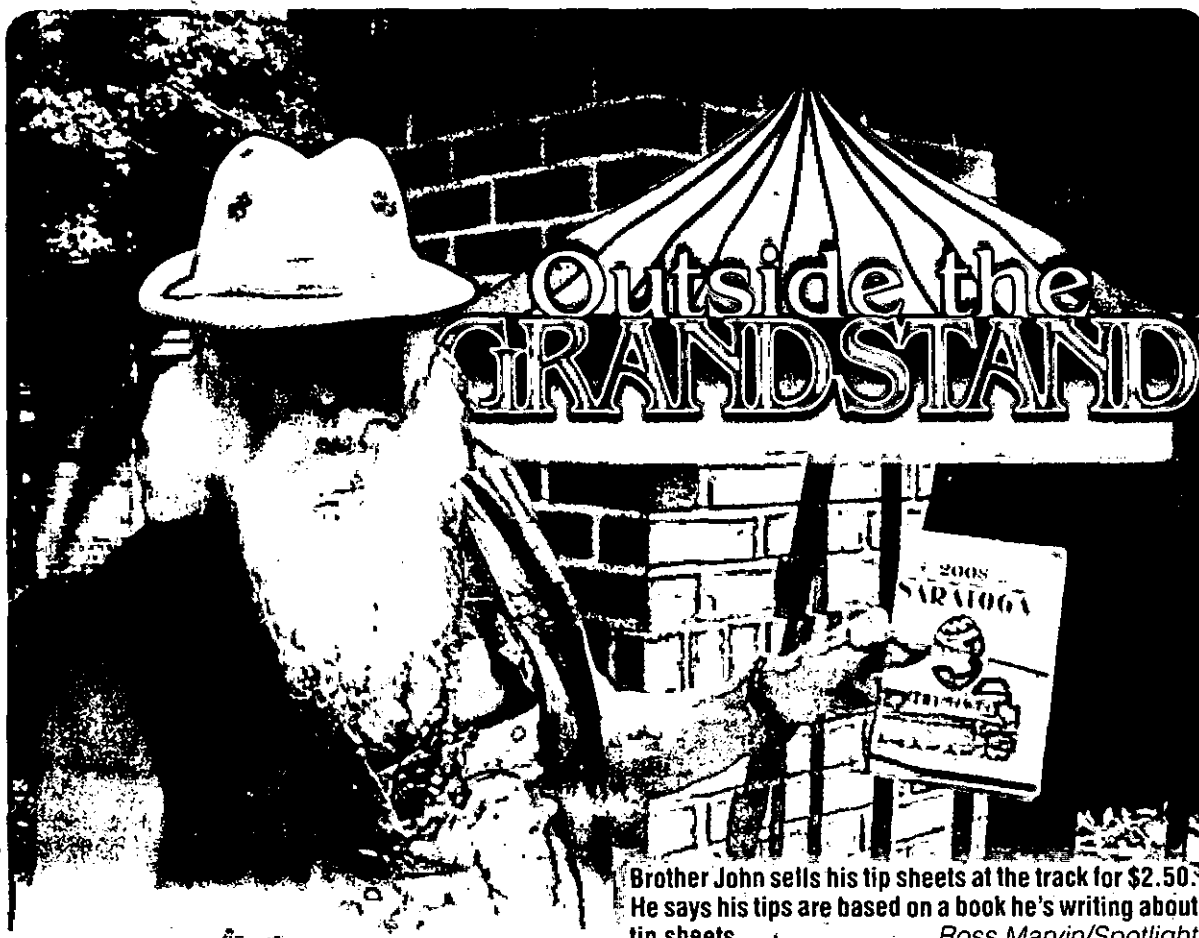

Race Course attracts diverse crowds of gamblers, entrepreneurs and fun-seekers

The walk along East Avenue toward the main entrance of Saratoga Race Course is an immediate reminder of the sheer diversity of the summer racing crowd.

Stable workers lead their horses in and out of their barns while a truck carrying bales of hay pulls out from the busy feed store.

Next door, men in dark suits and a startling number of women with bouffant hairdos gather outside the Fasig-Tipton pavilion where three horses, a trainer and popular jockey Edgar Prado have just been inducted

into the Hall of Fame.

Across the street, on a narrow strip of city-owned grass that lines the sidewalk, teenagers, and even a few tweens, hawk bottled water, soda and homemade cookies to the general admission crowd.

"Soda, \$1, \$3 inside," says Phil Krisson, 13, of Saratoga Springs. It's Krisson's second year selling water and soda. Where other teenage salesmen have their own staff and tent, Krisson simply sits in a folding lawn chair behind two large coolers.

Krisson said he makes about \$80 a day, not bad for a kid who can't legally work at a fast-food restaurant for another two years.

Grisly murder ends the life of Bethlehem grad in Guatemala

Family: Dan Dryden's charisma, enthusiasm will not be forgotten

Former Feura Bush resident and 1960 Bethlehem Central graduate Dan Dryden, a free spirit and an inspiration to many who knew him, was killed on Lake Izabal in Guatemala on Sunday,

Aug. 10, while defending his wife and his sailboat from four machete-wielding assailants.

The Dryden family reported that on Saturday, Aug. 9, at around 9:30 p.m., they received a call from a woman in Guatemala informing them that Nancy Dryden was in the hospital and that Dan Dryden, 66, was dead. The woman again spoke with the family later that

evening and described the events that took place.

"As they made dinner, anchored away from the marina in the harbor, Dan and Nancy heard a knock outside the cockpit. Dan emerged and found four men armed with machetes who had either swam or

Parties on the go

Teen drinking spots move from place to place once targeted

There's a spot off of Forsten Drive and Hasgate Drive in the Haswell Farms development that you can hike to, but even if you don't know about it, you're teen-aged son or daughter might.

Most likely they won't tell you about it either.

Underneath National Grid power lines lies a dirt trail that heads up a steep hill a little less than a quarter mile. At the top of this hill is a place that most every parent wishes wasn't there.

Hundreds of assorted beer cans lay strewn about, along with a variety of colorful plastic cups and the occasional ping-pong ball. All of the trash is heaped around two fireplaces covered in burned cans, cups, cigarettes, trash and even half-melted patio furniture.

One can follow the beer cans and broken glass that line the path to and from the area, as well as wrappers, containers and other trash.

According to Bethlehem police, the party spot is just one of several throughout town.

"We do periodically check these known party spots. ... There's several different known locations," said Lt. Thomas Heffernan. "This isn't a problem just in central Delmar, we have it in Glenmont, Slingerlands, Selkirk and Feura Bush. ... We cover 52 square miles."

Heffernan said the department attempts to target specific known spots but that it generally leads to the creation of other party spots in the town. And when the police do come across an underage drinking party in progress, Heffernan said, "When they see officers coming in, the kids run."

"Quite honestly, it seems when we target these areas it seems to move from one place to the next and then to the next," he said. "As the geography changes and de-

Dragging bumper leads to DWI arrest

A Delmar man was arrested for his third alcohol-related offense when police saw him driving across Delaware Avenue while dragging his front bumper.

Ryan P. Conley, 27, of Delmar, was arrested on Sunday, Aug. 3, on Kenwood Avenue for felony DWI; felony operating a motor vehicle with a blood-alcohol content of 0.08 percent or greater; consumption of alcohol in a motor vehicle; and failure to keep right.

Bethlehem police say they saw Conley driving south on Kenwood Avenue while he was crossing over to Delaware Avenue, police heard his vehicle making a loud dragging noise and saw an unknown dark

object caught under the front end of the vehicle's motor.

Police also saw that Conley's vehicle "made an abrupt movement, crossing the double solid yellow line then turn back to the fog line," according to the arrest report.

The officer following Conley activated his emergency lights, but Conley continued to drive "a few hundred feet" before stopping at the entrance of the middle school, the report states. When interviewing Conley, police reported that they could smell alcohol on his breath.

When asked if he had been drinking, Conley told officers "he had three glasses of wine at a friend's

house in Guilderland," the report states, and when asked if he knew he was dragging something, Conley said "no."

Conley told police he had hit a speed bump leaving his friend's house in Heritage Village Apartments and officers observed the vehicle's plastic guard hanging down and also noted that his radiator was bent.

Police said they called the Guilderland Police Department about any hit and runs, but none had been reported, and Conley was given a field-sobriety test, which he failed, and he tested positive for alcohol.

Officers found an open bottle of beer on the passenger-side floor of Conley's vehicle, and he was taken into custody and transported to the Bethlehem Police Department, the report states.

Police said after his vehicle was towed, Conley submitted to a chemical test and it was discovered

that he had been convicted of prior alcohol-related charges in February 2004 and January 2001.

Bethlehem Town Justice Paul Dwyer sent Conley to the Albany County Correctional Facility in lieu of a \$7,500 bail.

Other arrests

• David Weekes, 44, of Troy, was arrested by Bethlehem police on Saturday, Aug. 2 for felony second-degree burglary; second-degree criminal mischief, a misdemeanor; and a license plate violation.

Police say Weekes was driving south on River Road without a license plate displayed on his vehicle, and he was stopped at the Glenmont Road intersection.

A check revealed that an active arrest warrant for burglary was issued for Weekes out of the town of Schodack, according to the arrest

report, which was confirmed by Schodack police once Weekes was taken into custody.

Weekes was transported to the Bethlehem Police Department and processed before being turned over to Schodack police.

• Trevor J. Lemier, 24, of Delmar, was arrested on Wednesday, Aug. 13, for DWI; operating a motor vehicle with a blood-alcohol content of 0.08 percent or greater; operating a motor vehicle with a suspended registration; failure to notify a change of address on his driver's license; and failure to notify a change of address on his registration.

Bethlehem police say Lemier was initially observed stopped in the eastbound of Delaware Avenue waiting to make a left-hand turn, when a registration inquiry by an automatic license plate reader revealed that his vehicle's registration was suspended.

Police activated their emergency lights, but Lemier did not stop until he pulled into the driveway of his home on Salisbury Lane, according to the arrest report. Police said a check showed that his registration was suspended due to a lapse in insurance coverage.

When interviewing Lemier, police said they could smell alcohol on his breath and that he was showing signs of intoxication, and Lemier admitted to officers that he had been "drinking last night in Albany."



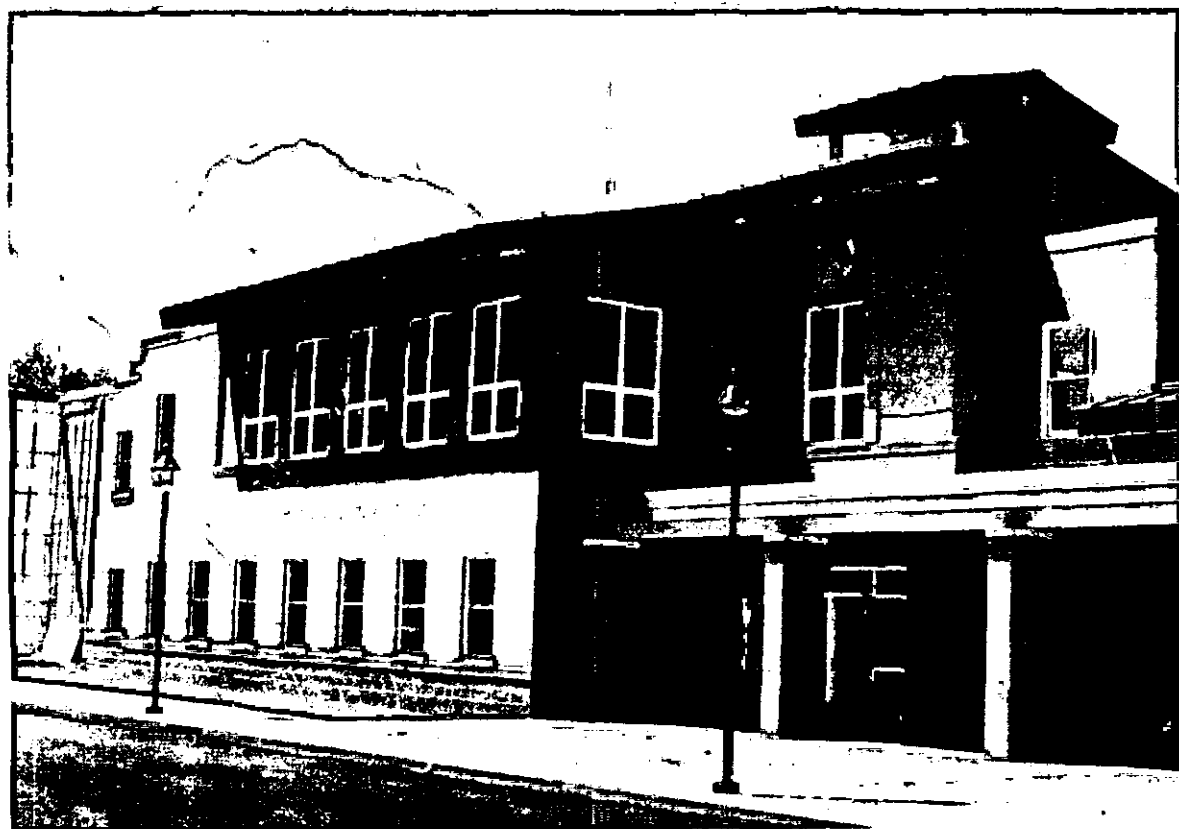

District updates construction estimates

Economy and 'unforeseen conditions' increase cost, not tax impact

Bethlehem Superintendent Michael Tebbano told the district's board of education that although an economic downturn and "unforeseen conditions" have tacked an additional \$1.8 million onto its current capital construction projects, there will be no impact on local taxes.

Tebbano announced the \$93 million bond referendum passed by voters in 2003 is near completion, but that it will take \$94.7 million to complete the projects. It represents a nearly \$1.8 million increase over the original cost estimate.

Construction covered by the bond included high school and middle school expansion and modernization; elementary renovations; a new elementary school (Eagle); expansion, safety and efficiency upgrades at the transportation facility; and expanded wetland and athletic field operations.

The superintendent told the board that the rise in overall construction costs over the past five years coupled with unforeseen

conditions resulted in the increased capital construction costs.

Tebbano said the conditions adding to district costs included additional asbestos abatement at the district's middle school and the removal of a previously unknown oil tank at the transportation facility, which resulted in remediation costs mandated by the state's Department of Conservation.

With the school receiving \$4.9 million in EXCEL aid (Expanding our Children's Education and Learning) from the state, the board of education voted to use some of the funds to finish the capital project so that there will be "little or no local tax impact."

Voters in October of 2007 originally decided to use the \$4.9 million to construct an additional wing at the new Eagle Elementary School for full-day kindergarten classes, as well as other projects. On the recommendation of Tebbano, the board of education voted to use the EXCEL money to finish the new kindergarten wing and the 2003 capital construction projects.

But as a result, some of the projects to be paid for by the EXCEL aid will have to be deferred, according to the district, most notably replacing the bleachers in the high school's Gym B and replacing asbestos floor tiles around the district are projects that will be put on hold.

Board of Education President James Lytle said the move was necessary.

"Revising our capital construction

priorities was necessary, and the decision to defer some of the EXCEL projects so that all of the high priority work planned in 2003 can be completed was the most prudent course of action," Lytle said. "The building project has led to safe and modern learning environments across the district that are outfitted with technology suitable for 21st century learning. This commitment is both an asset to our students and a credit to our community."

At the Wednesday, Aug. 13, board of education meeting, Tebbano assured the public that the 2003 capital construction plan will be completed without adding to the district's tax rate and that a full-day kindergarten wing will be built at Eagle Elementary on schedule.

Included in the 2003 building project, the last two school buildings to undergo renovations, Elsmere and Slingerlands, are under construction this summer and also near completion. The wetlands remediation and high school athletic field expansions are also ongoing, according to the district.

Eagle Elementary School will have a ribbon-cutting ceremony on Tuesday, Sept. 2, at 7 p.m., the day before classes begin. The new elementary school is located at 27 Van Dyke Road, directly across the street from the district's high school.

The public is invited to attend the ceremony, and tours will be available.

New Scotland weighs building guidelines

Advisory panel considers mixed-use zone and building size cap

The New Scotland commercial zone advisory committee presented the Town Board with a progress report at the Wednesday, Aug. 14, meeting and suggested a moratorium extension might be necessary.

The committee outlined some of its proposed guidelines, including the desire for a mixed-use overlay zone, which would allow for some residential development while preventing commercial establishments with a "regional draw." The committee also stressed a need for a cap on commercial building size and having provisions that provide leniency

for exceeding the cap. It has not, however, agreed on a building size cap itself.

New Scotland currently has a moratorium on commercial development, meaning no new commercial buildings over 30,000 square feet can be constructed until the moratorium expires on Nov. 21.

The moratorium was put in place in response to public outcry against the proposed \$4 million development of a 179-acre plot of land known as the Bender melon farm. Sphere Development LLC, a company based near Syracuse, had plans to develop the land owned by MLF Enterprises, but the Town Board decided to place a moratorium on large commercial developments until the town could study the comprehensive plan.

The advisory committee has been charged with overhauling the commercial zoning regulations to better fit with the "comprehensive plan," set forth by the town.

The "comprehensive plan" lays out the overall vision as to how New Scotland should be zoned.

"Everyone seems to be content with our progress," said John Biscone, one of the advisory committee members.

Biscone said the advisory committee will most likely be finished with its final recommendations for meshing the zoning regulations and the comprehensive plan within the next two months, however the Town Board might need additional time to review those recommendations, extending past the end of the moratorium.

"We'll probably be done [with our recommendation] in

60 days," Biscone said.

He said, though, that by the time the Town Board reviews their recommendations and conducts its own public hearings, it could be an additional 60 or 90 days. They then have the option of extending the moratorium or reviewing the committee's recommendation without extending it beyond its deadline.

New Scotland Town Supervisor Tom Dolin said an extension on the moratorium is "50/50" at this point.

"I don't think we'll know until September," he said. "It's a matter of how fast [the advisory committee] gets their report in."

He said he does not expect it will be more than three or four months before the advisory committee makes

their final report and the Town Board conducts its own reviews.

Once the town gets past determining an appropriate building cap, Dolin said, it will have gotten over its biggest challenge.

Bob Prentiss, a resident and former state assemblyman, has been an outspoken critic of the proposed commercial development at the Bender melon farm site. He said he supports the moratorium and careful examination of the zoning laws, as discussed at the meeting.

He also said he hopes New Scotland, after it makes its changes to the zoning laws, does not let the area become overrun with traffic and regional commercial structures.

"Clearly, the comprehensive master plan recommends against 'large, regionally drawing commercial operations,' identifies 'small-scale stores as the preferred type of commercial development,' and allows for mixed-use buildings to meet local residents' needs," he said in a written statement.

He said Crossgates, Glenmont and the Colonie Shopping Plaza are within 10 minutes and can accommodate the large regional commercial needs.

"After reviewing the comprehensive master plan, existing zoning regulations and the Commercial Zone Advisory Committee's Report, I therefore would join with other citizens tonight in supporting at least a 50,000-square-foot building size cap on all retail and wholesale trade," he added.

I envy Cinderella. Not because she got Prince Charming, but because she was comfortable dancing in glass dress pumps. We've all seen the movie and those shoes were NOT slippers. Slippers do not have heels.

OK, so she got the shoes from her Fairy Godmother, which explains the perfect fit, but what about the comfort?

Cinderella is not alone. I see women walking, dancing and even running in all sorts of heeled footwear. I don't know how they do it.

Even my "high-heeled" wedding shoes only sported a 1-inch heel. And I had a pair of lacy white sneakers on stand-by for the reception.

Forget high heels. I can't walk in them anymore. I'm not sure I ever really could, but I did wear them in my youth. I had a pair of dyed-purple open-toe strappy high heels that I wore as a bridesmaid at my brother's wedding and later to my prom. Twenty years later I strapped them on for a friend's wedding, teetered to my seat during the ceremony, and then had to walk barefoot back to the car before driving to the

reception. Those shoes are now retired.

I'm so short that heels don't even make me look taller. If I'm short even in heels, why bother?

Bottom line: I like shoes, but my feet do not. Well, my left foot is happy wearing most any shoe, but my right foot is picky, picky, picky. I used to think it was because my right foot was wider than my left. Shoes always feel tighter on my right foot.

But a podiatrist told me my right foot isn't wider, but it does have a higher arch and thus pushes up against the shoe differently than my left foot. That would have been helpful to know years ago, since I'm always looking for shoes with extra arch support. Who knew that my right foot was plenty arched? All those years I was "overarching" my foot and causing it to feel even more squeezed.

I always go shoe shopping when I'm exhausted. It adds to the suspense. Also, experts

recommend shopping for shoes later in the day when your feet are more swollen. It's a better example of how the shoe will feel when your feet are at their worst.

Last week, my daughter and I embarked on our annual search to find her black flats. All she needed was a basic shoe that would meet the requirement for school concerts and for "dress-up" events.

We were in one of those "mountain-o-shoes" stores.

You know the kind. The place is filled with piles of shoeboxes containing every size shoe except the size you wear. A sample shoe in the size Barbie wears is located above each stack of shoeboxes.

Gone are the days of waiting on a cushioned chair while the salesperson disappears to the back room and returns with two or three pairs of shoes for you to try on. Even some of the department stores have gone the do-it-yourself way.

In some ways it's better. You don't have to wait for the salesperson to finish with

another customer. You don't have a salesperson lurking around asking, "How does it feel?"

On the other hand, it's unfortunate that no one but you cares how the shoe feels or if it's the right size.

When Rachel was very young I liked going to the Stride Rite store. The salespeople would measure her feet and help us make an informed choice about what size to buy.

Once we started buying

while she dons the store-supplied disposable nylon peds and begins trying on shoes.

Several pairs are too tight in the toe area, but too loose in the heel.

Many pairs are dismissed on sight, "No, mother, those are horrendous," my 12-year-old tells me over and over.

What if only the horrendous shoes fit? Would it be so bad if the on-sale horrendous shoes fit?

Discouraged, she says, "Can I try on some sneakers now?"

"You already have sneakers," I say.

"Yeah, but I only have one pair."

"Yeah, but you have no black flats."

Over a two-day period she tries on enough shoes to cover the feet of every child in a small country. She even tries on shoes previously rejected as horrendous, including ones with a "funny buckle." And still no luck.

I have great sympathy for her because I too struggle to find comfortable shoes.

My husband doesn't have these issues. He says, "I don't even pick a shoe up off the shelf if I don't like the way it looks." If the store has the shoes in his size, which they always do, then the shoes fit. He's never had a problem with a pair of shoes "not feeling right." On rare occasions his regular size will be too tight and then the next size up works.

How nice for him.

As for my daughter and I, now that we've climbed every mountain-o-shoes, we'll need to seek out one of those rare shoe stores where the staff people help you find a shoe that fits. Then we'll be ready to go out and have a ball.

Bottom line: I like shoes, but my feet do not. Well, my left foot is happy wearing most any shoe, but my right foot is picky, picky, picky.

Rachel's shoes in department stores, I always made my husband determine whether the shoes fit. He would have her stand up and he'd press his thumb down in the toe area. He'd say, "Yup, there's room here, no not too much, a good amount."

I didn't want to be responsible for making the determination. How should I know if her shoes fit? How much is the "right" amount of room between her big toe and the edge of the shoe? How do I know for sure that I'm pressing down on the right spot?

My shoe evaluation consisted of questions and commands: How do they feel? Jump up and down. Are your toes near the edge? Go for a walk. Now run. Are the shoes still on your feet? (If your child runs out of the shoes, this is an indication that the size is too large.)

That was back in the day when all we needed to buy her were sneakers.

"Now we need to find black flats."

It seems like such a simple task.

I hold her stinky socks

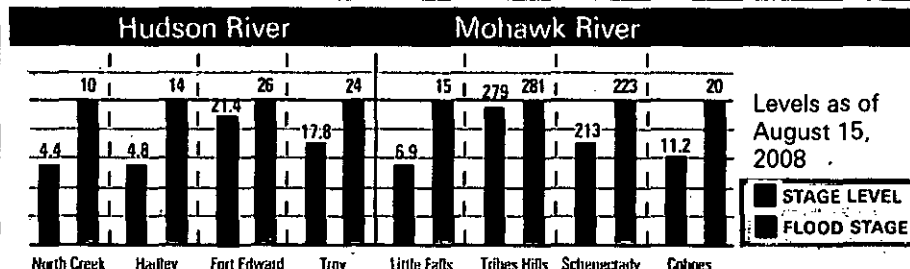

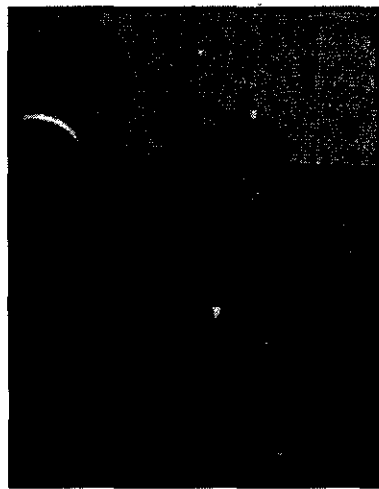
Although the Bethlehem police are retaining the same number of officers in the department, there's one new face and a handful of new promotions, including the town's first female police sergeant.

The police department held a swearing-in ceremony at Town Hall on Monday morning, Aug. 18, for its newest police officer Michael Malatino and the promotions of his fellow officers.

Several members of the Bethlehem Police Department joined town officials and residents to commemorate the event.

Kyle Kotary; and former town supervisor, Teresa Egan.

"We're very proud of your accomplishments," Cunningham told the officers, who were surrounded by friends and family at the Town Hall auditorium. "This is a big milestone in the town of Bethlehem, because Gina will be our first female sergeant."

As for new officer Malatino, Cunningham said, "He comes to us from Rensselaer with a good record, and we're looking for good things from him."

Malatino is a five-year veteran of the city of Rensselaer Police Department, and he will be assigned to the patrol division. Malatino's father pinned on his badge and his mother held the Bible during his swearing-in.

Corsi told *Spotlight Newspapers* on Friday, Aug. 15, about the three officers being promoted.

A new age of voting

Conventional wisdom has it that youth and, possibly until recently, the ability to vote, is wasted on the young.

Young people tended to be the first group cut from pollsters' target lists of potential voters. Seniors have always been seen as America's most dependable voters; they are more likely to vote in all elections and contests on the ballot.

But if recent statistics and, more importantly, political candidates' reactions to those statistics, can be trusted, it's quite possible that we have a young electorate that — gasp — may just possibly care about the future these elected officials will shape for them.

In the 2004 presidential election, younger voters turned out in the highest percentage they had since 1992, and in the third-highest percentage since a constitutional amendment in 1971 lowered the voting age to 18. And while young people currently favor Democrats, most analysts say they are not yet permanently attached to any political party.

Because of numbers like this, political parties and campaigns this year are lavishing attention on a new generation of young voters. They are studying ways to use new technology and promoting legislation geared toward young people's interests. In the race for the 21st Congressional District, only two out of the seven remaining candidates are not using social networking sites like Facebook or MySpace to reach out to voters. For their part, the two that don't use Facebook — one Republican, one Democrat — do have Web sites.

While most people are focused on the exposure of our young men and women to the unbridled information that the Web can deliver, politicians have discovered the flipside of that exchange: a heretofore unseen level of influence that the younger generation has on our society.

If a young voter has Internet access, cable TV and a cell phone (and what self-respecting 18-to-34-year-old doesn't have all of these things and more), they are not only able to take in the messages that politicians are sending, they are also able to disseminate it at an alarming rate.

In this sense, politicians have gained an incredible tool for marketing their platforms. We can only hope that our younger voters realize the vital role they play in the electoral process and use that power to affect the change they want. In short, to take advantage of the politicians that so want to take advantage of them.

Becoming an aunt, without being an aunt

This is the story of a baby, a title and some tears.

Before I get to the drama, perhaps I should give you a little history.

My boyfriend, Jon, and I have been dating just shy of a year now, and in terms legitimacy, I would say he's my first serious boyfriend.

Less than a month after Jon and I started dating, he told me he would be part of his big sister's wedding in a few weeks. I did not attend the wedding, but in the weeks preceding it, I could tell what a monumental moment this was, in not only her life, but in his as well.

A few weeks after that, an even bigger moment arose when he received a call from his sister, that I knew would change his life forever. For the first time, he was going to be an uncle.

At the time, I must say, this news didn't mean nearly as much to me as it does now. Don't get me wrong, I was definitely excited for him, but less than a month after a couple is dating, you can't possibly be completely sure that the birth of your boyfriend's niece is going to necessarily mean the birth of your niece.

Basically, my excitement was somewhat slowed by the newness of our relationship, and as time went on, I would have to see what the baby would mean to me.

Throughout his sister's pregnancy, I did stay updated, constantly asking how she was doing and how the baby was doing. And then came a day when I got exceptionally excited. The day she found out it was going to be a girl.

We could go to the mall together! She could share my makeup and shoes! I could send her all my hand-me-down clothes! Braid her hair! Gossip about boys!

Hold on, Ariana. You're not her real aunt.

About seven months into Carolyn's pregnancy, and about eight months into my relationship, I told Jon a story of a young lady named Jackie.

When I was a girl, and would see my own aunts and uncles somewhat infrequently, I remember only one girlfriend of my mother's youngest brother. Her name was Jackie. I don't remember how old I was when I met Jackie, but certain things about her seem to have stuck.

I remember her long, brown, spiraled curly hair, and the grey T-shirt she was wearing when I met her. I remember her playing games with me and sitting next to me when we ate dinner.

It might have been where I met Jackie that made me originally think she was going to be my aunt. My grandparents' house always had "family" associated with it, and any two people who were under its roof were automatically married in my mind. But Jackie and my uncle, Michael, were not. And I guess that's the point.

It may have been only one time that I met Jackie. It may have been two or three. But no matter how many times we crossed paths, she never became my aunt. Wendy became my aunt when my uncle married her. So what ever happened to Jackie?

I told Jon this story for a reason. To this baby, I was either going to be Aunt Wendy, or I was going to be Jackie.

I wasn't asking for any extra commitment. I was just trying to make him understand that by getting involved, should he ever chose to be uninvolved with me, I could become nothing but a distant memory to the baby later on. That thought stuck with me until the day Kendall was born.

At around midnight on Tuesday, Aug. 11, Jon got the first call that his sister was going to the hospital. We had talked about how he was going to go there, regardless of whether he was at work or home, and that I would be going, too.

On Tuesday morning, he said he would probably be going around lunchtime and that I didn't need to go if I didn't want to because I also would be at work.

I told him I was going, and that was that. I offered to bring doughnuts to his family, who had been waiting all night.

I got there, the first time, around noon, and waited with his family for nearly two hours. Two hours later, still no baby.

By the time I was leaving work, his sister was about to go in for a cesarean section, and the baby was expected to be screaming her little head off not more than 15 minutes later. So, I went back to the hospital.

Forty-five minutes later, still no baby.

What are you so anxious about, Ariana? This isn't even your niece!

By 5:45, Jon's entire family was blockading the glass doors in front of the delivery section of the hospital which all doctors, and babies' fathers would have to pass through, impatiently waiting for any word on the status of mommy and baby.

And when Jon's brother-in-law came strolling through the doors, words can't describe the jitters everyone, including myself, had.

Raising both thumbs up, he said, "It's good!" ... and the tears started streaming.

Maybe it was the fact that it was their first grandchild, combined with the relief of not having to wait any longer. But whatever it was, the look on Jon's parents' faces when they saw those two thumbs up was a moment that changed my life forever. Never, in a single moment, have I seen happiness such as that.

Returning to the waiting room for a moment of rest, Jon's own aunts began hugging one another, and then everyone else in the room. And then his mom approached him.

Hugging her son, she congratulated him on becoming, for the very first time, an uncle. And when she hugged me next, she said something that I was not expecting to hear.

"You're an auntie!"

Walking to the parking lot, of course after ogling the baby in the nursery for another hour, Jon mentioned how his mother referred to me as Kendall's aunt, and I couldn't help but question: Am I, or aren't I?

While I may not be Kendall's official aunt — yet — I sure felt like I was.

But regardless of whether I was or wasn't, in that moment, I didn't need to be either.

Whether I do turn out to be a Jackie, or a Wendy, what mattered was that I was there, and to be a part of something like that is something even a non-aunt could be completely content with.

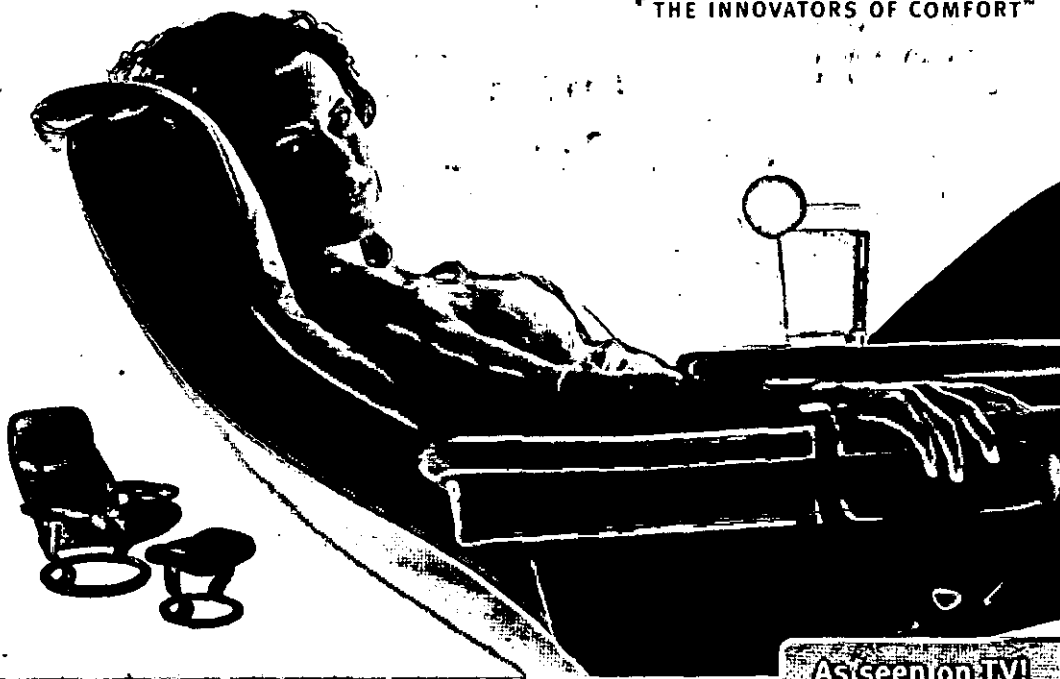

Henry Hudson celebration off by more than just a few miles

Editor, *The Spotlight*:

The Town of Bethlehem is preparing to celebrate the Henry Hudson quadricentennial. The state's Hudson-Fulton Champlain committee has encouraged localities to observe the sweep of four centuries, not just the one moment. Certainly Bethlehem has had a long and distinguished history, as chronicled in the bicentennial book, "Bethlehem Revisited," and in the many publications of former Town Historian Allison Bennett.

But I see in the Aug. 6 *Spotlight* (Town prepares for quadricentennial) a statement by the present town historian that "We

are very excited to commemorate Henry Hudson's September 1609 arrival in what was to become the town of Bethlehem."

This despite the fact that after a similar statement of hers was published, I wrote to her that this never happened: Hudson sailed past Bethlehem without stopping.

This "visit by Hudson" is not even an old folk tale, but rather the creation of former Town Historian Ed Mulligan (a political appointment if ever there was one), although several real historians showed him the evidence to the contrary. He even bamboozled the Town Board into erecting that silly monument to the non-event that sits in Henry Hudson Park, where it makes the town government and citizenry look like uninformed yokels. The present town "historian" seems to prefer

this kind of stuff to history. And she is hardly alone: when I pointed out at a meeting of the Town's Quadricentennial Committee that the nearest landing by members of Hudson's crew was at either Green Island or Troy (we don't know on which side of the river they set foot), the response I got from an appointed member of the board was, "What's a few miles?"

If you do not see any actual historian involved in the quadricentennial celebration it will be because neither the committee nor the town historian are interested in promoting Bethlehem's history. No true historian will want his or her reputation compromised by association with what can only be termed deliberate fraud.

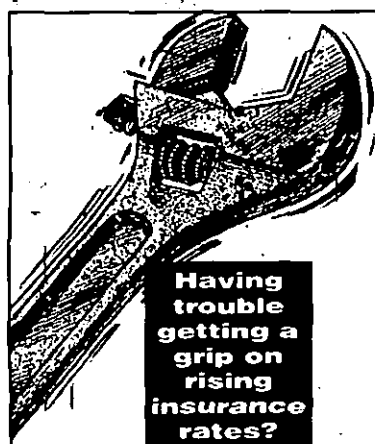

Schools announce reduced meal prices

In recognition that children need healthy meals to learn, Bethlehem Central announced its reduced meal costs through the 2009 school year.

Currently, breakfast costs \$1 at the elementary and middle school level and lunch costs \$1.75 at the elementary, middle school and high school level. Children from households that meet federal income guidelines are eligible for free meals or reduced-price meals.

Reduced-price meals cost 25 cents for lunch and 25 cents for breakfast.

To apply for free or reduced price meals, submit a direct certification letter from the state Office of Temporary and Disability Assistance or complete an application from the

school district, sign it and return it to the school.

The application can be found on the district's Web site, http://bcsd.k12.ny.us/foodservices/FAR_0809.htm.

For those who receive food stamps, Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) for any children in the household, or participate in the Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR), the application must include the child's name, the household food stamp, TANF or FDPIR number and the signature of an adult household member.

For applicants who do not list a food stamp, TANF or FDPIR number for all the children for whom they

are applying, the application must include the names of everyone in the household, the amount of income for each household member, and how often it is received and where it comes from.

It must include the signature of an adult household member and that adult's social security number, or the word "none" if the adult does not have a social security number.

Applicants can contact the local Department of Social Services for their food stamp or TANF numbers or complete the income portion of the application.

National database puts library in top 50

Earns ranking for circulation per capita

Last month, Gannett News Service released a searchable database that compares trends in public libraries between 2002 and 2006. Gannett used data from the National Center for Education Statistics (NCES) and numbers collected from libraries' state reports.

Among other things, the database provides a list of public libraries serving populations of 10,000 or more that have the highest circulation per capita. In a field of approximately 9,200 library systems across the country, Bethlehem Public Library ranks in the top 50.

The report also revealed that library visits in the U.S. increased by roughly 10 percent from 2002 to 2006, and that circulation of materials rose by 9 percent overall.

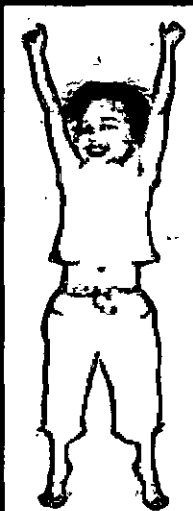

Krisson said he buys soda and water at grocery stores or convenience stores and sells them for a profit. He sets up his wares about three or four days a week along the East Avenue strip and thinks he'll make \$1,000 by the end of the meet. He's saving for a go-kart.

Many of Krisson's best clients are his neighbors, he says, but he also said he has regular customers who seem to follow the same ritual everyday.

The young salesmen on the strip have a certain appeal to families who stop and buy sodas from the boys as if they are little kids running a lemonade stand. But one gets a sense that some of these soda salesmen are more like used car dealers:

Fifteen-year-old Nicholas Byrne, of Saratoga Springs, has dealt drinks on the strip since he was 10. His coveted spot on the corner of East and Union Avenues makes him the area's top salesman. He brings in more than \$100 per day. Byrne also sells souvenirs and has a crew of his friends work for him.

"It really varies day to day with the weather, but I made \$400 my first summer, which wasn't bad for a 10-year-old, and I'm doing a lot better than that now," said Byrne.

"We just pick the horses by their numbers and make \$2 bets. Then we go to the rail to watch them race. The kids like that."

Byrne said he's had a good morning. It's Monday, Aug. 4, and its one of the first days of the meet where rain isn't likely. It's a sunny 75 degrees and the general admission crowd continues to pour in. Most in the crowd are oblivious to the induction festivities going on across the street. They have one thing in mind: get in the gates and find a place to plop down their lawn chairs. If they're lucky, they might find a picnic table, but only because it's a Monday. On the weekends, families arrive as early as 6 a.m. to put down their tablecloths and stake out a spot.

These general admission folk, who pay \$3 a piece to enter the racing grounds, drag rolling coolers full of cold drinks. A preponderance of the men wear polo shirts with cargo shorts. Some of them smoke cigars. The women are harder to stereotype. Some dress up in sun dresses and topped with the broad-brimmed hats that are part of an iconic Saratoga style. Others simply wear a T-shirt and shorts. A number of them sport "Saratoga" T-shirts that were given away free with admission during previous seasons.

Most of these people chase a dream. They buy tip sheets and The Daily Racing Form and spend an hour or two before the 1 p.m. post time to make their decisions.

When the crowds cross Union Avenue and approach the gates of the track, they are swarmed by the tipsters who make their sales pitches.

Zack Chapman, 20, of South

Glens Falls, sells "The Edge," which is touted as Saratoga's only local tip sheet, a claim that may or may not hold true.

Chapman said he and his cohorts, mostly college-aged kids wearing bright yellow T-shirts and money belts sell a combined 200 sheets per day for \$2 to \$5. Picks from "The Edge" use a computer program, which compiles previous performances and workouts to determine which horses are most likely to cross the finish line first.

"We're the only sheet that's honest about how we've done the day before," says Chapman, who's in his second summer as a salesman for the paper. "It's been around for 30 years."

Chapman said he only knows his boss by the name Jim the Edge. Mr. the Edge serves as handicapper, owner and sales team supervisor. Chapman said his boss sells his sheets inside the gates, just outside the clubhouse.

"The Edge" isn't the only track character with a nickname. "Brother John," who looks like a long-lost member of the band ZZ Top with his white beard, dark sunglasses and leather jacket also sells a tip sheet for \$2.50.

Brother John, 60, says his sheet, "The Jewel" is based on a book he's writing about a woman with the ability to travel in time. John's original artwork of the woman, named Jewel, graces the cover of the tip sheet.

But John doesn't insist that his picks are the culmination of supernatural visions.

"I make my picks using The Daily Racing Form, I just use the psychic thing to get people interested," said John. "I don't make much money off of this, but I use it to promote my art."

Asked if his picks were successful after a few races, John points to his picks in the first race — he'd picked the trifecta.

Some regular gamblers though, aren't quick to spend money on tip sheets.

"I'd say it's about 10 percent statistical and then 90 percent what the horse looks like in the paddock," says Joe Esola, who's barely missed a day of Saratoga racing in 40 years.

Esola, who also goes by "California Joe" and "Handicapper Joe" follows tracks all over the

country and teaches handicapping classes in Florida.

Esola, who now calls Upstate New York home, also runs a part-time contracting company called Post Time Construction to help pay for his gambling losses.

He says he puts about \$10 down on each race and that he always looks to the paddock area before placing his bet. It's the paddock area where the horses and their owners are paraded in front of the general admission crowd before making their way onto the main track.

"I like to make sure their ankles aren't taped up, that their head is up and that and they aren't foaming or all worked up,"

developments change, the places tend to change, too. Yeah, we're making a difference because we are breaking up the parties we find, but we encourage people to call."

Heffernan said the police rely on the community to help contain underage drinking.

"That's why we ask for the support of the residents and we encourage tips," Heffernan said. "If you see something, if you hear about a party or if you see lots of cars parked and kids heading into the woods with backpacks, call us. Don't wait until the next day."

Besides being illegal, and the obvious health and personal risks involved with underage drinking parties, Heffernan points out that there is also a safety risk for both police and teenagers that many overlook.

"It's hit or miss for the known spots we patrol, but when we do discover something, in most cases the kids run, which is another concern," Heffernan said. "It's dark, and running through the woods at night can be dangerous for my officers and the kids."

Especially if one is intoxicated, Heffernan said, adding that the situation is made even more dangerous because most of the party areas found by police are located near power lines and waterways.

Another problem police have is being able to make an arrest and charge a minor for underage drinking depending on where the party is taking place. In the Haswell Farm situation, the party spot is located on National Grid property.

Heffernan said the depart-

says Joe, who claimed to have been down a total of \$6 since the start of this year's meet.

Some in attendance don't bet at all. There are plenty of family activities at the track ranging from a kid's area to musical entertainment to a variety of food stands, including the new Restaurant Row, which features a number of downtown's most famous restaurants.

And other bettors aren't nearly as technical when making their picks.

Amateur bettors might bet on a name they like, or on the color of a jockey's silks. Others simply play the odds.

Like Handicapper Joe, Lor-

ment has to contact the business or corporation that owns the land to ask whether they want to press charges or not.

"I can't speak for them, but a lot of times [corporations] don't. It kind of depends on what actually takes place," Heffernan said. "If there's damage to their property, they are more likely."

Private landowners, especially farmers in more rural parts of town, are more likely to press charges, Heffernan said.

"We have had calls from some of the local farmers," Heffernan said. The large tracts of wooded land and open fields owned by farmers make for attractive party locations that are out of the public's eye but still relatively close to home, he said.

Some farmers have made complaints that debris, especially aluminum cans and glass, are thrown in fields that are used to grow hay and other crops and can be harmful to livestock, resulting in thousands of dollars in damage if an animal is killed or becomes sick.

Heffernan said police once again rely on the public's help in the problem because they are more likely to make an arrest when the underage party is held outdoors.

"It's different when it's indoors because we can't just barge into people's homes," Heffernan said. "When it's outside it's different. If we can observe something going on, then we can do something about it."

Heffernan said there are volunteer programs set up to combat home parties such as "Parents Who Host, Lose the Most," as well as a new law being considered by the Albany County Legislature that would charge parents for even knowing about

rairie Christman has been coming to the track for 40 years. But unlike the professional gambler, Christman comes once a year, making the trip from her New Jersey home, to spend the day with her family. Christman, her daughter and three small grandchildren sit in the picnic area under the shade of a tall tree.

The children hold crayons and coloring books while Christman digs into a cooler for a snack.

"We just pick the horses by their numbers and make \$2 bets," she said. "Then we go to the rail to watch them race. The kids like that."

A number of the picnickers and folding-chair general admissioners head to "the rail" just before each race to catch a glimpse of the horses as they come down the stretch and near the finish line.

As the horses come across the finish line in the day's third race, one young cargo-shorts wearing man, Chad Pinkowski, of Kinderhook, let out a great wail of exuberant proportions. Along with his wail, Pinkowski pumped his arm into the air, raising his can of Bud Light high above the crowd.

He'd hit the trifecta, picking the first, second and third horse in exact order.

Pinkowski says he and his wife, Cassidy, go to the track once or twice a year, but rarely win. This year, he's already made two visits to the track and says he's been surprisingly lucky.

His \$2 bet won him \$33.40. And his dream, like the dreams of the other lucky attendees, lived on for another race.

minors consuming alcohol on their property.

Currently parents can only be charged if they are found to be serving alcohol to minors. Heffernan said teenagers caught drinking are usually charged with possession of alcohol by a person under the age of 21, an infraction. They are released on an appearance ticket to appear in town court after they are processed.

Bethlehem Police Chief Louis Corsi said underage drinking at certain spots is a problem that has continued over the years despite the department and the community's efforts.

"We deal with this issue every year," Corsi said. "We have a family services unit that specifically deals with this."

The Bethlehem Police use their school resource officers, who work in the Bethlehem School District, and DARE officers to help educate students and the public about underage drinking, as well as combat the problem head-on by investigating drinking parties.

During the summer months, when school is out, the Bethlehem police send their resource officers on special assignments to check on active party spots and look for new ones.

Bethlehem police also routinely stage "stings" at area businesses, according to Heffernan, by sending in a minor to purchase alcohol and seeing if they asked for identification.

However, education is the best tool to address the problem, according to Heffernan and Corsi.

"It's a challenge for us," Heffernan said. "We've been doing this for years, and it takes a lot of time and manpower."

21st Candidates debate health care

Five of the seven congressional candidates for the 21st District looking to replace retiring Congressman Michael McNulty came out to discuss health care issues in what can only be described as a spirited and, at times, tense debate.

The Capital District Alliance

for Universal Healthcare Inc. (CDAUH) sponsored the debate and co-sponsors included Social Responsibilities Council of FUUSA and the Hunger Action Network of New York State.

The debate lasted for about two hours and although some of the discussion deviated from the topic at hand, the debate centered on health care issues and allowed each candidate ample time to share their views.

Democratic candidate Darius Shahinfar and Republican candidate James Burmaster were not in attendance at the First Unitarian Universalist Society of Albany. Shahinfar could not attend because he was at Albany Medical Center with his wife who was giving birth to their second child, Ava Kathryn.

Burmaster was not in attendance because of his obligations as a member of the Schenectady

County Legislature. He was attending a public hearing on the Schenectady County Community College budget and a meeting of the county legislature at the time.

Candidate and Coeymans Democrat Tracey Brooks spoke first; followed by a prepared statement from Albany Democrat Shahinfar; Colonie Democrat Phil Steck; Albany Democrat Joseph Sullivan; Amsterdam Democrat Paul Tonko; and Saratoga Republican Steven Vasquez.

Each candidate was given an equal opportunity to introduce himself or herself and highlight their views, and then asked a round of questions selected by the sponsors of the debate. The final half hour of the debate was reserved for questions from the crowd.

Although the debate began in high spirits and intermittent laughter, it quickly turned serious and even contentious at times.

The main point of difference between all the candidates during the debate was whether they supported single-payer health coverage. When asked yes or no for House Resolution 676, which would give universal health care with single-payer financing, the five candidates had different reasons, but responded as follows:

Brooks: yes; Steck: yes; Sullivan: no; Tonko: yes; Vasquez: no.

Shahinfar was not able to answer the direct question, but in his statement said he would not accept government funded health care coverage if elected to congress, stating, "As Americans dig deeper into their pockets to make ends meet, I cannot, in good conscience, take more money out of their pockets for my own healthcare until an affordable healthcare plan is created which covers everyone."

Brooks told the audience that every American should be entitled to the same health care as Congress members and touted her experience working with health care facilities as an aide for Senator Hillary Clinton as well as her work on Medicare wages and child health care with outgoing Congressman Michael McNulty.

After explaining what single-payer health care was, Steck said the system should work

how Medicare (elderly health care) was originally supposed to operate. Steck questioned not whether or not the nation should have a single-payer health care system, but why it wasn't already in place.

He was the first candidate in the debate to specifically name and take a shot at his opponents, saying that Brooks worked for a lobbying firm and that Tonko has taken money from health insurance companies.

Sullivan, a self-proclaimed "conservative Democrat" and former Republican who's controversial answers appeared the most out of line with his fellow Democrats, elicited the biggest reaction from the crowd throughout the night.

Sullivan said he was against the single-payer plan, saying he is on Medicare and wasn't "particularly happy with it," and that the government couldn't be trusted to functionally run anything, and that he wouldn't support any measure that would raise taxes.

In America, he said, you don't "force" people to do things, and that people need to be responsible and take better care of themselves. He also said he didn't want to see the government paying for abortions or "the death of infants."

Tonko cited his involvement with Timothy's Law, which addresses insurance policy limits, while serving in the state Assembly and that the issue of health care would need dialogue and investment "from all of us." The former NYSEDA president focused on the consolidation savings of a universal health care system, stating that administration costs, accounting for 35 percent of health care bills, are what plague our current system.

Tonko asked people to look at the whole picture.

Vasquez said the single-payer plan could never work when the government routinely raids taxpayer money to balance its budget, and described HMO's as "government funded monopolies."

He supports House Resolution 6110, which would give everyone a \$5,000 tax credit to purchase insurance from other states and get prescription drugs from Canada at much cheaper rates.

piloted their own dinghy to the sailboat," wrote the family on a tribute Web site. "Both Dan and Nancy were prodded in the chest with the machetes as the assailants demanded U.S. dollars and the access to either the sailboat or dinghy."

A conflict ensued after the four men were given money and Dan Dryden reportedly grabbed a machete and "fought to his death." The family reports that Nancy Dryden was held in a separate compartment on the boat and eventually radioed for help after the attackers left.

She was transported to the hospital with chest wounds that resulted in a collapsed lung. His wife, Nancy, is alive and recovering in a Guatemalan hospital but wants to go home as soon as possible, according to the family. Nancy Dryden was also a Bethlehem alumna, class of '59, and former Glenmont resident. The couple had recently retired and had spent the last six months sailing. The Drydens moved to Alaska in the 1960s, but would come back to New York from time to time.

The Dryden's three children, Jessica, Daniel and Brian, were reunited with their mother in Guatemala on Tuesday, Aug. 12. On Friday, Aug. 15, officials an-

nounced that two brothers were taken into custody in Guatemala in connection with the murder.

Rick Dryden, who graduated from Bethlehem in 1965 and now lives in Syracuse, said his brother, Dan, had just bought the sailboat he was killed on, and was anchored in the middle of the Guatemalan lake to work on his engine when he and wife were attacked.

Even though Dan and Nancy Dryden were both Bethlehem graduates, they had met in England and were both experienced sailors.

"During the 1970s he bought a sailboat in England and that's where he met his wife," said Rick Dryden. "They spent a number of years on that boat and they had a lot of sailing experience behind them."

"Dan was a very practical and worldly individual," Rick Dryden said of his late brother. "I would say he was a good example of a Renaissance man. ... He was an excellent horseman, he loved trekking over the mountains of Alaska and downhill skiing, which he did with his family and friends on a regular basis."

Dan Dryden was also involved with the Native American community as well as town government in his Alaskan home, according to his brother.

Rick Dryden said his presence and inspiration will be missed.

"He had that kind of charisma about him to encourage people to go beyond their comfortable limits. ... He inspired a lot of people because of the natural enthusiasm he had for life," Rick Dryden said. "It's been difficult for all of us. Nancy's family and myself and my daughter are all very close."

Dan Dryden inspired others in the Bethlehem community, too.

"I loved Dan, he was great. I lived near the Dryden Farm in the '80s," said Bethlehem photographer Joann Hoose. "He was the type of person who was there for you. They were really interesting people and such adventurers. The man was just amazing."

Hoose said whenever Dan Dryden would come to the farm, his sense of adventure would undoubtedly follow him.

"He would come home and just jump on the wildest horse on the farm. ... He was just in complete control of his universe" Hoose said. "It's very sad that he's not going to be here anymore."

Dan Dryden's travels haven't ended just yet, according to his brother.

"Nancy can't leave [Guatemala] for a couple of weeks at least," Rick Dryden said, "but I do believe Nancy's desire is to bring his ashes back to Alaska ... back home."

School of debt: how to financially survive graduate school

On average, today's college undergraduate leaves school with \$20,000 of student loan and credit card debt. For those who go on to graduate school, the debt load rises to \$42,000...or more—up to \$125,000 for those who make it through medical school. Short of buying a house, it's easily one of the biggest and arguably the most important investments an individual will ever make.

The question is, is it worth it? If so, can it be more affordable?

In most cases, the answers are yes and yes. In fact, according to the U.S. Census Report, individuals with a master's degree generally earn at least \$10,000 more than

those with just a bachelor's degree. The range varies according to industry with people in professional fields (law and medicine) getting the biggest returns on their investments. However, financial aid is not as readily available for students attending graduate school, so reducing the cost is largely a matter of diligence.

Find the money

You all know Cuba Gooding's line from the hit movie *Jerry Maguire*: "Show me the money, Jerry." Unfortunately, as a graduate student, you're probably your own Jerry and represent your best chance at making grad school more affordable. So if you're going to make it happen, you better know when and where to look, and you better be ready to work. Here's a list of some common ways current graduate school stu-

dents make it—without incurring an astronomical amount of debt.

- **Get hired.** It may seem antithetical, but getting a job prior to beginning graduate school can sometimes be the most cost-effective way to finance your continued education. Why? Because many employers offer tuition reimbursement as a part of their benefits package. Important things to consider when weighing if this option is right for you is the amount of time you will have to commit to work and study, your post-degree obligations to the company (for example, if you leave within a predefined timeframe, will you need to repay the cost of your education?) and minimum grade requirements for continued support. An upside to this option is that you will be advancing your career at two fronts—in the office and in the classroom—which could help you

earn more money and push you up the corporate ladder more quickly.

- **Score an assist.** Graduate assistantships are one of the most common and practical ways students earn money and schools score cheap labor. In fact, experts estimate that nearly half of all students in graduate school have an assistantship. Typically, assistantships include a tuition waiver and a stipend. In return, students teach an undergraduate class, provide research assistance or perform administrative tasks within a university department. Assistantships can be competitive and are usually made at the department level, so the earlier you inquire about your options and lobby on your own behalf, the better your chances of landing a position that aligns with your career interests.

- **Grab the money.** While they may not be as plentiful, grants and scholarships are available to graduate students. Many times, the opportunity for this additional aid is linked directly to the demand of the degree being sought. For example, students in math, science and engineering usually have more aid available to them than students in the arts. The key to securing a scholarship or grant is to start early, work hard and ask for help. In addition to talking with the financial aid office to see what aid is available through the school, go to www.students.gov for a listing of potential scholarships.

Borrow then consolidate

Chances are you will not be able to finance your graduate education 100 percent, which means you will need to borrow money. Perkins Student Loans, Graduate Stafford Loans and PLUS Students Loans are all potential options for bridging the gap between what you can contribute and what remains to be financed. You should also consult your bank about the loan programs they may have available. Online programs such as BorrowSmart (<http://borrowsmart.afford.com>) can also help you identify and select the best financing options for you and your budget.

While you are in school, you should be able to put off having to make payments on your undergraduate loans. However, when you are done with graduate school, you will probably have several loans from both your undergraduate and graduate studies that will need to be repaid, and making minimum payments on each may be difficult to manage. If this is the case, consider consolidating your loans into one monthly payment at the lowest interest rate available.

To decide if consolidation is right for you, here are three steps to follow:

1. **Compile a list of your loans and their details.** You can go online and access the National Student Loan Database (NSLDS) at www.nsls.ed.gov, which is the U.S. Department of Education's central database for financial aid. The NSLDS will have all your loan balances and the interest rates associated with each.

2. **Explore your other options,** such as forbearance or deferment.

In forbearance, borrowers either make lower monthly payments, interest-only payments or temporarily stop making payments. Deferment delays your requirement to make monthly payments.

3. **Calculate how you will repay your consolidated loans.** Once you locate your loans and have evaluated your alternatives, you can use an online calculator to determine a projected repayment schedule. Rates will likely vary from borrower to borrower, but securing a good rate can save you a lot of money in the future.

Nature of a hike, 25 years later

Twenty-five years changes people and places. Both grow up and mature and both show the effects of time and nature. I recently witnessed the aftermath of a place left alone for nearly three decades with my childhood friend Tracey on a long trek in the woods where we used to wander as kids. While the land was changing under Mother Nature's tutelage, we too were changing and branching out. Now both of us and our places were to be reunited.

With no route in mind, we set off to find our "cardboard

valley," "fort," and "the bridge." These names were pretty straightforward, but we would find out that the paths to them were not.

Like most kids growing up in the '70s, our neighborhood was our playground to do with as we wished. Our neighborhood was one of those "young subdivisions." Not all of the land was cleared, and much of it was under some phase of construction and up for grabs as far as we kids were concerned.

Our walks always meant gathering wheat pods in our hands as we strode through fields, woods and streams. And, as Tracey recently reminded me, "Remember when we thought about making bread from that wheat we carried around?" Now we were walking through those same fields, only they weren't filled with wheat, they were filled with knotted, thick, mosquito-infested vegetation.

As usual, Tracey was the first to step into the woods. Neither of us said much, we were 11 years old again. About 5 feet into the woods, I heard, "OK, let's see ... oh man, prickler bushes!" Those things always latched onto her. I didn't seem to get caught in them as much. Even when I was leading the way, it was Tracey who would get attacked by the daggered plants.

After fighting through an hour of impenetrable vegetation, we finally found "cardboard valley." We used to sail into it on old boxes with no fear, even though we know the place was crawling with snakes. As we paused for a minute and gazed upon the valley that was "just as pretty as I remember," as Tracey said, we caught a good whiff of a decomposing something. "I don't remember rotting things down here," I said to her. Funny, we never remember that part.

With one landmark hit and a few missed, our adult minds got rational, and we decided to find our way out. The years hadn't changed our ambition, but our bodies needed lunch. On our way out we passed again through "cardboard valley," and as we turned around, we saw a lone willow standing majestically on top of a hill. It seemed to be a testament to our finding the valley, so we visited it. It was new to our eyes, and we figured it must have been a sapling there on our last walk.

That was a different time, and roaming in such places was almost commonplace. Not so in 2008. For so many reasons, it would now be unheard of to let kids go out and roam like most of us did. On the surface, there seem to be so many limitations now to interacting with nature, but there are still ways to enjoy it.

A great natural area to visit in the town of Bethlehem is Hollyhock Hollow Sanctuary in Selkirk. Visit a nature trail and start creating memories with your children. Bring a notebook on a hike, and pick one or two things to search for. For example, in spring, look for flower buds and listen for birds that were absent during winter. Make a few notes and take a few pictures.

If time doesn't allow for a short trip, put your observations skills to the test by looking for signs of the



changing seasons in your backyard.

Over the following weeks and months, this column will offer suggestions for places to go and activities for all ages to engage in nature.

Although we didn't know it at the time, my friend Tracey and I were gaining insight into how to get through parts of life. Our jaunts helped us look for signs of changing weather, taught us to use natural landmarks, strengthened our sense of direction and gave us goals to achieve. If you were a part of a similar generation and are raising kids now, think of what a great gift you'll be giving them by showing them things about the natural world on a scale accommodating to 2008.

The trails of Hollyhock Hollow are open year-round. Hikes can be anywhere from 10 to 45 minutes long depending on your chosen route, and the difficulty level ranges from very easy to moderate. Directions may be found online at audubonintl.org/programs/asny/htsanctuary.org or by phoning 767-9051.

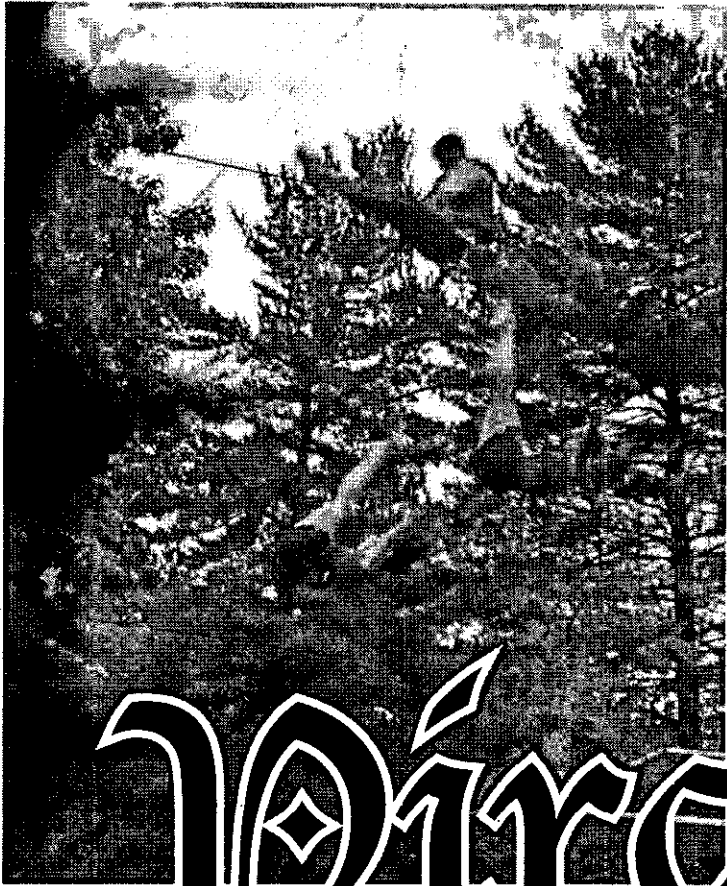

Pirates!

makes a splash at Great Escape

Performance features high-flying stunts of professional divers

With the 2008 Summer Olympic Games currently going on in Beijing, television viewers are getting a chance to see, among other athletes, some of the world's top divers. However, those wowed by those feats need not go halfway around world. They can see the same thing up close and personal, as the Great Escape and Splashwater Kingdom Theme Park in Lake George features one of the premiere diving shows in the entire country. Titled "Pirates!: The Search for the Treasure of the Lost Lagoon," the performance

combines death-defying dives, spectacular stunts, and a load of laughs for some wet-and-wild fun for the whole family. "Pirates!" is a production of Mirage Entertainment, a California-based company specializing in the production of live shows for amusement parks. The show is managed by Eric "Bones" Bohnert, a Minnesota native and long-time diver who began working with the company while living in Germany.

"I started diving when I was about 16 years old, then I started working with a couple of other companies, and then I started with Mirage," said Bohnert. "I started working my way up about six years ago, and now I'm the boss."

Bohnert took over production of the Great Escape's diving show approximately four years ago, and transitioned it into the extremely popular swashbuckling performance it is today. The performance regularly draws huge crowds and was named the top-rated show in all Six Flags theme parks for 2007.

The storyline of "Pirates!" features a group of young sailors under the command of a greedy captain desiring nothing more than the treasure hidden at the bottom of Lake George. What follows are some stunning high dives from a troupe that has included

divers from all over the world, as well as some circus acts and some crowd interaction as the performers douse the first five rows with water. The show climaxes with an incredible dive from Bohnert while engulfed in flames, as well as an enormous high dive by Kirby Mattocks from the very top of the ship's mast.

Mattocks, originally from St. Peter, Minn., had been high-diving for over a year when he received a call from Bohnert.

"Bones called me up one day and had me come here to do this show, and I'm definitely

happy with the switch," he said.

The performance also features several area divers, including Ian Hogan, going into his senior year at Ballston Spa High School.

"I love it... it's fun entertaining, it's fun making people laugh, it's good experience to be in front of huge crowds," said Hogan.

In addition, the show will go on the road later this year at the conclusion of the Great Escape's 2008 season, as much of the "Pirates!" crew will be heading to perform overseas in China. "I'm really excited for it" said Mattocks. "I love traveling, and it'll be a great experience."

"Pirates!: The Treasure of the Lost Lagoon" has multiple shows every day at the Great Escape and Splashwater Kingdom. For show times, contact the park office at 792-3500.

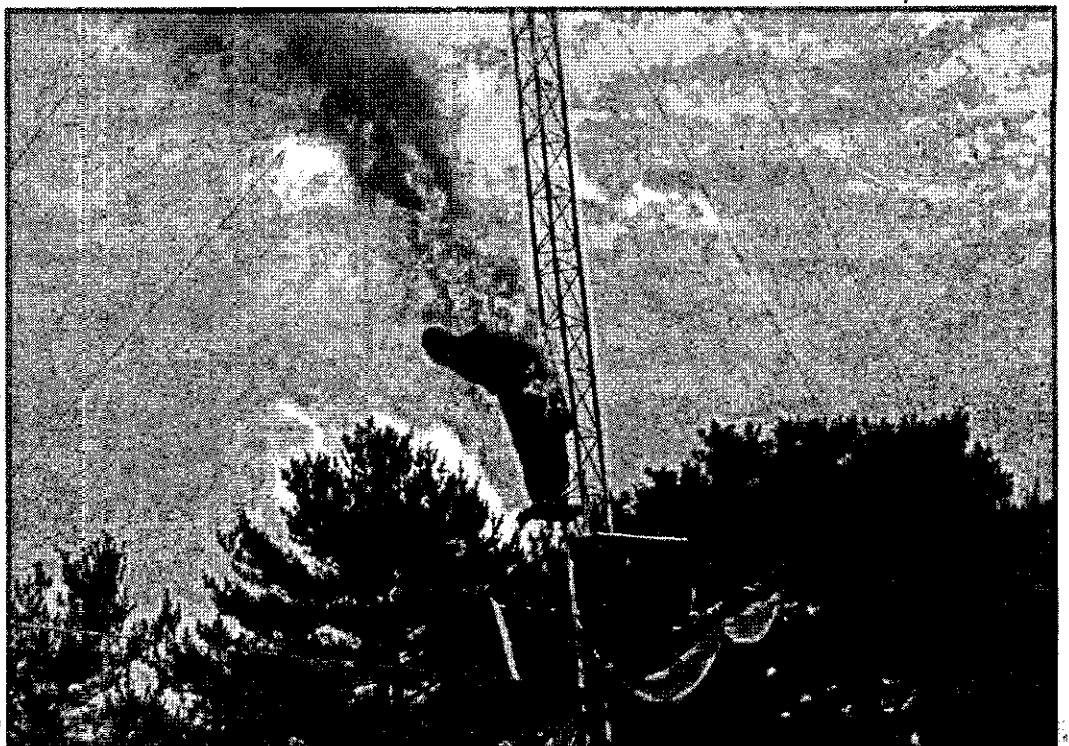

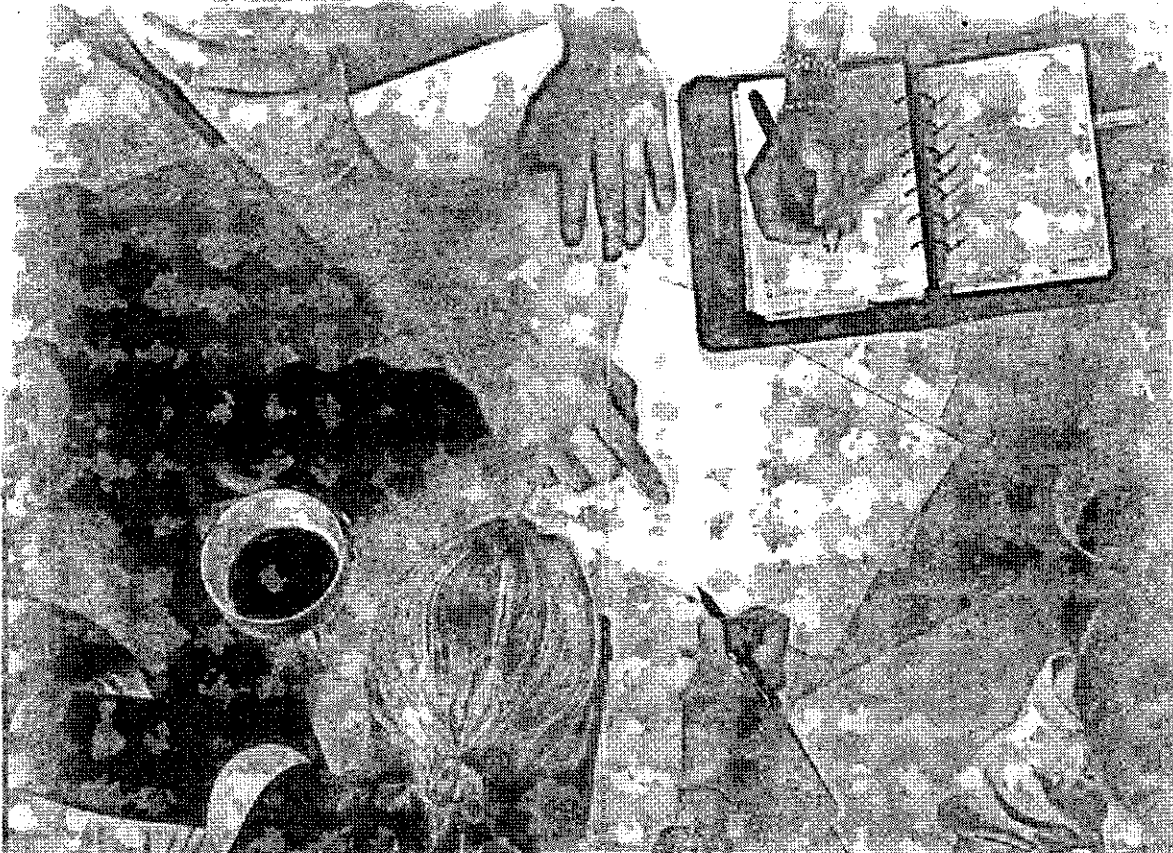

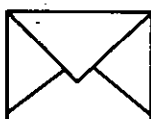

Kanuk joins national
elite team
on England trip

Melissa Kanuk is going places.

The 1999 Bethlehem Central High School graduate is in England this week with the United States National Elite Rugby Team for the start of the Nations Cup — an international tournament that serves as a warm-up for the 2010 World Cup.

This is Kanuk's second trip to England with the U.S. National Team. She was there with the Women Eagles during their most recent trip in December.

"We do hope to make a statement out there and turn some heads," said Kanuk before she left Saturday.

Kanuk was chosen out of a pool of approximately 60 players nationwide to join the elite team for the Nations Cup, which will also feature national teams from England and Canada.

"During the year, they have events that they will invite you to," said Kanuk. "You can be invited to events and never be invited to play on the (World Cup) team."

Kanuk's rugby career started when she arrived at American University in Washington, D.C. in the fall of 1999.

"I went there to try to play soccer as a walk-on, but I soon decided that I didn't want to play a varsity sport. So, I looked for a club sport to try," said Kanuk. "My roommate and I went to dining hall one day, and the women's rugby team had walked in from a practice. We were pretty much surrounded by them, so I asked them about the team, and they told me all about it."

What Kanuk learned about rugby led her to join the team. By the spring of 2000, she was playing

every match, even though the sport — which closely resembles American football minus the use

of protective helmets and pads — was foreign to her.

"Some things (about rugby)

were more natural (to me) than others," she said. "I had come from a background of playing mostly soccer and basketball, so the concept of the game was different."

What wasn't different was Kanuk's role. Like her career as a midfielder on Bethlehem's varsity soccer team, she was placed in a role on the rugby field where she orchestrated the offense — a role she carries on today.

"In a lot of team sports, what makes you successful is that you can see the whole field," said Kanuk. "That's no more truer than in rugby. You have so many different types of players that you have to rely on each other to do what they are supposed to do in order to be successful. Everyone has to work together."

After graduating from American University in 2003, Kanuk still wanted to play rugby. So she signed on with the Maryland Stingers, a club that plays in both a Mid-Atlantic region league and at national tournaments.

"We do travel a bit," said Kanuk, who has played matches as far away as Florida and California. "Being in the east, there are a lot more teams, so we don't always have to travel far."

While playing for the Stingers, Kanuk built up a reputation that got her placed in the National Team pool. Her first call-up to the elite team came last winter.

"It is an honor to be part of that (elite team), but you have to keep working hard to improve," said Kanuk. "When you're part of the (National Team) pool, you have to continue to improve both yourself and as a team."

The Women Eagles have a lot to live up to as they prepare for the 2010 World Cup. The United States finished fifth in the last World Cup in 2006, and the team is looking to break into the top four.

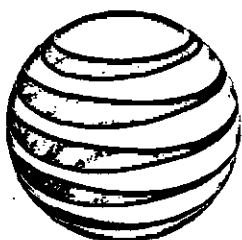

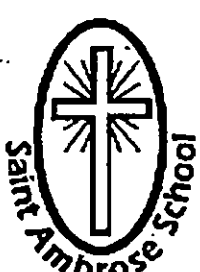

St. Rose introduces eco-friendly Massry Center for the Arts

The new \$14 million Massry Center for the Arts at The College of Saint Rose gives musical and visual artists a prime location to showcase their work to the college community and the public. The 46,000 square-foot building features a recital hall, art gallery, choral and instrument rehearsal rooms, teaching studios, piano labs and classrooms. The recital hall will serve as the primary venue for concerts by the college's 10 music groups and the 40 to 50 recitals performed by students and faculty each year.

The Massry Center will rank among the Capital Region's most energy-efficient buildings, is expected to attain a LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) "Gold" rating. A geothermal heat pump system will tap the constant temperature of the earth to heat and cool the facility, eliminating the need to directly burn fossil fuels or install a noisy outdoor cooling tower. Other energy-saving features will be incorporated throughout. Engineering estimates anticipate that the Massry Center will be 32 percent more energy efficient than the average building of its size.

Saint Rose President Dr. R. Mark Sullivan said, "The arts have always had a large presence in the Capital Region; however, none of the existing performance venues or galleries has the distinctive qualities of combining music

and art in a learning environment as will the Massry Center for the Arts. This unique facility represents a clear commitment by Saint Rose to the cultural vitality of, and the quality of life in, our Pine Hills neighborhood, the city of Albany and the greater Capital Region. It is yet another manifestation of the College's sustained investment in our urban campus and is a direct expression of the founding vision of the College."

The Opening Weekend of the Massry Center to the Community is scheduled for Friday, Sept. 26 through Sunday, Sept. 28. During that time, the public can enjoy the inaugural exhibit of internationally-acclaimed art-

ist, Judy Pfaff. Her exhibit, "Paperworks, Year of the Dog, Pig, Rat, Etc.," will be on display in the new art gallery through Nov. 9. Music events to enjoy include the Saint Rose Camerata: Celebrating Spain and Latin America at 7:00 p.m. on Friday; The DIVA Jazz Orchestra on Saturday at 8:00 p.m.; and the jazz ensemble concert Sunday at noon. All concerts will be held in the Picotte Recital Hall.

The public is also welcome to take self-guided tours of the Massry Center for the Arts during this unveiling weekend.

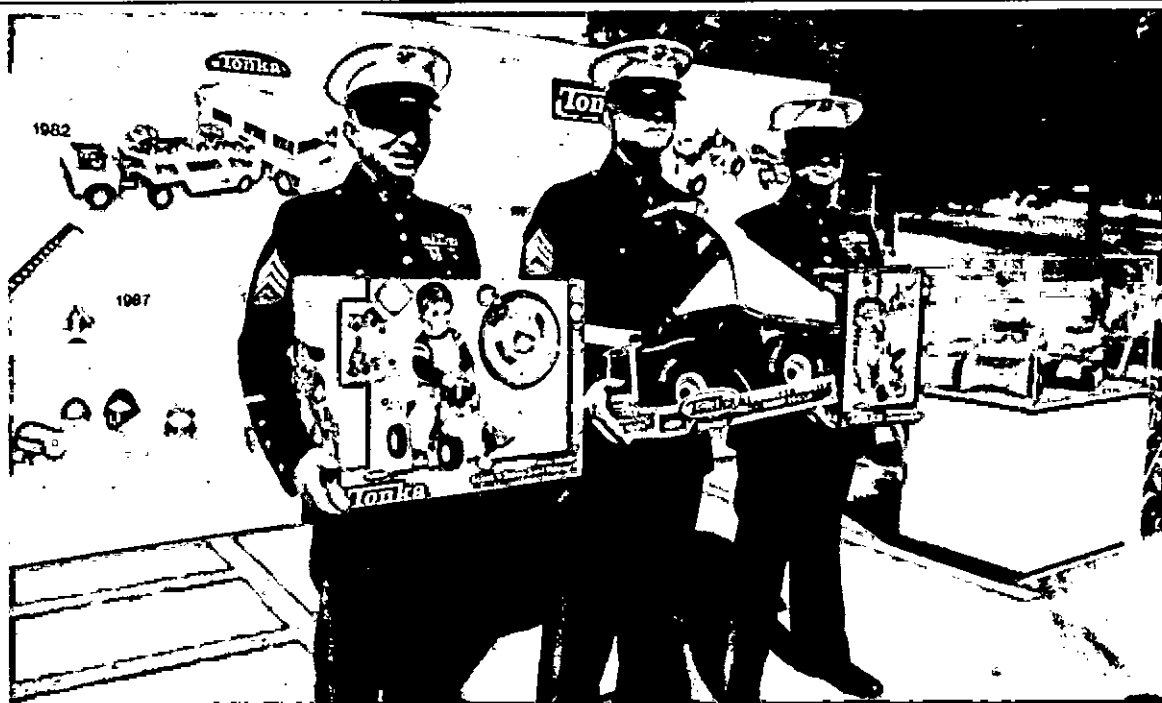
are inherent in martial arts training. Confidence and self esteem are achieved through encouragement and attainment of short and long term goals.

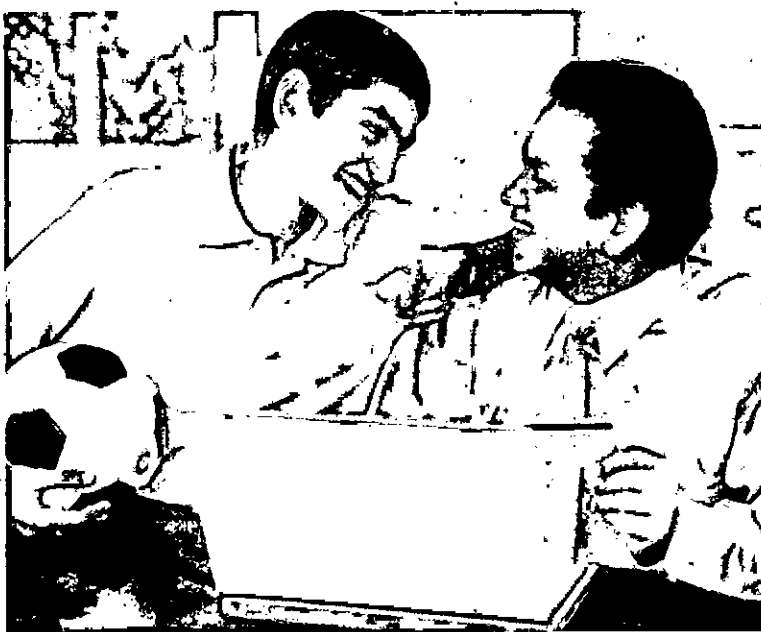
As the new school year starts, teens will be diving into history, science, math and English lessons. One important subject they may not be learning about, however, is money management. As the financial choices people must make in their lifetime become increasingly complex, teens need to learn how to navigate the financial world.

Michaela and Joshua are just two of the close to 120,000 teens who have become money savvy, thanks to Boys & Girls Clubs of America's (BGCA's) Money Matters: Make it Count program, sponsored by Charles Schwab Foundation. Michaela, 17, says she didn't know much about money management before participating in the program at her local Club in Tucson, Ariz. With a new understanding of money

management, and savings from her part-time job, she feels much better prepared to save and budget for college in the fall. But Michaela's new personal finance skills have done more than help her alone. After completing the program, she signed up as a Money Matters teen mentor to her peers. She's also been able to teach her mother how to more effectively budget and organize bills.

Joshua, 17, grew up in a single-parent family of four, and always knew that money was tight for college. After participating in Money Matters at his local Boys & Girls Club in the Washington, D.C., area, he also feels better prepared to make financial decisions to help him reach his goal

the sites of several individual retailers to check prices, she uses Microsoft's Live Search cashback (www.live.com/cashback) to find the best deals.

The site has partnerships with hundreds of the nation's major retailers to offer brand name products at bargain prices. Simply log on to www.live.com/cashback, enter the name of the product you are looking for into the search box, and the site will bring up the best prices available at several different stores. Click on the deal you like best, and if you make a purchase, in addition to a great price, you'll also get cashback which comes directly from Microsoft.

"I recently bought a Louis Vuitton bag and saved over 20 percent. I got more than \$200 deposited into my PayPal account. That's a great thing, considering it was a splurge that I wouldn't have made otherwise," says Olson.

2. Hit end-of-the-summer clearance sales.

Behind the holiday season, back-to-school is the most important shopping period of the year for retailers. And as a result, the weeks before school begins are a great time to shop for clothing, footwear, electronics, housewares and school supplies. It's not uncommon to find items marked 50, 60 or even 70 percent off since stores are desperate to clear out inventory in order to bring sales numbers up and make room for fall merchandise.

3. Shop at local consignment shops.

Why pay retail prices for clothes that the kids are going to outgrow anyway when you can find some great bargains at your local consignment shop? Consignment stores accept clothes that are gently used and in good shape, so if you're willing to invest a little time thumbing through the racks, you may be able to find inexpensive children's clothes that are nearly new at a fraction of retail prices.

4. Buy in bulk.

Another strategy you can take to save money is to buy in bulk. Warehouse stores carry a wide range of seasonal merchandise, including back-to-school supplies. But before you purchase a 100 pack of book covers, a box of 100 pens or pencils, 50 Crayola markers or a two-pack of scientific calculators, do your homework to make sure it's a great deal.

Bring a notepad to your local office or discount store and write down the unit price for each item you plan to purchase. Then when you return to the warehouse store, compare the numbers and make sure your savings will be significant enough to be worth it.

5. Reuse some of last year's school supplies.

But perhaps the best way to save money is if you can reuse some of last year's school supplies. Those Fiskar's scissors probably don't need to be replaced yet. Neither does your son or daughter's pencil box, or the markers that came home unused.

of graduating from college with a degree in mechanical engineering. He has opened both savings and checking accounts, and now saves money by limiting what he spends his money on. "Having stronger money management skills will definitely make college life easier," he says.

The Money Matters: Make it Count program was created to promote financial literacy among 13-to-18-year-olds by building basic money management skills. "The program aims to provide teens with valuable hands-on experience, which is the way teens want to learn," says Roxanne Spillet, president of BGCA.
