Town faces criticism for Blessing Road delays

The Bethlehem Town Board unanimously approved a \$37.6 million budget for 2008 that carries a 2.5 percent tax increase.

Along with the passage of the budget at the Wednesday, Nov. 14, meeting came some criticism over the

use of \$2.5 million in fund balance to lower the property tax increase. "We have needs for those surplus-

es," said resident Norm Morand.

Town Supervisor Jack Cunningham said the tax increase would have been closer to 35 percent without the use of fund balance.

Town board member Dan Plummer said the use of \$2.5 million in fund balance was appropriate given the alternative.

"You are looking at a fund balance around 27 percent right now," said Plummer. "The proper use of fund balance is to access them when you have certain shortfalls."

Board member Sam Messina said the town was able to accomplish some important goals in the newly adopted budget.

We found a way to give employees a 3 percent increase and approve an outreach coordinator for the senior services department," Messina said.

Cunningham said he was pleased with this year's smooth budget pro-

"It's a reflection that the town is being managed well, and my hope is to manage expenses more aggressively next year," Cunningham said.

Town Comptroller Judith Kehoe said the latest sales and mortgage tax figures for the town show a more positive trend than anticipated a few months back.

"Third quarter sales tax receipts were very strong, and we should be within \$100,000 of attaining our

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Woman honored for weight loss

Weight Watchers finds student's story 'inspiring'

If you think it's hard to lose weight during the holidays, try dieting while living in a college dorm.

At a time when many students find themselves battling the "freshman 15," **Glenmont native Adrienne** Davis lost 50 pounds over a seven-month span, earning her 2007 honors, as one of Weight Watchers inspiring stories of the year.

"It feels great to be honored with being selected for my inspiring Weight Watchers story," said Davis, a 23-yearold SUNY New Paltz graduate student majoring in music therapy.

Davis was chosen by a team of judges from nearly 1,700 entrants nationwide based on her weight loss and personal motivation that transformed her life.

"I saw no end in sight to my weight gain, and that frightened me," Davis said.

"I am so happy I found Weight Watchers, a program that worked for me, as a young adult, because I don't know where I'd be without it."

Motivation was Davis's driving lost 4 pounds the first week on the Weight Watchers program, she was hooked.

"I've lost 80 pounds in total now in little over a year, and it has been worth every sacrifice," she said.

"She followed the program when she was in college, and it's very hard to do," said Jana Rufino, spokeswoman for Weight Watchers International.

"For nearly 10 years, this contest has shown us

so many inspirational stories from many of our members, and we are honored to be able to help them achieve their goals," said Karen Miller-Kovach, chief scientific officer for Weight Watchers International.

Davis now hikes and walks regularly and takes more pleasure in shopping for clothes.

'Before I dreaded the thought of it," said Davis.

Her advice for those struggling with weight loss is to "make it work for you."

"Focus on 5 or 10 pounds at a time instead of your total goal," said Davis. "Try not to view it as a diet, but view it as learning healthier behaviors that can be lifelong.'

Curbing the influx of cuddly stuffed toys

I think my daughter's stuffed animals may be ganging up on me.

This past August, while Rachel was away at camp, I found Turtle Puppet on a shelf in her room. I knew with great certainty that Turtle Puppet had been bagged for storage. I had bagged him myself, after playing with the puppet. As I played, I recalled how, many years ago, I used to make the turtle pull other small toys into his shell until they disappeared. Then he would make the items suddenly reappear. I would act surprised and my young child would giggle.

Not only was Turtle Puppet back on the shelf, but several other companions I had previously bagged were also with him. Not right next to him, but cleverly mixed in with other toys.

"What's going on here?" I demanded. But the stuffed toys remained still and silent.

Did the stuffed animals not understand they were being bagged for their own good? Did they really like living in a jumble on a dust-filled shelf or strewn about on an un-vacuumed carpet?

I saw several years ago that the toys piled high on the shelf were in danger. At any moment, an avalanche could occur, and they'd go tumbling to the floor. OK, maybe stuffed animals aren't breakable, but they do have feelings.

One day, as predicted, the avalanche occurred. It was not a force of nature, but rather the result of my frustration. Looking at the clutter all around my daughter's room, including the shelf. I could not restrain myself. With a few swings of my arm, I sent the pile flying off the shelf and across the room, onto the bed and the floor. Yes, I was only adding to the mess, but gee it felt good.

I have nothing against stuffed



animals. I love stuffed animals. We just have too many. They hog space. They collect dust. Very few are machine washable. They are a barrier to making beds and cleaning rooms.

And so, when my daughter was 10, I had no choice but to place a moratorium on the purchase of stuffed animals. This applied even to purchases she was making with her own money, such as when using gift certificates or cash from grandparents.

The fluffy gray bunny was the last authorized stuffed animal purchase. She had cash to spend and we were browsing through a local bookstore that also sells stationery, jewelry, crafts and toys. It was getting late and she hadn't picked anything out. And then she showed me the bunny. I begged her to find something else to buy, like a book.

I tried to appeal to my daughter's emotions. I told her it was not fair to all the other stuffed animals back home. What happens to them? Every time a new stuffed toy comes in, all the others get cast aside, even those that only recently joined the household. The newest animal gets to cuddle with you at night and gets a prominent spot on the pillow during the day. A week or two goes by, and then what? The new animal is treated as special for only a short time. It's not long before the new animal falls to the floor and is lost in the fray. And so, it's not fair to the new or existing stuffed animals.

Then I made the mistake of picking up the bunny. It was so soft. Its ears were so floppy.

last stuffed animal purchased. I told my daughter, if you bring another stuffed animal into the house, then one of the ones already here has to leave. Her eves grew wide.

I wasn't trying to be heartless. I get attached to stuffed animals. And many of my daughter's toys come with a special memory. There's Pink Dolly, which my friend Cara brought to me in the hospital when Rachel was born. There's Caterpillar, which my nephew Joey, then 6, gave to Rachel when she was 3 months old. It makes different noises depending on where you squeeze it, and it has a bell in the tail.

There's also battery-operated Baby Dino, who purrs and moves her arms and legs when triggered by touch or even loud noises. I had purchased Baby Dino to use as a distraction during diaper changes, but more than once the toy started to purr when we walked into the room at night to check on our sleeping baby. After a while we had to keep Baby Dino set to the off position.

And though their names might not be overly creative, those three stuffed creatures are just a few of the countless cuddly toys that have played a special part in my child's life and in my role as a parent.

But enough is enough. There's just no more room:

And so last week when she brought a stuffed animal pug home from New York City, I could not believe my eyes. I looked at the dog and felt incredible disdain, as if she had brought home a real puppy and it had just peed on my kitchen floor.

"It was on sale," she said. "If we had been together, do you think I would have allowed you to buy that?" I asked her. She knew the answer was no.

I explained that her dad and I had given her spending money for souvenirs, not to buy a stuffed animal at a national chain toy store.

I privately spoke to my husband. I told him to request reimbursement for the stuffed animal. I told him it was a violation of the moratorium. I told him that she knew darn well that there should be no more purchases of stuffed animals. No more means "no more." It doesn't mean, "no more, unless they are on sale." It doesn't mean, "no more, unless they are really cute and cuddly.'

I picked it up. It's more solid than cuddly, but it is definitely cute. It was purchased on a special outing and it was one more thing: Quit buying reasonably priced at five bucks. stuffed animals!"

Plus, Rachel did come back with change from the \$20 her dad gave her, so she deserves credit for that.

I explained to Rachel that I was not angry. I was just frustrated because we've been planning to repaint her room, but we haven't been able to clean it out. She just keeps bringing more stuff into the room.

I reminded her how I've been trying to help by bagging up the stuffed animals. Then I pointed to the shelf. "But look, there's Turtle Puppet," I said quietly. "I had already bagged him, but somehow he's back in your room."

We had begun bagging the stuffed animals not long after the avalanche. They were overrunning the room and the majority served no purpose other than to collect dust. Turtle Puppet, one of my favorites, was put into storage only fairly recently in preparation for the new paint job.

"Right now, the bags are just for safekeeping," I told I warmed up to the pug once- my daughter. "And if you want your room redone, then the items that go into the bags need to stay in the bags. And

New Scotland adopts budge

The New Scotland Town Council adopted its 2008 budget Wednesday, Nov. 14, with a 15 cent tax rate increase by a vote of 4 to 1.

The 2008 tax rate is \$1.21 per \$1,000 of assessed value, up from \$1.06 per \$1,000 this year.

sole voice voting against the budget. He said he wished to have a tax hike of 10 cents rather than 15 cents.

"They knew it (a tax hike) was

coming," Clark said.

Worried about the depletion of the fund reserve for upcoming town projects, town councilwoman Deborah Baron said she felt the need for a tax increase.

"It sounds bigger than it is," Baron said. "Historically, the town has been modest (in taxes) for the value residents get."

Among the expected projects is a future engineering survey for Krumkill Road. Baron said she was also concerned about rising fuel prices.

Clark said he agreed that Krumkill Road engineering funds had to be allocated, but insisted that the council was overreaching in giving raises to certain

administrative personnel and not to others more qualified.

"Giving raises to people is the wrong way to do things without evidence of appropriateness,' he said.

Clark also said the council was too headstrong in converting the Senior Outreach Coordinator to a full-time position with an additional \$20,000 earmarked in the salary.

Elected officials received. a three percent cost of living adjustment across the board.

Salaries include town supervisor, \$54,523; town council, \$7,626 each; town clerk, \$50,984; highway superintendent, \$67,849; and town justices, \$22,724 each.

Mendick recognized as official winner

On election night the results showed Shafer in the lead due to an error in calculations of one election district. However, a recanvassing of the vote moved Mendick in front and the absentee ballots did not change the outcome any further.

"It was a long process and it feels good," said Mendick, who said, he is ready to get to work

on county issues.

"The county is faced with many financial issues and they need someone with that type of financial background," said Mendick.

Shafer served four years as county legislator and Mendick wished him well in his future endeavors.

"He should be commended for his public service," Mendick said.

Voters always get last word

The conclusion of the counting of absentee ballots will finalize this year's elections, and it looks like there was a call for change almost everywhere. It was probably a surprise for some, since voting in non-national election years is often a call for the status quo.

Instead, voters reminded office holders to never be complacent, and to never underestimate the intel-

ligence of the voters. In many of Spotlight Newspapers' 12 coverage areas, longtime incumbents were voted out.



Many officials chalk the change up to demographics: a lot of longtime Republican towns now have a higher percentage of Democrats than Republicans. That must have helped in Colonie and in Ballston, where Dems defeated GOP officeholders, but that's not the answer in Guilderland, where two Republicans beat out incumbent Democrats.

Voters clearly wanted change. The question elected officials need to ask themselves is why they wanted that change.

Politicians need to remember that the electorate is more than constituents. They are homeowners, business owners and parents interested in creating and maintaining the kinds of towns their children would one day want to call home. They are stakeholders with a sense of vision about their communities. They elect their leaders to guide the town to that future.

And while elected officials are given a certain amount of trust, community stakeholders pay close attention to their actions. Those who misuse the public trust – and the funds that are a manifestation of that trust – are shown the exit in the next election.

If you sign two contracts for water; settle big financial deals out of court with employees suing the town; allow a deficit in spite of good tax revenues; use public money for private property; have a police chief in legal battles; run public meetings that become free-for-alls ...well, you'd better be polishing up your resume.

Voters won't tolerate arrogance.

Politicians who think they know better than the people who put them in office should remind themselves daily that government exists to make life better for its citizens.

As newly elected leaders organize their teams and prepare for inauguration, we hope they will keep this idea paramount.

A blessing, not a stress

You'd think I'd have learned to not expound on parenting topics until after I've been through it, but once again, I did my best parenting in this area before it was mine to experience.

I am giving in and saying the "s" word on this process, although I cling officially to my belief that stress belongs to those who don't know how they're going to feed their children, not people choosing which ivy-covered tower their lucky children will spend the next four years in.

Still, a few general observations have gelled as we guide our older son on this next step toward full independence. I wish I had founded The College Board; I envy the colleges this demographic bubble that's giving them the largest number of college applicants in years; and I'm grateful for my son's guidance counselor.

I worry that we are turning into "those" parents. We spend a lot of time poring over college brochures and visiting Web sites online. Chris is going over and over the common application and the supplemental applications that some schools want. We have brainstormed about the all-important application essay with Christopher, and discussed his first draft at length. We finally made a rule: no talking about college applications in the morning before school, and no talking about it at the dinner table. Chris and I try to make it Christopher's process as much as possible, but the truth is that without a great deal of prodding, not a great deal would get done, even though he is anxious to fly from the nest. If he could just get from here to there without any paperwork, his life would be perfect. It's good that The Big Voice is keeping him as close to schedule as possible.

Already, Christopher is applying to too many colleges. but we didn't want to rule any out and possibly regret it later. I listen in when other parents talk about where their children are applying and sigh with relief if there's no overlap with Christopher's choices. I have sized up and ranked other families on the same college tours and in the same admissions offices as us. Eager, freckled face girl looks like a serious contender; sullen, slightly slack-jawed boy would clearly rather be anywhere than with his father walking leaf-strewn paths, listening to the tour guide talk about junior year abroad. The mother from Russia refuses to accept in the information session that her child needs to have attended three years of an Englishmedium school to be able to skip the college's English evaluation exam.

And every parent wears the same expression: a pained look that comes when you are trying to not do that amorphous thing that makes your kid consider you a doofus, while at the same time you struggle to get your questions answered about this place that might potentially have more influence over your child's life than you've had in the past 17 years.

It's hard to not feel that we are once again on trial. Yes, of course, this is about the student, but really, who got the kid up for school every day? Who sat with them to do homework? Who broke up the sibling battles before they got (really) ugly? Who drove them to play dates? Who pushed them that little extra? Who withheld allowance when school work didn't get done? It's hard not to feel that their college acceptances and rejections aren't really an evaluation of the job we've done as parents.

Combine that evaluation anxiety with a huge dose of wistfulness. It would be so great to be 17 again and looking ahead to four incredible years. If I could go back to college, this time, I'd do all the readings; participate in class; and join more extra-curricular clubs. Maybe I'd swap my German/ political science major for English. No, American studies. No, wait, history. No, I really loved going abroad, so maybe German again.

Oh, heck, I don't really want to go to college all over again; I want to time travel back when work/kids/housework/ laundry threaten to kill me with boredom. I want to scuff through fallen leaves as I walk to dinner with friends, and admire the blue-gray sky holding the first snowstorm of the season. I want to sit in the chaos of the dining hall and listen to the laughter and chatter of the people who will shape the future of this nation. I want to have time to go to the gym, go for a swim, or head out for an hour of crosscountry skiing on a clear winter day. I want to look how I looked then: thinner, less wrinkly, with



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streaks of blond, not gray, in my hair. I want to believe that the world is a really cool place and I can become anything I want.

As Thanksgiving week arrives and we consult with Christopher on the final draft of the application essay that we hope will make all the college admissions officers want him, I am grateful that my college experience still ranks so high in my mind and heart, and that the friends I made there still matter so much to me. I hope that both my sons will have that. I hope that they find the place that makes them sigh, "Yes, this is where I want to be" and that the place that says, "Yes, we want you here" is the place that becomes a part of them forever.

Reform is vital for the safety our some of our most vulnerable children and adults. Currently OMRDD and the CQC, are investigating incidents of alleged abuse, and their pattern for years has been to unfound most cases of abuse and notify parents of such, then seal

documents and actual findings from parents or legal guardians.

The Social Service Law standard of abuse being used is far worse than anyone would imagine, and actually breaks other state laws. Letters are sent to families of disabled children saying that there is no credible evidence of abuse. when in fact many times there is ample evidence. Records have been sealed, and the police in most cases are not notified as is required by

mental hygiene law. Names of individuals involved in abuse or neglect many times are not put on the State Central Registry. Often these individuals remain in their jobs because of the cover up such abuses, to go on to further harm or even kill those they are entrusted to care for. Many times crimes are being committed with no legal consequences for those involved. This is gross injustice. Those that are disabled need extra protection, but on top of their affliction many are being either

abused or neglected repeatedly, many times by the same cruel individuals.

We believe that both OMRDD and the CQC have literally covered up thousands of cases of abuse, to protect private and state facilities reputations, as well as protecting themselves from litigation. This is a severe problem, and those in leadership must come forward with us to reform things immediately.

Panel continues to refine recommendations through public input

A numbers of parents attended the Tuesday, Nov. 13, meeting of the Bethlehem schools redistricting committee, where the five boundary scenarios were narrowed down to two by the end of the night.

A variation of the first and the fifth scenario remain up for discussion, with Scenario Five the committee's top pick. The committee will meet at least one more time before signing off on the final boundary maps to present to the school board in early December. The district will approve a final redistricting map at the Wednesday, Dec. 19 meeting.

School board president James Lytle noted there were fewer people in attendance than at previous meeting; about 50 overall,

and final decisions about redistricting have yet to be made.

"We just hope in the course of all this we can be as positive about this and encouraging as we can," said Lytle.

VersaTrans president Doug Hamlin, hired by the district to come up with the new boundary maps, said the committee would continue to evaluate scenarios and work toward a recommendation to the school board.

"We have established the most comprehensive communication program of any redistricting study I have ever done in the past," said Hamlin, commending the school district for communicating to the parents through e-mails, meeting presentations, and the district Web site.

In discussions at the meeting, parents had mixed feelings about the boundary scenarios.

"I want Scenario Two so my kids go to Eagle," said Penny Hayward of Somerset Wood. Hayward said many other scenarios show a split in her neighborhood, where one side goes to Glenmont and the other side goes to Hamagrael.

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Janet Joseph's daughter, who is enrolled in Slingerlands, would likely be moved Clarksville next year according to the boundary scenarios. She said the boundary lines need to be refined.

"I have three children who would be affected by the move," said Joseph.

Under the boundary scenarios, Mitch Earleywine, a Slingerlands parent, will become part of the Clarksville district, a change, he said, that makes little sense.

"I have been moved to a school seven miles away, when two schools are two miles away,' Earleywine said.

In a June 2005 letter to Michael Carey from the CQC, the agency told Carey that investigators visited the school on several occasions and had found that the behavior support plan provided no direction for staff; it failed to follow the school's own nursing directive to track Jonathan's food intake for almost two weeks; and the school failed to protect the rights of Jonathan and his parents according to OMRDD directions, "specifically denial of his regular meal without approval from both the agency's human rights committee" and the Careys. Carey called the CQC and

possible standard for anyone to take action against. The law reads that abuse means anything that causes a "substantial risk of death, serious or protracted disfigurement, protracted impairment or physical and emotional health or protracted loss or impairment of the function of any bodily organ."

He said his interest in changing the law is not about getting even or about his own grief and anger; it's about helping those who needlessly suffer from this kind of



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The second thing Carey is urging is to change the law of endangering the welfare of an incompetent or physically disabled person from a misdemeanor charge to a felony violation. Gordon said this law has passed both the state Senate and Assembly in different forms.

"I have a bill that elevates to a felony mistreatment or abuse of someone in residential care," said Gordon.

The third request is to ensure all calls into the state mental health hot line of abuse go directly to a law enforcement agency and not just a mental health agency.

"When somebody calls in an abuse or neglect, these are criminal charges," said Carey of the legislation.

'Steamroller' makes a U-turn

Tedisco praises voters, clerks as Spitzer changes license plan

Gov. Eliot Spitzer has backed off of his plan to give illegal immigrants driver's licenses, and state Assembly

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Minority Leader James Tedisco, R-Schenectady, says the citizens of New York and its county clerks are to thank.

"The box score is people of New York-1, Eliot Spitzer-0," Tedisco said in a Thursday, Nov. 15, interview. "This victory is proof positive that the people of our great state are the most powerful voices in this

democracy. Today, their voices were finally heard, loud and clear, by Gov. Spitzer.'

The governor's plan to allow people to get driver's licenses without providing a Social Security number, giving New York's approximately 1 million illegal immigrants the opportunity to get valid New York driver's licenses, was unveiled in September. It was immediately met with overwhelming opposition from voters and county clerks statewide. A poll conducted by Siena College found more than 70 percent of those polled were against the plan.

Spitzer, who called himself a "steamroller" during a private meeting with Tedisco in early 2007, then re-tooled his plan to allow three different types of driver's licenses. One would have been the standard state license, still available to illegal immigrants.

"It does not take a stethoscope to hear the voice of New Yorkers on this issue," Spitzer said at a news conference on Wednesday, Nov. 14. "Part of leadership is knowing what isn't working and pulling back."

The issue reached the national spotlight, and was even the subject of a question posed to Democratic presidential hopefuls at an Oct. 30 debate.

U.S. Rep. Kirsten Gillibrand, D-Hudson, weighed in on the issue in a written statement released the day Spitzer rescinded his plan.

"The governor made the right decision-illegal immigrants should not have access to driver's licenses,' said Gillibrand. "When I spoke with the governor this morning, he was clearly focused on moving forward and working toward creating economic opportunities and good paying jobs in our region. I look forward to working with him towards that goal."

But Spitzer has heard the voices of New York a little too late, said Tedisco.

Responding to a comment made by U.S. Rep. Michael McNulty, D-Green Island, in which McNulty said that Spitzer would have wasted valuable political capital if he hadn't stepped away from the issue,

Tedisco said Spitzer has already wasted too much.

"This was tremendous waste of the taxpayers' time," said Tedisco. "And this is just the tip of the iceberg as to how much political capital the governor has squandered. He's moved from Troopergate to using the IRS against his political rivals to driver's licenses for illegal aliens. He has squandered a 75 percent favorable rating down to 41 percent. That's unbelievable."

Spitzer was elected last November with almost 70 percent of the vote. A recent Siena poll showed only 25 percent of those polled would reelect Spitzer in 2010

Tedisco said debate over the license issue has taken away from outstanding state business, such as selecting a racing franchise holder.

He also commended New York's county clerks who opposed the plan.

Kathy Marchione, Saratoga County clerk and president of the state Association of County Clerks has been a vocal opponent of the plan from its outset. She led Saratoga County's Board of Supervisors in passing a resolution opposing the plan, Rensselaer County Clerk Frank Merola still has a lawsuit against Spitzer regarding the license plan, to ensure that it will not come up again.

"If there were a Profile in Courage Award' that the Assembly could give out, we would give it to Kathy Marchione and Frank Merola,' Tedisco said.

Spitzer and supporters of his plan have said that opponents have played on fears regarding illegal immigration and have used the proposed plan to make political hay against Democrats.

Tedisco said his opposition had less to do with immigration than it did with the state's security.

"We have nothing against immigration. We know that what makes this country great is the cultural diversity that legal immigration creates," he said. "The only reason we came out as strongly as we did was because it was security issue. The end of the Gov. Spitzer's proposal marks the beginning of a safer, more secure New York state."

As for making political hay, Tedisco said it isn't his or his cohorts' intention to keep this in the headlines to bash Democrats.

"Now, is it fair game in any election? Certainly, because these are security questions that need to be answered." he said.







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Payback time

Some renovations and upgrades can improve fuel efficiency

In addition to seeing higher prices at gasoline pumps, Capital District residents who heat their home: with oil will pay more to fill their tanks.

Oil prices rose rapidly in November, approaching \$100 a barrel, which accounts for some 60 percent of the price of heating oil. Wholesale prices of heating oil were 50 percent higher than in November 2006, according to the U.S. Energy Information Administration.

Natural gas prices, in contrast, have stayed flat compared to last year. Those who heat their homes with gas should see no more than a moderate price increase.

However, the choice of fuel is not the only thing that affects heating costs, said Ray Hull of the New York State Energy Research and Development Authority (NYSERDA). High efficiency heating systems, regardless of fuel, generate more heat per dollar and well-sealed homes hold that heat better.

To help New York residents become efficient energy users and reduce their costs, NY-SERDA sponsors home energy performance audits by certified contractors through its New York Energy Smart program.

You get a list of renovations that are ranked by payback,'

said Hull. "That is, the first item on the list will be the item that's costing you the most to ignore.'

Payback literally means how long it takes to recoup the cost of a renovation.

Often, it's attic insulation, said Hull.

Upgrading windows and doors can help, but it's expensive," he said. "So payback takes longer."

The same three things come up repeatedly in home energy audits, said

Dan Gibson of Home Energy Advisors in Ballston Lake, who participates with the New York Energy Smart program.

The most beneficial thing is air sealing, said Gibson. As much as 40 percent of a home's heat can escape through holes in the attic and the basement problems that require more than weather stripping.

"We do a blower door test," said Gibson. By depressurizing the house, he can measure the amount of air flowing into the house. Stopping up the cracks and crevices responsible is one of the most cost-effective measures to implement, said Gib-

No. 2 is insulation, which can be laid on attic floors and sprayed into walls. Gibson encourages homeowners to consider adding insulation when they take on exterior renovations — re-roofing or re-siding - as well.

The third thing is heating systems. Older, naturally ventilated heating systems may run at 75 percent efficiency, which

Gibson said means "25 cents of budgeted amount of \$9.7 million," every dollar you spend is heating the sky."

Newer furnaces run as high as 95 percent efficiency.

It's a big investment, with new high efficiency furnaces or boilers costing anywhere from \$4,000 to \$9,000 to replace.

"Payback may take 10 years," said Gibson, much longer than for air sealing and insulation. Still, the sheer energy sav-

ings might sway you.

'You can save 30 to 50 million BTUs a year by replacing your furnace," said Gibson. He pointed out that in addition to saving money and saving energy, but also you're reducing your contribution to global warming.

Supplemental heat sources can be useful, like when you want to warm a small area, rather than heat the whole house. While gas or electric space heaters are not terribly efficient and kerosene heaters have safety concerns, they might offermore good than bad in certain cases.

Newer wood stoves (those certified by the EPA) and pellet stoves, on the other hand, burn cleanly and efficiently. Also, they are environmentally friendly.

'Wood stoves are practically carbon neutral. Grow a tree, burn a tree," said Gibson. Pellets involve more processing and transport, so in using them you consume more of the Earth's carbon stores.

"But they're far better than gas and oil," in that regard, said Gibson.

Kehoe said.

The same upbeat news held true for mortgage tax numbers.

We should be about \$51,000 ahead of our mortgage tax budget. but less than the 2006 amount," Kehoe said.

This year's budget workshops under Cunningham were held earlier in the summer, with a public hearing held in late October and the final budget vote on Wednesday, Nov. 14. The 2008 fiscal document was revealed to the public in September. Expenditures were up 3.8 percent from the previous year, with only a 2 percent revenue growth projected for next year.

Blessing Road opens

Frustrated Blessing Road residents received some much-needed good news from Cunningham at the Nov. 14 meeting when he announced that at 4 p.m. that day, state Department of Transportation officials had declared Blessing Road open to traffic.

The road's closure, which was at one time expected to last only eight weeks while state DOT installed a roundabout, ended up lasting 15 weeks, with many area residents stuck in traffic snarls on the Route 85 bypass for several minutes during construction. At times, motorists had to take a winding 10 to 15minute detour to get to the opposite side of Blessing Road and North Bethlehem where they lived.

The Blessing Road opening did not come soon enough for resident Peter Bakal.

"I am here to complain that we were cut off for 15-1/2 weeks," said Bakal, who said residents were never notified of the delays in opening the road.

Bakal accused the supervisor's office of not being on top of the situation, instead focusing on two major press conferences about the Vista Technology Park and roundabout openings leading up to Election Day.

Bakal called it "political grandstanding.'

Cunningham said it was the state DOT that determined when the road would open and when the public should be alerted to the roundabout opening.

"My office was completely engaged in this project," said Cunningham. "DOT set the deadline and DOT decided on when a press briefing would be held."

Pete Van Keuren, spokesman for DOT Region 1 office, said his agency had planned on a "soft" opening for the roundabouts on Route 85 for the weekend of Nov. 2 through Nov. 4.

"We received a call from the town the Friday before the Sunday event wanting something more formal, like a ribbon cutting," said Van Keuren.

Cunningham said the more formal event announcing Route 85 being open was his idea but DOT officials chose the date of the event. He also said the town had asked for Blessing Road to be open for several weeks.

We had been pushing DOT very hard to get that open," Cunningham said.

Weather has caused some of the delays in finishing up the project, said Van Keuren. Bridge work near Blessing Road also caused unexpected delays in opening the road.

"A lot of work was weather-dependent, and we have been held up a little bit by weather," Van Keuren said.

The Bethlehem Police Department told The Spotlight that three minor traffic accidents have occurred on Route 85 since the roundabouts opened.

Van Keuren said accidents in roundabouts are usually minor.

"In Malta, where roundabouts are now located, the severity of the accidents has lessened a lot," Van Keuren said.

Many Bethlehem and New Scotland motorists are turning right into the Maher Road roundabout built for the anticipated Vista Park traffic and driving behind Price Chopper to exit back on New Scotland Road or Cherry Avenue to the third roundabout. Work continues to complete signage and to open up turn lanes on all three roundabouts. The work is scheduled to be complete by mid-December.

opposed to cords of wood, and, he said, they can cost about the same

"We have a lot of people coming in for both wood pellets and corn for corn stoves. They are an excellent alternative to oil and gas," said Dymes.

Most experts say that the best way to help keep the heat inside a home once it is on is by making the most of your windows. If you cannot afford the cost of double-hung replacement windows, there are products on the market that can help. Homeowners can find a wide selection of window insulation products at their local home improvement stores. Robert Conrad, owner of Shaker Ace Hardware in Latham, said taking the time to make your windows as efficient as possible will make measurable differences in your heating costs, as much as \$500 a year. Products like heavy-duty clear sheets of plastic on the inside of the windows will reduce the amount of cold air coming in. Weather-stripping is another product that goes around your window seams like a tape with a foam insulation attached. It covers any spots where cold air is leaking in, areas that you may not be able to even see. "You can find window insulation kits that have everything you need to prepare your win-

dows for winter. Repairing any leaks with window caulk is another improvement step we recommend," said Conrad.

In addition to lowering the thermostat, other ways to save energy include the smart use of hot water and electricity.

The state Department of Energy Research and Development Authority on the Energy Smart Programs says that homeowners can save hundreds of dollars

"It is not unusual to see my husband wearing his hood up around the house or even have on a winter hat," said Coates.

Coates said her children, ages 6, 8 and 10, sometimes take matters in their own hands and crank up the thermostat, but she said, in general, they learn to adjust. "We have a lot of Polartec pajamas, flannel sheets and featherbeds. It's what we have always done and what we are accustomed to," said Coates. Coates says she has friends who keep their heat between 70 and 72 degrees and jokes that when they visit she is sometimes guilted into turning up the heat. Coates said her former neighbor in Cooperstown taught her some of her tricks. "Our neighbor would not turn on the heat until November; that was her rule. It didn't matter if it was snowing in October, that heat was not going on until November," said Coates.

Deadline extended for STAR rebate applications IN BRIEF

Acting New York State Commissioner of Taxation and Finance Barbara G. Billet announced that Gov. Eliot Spitzer recently signed legislation extending the deadline for homeowners to apply for their 2007 Middle Class STAR Rebate Program check from Nov. 30 to Dec. 31.

Billet also said that reminders about the program will be sent to about 600,000 property owners statewide who have yet to apply for their rebate checks.

"This rebate program provides direct relief to middle class New Yorkers who need it most, and it is our department's goal to reach as many homeowners as possible. We want all eligible New York homeowners to take advantage of this unique \$1.3 billion property tax cut," Billet said. Between July and October, the tax department mailed more than 2.7 million notices and applications to property owners throughout New York who receive the basic STAR exemption on their school tax bills, inviting them to apply for a rebate check under the STAR program.

By the end of October, approximately 79 percent of households had responded by filing applications online or through the mail. Rebate checks totaling \$685 million have been mailed so far to 1.8 million eligible households

Once a homeowner receives a notice, enrollment is easy with an application that can be submitted by mail or online. The rebate checks are mailed to homeowners as their applications are processed. Online applications take less time to process, though generally people may expect their check several weeks after they submit their application. Enrolling online at www.nystax. gov will be the fastest way to receive a rebate check.

"There has been a great response to the program," Billet said. "While most rebates have been processed, some applications take additional processing time. We assure all applicants that we are working very hard to issue rebate checks as quickly as possible."

To receive a rebate check, homeowners only have to verify the property information provided on the application, enter the names, Social Security numbers, and all required information for all resident property owners and their spouses, verify the mailing address and submit the application.

The tax department has updated information on its Web site, www.nystax.gov, or through the STAR hotline at 1-877-678-2769. Spanish speakers can also use the hotline for information.

Art from around the world: Store features unique collectibles

Through years of collaboration with artists throughout the world, Peter and Yona Ilani of Rhinebeck have brought their connections and collections of classic and contemporary art to Loudonville.

No more than three days after opening Tuesday, Nov. 13, several items at the Art in Design store had been sold. They are irreplaceable, one-of-akind works of art that have their roots in Germany, South Africa, Turkey and Israel. Some works incorporate classic design into modern media and others use semi-precious stones, diamonds, and in one artist's jewelry, Roman glass. That's a common artifact to come by in the couple's home country, Israel.

"We were doing a lot of trade shows. Trade shows got old, and a long time ago, I got old. I was spending 250 nights a year on the road," said Peter.

He and Yona currently live in Rhinebeck and make the hour trek north to Newton Plaza to

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open their store Art in Design, every morning at 10. They moved to Rhinebeck from New York City nearly four years ago and to New York City from Israel in 1975. Both served in the Israeli military during the Yom Kippur War. Peter served his mandatory three years; Yona went on to become an officer.

They both kept art close in their hearts. After years of trade shows, traveling the world and occasional trips home to Israel, they wanted a place to share their passion. Yona brought beads and Peter sought crafts and jewelry from across the globe.

"We were everywhere for the last two years. Now we want people to know us," said Yona.

The two knew they wanted to set up shop near Albany because

Deer present unique challenges to area drivers

October through December is the high season for car crashes with deer. Each year, car collisions with deer account for more than 150 human and nearly 1.5 million deer fatalities. Experts attribute it to the combination of deer mating and migration habits and shortened daylight hours.

"More drivers are on the road at dawn and dusk, the very time of day when deer are most active," cautioned Ray Palermo, director of public relations for Response Insurance, a national car insurer. "A car striking a 200pound adult deer can not only result in the death of the deer, but also incur an average of \$2,000 in damage to the vehicle." Palermo suggested a few basic cautions for drivers:

•Scan a wide swath of the roadside. Slow down when approaching a deer standing near the side of the road and be prepared. If startled, the deer can bolt onto the road and into your path. If necessary, honk your horn and flash your lights to try to scare it away.

•Be alert for more deer than

you may see at that moment.

•In many instances, it is best not to swerve around the deer since the deer may move in the same direction. You may also inadvertently hit another vehicle, or go off onto a dangerous shoulder. Unless you're sure of road factors, it is often best to simply brake and continue in your lane of traffic.

• Take deer crossing signs seriously, particularly those installed specifically for this time of year. Be particularly cautious in wooded and agricultural areas where there is little distance between the road and the woods.

One way Wambach believes the U.S. can climb back to the top is to encourage future generations to continue playing soccer as much for the love of the game as for international glory.
