In a unanimous decision, the Bethlehem town board appointed Patricia Parsons its new court clerk during its Wednesday, June 25, town board meeting.

The current long-time court clerk, Barbara J. Hodom, is set

to retire on Friday, July 18, from the post she had held for three decades.

Board appoints Parsons

as new court clerk

Parsons has already begun training for the position and working at Bethlehem Town Hall.

She is leaving a job as an administrative assistant at Albany County's general services department and said she was honored to be selected by town justices Ryan Donovan and Paul Dwyer.

"I'm extremely excited. I've always had an interest in the criminal justice system. ... At one point I was planning on becoming a police officer," Parsons said of being appointed to the \$58,000 a year job. "I'm honored to work for such respected judges as Judge Dwyer and Judge Donovan. I will be learning from the best. Barbara maybe one of the best court clerks in the area."

Parsons lives in Delmar and has worked for the county for 35 years and said she approached the town justices about the position once she learned Hodom was retiring. She ran for receiver

Police Blotter Prescription pills found during DWI arrest

Karen E. McClintock, 45, of Selkirk, was arrested on Monday, June 16, on River Road on charges of seventhdegree criminal possession of a controlled substance, DWI, and failure to keep right.

Bethlehem police said an officer on patrol saw McClintock driving south on River Road, at which point "the vehicle left the southbound lane, crossed over the double solid yellow line and was traveling in the northbound lane. At that time, the vehicle made an abrupt jerking movement to the right, crossing over the lane on the shoulder."

When police stopped

McClintock, according to the report, they noticed the smell of alcohol when interviewing her.

According to the investigation, she stated, "I haven't had anything to drink, I just took (three) hydrocodone for my teeth."

McClintock failed a fieldsobriety test and tested positive for alcohol on a pre-screening device, according to the arrest report.

She handed officers an open bottle of prescription hydrocodone, a narcotic, and was also in possession of two other empty bottles of the

same from a pharmacy in Ravena, the report stated. The prescriptions were not in McClintock's name.

Upon further investigation, police said they also found a plastic baggie with another half of a pill, later determined to also be hydrocodone, which McClintock told officers had been given to her by an aunt.

She was taken into custody for DWI and criminal possession and consented to a blood test at Albany Medical Center, the report states.

McClintock is scheduled to appear in Bethlehem Town Court on Tuesday, July 8.

Other arrests

• Sonja L. Morris, 37, of Albany, was arrested by Bethlehem police on Saturday, June 21, for fourth-degree grand larceny, a felony.

Police said Morris was arrested on charges stemming from a May 7 incident at the Kmart in Glenmont where she worked.

Police arrived on the scene after receiving a call from the loss-prevention officer saying Morris was in custody at the store.

Morris had allegedly stolen Western Union money orders in the amount of \$1,325 from the store in order to pay her rent, according to the arrest report.

Police said she was arraigned in front of Town Justice Ryan Donovan and was given a bail of \$2,500 and scheduled to return to Bethlehem Town Court on Tuesday, July 15.







Sewer fix to close Elsmere

Line break forces detour of thoroughfare for at least three days

The town has announced that Elsmere Avenue will be closed "for at least three days" between Maple Avenue and Kenwood Avenue starting on Tuesday, July 8.

Supervisor Jack Cunningham made the announcement during the town's Wednesday, June 25, town board meeting.

Commissioner of Public Works Josh Cansler told town board members that they discovered a sewer main running underneath Elsmere Avenue was broken in at least two places and would have to be dug up, resulting in the closure of both lanes of traffic until the sewer line is fixed.

The two breaks in the pipe are about 30 or 40 yards apart, according to Cansler, and will have to be replaced. Traffic will be diverted in opposite directions in order to detour both lanes of

traffic on the heavily commuted road, which will most likely lead to delays during peak driving hours.

"Obviously Elsmere's a main thoroughfare here in Bethlehem and Delmar, so that's going to affect a lot of people," Cansler said. "We've been working with DOT and the police department to come up with the best route to detour traffic for a couple of days."

Cansler said the current plan of action was to divert southbound traffic down Elsmere Avenue to Herber Avenue and then left on Glendale Avenue before turning onto Kenwood Avenue and back onto Elsmere Avenue.

Northbound vehicles will be directed to take a right from Elsmere Avenue onto Kenwood Avenue and then left onto Ridge Road and left again onto West Popular Drive before merging back onto Elsmere Avenue.

Cansler told the board that the work will begin at 6 a.m. on July 8 and that only one home will have its access blocked by the construction. He added that they held off on the project until after school was out.

"We're going to try to fix one break one day [July 8], hopefully backfill it in and be able to reopen the road that night. There's no guarantee of that, but that is our plan," Cansler said. "Then open it up the next day, fix the second break and backfill it again on the night of [Wednesday] July 9.'

However, Cansler warned, Obviously if we get down there and find that it is a bigger problem than we thought, then we may not be able to do that." Cansler told residents and board members that marked flaggers would be directing traffic on the corners of Elsmere Avenue Kenwood Avenue, Poplar Drive, Herber Avenue and Glendale Avenue. He also said that notices would be put in the local newspapers and signs would be placed along the roadways.

Cansler said large trucks will not be diverted into the residential neighborhoods but will instead be sent down Elm Avenue over to the Delmar Bypass. Traffic will be able to flow in both directions throughout the construction, he said.

Church parking lot houses more than a market

Every Tuesday, local growers turn space into social scene

Every Tuesday during the summer months, the farmers market at the First United Methodist Church on 428 Kenwood Ave. brings out growers, florists and barbecue stands to attract locals into buying locally grown produce and handmade goods.

This is our social life," said Chaz Martel, a farmer who has gone to the market for the past four years and who belonged to the church before relocating to Greenfield Center with his wife.

Martel brings his Blue Moon salad dressings and marinades to the market as well as homemade soap, honey and vegetables. He started growing produce to make use of the waste left behind by the horses he and his wife own, and it quickly became a way to make money on the side.

"They [the church] are very

Church at 35 Adams Place in the 1970s. After gaining popularity on Fridays, the market expanded to include Tuesdays. Later, the market moved to its location on Kenwood Avenue and is now held only on Tuesdays.

The mid-week afternoon was picked because it is the more productive day, according to Gretchen Geurtze, who runs Geurtze Bar-B-Q, which has been at the market since the beginning, when the company was still being run by her father.

"I have weekly customers that have come to me since we started. I know 90 percent of my customers' names," said Geurtze, a Delmar native. She said she has some customers who have been buying from her since the days her father was still selling eggs at the market. She sells about 175 barbecued chickens per week and until recently used her own chickens until the demand became so great she had to buy them separately.

The farmers market at the First United Methodist Church is a part of the Capital District Farmers Market Association, one of the oldest groups in the region that helps to bring together farmers and buyers of local goods. Merchants who go to the market in town have to be a part of the association and are voted into local area markets on the basis of keeping everyone balanced.

Struck by a new found soft spot for softball

It was the top of the last inning. The orange tie-dye team had rallied and was closing the gap in the score. They needed one more run to stay in the softball game. Alas, it was not meant to be. The lavender team won the semi-finals.

How could this be? I had even donned an orange shirt. OK, it was more yellowish than orange, but my heart was in the right place. And I did have an orange sun visor, although it was solid orange, not tie-dye.

Despite my team spirit, softball season for the orange tie-dye team ended.

I'm supposed to feel relieved. Now my weekends are freed up. No more carting my middleschool age daughter to the field or worrying about dirty cleats or misplaced mouth guards.

But I don't feel relieved.

I looked forward to the games, not just for the opportunity to socialize with the other parents but because I actually liked watching the kids play.

And so, I'm bummed. I've got the post-season blues.

How did this happen? I've never cared about sports. Did I get hit in the head with a ball?

I like the game, but I don't think I'll ever get all the rules down.



Last year I learned about the in-field fly rule. Also, I knew that after four balls the batter received a last-chance pitch from her coach.

This year they added the dropped third strike rule, plus the players could steal home, and ball four meant the runner walked to first base, no coaches on the pitching mound. Actually, there's not even a pitching mound, it's called the pitcher's circle.

The team on the field must always remember that the play is to first base, except when it isn't.

Three strikes you're out, unless the third strike is a foul ball in which case you get another pitch.

And sometimes you need to tag the player out and other times you just need to have your foot on the base when you catch the ball.

And if you miss your shift staffing the concession stand, it's your husband's fault because he is supposed to be handling all the softball-related assignments. Well, that's how it works in my house.

And most important: Do not be the parent who forgets to bring Popsicles. I made several notations on our calendar regarding the Popsicles and provided verbal reminders to the person handling softballrelated assignments (read previous paragraph). It was over 90 degrees and we remembered the treats. We did not, however, remember that we had concession stand duty on the same day. .

But back to my recollection of the rules of the game:

There's some magic involved with not letting a grounder get by you, and it helps to be at the ready and make sure your gloved hand extends all the way to the ground.

Also, innings end after three outs or five runs, whichever comes first.

However, if there are two outs and the batter has just received ball four and is walking to first base as the fifth run is being scored, the play is not complete until the runner touches first. So, if the runner, along with the rest of the team, heads directly into the dug out, as instructed by the coach, then an alert opposing team will throw the ball to first (the play is always to first). This results in the walked player being called out at first and the fifth run not being counted.



Who's on first? Nobody.

And sometimes the runner on first will risk stealing a base even though from where I'm sitting there's a good chance the catcher is going to throw the runner out at second. But that's OK if the runner on third base gets to score.

Wow, that's a lot to keep track of.

Luckily, we've got great coaches. They are parent volunteers who spend considerable time teaching our kids the nuances of the game and building their confidence level

"You are a hitter!" shouts the coach to the batter.

.....Why can't I be this patient and encouraging with my child?

In many ways my town's recreational league is like one giant family. Over the years the coaches get to know a lot of theskids. They know them from a previous year in the recreational league or they know them from the travel league or fall ball or another sport or the neighborhood or a school activity or their daughter's circle of friends.

During one rainy game, one of our coaches was toweling off the softballs and tossing dry ones to the pitcher, as needed. He knew her by name, even though she

was on the opposing team:

And at a playoff game, when the ball hit our catcher near her neck, coaches from both teams came to assist, with a second coach from the opposing team arriving with an ice pack.

Together, the coaches work to create a supportive environment. The girls, in turn, cheer one another, applauding both the successful moments and the attempts. In my experience with the league, the coaches have offered only praise and constructive criticism. They serve as role models for the players and for the players' parents.

For me, it's the combination of the game and the atmosphere that draws my interest. So much so that even though my daughter's team didn't make the final playoffs I still went early to the end-ofseason picnic in order to watch the championship games.


That's right, my kid wasn't even playing and I enjoyed watching the game. What's happening to me?

The lavender team went on to win the final playoff game, and then all the players in the entire league received a trophy, a medal, or a pin of participation. It was a wonderful afternoon, and I'm already looking forward to next spring when we'll do it all again.

Teens looking for parttime work can register with YES, located at the Parks and Recreation office at Elm Avenue Park, during office hours.


The program is a year-round referral service.

Say it ain't so, Joe

That big sucking noise you heard last week after Senate Majority Leader Joseph L. Bruno announced he is resigning his seat at the end of the year was the sound of state tax dollars leaving Upstate New York.

Calling public service "a tough ball game" that he loves, Bruno confirmed Monday, June 23, that he won't

seek re-election in the fall to the Legislature he's been part of since 1976. Bruno's decision was announced in a closed-door session on the last scheduled day



of the 2008 legislative session. The 79-year-old Bruno has been the state's top Republican since 2006.

"After 32 years in office, I have decided that it is time to move on with my life and to give my constituents an opportunity for new representation and my colleagues in the Senate who have supported me, an opportunity for new leadership," The senator said in a written statement.

But that leadership won't come from Upstate New York. Sen. Dean Skelos of Long Island was voted Senate Majority Leader a few days later, cementing what pundits have been saying more regularly as Uncle Joe has gotten up in years: Eventually the pork that Bruno has been so pivotal in bringing to the Capital District and its outlying areas will dry up and flow to other parts of the state.

Maybe it would be easier to swallow if it looked like those dollars were going to places that are worse off than we are — places like Buffalo and Syracuse that have been taking an economic beating for some time but have lacked a certain something needed to get some economic stimulation. Something like say, a certain white-haired, well-dressed state official willing to run a backhoe or jump in an 18-wheeler to court local media.

No, sir. With a Senate minority leader, speaker of the Assembly and governor that hail from the five boroughs; and a new Senate majority leader from Long Island, places like Chittenango and Cheektowaga look a lot like...well, Appalachia, as a former governor once said.

But at least Gov. David Paterson has a home in Guilderland, some may say. He sure does. But, first of all, Guilderland is a far cry from Buffalo or Syracuse. Secondly, it doesn't necessarily mean the governor or his sensibilities actually live there.

The best that Upstate can expect after Bruno leaves is to be thrown a bone every once in a while — a bone that will no doubt remind Upstate constituents of where their leadership lives.

Baby boomers may dream of owning a second home as they head into their retirement years. But instead of caring for a vacation house, adult children often find themselves helping an aging mom and dad avoid the safety pitfalls of the family home. There's no doubt where seniors want to be as they age. The majority of seniors polled in recent industry surveys — typically 90 percent — say they want to stay at home. But in a 2007 AARP independent living study, two-thirds of boomer women surveyed said they are concerned about their parents' ability to live independently as they get older, with 43 percent being very concerned and 26 percent somewhat concerned. It's a legitimate fear.

"Many seniors and their families don't think about the fact that homes must adapt to the changing needs of seniors as they age until an accident happens," said Nelson Carpenter, owner of the Home Instead Senior Care office serving Saratoga, Washington and Warren Counties.

"There are many potential pitfalls that we've seen during the home safety reviews that our company conducts before starting service in a client's home. Our reviews cover 50 different items throughout a home including the entrance, living areas, kitchen, bedroom, bathroom and stairways. Important safety areas to highlight in a senior's home run the gamut from accessibility to lighting to trip and fall hazards. A lack of attention to those details can jeopardize an older adult's ability to remain at home." Carpenter said. Many home safety improvements are simple and inexpensive, experts say. Convincing seniors, on the other hand, is another story.

Danise Levine, assistant director of the IDEA Center at the State University of New York Buffalo School of Architecture, said that denial often comes into play with!

seniors.

"We see a lot of seniors who don't want to admit they're getting older so they don't want to make changes in their homes," Levine said. "Secondly, consumer education is an issue. If older adults do need help they often don't know where to go or how much things cost." Those issues can result in seniors' adapting behavior to their environment, creating a potentially dangerous situation, said Levine, whose IDEA Center is dedicated to improving the design of environments and products by making them more usable.

"If a senior has problems getting off the toilet, he could develop a several-step process of using a window sill, shower curtain and towel bar to get up." However, a window sill and towel bar will eventually pull away and break, and a shower curtain will tear under the strain, creating the potential for an accident. Unfortunately, many home makeover changes are responsive rather than proactive, noted Peter Bell, president of the National Aging in Place Council, a Washington-based advocacy group dedicated to helping seniors remain at home.

"Too often changes aren't made until someone has had a stroke or other type of condition that begins to impair their mobility," Bell said. "It's a shame, too, because that's a difficult time to be making a renovation." Bell said that it's important for a senior-care professional to conduct a home review to identify various safety pitfalls from poor lighting to the need for adaptive devices in a home. While many fixes are simple and inexpensive, others might involve a remodeling project to help a senior remain at home.

Look and see signs: A home safety review and checklist

• Examine dark pathways, corners and other areas where seniors regularly walk or read. Make sure all areas of the home have adequate lighting. Timed and motion-sensor lights outdoors can illuminate potentially dangerous pathways. Inside, consider Ott-Lites in the meat tray.

•Look behind closed doors. Many seniors will close off parts of a house they no longer use. Be sure to check those areas regularly for mold or water damage. Don't close vents to crawl spaces.

·Look for ways to simplify your senior's life. Talk to your parents about why and how they do things then look for ways to simplify their lives. If your Mom's immaculate floors are now regularly dirty, think about how she's been doing that job all these years and offer options. Rather than a heavy mop and bucket, investigate light-weight, all-in-one mops. If your senior is replacing appliances, look for smooth-top stoves and refrigerators with water and ice on the outside. Change door knobs to levers, or purchase grips that can go on conventional knobs. Convert single-bulb light fixtures to multiple bulbs so seniors still have light when one bulb burns out.

•Consider security. Think about the potential dangers that hurk within your loved one's home. Lock-in switches on thermostats and stoves will keep seniors with dementia and Alzheimer's disease from harming themselves. Help them manage in their environment by installing a cordless intercom.

• Keep an eye out for damage. Watch for signs that a senior is adapting his or her behavior to the environment. Look for towel bars or window sills that are pulling away or shower curtains that have torn from seniors using them to grab onto.

•Look for ways to make entries safe. Make sure that railings into a home are in good repair and that steps and sidewalks are not damaged. Make sure that doors can be set to stay open for carrying groceries and other items in and out. Install remote control locks.

• Is clutter taking over? Messy conditions and broken items are important warning signs. Remove arearugs and stacks of newspapers and magazines, or other potential obstacles.

Following are adaptive devices you can easily install and add to a senior's home for a combined total of about \$500.


• Raised toilet seats with arms that lock onto an existing toilet provide height and support to stand. \$90.

•Hand-held shower nozzle slips directly over a tub faucet. \$24.

• Floor to ceiling grab bar provides a full range of heights to hold onto while:sitting or standing up. It can be installed by the bed, in the bathroom or by a favorite chair. \$150. • Lever doorknob turner adapters attach securely to a variety of round door knobs to provide leverage for easy opening. \$22.

A dark green or brown toilet seat and vinyl tape around the shower will make those fixtures more easily distinguished. Kitchen countertops should contrast with floors as well.

•Lookforwaystoreorganize. Mom always put the black stew pot under the stove to keep the kids from breaking it. Perhaps now it belongs on a shelf beside the stove. And who says the eggs must go in the egg tray of the refrigerator? Perhaps it's easier for dad to handle them if they're stored • Lever handles attach to recliner chair handles to serve as an extension. \$22.

•Various kitchen items are available including automatic openers that remove lids and open cans, jars and bottles. \$50.

• Rubber ramps that are ADA compliant are often easy to install to most surfaces. Ramp stays in place by its sheer weight and can be moved from one opening to another. \$36.

•Mobile stools are particularly useful to help seniors navigate a kitchen \$100.

Thanks for supporting Taxpayers should be aware of resolution

Editor, The Spotlight: .

Spotlight Newspapers published an article, Mendick: Towns paying for city elections" in the Colonie Spotlight on Wednesday, May 21, that covered the resolution I have sponsored in the Albany County Legislature to change how election-day costs are charged back to each town/city from using assessed property values to actual costs.

Presently, the costs of poll inspectors, poll sitters, machine storage costs, etc. are charged based upon the equalized assessed value for all parcels in the county rather than the actual costs incurred by the specific towns/cities. Using assessed value has the impact of shifting costs of the cities into the suburban towns. Specifically, for the 2006 election, the electionday cost for the City of Albany was \$243,553, but \$123,904 of that total ended up on the bills of suburban towns. Bethlehem was billed \$24,166 above what it actually cost Bethlehem to run the election. Colonie was the big loser with \$104,198 of Albany cost shifted to the Colonie taxpayers.

It is unfortunate the story in the Colonie Spotlight since it is as applicable to the taxpayers in Bethlehem, as it is to Colonie.

I write this letter to make Leonel will continue to benefit Bethlehem taxpayers aware of my resolution, Resolution 197, calling for election costs to be billed on an actual cost basis, town by town. Towns, like Bethlehem, who have worked to keep election costs down, should reap the benefits of their efforts. Why should Bethlehem or Colonie or any other town pay for the inefficiencies of our Albany neighbor?

To illustrate the issue, here are a couple of statistics from the 2006 election. Albany had 66 polling places as compared to Bethlehem's 22 and Colonie's 35 polling sites. Geographically, Bethlehem is more than twice Albany's size and Colonie is almost three times its size. The polling places for Colonie and Bethlehem were configured to handle more than 1,000 registered voters each, while Albany was geared for less than 700 per polling place.

Resolution 197 provides the motivation for cities and towns to take a long look at the election process and make the necessary corrections to minimize the cost of running the election, thereby saving taxpayer dollars.

If this resolution is not

passed, Bethlehem, along with the other suburban towns, will continue to financially support the inefficiencies of its neighbors. Each town or city should stand on its own. I encourage taxpayers to contact their Albany County representative and make their feelings known regarding Resolution 197. I also suggest taxpayers contact their town officials and request they support Resolution 197 by writing letters, calling representatives or personally appearing at the public hearing prior to the County Legislative session on Monday, July 14, at 6:30 p.m. You can also contact me at remendick@aol.com or call 767-0511.

In a recent Spotlight article, "BC maintains salary negotiation procedures," June 18, John Giordano is concerned about the high cost of teachers' salaries in Bethlehem. He might do better to look at another organization.

A recent Times Union article on Monday, June 23, "For police, overtime is the great equalizer," puts the "average total police officer salary, 2007, for a Bethlehem police officer at \$80,514.'

In order to make comparable pay, a Bethlehem teacher would have to be in the 24th year of service, with a master's degree. At the end of the 2008 school year, there was a total of only

15 staff members, including teachers, aides, bus drivers and custodians, with 25 or more years of service. On the other hand, the median teacher salary, according to the 2007-2008 schedule, is at the 15th year of service, and is \$62,303, or 77 percent of the average police pay.

Furthermore, according to the Times Union, a new Bethlehem police officer earns \$46,000 per year. In order to equal this pay level, a BC teacher would have to be in the sixth year of service, also with a master's degree.

Mr. Giordano is concerned that BC salaries are "on pace with those who pay their salaries." Did he poll the doctors, lawyers and other and that their union has played professionals who live in the BC district about their pay? If so, he might have found that indeed teachers' pay is not "on pace."

He also states that "regular citizens" can't be engaged in the salary process. This is just not true. Many meetings about the budget are held before its adoption, and public comment is welcomed. Being part of a public entity, both the teachers' contract and pay scale are open to inspection by any district resident of voting age.

Mr. Giordano worries that the "unions are going to ... hate me" for his opinion. I'm sure he realizes that the police officers have a union as well, an instrumental role in securing their generous pay.

Finally, Mr. Giordano forgets an important fact. Unlike the town budget and police salaries, district residents, including himself, have the final say, and are able to vote "no" on the school budget if they are not happy with the cost.

Our school system is always looking to reduce expenses while delivering the superb education that taxpayers want for their children. Mr. Giordano's efforts to hold down costs are admirable. He just needs to look around for other possibilities as well.



Handling of negotiations under fire by group that calls for more open process

Following an executive session held by the Bethlehem Board of Education at 8:15 in the morning on Thursday, June 26, the board unanimously approved the Bethlehem Central United Employee Association (BCUEA) contract, effective July 1 until June 30, 2012.

The settlement includes significant employee health insurance concessions that will reduce district expenditures. according to a release from the district, and the new contract contains an average annual overall increase of 2.6 percent plus step increases over the life of the contract.

The BCUEA encompasses the district's support staff, including bus drivers, custodians and secretaries. Their last four-year contract contained an average salary increase of 3.1 percent per year plus step increases. The starting salary for first-year bus drivers is \$29,247 and for first-year custodians, \$30,756, according to district records.

The new contract's insurance cost reductions will save the district an estimated \$210,000 in 2008-09, according to the district's spokesman, Matt Leon.

The way the school conducts its salary contract negotiations has come under some criticism recently by Citizen Budget Group member John Giordano, who in a June 18 article in Spotlight

Newspapers titled "Citizen Budget Group member wants more participation" said he wanted to open up the negotiation process. A letter to the editor have been submitted to Spotlight Newspapers about the matter (see page 8).

The school said it wishes to maintain its current process of engaging in contract talks between the teachers' unions and the school board elected to represent the district's interests.

Another resident, Philip Carter, who owns a consulting business in Slingerlands, has also raised concerns over the matter and has sent several e-mails to the school district asking about its budget process.

In one of the e-mails, Carter questioned the school board about its last budget vote on May 20, which passed with about 60 percent approval.

"It turns out that only about 20 percent of the eligible voters took part in the election and only 11 percent approved your budget," Carter wrote. "That's a far cry from 60^{spercent} approving.'

Contract negotiations have been ongoing, according to board president James Lytle, and the union had agreed to the conditions of the contract the night before the vote and recommended its approval to the board.

"We've been engaging in negotiations for the last several months, fairly intensely, a lot of issues on the table including some significant health insurance concessions," Lytle said at the

meeting. "Important changes allow us to be more flexible with the employees as you gain additional proficiencies in number of different areas. It has been recommended to us by the negotiating team to approve this contract.'

District officials said the contract calls for fair salary increases for valued employees and substantial savings in three areas: health insurance costs; improved transportation staffing and routing efficiency; and limitations on worker's compensation costs.

'In particular, the contract calls for a significant increase in employee contributions to health insurance premiums for family coverage," according to a district release. "Additional savings will come with greater staffing efficiency within the transportation department, including a reduction in midday bus runs when the district implements full-day kindergarten in 2009-10."

Superintendent Les Loomis, in what was likely his last board meeting, described the healthcare concessions in the contract as "incredibly significant."

"Having been involved in negotiations along the way that I think the concessions in the health insurance are incredibly significant because the trend always of the increases in health insurance far outstrips any kind of salary increases," Loomis said. "I think you're going to see continuing significant saving."

District officials are also touting the new provisions in the BCUEA as allowing for greater flexibility in assigning. bus drivers, which will lead! to more drivers continually maintaining their regular routes! Loomis said the stability will lead to improved safety in the district's transportation program, which he said is already known across the state for its safety and reliability.





NYRA touts summer plans

Franchise announces ideas to bring in crowds despite sluggish economy

With legislation still pending regarding the New York Racing Association's franchise, it announced plans Monday, June 23, at the Desmond Hotel in Colonie to bring in big crowds and supply good times for the 2008 Saratoga racing meet.

Charles Hayward, chief executive for NYRA, acknowledged NYRA's legal red tape is still an ongoing issue, but emphasized that NYRA is planning an exciting season for its 140th summer session at Saratoga.

"I hope next year by this time there won't be any talk about the franchise," Hayward said.

Hayward said that Senate Majority Leader Joe Bruno. R-Brunswick, Assembly Speaker Sheldon Silver, D-Manhattan, and Gov. David Paterson have all been supportive of NYRA in its attempts to come out of bankruptcy.

Gavin Landry, NYRA's senior vice-president of sales and marketing, highlighted several new ideas to help improve customer service and bring people to the track.

Five new restaurants; Grey Gelding, Hattie's, Brindisi's, Panza's and 1 Caroline Street Bistro/ Mouzon House, will be featured on-site this summer, a feature that Landry believes will provide a boost to the overall atmosphere at the track.

"NYRA is happy to be working with the local area to promote some of its more popular restaurants on track. As a gesture to the Saratoga community, NYRA waived some of its profits and paid for certain infrastructure in order to accomplish this. NYRA's food and beverage concessionaire, Centerplate, was also a significant partner with these quality restaurants that are part of the attraction of Saratoga," said Landry in a written statement.

Landry said this season there will be more corporate sponsorship, an additional picnic area and a "Spa" program that will offer an "elevated level of service" to customers

NYRA is also hopeful they will be able to have Big Brown as a fan attraction. Big Brown won two out of the three legs of the Triple Crown and NYRA officials believe it is a possibility the horse will run

Landry also announced the promotional giveaways for the upcoming meet. NYRA is eliminating its normal opening Thursday bobblehead giveaway, but still has five items lined up to bring in the crowds on Sundays.

The first giveaway is on July 27, and attendees will be given a baseball cap. The other four are scheduled for Aug. 3, when fans will be given a short-sleeve T-shirt; on Aug. 10, a "stadium seat" sponsored by the Daily Racing Form: on Aug. 17, a long-sleeve T-shirt sponsored by the Adirondack Trust Company; and on Aug. 31, a cooler bag.

Speculation about a potential decrease in track attendance due to the sluggish economy was also addressed.

There are some uncertain economic times facing Saratoga," said Hal Handel, NYRA's chief operating officer.

He cited high gas prices and fickle weather as other possible reasons for a potential decrease in attendees.

He said the "allure of the track" and quality of the product are reasons the Saratoga track might not take such a large hit. He also said the attendance at Belmont and Aqueduct has been good despite the difficult economic times.

John Lee, NYRA's communication director, said the high gas prices might not negatively affect attendance as much as some have speculated. He used the term "staycation" to Illustrate that many patrons might opt to take a day trip to the track rather than go on longer, more expensive summer vacations.

Joe Dalton, president of the

Saratoga Chamber of Commerce, also expressed his lack of concern for the rising gas prices.

"I think there are two important factors to consider. First, people are not flying as much simply because they don't want to spend a day in an airport. Second, even though the price of gasoline is double what it was a few years ago, people are more willing to drive to a vacation spot close to where they live," said Dalton in a written statement.

Saratoga is close to a three-hour drive from Boston, New York City and Montreal.

Handel pointed out that the races will be broadcast in 32 states and in countries such as Canada. Mexico, England and Austria.

There will be over 1,000 sites that involved in Saratoga racing,' he said.

NYRA still has some issues to deal with, including its bankruptcy and lack of an operator for the video lottery terminals at the Aqueduct track.

Hayward said there are several bidders for the VLT contract including Capital Play who made a bid on the entire franchise last year. New York state considered giving the racing contract to another entity due to NYRA's bankruptcy, but ultimately chose not to give the contract away. There is a tentative 2009 date for an operator to be named and the Video Lottery Terminal's to be made available to the public.

"[We have been] pretty much running on fumes from a financial perspective," he added.

The Saratoga season will go from July 23 through Labor Day, Sept. 1.

of taxes on the Democratic line in 2007 against current receiver of taxes Nancy Mendick. Judge Dwyer also ran that year, winning against Daniel J.Persing.

Although the board voted yes down the line, one resident harshly spoke out against the appointment. In addition, Councilman Sam Messina, an Independence Party member who has been openly critical of the town appointment process, said he wanted to make appointments "more competitive."

The five-member town board is made up of a Democratic majority, with Messina and Councilwoman Joanne Dawson as its two Independence members.

Even though Messina voted for Parsons, welcomed her and wished her well in the post, he reiterated his stance on town appointments to his fellow board members.

"These things are not easy for me because sometimes I feel like I am paddling upstream and maybe that is my role these days," Messina said. "Even though the justices control this appointment ... this is a \$58,000 a year job, it has control of over a million dollars in receipts, it's a responsible position, and that's why we have just given Barbara the accommodations and kudos for a job well done."

Continuing, Messina said, "But as far as I know there was only one candidate.'

The councilman pointed out that neither judge nor Parsons were at the meeting to publicly answer questions about the appointment. Supervisor Jack Cunningham pointed out Parsons had a scheduling conflict and could not attend the meeting.

'My strong recommendation is agair, whether it's appointed or volunteer positions, whether it's on courts or on town government, is to seek a bit more competition, and post for jobs to let people know they're out there," Messina said. "I would say the words trust, courage, and political leadership come to mind."

There was loud applause from Norman Morand, a Republican committeeman who has frequented town board meetings and spoke against Parson's appointment earlier in the meeting.

"I'm confused ... I look at the agenda and see that judges D and D went ahead and make [sic] an appointment and now the board is going to rubber stamp it What is going on? ... I would think that all hiring would be done by the board.

"It's starting to stink up here, I'll tell ycu that," Morand concluded

Town Attorney James Potter answered Morand's legal inquiries of Parson's appointment.

"I'll give you a legal opinion, Mr. Morand. There's a section of the New York State Town Law, section 20, that provides that the justices appoint their own clerk, not the town board, so the board is acknowledging the appointment by the two justices of their own clerk.'

Morand asked about others working in the town who could have been promoted.

'I'm sure there's people that are on the payroll in the town that were qualified to get a promotion," Morand said. "Were they considered?"

Potter answered, "I can't speak to what the justices did, they have appointed their clerk."

Donovan and Dwyer did not return a call for comment.

Messina put forth a proposal in early March to create guidelines for the way the town advertises and appoints people who are non-civil service to various boards and committees not deemed competitive by the state.

The proposal was voted down 4-to-1 at a March 26 board meeting, with Messina casting the only vote in its favor.

At the time, Cunningham and the other board members said Messina's proposal was unnecessary and a solution to a problem that doesn't exist. The town contends political appointments are far from the norm and point to Parker Mathusa on the planning board, Mike Hodom on the zoning board, and former supervisor Kenneth Ringler on the 20/20 advisory committee, as prime examples of other political parties holding town appointments.

Democratic Councilman Kyle Kotary told Spotlight Newspapers in March that Messina's proposal would tie down the business of the board.

"New York State law is very clear ... the town board has authority in its discretion to make appointments," Kotary said at the time. "This is his view, his [Messina] perception, and it would handcuff future board members. ... It's like saying, 'We're going to legislate how I'm. to go vote,' and that's insane."

Parsons officially began the job on Monday, June 30.

"I want to thank the community for the opportunity to serve as your superintendent for the past 21 years," Loomis told the roaring crowd.



Diegel quoted Sir Edmund Hillary, the first man ever to summit the 29,000-foot Mount Everest, who is not to be confused with Voorheesville graduate Hilary Edmunds, saying, "It is not the mountain that we conquer, but ourselves."


Also of note was graduate Matthew Alan Hopper, who lost his grandfather Daniel Plesser on Wednesday, June 25.

She was the widow of Seymour Weinste.







Web of worries

As younger children spend more time online, parents need to learn how to set limits

As a parent, I can't bury my head in the sand when it comes to social networking. Although, as a "digital immigrant" – anyone over 28 who grew up before the digital age – I want to.

Social networking – think MySpace, Facebook, LinkedIn – has become a way of life for many people. In the United Kingdom, 49 percent of all those under 18 online said they used social networking sites regularly; part of the findings in an Office of Communications' report.

Despite age restrictions for registering (MySpace is 14 and Facebook is 13), the same report says, among children with Internet access, more than a quarter of 8-to-11-year-olds claimed to have a profile page on one of these sites.

In the U.S., according to an Alloy Media + Marketing report, some 71 percent of online 9-to-17-year-olds use social networking sites weekly.

It doesn't surprise me that young people are expert social network surfers; after all, that demographic is known the so-called Generation M or Media Multitasking generation.

I on the other hand come from the betwixt and between generation that didn't grow up holding a mouse, but started with slide rules and books of log tables and ended in high school or college learning how to use computers for the first time.

I've worked to get competent with technology, but at times I feel one step ahead of my children.

What will they call my children's generation (both under five) and how adept will they be at media multitasking? Already, it's part of their norm to see me or Daddy on the computer working or surfing.

Of course, they want to have a go and I admit it's great to see their reactions as I help them move a turtle through the water to gobble the jelly fish or make the Tellytubbies appear and disappear from the screen.

By the time children reach preteens or tweens – generally defined as 8 to 12 years – many are old hands at playing online educational games connected to their favorite TV shows.

Social networking isn't news anymore, but tweens social networking (roaming about and chatting with friends online) is a growing and lucrative market; hot on the heels of the success of Club Penguin and Webkinz. Three years on, both sites have become extremely popular with tweens by word of mouth. They attract 5 to 14 year olds.

In 2007, the Walt Disney Company bought Club Penguin for \$350M as they look to expand markets abroad and through promotions on Disney-branded sites.

her kids' favorite social network, Webkinz. They like it because it's fun and never boring, with a variety of games and things to do. They're allowed 20 minutes each to play on the site and don't think it's addictive, contrary to what their parents think.

As I get more familiar with tweens social networking, I can equate it to hanging out on the street corner with my friends when I was that age, but now tweens are socializing in the virtual world.

Whether tweens are using Club Penguin, Webkinz or Moshi Monster, a hit Web site for 2008, many of them use a similar formula: play simple games, earn some kind of currency and spend it on decorations for their online pad, whether that's an igloo or house.

Club Penguin – a site where your tween can waddle through a fantasy world and interact with other penguins of their choice – charges a \$5.95 monthly subscription and you get an ad-free site, advanced features and you can set limits on the time your tween spends playing.

In a brilliant stroke of marketing, Webkinz, another ad-free site, requires you to buy a small plush toy (produced by the Ganz company), which has a special code on its label that allows your tween access to their



identical online animal character in the "Webkinz World."

I can see how these sites can hook preadolescence in with great graphics, fun activities and the challenge of earning points or "cash" to create their "pet's" room. It's absorbing with the added bonus of socializing with your peer group.

Advocates for social networks say these sites allow children to communicate in a 'controlled' environment. On many sites, users can chat online only by exchanging pre-constructed phrases, such as "What is your favorite color?" from the drop-down menu. Parents can allow some free-flowing chat, but this is heavily monitored by employees of the sites who look out for confidential information and language.

The truth is some parents probably have to do media literacy boot camp to engage with their children's 21st century computer habits. You may not understand the social networking needs of your tween, but you have to be aware of it, interested and hands on. Even as these sites are set up as safer sites, there are many dangers ahead for your preteen as he or she navigates the virtual world.

Follow common sense tips on Internet safety and happy networking:

Be informed - learn the terminology and how to navigate the site.
Many provide parent pages that explain usage and safety features.

- Talk to your tween about Internet safety.

Get involved – pay attention to where your child is going online. Keep the computer in a public area within sight.

Don't post personal information online for the whole world to see.

You may be monitoring, but what about when your child goes and plays at her friend's house. Talk to other parents.



aylor Wright-Sanson always had a lot of energy, so when he was about 9, his parents bought him a unicycle.

"It was mostly just to slow him down and challenge him," Wright-Sanson's father, Robert Sanson, remembered.

Soon enough, though, Wright-Sanson mastered the unicycle - so much so that two years ago, he joined the circus.

It sounds like a joke, but the Saratoga Springs teen is spending the summer touring with Circus Smirkus, a show whose acrobats, jugglers, and trapeze artists range from J, 10 to 18 years old. Based in Vermont, Circus Sinirkus is a nonprofit organization dedicated to exposing kids to circus life. Over the course of seven weeks this summer, it will put on 71* shows.

"It's very, very professionally done," Sanson said. "The level of competency is right there : with adults."



Without Borders and Habitat for Humanity. Last year, Perkins and Crossman traveled to China with an Albany volleyball team for the Special Olympics.

"All of these things that I've done ... they've helped me reach this point," said Perkins.

It's that sense of giving back to the community and being an upstanding citizen that Perkins wants to impart to the Pacers' players - something the organization has been lacking in recent years. Three Indiana players - Jamaal Tinsley, Shawne Williams and Marquis Daniels - have been involved in off-thecourt incidents in the last two years, and another player, David Harrison, was suspended by the NBA for a drug policy violation. Then, there was the infamous brawl between the Pacers and Detroit Pistons several years ago in Detroit that involved players and fans.

"Trouble is going to look for you all the time, and you have to learn how to deal with it," said Perkins.

"When you've got a franchise that is perceived as having lost its way, I think he's the right man for the job of helping the franchise find its way," said Crossman.

Perkins knows how trouble can find a person. During his 17year NBA career with the Pacers, the Seattle Supersonics, the Los Angeles Lakers and the Dallas Mavericks, he said there were times that he made poor choices. Fortunately for Perkins, those choices didn't lead to run-ins with the law.

"Did I stay out late? Yes. Did I drink? Yes," said Perkins. "But I never took advantage of anybody or let anybody take advantage of me, and that's how you gain respect."

The Siena College men's basketball team will play defending national champion Kansas Tuesday, Jan. 6, at Allen Fieldhouse in Lawrence, Kan.


It marks the first time that the Saints will have played the reigning national champions since they faced Syracuse in the 2003-04 season. Syracuse beat Siena 74-61 in that game.
