesn't mean it shouldn't be decorative," Primous says. "You can use spotlights and flood lights to both light the area and accent prevalent architectural features of the home's structure or notable landscaping elements."

For instance, if the home has a beautiful stone facade, a grazing technique with carefully placed accent fixtures (ideally six to twelve inches from the surface) will bring out the texture to create a visually stunning picture from the curb. Similarly, tall columns can be highlighted by using closely placed ground-mounted spotlights or in-grade fixtures with very narrow sources that will really bring out the height and showcase the architectural features of the column.

Jeff Dross of Kichler Lighting points out, "People have come to realize that if you want your home's lighting job done right, you need to bring in a professional. As you get more creative people involved, it leads to more creative solutions and a better result. We're seeing a definite maturing of the field."

Everything's coming up tulips

Festival celebrates city's Dutch heritage with music, food and fun

This weekend, thousands of visitors from across the region will descend upon Albany's Washington Park to welcome spring at the city's 59th annual Tulip Festival.

Featuring live music, food, activities for kids and, of course, hundreds of thousands of tulips, the 2007 Tulip Festival has something for everyone.

"Tulip Festival weekend is always an exciting time in our city. From the annual street scrubbing on Friday to the festival's closing hours on Mother's Day, this event draws thousands of people from near and far," said Albany Mayor Jerry Jennings. "I encourage everyone to visit our beautiful and historic Washington Park which will be brimming with fun and entertainment for all ages."

The event kicks off at 11:30 a.m. Friday, May 11, with a carillon concert, followed by the traditional Dutch street scrubbing at noon. A reservation-only luncheon and fashion show at 12:30 p.m. bids farewell to last year's Tulip Queen, Amanda Benincasa, and her court. Beginning at 5:30 p.m. that evening, Washington Park will be the scene of the festival's official kick-off party, which will feature acoustic entertainment by the Empire State Wind Orchestra, Ramblin' Jug Stompers and Ten27. Food and beverages will be available.

Things start up again Saturday, May 12, at 10:30 a.m. with events leading up to the 2007 Tulip Queen's coronation at noon.

At 12:30 p.m., Saturday's rock heavy main stage shows get under way.

"As always, there's fantastic entertainment on all the stages," said Susan Cleary, the city's director of special events.

Saturday will feature performances from several artists, including the legendary Joan Jett and the Blackhearts, known for their hit, "I Love Rock 'n' Roll." Other acts on Saturday include Buddahead, The Cinematics

Saturday events wrap up with the Royal Tulip Ball, an evening of dining and dancing to honor the Tulip Queen and court. Tickets are required.

On Sunday, Mother's Day, the main stage musical selections mellow down a bit, featuring a performance by jazz musician Chris Botti. The eighth annual Mother of the Year award will be presented by Bellevue Women's Hospital.

Over at the amphitheater, audiences can enjoy performances by Lara Herscovitch, Johanna, Mudfunk and rock band Stephen Kellogg and The Sixers.

On both Saturday and Sunday, in addition to the music, the Tulip Festival will host more than 100 crafters from all along the Eastern Seaboard, a fine arts show and a KidZone area featuring a stage and tent area. KidZone will have face painters, design-a-doll activities, magic shows and the Tri-City Valley Cats.

And the event's namesake — the tulips — should be popping up for a visit.

This year, the city planted 207,000 tulip bulbs. Cleary said due to the cooler weather, they have gotten a really good start.

"It looks like we're in really good shape for the festival this year," she said. "We're nicely on schedule."

During the festival's 59 years, the event has taken on a new identity.

"Over the years, it has become a rite of spring in the area," said Cleary.

"It began as a celebration of Albany's Dutch heritage,"

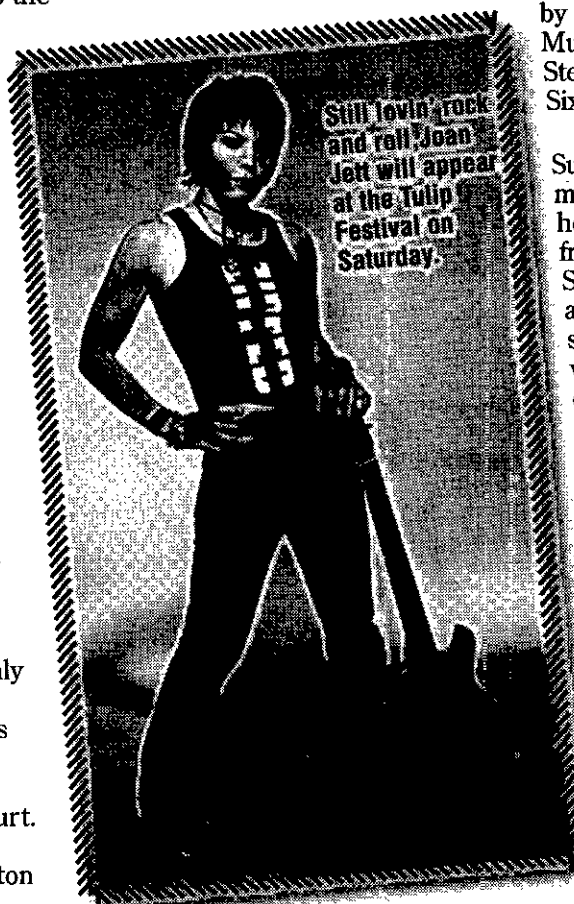
"One of the nice things about (the Tulip Festival) is the basic framework of the event is basically the same, we just change the core of what goes into it," said Cleary.

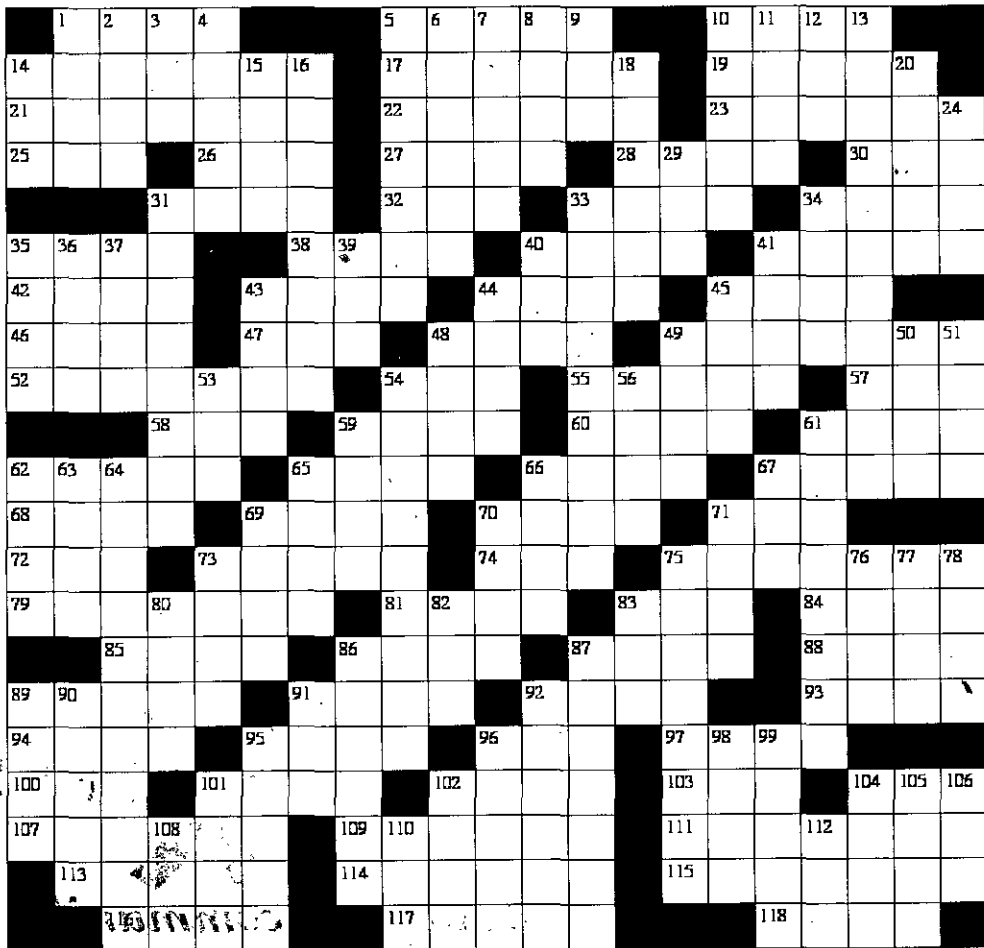

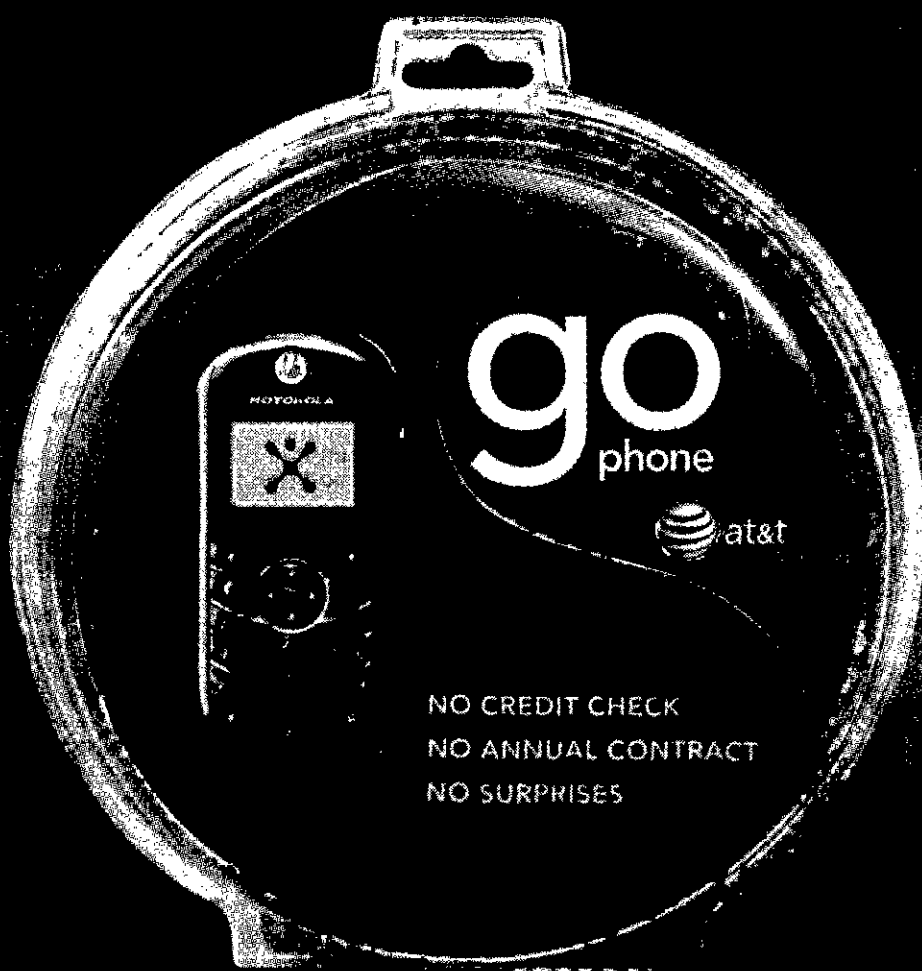

— Ballston Spa and Burnt Hills-Ballston Lake — that have been at the varsity level for less than three years.

If Niskayuna can't take advantage of this field this year, it will be a surprise.

• Can a top seed win the Section II, Class AA baseball title? As of now, it looks like a distinct possibility.

Guilderland has been the most consistent team in the Suburban Council, which is a good sign for the Dutchmen. In previous years, Guilderland had the offense and the pitching to be a top-tier team, but errors did the Dutchmen in against such Suburban powers as Shaker, Shenendehowa and Colonie. But Guilderland's defense has improved each of the last two years, which has vaulted the Dutchmen to the top.

Over in the Big 10, league co-leaders Christian Brothers Academy and LaSalle have the tools for Sectional success — solid lineups, good pitching and defenses that don't make mistakes. LaSalle owns a slight advantage over CBA after beating the Brothers last month, but if CBA beats the Cadets in Wednesday's rematch, the Brothers can position themselves for a deep playoff run as the Big

10's No. 1 seed.

One disclaimer about the class AA playoffs: it's a wide open field. Colonie, Niskayuna, Shaker, Bethlehem, Troy, Amsterdam and Schenectady are all quality teams capable of pulling off upsets. If Guilderland, CBA or LaSalle are going to win the class AA title, they can't suffer any breakdowns along the way.

• Finally, will this be the year a Big 10 team wins the class AA softball championship? Unless it's Troy, the answer is no, and I don't think Troy will win it.

The Flying Horses are the last remaining unbeaten class AA team, and that includes a victory over four-time defending champion Shen. But here's the catch — Troy's league schedule isn't nearly as tough as Shen's league schedule. Troy doesn't play Colonie, Shaker and Saratoga twice like Shen does. If the Flying Horses are fortunate, they get challenged by a team like Catholic Central or Schenectady. Shen, meanwhile, is challenged by nearly every Suburban Council team.

Strength of schedule won't factor into where Troy and Shen are seeded for Sectionals, but it will factor into which team winds up hoisting the class AA championship plaque. On that front, I would favor Shen or any other Suburban Council team that reaches the title game.

Adjustments work for Eagles

BC enters critical week with winning streak

The Bethlehem boys lacrosse team isn't scoring goals at the same breakneck pace it did at the start of the season, but it isn't giving up goals at a breakneck pace either.

That second fact has helped the Eagles go on a four-game winning streak that has raised

their record to 9-4 entering Tuesday's Suburban Council game against Niskayuna.

"We made some adjustments with our defensive alignment, and that's really helped us out," said Bethlehem coach Dave Rounds. "It's cut down on our penalties, and it's forced teams to shoot from the outside, rather than from point-blank range at our goalie."

The contrast has been noticeable. The Eagles have allowed fewer than seven goals in each of their last three games. Prior to that stretch, Bethlehem allowed fewer than seven goals

only twice.

Besides changing the defense, Rounds and his coaching staff have encouraged Bethlehem's high-powered offense to hold on to the ball a little longer before shooting it. The extra possession time has cut down on the Eagles' goal totals, but it's also helped the defense gain some valuable down time.

"The points being reduced from the beginning of the year was all planned," said Rounds. "The scoring is down, but we're possessing the ball better and getting better looks (at the

goal)."

The Eagles will have to continue their improvements under hostile conditions this week. After facing league-leading Niskayuna Tuesday, they battle Guiderland Thursday and Big 10 leader Christian Brothers Academy Friday.

"We've looked forward to this week all year because we think we're a top four team, and in order to be a top four team, we have to beat one of those teams," said Rounds.

Sectional storylines to watch for

Some interesting spring sport story lines to follow as we speed toward Section II playoff time:

- Is the Bethlehem girls lacrosse team's long reign as Sectional champions about to end? That could be the case.

The Lady Eagles are still one of the top teams in the region, but the gap has tightened to the point where they might not even win the Suburban Council.



Guiderland owned the top spot by 1 1/2 games over Bethlehem and two games over Shaker entering Monday's action. And with Bethlehem playing Shaker Monday, Guiderland had a chance to build a bigger lead as long as it beat Shenendehowa and Shaker defeated Bethlehem for the second time this season.

Not winning the league title isn't necessarily a death knell for Bethlehem, though. The Lady Eagles have enough talent

to make a run at the Sectional championship. But so do Shaker, Guiderland and Saratoga. That makes four class A girls lacrosse teams with legitimate title hopes — something this region has rarely seen.

If Bethlehem is going to extend its streak to nine consecutive Sectional championships, it will have to earn it by beating some top-notch competition.

- Staying with lacrosse, this could also be the year where the Niskayuna boys and girls teams win Sectional titles.

The Niskayuna boys have had a couple of hiccups this season, but the Silver Warriors still look like the team to beat for the class A title. Despite graduating most of last year's

starting lineup, Niskayuna has maintained a balanced attack and has received good goaltending from James Manchester. The Silver Warriors will certainly be tested in Sectionals by the likes of Guiderland, Christian Brothers Academy and Bethlehem, but they should be up to the challenge.

As for the Niskayuna girls, they were given a golden ticket this year by being moved down to class B. Instead of dealing with Bethlehem, Guiderland, Shaker and Saratoga, the Lady Warriors get a field that includes a Scotia-Glenville team that is not at the level it was at when it was a perennial Sectional champion the first half of this decade and two Suburban Council programs

approach to the area. But supporters say local residents should take priority over out-of-towners when it comes to employment.

Under a provision of state civil service law, local governments are allowed to give preference to applicants who can show they have lived in the local community before taking a written test for a municipal job.

In Halfmoon, that means a person is more likely to get hired for its permanent coordinator of grant writing position if they've lived in town for at least four months before taking the June 16 written exam. In Bethlehem, anyone with the qualifications to become a supervising nurse is given a better shot at the job if they have lived in the jurisdic-

lives outside the district. But unlike the criticism faced by Paolino, Bourgeois has been universally praised for his work. "Matt doesn't live in the district, but he works harder for this district than just about anyone else," said school board president Barbara Mauro.

The idea of giving residents a better shot at municipal jobs is a good one, said Schenectady County Legislator Joseph Suhrada, R-Rotterdam, but it doesn't always work the way it's planned.

"It's fair to say that someone who lives in the community should be given preference when local governments are hiring, but the problem comes in when they give out waivers to the rules," said Suhrada.

"If it's applied equally to everyone, a residency requirement is a good idea," he added. "But a lot of times they give out waivers to the fat cats with the big jobs, and they don't do it for the little guy. I have almost never heard of a waiver being given to a guy who drives a truck with a snow plow."

Not everyone agrees that giving preference to locals works the way it is intended to.

Mauro, who is a commissioner with the Capital District Regional Planning Commission, questioned whether residency rules are helpful. Having personally experienced the impact of New York City's requirements when her husband, Frank Mauro, worked for the city more than two decades ago, she said the rule could hurt the ability of school districts and municipalities to attract skilled workers.

"I feel very strongly about this. When Frank was working for a temporary charter revision commission in New York, we had to juggle where we were going to live and how we were going to afford it," Mauro said. "If you lived in an upscale community like Scarsdale, you would have to pay a janitor \$300,000 for them to afford to raise a family. That's just a number I am taking out of the air as an example, but clearly, if you are in a high-cost suburb and require everyone to live there, you will have to dramatically raise the wages for your workforce."

"And I don't think it is very productive for our region to pit one school district, let's say Guilderland or Bethlehem, against another one like Niskayuna," said Mauro.

tion for a month before applying for the job. In most of the towns in Albany County, the same rule applies for those seeking a job in local government.

In both Saratoga and Albany counties, suburban school districts like Ballston Spa, Shenendehowa, North Colonie and Guilderland rely on county civil service offices to test and rank those applying for positions. Each district has the option of giving preference to local residents as part of their hiring process.

That option hasn't blocked non-residents from taking high-profile positions and in Schenectady County, two top key officials live outside of the community where they work. One of those, John Paolino, was the subject of some criticism when he was hired as the city of Schenectady's top financial officer. Mayor Brian Stratton defended the choice, saying Paolino, a former Rotterdam town supervisor, is the best person available for the job.

In the neighboring school district of Niskayuna, Matthew Bourgeois, the assistant superintendent for business,

Towns juggle residency requirements for cops

Some require officers to live in town; others don't

Residency requirements for police officers can be a sticky topic, as some municipalities adjust them to meet their hiring needs.

In some areas, too-strict requirements have caused officers to seek work elsewhere. For example, Troy recently lost an officer to the Bethlehem Police Department because, in part, Troy officers have to live within the city's borders whereas Bethlehem officers, after their first year of service, are only required to live in Albany County and within 25 miles of the station. During their first year with the department, however, Bethlehem officers must live in the town.

Bethlehem police Lt. Tom Heffernan said the residency requirement is not the main reason officers seek transfers to the town's department.

"We get a lot of lateral transfers, but I don't believe it is due to the residency requirement," he said. "People do come to us. Other officers seek employment with the Bethlehem Police Department; we don't look to recruit other officers from other agencies."

Some departments are forced to open up the residency requirements depending on how hard it is to recruit officers, said John Grebert, executive director of the New York State Association of Chiefs of Police.

"It would be common that most Police Benevolent Asso-

ciations (PBA) would prefer not to have any residency requirements," he said. "They don't like to impose too many restrictions on themselves, and it would give them more freedom."

Proponents of residency requirements say municipal employees are paid by taxpayer dollars and should contribute to the tax base of the municipality by living there. They also claim the employees will

officers can live outside the city, but it comes with a price, said Lt. Peter Frisoni. For the first six years they forfeit their annual holiday check, which officers get each December for 12 holidays whether they work them or not. The first year's check is worth \$1,400, and it tops out at \$2,500.

The city did change its policy of requiring officers to live within the city borders, he said, so the residency requirement is not an issue.

"The city and PBA looked at it as a win-win for both sides," he said. "Officers were not restricted to where they could live, and the city could save some money if they did not want to live in the city by not having to pay them their holiday check."

The Niskayuna Police Department, said Sgt. Daniel McManus, follows Schenectady County Civil Service law, which does not include a residency requirement but gives the municipalities the authority to give residents preference when considering new hires despite where they score on the list.

Opponents claim it reduces the pool of qualified candidates and, in the case of police officers, makes it more difficult for employees to do their jobs because they may be less inclined to arrest their neighbors.
