

School to sport new varsity guidelines

Board of Ed hears recommendations on athletic protocol

The Bethlehem Board of Education has addressed the dis-

tricts' guidelines pertaining to its athletics program following a controversy involving student athletes being cut from teams for missing practices.

Although a resolution outlining absences from the athletic program hasn't been officially adopted, a framework resolution was accepted by the school board during its Wednesday, May 7,

meeting. School officials and athletic directors are currently working on the exact language to be adopted by the district's new rules.

The situation came to light after students were forced to choose between softball practices and a missionary trip to help Hurricane Katrina victims dur-

School, library votes near

May 20 polling place moves to high school

Local residents over the age of 18 will be weighing in on the school district's and library's new budgets and board members at a Tuesday, May 20, vote.

Voters will cast their ballots at Bethlehem Central High School at 400 Delaware Ave. this year.

The school district is proposing an \$84.77 million budget, which will result in a 3.79 percent tax levy increase for Bethlehem residents and a 4.9 percent increase for New Scotland residents.

Since the district adopted its budget in March, well before the April 1 deadline for the state budget, Assemblyman Tim Gordon, I-Bethlehem, was able to secure an additional \$500,000 for the school with the support of state Sen. Neil Breslin, D-Delmar. The money was used to offset costs for the new Eagle Elementary School and lower the tax rate increase for residents by about a third of a percent for the year.

Residents will also be voting on a bus proposition not to exceed \$1.36 million in order to purchase 18 new buses. The state will reimburse the district 64 percent of the total cost if the bus proposition is passed and there would be no tax impact on residents until next year.

The total budget adopted by the school represents a roughly 7.5 million increase over last year's \$77.2 million finalized budget.

School officials praised this year's budget as being conservative and fiscally responsible in the face a tough economic climate and substantial capital projects like school renovations and the first new school built in the

Supercuts burglary suspects still at large

A burglary at the Supercuts salon in Glenmont is being investigated by the Bethlehem Police Department as investigators are looking to charge the individuals involved with felony third-degree burglary and two misdemeanor charges of fourthdegree criminal mischief and petty larceny.

The store is located in the newly constructed strip mall inside of Towne Center Plaza off of Route

Police say they received a telephone call from a salon employee reporting that a burglary had occurred.

"She noticed the coins were missing from the cash register," stated the police report. "Then [the

According to police, the store had reported the crime at about 10 a.m. on Sunday, May 4, and said that, at least \$200 was missing from the safe and that the rear entrance to the building was damaged.

Stanley "was not able to state where he had stopped," according to the arrest report, and he admitted to having a glass of wine prior to being pulled over by police.

After failing a field-sobriety test and testing positive for alcohol on a prescreening device, Bethlehem police say Stanley was taken to the station to be processed on DWIrelated charges.

He voluntarily consented to a chemical test and was arraigned before Bethlehem Town Justice Paul Dwyer with his lawyer present, according to police. He is scheduled to return to Town Court on Tuesday,

The report states his vehicle was towed after he was arrested.

• Greg L. Smith, 23, of Albany, was arrested by police on an active bench warrant out of the Albany Police Department.







Scotland passes building moratorium

Construction halt will give. town time to reassess development strategy

The New Scotland Town Board passed a six-month moratorium after listening to residents' concerns at the Wednesday, May 7, public hearing in the Voorheesville High School.

More than 750 residents from New Scotland, New Salem and Voorheesville filled the auditorium, and for more than three hours, the residents staked their claim against the Syracusebased Sphere Development Group's plan to construct a 750,000-square-foot retail development off of routes 85 and

85A, on the land that was once - breather - think outside the box, the Bender melon farm.

The company has not yet closed on the property.

Bob Prentiss, a Voorheesville resident and former state Assemblyman, spoke in opposition of Sphere's plan.

Prentiss, a member of the group New Scotlanders 4 Sound Economic Development. or NS4SED, warned the New Scotland Town Board of the problems that might arrive with shopping center.

"Traffic congestion, road maintenance, police protection, fire protection, ambulance protection. other infrastructure costs - these all add up when you get the bigbox regional power centers in your backyard," he said. "That's one of the big reasons we need a moratorium - so we can take a

so to speak - and put some sanity. into our planning process.

NS4SED unfurled a banner at the meeting with petitions taped all over it. The petitions handed in to the Town Board had a total of 2,245 signatures.

The town board unanimously voted to enact a building moratorium for projects larger than 30,000 square feet.

As cheers roared through the crowd following the vote, some complained six months would not be long enough. "I don't think it's worth jeopardizing the town's legal 1 potential legal fees," said town Supervisor Tom Dolin, in defense of the six-month time frame. .

"The town can renew the" moratorium after the six-month

period is over," he added.

A joint statement was issued on behalf of board members Rich Reilly, Debbie Baron and Peg Neri.

"If we were to announce our position prior to the public hearing as some of our colleagues have done, we believe that it would create a basis for a legal challenge by whichever side is not pleased with the outcome on the grounds that the board had acted arbitrarily and capriciously by predetermining its decision without having established a record," Neri said.

New Scotland resident and standing by subjecting it to . member of NS4SED Christine Galvin said she is more than pleased that the board passed the moratorium. "I am thrilled that the Town Board finally heard our residents' message that regional,

big-box malls have no place in our town," she said.

Galvin said NS4SED's work is not over, though. "Our future work will now be concentrated on making sure our zoning regulations enforce that community vision."

Representatives from Sphere were also at the hearing.

"A moratorium is not necessary," said Kurt Wendler of Sphere. "We have an excellent team put together with a lot of experience." experience."

After the moratorium . passed, John D'Alessandro, also from Sphere, said that? the company is going to have to reassess its strategy. We're going to take some time to regroup and figure out if we want to wait out the six months or not," he said.

Project Adventure swings through town

Students participate in team-building and fitness '... program

Teamwork and trust must be taught; they are not innate skills : in the woods behind the high or simply acquired. However, sophomores at Bethlehem Central-High School are getting a jump on these life lessons and climbing to the top of the class with a newfound sense of accomplishment and camaraderie in their Adventure Education.

The 20-week course, given to all sophomores in the district, teaches goal-setting, problemsolving, team-building and communication in a setting that fosters personal challenge and group interaction.

A less intensive program is offered at the sixth-grade level as well, but in high school, students are required to keep a journal, set goals, participate in discussions and write a three-to-five-page essay about the experience.

The students start off interacting with each other like they would in an ordinary physical education class, according to Fred Powers, director of athletics. But by the end of the course, students form a tight-knit group of friends, and most importantly — a team.

"As you start this, there are set stages that students will go through. ... It gets prettyheated as they start the problem solving," Powers said. "We want them to push out of their comfort zone.... This really is a laboratory to real-life experience.'

The students' Adventure Education starts inside for the carrolli@spotlightnews.com, to first 10 weeks of the semester. before they move outside to a type of obstacle course set up

> -The actual curriculum consists of goal-setting, cognitive problemsolving, low-activity problems, competitive and noncompetitive activities, as well as personal challenges that allow the students to push themselves in perceived risk environments such as rock wall climbing, falls and swinging through the air on ropes.

> "Inside, they're working on team building and trust building," Powers said. "And then making that connection to the real world.

> Thanks to a donation from the Bethlehem Class of 1965, students are getting a head start on the outdoor segment of the program. The Class of '65 donated a rock-climbing wall to the district, and it has been integrated into the Adventure Education curriculum.

> According to Powers, the donation has been indispensable for his students.

problem-solving activities of a more physical nature, such as. walking on a low cable, swinging on a rope swing, and climbing

lower physical problem-solving challenges such as whale watch — a group balancing platform and the shuffle — walking along a log while passing partners go in the opposite direction.

They learn how to deal with. real-life situations and how to work together as a team," Powers

Much of the ropes course looks like an obstacle course you'd expect to see involved in That's a big piece, 390 kids military or paramilitary training, Powers said the Police Academy and local police departments have often used the coarse for training their recruits.

During the height segment of the course, the students are taught how to tie their own harnesses, according to Powers, and are asked to push out of their comfort zone and attempt a number of climbs.

Students will also "belay" each other with the use of an Australian belay, act as back-up · belayers for the instructor and support one another in their climbing attempts.

"They really get to see each other in another light," Powers said. "They struggle together, and it's a hands-on thing. ... There's this mentality of 'I have to support you, man.'

All sophomores at Bethlehem Central High School are taking a 20-week course called Adventure Education.

With some of the exercises, students literally have to support one another, whether it's holding supportropes or a ladder, or climbing together up a set of ropes.

The types of exercises vary.

Some are vertical climbs with or without a partner, some require students to climb along staples up a tree and then complete a horizontal challenge such as walking across a foot cable or log. The high elements have varying degrees of challenges from a low difficulty to very difficult.

· Accommodations are made for students with physical limitations so they can participate with in their abilities and still be part of the class, Powers said.

On a sunny May morning, Spotlight Newspapers was invited to the Project Adventure Course to witness a group of students taking part in a challenge.

Students harnessed and pulled one another up into the air through a series of ropes before the harnessed student came swinging back down.

Clapping and encouraging one another, students would yell, 'Come on, higher, higher," as a student would push as far as he or she could.

Then, with the support of the whole class and the short tug of a rope, they would come swooping down past their classmates with their arms swinging like trapeze artist performing for the crowd.

"It was extraordinary," said Brendan McCann as he unhooked his harness, "It's not that bad when you're looking at it from the ground, but it's different when you're up there."

McCann said he has made a lot of close friends in the class, more so than "a regular PE class."

His advice for the freshmen who will be in next year's class: "Learn how to tie your harness correctly and wear sneakers."


Powers said there is no danger in providing the program, and that since it has been offered at the school starting in the mid 1990s, nothing has occurred more serious than a couple of twisted ankles.



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School's Out Inc. celebrates 25 years in community

Company provides the keys to avoiding a latchkey kid

When school's out, School's Out Inc. is in.

The company that has been preventing latchkey kids in Bethlehem from coming home to an empty home since 1982 is celebrating 25 years in the community. On Friday, May 23, School's Out, Inc. will be holding morning and afternoon events at all of its locations in honor of the celebration.

Food, carnival games, and prize drawings will help commemorate the date.

Executive Director Jayne Maloney said the company provides a much needed service to busy Bethlehem parents where typically both mom and dad work and cannot always be there exactly when the school bell rings. Working with the Bethlehem School District allows the elementary aged students to engage in safe and healthy activities until mom or date arrives.

"We serve about 500 kids a day. ... We're a much needed service in Bethlehem," said Maloney. "Not too many people have jobs from 9 till 3, so we help out until their done."

With about 60 staff members on hand, School's Out Inc. is open for parents at 7:30 a.m. and will stay with children until 6 at night. Two fulltime program directors help create and improve on activities

Heather McDonough and Mandy Kirk, the program directors, have been with the company for more than six years each and both say they love what they do and they love finding new things for the kids to do.

for the children.

"I love working here," Kirk said. "That's why. I'm still here."

Many of the staff members are college students working on becoming teachers, said Maloney, and all of the site managers and directors have college degrees.

"We have a high-quality staff here," she said. "I think we have a lot to offer. Parents have a piece of mind knowing that their children are safe and being well taken care of when they are away at work."

The company is a private not-for-profit organization that started in a church with a couple of working parents, including Bethlehem Chamber of Commerce President Marty DeLaney.

"Early in 1982, after being a stay-at-home mom for five years, I went back to work part time and found myself talking to parents at the Hamagrael Elementary School about the difficult balancing act of after school care," DeLaney said. "The names that come to mind right now, Nancy Ray, Bonnie Cohen, Christopher Smith and Pam Siegal, among others, helped me formulate an idea to bring to [Bethlehem] Principal Joe Schaefer."

DeLaney said the program was meant as after school care for enrichment, outdoor play and healthy snacks, not daycare.

And today, 25 years later, DeLaney said she couldn't believe how much it's grown, and commended the job Maloney and the rest of the staff are doing.

In 1987, DeLaney was invited to speak as part of a panel on "The Phil Donahue Show" to discuss alternatives to "latchkey care." She said the term "latchkey" carries a negative connotation and that School's Out Inc. was one of the few solutions to the problem at the time.

DeLaney and Maloney were both quick to point out that Superintendent Les Loomis of Bethlehem Central has been very supportive of the program throughout his 21-year tenure in the district.

Party celebrations will be at all sites on Friday, May 23, from 8:30 to 9 for the morning program and 4:30 to 5:15 for the afternoon program.



in any other election process in the United Sates.

In national races — and even local ones — we are given the authority to vote for the people who may influence fiscal responsibility. But only at the school district level are we afforded the ability to whole-handedly reject or wholeheartedly accept the way a governing body spends its money.

Outside of the family unit, no other organization has the immediate influence on our children than our school systems. It is only fitting, that we, in turn, have that same unequaled influence on the way they do business.

But our influence doesn't end with the vote. Participation on school boards and citizen advisory groups are instrumental in fashioning the environment you want for your children.

Many of the communities our readers live in have uncontested, or little-contested, races for school board seats. One would like to think it is because our residents feel these school boards are doing such wonderful jobs that they need no new blood.

That may be true. The school board in your community may be exemplary. But the *Spotlight* challenges you to think that as good as it may be, it could always improve, and to find the candidates – possibly yourselves— that would make it better.

The alternative is an apathy-in-waiting, disguised as contentment.

We at the *Spotlight* understand the demands and rigors of working parenthood — believe it or not, many of us have families of our own — but we also understand that public involvement is the cornerstone of a sound community.

On Tuesday, May 20, get out and vote. Beyond that, think of other ways you can influence the people that are influencing your young ones. Maybe it's running for a school board seat or maybe it's going to your first board of education meeting.

In any case, get out and do it. You can't assume that someone else is going to show up and do the right thing for you.

Teach kids money isn't free

Kids are surprisingly aware of what's going on in the world. And if they don't know that times are a little bit tough and mom and dad have to watch their spending, it's time to tell them. Sheltering kids from financial realities does them no favors.

Indeed, the opposite is true. A good grasp of personal finance is one of the most valuable life skills a person can have. And while previous generations may have been raised with the constant admonishment that "money doesn't grow on trees," too many of today's parents neglect that lesson. It's time to change that—and the economic slowdown we're in now provides a great incentive for doing so.

In many ways, a slower economy can be a blessing in disguise. It leads families to make a budget and stick to it. It forces them to be conscious about how they handle money. That's good for kids. It shows them how the world is supposed to work.

Ready to get started?

- Realize that kids learn what they live. It may sound like common sense, but you—mom and dad—are your kids' most influential teachers. When you ring up a barge-load of credit card debt, take out exorbitant mortgages or car loans, and fail to save anything, that's what your kids come to see as normal. If you are modeling unhealthy financial habits, you can't realistically expect your kids to "do as I say, not as I do."
- De-program them. Kids are constantly bombarded with information about what things cost, whether it's the fancy sports car they like or the wardrobe of their favorite athlete or actor, not to mention the 40,000 commercials that the American Academy of Pediatrics estimates the average American child sees each year.

What they aren't bombarded with is knowledge on how to manage money effectively. And while schools are increasingly incorporating money issues into the existing curriculum, the broader concepts of personal financial management still aren't taught. Frightening though it may be, some schools rely on free "educational" materials from the likes of VISA and MasterCard.

These credit card titans provide materials that implicitly and explicitly support carrying consumer debt as a sound way to finance significant purchases and living expenses. In fact, credit company-sponsored schoolsupplied resources endorse spending upward of 15 to 20 percent of one's monthly takehome incomé to pay credit card and other consumer debts. Explain to your kids that such spending puts a lot of money directly into the credit card companies' pockets, so of course they're going to offer that advice...but that smart people don't listen to it.

• An allowance is a great teaching tool. A well-implemented allowance program can mimic many money matters that adults face every day throughout their lives: From recognizing the need to earn the green stuff to learning how to responsibly and intelligently spend, save and invest their allowance, children can gain a solid financial footing from a young age.

A great time to start is when your kids reach the 5 to 7 age range. Start them on some household chores and explain to them that they will be paid for their work. Of course, the size of the allowance should depend, in part, on what sorts of expenditures and savings you expect your child to engage in and, perhaps, the amount of 'work' you expect your child to perform around the house. I recommend paying 50 cents to \$1 per year of age. So, for example, a 6-year-old child would earn between \$3 and \$6 per week.

- Start them saving and investing early. After they start earning an allowance, have your kids save a significant portion (up to half) of their allowance money toward longer-term goals, such as college (just be careful about putting money in children's names as doing so can harm college financial aid awards). As they accumulate more significant savings over time, you can introduce the concept of investing.
- Reduce their exposure to ads. The primary path to reduced exposure to ads is to cut down on TV time. When kids are in front of the tube, have them watch prerecorded material. You can direct the television viewing of younger children, in particular, toward videos and DVDs. And for older kids, if you use digital video recorders (DVRs), such as TiVo, you can easily zap ads. But when an ad does sneak under the radar

and set the kids to begging, address it. Explain to your kids that there's never a good time for frivolous impulse spending—but it's especially harmful when money is tight.

- Find entertaining ways to teach good money habits. You'll probably be facing an uphill battle when trying to get your kids to sit down and learn about personal finance. That's why it's so important to find entertaining ways to instill good financial habits in them. I recommend age-appropriate books like "The Berenstain Bears Get the Gimmies." For late-elementaryschool-aged kids, "Quest for the Pillars of Wealth" by J.J. Pritchard is a chapter book that teaches the major personal finance concepts through an engaging adventure story. You could also get them a subscription to Zillions, a kids magazine from the publishers of Consumer Reports, which covers money and buying topics.
- Teach them how to shop wisely. Family shopping trips, whether for groceries or something else, are likely to be your kids' first encounter with spending. They'll see you make decisions based on what the family needs, maybe see the occasional coupon used, and will observe how you pay. These trips are a great time to teach them lessons about money.
- Introduce the right and wrong ways to use credit and debit cards. Those plastic cards in your wallet offer a convenient way to conduct purchases in stores, by phone and over the Internet. Unfortunately, credit cards offer temptation for overspending and carrying debt from month to month. Teach your kids the difference between a credit and debit card, explaining that debit cards are connected to your checking account and thus prevent you from overspending as you can on a credit card. Explain to them that credit cards should be used sparingly and then practice what you preach.
- Encourage older kids to get a job. An allowance doesn't have to be the only way for your kids to earn money. Your child's initial exposure to the work-for-pay world can start with something as simple as a lemonade stand. Depending on age, he or she might do work for neighbors or offer babysitting services. And the fact that we're in a recession makes it all the more appropriate for older kids to "help out" by getting a part-time job-especially to fund unnecessary purchases like DVDs or cool clothing.

Besides the learning opportunities it presents, there's another positive to the economic downturn. It forces families to be more thoughtful about how they spend their time—and this often leads to the stunning realization that money really doesn't buy happiness.

The best things in life—friends, family, quiet evenings at home just being together—really are free. Sometimes it's good to be reminded of that.



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Development plans move ahead in Bethlehem

Updates on Dowerskill Village, Mystic Woods, **Cottonwood Estates** proposals heard

It takes a village to make a village in the town of Bethlehem.

At the planning board's Tuesday, May 6, meeting, members listened to plans for three developments in townknown as Dowerskill Village in Glenmont, Mystic Woods in Delmar, and Cottonwood Estates in Delmar. All of the developments have been before the board previously and were submitting updated plans.

Kent Jankins, the property owner and developer of Dowerskill Village, updated the board with his plans saying that 6 acres of green space would be deeded as open space and not be developed. The neighborhood association will oversee the property, he said.

Jankins said street tree plantings would occur along Rotterdam Drive and that other shrubs and landscaping plans would also be included in the development.

At least one resident complained to the board that some of the existing trees along, the street were to be removed during construction.

A woman who lives across the street from the development told the board that Jankins told her trees would remain across the street from her. Jankins denied stating that all the trees would remain.

Planning Board Chairman Parker Mathusa said the planning board would continue working with Jankins on his plans as the development moved forward.

The Mystic Woods plans were heard next.

The project is proposed for 25-acre parcel on Orchard Street in Delmar, which had an original zoning designation that could have allowed about 38 to 40 lots on the property. The current application proposes nine lots with part of the property bordering on the Five Rivers State Conservation land.

The property was rezoned while the project was still in the planning phases to residential large lot and the current application is consistent with its zoning, according to the

planning board.

Each lot size ranges from a little over 2 acres to more than 3 acres, according to the plans, and the lots will front on a new town road and cul-de-sac.

John Schafer, an engineer for the project, said the traffic coming out of a nine-lot subdivision would not be heavy over the course of a day, and that all of the utilities will be underground.

Schafer told the board that the project has accommodated "probably 75 percent of the [town] engineer's suggestions."

"If we could get water to run uphill, we could've solved this a long time ago," he told the board.

The water, he said, will be attached to an existing line along Orchard Street and the sewer system will be pressurized with a grinder pump at each house. There will also be two retention ponds to handle the quantity and quality of the stormwater runoff.

The ponds and the road will

be deeded to the town, according to Schafer.

The board asked for a 10-foot easement for a right-of-way along the project for a future pathway or possible bike path and/or sidewalk, which Schafer said could be included.

The Cottonwood Estates plans were heard last.

The proposed seven-lot subdivision is located at the end of Cottonwood Lane in Delmar, and David Ingalls from Ingalls Associates, presented for the applicant.

"We're quite far along with the technical detail of our plan," Ingalls told the board.

He acknowledged that there were drainage issues that they were working on with the Engineering Division.

Because of the wetlands involved with the project, Mathusa called the development "a sensitive project" and asked to table the project until board members were able to look over all of the information involved. included a detailed wetland impact plan.

Ingalls said he understood, but added that a drainage analysis was done on the property and that there were no increased offsite drainage issues. He said he was working with the Army Corp. of Engineers on the project and that deed restrictions would be put on any remaining undisturbed wetlands on the property.

The board voted to table a decision on the project with a vote expected at its next meeting Tuesday, May 20.

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

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

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

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Ravena loses a mentor

Marion Fross was a STARS mentor and role model

Marion Fross, 88, a longtime volunteer who dedicated her life to serving children, her church and others in need, died Saturday, May 3.

Growing up in Yonkers, where her parents provided the piano lessons that instilled in her a lifetime love of music, she earned her undergraduate degree in history and Latin at Mount Holyoke College. She received her graduate degree in history and American Literature from Cornell University.

She and her husband, Arthur Fross, raised six children, and, once the last of the children was enrolled in elementary school, Mrs. Fross began working as a substitute teacher for the Bethlehem and Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk school districts until she retired at the age of 80.

Mrs. Fross received a Volunteer Award from Albany County Executive Michael Breslin in 2006 as well as a Senior Lifetime Achievement Award from the Capital District Senior Issues Forum, which recognized her many years of service to the community,

Involved in many different organizations throughout a 40year period, she considered her children "her first love."

For the past eight years, Mrs. Fross was a volunteer for the Seniors Teaching and Reaching. Out to Students (STARS) Program, which is an integrated program that allowed her to

continue working with preschool students in her daughter's classroom at the A.W. Becker Elementary School in Selkirk. She volunteers more than 350 hours of service to the STARS Program during the 2004-05 school year.

"[She] was one of our longestserving volunteers who helped make the STARS Program the success it is today," said program director Karen Harmon. "She was one of the most selfless persons I have ever met. We all should aspire to give back to the community the way she did."

Mrs. Fross was active in the South Bethlehem United Methodist Church as well, where she was a Sunday school piano player for more than 40 years. She was also a church organist and held numerous administrative posts at the church and traveled to Puerto Rico twice with the congregation to help build a church and then later decorate it.

For 21 years she was a 4-H leader, teaching students to make items for nursing home residents and taking them to visit a local nursing home where she would bring a portable organ to play while the students performed sing-a-longs.

"I love being able to help others," she was quoted as explaining her volunteerism. "It gives me a sense of purpose."

Mrs. Fross was the widow of Arthur Fross.

Survivors include six daughters, Barbara (John) Mazzone, Joan (Paul) Carpenter. Peggy (Dennis) Fross, Susie (Bruce) Parker, Patti (Lou) LeFevre and Jean Fross Myers; 15 grandchildren; and 18 greatgrandchildren.

Services were from the South Bethlehem United Methodist Church with burial on Wednesday, May 7, at Mt. Pleasant Cemetery in South Bethlehem.

district in more than 50 years.

"We think people should invest ... in an excellent school system," Board of Education President James Lytle, encouraging people to participate in a May 20 vote. "We believe it will be supported by a community very proud of its schools."

Lytle also pointed out that it was the second year in a row that a citizen budget group has helped worked on the school budget as an indication of the community's involvement and investment into the district.

Superintendent Les Loomis, who is retiring at the end of the school year, noted that this is the third year in a row that the district has kept the tax levy increase under 4 percent despite

all of the economic hurdles in place.

In Bethlehem, the estimated school increase translates into \$18.09 per \$1,000 of assessed valued (a 69-cent increase), or \$138 increase for a \$200,000 home. In New Scotland, the estimated increase is \$17.43 per \$1,000 dollars of assessed value (a 3-cent increase), or a \$6 increase for a \$200,000 home.

An owner of a \$400,000 home in Bethlehem will see a \$276 tax increase and \$12 in New Scotland if voters pass the budget.

If the budget is voted down, the state allows districts to make some cuts and re-propose a new budget to voters. If that vote fails, a bare-bones contin-. gency budget will have to be in place and board members would have to make more cuts in order to keep the district operational costs in place.

"That would be damaging to the quality of our programs,' Loomis said at the meeting when asked what would happen if the budget was voted down.

In addition to voting on the budget and bus proposition,

residents will be voting on three Board of Education members running for three open seats. The candidates include one incumbent, current board vice president, James Dering, and two newcomers: Laura Ladd Bierman, who ran unsuccessfully last year, and Matt Downey.

Library vote

Although the school district and the Bethlehem Library are their own entities with their own boards and budgets, both will be on the ballot at the high school.

The Bethlehem Public Library is proposing a \$3.47 million budget for the 2008-09 season and has two people running for two seats on its board.

The budget represents a 2.26 percent tax levy increase over last year's, with a majority of the proposed budget — \$2.07 million — for salaries.

Overall, the proposed budget has increased 2.1 percent over the current budget.

The estimated tax levy increase from the proposed library budget is \$1.23 for Bethlehem residents and \$1.21 for New Scotland residents. All of the library's figures are based on \$1,000 per assessed home value.

There are two candidates running for the library's Board of Trustees.

John Sobiecki, who is currently on the board serving the unfinished term of a former member, and Nancy Smith will both be on the ballot on Tuesday, May 20.

Sobiecki is senior project director with Einhorn Yaffee Prescott Architecture and Engineering in Albany, and he was originally appointed to the board in 2006 to complete an unexpired term.

He is a member of the Historic Albany Foundation and the Eastern New York chapter of the American Institute of Architects. Sobiecki is actively involved in the community and has been a Bethlehem resident for 17 years.

Smith has been a school library media specialist in the Bethlehem Central School District since 1986. She has been an active member of the Elsmere parent-teacher association for 22 years and served on many district curriculum committees. She has been a strong advocate for the district's school libraries during that time.

In 2006, she served on the library's Plan of Service committee and is a 20-year resident of the town.

Voting on this year's budgets will be held at Bethlehem Central High School - not Bethlehem Central Middle School as in recent years — in the school's upper gym through the main entrance of the building.

The high school, located at 700 Delaware Ave., offers more parking and improved building access, according to Loomis. Voters will park in the Delaware Avenue parking lot and use the building's main entrance, which faces Delaware Avenue.

There will be several activities taking place throughout the day at the school and any resident aged 18 or older can vote, regardless of their voter registration status.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 9 p.m. on Tuesday, May 20.

ing spring break. The students who chose to go to New Orleans instead of practicing were cut from the team.

In response to criticism of the situation, school officials put together a committee of athletic directors, coaches, parents and students, to re-evaluate the school's athletic guidelines.

According the new guidelines, which pertain strictly to varsity-level athletes, students are expected to attend every practice and every competition. If extenuating circumstances are

known before the beginning of the season, students are to notify the school immediately and parents are being asked to schedule family obligations and events around the athletic calen-

"If student athletes are unable to fulfill their obligations to the team, they may choose not to participate for the season," the guidelines state. "Should extenuating circumstances be known prior to the season beginning, the student should communicate this information to the coach and Athletic Director before the first day of tryouts."

The guidelines also state that if a student misses a competi-

be prevented from participating on a team due to circumstances or opportunities that will take them out of town. I want to thank the parents and coaches whose participation in the process has led to this improvement."

Board members questioned the policy during the meeting asking whether it was a vacation policy or a standard athletics policy.

"We put a committee together and we met three times," In-

terim Athletic Director Ron Smith told the board. "This is a very difficult topic ... but I think we Charles Abba came up with a real good policy."

Smith said that the committee looked at the policies of other similar school districts and "spoke very candidly about this topic." The committee made it clear that the policy would only apply to "varsity level sports."

Superintendent Les Loomis said the spirit of the guidelines were clear enough for the board to accept the recommendations with a later vote on the formal wording of what will be included in next year's athletic handbook for students and parents.

Because of all the different sports teams, coaches and schedules, the board of education said it wanted to have a comprehensive and consistent policy that would apply to the entire athletics department.

According to Smith, absences in practices and competitions seem more prevalent in spring, but that the guidelines would also apply to the fall semester.

Board member Robin Storey said, "There needs to be some way to educate parents" about the new sports policy and that it should be included on the school's Web site and newslet-

The board agreed that full disclosure and notice would be given to the community concerning the district's updated athletic policy.

> tion, that student will have to sit out of an equal number of competitions.


> Officials did not come to an agreement pertaining to the repercussions of missing practices, with the guidelines stating, "The Director of Athletics and the High School Principal shall determine all matters of student athletic eligibility."

> The board and the committee did agree on several basic principals, including the need for conformity in dealing with such matters.

Board President James Lytle said it was clear that three basic principles were understood: student athletes have a responsibility to fulfill; there will be consequences for missing games for vacations and other activities but would not include ineligibility for the entire season; and there will be an appeals process for students whose absences are due to extenuating circumstances such as illness or a family death.

The board unanimously approved this framework for a policy to be included in the high school's athletic handbook.

"I believe this is the right approach," Principal Charles Abba said. "It calls for consistency across the Athletic Department and ensures that no student will



"For teens, you drink to get drunk," said Liz D'Agostino, a student panelist and senior at Saratoga Springs High School.

Devlin called substance abuse a "social lubricant," explaining drugs and alcohol are ways to fit in and make friends.

Several student panelists said it is very easy to acquire alcohol. They described ways in which teens in their communities obtained alcohol, including stealing from their parents, fake IDs and the "hey buddy" trick, in which a teenager sits in their car and looks for someone to buy them alcohol in a grocery store parking lot.

In several communities throughout the Capital District, parents can now pay the price if they allow underage drinking on their premises.

Under the "social host" law, which was adopted by the Niskayuna Town Board in July, parents who turn a blind eye or who allow drinking in their homes can be charged with a violation.

Mechanicville will vote on the "social host" legislation in

Other nearby communities considering the legislation include Greene County, Stillwater, Gloversville and John-

Devlin warned of sending a double message to teenagers. She said if parents allow their children to drink in their home with friends because they think it is a safer alternative, then they are essentially saying it is OK to drink outside the home with friends.

"Kids want their parents to be parents," Devlin said.

She said, in her experience, several students said they want their parents to tell them what they are doing is wrong instead of permitting it to happen.

"In the long run, they will realize what's good for them," said student panelist Jordan Stern to a mother who said her children feel like they are the only ones not allowed to attend parties.

Stern is a senior at Saratoga High School.

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

We've done everything from eating after the games and practices (complaints from everyone on that one), to eating cold sandwiches beforehand (ditto.)

It was with this desire to both feed my family well and to celebrate the fruits of the Hudson Valley, that I set off for the farmer's market this past weekend.

I was dreaming of tender baby greens and big red juicy tomatoes, and the sweet taste of tiny spring onions. There were big cheers from my kids when I announced where we were going. Paul even got into the spirit and put away his garden tools. Now it was an official family outing.

Truly inspired by my family going to the market together, I asked each of them to choose something fresh for our dinner table. They happily agreed.

 In the interest of full disclosure, I. should tell you that my children did not drop everything on a leisurely Saturday morning and skip to the car simply to help me choose fruits and vegetables. They have been on the farmer's market circuit long enough to know this: There are bakers there, offering up long tables filled with cinnamon, chocolate and blueberry goodies. So they knew a treat was in store.

Once we got the muffins and scones out of the way, we went for the good stuff: ' 2 pounds of Honeycrisp apples, sweet pea greens, mesclun mix, garlic, carrots and

sweet onions. And then there were the kid choices: Zoe waited patiently in line to buy a huge, deep red, juicy tomato, plus two more to ripen on our windowsill. That big tomato did not go into any recipe. It was sliced thick, sprinkled with salt, and then gobbled down. Lucy found a pint of small fingerling potatoes. Elliot stood, purplefaced from the sugar-topped blueberry muffin he ate, pointing to a bunch of bright green spinach. Who argues with a 3-yearold asking for spinach?

We walked to the car, arms heavy with our goods. I peeked into the bags, feeling so happy about the food we were going to eat that week. And then I felt a little panicky. I had gone overboard and bought four large bags of greens. The idea of wasting any of it made me feel terrible. I wondered if we could eat it all before it turned to mush.

We did end up eating every bit of those greens. I made salads for lunch, dinner and then lunch and dinner all over again. It felt good to eat that way.

And what of Elliot's spinach? I ended up making a chicken salad to go with it. The taste of spinach and lemon goes well together. So I marinated a few chicken breasts in lemon and herbs, put it together with the spinach. And the creamy mildness of goat cheese complements the lemon tang. This is a dish to be eaten when you don't have to run off to soccer practice. Something to be savored. My -kids ate the lemon chicken with Lucy's fingerling potatoes.

If your kids are anything like mine, they believe there is something magical about any food that is crispy - especially those foods containing cheese. So I boiled the potatoes in water loaded up with kosher salt. They were soft on the inside, with a salty potato skin. And then I sliced them in half, covered them in grated cheese and broiled until brown and, you got it very crispy. Elliot claimed this to be his "bestest dinner." He says that often, but each time it's the best compliment I've ever received.

And what to eat when you are going from piano to soccer to softball?

Lemon, Chicken and Spinach Salad 5 boneless chicken breasts

Marinade:

Zest from 1 lemon white wine

1/2 cup

1 fresh rosemary stalk

2 tablespoons olive oil 2 teaspoons kosher salt

3 tablespoons pine nuts, toasted

5 ounces fresh baby spinach, washed and placed on a serving platter

2 ounces crumbled goat cheese (I like Vermont Butter & Cheese Co., available at local supermarkets)

Dressing:

1/4 cup olive oil, juice from 1 lemon, a few drops of honey, and a little salt and pepper whisked together

In a small bowl, mix together the ingredients for the marinade. Allow to sit for 30 minutes in the refrigerator. Grill over medium heat for 5 minutes per side. Allow to rest for a few minutes. Slice the chicken, and while still warm, place on the spinach. Crumble the goat cheese over top, and add the pine nuts. Drizzle the lemon dressing over, and serve. Serves five.

Fingerling Potatoes with Crispy Cheese

1-1/2 pounds fingerling potatoes or any small potato

3 tablespoons kosher salt

3/4 to 1 cup shredded provolone

Bring a pot of water to boil with the kosher salt. Add the potatoes and reduce the heat to medium. Cook for 10 minutes, until tender but not falling apart. Drain and when cool enough to handle, slice the potatoes in half. Place the potatoes, cut side up, in a baking dish coated with cooking spray. They should be touching each other. Sprinkle the cheese over and broil, watching closely, for 3-4 minutes or until the cheese is brown and bubbly.

Practice Night Stromboli

2 packages refrigerated whole wheat pizza dough

A few tablespoons olive oil

Kosher salt

3 cups shredded part skim mozzarella

1/8 cup pesto

2 cup sliced cooked chicken breast Sliced olives, roasted red pepper, spinach (all optional)

Jarred red sauce for dipping

Set the dough out at room temperature for a few hours. If you forget to do this or don't have time, don't worry, it's just a little easier to handle when warm. Spray two baking sheets with nonstick cooking spray. Pour a little olive oil on one piece of dough, and carefully stretch it out to a large rectangle. It should touch the edges of your baking sheet. Leaving a 1-inch border all around and using half of the ingredients, layer the pesto, spinach if using, chicken, any other toppings, and mozzarella. Turn the pan so a short end is closest to you, roll the dough carefully to form a roll, and slide the whole thing to the center of the pan. Tuck the ends under. Use a sharp knife and cut four 1-inch slashes through the dough. Do the same with the other piece of dough and remaining ingredients. Bake at 400 degrees for 25 minutes, until brown and slightly crispy. Allow to cool for a few minutes. Cut slices 1 inch thick and serve with the red sauce for dipping.

desperate attempt to serve something other than pizza when all I had was pizza dough. It's basically a pizza, rolled up, baked and sliced into pinwheels. Traditionally, stromboli is filled with salami and other meats. I use chicken, to pack in some low-fat protein, and pesto for flavor. The local supermarkets are now selling whole-wheat pizza dough, which is great tasting, even according to Zoe I put together a stromboli once in a (a girl who once asked if she could have

a white bread sandwich for her birthday dinner). I used purchased pesto, found at the farmer's market - but any pesto will do and grilled chicken. You can even use a rotisserie chicken. So we eat slices of this, warm, cold, it doesn't matter. Just serve it with a cup of marinara sauce for dipping, a few raw veggies on the side and you've got a practice night dinner. And whenever I've made this for our family, Elliot swears it's his bestest dinner ever.



early 40 years ago, the parishioners at St. Sophia Greek Orthodox Church on Whitehall Road in Albany decided to hold a festival Greek foods.

Beyond the food there will be continuous live Greek music and Greek dancers, historic reenactors dressed like Spartan warriors, souvenir and jewelry stands, church tours and amusement rides for children.

Neal is particularly excited about the re-enactors, who attended the festival for the first, time last year. Two re-enactors came up from New York City, and they were so impressed with the festival that Neal expects them to bring another four or five reenactors this year.

The re-enactors won't even necessarily be Greek themselves, she said; "They just love that period in history. They can play out their passion."

The group makes its own costumes, featuring the arms and armor of the ancient Greeks. The enactors are happy to pose for pictures and answer questions about Greek history, Neal said. Some festivalgoers who missed them last year have told her how much they're looking forward to catching the group this year.

As for the dancers, the church has about 75 dancers from 8 to 17 years old who know dances from all of the different regions of Greece. They will wear costumes corresponding to those regions as they dance in the dining room.

The festival attracts 25,000 people annually. The church has plenty of free parking, with extra parking at the nearby Center for the Disabled with free shuttle service. Because so much of the festival takes place indoors or under tents, it will be held rain or shine. Hours are 6 to 11 p.m. on Friday, noon to 11 p.m. on Saturday and noon to 7 p.m. on Sunday.





Glenmont's Havley Quillinan benefitted from some of Rowan's assists, as the Bethlehem Central High School graduate finished with four goals.





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Community gardens bring together people, green spaces

Nomething green and wonderful is growing across the country. Friends, families and neighbors are rolling up their sleeves and nurturing community gardens that are sprouting to life.

An estimated 18,000 community gardens are growing throughout the United States and Canada. Not only are these gardens good for the environment, they also help community members nourish relationships. Joining others in creating a garden is a great way to get outside, make new friends and create a living, growing green space. The benefits of gardens are numerous, from cleaning our air to providing a place to relax.

"Community gardens are important investments in the wellbeing of a neighborhood," says Keith Baeder, senior vice president, gardens, The Scotts Miracle-Gro Company. "A garden welcomes participants, encourages people to work together and provides a haven for nature."

A community garden can be any size and consist of almost any type of plant life. Bill Dawson, the Growing to Green coordinator for the Franklin Park Conservatory in Columbus, Ohio, defines a community garden as an area where more than one person in a community is caring for a garden. That community might be a church group, a school, or simply neighbors hoping to beautify their neighborhood.

"It's a group of people coming together to make their space greener and enjoying the many benefits," says Dawson about community gardens.

In his course on starting a community garden, Dawson focuses on six basic steps:

- Form a group. It is important to have two or three core leaders to handle planning and coordinating year-round.
- Decide on garden type. With so many possibilities (vegetable, flower, raised beds, herbs) the

group must decide what to grow and who the garden serves.

- Find land. This can be a several-step process, but the land needs access to water and sunshine. Contact your local city council or municipal government for help finding space.
- · Gather money and resources. Create a garden fund, and determine if the group should fundraise or partner with local organizations. It is necessary to create awareness of the garden to gain community support.
- · Design the garden. Hold open design meetings so all volunteers can share what they want to see in the garden.
- Think ahead. A critical step is to realize what it will take to sustain the garden. Plan for the future when creating the garden, and decide in advance details such as who pays the water bill.

Many people grow a garden for its beauty, but the benefits of a community garden extend well beyond aesthetics. Community gardens reduce crime by turning dark, abandoned lots into active areas. They also promote opportunities for neighborly and multicultural exchanges. The social benefits are often springboards for ventures like teaching young adults entrepreneurship by selling produce and homemade goods at local farmers' markets.

A garden can also serve an educational purpose, like introducing kids living in urban settings to the science behind a seed growing, or the link between honeybees and pollination. Community gardens are often the first introduction to nature for many children who have grown up without a backyard or nearby park.


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Lawn equipment maintenance made easy

s plant life begins to thrive all around us, the warmer weather is a reminder that it's time to get lawn equipment out of storage and back in working condition. But what do you do if you pull your lawn mower out, turn the key and nothing happens?

"After sitting for months, there are some things that should be checked to ensure lawn equipment is in top shape so it works well throughout this season and many seasons to come," says Scott Mack, senior training specialist at Kohler Engines, a global manufacturer of small gasoline and diesel engines.

Mack offers these maintenance tips to help keep lawn equipment running at its best:

1) Clean out debris.

It's not uncommon over the cold months for mice and other critters to build nests in lawn equipment. In particular, it's important to check where the air cleaner is located. Look for grass and other dried plants as an indicator. If you think an animal has been in your equipment, look at the wires also to make sure they haven't been chewed on and damaged. A nest built in the engines cooling fins will cause overheating.


2) Fully charge the battery.

It sounds simple, but a battery can lose its charge over the winter months and should be fully charged before you turn the key again. Most batteries are

maintenance-free, but some will require you to check water levels. If your equipment has this type of battery, remember to always use distilled water.

3) Clean battery connections.

Build-up and corrosion occur over time in the battery connections and it's important to clean them before it causes permanent damage. Remove the wires from the battery and clean connections by scrubbing with a wire brush. A baking soda and water solution will neutralize the acid and clean the parts without causing any damage. Make sure that termi-

nals are dry before reassembling the battery cables. Also, be sure to properly torque the bolts - this information can be found in your user's manual or on the engine manufacturer's Web site.

4) Change oil and spark plugs.

If you didn't change the oil before the equipment was stored a few months back, it's important to do it now before the new season. Additionally, spark plugs are easy to replace and help keep equipment running in top condition during peak usage. Be careful when removing and reinstalling the plug not to cross thread

By keeping parts clean and using fresh fuel, your engine will run more efficiently. 7) Clean the carburetor.



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
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
