The Town of Bethlehem Plan ning Board unanimously accepted two drafts for new condominium complexes on Tuesday, June 3

Glenwood Village, presented by United Group, would be located on Glenmont Road and would include 150 units for controlledcost senior living with rent starting at \$1,250 per month. The complex would include underground parking with elevator access to the four floors of apartments, emergency pull cords in every bathroom and bedroom, as well = need of services. as access to public transportation and community programs to create a sense of community among

the residents.

Two condo plans in the works

United Group's Executive Vice President of Development Terri A-Herubin said that Glenwood Village would "be a good product for Bethlehem."

Glenwood Village was created as a housing alternative for seniors who are still able to live on their own without the constant'

Herubin said the developers are eager to manage the site with the help of the town "to be a good

neighbor."

The condominium complex would be one of the tallest buildings in the area.

Planning Board members questioned the effect the development would have on traffic conditions along Glenmont Road.

Board member John Smolinsky said the development would bring diversity to the area but would also create traffic prob-

**Police Blotter** Man charged with pointing rifle at motorist

sobriety test, which he failed, according to the arrest report, and tested positive for alcohol.


Hancock was placed into custody without incident.



# Sidewalk to mask construction scars

#### **Residents ask planning** board to fix mess left behind by developer

At the Tuesday, June 3, planning board meeting at Bethlehem Town Hall, plans were put into place to add a 10-foot-wide sidewalk to the McCormick's Hollow subdivision, which will help mask a construction project that has been left unattended for more than a year.

Surveyor Paul Hite outlined the plans for a sidewalk that would stretch from North Street to Harding Avenue. The path would be maintained by the town and cover up work that had been left unresolved by earlier developer Key Stone Companies Inc., which was developing the McCormick's Hollow subdivision - which did not materialize - and left local residents such as Anthony Apuzzi with construction scars on their front lawns.

Hite said that a possible reason for the subdivision plans falling through is that the gradient of the area was such that a road could not be built without drainage problems and issues with preexisting power poles in the area.

Local residents said they were fed up with the unsightly damage to their neighborhood and would like to see it resolved.

"I would like to see this done," said Audrey Watson, a neighbor

to Apuzzi.

The proposed extrawide sidewalk would allow for emergency access, but landscaping would be added to deter vehicles.

Planning board chairman Parker Mathusa suggested implementing a time line to help speed up the unfinished work.

While both the developer and town have offered few reasons as to why construction was halted or why Apuzzi has had to deal with the remnants of construction on his front lawn for so long, the planning board motioned to see the sidewalk proposal again in two weeks, although a deadline had not been set for when such a project would be completed.

After the motion to revisit the proposal in a week, Apuzzi said, "I'm happy with the proposed plan; not happy with the lack of firm deadline.'

He said he has "strong feelings that it [the delay of construction] would not happen in other more visual subdivisions" in the town.

Apuzzi has lived with a damaged front lawn with weed patches and bare spots for the past 17 months and has had to deal with several unexpected construction projects, including one where his wife and her car were blocked from leaving the home as workers re-paved the end of his driveway without notice. 🧎 🖕

"I would just like to get it done," said town Supervisor Jack Cunningham.

# **District: No to more** modified soccer teams

#### School board cites finances and other issues


At the recommendation of its president and district superintendent, the Bethlehem Board of Education voted to not add an additional modified boys' soccer team to the school's athletic division.

A large contingent of sixth-grade boys has led to a surge of student athletes trying out for modified teams at Bethlehem, according to one Delmar mother, but with only a limited amount of roster room, many students can't make the teams. Joan Smith asked school board members to consider creating additional modified teams, especially for soccer, where 48 kids tried out for 22 spots last year and 54 students this year for 23 final positions.

Lytle said scheduling conflicts with the other suburban schools would also be an issue with multiple modified teams. The school's "point of view" is to have equality among all of its athletic teams, he said.

Smith said she understood that the budget was set, and it would be a costly endeavor but asked if corporate sponsors could be brought in.

"The goal is one in which we share. We certainly understand that we try to make sure that as many kids that are interested in physical activities can do so," Lytle said. "I think we would be prepared in the course of our budgetary discussions next year in ways that we can achieve, which may or may not be through expanded the numbers of modified team, but maybe there are other steps we can take."

Other parents have expressed similar concerns, according to Smith, who has twin boys in sixth grade. She said she only hopes as many options are available to students as possible but realizes there are financial and equality barriers.

"There's a huge group of kids," Smith said of those interested in school sports. "And I totally believe in gender equality, but there's just not enough girls to make a girls team."





# **Community growth**

During World War II, while American soldiers fought and died in far-off lands like Sicily and Monte Casino, back home the United States was undergoing a growth spurt of sorts. Victory gardens dotted the nation. In backyards, empty urban lots and apartment rooftops; in parks, baseball fields and schoolyards; neighbors came

together, in the name of patriotism, to answer their government's call to aid the war effort.



In the 1940s, because America's resources

were devoted to the war, labor and transportation shortages made it hard to harvest and transport fruits and vegetables to market.

Fast forward nearly 70 years, and America is facing similar problems. We are a nation at war, and rising energy costs have made it nearly as difficult to transport fruits and vegetables the average 1,500 miles they must go from harvest to market.

In 1943, The Department of Agriculture estimates, there were 20 million victory gardens that produced more than 8 million pounds of food. More importantly, those gardens produced an unquantifiable sense of national unity in a very tough time for the United States.

We could use some more of that unity.

Amid a controversial war, an unfavorable economy, skyrocketing gas prices and all of the other crises, problems and inconveniences that make life difficult, it's easy to lose the fact that we're all human — all Americans.

Americans share a unique national history in the sense that we come from diverse pasts, have a fractured present, but a common future. We sometimes lose sense of that last part, and perhaps by planting these modern-day victory gardens, we can reclaim some of our national identity—not in the name of the war effort, per se, but in the name of a national, and more importantly, human effort.

Try to leave politics out of it. Yes, a victory garden's historic purpose was to support the war effort, but a victory garden also could be a way to combat high energy consumption that takes place in the process of planting, fertilizing, processing, packaging, and transporting our store-bought food. Regardless of the motive, it's time for us as citizens, residents and neighbors to show a solidarity that hasn't been seen since the two towers fell.

So go ahead, turn over a patch of ground by your fence. Plant something, watch it grow. While you're over there, say hello to your neighbor. Strike up a conversation. Maybe it'll be about politics; hopefully it won't.

# **Reflections on the Swede life**

"There is only one Scandinavian language, but, the Danes can't pronounce it and the Norwegians can't spell it right."

I must admit, I changed the punch line a little to make the Swedes come out on top. Still, all Scandinavians claim they can understand one another, and as a first-generation Swedish American, that joke always makes me laugh, while at the same time it helps me remember who and what I am.

My parents came from the old country, and my much older sister was born in Sweden. I was almost born there too, since my parents did return to Sweden for a short period. But upon my mother's insistence, my father relented and they returned to Jamestown, N.Y., where I was born and, as a child, thought was the heartland of Swedish immigration.

They arrived the first time with not much more than the clothes on their backs and a couple of small trunks filled with a few possessions. All they knew about the new land is what they had heard and what relatives who were already here had written home about. They wanted to fit in and become Americans so they studied English and American history and eventually became citizens. My father even went down the path of name change from Larson to Anderson. Since everyone knew him as "Andy" Anderson, that change probably. saved me from being nicknamed "Larceny" today.

Because they also wanted to keep the old memories alive and make sure I learned about my heritage, we ate Swedish food, spent a lot of time with Swedish relatives and friends, celebrated holidays in Swedish tradition, and among other things kept a small traditional Gold and Blue flag and a brightly painted red Dala horse in the living room.

# Point of View

My father would tell me stories he learned as a child about Swedish heroes like Gustav Vasa, the founder of the modern Swedish monarchy, King Gustavus Adolphus a leader of Protestant armies in the Protestant Reformation, and the young Warrior King Charles XII – each of whom contributed to the history of Sweden as it is today.

Before starting kindergarten, Swedish was my first language. Once school started I easily drifted into English, but as a child I always kept that bilingual gift in the background. Our family was grounded in a circle of Swedish relatives and friends so I understood the conversations around me with no problem. Among my school friends I was always sort of embarrassed by the Swedish babble from my father, who of course they could not understand, but I always immediately acknowledged.

The year I turned 10, we visited Sweden for the summer, and I immediately lapsed into the language so completely that upon returning home I had a hard time getting back to English. That whole summer was filled with memorable events. In particular, I was exposed to the history and accomplishments of Swedish author Selma Lagerlof, the first woman to win the Nobel Prize for literature, named after Alfred Nobel, the Swedish inventor of dynamite who later created and endowed the entire Nobel Prize program.

My excuse for doing poorly in high school Spanish was that it was nothing like Swedish, but when I was required to study German in college I thought I had it made. Well, in some ways I did. I could pronounce the words and read out loud like a native German because of the similarity in sound, but I could not keep the vocabulary straight.

Sadly, both my parents passed on before I finished high school and when I moved on to college and into the real world, much of the gift slipped away. Oh, I still find myself remembering my father speaking only Swedish to me, and I even sometimes catch myself thinking in Swedish. But since I have put it aside and behind me, I really have to concentrate to even put a simple sentence together. For welcomed to Sweden in Swedish at the airport by a black woman wearing an official uniform. On that same trip, I enjoyed lunch in a Swedish speaking Italian restaurant that made me feel like I was in Rome or Venice; and why not, after all, Stockholm is known as the Venice of the North.

On our last evening in Gothenburg we dined with relatives in a Vietnamese restaurant. The young waitress spoke perfect Swedish and English as well as her native tongue. As one point I asked her if she was born in Sweden, at which she smiled and then said in English with a fake Swedish accent: "Oh ja, I'm a Svede." Seeing my shocked reaction, she immediately grinned and said in flawless English: "You are an American, but you're Swedish. Well, I am a Swede but I'm Vietnamese; it's the same thing." Here was a lady with a clear understanding of a multicultural world.

My late father-in-law was also first generation Swedish-American. When I first methim I was intrigued by his life story and I asked if we shared a similar childhood experience with the language. No, he said, after his parents arrived they were adamant that their children would be Americans and speak only English. But, he did know a couple of phrases which he would rattle off occasionally, I think just to show me that deep down he was indeed a real Swede.

One day at the kitchen table he tossed out one of those Swedish phrases. Not to be outdone, I responded as best I could. To my surprise, he quickly came back with something else in Swedish. Even though it was a struggle, I did manage to put something together. Now we were off and running. The conversation went back and forth for a while, during which I did not point out what was going on because I didn't want to break the mood. Finally, when it ended, I told him that we had been conversing in Swedish, albeit at a childish level. No, he insisted, he could not speak Swedish. Nevertheless it was clear to me that as a child he had heard and absorbed the language enough to be able to subconsciously reach into early memories, retrieve it and speak it again.

We are all defined by these kinds of background and experience, and as a nation of diverse immigrant influences, we should all be proud of our heritage. It defines who and what we are. I maintain that English is and should be the primary language of this nation, even to the extent of official legality. But, let us not forget who we are and where we came from, and always remember and be proud to honor and respect the significant contributions of our forefathers. On my 10-year-old visit to Sweden we also spent a couple of days in Norway, and I understood the language well enough to know what was going on. But trying to understand Danish makes me feel like I am back in my high school Spanish class, so that puts my opening joke to rest.

purposes of conversation, I have to be exposed to it for a couple of days before I can get comfortable.

Over the years I have had the privilege of knowing a number of people from various backgrounds with similar language gifts. Even when the language is completely different from my experience, I relate to them and share their emotions.

I particularly remember a single mother of Hispanic background who told me one day how her daughter in second grade was fluent enough in both Spanish and English that her school would use her as an interpreter with new students and their parents. You can imagine the pride in that woman's smile when she told the story.

Ironically, on my last visit to Sweden six years ago.I was







# Guilderland town board tabs Lawlor to be top cop

#### Democratic majority rules in partisan vote

Guilderland's town board voted along party lines to choose Carol Lawlor as its new police chief before a standing-room crowd that filled Town Hall Tuesday, June 2.

Three days later, on Friday, June 6, she took the oath to officially become Chief Lawlor.

A 29-year veteran who was the town's deputy chief, Lawlor had the support of the roaring crowd as the final vote of 3-to-2 secured her place as New York's 10th female police chief. She had just as much support, if not more, when she was sworn in during a full ceremonial procession, complete with bagpipes.

At age 50, she is the department's third police chief since 1977 and its first female chief.

Republican councilmen Warren Redlich and Mark Grimm voted against Lawlor's nomination. Supervisor Kenneth Runion, along with Councilwoman Patricia Slavick and Councilman Paul Pastore — all Democrats — voted to give Lawlor the job.

Lawlor has been the town's acting police chief for the past year after longtime chief James Murley retired amid scandal.

"The goal is to have the best

candidate possible," Runion said at the meeting. "Tonight it gives me great pleasure to say ... the best candidate for the job is Carol Lawlor."

Runion also took a moment after the final vote to admonish his Republican counterparts on the board for not supporting his candidate for police chief.

"I have to say this is probably one moment when I feel the most embarrassed for this board as a whole," Runion said. "This is a day when we should all be cherishing an individual who has moved through the ranks and moved through great achievements for the Guilderland Police Department."

Continuing, Runion said, "But unfortunately, two of our town board members started this process ... in what I believe to be a prejudicial view of the acting chief who's here this evening."

Grimm took issue with Runion's statements following the Lawlor vote.

"I thought that was unbelievable. He's embarrassed because people disagree with him? ...We have nothing to apologize for; we did our jobs," he said. "This [appointment] was a predetermined outcome ... and another example of old-style insider politics, which is Ken Runion's calling card."

The Republican councilmen said they did not feel Lawlor was the strongest candidate out of a final pool of three applicants. They both put their support behind a Troy city assistant police chief, John Tedesco, saying that he had more education and a better background and was better suited for the job.

"It's important to all Guilderland residents that we have the best candidate for the job. With events like Columbine and the Porco case, we need the best," Redlich said. "It's a cliché, but when that call comes in at 3 a.m., we want the most qualified person we can have to take that call."

Redlich said that Lawlor was not the best based on the résumé presented on a "side-by-side comparison."

He said Lawlor's appointment represented the status quo in Guilderland Town Hall politics.

"The previous chief left under a cloud, we all know that," Redlich said at the meeting. "One of the things that came out during the interview process ... was Acting Chief Lawlor presented a memo that had come from the previous chief that was essentially a secrecy order, and the department has a culture of secrecy."

Grimm agreed with Redlich and said hiring outside of the department would prevent any insider secrecy that may occur in a department that was rocked by the sudden resignation of its former police chief amid allegations of sexual misconduct and other inappropriate behavior.

"On the merits, Acting Chief Carol Lawlor is not the strongest candidate in my view," Grimm said.

The rest of the board, and seemingly most of the residents in attendance, disagreed.

Dozens of residents filled the room June 2. Many held signs in favor of Lawlor, and they applauded loudly when each board member voted for Lawlor.

Both councilmen said they would work with Lawlor now that she is chief. However, neither appeared at Town Hall during Lawlor's swearing-in ceremony four days later.

Runion acknowledged their absence during the ceremony and introduced his Democratic colleagues, Slavick and Pastore, to roaring applause. He told Lawlor that she deserved a unanimous vote on her appointment and apologized for the partisan vote that took place a few days prior.

"I think the minority turned it into a partisan appointment," Runion said during a telephone interview after Lawlor's appointment. "It was almost like they had a grudge on day one against her. ... It was just disgraceful."

The supervisor added that a new deputy chief would not.

After the final vote was taken, Lawlor said she was glad the selection process was over and is proud to lead what she described as a professional and hard-working department. She said it was time to move forward and put politics aside.

"I'm very proud to be police chief ... I want to thank the town board members who supported me," Lawlor said after being nominated. "And to those who didn't support me, I hope we can put public safety first."

Lawlor will be paid \$90,000 a year as chief.





The branding will "let people know that dumping things in the water ... will end up in the Hudson," he said.

Councilwoman Joann Dawson said the branding was a good idea.

"It's things like that that will help make people more aware and hopefully a little more conscious of things they are dumping and may be thinking about dumping," said Dawson.

Robert Jasinski, a Bethlehem resident and a member of the town's noise ordinance task force, asked about the authority to test water on private property.

"What about private citizens that have no storm-water system along the road, or anything? What is going to be your criteria on them?" Jasinski asked. "Are you going to come knocking on my door and tell me you don't like how the rain is coming off my property?" Penman responded that testing and enforcement measures would occur only if illicit substances are discovered coming off the property. Cunningham said that new development and construction sites would be the primary targets, but that the town now has the responsibility to test for illicit discharges into the water ways. The town has updated its Web site, www.townofbethlehem.org, to include septic information and a list of things not to be dumped in water and sewage drains.

# Lifestyles Spotlight

t was Friday night, and we were all hungry. I had a car full of kids well past 6 o'clock, and we were a good 20 minutes from home. Also, there was no warm pot of dinner bubbling on my stovetop. So I was left with no other choice: We were going out to eat. This was met with cheers from everyone in the back seat, followed immediately by the question: Where?

Paul was working late and couldn't join us. I had my three kids plus our dear friend Maggie with us. Being the adult, and the one with the money in my pocket, I made a fast decision and announced where we were going, rather than debate what people felt like eating. So it was decided that we would eat at Van's Vietnamese Restaurant (307 Central Ave. in Albany, 436-1868).

A kind waitress sat us right away. She continued to provide us with friendly service throughout our meal (not always the case when you waltz into a restaurant with four children). We started our meal with huge, steaming bowls of Pho Ga (chicken soup) and Pho Bo (beef soup). Each bowl had plenty of noodles and meat, which we divided into the smaller bowls brought by our waitress. Everyone loved the bowls and matching Asian-style spoons, which let you scoop up lots of noodles and slurp them down. I told everyone that in Vietnam it's OK to make the slurping noise when eating soup, which encouraged everyone to slurp many bowls of Pho. Pho is made with noodles, meat and a broth that is seasoned with star anise, ginger, onion and cinnamon. Small dishes filled with hoisin sauce, basil, bean sprouts and a fiery red chili sauce are served on the side. Stir it all into your bowl, and it is my opinion that this soup will cure whatever ails you.

We also had the vegetarian spring rolls — exquisite in my opinion but not loved by the rest of the group. Lucy didn't like the rubbery texture of the rice paper and Elliot eyed the contents carefully before waving it away. The rolls are beautifully presented, and filled with tofu, rice noodles and bean sprouts. They were served with nuoc mam, a clear dipping sauce made with fish sauce, sugar, water and chilies.

This sauce showed itself again in two of our entrees. We ordered three dinners to share. Everyone loved the grilled beef slices over vermicelli (Bun Bo Nuong.) This huge platter was filled with thin rice noodles, bitesized pieces of tender beef and shredded carrots and cucumber. The whole thing was finished with the nuoc mam and chopped peanuts. The beef pieces were very tender, and I think kids like scooping up servings of meat that no one has to spend time cutting. Each bite was a little mixture of the salty beef, cool vegetables, and the noodles with the sweet and sour flavor of nuoc mam. It was just perfect for our crowd.

And then there was the curry chicken " (Com CaRi Ga). Unfortunately, I could tell



# Vietnamese chicken a hit with all ages

#### Vietnamese Grilled Chicken

Serves 5, with leftovers

2 whole chickens, cut in half lengthwise (ask the butcher to do this) 1 2-inch piece of ginger, peeled and chopped

4 stalks lemongrass, bottom inch and top few inches trimmed, outer stalks peeled away, and chopped

- Zest and juice of one lime 3 tablespoons sugar 3 tablespoons kosher salt
- 4 tablespoons soy sauce

Combine the ginger through the soy sauce ingredients in a food processor. Pulse for a few minutes and then turn it on for a few more minutes until everything is finely chopped. Put the chickens in a glass dish and use a rubber spatula to spread the marinade over all. Cover tightly and refrigerate overnight.

Prepare a grill to medium low heat (approximately 300 degrees.) Grill the chickens for a total of 1-1/2 hours, turning and rotating around the grill every 15 minutes. Paul recommends using a gas grill, and only turning on the front burners, keeping the chicken near the back of the grill, away from the direct flame. The chicken will cook slowly, making it juicy with a crisp skin.


just by the look of it that I would not like it. A big curry fan, the texture and flavor of the sauce is equally important to me. This sauce tasted all right, but it was thick and had a gelatinous consistency. It was mild and fine for the kids. Lucy loved the chicken, potatoes, sauce, the whole thing. Maggie and Zoe ate small servings on their plates. Elliot took a large spoonful, spread it over all the rest of his food and declared it "yellow and good."

The overwhelming favorite was the grilled boneless lemongrass chicken (Com Ga Nuong Xa Ot.) This dish is half of a chicken, marinated and grilled to crispy perfection. The outside was perfectly brown and the meat inside was tender. There was a mild lemongrass flavor that, again, paired up very well with the nuoc mam sauce that it was served with. It may seem like too much of a good thing with this sauce but we were so happy, practically drunk on nuoc mam.

And it was this chicken dish that got me to thinking: I bet I could make grilled chicken at home that was as good, or almost as good as that one. I started out with lemongrass, which seems exotic but is readily available at the supermarket. Lemongrass has a distinctive citrus flavor, central to Vietnamese cooking. I added lime, ginger, garlic, sugar and salt. If you were making this chicken for people who like spicy foods, a chopped chili would add a kick too. Paul grilled this chicken, using the gas grill on medium low, rotating the chickens around the grate and turning them frequently. I was surprised by how good it turned out. The skin turns out brown and crisp, like Van's. But the meat inside was so juicy, and the lime, ginger and lemongrass all stand out.

With the tax and tip, the bill at Van's was \$72. It may sound like a lot to spend on an impromptu dinner with kids. But I walked out with a quart of soup and containers of each of the entrees. My entire family feasted on these for our next evening's dinner. Not to mention that we really had fun sitting in Van's. The atmosphere was relaxed. Maggie showed us the "real way" to eat food with chop sticks: Simply stab each piece of meat, one stick at a time. So we stabbed, slurped and laughed our way through dinner. And I was inspired to create my own lemongrass chicken. It was worth every penny.

Schenectady isn't the only place local residents can take part in observing Juneteenth. In Albany, the Arbor Hill Community Center will hold its fourth annual Juneteenth celebration on Saturday, June 14, at 10 a.m. Other celebrations are slated throughout the state. That's heartening for the Rev. Ronald V. Myers Sr., chairman of the National Juneteenth **Observance Foundation. His** organization works to bring greater attention to Juneteenth. hailed as "America's second Independence Day." # Lyme disease: Prevention and treatment

he late spring and early summer months bring an increase in outdoor activity but, unfortunately, this is also the time of peak tick activity and Lyme disease transmission. People venturirg outdoors should be vigilant for and guard themselves against tick bites. This is especially important for people here in the Northeast, as Lyme disease risk is very high ir. this region. In 2006, New York had the nation's ninth highest incidence of Lyme disease. Its 4,460 cases made up nearly 23 percent of the all U.S. cases of Lyme disease that were reported to the Centers for Disease Control that year. Although Lyme disease is a serious risk in our area, simple measures can be taken to minimize the risk of disease transmission and most cases can be easily treated with antibiotics.

#### What is Lyme disease?

Lyme disease is an infection caused by the bacteria, Borrelia burgdorferi. The bacteria are spread by the bites of infected black-legged (deer) ticks. Dog ticks and Lone Star ticks do not spread Lyme disease. The risk of disease transmission is greatest after at least 36 hours of tick attachment. The most common early sign of infection is a circular, expanding rash called erythema migrans that is more commonly known as a "bull's-eye" rash. Other early symptoms include: fatigue, Leadache, chills, fever, muscle and joint aches and muscle weakr.ess. Untreated Lyme disease can progress to other areas of the body causing severe bouts of artaritis, heart disease, and various r.ervous system problems such as r erve pain.

### How is Lyme disease prevented? Is there a vaccine?

The best way to prevent Lyme cisease is to avoid entering tick habitat (tall grassy areas, brushy cr wooded areas) when possible. Clear brush and leaf litter, and keep areas of heavy use mowed regularly. When entering tick infested areas, wearing light-col-

ored, long-sleeved shirts and long pants will aid in visualizing ticks on clothing and reduce the amount of exposed skin available for ticks to attach. Tucking the shirt into the pants and the pant-legs into the socks will provide another physical barrier.

Insect repellants containing 20 to 30 percent DEET are effective at preventing tick bites and are safe to use infrequently and in low concentrations. DEET should be applied only to exposed areas of the skin and not underneath clothes. The product needs to be reapplied every few hours (check the product label). To limit exposure to DEET do not apply it to broken, wounded or sun-burned skin and wash the treated area and clothes with soap and water after returning indoors. Concentrations above 30 percent DEET are not recommended for prolonged or frequent use. For children under age 5, use products containing less than 10 percent of DEET and try to avoid repeated applications. Spray the product on your hands first and then apply it to your child to avoid children transferring the product from their hands to their eves. nose or mouth. Permethrin, an insecticide, is proven to repel and kill ticks when applied to clothes, shoes and camping gear. Treated clothes will retain their effect even after several launderings. Permethrin should NOT be used on the skin. Lastly, thoroughly inspect your entire body for ticks after

outdoor activities. A Lyme disease vaccine was discontinued in 2002 due to lack of demand.

## What do you do if you are

### bitten by a tick?

Tick removal within 36 hours of attachment greatly reduces the risk of infection, so remove them promptly when discovered. Grasp the tick's mouthparts with tweezers close to the skin and gently pull it out. It is OK to leave a portion of the mouthparts in the skin. It does not affect disease transmission and efforts to remove them may cause further tissue injury. Do not crush the body of the tick, and do not use chemicals or to try to loosen the tick. After removal, wash your hands and the bite site

with soap and water and disinfect with either rubbing alcohol or hydrogen peroxide. Monitor the bite site and overall health closely for early symptoms of Lyme disease. Tick identification and testing is usually not recommended to determine if a patient requires treatment, but these services are available in some areas.

Preventative antibiotics for adults and children age 8 and older are only recommended when the following are met: The removed tick can be identified as a species of black-legged tick, the tick was attached for at least 36 hours, it is within 72 hours of the time of tick removal, when 20 percent of black-legged ticks in the area are infected, and it is safe for the patient to take the antibiotic. Patients should consult their physician after a tick bite to determine if treatment is warranted.

#### How is Lyme disease

#### diagnosed and treated?

Lyme disease in its early stages is usually diagnosed based on signs and symptoms (especially the bull's-eye rash) and a recent history of a tick bite. The bull'seye rash can occur between seven to 14 days after tick attachment, but it does not occur in all patients,

chance that symptoms will persist and develop into a chronic illness. In these cases, physicians can prescribe medications to manage any remaining symptoms.

Lyme disease is a potentially

so monitor for other early symptoms of disease, such as joint pain and weakness. Blood tests are available to diagnose the disease in its later stages. Lyme disease is treated with antibiotics and the length of treatment varies according to severity and how early the disease is caught.

### Are there any chronic

#### effects of Lyme disease?

Although antibiotic therapy can rid patients of the bacteria that cause Lyme disease, there is a serious disease that we should all be mindful of as we venture outdoors this summer. Fortunately there are steps to be taken to minimize the risk of infection and the majority of Lyme disease cases are easily treated. Being proactive in terms of preventing and identifying tick bites can go a long way toward ensuring that our outdoor adventures remain enjoyable, healthy experiences.


a mattress that is supportive and relieves your body of pressure so you can sleep soundly.

competitor. She likes to win and has a cupboard full of trophies and awards to prove it. Tennis was her game; singles, mixed doubles - anytime, anywhere.

Trim and athletic, she was diagnosed with breast cancer in 1996, while in her mid-sixties. It wasn't the disease that put her on the sidelines. On the contrary, Zeh underwent a mastectomy, chemotherapy and radiation and was ready to "get right back into the game," she says.

"But," she continues, "my serve was off. If I couldn't compete and play well, I needed to find something else to do."

She set her sights on snowshoe racing.

To become a serious competitor, Lori says she needed to train. She took up jogging on the rural roadways in East Berne, where she and her husband, Bob, have lived for the past 30 years. In the winter months, when snow is plentiful in the Hilltowns, Bob would tamp down a trail along their property line - his large snowshoes helping to pave the way for his wife's smaller ones.

"I became quite proficient at it," she says.

In 2004, she competed in the Empire State Winter Games the only entrant in her age group - and was named Snowshoe Athlete of the Year. Although it was

olores (Lori) Zeh is a never her intention to become a role model, she says it gives her "great pleasure knowing that other people have taken up the sport because of me."

Mr. and Mrs. Zeh are, in the truest sense, lifelong companions. Married for 55 years, they met during their college days at Hofstra University. He became an engineer, building scientific instruments used to measure continental drift. She was a homemaker, wife and mother. They raised their children, built a home and developed many shared interests, including history, hiking and biking. Together, they survived the ups and downs of marriage and parenthood and life in general — not the least of which was cancer.

The Zehs were introduced to cancer for the first time when their 18-year-old son was diagnosed with melanoma. They sought treatment from Dr. Janet Garguilo, a medical oncologist with New York Oncology Hematology (NYOH) in Latham. Their second encounter was Lori's bout with breast cancer. Three years later, she underwent surgery for colon cancer. Bob, too, is a cancer survivor, having had multiple occurrences of malignant melanoma.

"The Zehs are very bright and intelligent, very motivated, very eager to learn and do new things and very anxious to take

advantage of all that life has to offer," says Dr. Garguilo. "They do whatever they are asked to do to stay healthy, but their cancers do not control their lives."

Now, well into their 70s, Lori and Bob Zeh are still going strong. They speak enthusiastically of road trips, visits to historic sites and walking tours that await them. Lori is considering archery as the next test of her competitive spirit.

They are among the tens of thousands of cancer survivors whose lives are celebrated during National Cancer Survivors Day activities, traditionally held during the month of June. Established more than two decades ago, the celebration has grown into a worldwide affirmation that life, after a diagnosis of cancer, is a reality.

Things in life can go wrong easily," says Lori. "It's important to enjoy the things that go right."

'Survivorship celebration time is a very special time, not only for patients and their loved ones, but for physicians," notes Dr. Garguilo.
