Developers ask to show town preliminary plans for former farmland

The Town of New Scotland has drafted a building moratorium in light of a major commercial development deal proposed for the former Bender melon farm off of routes 85 and 85A.

The moratorium won't be voted on until late May, according to town officials, but a public hearing has been scheduled for Wednesday, May 7, at 7 p.m., at the Voorheesville High School.

Sphere Development Group out of Syracuse is looking to develop the 179-acre parcel of land, but the company has not yet closed on the property.

Currently a group of investors own the land, which is being listed through Platform Realty Group at \$4 million. The town assessed the land, which

has no municipal water or sewer and contains a barn structure, at \$734,700.

Police Blotter Delmar woman arrested for DWI with son

Theresa H. Raker, 29, of Delmar, was arrested on driving while intoxicated charges with her wheelchair-bound son in the back seat of the vehicle she was driving.

Bethlehem police pulled Raker over on Monday, March 24, after she was seen driving erratically and charged her with DWI, operating a vehicle with a blood-alcohol content of .08 percent or greater, and aggravated DWI, driving with a blood-alcohol content of .18 percent or greater.

Police said they received a call from a person on a cell phone who reported Raker's vehicle was being operated "in an erratic manner." When police spotted the vehicle, Raker was driving on Delaware Avenue and, according to the report, police said they saw her use her turn signal to turn onto Cherry Avenue but continued driving.

Raker then continued driving and began using "back streets," according to the arrest report. When police activated their emergency lights in an unmarked vehicle, Raker did not stop. The report states that police then activated the emergency siren and Raker still did not stop but eventually pulled over her vehicle in front of her home on Cherry Avenue.

When officers asked Raker is everything was OK, police said she responded that she "just wanted to get home," and police discovered her son in the back seat of the vehicle seated in a wheel chair.

Police said they smelled alcohol on Raker's breath when interviewing her and that she was displaying signs of intoxication. They had her pull the vehicle into her driveway in order to clear the roadway, according to the report.

Raker's husband was inside of the home and removed their son from the vehicle before Raker was given a field-sobriety test, which she failed, according to police. She also tested positive for alcohol on a prescreening device used by police, and after she was processed, she was released into the custody of her husband.

State Child Protective Services was contacted and notified of the incident, according to the arrest

• George L. Kirkly, 56, of Schenectady, was arrested by Bethlehem police on Wednesday, March 26, for fourth-degree criminal possession of stolen property and second-degree identity theft, both felonies, as well as petty larceny, a misdemeanor.

Police say Kirkly was arrested in the parking lot of a gas station on an active bench warrant issued by Bethlehem Town Justice Ryan Donovan on Feb. 6, and he was taken into custody.

Kirkly was then arraigned in front of Donovan and sent to Albany County Correctional Facility without bail. An April 1 preliminary hearing was set at the time of his arraignment.

•Ronnie S. Bartee Jr., 24, was arrested on April 1 for criminal possession of a forged instrument, a felony, and petty larceny, a misdemeanor.

Bethlehem police say Bartee turned himself into police custody in the presence of his attorney for a felony warrant signed by Bethlehem Town Justice Paul Dwyer on March 11.

Bartee was processed by police and arraigned by Dwyer, according to the arrest report, and then released by Dwyer on "a continuance of his bail and ... status from Albany Police," stemming from an arrest on Feb. 29.



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Town of Bethlehem gets \$3 million in pork

Assemblyman nabs funding for schools. infrastructure improvements

Even in a year of tough economic choices around the state, Assemblyman Tim Gordon managed to get a chunk of state funds for his hometown of Bethlehem.

Gordon, an Independence Party member and party chairman in Bethlehem, secured \$3 million in funding for Bethlehem's Vista Technology Park and another half million for the Bethlehem School District.

These types of secured funding by legislators for their districts are commonly referred to as "pork barrel" funds.

"This money from Urban **Development Corporation will** go to the town ... specifically for water and sewer and other infrastructure improvements.' Gordon said after the budget passed. "I'm simply delighted. ...It's smart growth and good economic development."

Gordon noted that the funding was included in the Assembly's budget, which was passed prior to the finalized budget and that he fought to get it included in the final state budget agreement.

"With the Capital Region quickly becoming a leader in technology, this funding will help capitalize on the growth of the technology market," Gordón said in a release. "This technology park can have a tremendous impact on our local economy by creating more jobs and creating a positive spin-off effect into the community.'

The funding, allocated through the Urban Development Corporation, was needed to upgrade Bethlehem's infrastructure in order to support the planned technology park.

The Vista campus has been a major focus of Bethlehem's economic development initiatives to boost the local economy.

Gordon said the park's main use will be high-technology research, office and development space.

Once completed, he said, it is expected to sustain 5,000 jobs annually and inject \$10 billion into the economy over 20 years.

"Companies around the world are actually taking notice, and we need be prepared and have the facility ready because they will come," Gordon said.

Town, Supervisor Jack Cunningham took a moment at the end of the Wednesday, April 9, town board meeting to recognize the funding secured by Gordon.

"I would like to publicly thank Mr. Gordon for all of his hard work," Cunningham said at the meeting. "The Vista Tech Park is important not only for Bethlehem, but for the entire area."

Gordon also managed to squeeze out another \$500,000 of unrestricted state aid to the Bethlehem School District from the state budget on top of what the school is already projected to get.

Gordon said he went after more state funding for the district so it could be used to fill any gaps in school funding.

He said he hoped the additional aid would help take some burden off of Bethlehem's property taxpayers. The district adopted an \$87.8 million budget, which will go to vote on May 20 at the district's high school. The budget would reflect a tax rate increase of 4.14 percent over last year's if it passes.

Residents will also be voting on a proposition that approve the purchase of 18 new buses.

This year's state budget provides an additional \$950,360 in high-tax aid, which is meant for high-cost school districts such as Bethlehem, according to Gordon. The additional funding for highly taxed schools is aimed at helping to ease the tax burden, he added.

"Bethlehem schools are known for the first-rate education they provide to our kids. However, sustaining that quality education for our kids should not further burden local property taxpayers,' Gordon said. "I could not sit by and let Bethlehem lose funding. Cuts lead to one of two outcomes either a program would be lost or property taxpayers would face an additional tax burden."

Gordon said that the budget also rejects shifting preschool special evaluation costs to school districts, which would have shifted \$42 million in costs to taxpayers. The plan also rejects a cut of \$500,000, he said, and adds \$600,000 more to the Education Department's Office of School Personnel Review and Accountability, which handles background checks for school personnel.

State Sen. Neil Breslin, D-Delmar, said Gordon is doing a pretty good job for a new kid on the block.

"For someone who's been around for only a little while," Breslin said, "that's a nice amount of pork for the town."



The deadline to declare a run for Bethlehem's Board . o f Education is fast approaching; petitions are due Monday, April 21. Qualified

RCS superintendent steps down from post

Resignation comes amid lawsuit allegations of discrimination

Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk School District officials on Tuesday, April 8, confirmed the resignation of Superintendent Viki Wright.

The resignation comes to light in the midst of a lawsuit against her and criticism in a state audit last year over a trip she took to Las Vegas in 2005 with Assistant Superintendent for Instruction Diane

Albano. The two went to a two-day conference in Las Vegas but ended up staying for four days, according to the audit.

There was an \$11 million lawsuit filed against Wright in February, the school's board of education president, and a middle school teacher by fellow RCS teacher Daniel Pickett. The lawsuit deals with alleged discrimination against Pickett after he spoke out against school policies at a public board of education meeting.




Wright has been with the district since 2003, and according to McCagg, will remain actively employed as the district's superintendent until June 30. After that, her salary and benefits will be paid through the 2008-09 school year or

until she begins employment with another district.

Wright is budgeted to make \$146,419 next year.

"It was mutually agreed upon by the board and Ms. Wright that this action represents the best option for the district and for her," said board President Mike Varney in a release. "We have

Pickett is also suing on the grounds that he was defamed and demoted following allegations that he had an inappropriate relationship with a student, which the student later publicly denied.

Pickett's lawyer Brendan Baynes said his client's civil rights under the first, fourth and 14th amendments were violated. The suit alleges that the three infringed upon Pickett's rights to free speech, due process, and equal protection of the law.

The school director of communications Michael McCagg confirmed that Wright was resigning and that the board of education on Monday, April 7, approved an addendum agreement

great respect for much of what Ms. Wright has accomplished through her tenure at RCS. That said, we believe it is time to move in a new direction."

The Board of Education is working to identify and hire an interim superintendent to begin work on July 1, according to Varney. A search for a permanent successor will begin in the late spring or summer, he added.

When Baynes was asked for comment about Wright's resignation, he said he couldn't but added that he hoped it could be used in his client's trial against the RCS faculty members.

"I can't really speculate on what this means," he said. "I would like to hope [to use the resignation in court] ... but whether there is a paper trail that ties it, remains to be seen."

It isn't easy being free.

I'm free to choose how I spend my time, yet I often waste it worrying or complaining. Then I waste more time feeling guilty about wasting time worrying and complaining. Then I stay up late feeling upset about all the guilt, which means I don't get a good night's sleep, and the whole cycle begins again the next day.

Further, I live under the mistaken assumption that I'm in charge of everything. There are others like me. And we'll all tell you that it's quite tiring.

Being in charge of everything means that I believe that if I plan enough, collect lots of information, and anticipate every scenario and weather condition, I can make any situation turn out right. And if success is not achieved, then it must be because I dropped the ball, missed an angle or forgot to follow through.

Passover, which begins Saturday night, celebrates the Jews' escape. from slavery in Egypt over 3,000 years ago. They wandered in the desert for 40 years during their journey to freedom. And since they left Egypt in a hurry, there was no time to carefully plan and pack for that trip.

Wow, I would have had a difficult time with all the uncertainties. I would have had a lot of questions for Moses: We have to do what? We're going where? How long will it take to get there? Why can't we take the time to bake some decent bread so we'll have something to nosh on? How do we expect the young children and the elderly to walk so far?

The holiday of Passover includes participating in a Seder (SAY-der), a lively hands-on religious ceremony celebrating the exodus from Egypt. During the Seder, Jews read from a special book called a haggadah. The word haggadah means "the telling," referring to the obligation to tell the story of Passover to our children each year so the story will be remembered and relayed from generation to generation.

Taking time out to celebrate my ancestors' freedom from



physical slavery, reminds me that I need to remember to release myself from mental slavery. I need to get rid of emotional and physical clutter and use my time more wisely.

Recently, I began to indulge myself with a Saturday afternoon nap. I need time to recharge. All that worrying and complaining drains my energy.

And what do you know? Getting some rest enables me to be in charge of everything in a more productive way.

For years my husband has tried to convince me of the power of the nap. He's constantly saying, "I'm going to take a nap." Sometimes he gives no warning. He just sits down on the couch and instantly falls asleep. There's no deliberation involved. He doesn't even need a pillow. He's a pro at spontaneous napping.

Of course, this is easy for him to do. He's not in charge of everything.

My brain is constantly processing, analyzing and planning. I can't just simply put my head on a pillow and fall asleep. That would be like powering off a computer instead of using the log off and shut down functions.

Unless I'm on the brink of exhaustion, it's hard for me to drift off to sleep. When I close my eyes, a to-do list pops into my head. My brain says: How dare you rest when there's so much to be done?

With Passover approaching, the to-do list is intensified: Clean the house, plan the festive meal, shop for the food (must get Breakstone's whipped butter), and devise a creative way to keep everyone interested and involved in the Seder.

Then there's the mish mash of other thoughts: I remember fondly the Passovers celebrated at Aunt Selma's apartment in Queens. I lament the fact that it has been years since I've been to Queens. I fret that the entire

family will not all be together. I rejoice in the friends and family who will join us for the Seder.

I'm forever beating myself up for a missed opportunity when my daughter was 3 years old and we were videotaping the Passover Seder. She had stood up on her chair and had started to say a version of the "Four Questions," recited by the youngest person present. I told her it was not quite time yet. And when it was time, she was no longer interested. No amount of cajoling would change her mind. You see on the video that she was ready, and then you hear my voice saying, "Not yet." Oh, if I could only go back and capture that precious baby singing!

"Just focus on the good things," my wise husband advises.

That's easier said than done.

There were days in the desert when my ancestors got discouraged. And we all know that negativity is contagious. A few disgruntled folks incited the masses to build and pray to a golden calf. Imagine how Moses felt when he returned with the tablets containing the Ten Commandments and found everyone blatantly disregarding the "no idol worship" rule. Talk about frustrating.

If I had lived back in that

time, I might have assembled coalitions and gotten the people to hold off on erecting the calf. It's also possible that my attempts would have failed and I would have felt responsible for being unable to prevent the whole golden calf scene.

I have to believe I would have tried. You see I'm even retroactively in charge of everything.

I would have told the people: "Look, we're not slaves anymore,

and although we are going through difficult times, it's not as bad as when we were slaves."

I need to focus on the positive and keep things in perspective.


With freedom comes responsibility, but in reality I'm not in charge of everything.

Around the County Varying outlooks surround Tech Valley High School

School has mixed support among faculty, parents

The 21st century classroom has emerged as an engaging stage for students immersed in our modern world.

With a new, wired world becoming the norm across the country, a technologically savvy student reflects the innovations surrounding us all. With this mindset, Tech Valley High School now offers opportunities for students to connect with the modern world by offering a new type of learning.

"Our first class began in September of 2007," said Tech Valley High School Principal Dan Liebert. The high school, initially established by joint efforts from Capital Region BOCES, Questar III BOCES and local businesses, was about five years in planning before it fully came to fruition.

It offers "project-based learning," said Liebert, giving students the chance to apply the skills they develop in school directly to real world scenarios. Initiatives such as providing a one-to-one computer ratio and collaborating with local businesses gives Tech Valley High School the ability to stay on the cutting edge of modern needs, he said.

Though there are concerns about the curriculum at Tech Valley High School, the administration maintain's that their style of learning prepares children for the 21st century as well as today's state standards.

"Colleges tell us [they] need people who can collaborate and think critically. Project-based learning is really organizing instruction around New York State standards, but in a practical and applied way," said Liebert, "Kids at Tech Valley High School have to take and pass regents exams. We teach to the content and learning standards.

With these notions in mind, many question why students should be sent to Tech Valley High School. Students at the school, who are funded by their parent district's tax coffers, will each require about \$18,000 in tuition for one year of study.

"[This is] an opportunity for districts to innovate. We can share that [with the rest of the community]," said Liebert; "it's like a research and development arm for districts."

Regardless, many districts still question how useful Tech Valley High School is.

The major question is: does Tech Valley High School provide a student experience that is different or beyond that which we offer at the district's schools,' said Bethlehem Superintendent Les Loomis. "People in the school district, including our staff and board of education, do not have complete information on Tech Valley High School. The board, however, did include a second slot for a freshman at Tech Valley [this year]," he added.


John McGuire offers a similar outlook. "Our district has been very supportive of Tech Valley. We've seen it as a kind of magnet approach in the heart of Tech Valley," he said.

However, not every district is as supportive, nor can they afford to be. Voorheesville, for example, will not be sending an additional student for the 2008-2009 freshman class. According to Voorheesville Superintendent Linda Langevin, the board's decision was made with concern for how sending a student will benefit the school and how it can be managed financially.

"Other board members had some concerns; they see it as a rather high expense to be made on one child," added Jim Coffin, 'a Voorheesville school board member.

"It's a good concept. There are other operations like it around the country that generate a lot of enthusiasm, [but] the way the school is being funded needs improvement," he said.

This has angered some parents. "Voorheesville allowed kids to apply and [at that point] everyone was really excited about it. However, a few meetings ago, it became clear the board wouldn't fund another student," said Shari Hoffman-Simsek of Voorheesville, "Smaller districts are not sending students. Are we creating a caste system that excludes smaller districts? They don't realize the benefits the kids bring back."

Parents of preemies persevere

The writer, a resident of Saratoga Springs, was chosen by the March of Dimes to tell her family's story.

Sept.11, 2001, as we all know, is probably the worst day in American history, but three years later on the same day, my husband, Greg, and I were celebrating — I was pregnant and my due date was May 11.

I had always wanted to be a mother, and I had also been preparing myself — I took folic acid for a year and had not had a drop of alcohol for more than eight months. And so it seemed that the stars were aligned and all was right in the universe. I had no fertility issues, and conception was easy.

On Jan. 4, in my 21st week of pregnancy, I had a Level II ultrasound, and everything looked good. That night, I thought I had indigestion, and over the next couple of days I had general malaise and some epigastric pain. I was told that indigestion is a common complaint during pregnancy and to take Maalox.

On Jan. 22, I was admitted to labor and delivery at Albany Medical Center. I was 24 weeks pregnant. I had been diagnosed with severe preeclampsia and pregnancy-induced hypertension.

My perinatologist told me that I was in liver failure and would have died over the next 24 to 48 hours if I had not sought medical treatment. Luckily, I stabilized over the next few days, but significant changes were noted on an ultrasound on the sixth day, and so Gabriela Lisbeth Garofalowas born at 10:03 p.m. on Jan. 28. She was 1 pound, 2 ounces, and 12 inches long. We heard her crv. one small cry, before the NICU team whisked her away. We would not hear her cry again for more than a year.

Ultimately, Gabriela spent 165 days in the NICU/PICU and was discharged on July 11,

2005, on a vent, oxygen and a tracheostomy.

Gabriela has a very complicated medical history, like so many premature babies. She has undergone four major surgeries. She has been to the OR nine times and spent 12 months on diuretics, 15 months on continuous oxygen, 17 months on a ventilator and was trached for 18 months. I have had to resuscitate her on four occasions.

When Gabriela was just 8 days old, she developed severe sepsis, a common prematurity complication. And so on that eighth day of her life, she lay nearly lifeless in Nursery 2. We were told that the next 12 hours were critical. The NICU staff worked tirelessly but feared that Gabriela had probably suffered a significant brain bleed.

We had planned an informal baptism for the next day, but the attending neonatologist and our nurse told us we should have it done right away.

At that moment, my husband finally allowed himself to break down and weep. He could barely stand because his knees were buckling. I was able to remain pretty calm, and we would learn over the coming months that we could help each other get through what seemed like a living nightmare. I asked God to spare my daughter's life.

As we waited for the chaplain to baptize Gabriela, Greg and I held her tiny hands and talked to her. We talked to her about the seasons in nature. We told her that she was the most important person in our lives. We told her that we had waited for her all of our lives, and that we would not let anything happen to her.

Our nurse told us to keep talking because Gabriela's numbers were improving. At the end of the ceremony, I whispered in her ear, "I am your mother, and if you can hear me, give mama a sign," and my precious daughter squeezed my finger. I knew then with complete certainty that she would survive. Over the next 12 hours, she stabilized, and on the next day, we were told that the brain scan was normal.

Greg and I have had great support from the NICU, March

than once to go home, to spend time with my husband because so many marriages don't survive this. And I knew they were trying to help and they were right, but I resented the advice.

In the midst of the crisis I had lifelines to certain people, one of those people being Father Frank Sullivan, our beloved priest at St. Clement's Church in Saratoga Springs. I would call him each week and give updates and ask for extra prayers when there was a surgery or when her condition was worsening. He would mention Gabriela in each of his weekly masses for almost two years, and she was also on the prayer list of the sick in congregations around the globe. Believe me, we felt the power of so many prayers. Gabriela came off her ventilator on June 8, 2006, and never went back on. She took her first steps on Labor Day weekend in 2006. Davs before Christmas this past year, she said "ma-ma," and now she says "dada."

In the fall, we were given permission from the doctors to take Gabriela to church just once for the year (putic places are a big no-no for her suring cold and flu season due to her chronic lung disease). Father Sullivan asked if we would walk in the procession with him at the start of Mass so he could introduce us.

When he introduced us, he said, "Today is a very blessed day. Almost two years ago, Elisabeth called me when Gabriela was born and told me that, 'One day, Father, we will bring Gabriela to your Mass to meet everyone at St. Clement's,' and when that day came, Elisabeth and Greg would know that a miracle had occurred. And so standing before you is Greg, Elisabeth, and the baby you have been praying for for almost two years: Gabriela Garofalo."

At the mention of her name, our daughter clapped, and, in turn, the congregation clapped and wept.

After Mass, people flocked to us. Many were the parents of premature children. One couple told us of their preemie son, who is now a strapping 22-year-old football college star, but they wept as if he had just been born.

I am here to tell you that miracles do occur. The advances in medicine and technology are nothing short of miraculous. I am here to tell you that the power of

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of Dimes, social workers and the NICU case manager.

During that difficult time, I would wake up with such severe anxiety that I could barely breathe. I was depressed, but even more, I felt so guilty. My body had betrayed me. I was never sick in my life until I became pregnant. My baby was suffering, and I felt so responsible, so helpless.

The staff tried to prepare me for the day I would go home but Gabriela would not. A nurse encouraged me to kiss my daughter, to feel her and for her to feel me, and so I kissed her body from head to toe. I wish I could have bottled her sweet baby smell. I hated being home. The house was silent. Her room was so empty. I never missed a day visiting her, and I was told more prayer works. I am a better parent and far better person because of this experience.

My calling is to serve others and dedicate my professional life to improving the lives of premature babies and their families.

I would like to thank those of you who have supported the March of Dimes because, ultimately, you have helped saved my daughter's life, and I would like to encourage you to continue your efforts and to inspire others to do the same as this will save many more lives.

This story is dedicated in memory of Amiyah, Christian, Isabella, Michael, Billy and Amelia — Gabriela's nursery mates who died within their first year of life. May their parents find hope, courage and peace.

Unemployment is up and house foreclosures are skyrocketing throughout the state and nation. And so too is public library traffic.

The American Library

circles, "it's the economy Association (ALA) has stupid." The price of gas is commissioned studies in the past that demonstrate a clear connection between an economic decline and an increase in public library use.

> One five-year study released in April 2002, saw a match between circulation increases at 25 of the nation's largest public libraries and time periods labeled "recessions" by the National Bureau of Economic Research.

> Put simply, when our dollars shrink and expenses grow, people tend to rely more on their public libraries for free materials and services they might otherwise pay for.

The ALA studies confirm the stories we've heard in the past are once again being told by our librarians from around the state.

In fact, one of our members e-mailed me a story about two young women in their 20s who renewed their library cards because money was too tight to go to a chain bookstore.

In another part of the state, a young man went to his local public library and asked for help finding a computer technician's position. He got a job offer from a company he found listed at his library and claimed the experience had turned his life around.

We see people flocking

back to our libraries at a time when library dollars are also tight, which means that state and local funding has never been so important to our local public libraries.

As the English author Ashleigh Brilliant said, "The closest you will ever come in this life to an orderly universe is a good library."

And isn't an orderly safeharbor something we all seek-and can all support-in such turbulent and uncertain economic and political times.



Editor, Spotlight Newspapers:

So, some in New Scotland are organizing against the Edie Abrams gang? Wow!

Here's the story.

I agree with large landowners' claims that they pay taxes for the public's "open space." You want open space, they protest, then buy

However, when specific land is special – its history unique, its viewshed so spectacular it affects the town's identity and very spirituality - then that landowner has an exceptional and extraordinary

community.

When the public pays extra taxes for an agricultural district and subsidies to help farmers remain viable, then citizens do have an interest in the land. We value farming. We don't pay these taxes and subsidies so farmland may be sold for a development that destroys the nature of our community.

As a Residents Planning Advisory Committee member, I recommended researched, and included a model Right-to-Farm Law in

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responsibility ... as does the the final report. Frustrated were willing to pay extra taxes that none of RPAC's 100 recommendations was considered, I cajoled the board to pass this law.

I also lobbied for a dedicated fund to purchase land important to residents. **Residents** overwhelmingly had indicated they wanted agricultural uses and open space to remain on properties bordering routes 85 and 85A.

The majority of respondents to the town-wide survey demonstrated that they wanted such a fund, and many for that purpose.

RPAC didn't ask about bigbox stores because it was the furthest thing from our minds. Based on respondents' replies and comments from townwide meetings, it's obvious residents didn't want and could not conceive of such a development here.

So, when someone says the RPAC recommendations don't prohibit big boxes, that is only technically correct, but misleading, misrepresentative of the conclusions and recommendations of the entire report, and manipulative.

Residents overwhelmingly want the Town Board to "pursue development of reasonable guidelines that would improve the quality of building design, signage, and landscaping in the town's commercial districts." Residents did not want corporate or franchise prototype designs, but a hamlet-style design. Parking, residents said, should not be allowed to dominate an entire development.

silent to residents' views. Supervisor Thomas Dolin correctly says the site plan procedure will not ensure the town's vision. We need more detail in the zoning code, immediately.


Residents cannot buy the property along routes 85 and 85A. But, we can enact better zoning and guidance.

Existing law allows big boxes while prohibiting mixed use hamlet-style villages. We need a moratorium so the public participates in crafting intelligent zoning. We need to work together, and fast.

While I'm attracted to "new urbanism" concepts, and would not mind if a big box conforms to those designs instead of a huge, nondescript box, the town must weigh in. I'm sure landowners, developers, and the community can agree on guidelines that would generally satisfy everyone.

I am not a NIMBY run amok.

Something similar will likely happen in China as prices typically get expensive during such a world-class event.

And here is an example of how other cultures can change with time. I recently returned from a glorious golf vacation to the north of Ireland.

I never thought I would use the words "chic" and "Dublin" in the same sentence, but that is how I found the capital city – sophisticated, modern and, yes, chic. Dublin today is a true melting pot of world and European cultures.

As I reflect on my winding trail through the beautiful country, I recall the faces. I remember the warmth and sincerity of Marie Gough, the chatty greeter and starter at Ballyliffin Golf Club who got us off on time and was anxious to hear what we thought about the new Faldo design when we finished.

I still recall the smile from Frances Kelly that warmed the breakfast room early one chilly morning at her charmed Stella Maris Country House Hotel. She came in early that morning, wanting us to have a full Irish breakfast before the kitchen opened, the only way we could do it and still make our tee time. Frances runs this lovely property with Terry McSweeney, and it was voted Ireland's Small Hotel of the Year in 2006.

I remember pro Charlie McGoldrick warning us before our round at Ennicrone Golf Club, "Now on a windy links course, you've got to keep the ball where you can see it. In America you have Risk and Reward holes. Here we have Risk and *Reload* holes."

Then there was the hospitality of the Moylett family. Rachael, Nicole and her husband, John Raferty, who run the Downhill Inn Ballina. Their good cheer was surpassed only by a very robust but happy father of the bride, who entered the lobby of the hotel with two Jamison brandies in one hand and a warm Guinness in the other.

His ample belly heaved with laughter like a perfect Santa Claus ...until his tux pants dropped straight to the oriental carpet. Having never faced such an issue before, we offered to hold his drinks so he could raise his trousers. With a jovial "thank

you," he said; "Come join m'daughter's wedding. Love to have ya."

My experience is no different from that of the thousands of visitors who tour Ireland every year. It always comes back to the natural warmth, and kind and fun-loving personalities of the people who touch us and make us want to return.

But here is a warning to my Irish friends: You may hear in the midst of your building boom (where the cost of homes has doubled in the past four years) that much of the new housing is boring and repetitious and that the new housing is making the scenery along your winding roads lose some of the charm and character that made it so interesting.

I miss the thatched roofs. In the past it seemed you could almost imagine who lived in the houses and cottages just by looking them. Now they are all starting to look the same, not unlike the early housing developments in most suburban towns in America.

The more important aspect of the housing boom is the influx of foreign tradesmen who have come to work. I read on my recent visit that one in 10 now employed in Ireland are not Irish.

Ireland has always extended a warm welcome to visitors, but now in the desire to be "politically correct" the country could be creating a nightmare for future tourism.

Here's the dilemma in a nutshell: Imagine it's 2010 in downtown Belfast. Looking for some local charm, visiting golfers walk from the contemporary Europa Hotel to the Crown Bar Saloon across the street. They snuggle up to the bar in the most famous pub in Belfast, and they are greeted by, "Hi, I'm Susie. What can I get you to drink?"

Susie is a perky blonde from Kansas City with a big smile. She came to Ireland with her boyfriend, who is in the construction business.

I'm sure Susie is a nice kid, but when I come to Ireland and stop in a local pub, I don't want a Susie from Kansas; I want a guy named Paddy or Shawn to draw me a Guinness.

I don't want to walk the fair ways of Ireland's worldclass links with a caddie named Isaac from New Jersey or Mohamed or Sven. I want Sully or Tommy or Murphy to pick my club in the wind and tell me historic stories.

The Irish people are the frosting on the cake, the sun breaking through a cloudy day. It's the people that bring a potentially mundane experience alive with color and emotion and laughter, and it's easy and natural for them; they don't need hospitality classes. They should be teaching them.

The future of the Irish tourism industry depends on if, in a complex politically correct world, they can recognize that visitors don't want Susie pouring pints. Bring on Erin or Kathleen.

In a new and smaller world full of travel options and wonderful accommodations, it's important to remember what really warms our hearts on those chilly and damp Irish days.

Sometimes change makes me a little grumpy.

Bed, Bed."



The state budget will increase overall aid to RCS by a little more than \$100,000 from earlier budget projections.

Interim Business Administrator Dennis Geisler said state aid projections show RCS receiving \$16.8 million in state aid, \$119,025 more than was proposed by former Gov. Eliot Spitzer.

The majority of the funding boost the district is slated to receive will be in aid for sharing services through the Board of **Cooperative Education Services** (BOCES), which RCS will receive an extra \$84,699, and foundation


aid, in which the district will receive an additional \$27,686, Geisler said.

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Finance Spotlight The ins and outs of long-term care insurance: Have 'the talk' with your parents

G rowing up, it was always our parents who were sitting us down for "the talk." Sometimes it was about dating, other times it was about being safe and making smart decisions. Always, at the core, was our well-being.

Somehow, we could always anticipate when "the talk" was coming (call it an adolescent's intuition), but it never made it any easier. Heart-tohearts with our parents were enough to make us squeamish—whether they were good for our well-being or not.

A real issue with every day implications

Chances are, talking with your parents has gotten easier over-the years. The reason is probably rooted in the fact that they are no longer your primary caregiver. But what happens when roles reverse? What happens when your parents are no longer able to care for themselves, and you become the primary caregiver? Does talking become hard again?

According to a study conducted by the University of Minnesota, one out of every two people will require long-term care during their life. While the elderly certainly aren't the only demographic who need care—accidents and illnesses can

happen to anybody at any age—they are the demographic that takes the largest toll on families.

Experts estimate that by 2010 the annual cost of nursing-home care will be \$78,600. Most people can't afford that, and Medicare, health insurance and disability do not provide any help. It is a cost that can deplete an individual's estate and, in many cases, deplete the life savings of the caregiver.

And still, like inheritances, most of us have a hard time talking about it. The benefits of early planning

Not only can your parents be more selective of the facility they will choose

to live in, but there is also the possibility that, with good planning, in-home care can be s realistic and affordable.

In addition, long-term care can protect an individual's assets, as the financial burden of long-term care is transferred to a third party.

How long-term care insurance works

When an individual purchases long-term care insurance, they are purchasing a policy that pays a predetermined amount toward future long-term care costs. The benefits become payable when a person is no longer able to perform routine, daily activities, as defined by the coverage; becomes physically disabled by diseases such as Parkinson's or Alzheimer's; or when a physician determines that long-term care is needed.

Some of the costs covered by long-term care insurance include:

• in-home assistance with daily activities, such as bathing, eating and dressing;

- day care programs;
- visiting nurses; and
- nursing home expenses.

Long-term care insurance policies differ, and buyers have a lot of flexibility in choosing a plan that is right for their budget and longrange needs. However, buyers of long-term care insurance should always consider two things: inflation protection and coverage eligibility, c.

1. Due to the skyrocketing cost of healthcare, policies that do not account for inflation will not likely provide benefits that can cover the full range of long-term care costs.

2. Whether it is the benefit period, which is the length of time it takes to receive benefits, or the waiting period, which determines how soon after an individual qualifies for longterm care that benefits are provided, buyers of long-term care insurance must understand that choices that lower their premium cost them at the other end. For example, individuals who opt to have a waiting period of 100 days will have to pay their own healthcare expenses for 100 days. In a nursing home, this could be close to \$200 a day-out of pocket. Room for art

Local designer uses her skill as a painter to bring interior spaces to life

Whether art imitates life or life imitates art, Slingerlands' own Deidre Gatta is transforming everyday objects into pieces of art one room at a time.

Gaining national recognition for her designs in magazines such as House Beautiful, Better Homes and Gardens, and Good Housekeeping, Gatta lives and works in Bethlehem with her husband and two teenage daughters.

"I really try to stay locally, due to my children," Gatta said while showing off some of the artistic touches she has incorporated into her own home. "I do receive calls from people all over wanting to purchase some of my work."

At first glance, Gatta appears to live in a relatively normal suburban home on the hillside of a cul-de-sac with an in-ground pool and two beautiful Akita dogs, but the furnishings inside her home are anything but ordinary.

Ornate curtains and sashes drape over the windows, expertly detailed faux finishes sculpt the walls, and extraordinary paintings cover the shades of her lamps. If the rooms of her home look like they came right out of the. pages of a design magazine,

it's probably not too far off because her work is increasingly being picked up by a variety of interior design publications.

In her living room hangs the one painting she hasn't sold and the only one she won't.

"It's called 'Open Field." Gatta said with a smile, pointing to the landscape scene prominently displayed. "This is my inspiration."

The painting netted her several awards from Alfred University while she was there, and her husband even used it as a label on one of his homemade wines. (She joked that her husband wishes he were a wine maker instead of the CEO of Portadam, Inc.)

Graduating from Alfred with a bachelor's degree in fine arts, Gatta has turned her skills as a painter into a blossoming design career.

Her company, Artistic Designs by Deidre, serves residential and commercial clients and offers a variety of services, from design consulting to plaster finishes and studio art. However, if you're trying to sneak a peak at her upcoming works, you may be out of luck because Gatta doesn't let anyone into her studio.

"That's off limits," she said with a gentle laugh.

Gatta uses a variety of materials when it comes to renovating a room or a home, or she focuses her creativity on transforming a single object or piece of furniture.

'Sometimes I'll do the whole space, or sometimes I get an order for a specific piece ... or sometimes I'll even get a call for the restoration of a whole house," Gatta said. "I'm always looking around and seeing materials. ... I always try to find something unique and interesting to add to the space. and; if all else fails, I usually have to make it myself."

Gatta will work with homeowners or clients to get the look that best suits them. Other times she will be given carte blanche to reinvent a living space as if given a blank canvas.

"Some people have set ideas and just let me do it." she said. "Once we come to an agreement, then we put it together. What I usually ask is, what kind of materials do you envision?"

Gatta said a common question when people see her work inside of a home is, "How long will this take?"

I think that has a lot to do with all of these home improvement and home makeover shows," Gatta guipped. "A lot of my work is customized.'

Although Gatta applies her talents to a variety of objects and furniture, from table legs and floors to outlet covers and end tables, she hasn't gotten a totally far-out request — yet.

'We're in Albany, so we're not going to get that many funky requests," she said. "I have done a dentist office where we've done a mural. ... Murals would be where you kind of get to go crazy.'



'We don't have any great deal of experience with this type of development because of our location here in New Scotland," Mackey said.

Finally, in Schenectady, visit the The Empire State Aerosciences Museum.

"We've been in existence for 22 years. Our mission and our purpose is to interpret aviation, especially in New York state," said Kevin Millington, president of The Empire State Aerosciences Museum.

Featuring an airpark with more than 15 varieties of jetfighters and attack planes from the 1950s to today, the museum also boasts large exhibit galleries with many hands-on activities, such as a flight simulator and a hot-air balloon you work yourself.

"We offer a variety of aircraft types - ones you can't see everywhere," says Millington.

Last, but not least, is Saratoga County. Although the race track won't be opening for a while, there is still plenty to do and see.

Families can spend an entire afternoon perusing the shops along Broadway, stopping to eat lunch in one of the many restaurants or cafes, or make a visit to any one of Saratoga's museums there's bound to be something to meet everyone's interests. 

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

That is, if you're not one of the 6,500 people who like "YMCA."



The Bethlehem girls track and field team finished second at Saturday's CBA/LaSalle Relays at Christian Brothers Academy in Colonie.


The Lady Eagles finished with 93 points, 58 points behind overall champion Colonie. Schenectady was third with 66 points.



Road safety starts with good tires

egular auto maintenance is imperative to ensure your car is functioning at its best. While oil changes and seasonal preparation are important, one of the most critical parts of your car to maintain is also something that is often overlooked – the tires.

A dealer will not sell you a lower speed rated tire than what is outlined in your vehicle's manual. It is a liability and not considered safe.

The car of the future: 1950s style

he 1950s was a time of inimitable optimism in the United States. After having just won WWII and defeated two mighty empires, Americans were at an all-time high. The war had created a demand for new technologies, materials and methods of production in order to create the conditions for victory. When the war ended, these new technologies were ready for use and without a market. Quickly, the innovations were put into commercial use. Combined with a newfound disposable consumer income and a move to a suburban lifestyle. the automobile was the perfect center of innovation and development.

The jet age began in the 1950s, and people were absolutely fascinated by the power and strength embodied by jet engines. They wanted some of that marguis power for themselves, and designers were eager to please them. The jet age allowed for much faster production, and the education provided to returning service men and women created a great resource for innovation and development in the car industry.

Cars became lower, longer and wider, with more materials and metals available because they were not needed for the war effort. Family cars, which were normally drab or even mundane, began to sport wings, turbines and after-burner taillights. These effects were purely cosmetic and only added to the value of the car because of the cache of the jet age. Although some detracted from the overall performance,

they were such symbols of status and modernity that cars with them continued to fly off dealers' lots.

The 1957 Chevrolet Bel Air was one of the first models to reach commercial popularity with its stylized designs. In comparison to later models, the Bel Air today seems to be a model of restraint, with large but not unwieldy fins and clean lines that have earned it a place among car enthusiasts, particularly in its convertible model. The 1959 Ford Fairlane Skyliner is often noted as the most outlandish of models from this period. Not only was the Skyliner's name intended to evoke images of flight, but the tail fins, headlights and taillights were crafted to nearly absurd proportions to reflect the stylings of contemporary aircraft. The Fairlane also featured a retractable hard-top roof that would come back into vogue 20 years later.

While this trend didn't last long, it was very popular, and these cars remain classic icons of a time of innocence and exuberance in America; when nothing was impossible and there were no damaging effects from the automobile. They represent a fascination with science and technology that could be compared to today's integration of multimedia tools and state-of-the-art electronics. Americans are obsessed with cars and with technology, and it makes sense that, in the 1950s and in the modern age, these two classic examples of Americana would meld and intertwine.

But it is most well-known for its namesake: the Joshua tree. The park may need to consider changing its name at the end of this century, as the beloved tree is expected to slowly disappear. Joshua trees need the temperature to drop to a certain mark in order to reproduce, and according to NPCA's report, that is less likely to happen due to global warming. The change will damage the entire

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Motor oil facts, not friction

any people don't know how to select motor oil that will L help them get optimum performance out of their car. People often just select the oil their father used, or they may take the suggestion of a counter person at an auto parts store who may not know any more about cars than they do.

There are meaningful differences in motor oils, and choosing the right one can have a major impact on how well your car runs. Selecting the right oil is the quickest and cheapest way to improve your car's performance and reliability.

Two components, determine how well motor oil will perform in your car. One factor is the base oil, and the other is the combination of chemicals (additives) that are added to the base oil.

Base oils

The two primary types of base oils used are mineral and synthetic. Mineral oils are by-products of refined crude oil. Refining helps reduce the impurities but leaves molecules of all shapes and sizes. Synthetic oils are manmade compounds whose molecules are all

the same size and shape; consequently, synthetic oil has less friction and performs significantly better than mineral oils.

There's

been sizable growth in the use of synthetic oils over the years. In fact, synthetic oils are often the factory fill in many new performance and luxury cars.

Additives

Regardless of the base oil used, chemicals must be added to give motor oil the characteristics needed to do its job. Typical additives that may be added to base

oil include detergents to reduce the formation of residue, defoamants to deter absorption of air, anti-wear agents, antioxidants and others.

Although additives are typically only 15 to 25 percent of the make-up of motor oil, they can impact a lubricant's performance much more than the base oil. For instance, mineral-based motor oil with a very good additive package can easily outperform synthetic motor oil with a mediocre additive package.


There is no easy way for a consumer to determine the quality of motor oil's additive package. Price is often an indicator of quality since the more advanced additive technologies cost more to produce. Performance is the ultimate measure of additive package quality.

Advances in lubrication

Some of the biggest technological advances in lubrication are now coming through advancements in chemical additives. These breakthroughs have been developed by a handful of companies that specialize in high-performance lubricants, as opposed

to major oil companies whose primary focus is refining and selling crude oil by products like gasoline and other fuels. high-One performance

lubricant company, Royal Purple, has developed lubricants that outperform both leading mineral oils and other synthetics. Their oil has been proven in numerous independent tests to dramatically reduce engine wear, increase horsepower and torque, and reduce fuel consumption and emissions.  Drive smoothly and considerately. Aggressive driving - fast starts, excessive speed, abrupt maneuvers and constant braking - is not only dangerous, it significantly increases your vehicle's fuel consumption. "You'll enjoy the ride more and spend less on gas if you just drive friendly," Pinera says.

• Only use premium fuel if your car's manufacturer specifically recommends it for your engine type. Regular fuel costs less

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and premium will not improve your fuel efficiency in anything but a high-performance engine.

 Look for gas stations that offer pumps with vapor-recovery nozzles. They look like black plastic accordions attached to the nozzle. These curb emissions. Likewise, never try to "top off" your tank with these nozzles. They're designed to shut off when the gas tank is at its optimum fullness. Continuing to pump could lead to overfilling and spilling.

 Try to pack light and avoid putting anything on top of your vehicle. Rooftop storage may increase the risk of rollover in some types of vehicles, and increases drag, which lowers fuel efficiency in all kinds of autos.

· Whenever possible, choose a fuel-efficient model, such as a subcompact, compact or economy car. The good news is that these are usually the least expensive to rent from any company.

• Consider renting a hybrid. Hertz, for example, offers a "Green Collection" of rental cars that includes fuel-sipping hybrids like the Toyota Prius or other environmentally friendly vehicles like the Toyota Camry or Hyundai Sonata, which feature an average Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) highway fuel efficiency rating of 31

Devil in the detailing

ppearances are more important than ever, and your car is no exception. It is often the first impression people have of you when you arrive at an event or work or when they arrive at your home. As such, it's important to have your car looking as immaculate as possible. Many people are willing to spend thousands of dollars on top of the car's price on extras and sport packages, but are not willing to take the time and effort to keep up the appearance of their car.

A thorough rinse is the first step in cleaning your car. Always clean the wheels and the tires before you clean the rest of the car, and don't use the same sponge or mitt on the exterior as you do for the tires. The tires are often the dirtiest parts and pick up all the road grime. You should always use cleaning products that are manufactured specifically for cars. Use a stiff brush to improve the tire's appearance, even if you don't have white walls or decorative tires. The wheels need a separate wheel cleaner that removes the brake dust, which often collects on the front of the wheels and can blacken them. The directions on each of these products will vary depending on the chemicals involved, so be sure to read them. If you can find a reliable product that you like, stick with it. Household cleaners can strip the wax from the paint and damage the finish on your car, so it is best to use products designed for cars. Wash one section at a time, clearing away all of the soap. Soap can build up and leave spots or settle into cracks and become hard to get out, damaging the overall finish. Work from the top of the car to the front, then come around and clean the rear of the car. The backside usually has

the most dust and grime, and you don't want to spread that around to the rest of your car. Use cascading water, not a high pressure to remove all of the final vestiges of soap and apply a final rinse.

Waxing is the next step, and it is one that too many people skip. Waxing is an excellent way to protect the finish and make subsequent washing easier. Look for foreign particles on or in the paint. More specialty products are manufactured to remove contaminants that might be embedded in the paint. It is often recommended that waxes not be applied in direct sunlight.

Keeping your car clean and waxed can make it more pleasurable to drive around town. It will also make a good impression on your friends and employer.

More horsepower for less than \$100

ant more horsepower without paying much to get it? Here are three ways today's top engine builders get more power from their racing engines and their personal cars, without spending a lot of moneyto do it.

Upgrade your lubricants -Friction and heat from engine components and the drive train rob horsepower and performance. Minimizing this power loss can be as easy as upgrading to one of the newer high performance lubricants that are available. For instance, in a recent test by Horsepower TV, upgrading to high performance motor oil freed up 8 horsepower in a V8 engine. Replace and/or upgrade your air filter - During the life of your engine, thousands of cubic feet of air will pass through the engine cylinders. Dust and other

material in the engine can cause excessive wear and operating problems. It's imperative that you keep air filters clean by regularly replacing them.

To further enhance performance, upgrade to a performance air filter, which can free up an additional 2 to 3 horsepower. While not a tremendous power gain, the relatively low cost of a filter and ease of installation (about 5 minutes) more than make up for it.

Use higher octane gas or an octane booster - Go for the good stuff the next time you're at the pump. Depending on your vehicle, high octane gasoline can provide an increase in horsepower. Even a marginal gain in switching from the lowest octane gasoline to the highest octane may be worth a few extra pennies at the pump to you.

For those who want to see a more measurable increase in power, a racing blend of gasoline will work well or one of the numerous brands of octane booster commonly available at auto parts stores.

Upgrading your gas, lubricants and air filter are a cheap and easy way to increase horsepower. These simple steps will also extend the life of your engine and help prevent expensive repairs.





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AAA: A history of service

Imost immediately after the first horseless carriages appeared on America's roads, motorists began organizing automobile clubs. In 1902, only 23,000 cars were in operation in this country compared with 17 million horses. Yet, motoring enthusiasts had formed approximately 50 small auto clubs across the country.

Nine of those clubs met in Chicago on March 4, 1902, to create a national motoring organization,

and the American Automobile Association was formed with 1,500 members. The first headquarters office was one shared with the Automobile Club of America, on

Fifth Avenue in New York City.

Over 100 years and 51 million members later, AAA's most basic premise remains the same: safe, efficient transportation is a fundamental underpinning of our society.

The Fight for Better Roads

At the turn of the century, existing roads had been designed for the horse and buggy – not the auto. Traveling on those dirt paths was often risky, and AAA's earliest goal was to lead a fight for improvements in the nation's roads to more safely accommodate automobile traffic.

Although there have been many roadblocks, AAA's successes have helped to make road travel easier and safer for all Americans. In 1902, AAA began its long journey as a legislative advocate with bills which called for the appropriation of federal funds for the improvement of national highways and establishing the U.S. Bureau of Public Roads (now the Department of Transportation). Through the years, AAA and its affiliated clubs have worked with government at all levels to ensure the public's interests would be represented.

Traffic Safety Endeavors


The rapidly increasing number of cars on the road in the early 1900s brought about a similar increase in motor vehicle crashes, and prevention of traffic mishaps became an early concern of AAA clubs. Pedestrian safety was also a primary concern. In 1917, AAA issued a resolution advocating

that pedestrians abide by signals of traffic officers and cross streets only in designated places. Since that time, AAA has been a staunch advocate for motorist and

pedestrian safety, with school safety patrol programs, publishing textbooks and instructional manuals, creating and hosting driver improvement programs, and leading a nationwide effort to pass graduated driver licensing (GDL) laws to ensure teens get the practice and guidance they need to become safe drivers. Data show these laws help reduce the number of teen driver crashes and save lives. AAA also has been actively involved for more than 40 years in combating impaired driving. Special AAA educational programs have been used by thousands of communities and schools to educate students and the public on the seriousness of drinking and driving. In 1985, AAA launched a campaign to promote seat belt and child restraint use, and in 2001 supported legislation or regulations that would mandate the use of safety belts and approved child restraint systems by all occupants of passenger vehicles.

Automotive Issues and Assistance

Auto breakdowns have always

been a source of frustration to car owners. In 1915, the Automobile Club of St. Louis was the first to introduce an emergency service for motorists. Their First Aid Corp – a group of five motorcyclists – would drive the streets of St. Louis on Sundays looking for stranded motorists and making minor engine and tire repairs.

This service was so successful that it became a nationwide program called Emergency Road Service (ERS) and has now become one of the most valued features of AAA membership. AAA ERS – which responded to nearly 26 million calls in 2007 – is coordinated through a network of more than 116 AAA call centers and 9,340 independently-owned towing services, as well as clubowned towing operations.

In 1982, AAA established a toll-free ERS number, 1-800-AAA-HELP for traveling U.S. and Canadian members. AAA counselors

handle ERS calls and respond to inquiries about travel-related subjects and approved auto repair facilities. Hearing impaired members use the 1-800-955-4833 TDD number toll free.

To ensure members receive reliable and quality workmanship in auto repairs, AAA developed its Approved Auto Repair program in 1975, which identifies automotive repair facilities that have met AAA's stringent criteria in customer satisfaction, equipment requirements and trained technicians.

The AAA Approved Auto Repair program is now the largest independently inspected and approved network of repair facilities in North America with more than 7,000 participating service facilities. These facilities provide special benefits to AAA members including a courtesy safety inspection if the owner arranges to have maintenance or repairs performed on the vehicle and media-

tion by AAA if needed.

Geographic Information Systems

AAA issued its first map in 1905, a street map of Staten Island. In 1911, AAA produced its first state map, a map of New York, and its first booklet of strip maps detailing a pathfinder's route from New York to Jacksonville. Pathfinders were early road reporters who even today keep AAA's map details up-to-date.

Those strip maps were the forerunners of AAA's famous TripTik® routings, which were trademarked in 1932. TripTik® routings – now available on the Internet at AAA.com – include driving times, mileage, points of interest, current highway conditions, construction and detours, and are individually tailored for each trip. Since the early 1900s, AAA has been a leader in the development of maps and atlases of North America, Europe and many other areas of the world.


This position of leadership perhaps resulted in AAA's greatest cartographic contribution to the United States when, in 1942, AAA placed its mapping facilities at the disposal of the Department of the Army in support of the nation's war effort. This generous offer was made again in 1951 to the National Defense Department during the Korean War.

But times of war are not the only times that AAA has aided the government through its mapping resources. AAA frequently provides maps to support emergency service providers in times of natural disasters such as wildfires or hurricanes.

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How to pay less at the pump

Ith gasoline prices still hovering near \$3 per gallon in many areas of the country, you may be wishing you could afford a hybrid. The good news is, you can probably increase your fuel efficiency and reduce fuel costs right now - without shelling out thousands more for a hybrid car or waiting a few more years until automakers produce cheaper, more plentiful hybrids.

"Many Americans are already driving vehicles that can run on an alternative fuel, but they may not be aware of that fact," says Ed Lonergan, president of EMTA Holdings Inc., a company involved in developing alternative fuels. "Fuel treatments currently on the market can also help improve fuel efficiency."

So what are alternative fuels and why should consumers care about them?

Simply stated, an alternative fuel is one that is not entirely derived from petroleum," says Lonergan. "That means the product. distribution and, ultimately, the cost that is passed on to the consumers is not controlled by foreign oil producers or domestic oil companies. Alternative fuels generally cost less than regular

gasoline and are better for the environment."

Biodiesel and ethanol may be two alternative fuels you've already heard about. Biodiesel is largely used in commercial applications, while ethanol is most often used in passenger vehicles. Both fuels can only be used in vehicles with engines specifically



designed to run on them. Ethanol-gasoline blends, however, are more versatile. More gas stations across the country are beginning to offer ethanol blends, like E85 and E10.


According to the Environmental Protection Agency, E85 is a blend of 15 percent gasoline and 85 percent ethanol. While E85 can't be used in conventional gasonly engines, Flex Fuel Vehicles (FFVs) can run on ethanol, gaso-

line or any blend of the two. There are more than 6 million FFVs already on the road, and many automakers have announced plans to increase production and the variety of FFVs, according to the EPA. If you're unsure whether you're driving an FFV, look inside your gas tank door for an identification sticker.

E10 is a blend of 90 percent gasoline and 10 percent ethanol and virtually every car built after 1980 can run on it. If you haven't already seen it offered at gas stations in your area, chances are you'll be seeing it soon.

Using alternative fuels not only makes sense for your wallet, it can help the economy as well, Lonergan says. "Alternative fuels are made from renewable resources grown on farms, so farmers have an immediate benefit. The second major economic benefit is reduced dependency on foreign oil."

Regardless of gas prices, alternative fuels - and the vehicles that can run on them – are here to stay, experts agree. "New developments are taking place on a continual basis," Lonergan says. "New alternative fuel plants are being constructed across the nation, and new additives that improve performance of alternatives -



are just now being introduced."

EMTA markets the XenTx line of fuel treatments, largely used in commercial applications that reduce fuel consumption by increasing fuel economy. "It adds up to cleaner air because when you increase fuel economy, you also reduce harmful exhaust emissions," Lonergan says.

The hottest trend in alternative fuels is the conversion of different crops into fuels, he adds, with new additive technology a close second. Domestically, grown crops like soy, corn, palm and sugar cane are now being converted into fuel that may soon be sold at a fueling station near you.

Mineral-based (conventional) motor oils. These are

They are typically only available through auto parts stores and select oil change centers. These oils primarily differ in their use of more advanced, proprietary additive technologies.

Still confused? For a used car with little life left in it, stick with the cheap mineral-based motor oil. For a car you plan to keep for a few years and want to get a little better performance from, you should at least upgrade to synthetic motor oil. To get the most performance out of your car, truck or KV, or to protect a vehicle you really care about and want to last, upgrade to a high performance motor oil.



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the cheapest and most widely available oils. They typically use standard additive packages that provide minimum levels of performance and protection.

Synthetic motor oils. These man-made oils are more expensive that mineral-based oils but are still widely available. Their performance advantages come predominantly from the synthetic base oil used. They have a longer service life and offer some improvements in protection. They typically use the same additive packages found in mineral-based oils.

High-performance 'specialty' synthetic motor oils. These motor oils are the most technologically advanced oils. Although they significantly outperform mineral based or synthetic motor. oils, they are about the same price as standard synthetic motor oil.

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
