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


Bigger Better Bottle Bill bound to bounce back

Although the Bigger Better Bottle Bill passed in the state Assembly only to die in the Senate this spring, some lawmakers are hoping to bring it back for consideration next year.

Some see the bill, which was sponsored by Democratic Assemblymen Robert Sweeney of Suffolk County, as a way to update the 1982 New York State Returnable Container Act, commonly known as the bottle bill, by assigning non-carbonated beverages such as bottled water, sports drinks, juices and iced tea a 5-cent refundable deposit. Every unredeemed 5-cent deposit, which in the past would have gone to the distributor and the business that originally sold the product, would be returned to the state and invested in environmental programs such as recycling programs, parks, pollution prevention and water quality improvement.

Although the addition of non-carbonated beverages to the already existing beer and soda deposits sounds like a good idea for many environmentalists, those against the bill see it as nothing more than a way for the state to help to balance the budget by redirecting money from local businesses.

New court clerk appointed

Town acknowledges internal appointment, names replacement

After a surprisingly quick turnover in the court clerk position, the Bethlehem town judges have appointed a new one.

The Town Board unanimously acknowledged the appointment of Karen Creed as town clerk after justices Paul Dwyer and

Ryan Donovan picked her to replace former court clerk Patricia Parsons, who quit the post after less than two months on the job. Parsons was originally selected by the judges to replace outgoing court clerk Barbara Odom, who retired after more than two decades of service to the town.

Hodom is still working part time on an hourly basis as Creed transitions into the position. Creed was promoted from within the court clerk's office by the town judges, according to Supervisor Jack Cunningham.

Also during the Wednesday, Sept. 24, meeting, the board

unanimously appointed Linda Yates from off of the Albany County Civil Service list to fill Creed's former keyboard specialist position. Yates began her new position Thursday, Sept. 25, and Yates is scheduled to begin on Tuesday, Oct. 14.

However, neither appointment was on the agenda that evening, which came as a surprise to at least one council member.

"I didn't know anything about it... I opened the folder on the table, and there it was," Councilman Sam Messina said about the

Town floats a 6.89% tax hike

Comptroller says Bethlehem is holding the line during tough economic times

The Town of Bethlehem unveiled its \$38.67 million spending plan for next year during its Wednesday, Sept. 24, meeting.

The proposed budget constitutes a 2.8 percent spending increase over this year's \$37.63 million budget and an overall 6.89 tax rate increase for the town's combined general fund, highway department tax rate, and water and sewer district tax rates.

The proposed tax rate increase would result in a \$17.45 increase per \$100,000 of assessed value. Supervisor Jack Cunningham said the average home assessment in Bethlehem is \$285,000.

According to Judi Kehoe, the town's outgoing comptroller who has taken a job with the Bethlehem Central School District, the tax levy increase is being proposed at 6.89 percent. However, the 6.89 percent increase combined with the expanded assessment base will result in an increase of 7.3 percent in revenues to the town from property taxes, she said.

In opening the presentation, Cunningham said balancing this year's budget was "difficult on many different levels," citing a bad economy, poor consumer confidence, and the challenge of balancing "what was desirable and what was absolutely necessary" for the town.

The supervisor said that a large chunk of the budget was going to pay for town employees and their benefits, but that "our

Teen charged with aggravated DWI

Devin J. Ursprung, 19, of Athens, was arrested on Saturday, Sept. 6, for DWI; operating a motor vehicle with a blood-alcohol content of 0.08 percent or greater; aggravated DWI, operating a motor vehicle with a BAC of 0.18 percent or greater; speeding; and failure to keep right.

Bethlehem police said Ursprung was driving south on Cherry Avenue when an officer on patrol saw him speeding and failing to keep right before pulling him over.

During an interview, police could smell alcohol on Ursprung's breath and noticed that he had "glassy, bloodshot eyes," and was slurring his speech, according to the arrest report.

Police said Ursprung failed a field-sobriety test and then tested positive for alcohol before being taken into custody and transported to the Bethlehem Police Department.

A chemical test revealed that his BAC was over double the legal limit and his vehicle

was towed, the report states.

Ursprung was picked up from the police station by his mother and he is scheduled to appear in town court on Tuesday, Oct. 7.

Officials seek leads in dog abandonment case.

Bethlehem police say they are still looking for a white female and a white

male driving a light blue Ford Expedition who were spotted abandoning four dogs on Meads Lane near Route 32 in Delmar.

Bethlehem Animal Control said the incident occurred around 11 a.m. on Sunday, Sept. 21, and that the dogs were picked up by police and animal control officers and brought to Reigning Cats and Dogs on Route 9W in Glenmont.

The four dogs found included a male tan shepherd or husky mix; a female black

and white border collie or hound mix; a female golden retriever mix puppy; and a female white spaniel or lab mix.

"Unless further information is obtained we have little chance of arrest or prosecution," Bethlehem Animal Control Officer Richard Watt said in a release.

Police are asking anyone with information on who may have dropped off the animals to call 439-9973 and make a report.

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
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
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Jonathan Carey Foundation to hold benefit walk

Organization advocates for developmentally disabled and 'vulnerable' children

The second Jonathan Carey Foundation Walk to help vulnerable children will take place on the morning of Saturday, Oct. 4, at the Bethlehem Town Park.

Registration will take place from 9 to 10 a.m. at the Elm Avenue park, and the walk will begin at 10 a.m.

Pledgesheets can be found on-line at www.jonathancareyfoundation.org, or at the Jonathan Carey Foundation, 90 Delaware Ave. in Delmar.

There will be food and refreshments available at the rear pavilion from 11 a.m. until 1 p.m. after the 2.5-mile walk. There also will be special guest speakers and raffles, including a drawing for a flat-screen TV, during the event. Michael Carey, Jonathan's father, said he will be selling raffle tickets for \$5 each and five tickets for \$20.

"The money will come into the foundation, and part of the money will also go to a number of other good organizations," Carey said. "We also use some of the money for public advocacy campaigns."

Carey and his wife, Lisa, became political activists who lobbied the state legislature to pass Jonathan's Law following the death of their autistic son. The

law requires records concerning the care of disabled children be made available to the parents and was unanimously passed by the legislature and signed into law by then-Gov. Eliot Spitzer on May 5, 2007.

Jonathan died while in the care of the O.D. Heck Development Center in Schenectady after he was moved there when the Careys suspected he was being abused at the Anderson School in Dutchess County. The family was denied access to Jonathan's records at the Anderson School.

Carey said his work with the foundation is separate from his political activism. He lobbies the legislature as Jonathan's father, Carey said, but runs the foundation as a not-for-profit to raise awareness and to advocate for the most vulnerable of children

— the developmentally disabled, the orphaned, the abandoned and the abused.

"We would first like to thank everyone for the love and support you have shown to us and our entire family, both now and just after Jonathan's passing," the Careys wrote in their foundation brochure. "We also want to thank you for caring for other vulnerable children in need of extra care, love and protection. With your help we can bring many necessary changes and do what is right to help them."

As a parent, Carey said, he has been lobbying for several things in the legislature, including a maximum 60-hour work week for care workers; having surveillance cameras installed in vans and common

areas of special needs facilities; and having reported calls of abuse directed to local police departments to investigate.

"We're asking Gov. [David] Paterson to immediately have all calls for abuse ... to go directly to local law enforcement officers," Carey said.

As for the cameras, Carey added, "Basically, we feel surveillance cameras would be a huge deterrent [to offenders]."

Noise task force adds two more members

Expanded committee charged with drafting law

The Noise Ordinance Task Force held its last meeting as a five-member group on the afternoon of Tuesday, Sept. 23. The task force has since expanded to include Councilman Mark Hennessey and resident Chris Hanifin.

The committee has been charged with drafting a new local noise law after the original task force recommended that the town board pursue such a law.

At the Wednesday, Sept. 10, meeting, the town board unanimously decided to expand the task force to nine members and is expected to add to more residents in the future.

Commissioned in September 2007, the Noise Ordinance Task Force is headed by Councilman Sam Messina and is currently in the process of writing an entirely new local law for the town, after a lengthy assessment process, to consider whether it was necessary or not.

During a well-attended public hearing earlier in the year, the majority of residents spoke overwhelmingly in favor of the noise ordinance. A vocal minority did speak out, saying a noise law would be overly

regulative and could be used to harass neighbors if not drafted properly.

Messina has repeatedly pointed out that out of 40 e-mails the town received about a possible noise law, only two were against the ordinance. The original Noise Ordinance Task Force was made up of community representatives Jennifer DeFranco and Robert Jasinski; Bethlehem Deputy Police Chief Tim Beebe; and the town's building inspector, Gil Boucher. They are all still on the task force.

Messina said the last meeting went well, and he is looking forward to continuing the noise ordinance committee's work as members delve into the complexities of decibels levels and the sensitivities of noise exemptions.

"Now is the time to work hard and to get this going," Messina said about drafting the new law. He said he was unsure when the final two residents would be appointed to the task force or who they would be. Messina added, however, that he was happy to see the town's freshmen councilman appointed to the committee.

"I am looking forward to serving on the task force. We all know that the ordinance should not take the place of being a good neighbor," Hennessey said of being named to the committee. "My hope is that my addition to the task force will help to speed the development and broaden the approach to an ordinance."

The new task force is expected to increase the number of meetings it holds in order to draft a new noise law in a reasonable time frame. After a noise law is drafted it will be presented to the public and to the town board and at least one more public hearing will be held before the town board could put the noise law to a vote.

Denim that makes a difference

Delmar vet donates money to breast cancer research for all jean-clad clients

Denim — the all-American clothing that never goes out of style — is also helping to fight breast cancer.

From Friday, Oct. 3 until Friday, Oct. 10, the Canterbury Animal Hospital in Delmar will donate \$5 toward breast cancer research for every customer and client, two legs or four, who walks through the doors wearing denim.

According to veterinarian Tara Estra, she means any kind of denim clothing.

"During the week, every client that comes in wearing jeans or anything denim we're going to donate \$5 to help fight breast cancer," Estra said. "If you come in with a denim bandana, we're going to donate that \$5."

Located at 88 Delaware Ave.,

the Canterbury Animal Hospital is expanding upon the Lee National Denim Day, which bills itself as the largest single-day breast cancer fundraiser in the nation, on Oct. 3.

"We're going to expand it for the whole week," said Estra, who came up with the idea after reading about the Lee National Denim Day. Having a small staff at her office, Estra said she wanted to open up the fundraiser to her customers and local residents and, of course, their pets.

"We wanted to open it up to our community," Estra said. "I had seen an ad in Time magazine about the Lee Denim Day ... and all of the staff here has been touched in some way or form by breast cancer, so we went ahead and put this together."

October is national Breast Cancer Awareness Month and a month that focuses on the most common form of cancer in women, second only to skin cancer, and is the second leading cause of cancer death in women after lung cancer.

According to the American Cancer Society, about 182,460 women in the United States will be found to have invasive breast cancer in 2008. Statistics show

that about one in eight women will have some type of invasive breast cancer in their lifetime and that the chance of dying from it is about one in 35.

The American Cancer Society reports that breast cancer death rates have been steadily declining, however, and cite the reason as a result of earlier detection and improved medical treatment and options.

The Canterbury Animal Hospital has been open in Delmar for two years and has a staff of four, including Estra, who earned her doctorate of Veterinary Medicine from Cornell University. Estra has also been an active volunteer for the past 10 years raising and training guide dogs from puppies for the Guiding Eyes for the Blind organization.

"One Day, One Cause, One Cure," is the motto of the Lee fundraiser that began in 1996 when Lee employees paid \$5 to wear jeans to work one day and donated the money. The company's Web site said the annual event has netted more than \$70 million to help fight breast cancer.

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It's hard not to read between the lines

Children's stories are downright creepy.

I tend to look at things very cynically. My wife gets angry with me because I lack the ability to suspend my skepticism in even the stories that I read to my children or the shows they watch on television.

A couple of winters ago, the DeVoe family was sitting on the couch, a bowl of popcorn firmly wedged in between my wife and me, watching the old Rankin and Bass claymation special "Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer." Kevin, who was 3 at the time, turned to us and asked: "Why is his nose red and no one else's is?"

To which I replied, "Wouldn't a better question be, 'Why can all of these reindeer talk?' I mean, have you ever seen a talking reindeer?"

I'm lucky, in the sense that my son is already wise enough to know when not to listen to me. I'm sure that'll come back to bite me in his teenage years, but so far it's worked in his favor.

My disposition toward kids' entertainment has only gotten worse in recent years, and I think I have only journalism to blame. In the newsroom, you learn to disassociate yourself from the news; to separate whatever emotional attachment

you may have to a story from the story itself. I'm finding that I now do that with things written by Virginia Lee Burton or Dr. Seuss.

Take, for example, the celebrated tale of the Cat in the Hat. It is, by all accounts, a wonderful tale of whimsical cat who shows two bored-out-of-their-minds kids how to have fun in even the most lackluster of circumstances.

When viewed through the lens of the newsroom, it is a tale of home invasion and would probably read something like this: (Please read in your best Walter Winchell impersonation. If you don't know who Walter Winchell is, Bugs Bunny will suffice.)

Good evening Mr. and Mrs. America and all the ships at sea. Let's go to press.

Dateline Whoville! Two youngsters, Sally and her unnamed narrator brother, were sitting unassumingly at home during a cold, cold, wet day when suddenly a man-sized cat monster burst into their house, began speaking in anapestic

tetrameter and started juggling things. Threatening the life of their pet goldfish, he then unleashed two spiteful midgets, Thing One and Thing Two, on the children and their house, the latter of which suffered extensive damage.

At this time, local officials are not prepared to classify the incident as terrorism.

"I don't know why the cat-monster chose our house or even how he could possibly pull two blue-haired people out of his hat, but I know that he should not be here when our mother is out," said Sally.

There is no word on the condition of the goldfish or whether or not the Cat in the Hat will come back.

It's silly, isn't it? But it's creepy, too, because children's stories are filled with these fantastic circumstances to which kids respond nonchalantly.

In "Frosty the Snowman," another Rankin-Bass classic that is on heavy rotation in the DeVoe household during the holidays, a magical hat lands on snowman some kids have built and brings him to life. In the cartoon, the kids befriend and sing songs about the snowman while some nefarious-looking magician who's about one ice cream truck away from landing on some state registry follows them to the North Pole, where Frosty can live year-round

or something like that — it's been a while.

This is not what would happen in this day and age (minus the pedophilic magician). The days of awe and wonderment are gone. Today, if an inanimate snow being comes to life in the middle of town square, someone will most likely get shot.

Never mind the fact that as soon as the government found out about the invulnerability of Christmas snow, men in black pajamas would have rappelled down from an off-screen helicopter, tranquilized the kids and taken Frosty into custody.

In "Mike Mulligan and His Steam Shovel," written by Virginia Lee Burton in 1939, Mike and his steam shovel, Mary Anne, in an attempt to outperform the new diesel-powered shovels, claim they can dig a cellar for the new town hall in a single day. They do, but they neglect to build themselves a way out, and Mary Anne is stuck in the basement and now serves as the boiler for the building. What they don't tell you in the book is that the guy contracted to do the boiler work in town hall is now suing the town for breach of contract, the historical preservation society is lobbying

to have Mary Anne removed from the grounds anyway, and Mike, now serving as the janitor in town hall, is berated every day by the townsfolk who have come to hate him.

My wife is incensed when I tell these things to my son, but I tell her that I'm teaching him to read between the lines and not believe everything "The Man" tells him.

The best story for reading between the lines? "The Lorax," once again by Dr. Seuss. It has everything a child needs in a story: commercialism, corruption, slave labor, environmental neglect and adorable Brown Bar-ba-loots in Bar-ba-loot suits.

For this cautionary tale, directed at the logging industry when it was written, you hardly need to interject any newsroom skepticism. The Onceler, obviously an agent of big-box retail, is pillaging the Truffula Trees, selling underpriced Thneeds while oppressing his overworked Brown Bar-ba-loots.

The Lorax, obviously some hippie "green space" fanatic, protests to no avail. What's left is a single Truffula seed and a very repentant Lorax, hoping he can make right the damage he's done.



Ambulance services to present plan to bill insurance companies

The Delmar Ambulance Corps made a presentation during the Wednesday, Sept. 24, Bethlehem Town Board meeting about changes to its billing for ambulance services.

The public is invited to attend an official presentation of the proposal at 7 p.m. Wednesday, Oct 1, at Town Hall. In order to keep the town's ambulance tax down, the ambulance corps wants to begin billing individual insurance companies in order to generate additional revenues to help cope with a growing community.

Those uninsured will be billed, but no collection agencies will be involved if payment cannot be made. No town resident will ever be denied ambulance care based on their insurance situation, according to Delmar Ambulance Corps.

During the presentation it was noted that the town's ambulance corps receive 3,500 calls a year and that the number of calls increase between 10 percent and 15 percent each year. Because of the increased demand and the fact that volunteers usually work during the day, the town has had to begin hiring

professional EMTs during the daytime, which in return has added "hundreds of thousands a year" to emergency medical services expenditures.

The plan is to have a private biller, not a collection agency, send out bills to insurance companies and residents. Whatever payment received by the billing company will be considered payment in full, according to the plan.

Residents interested in hearing the presentation are encouraged to attend the Wednesday, Sept. 24, 7 p.m. meeting at Town Hall.

Graffiti law won't make mark

In September, hot on the heels of legislating what kinds of fats its citizens could ingest, Albany County officials decided to regulate the sale of certain paint and art items in order to curtail vandalism, most notably graffiti.

The law, which passed unanimously in the Legislature, calls on merchants who sell spray paint, broad-tipped markers and etching acid, to require customers to present identification proving to the clerk that they are 18 years of age or older.

As was noted in *Spotlight Newspapers* in the Sept. 3 editions of our Albany County papers, for some stores, implementation of the law meant nothing, as the stores already had policies in place to monitor the sale of these items.

As was also pointed out in our coverage, some tools that vandals use to create graffiti might be too difficult to regulate — such as Sharpies, or permanent markers and pens with non-erasable ink. Officials conceded that a potential vandal could walk into a Staples or OfficeMax and buy materials that wouldn't be "regulated," such as any writing instrument not defined by the term "broad-tipped marker," which requires the tip of the marker to be wider than 1/2 inch.

For reference purposes, the highlighter you're using to showcase the more salient points of this editorial has a tip-width of about 1/4 inch; most "chisel tipped" black permanent markers have tips anywhere from that width to 1/2 inch.

So it appears that Albany County officials have been pretty thorough in trying to curtail vandalism. Sure, if you believe that A) all vandalism is perpetuated by people under the age of 18; B) graffiti can only be done with the items regulated by the county; and C) that graffiti vandals who have been adept at tagging walls, buildings and other public structures throughout the county without getting caught will not somehow manage to find a way to circumvent this indirect attempt at policing them.

And — as was the case with Albany County's ban of trans-fats — it's the "indirectness" that is the real issue. You don't want vandals spraying graffiti all over the county? You don't outlaw spray paint, you get a handle on what it is that motivates these people to express themselves in this way and you address that issue.

In the meantime, police the activity the county's trying to curtail, not the innocuous tools they use to do it. It's not as though you can't tell where these people have been (spray-painted walls) or where they're going (clean, inviting walls).

But, once again, Albany County has shown it would rather walk around the cookie aisle than tell a child "no."

Application essay is powerful

To me, nothing is more exciting than helping high school seniors fire their spirits to write their college application essay. If they can galvanize their imaginations to write in an authentic, enthusiastic voice about an endeavor that has moved their hearts and focused their energy, they will be one step closer to acceptance at the college of their dreams.

This process can take as little time as two, one-hour sessions of concentrated effort and can result in a phenomenal product.

Obviously the college essay is not the top determining factor in college acceptance. However, research shows that a great essay is at least the fourth top factor in a student's candidacy. When a student generates a compelling idea that reveals his or her most genuine side and then writes in a clear, fluid style stamped with originality, he or she is speaking directly to college admissions officers. What better time to shine? And the best part is this is the one area over which students have complete control. In a tight field of applicants, many of whom have almost the exact same excellent credentials, a terrific essay can tip the scales in favor of acceptance.

Knowing that an admissions officer will have a mere two minutes to read a student essay, each individual should try to create an original, yet clear and specific response.

Over the years, I have compiled some of my favorite college essays. I have sat with many students, watching them mull over their lives, wondering which seed might grow to the proper dimensions to qualify as

a good essay. I have encouraged them to remember that their writing should be as individual as a fingerprint and as fresh as the spoken voice.

I recall the daughter of a friend in my neighborhood who asked me timidly if she could send me her final draft, so that I could critique her prose. Although I knew she was an excellent writer, I was not prepared for my powerful emotions when I read about her struggle with joint pain that made holding a pencil impossible for her. The point of her response was optimism and joy. She refused to give in to the debilitation of her condition and felt the need to encourage others to find brightness in their conditions and also think outside of the box.

I was equally moved by a young woman in Boston who wrote of her long-term commitment to sustainable agriculture and her years of service to various social justice organizations. Her personality sparkled in her essay when she spoke about 70-year-old Honorio, the unofficial "mayor" of a Boston neighborhood, who accompanied her on her weekly jaunts to educate residents about lead-free gardening.

Recently, a local young man wrote of how much he enjoyed playing the piano every Sunday for half a year at a nursing home for Alzheimer patients. He was astonished to find that his music made a difference in the lives of the patients who sang along or tapped to the tunes and then gratefully applauded at the end of each session. He decided to continue this weekly activity because he was so happy with the response, changing him as well as the guests.

Right in the middle of this close election season, I helped a student write a powerful essay that examined his political views that are unpopular in his high school. He spoke about the students in his English class mocking his beliefs. Then he passionately described the development of his convictions as an 8-year-old child watching history shows on television with his father, starting a conversation and a bond around politics and morality that spanned the past 10 years.

Many students approach the essay with fear and a reserve stemming from the belief that they have nothing to say or don't know where to start. Many feel they do not have compelling stories to tell. These feelings are always groundless. Students must first start from a point of brainstorming and free-writing

to understand the experience or activity that they might want to discuss. Then the rules for composition will feel less daunting. After students write their first draft, they should leave the draft alone for a week and then approach it later with fresh eyes.

How exactly does a writer maintain that pitch-perfect tone of desire and enthusiasm while still maintaining humility? He or she may also wish to comment on career goals and the role that the particular college could play in the fulfillment of those desires.

Colleges are looking for students who want to contribute their passions and service. In doing all this, it is important to keep in mind the following points.

- When brainstorming about possible topics, it is always better to augment your college application information, rather than repeat what is already there. Say something new. Because you want to illuminate your personality or a moment that you grew in some way, consider discussing a time that your opinion changed. What happened? How did you learn something new, either about yourself or others? How can you be distinguished from others? Make sure that you buttress any accomplishment with real support rather than just broad and general statements. Details always help to sell the applicant. If you cannot produce concrete examples, perhaps the topic is not workable.

- Use your own voice. Admissions officers can spot a false tone, and students should take pains to be completely honest and authentic in their language while also being creative. Simple, clear and lively prose is always best.

- Spend the most time on your introduction. This must grab a reader immediately and therefore should set the mood and draw the reader into the scene, while creating a bit of mystery.

Follow with an organization whose coherence is established with a beginning, middle and end. Make a clear point and stick to this focus.

- Finally, proofread your essay. You should edit for perfection and ask others to read it to spot any errors.

As we know, grades, recommendations, a rigorous program of studies, and a balanced life of activities matter greatly to college admissions committees. In many instances, SAT scores factor in, although less now than ever before in our history. But to my mind, nothing is better than revealing a bit of one's heart and personal history through the essay. Those few paragraphs may very well seal the deal.

New Scotlanders don't want 'big-box'

Editor, *Spotlight Newspapers*:

The following was sent to members of the New Scotland Town Board and CZAC:

I would like to give you my thoughts, which I believe reflect the preferences of the majority of the town, concerning the revisions to zoning provisions and development of the commercial zone located at the intersection of Routes 85 and 85A.

As the town veterinarian in an animal-loving area who has the opportunity to visit and chat with many fellow New Scotlanders in my daily practice, I heard a lot of reactions to the moratorium debate last May, and now engage in active discussions with my clients about the preferred size cap for the proposed development.

My practice serves a wide variety of people in this area and I see the spectrum of income level, occupation, and background among my clients.

The uniformity of opinion amongst this disparate group, as we chat over their pets, has been notable from the beginning.

When I first collected signatures in May in Salem Hills and Clipp Road, I found that 1 percent of residents wanted the "big box" store and opposed the moratorium, 3 percent were undecided and 96 percent were in support of the moratorium and a size cap/no big-box approach to development.

These results were replicated recently on the night of the primaries, in which I stood outside the Wyman Osterhaut Center in New Salem, handing out informational flyers about the workshop, and polled each voter as he/she emerged between 7 and 9 p.m.

This time, 5 percent were in support of the Sphere proposal and large-scale, big box-type development, 5 percent were undecided, and 90 percent were in strong support of

extending the moratorium, limiting development to reflect the tenor of the community with a mixed-use, walkable, hamlet-type development, with retail on a more modest scale to serve the needs of the community.

The message from last week's workshop put on by the CZAC served to underscore the same overwhelming preponderance of community sentiment. This strong consensus was heard in each of the five breakout workshop groups.

The members of NS4SED and its two members on the CZAC are no lightweights.

They are comprised of professionals who are expert in the areas of commercial development, community planning, real estate, architecture, economics and rural agronomy.

Their opinions and advice, especially as they reflect the overwhelming community sentiment, should be given due consideration, as should

the wealth of data they have offered fellow CZAC and town board members that indicates that the size of commercial activity that Sphere proposes is in the wrong place at the wrong time.

I sincerely hope that your votes will reflect the majority opinion of the people you serve and represent.

My clients and fellow residents join me in asking you to support their expressed wishes as outlined above.

We truly believe that the creation of such a hamlet could, if done appropriately, greatly enhance our community's character, whereas the Sphere proposal will change our home forever.

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

Race for 104th driven by big picture

Candidates sound off about local, state and national policies

The candidates for the 104th Assembly District said there is a growing concern with the effects of policies not only on the state level, but on the federal and international levels as well.

Incumbent John J. McEneny, D-Albany, and Republican candidate Terry O'Neill, who has a background in criminal justice, will be facing off in the general election on Tuesday, Nov. 4, for the 104th seat.

"The priorities will identify themselves based on what's going on in the White House," McEneny said of the upcoming session.

O'Neill said problems with international, gang-related crime and drug-smuggling from El Salvador and Mexico are issues with far-reaching effects and need to be addressed.

On the other hand, McEneny, is concerned

with the lack of federal economic regulation and the evacuation procedures and emergency response in America, claiming they are lagging.

"I really want to see this administration come to an end," McEneny said of President George W. Bush's administration. He said America is involved with a war that makes "no sense," and there has been an erosion of civil liberties and economic woes.

He said given the chance, he would go to Pennsylvania to campaign for Democrat Barack Obama in the upcoming presidential election.

He said the lack of regulation at the federal level has been the cause of a number of problems and is pushing for an increase in federal regulation with the next presidential administration.

When the federal government does not provide regulation, it falls on the states, McEneny said, but the states cannot do it nearly as efficiently.

In reference to some of the problems Albany County will have to deal with, McEneny said the policies of the next administration will play a key role in defining the agenda.

He added that jobs, the economy and property tax are going to be important issues in the coming session if he gets reelected.

In addition to international gangs, O'Neill said he is concerned with federal funding for programs for prisoners reentering society.

He said President Bush approved appropriations for programs of that nature in April, but they have not been budgeted for yet.

O'Neill said he wants to address the 600 parolees walking the streets of Albany at any given time, and their transition back to society.

He also said there are 26,000 people who have been released from prison in Albany, and programs need to be in place to help them assimilate back into society, not only for their sake, but for their families as well.

"We have to get them a

house, a job and to assume some family responsibility," O'Neill said.

He said during former Gov. Mario Cuomo's administration, the prison population jumped from 17,000 to 70,000, and he said Andrew Cuomo, an advisor to his father during his administration, should be responsible for spearheading efforts to fund re-assimilation programs.

He said he is asking Cuomo to "undo the damage caused by the prison policy."

He also said he is concerned with legislation for veterans, the potential for same-sex marriage, a new convention center and property taxes.

"I'm taking positions driven by what's on people's mind," he said.

He said he is going against the Republican grain, and supporting same-sex unions.

"It's time for people to get their rights," he added.

Three RCS students will play with the Empire State Youth Orchestra after successfully auditioning for the honor.



Bastian and Selkirk will play with Empire State Youth Repertory Orchestra and Lammy will play with the Empire State Youth Wind Orchestra.

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
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Candidates for 46th gear up for election

Tentative debate planned for this month

As election season heats up, the candidates of the 46th Senate District could be slugging it out in a public arena some time this month, one candidate said.

Conservative Party candidate Charlie Voelker said he and

incumbent state Sen. Neil Breslin, D-Delmar, are hoping to schedule a debate for mid-October.

"Every night I'm out doing something political in my district," he said.

Voelker said his focus has been on taxes, fiscal responsibility and reducing wasteful spending.

The state of New York spends money like it's going out of style," he said. "We spend [it] like we

print it."

He said changing the way the state spends money will prevent a lot of trouble in the long run. He also said he wants to consolidate services to reduce redundant spending, claiming the state is being run like a bad business. He added, though, that reducing spending does not have to translate to job loss.

"It's a tough road, and I'm a realist ... but consolidation doesn't necessarily mean job cuts," he added.

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

District head bus driver Kevin Williams said 10 drivers are in training and four have been hired since August, when steps were taken to address a critical driver shortage.

The drivers in training are receiving that training free of charge from RCS and are preparing to take the state exam for bus drivers.

The district addressed the perennial driver shortage by increasing the hourly wage by more than \$3 over the past two years, up to \$15 an hour.

Additionally, the district began offering free, paid training to potential bus drivers. It also mounted the most wide-spread effort ever to recruit drivers, including posters, fliers, advertisements and media appeals.

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

back into the government.

"This is a money grab no doubt," said Jonathan Peirce, who represents New Yorkers for Real Recycling Reform, a coalition of state retailers, businesses and labor groups that support legislation that will improve recycling without increased consumer costs.

"The proposal is a bad thing for New York consumers who can't deal with an increase in anything, with increasing gas and food prices. Bottles and cans of all beverages make up less than 3 percent of the waste stream and 9 percent of litter on roads."

According to research done by Northbridge Environmental Consultants, New Yorkers for Real Recycling Reform say that the Bigger Better Bottle Bill would result in an average increase of 15 cents for each bottle and can in stores.

With this increase, the group believes that a case of 24 bottles of juice that would sell for \$4.99 would now cost \$8.59. The group says this increase in price, alongside the increasing price of food and gas, would hurt rather than help New York consumers who are already feeling a pinch in their pocketbooks. The group is working with the state to make comprehensive recycling goals and would rather work on a solution to recycling that won't require consumers to go out of their way to save the environ-

ment and save money, by investing in curbside pickup, municipal waste stations and recycling inside apartment buildings.

On the surface, the updated bottle bill looks like an effective way to help clean up the environment, but for some in the Assembly, including Assemblyman Bob Reilly, D-Newtonville, the new bill comes off as a burden to Upstate businesses and consumers.

"It's a regressive hidden tax that is detrimental to small business," says Reilly, who represents parts of Albany and Saratoga counties. "Advocates

say this is not a tax, and it most certainly is."

Reilly says the proposed bill puts an unneeded burden on retail stores that also exempts small stores in New York City because of "financial difficulties" while leaving Upstate stores to deal with the new tax.

Sweeney, who serves as the Environmental Conservation Committee chairman, and other supporters of the bill, say the negative attention that has been given to the bill is the same: the original bill faced in 1982.

"All the arguments that are being used against the new bottle bill are the same arguments

against the original bill," said Sweeney, who says the advantages outweigh the disadvantages.

According to Sweeney, about 80 percent of recycled products, at curbside pickup or at redemption centers, are those with deposit refunds attached to the product, while only 20 percent of non-refundable recyclable materials are recycled at curbside or redemption centers, leaving about 80 percent of nonrefundable items to become unsightly litter on our highways, parks and left unrecycled in the landfills. The addition of refunds on noncarbonated beverages would create an incentive for people to recycle more products more often.

"People will recycle when there is a deposit on the bottle," said Sweeney.

"We know it has worked, even though there was opposition to it years ago," said Assemblyman Ron Canestrari, D-Cohoes, who represents parts of Albany, Rensselaer and Saratoga counties.

Canestrari said he agrees with Sweeney that the positives of the Bigger Better Bottle Bill outweigh the negatives, such as an increased price in bottled beverages.

"If there is a financial incentive, more people will recycle," he said. "We must do all that is reasonable to reduce the waste stream and the number of bottles out of landfills."

* Assemblymen Roy McDonald said he voted for an earlier

version of the bill with the hope that a small exemption clause that was directed to small stores in New York City would be applied to small stores throughout the state in a future version of the bill. The clause states, "In a city with a population greater than one million, a dealer may limit the number of empty beverage containers to be accepted for redemption at the dealer's place of business to no less than 72 containers per visit, per redeemer, per day [...] the primary business is the sale of food or beverages for consumption off-premises, and the dealer's place of business is less than 10,000 square feet in size."

The exemption deals with the small corner grocers of New York City, according to McDonald, who added that 75 percent of New Yorkers live below the city of Poughkeepsie, or "Downstate."

Because the clause was not eventually changed to include the rest of the state, McDonald voted against the bill, June 11.

"I will not vote for a bill that gives New York City priority," said McDonald, "I will not tolerate this idea that New York City is different from New York state."

McDonald said he realizes the need to clean up the environment, but the exemption

of small New York City retail stores creates a situation where New York City is seen as a different entity from the rest of the state.

Joshua Fitzpatrick, communications director for Assemblyman James Tedisco, R-Schenectady, said that there were three major reasons why Tedisco opposed the bill. "One, it really amounts to another big state mandate on small business; two, it really amounts to a hidden tax on state bottlers and distributors; and three, he opposes extra costs to the tune of \$80 million to New York state consumers through increased unclaimed bottle deposits."

While both sides have different reasons for supporting or being against the bill, they agree that cleaning up the environment is a priority that should be taken care of.

"I keep an open mind, and I try to help the environment," said McDonald. "We all want a better community, we want a cleaner community."

"There's a cost to everything and we must weigh that cost to the environment and to society," said Canestrari.

Sweeney said he hopes to get help from members of the Senate or Gov. David Paterson to get the bill back to the floor of the Senate next year.

employees in Town Hall are our biggest assets" and that the town has to be as committed to them as they are committed to the town.

Cunningham said many of the town's employees work long hours and could make much more money in the private sector, but are instead "committed to the community" they live and work in.

Some of the revenue projections were promising, however, Cunningham said, especially considering the economy and the fact that Bethlehem is "not exempt" from the economic woes nationwide.

In particular, Cunningham pointed to the now town-operated Colonial Acres Golf Course, which has already netted a profit of \$20,000 even though the season isn't over and the golf course was only projected to break even in the first year owned by the town.

"We're looking at this as an increasing revenue source for the town," he said.

Cunningham mentioned other budget items like the \$5.2 million project to upgrade the town's sewer pump stations and several townwide studies, including farming and agricultural studies, and the Delaware Avenue and Route 9W studies.

He also mentioned three initiatives for inter-municipal cooperation to help consolidate services and save money, including joining the Albany County Storm Water Coalition; joining the study for the Albany County Health Insurance Consortium;

and looking at consolidating 911 call centers around the county.

The town is looking at a challenging couple of years ahead as it is looking to stop dipping into its reserve fund balance to close financial gaps in the budget each year.

"We are currently into our reserve funds. We have been using our reserve funds for the last five years," Cunningham said during a budget interview. "There's a gap between expenditures and our income, and we are closing that gap each year with our reserves."

"The challenge for me is to stop doing that," he concluded. "If we continue down that road there won't be any reserves left."

Although Bethlehem may be better off than neighboring municipalities such as Colonie, Cunningham said, the town has to find a way to reduce costs and raise revenues. However, the only revenue stream the town controls is local taxes because sales tax revenues and mortgage tax revenues are dependent upon current economic trends.

A flat tax to residents, such as what Colonie has proposed, is not feasible for Bethlehem, the supervisor said.

"If we applied a single fee to the residents of Bethlehem," said Cunningham referring to Colonie, "that would be equivalent to a 50 percent tax increase to our residents."

Cunningham said the county as a whole may have to take some action in order to alleviate some of the financial pressures on the local municipalities, such as when Albany County temporarily raised sales taxes a few

years ago.

"At the presentation at Town Hall, Kehoe crunched the proposed budget numbers for the board," stating that salary and health benefits constituted 55 percent of the new spending plan.

She said equipment costs were down and the retirement system costs were stable, but that health insurance was up 14 percent and there are large increases in energy spending and petroleum-based products such as asphalt for the highway department.

The highway fund expenditures is proposed to raise 4.7 percent, said Kehoe, but the highway department will keep the current staff level of 56 employees in place despite the increased demand on its services.

The town is also looking at a 4.7 percent increase in expenditures, Kehoe said, and is planning on hiring an additional police officer in either June or July, but added that bringing the police force up to 44 members had little impact on the budget.

The sewer tax rate is being proposed to increase 4 percent, or \$1.18, and there will be a quarterly \$4.50 flat fee for the water and sewer districts.

The town board scheduled a public hearing on the proposed budget for Wednesday, Oct. 22, at 6 p.m. Cunningham said the proposed budget is available to the public at the town clerk's office in Town Hall or on the town's Web site.

The proposed Bethlehem budget increase of 6.89 percent does include Albany County taxes and other special districts.

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


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Bethlehem replaces all mercury flow meters

After signing a DEC consent order in June, town gets rid of meters at the water plant

The Town of Bethlehem has agreed to pay over \$22,000 to Clough Harbor and Associates to help replace all of its mercury flow meters at the town's Voorheesville water plant, following a consent order signed with the state's Department of Environmental Conservation.

At its Wednesday, Sept. 24, meeting, the Town Board unanimously agreed to allow Supervisor Jack Cunningham to sign a task order with Clough Harbor for the amount of \$22,100 for engineering services and support for the meter replacement.

On Monday, Sept. 29, Cunningham told *Spotlight Newspapers* that Clough Harbor was coming in as a consultant on the replacement process but added

the town has yet to bid on the actual meter replacements, so finalized costs are not known at this time.

The DEC fined the town \$15,000 in June for mercury and petroleum "reporting and handling violations" that occurred over the past two years.

By signing a consent form, paying the \$15,000 and remaining compliant, the town does not have to pay an additional \$60,000 civil penalty to DEC, according to the state's signed consent order, which stated the fine could have totaled \$75,000.

Currently, the town is in full compliance with all of the stipulations of the consent order signed by the supervisor on June 6, according to DEC Region 4 spokesman Rick Georgeson.

"Bethlehem is in full compliance with the consent order and has given us everything we asked for," Georgeson said.

Cunningham has repeatedly emphasized that absolutely no contaminants reached the town's water supply — not mercury or petroleum.

DEC officials agreed and said no mercury was found in the water supply, but said they fined the town for not properly reporting the mercury spills. The town also did not properly dispose of an old fuel-oil tank near the plant on town-owned property, according to DEC Region 4 Director Gene Kelly.

"DEC Region 4 law enforcement staff worked diligently in following leads, interviewing witnesses and compiling the facts of this case," Kelly said in a release following the initial investigation. "The town recognized the continued risk posed by the mercury gauges and switches at the plant and agreed to replace all of them at a cost of \$258,000 over the next year."

Cunningham said the state's estimated replacement cost was a "high-end estimate," and that the replacements will likely cost less. The new flow meters will, however, be able to be used in the town's eventual new water plant. The town's Clapper Road plant in Selkirk already has updated meters, he said.

The DEC said the replacement estimates came from the town's commissioner of public works, and Georgeson said they

have documentation from the town's attorney.

The supervisor also previously stated that the town was forced to sign the consent order because it couldn't prove that less than a pound of mercury had spilled at the water plant, a statement he still stands by.

Further controversy arose surrounding the water plant spills in August when the town fired Albany County Sheriff's deputy Gary Fish after he served 12 years as a part-time patrolman for the town's water supply.

Fish alleged he was fired be-

cause he spoke out about the mercury spill at the town's water plant, but town officials said he was fired because of repeated scheduling conflicts, but would not comment further because the incident is a "personnel matter."

As a veteran law enforcement officer of 23 years, Fish said the town wasn't fully disclosing incidents involving mercury and other problems at Bethlehem's water treatment plant located in the town of New Scotland. He was hired by the town in 1996 to patrol the restricted reservoir.

Fish claimed his termination has nothing to do with scheduling and is the result of his talking to Town Attorney James Potter after a meeting about what he called inaccuracies in the report given to the public by Public Works Commissioner Josh Cansler in February regarding mercury spills at the water plant.

Both Potter and Cunningham said Fish was not fired because of talking to anyone about the matter, but neither could elaborate because it was a "personnel matter."

Fish said more mercury was released inside of the water plant than what was reported and that workers were constantly put at risk by "having to track through mercury for two years."

The town is currently on schedule and in compliance with its replacement of the mercury flow meter, according to the DEC.

town board meeting. "I was a little shocked when I came in."

Cunningham said the reason it wasn't on the agenda was because the judges had just notified him of their choice earlier that day and they wanted to get Creed on the job as quickly as possible.

"They [the judges] sent me a memo on Tuesday afternoon, which is why it ended up not being on the agenda, saying they wanted to appoint Karen to clerk," Cunningham said Friday, Sept. 26, during an interview at Town Hall. "So I just acknowledged her appointment at the board meeting so there was public knowledge ... and the next step was that we approved her salary attached to that position."

According to New York municipal law, town judges have the right to choose their own clerk, but a town board has to approve

the salary of the position and therefore essentially gets final say over the appointment.

"The budget is all controlled by the town board, but the actual appointment of the clerk is similar to my appointment of my personal secretary, it's a unilateral thing," Cunningham said. "The board has no power to approve or disapprove."

Messina has been openly critical of the appointment process in the past year, calling for a standard set of guidelines to regulate such appointments — a proposal that was defeated in a 4-to-1 vote earlier in the year.

Messina called on judges Dwyer and Donovan to "do the right thing" after Parsons abruptly quit the job and to carefully pick a qualified candidate. He said he was happy to see that the judges hired from within, while citing several advantages to internal candidates, but said he hoped that the judges had interviewed other candidates besides Creed.

Messina said he was pleased with the open, fair and transparent process when the town

appointed Suzanne Traylor to replace outgoing comptroller Judi Kehoe, but he said he was surprised by the judges' appointment because he didn't know it had happened until the town board met.

Messina said given "the difficulties" of the past appointment by the judges, he thought they would have opted for a more extensive and open search for their next clerk.

"I don't know her well, but I hope she does well," Messina said of Creed.

The court clerk position oversees more than \$1 million of receipts annually for the town.

Cunningham has maintained over the past year that there is no need to have a set of guidelines for town appointments and that Messina's previous proposition is "a solution to a problem that doesn't exist."

The board unanimously accepted Creed's and Yates' appointment. Creed was approved a salary of \$57,973, and Yates was approved a salary of \$30,428.

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

Will readers warm up to Kindle?

Log on to Amazon.com, and the first product you'll see advertised is the Kindle, a wireless reading device that allows people to download thousands of books, newspapers, magazines and blogs instantly to a portable electronic device.

With a display fashioned to emulate the look of real paper, it is designed to make people feel more like they're reading a book and less like they're staring at a small, electronic device. It allows readers to download materials in less than a minute no matter where they are — in bed, the bathroom, a coffee shop, an airport.

"My first thought was, 'Oh, this won't work,' just because we've seen a lot of things like this over the years that haven't worked, but I guess from what I've read, people seem to like it," said Dan Hubbs, director of Adult Services at the Saratoga Springs Public Library.

The Kindle can hold more than 200 titles at once, and weighing 10.3 ounces, it's still lighter than the average paperback. The list of the Kindle's assets goes on, but will it eventually put an end to reading actual books, newspapers and magazines or is it simply a device — albeit a costly one at \$359 before tax — meant to make life more convenient for the avid reader?

The Kindle does have drawbacks. First and foremost, a buyer can't actually see one or touch it to experience what it's like before purchasing it because the device is only available through Amazon.com's Web site.

Amazon.com does host a discussion board called "Find a Kindle in Your City," where people can post an inquiry about whether or not someone has a Kindle in, say, Delmar. If they get a response, they can arrange a meeting somewhere to discuss all things Kindle. A recent request to meet with a Capital District Kindle owner has, as yet, gone unanswered.

"The Kindle has sort of become like a unicorn; everyone talks about this beautiful creature, but nobody ever seems to see it," said Susan Novotny, owner of the Book House of Stuyvesant Plaza in Albany.

There is also the price — \$359 is no small amount to spend in the current economy. The Kindle's high price may be preventing consumers from purchasing it, just like the iPhone's high price prevented many from purchasing the cellular phone when it was first introduced to the market in 2007. (Apple eventually cut the price in half).

"If it dropped down to \$200 or even \$50, which it probably will in the next couple of years, more and more people will buy them," says Novotny.

Electronic reading device provides books on command

For some people, the main problem with the Kindle is that it isn't a book. Part of the pleasure of reading a book is holding it in your hands, smelling the paper, flipping through the pages, marking them and folding them. While the Kindle allows readers to do these things digitally, nothing compares to the real deal — it's like the difference between talking to a friend in person versus through Skype. It's exciting because you can hear their computer, but nothing beats being with that person in the same room.

"The book is a pretty damn good invention — it doesn't take batteries, and all it involves is a little bit of light, and if it falls into the pool you're not out of luck," said Novotny.

Despite its drawbacks, the Kindle has a number of positive attributes. It's environmentally friendly because it saves lots of paper and it's good for the back because it doesn't weigh anything but holds a substantial amount of information.

After the initial purchase of the device, books are generally \$9.99, unless otherwise specified (nowadays, unless you're buying books used, they cost anywhere from \$15 and more), and you can connect to the Internet to download reading materials from anywhere, regardless of whether or not you have a wireless network.


"It would be really nice for people who travel," said Hubbs.

"When I go on vacation with my family, I like to bring a number of books, but often the weight is a problem with flying. If I could have a device like this with a number of books, I would like that."

Also, the Kindle is great for students because they can download journals and articles easily. If textbooks ever become available, students will save hundreds of dollars and a lot of back pain with their Kindle.

It's also a wonderful device for people with vision problems because the size of the text can be adjusted.

Will the Kindle replace books someday? No. There will always be purists who love books for reasons the Kindle will never be able to replicate. However, for certain people, the Kindle will certainly make life more convenient.



And there are some popular titles that aren't included on the Kindle's "extensive" list.

"There has been a few surprising exceptions, such as the Harry Potter series and 'To Kill a Mockingbird.' Being active in the theater, I would also love it if I could get scripts to modern plays," says Amy Pelleg, a Kindle owner in Ohio, via e-mail.

The design isn't flawless either. The placement of the buttons on the bottom of the Kindle makes it easy to turn a page when you didn't mean to, or hit a button you didn't intend to when shifting positions in a chair or forgetting to lock the screen when transporting the Kindle. Security for the Kindle, such as setting passwords so that someone else doesn't purchase a title

without your authorization, also can be difficult to access.

"It's only when I'm shifting around, i.e. casually carrying the Kindle over to the fridge to get a snack without either turning it off or locking the screen [that a button is accidentally hit]. I also wish there was better security," wrote Pelleg in an e-mail.

"The only time you have to enter your password is when you initially register your Kindle. Ideally, they should make you enter your password every time you make a purchase to ensure purchases aren't made without your knowledge. Maybe they already have this feature, but I'm just not aware of it," continued Pelleg.

For the past few years, the Shenendehowa Rotary Club has held a road rally fundraiser. Drivers use geographical and historical clues to find their way along the road rally route, trying to meet mileage and time goals.

The rally has been a big success, but it also posed a dilemma, Rotary president Dave Tomney said. Since drivers reached the finish line at different times, early finishers were often left with little to do while they waited for everyone to complete the route.

So this year, the Rotary is combining the road rally with its inaugural Harvest Festival. Set for Saturday, Oct. 5, at Clifton Park Golf, 1759 Route 9, from noon to 5 p.m., the festival will offer crafts, food, music, pony rides and children's activities.

"We said, 'What do we like to do in the fall?'" Tomney said, remembering how Rotary members were trying to come up with ways to entertain the drivers who were the first to complete the road rally.

Fall fun at the finish line

"We decided, why don't we have a whole festival?"

In addition to offering fun for the whole family, the Harvest Fest will raise money for the Rotary Club, which is celebrating its 50th anniversary. Fred Droms established the local club in 1958, and today there are about 35 members, who take part in both local and international service projects.

"Whenever there's an event, everyone gets involved," said Mollie Kennedy, a co-chair for the Harvest Fest.

That spirit of cooperation was one of the things that attracted Kennedy to the club when she decided earlier this year that she wanted to get involved with some

kind of service organization. She checked out the Rotary Club on the recommendation of a co-worker, and she quickly felt it was a good fit.

"I was just enamored by the people," she said.

Tomney, too, felt a rapport with the members when he first attended a Rotary meeting about five years ago.

"It was a good group of people I met," he said.

Members often suggest service projects based on their interests, Tomney said. Locally, the club has contributed to the Clifton Park-Halfmoon Library, awarded scholarships to high school seniors and given out dictionaries to third-grade students.

Outside the U.S., the club has helped provide water purification systems to villages in Honduras and sewing machines for young men and women in Zimbabwe.

The money that the club makes from the Harvest Fest is earmarked for programs to help

children and teens in the Clifton Park/Halfmoon area - although it should be noted that admission to the festival is free. There will be a fee for the games, contests and food, and it's \$30 to take part in the road rally (\$25 for early registration).

Tomney said that the club is hoping to raise at least a couple of thousand dollars, although "anything is good."

Road rally participants will be eligible for a number of prizes, including the grand prize of a one-year family membership to the Southern Saratoga YMCA.

Kids, meanwhile, can win their own prizes at the carnival games, as well as enjoy a bounce house, face painting and miniature golf.

"We're trying to make it a big community-oriented event," Kennedy said. "It's just going to be a really fun event."



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Small numbers not a problem

Indians keep pace in Colonial Council with 15 players

The Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk girls soccer team keeps on winning, no matter how many players it has on its roster.

The Indians improved their Colonial Council record to 6-1 with last Wednesday's 4-1 home victory over Cohoes, despite the fact that roughly half of the 15 players on coach Danielle Wolfe's roster were sick.

The pushing point came when Cohoes tied the game midway through the second half. R-C-S started applying heavy pressure on Cohoes' defense, and that pressure paid off when Ashley Ten Eyck scored off a corner kick to put the Indians ahead for good. Ten Eyck's original shot bounced off the goalpost, but the rebound came right back to the senior forward and she kicked the ball inside the right post for the eventual game winner.

"She deserved it. She's been working hard," said Wolfe. "She's been my assists person, not my goals person."

Emily Scott and Caitlin Posniewski added insurance goals late in the second half for R-C-S. Ashley Wilson had the Indians' first goal shortly after halftime when her shot bounced off the Cohoes goalkeeper's hands into the net.

The Indians had some time to recover from their illnesses when their Friday game against Lansingburgh was postponed. They returned to action Monday with a non-league game against Suburban Council North Division leader Ballston Spa.

If there is one nemesis for the Bethlehem boys volleyball team, it is Burnt Hills-Ballston Lake.


The Spartans swept the Eagles in two games to win their semifinal match at Saturday's BH-BL Mid-Season Tournament at Union College.





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Program helps manage diabetes, maintain independence

Nearly a half million Americans over age 60 have diabetes. Diabetes is a chronic disease that, left uncontrolled, can lead to heart disease, stroke, blindness, kidney disease and nerve damage. Even with medication, much of the responsibility for managing

diabetes falls on the individual with the disease.

Recognizing the need for a self-management program for seniors in the Capital District, Colonie Senior Service Centers is introducing "Healthy Changes: A Diabetes Wellness Program," in collaboration with Albany Medical College Division of Endocrinology. The new program will be identical to CSSC's award-winning Osteoporosis Ex-

ercise and Wellness Program. Both programs feature education, nutrition, exercise, group discussion, and most importantly, socialization to reinforce healthy lifestyle changes.

Healthy Changes is an evidence-based model program developed by the Providence Center on Aging in Portland, Ore. The educational and support program is designed to assist older adults in the day-to-day self-management of diabetes. The weekly group meetings focus on the roles that nutrition and physical activity play in setting and achieving personal goals. Group discussions provide problem-solving help and support from other attendees, as well as connecting with community assets with CSSC and in the larger community.

But key components of all of CSSC's Healthy Aging Programs for chronic conditions are the Peer Leader Teams trained by knowledgeable experts such as Sunnyview Rehabilitation Hospital for the osteoporosis program and the Arthritis Foundation of NENY for the arthritis program.

Kathryn Godley, diabetes nurse clinician, and Teri Hutson-Mulligan, registered dietitian and educator, from the Division of Endocrinology at Albany Medical College are indispensable partners to the success of the program, not only for their expertise, but their in-depth un-

Tackling the obesity epidemic

We are literally eating ourselves to death. If we define health as the absence of disease, it is clear that most of us are not healthy. Our diet affects every aspect of our lives playing a part in our health, longevity, quality of life, and how we feel about ourselves. Today women lead fast-paced lives that leave little time to focus on proper nutrition and overall optimal health, resulting in an alarming increase in heart disease, cancer, diabetes, and bone and joint problems. The major culprit of these conditions is the chronic disease of obesity.

In the United States, 34 percent of women are obese. A woman is defined as being overweight when her body mass index (BMI) is between 25 percent and 29 percent. At 30 percent, she is obese. If you are 5-foot-2-inches and weigh 164 pounds, you are obese.

There are many factors causing obesity. First, the quality of the foods we are eating. Our diet today is high in fat and calories, which in turn cause heart disease. This is the No. 1 killer of women. Time plays a factor in this because it is easier to grab something than take the time to prepare it. Secondly, our portion size is extremely out of control. The acceptable behavior has been to "super size" our meals. Lastly, exercise is not a priority. We spend a good deal of time sitting in cars and at work, and navigating through a fast-paced, stressful day.

The results of these factors are an increase in disease. As mentioned before, heart disease is the No. 1 killer of women in America. Obesity also plays a part in Type II Diabetes, high blood pressure, stroke, hypertension, sleep apnea, osteoarthritis and cancer.

Women who gain 20 to 30 pounds after high school are 40 percent more likely to get breast cancer. Women who gain more than 70 pounds are twice as likely to develop breast cancer. Also, as women, we need to be aware of how our diet and activity affects osteoporosis and menopause.

What can we do to correct this trend? First of all, if you are overweight, find a way to take off those extra unhealthy pounds. There are many plans available. It requires finding the one that works for you. You want a program that emphasizes low calorie and fat intake and focuses on portion control. Studies show that eating six smaller meals spread throughout the day helps to maintain sugar and energy levels. Support is an important factor. You will have better success if you have someone that encourages and educates you to succeed. You will need a plan that gives you life-long weight management solutions and that is easy to follow. Exercise regularly. Monitor your blood pressure, cholesterol and sugar levels.

Instead of eating ourselves to death, we can turn this trend around. When individuals are able to achieve a healthy body weight by losing weight, they can improve their health far more than can be accomplished with medications and procedures. Most of the adverse health effects of obesity are greatly diminished or resolve completely when obese patients achieve a healthy body weight. Be educated and informed and most importantly take action to reverse the negative trends in your life.



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Seminar helps find balance between cancer and career

Last year, approximately 12,580 New York women were diagnosed with breast cancer. For many of them, continuing to work was not an option but a necessity. Ten years ago, Albany resident, mother and attorney Mara Ginsberg had to make a decision about her career after she was diagnosed with breast cancer. At the time, she was stunned to find the lack of resources available to women like her.

Around the same time, just 136 miles away in New York

City, former Harper's Bazaar Beauty Editor Carlotta Jacobson was alarmed to learn that five board members of her organization, Cosmetic Executive Women (CEW), were diagnosed with cancer within two years of one another. While they battled different types of cancer, they all shared a common bond: They continued to work through treatment. Jacobson was disappointed by the lack of information to help women navigate a complicated situation during a challenging time.

Both Ginsberg and Jacobson decided to do something. Ginsberg founded To Life!, a nonprofit organization that provides the Capital District with breast cancer education and support services. Jacobson launched Cancer and Careers - a nonprofit that offers online information, free publications and support for employees and employers with cancer. It is fitting then, that this year, in recognition of Breast Cancer Awareness Month, these two organizations have partnered with Roche to host a seminar - Balancing Cancer and Careers - that will assist women in the Capital District who decide to continue working after a breast cancer diagnosis.

"Work doesn't stop once you've been diagnosed with cancer. Many women have to - and want to - work during and after treatment," said Carlotta Jacobson, founder of Cancer and Careers and pres-





Group provides cancer screening services to those in need

The Cancer Services Program Partnership of Albany (formerly Healthy Women/Living Partnership) is grant funded through the state Department of Health and Centers for Disease Control. The partnership offers free breast, cervical and colorectal cancer screenings, and prostate education to the uninsured and underinsured, those with high deductibles, and screenings not covered by insurance, for example.

Women who are uninsured or underinsured, and over the age of 18, can receive a free breast exam and pap smear/pelvic exam through local OB/GYNs and physicians in the area. Women who are uninsured or underinsured and are either over the age of 40 or have a fam-

ily history of breast cancer may also receive a free mammogram through hospitals and imaging centers in the area.

Men and women over the age of 50 are also eligible for colorectal cancer screening with a FIT kit (fecal immunochemical kit). If someone has a family history of colon cancer, polyps, Crohn's disease, inflammatory bowel disease, or colitis, they may be eligible to go straight to colonoscopy. Any FIT kits that come back positive will be followed up with a colonoscopy.

If someone is diagnosed through the Cancer Services Program Partnership with breast, cervical, colorectal or prostate cancer, all further treatment will be covered for those who meet eligibility requirements.

If patients have barriers to receiving care, the partnership also offers supportive case management services. Anything from encouragement, education, transportation or language barriers can be addressed.

The partnership also includes an incentive program to the patients for returning their FIT kits and receiving comprehensive screening services. The incentives vary but include food and gas gift cards from local businesses.

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Take steps to prevent the flu

What is influenza?

More commonly known as the flu, influenza is a respiratory illness caused by a virus. The flu is contagious and is generally spread from person to person through coughing or sneezing. Every year in the United States, more than 200,000 people are hospitalized from flu complications, and 36,000 die from the flu. Usually, these are high-risk patients.

Who is at risk?

Although anyone can catch the flu, certain people are at a higher risk of having serious complications from infection. These people include children, pregnant women, people 50 years of age or older, people with chronic medical conditions such as asthma, diabetes, or heart disease, nursing home or long term care residents, health-care workers, or anyone in contact with these groups.

How is the flu prevented?

According to the Center for Disease Control, the best way to prevent infection is being vaccinated annually. The vaccine protects against the three main types of influenza, and the flu shot is approved for people 6 months of age or older. The vaccine usually becomes available early in the fall, so this is the best time to get vaccinated.

Who should get vaccinated?

Anyone who wants to decrease their chance of catching the flu should get vaccinated, but it is especially important for

people listed in the high risk group to receive the vaccine. Caretakers and loved ones of those at high risk should also consider vaccination to protect themselves as well as the person at risk.

Who should not get vaccinated?

If you have had a severe adverse reaction to the influenza vaccine in the past or have a severe allergy to chicken eggs, you should not receive the vaccine. If you currently have a moderate to severe illness along with a fever you should wait to receive your vaccine. Also, the vaccine is not approved for children less than 6 months of age.

Can you get the flu from the flu shot?

No! This is because the injection contains inactive or killed virus, so it can not give you an infection. The most common side effects from the shot include redness and pain at the site of injection.

Can pharmacists provide immunizations?

Yes! New York recently became the 49th state to allow pharmacists to immunize. For a pharmacist to become certified, they must undergo a rigorous training course where they are taught information on vaccines, how to administer them, and what to do in case of an emergency.

Why are pharmacists suited for becoming immunizers?

There are many reasons, the first being that vaccines are medications, and pharmacists are medication information experts. Second, pharmacists are the most accessible health care

providers to the community, and third, pharmacists can directly target high risk groups in need of vaccination.

Four ways to stay healthy this flu season

- Get vaccinated this year and every year.
- Know the signs and symptoms of influenza.
- Take everyday preventive actions.

These include frequent hand washing, covering nose and mouth when sneezing, avoiding contact with sick people and staying home when you become sick.


You may have the flu if you have combination of fever, headache, fatigue, muscle aches and pain, sore throat, dry cough, and runny nose.

- Seek medical attention if you do become sick.
- Antiviral medications are an

available treatment option for fighting an infection. They are most effective when started soon after becoming sick.

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Institute offers range of treatments

Options allow women to keep up with the demands of changing times

The aging of America is a phrase we have heard countless times in the past decade. More women in America are over 50 than under 30, which is a very interesting statistic and one of the primary reasons the Capital Region Institute for Pelvic Medicine was developed. Greater demands are placed on us in the workforce, and we must remain productive longer to survive this ever-changing economy. However, the body continues to age and weaken, creating certain problems that prevent us from performing at an optimum level.

Commercials on TV are dominated by advertisements for overactive bladder syndrome and incontinence. Less than a decade ago, the options for treatment of these life-altering conditions were nearly limited to the use of adult diapers. Understanding and research into the causes of these conditions has opened up an entirely new field of medicine termed pelvic reconstructive surgery. It is impossible for the average gynecologic surgeon to stay current with all the new information, medications, and surgical skills required to treat these conditions. The mission of the Capital Region Institute for Pelvic Medicine is to advance the treatment of pelvic floor dysfunction and incontinence. With this sole focus, the surgeons at the institute have become leaders in this field and are able to provide treatment options normally only available at large metropolitan hospitals.

Not all types of incontinence or prolapse conditions require surgery. Many different options

are available from retraining the bladder through biofeedback to stimulating the nerve to the bladder through neuromodulation. The key is proper diagnosis by a physician who specializes in this area of medicine. Testing of the bladder is vital to determine the type of incontinence or other pelvic dysfunction. Then, a treatment plan can be established.

Even with surgical intervention, return to normal function is rapid. Most procedures are using soft synthetic mesh that has been used extensively in hernia repairs. This technology is relatively new, but the results have been very promising. The beauty of synthetic mesh is that the body cannot reabsorb the material and it will not weaken in time. This type of surgery can be completed in less than half the time of traditional surgery and restores the lost pelvic support. It has opened up a whole new array of possibilities for women with little down time experienced.

Today's society places great demands on women to function well in the workplace, continue to be physically active, and remain competitive in the marketplace. No longer do women have to live with an embarrassing condition or alter their lifestyle because of aging and weakening of the pelvic organs. Science and technology have revolutionized the treatment for incontinence and pelvic relaxation.
