CRASHING THE PARTY



Ballots make room for alternatives to Democrat or Republican candidates

As the iconic donkey and elephant battle for votes this season, a third-party mammal with a long history of making waves in state politics is waiting in the wings.

There are many names for third-line political parties. Some of them have a negative connotation - possibly influenced by the two major parties - like "spoiler," but those third parties often provide a home to disenfranchised and dissatisfied voters.

No matter how you see them, they affect New York politics, especially local elections, according to Albany County Board of Elections Demo-

cratic Commissioner Matthew Clyne.

"If there's a party with 150 people in it, they can throw off 700 votes in a general election ... and it's quite common," Clyne said.

Clyne, who is also the town of Bethlehem's Democratic chairman, said that one simply needs enough signatures to create a political party.

"If any independent party gets 50,000 votes in the gubernatorial elections, they get put on the ballot," Clyne said. "When I say on the ballot, I mean a

Subway's Jared visits Hamagrael Elementary

Franchise spokesman encourages students to make healthy choices

One of the country's biggest weight-loss icons visited one of the nation's heart-healthiest elementary schools on Tuesday,

Oct. 14.

Subway spokesman Jared Fogle paid a visit to the students at Hamagrael Elementary in Delmar after the school was recognized with a national award from the American Heart Association for its fitness initiatives.

Fogle told the students that his gain of nearly 300 pounds and a negative self-image began with a favorite pastime of many children - video games and junk food. He said his journey back

to a healthier body weight began with a simple lifestyle change of eating right and exercising.

His message to the third- and fourth-graders at Hamagrael was to make healthier eating choices, get lots of exercise, and to practice moderation when watching television or playing video games.

"My grades went down, my self confidence went down," Fogle said. "Everything around me began to crumble as I got heavier

and heavier."

Fogle, who is an Indianapolis native, said he was about the age of the students in the audience when his quality of life declined. He said he couldn't play sports any longer or go to the movies, or eventually even sit in the back seat of a car.

Fogle said he eventually reached the tipping point, when he weighed more than 400

District freezes spending

Budget tightening to affect field trips, new hires, staff development and some supply requests

Bethlehem Central School District announced during its Tuesday, Oct. 14, board of education meeting that it would be initiating a "non-essential spending freeze."

Superintendent Michael Tebbano said the district is taking a proactive approach in monitoring its finances during a time of national and global economic woes. Tebbano said the school would take a series of precautionary measures to limit spending and identify areas of savings and cost avoidances.

He said all essential operations, particularly the core academic program for students, would continue without being affected. The superintendent emphasized that the district is not on the brink of a financial crisis, but he wanted to take precautions to alleviate as much of the financial burden as possible.

Tebbano said the district is putting a freeze on additional hiring and certain supply requests, as well as discontinuing professional programs outside of the district and holding other professional programs after school hours so that substitutes will not have to

Man charged with swiping home improvement goods

Bethlehem police arrested a Slingerlands man for attempting to steal more than \$1,000 worth of ceiling tiles from Lowes in Glenmont.

Robert A. Hugill, 31, was charged with felony fourth-degree grand larceny after police received a call on Saturday, Oct. 4, that a man had been caught taking 74 ceiling tiles from the home improvement store without paying, according to the arrest report.

According to the report, Hugill was allegedly seen putting the ceiling tiles in a shopping cart before leaving the store.

Hugill was approached outside the store and escorted back inside by the store's loss prevention officer, the report states. Police took Hugill

into custody without incident, and the ceiling tiles were recovered by the store.

Bethlehem Town Justice Paul Dwyer arraigned Hugill.

Other arrests

• Jennifer L. Wilder, 28, of Troy, was arrested Tuesday, Oct. 7, for two counts of second-degree forgery and first-degree identity theft — both felonies — and fifth-degree criminal possession of stolen property, a misdemeanor.

Bethlehem police said Wilder was transported from the Albany County Correctional Facility to the Bethlehem Police Department on an active felony arrest warrant signed on April 12.

Wilder was processed at the police department and arraigned in front of Bethlehem Town Justice Paul Dwyer, who set a \$25,000 bail.

She waived her right to preliminary hearing and was sent back to the Albany County jail after being scheduled to return to town court on Wednesday, Nov. 5.

• Aundrey P. Holeman, 40, of Troy, was arrested by Bethlehem police on Friday, Oct. 10, for felony first-degree criminal contempt and second-degree harassment.

Police said they received a call from a towing company that a man was there at the time attempting to retrieve personal items from an impounded vehicle.

An arriving officer "was familiar"

with Holeman, having arrested him in August, and a check revealed that two active warrants for Holeman's arrest were issued in the city of Troy, according to the arrest report.

Holeman was placed in custody and transported to the Albany city line on Route 9W where a Troy police officer took Holeman into custody and transported him to the Troy Police Department for processing, the report states.

• Erica L. Duell, 19, of Feura Bush was arrested Saturday, Oct. 11, on Glenmont Road for felony fourth-degree grand larceny.

Bethlehem police said the Kmart in Glenmont had reports from early September until Thursday, Oct. 9, that Duell was allegedly undercharging customers for

merchandise purchased in the store.

The loss for the store totaled \$1,947.82, according to the arrest report.

The week before Duell was arrested, she allegedly "committed similar acts," which were captured by the store's surveillance video camera, according to the report.


Police said they took a statement from Duell and then arrested her without incident before transporting her to the Bethlehem Police Department for processing.

She was arraigned before Town Justice Paul Dwyer and scheduled to return to court on Nov. 5.



Towns schedule hearing on linkage study

Guilderland and Princetown consider ways to develop land along Route 20

The towns of Guilderland and Princetown have prepared a plan to guide development of a 4-mile stretch of Route 20 between Route 158 and Duanesburg, which makes recommendations for land use and transportation upgrades, according to information provided by the town.

A public meeting about the plan is scheduled for 6:30 p.m. on Thursday, Oct. 30, at Princetown Town Hall.

A presentation of the draft plan concepts by consultants, Behan Planning Associates and the Capital District Transportation Committee, which helped fund the land use and transportation study leading up to the meeting, will take place at the event.

CDTC representative Chris O'Neill said the organization matches 50 percent of funding that the municipalities put up in order to conduct linkage studies, such as the one for Guilderland and Princetown.

He cited the importance of

"integration" as an important reason to develop land.

Donald Csaposs, a grant writer in Guilderland, said Princetown has had some pressure to develop the land on their end, and Guilderland has not been able to develop the area due to a lack of water, which prompted the study.

Csaposs said the goal of the study and public meeting is to look at a way to develop the area in a mutually beneficial way, without being overly concerned with the town line.

"We're not expecting anything particularly controversial," Csaposs said of the meeting.

The Princetown side has limited commercial development, while the Guilderland side is primarily zoned for agricultural uses, although Csaposs said there has been a recent push by the public for residential development in the area.

Princetown Supervisor Nicholas Maura said the primary benefit for Princetown will be the opportunity to sell its water to Guilderland. He added that the proposal is still in the preliminary stages, and could take years to realize.

Csaposs said a general discussion about developing

the 4-mile stretch was held in Guilderland last November, which led to calls for preservation of the rural character, slowing traffic down in the area, considering a hamlet development near Dunnsville, improving the aesthetics of the area and further study of the long- and short-term implications of the plan.

The meeting in Princetown will not go over some of the specifics of the type of development that is feasible, and where funding will come from.

Csaposs said funding for future developments could come from state grants, a developer or even the local tax levy.

Cops nab suspect in Queensbury

Surveillance footage helped in arrest

Officers with the Bethlehem Police Department announced they have arrested an Albany man in connection with a Saturday, Oct. 11, robbery that occurred at the Delaware Plaza Key Bank.

Police charged James L. Eleby Jr., 40, of Wellington Avenue, Albany, with first-degree robbery, third-degree criminal possession of a weapon and fourth-degree grand larceny—all felonies.

Eleby was located and taken into custody Wednesday, Oct. 15, in Queensbury. Police Lt. Thomas Heffernan said New York State Police helped confirm Eleby's location.

"We were in the area following up on leads," Heffernan said. "We had reason to believe he was going to a specific location."

Heffernan did not release the amount of money stolen from the Key Bank, but said none had been recovered. Heffernan said Eleby indicated he had a gun, but no weapons were found during the arrest.

After Eleby left the bank with the money, Heffernan said, he was last seen running through the parking lot of Delaware Plaza.

"We have reason to believe that he went back into Albany after the robbery," Heffernan said.

The clear surveillance footage of the suspect during the alleged heist helped police, said Heffernan.

"That's what we like to see," he said of the unobstructed view of the suspect in the footage. "If you're going to invest in a surveillance system, you should get one with good quality footage because what's the point if you can't make out the suspect?"

Eleby was arraigned in Bethlehem Town Court and sent to the Albany County Correctional Facility without bail. He appeared in town court on Friday, Oct. 17, for his preliminary hearing.

Police said that several local law enforcement agencies, including the U.S. Marshals Service, Albany Police Department, Troy Police Department, Guilderland Police Department, and State Police, as well as tips from the public, assisted with this investigation.

Bethlehem helping Bethlehem

Bethlehem Senior Projects Inc. and Bethlehem Senior Services work for the community

The Town of Bethlehem has a history of helping its neighbors.

Borrowing from its rural roots, the town has adopted an attitude of caring for its own, and when it comes to the town's seniors, there is no exception.

Bethlehem Senior Services and the not-for-profit Bethlehem Senior Projects Inc. work together in order to provide services to the town's seniors, but they don't stop there.

The organizations also help coordinate the town's food pantry and facilitate programs such as HEAP and WRAP to financially strapped residents.

Karen Pellettier, director of Bethlehem Senior Services, said that originally, the senior services department was a town-run entity that was funded through taxes. That part of it is still around, but has expanded to create the Bethlehem Senior Projects Inc., which is the organization's "fundraising arm," and isn't funded by the town, according to Pellettier.

"It all began by word of mouth. Our volunteer core started in the 1980s with just a few volunteers and as our programs grew, the core of volunteers grew also," Pellettier said.

"When we got our first van in 1984, I didn't know how we were going to find drivers, and the supervisor then looked out the window and when he saw a retired telephone guy walking down the street, he said 'There you go, there's one, there's your driver.'"

It started when retired telephone workers from New York Bell, or "Bell Heads," as they called each other according to

Assistant Director Joyce Becker, began recruiting each other to drive the van.

"The best volunteers are the ones recruited by volunteers," Becker said.

The department is mostly made up of retirees, but the department also works with the school district and the justice court and gets about 15 teenagers to volunteer each year.

There are still plenty of people in town who don't know about the senior services that are offered, said Becker.

"We are not aware of every person over the age 60 in town," Becker said. "So there's a lot of people we're probably missing because we don't even know they're out there."

Pellettier said some of the town's seniors struggle alone because they are very independent people.

"They keep trying to make it on their own because that's just who they are," Pellettier said. "But we have volunteers who are very committed. We have one volunteer who has volunteered over 8,000 hours, he's been with us like many of our volunteers since the mid-80s and he's still here today."

This morning I realized just how little spare time parents have. My son and I were brushing our teeth, the last thing we do before we leave for school and work. Kevin rinsed, spit and put his toothbrush away. I rinsed, leaned in to spit and hit my head on the corner of the medicine cabinet door, which had sprung open while I was looking down at Kevin. I winced in pain and whispered a minor curse.

"Dad, are you all right?" Kevin asked.

"Yeah. We have to go. We're running late," I said hurriedly. Then I put my hand to the sore spot on my head. When I took it away, there was a little blood on it.

Two thoughts occurred to me then: I don't have time for this.

And then: I don't have time to even bump my head? What's going on here?

Kevin snapped me out of my cabinet-induced haze. "Dad, you've got the bleed on you."

I immediately thought of Jesse

"The Body" Ventura in "Predator" (long before he was governor of Minnesota) saying, "I don't have time to bleed."

But instead, "Thanks, Bubba, I'll get a tissue. After that, we really need to go."

Cruising down the highway toward Kevin's school, running late as usual, Kevin asks me how long it takes to get to his school from our house.

"About one SpongeBob and a Bugs Bunny," I say, and he knows exactly what I mean.

In the DeVoe household, as I'm sure it is in households across the land (although you'd never admit it), time is measured in television shows. Dinner is not at 6:30 p.m. Dinner is "after the news." Bedtime is not at 8:30 p.m., it is after "The Suite Life of Zack and Cody."

And on those winter weekend afternoons, when I need a break from the kids for a while? Naptime is over when the hockey game is over.

My son doesn't yet know how to tell time. (Apparently his

kindergarten teacher and I have not had the time to teach him.) So, once again, I turn to the television. As a half-hour episode of "SpongeBob SquarePants" is usually made up of two belly-hurting, laugh-aloud tales, one unit of SpongeBob is equal to roughly 15 minutes. Half-hours are measured in "Zack and Cody's" or "Drake and Josh's." There are no hourlong children's shows, the marketers know better than to waste their time. So, hours are either measured in a combination of shorter shows or in terms of a show of which Kevin is aware but doesn't watch. For me, I might say bedtime is in one "Lost," my wife may tell him it's in one "Project Runway."

Shorter times are more difficult. We used to measure those in "Johnny and the Sprites," but then Disney had to go and turn that into a half-hour-long show and ruin my whole system. So we had to go to the classics. Not only does Bugs Bunny teach my son about time, but he also teaches him the social merit of cross-dressing and throwing pies at Depression-era gangsters.

It's a win-win, really.

I wish there wasn't such a rush to do ... oh, just about everything in life. It goes by quickly enough without our helping it along by zipping down the highway or microwaving dinner or rushing

the kids out the door to this function or that.

My father, retired after a handful of decades of working hard for the U.S. government, is perfecting the practice of taking his sweet time. When we visit my parents, which is often, I try my damndest to get wrapped up in my father's sense of leisure. We do things that not only require time, but are done best when done slowly. We visit. We cook breakfast. We eat at the large dining room table and we take our sweet time doing it.

After breakfast, my father puts on albums from the large collection he's amassed over the span of his life. Whole albums from people like Johnny Rivers, Ray Charles, Melanie, Harry Nilsson, played deliberately from beginning to end.

One Sunday morning we were standing in front of the wall of my parents' house where my father keeps his records. From wall to wall, floor to ceiling, there is vinyl. From country to blues, from rock to Motown, from singer/songwriters to pre-fab groups like the Monkees and the Archies, there is vinyl.

Something struck me that I thought my father might be interested in. I took my iPod out of my pocket and held it up

to him.

"You know," I said, "you could put just about every record you have on this one iPod."

A sad look overcame my father's face.

"Why in the hell would you want to do that?" he asked.

The concept of listening to a single song is foreign to my father. Back in his day you could buy a 45 of a single you wanted, but even then, there was a B-side. And not just that, but the physical act of selecting a record out of a stack of them, placing it on the turntable and lowering the needle to the album produces a sense of delayed gratification that is rarely found these days.

There is preparation in playing vinyl, a ritual maybe, the purpose of which would be defeated by the instant accessing and playability that digital media offers.

It's a shame really, but in this day and age, even when we're doing something leisurely, we're doing it more quickly than ever.

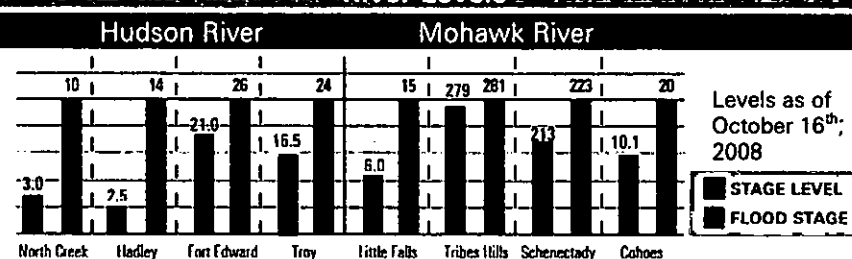

Breslin releases executive budget

Prelim plan focuses on human services and potential decreases in revenue

Albany County Executive Mike Breslin released a \$580 million spending proposal that adds more than \$2.5 million for human services, according to information provided by his office.

"Those kind of people who live on the margins... those kind of people need our assistance," Breslin said.

He said those hit by job loss, health care loss and the inability to keep up with inflation have been hurt the most by the lagging economy.

"We are determined to keep up our efforts to create housing for those on the margin," Breslin added.

Breslin said he anticipates continued increasing demands for public aid with Wall Street in its current critical state.

"The current financial crisis will affect New York more than any other state. There is no doubt that the next state budget will include significant additional reductions. And the impact on Albany County residents and Albany County government is unavoidable," said Breslin in a written statement. "Family assistance funding will be increased by \$1.6 million and an additional \$742,000 has been added for emergency assistance."

Breslin said the spending plan is only 2.2 percent higher than in 2008 — a number lower than the annual inflation rate — despite increases in Medicaid, energy, health care and employee cost of living adjustments.

Information provided by his office states that the 2009 proposed budget features a real property tax hike of 4 percent. This will bring the real property tax levy to \$67.9 million.

"For a taxpayer with a home valued at \$150,000, this represents an increase of \$13 to \$26 a year, depending on municipality,"

Breslin said.

He said sales tax revenues are projected to raise less than one percent over 2008 collections, and the spending plan does not include the use of surplus or reserves.

Due to "economic stresses on the state and policy changes already in place, Breslin is expecting a reduction in state aid of 3.9 percent, or \$3.5 million, and he said additional cuts are expected due to the "extreme financial challenges," the state is facing.

Breslin said he also placing an emphasis on ongoing energy conservation initiatives that include the sewer district, correctional facility and other county facilities.

According to Breslin's office, the county is looking at a cut in the deficit for the nursing home programs. The nursing home deficit will be \$4.56 million, a number that is below \$10 million for the first time since 2002.

The decreased deficit is the result of funding from a "retroactive intergovernmental transfer fund," according to the county, and that funding could further reduce the deficit in the next two years.

Breslin is proposing action to eliminate staff at the Albany County Nursing Home, as it continues to employ an operating staff that used to run two facilities. As a result of Berger Commission requirements, Albany County runs one facility now, he said.

Breslin said more than 40 position will terminate on March 31, but those positions do not provide direct care to nursing home residents.

"This was a very difficult decision. However, it is not fair to ask taxpayers to fund staff for two facilities when we are operating only one," Breslin said. "Since 2007, we have committed resources to develop community based long term care services in Albany County... the waiting list for in-home services has been eliminated."

Breslin is also including expanded services for the homebound elderly by more than \$600,000 and an additional

\$300,000 for home delivered meals.

"The Albany County Housing Trust Fund will receive an additional \$300,000 to support affordable housing programs and projects to assist homeowners, tenants and the homeless gain access to housing," according to information provided by Breslin.

The executive budget is now under review by the Albany County Legislature. They plan to hold two public hearings, one on Tuesday, Oct. 28, and the other on Tuesday, Nov. 25, both at 7:15 p.m. in the Legislative Chamber Courthouse, according to George L. Infante, D,C,I, WF-Albany.

Infante said the county Legislature will get input from the department heads before issuing a recommendation to the county audit and finance committee to draft a version of the budget.

For the dogs

A couple of weeks ago, we at *Spotlight Newspapers* asked our readers to be more charitable in the coming months, to think of our fellow man in these trying economic times.

This week, we'd like to remind you to extend that charity to our four-legged friends. Think about the cats and dogs that need our care, and possibly our homes, as we come into these chilly winter months. Every municipality in our coverage area has some sort of animal control policy and shelter to keep strays and unwanted pets off the streets and properly cared for.

Editorial

According to the Humane Society, approximately 56 percent of dogs and 71 percent of cats that enter animal shelters are euthanized. These animals may have been put down due to overcrowding, but they may also have been sick, aggressive, injured or suffered something else. More cats are euthanized than dogs because they are more likely to enter a shelter without any owner identification. Only 15 percent of dogs and 2 percent of cats that enter animal shelters are reunited with their owners. Only 25 percent of dogs and 24 percent of cats that enter animal shelters are adopted.

It is estimated that between 4 million and 6 million animals are euthanized annually in the United States, and for reasons that shouldn't lead to their destruction. The top reasons owners have given for voluntarily relinquishing their pets include moving, the cost of pet maintenance and not having enough time for a pet.

It's not the animals' fault that people didn't properly gauge the responsibility of being pet owners, and they certainly shouldn't be killed because someone didn't have the time or resources to care for them.

So help them out. We're not asking people to impulsively take an animal into their homes, but if you can afford to help out your local animal shelter, throw them a bone. Literally. Or some food, or any donation you're comfortable with.

And who knows, one of these days you may feel like getting a first — or another — pet. Give these shelter animals a chance; they need you.

In last week's editorial, "AMD says yes, but now what?" it was incorrectly stated that the company is giving the towns of Malta and Stillwater a combined \$10 million, or 0.83 percent of the \$1.2 billion in tax money AMD is getting from New York state. It turns out the number is lower — half of what we said, in fact. Malta and Stillwater will split \$5 million, or less than one half of a percent of what we are giving them as an incentive to come to this state.

Making a third party legit

A vote for "Grandpa" Al Lewis was a vote for freedom

I, too, have unwittingly participated in New York's third party process.

I usually don't pull the lever and tell, but in this particular case I believe it is justified in its timeliness and relevance. Exactly 10 years ago I cast my first vote as a high school senior for none other than the late Albert Lewis.

For the uninitiated, he was better known as "Grandpa" Al Lewis, for his television role of Grandpa in "The Munsters."

Growing up as a latchkey kid, I could think of no better way to officially enter society and perform my civic duty then by pulling that lever all the way at the bottom of the ballot for Grandpa Munster. As an 18-year-old, the ink wasn't even dried on my registration card, but there I was, voting for a Munster.

Relegated to the land of TV re-runs before coming back on the small screen as a candidate for the governor of New York, I couldn't think of a better "first vote" choice. To many of New York's 18-year-olds of the time, a vote for Grandpa Munster was a vote for freedom.

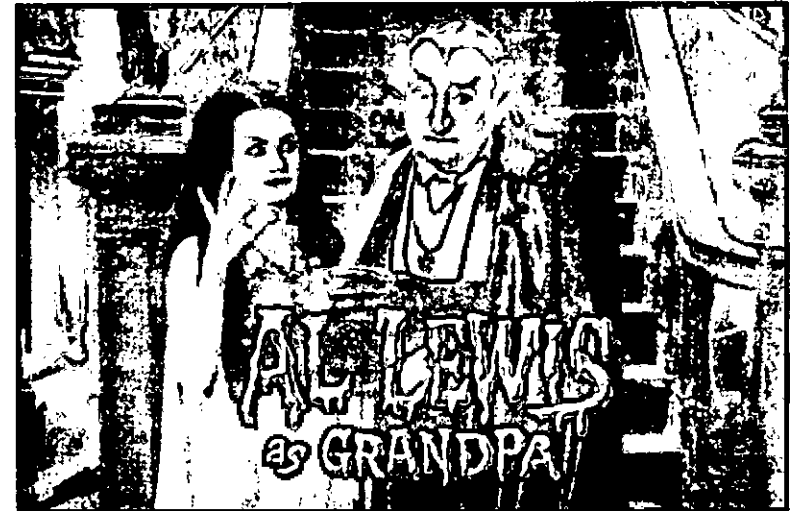
Long story short, I cast one of the 52,533 votes to officially put the Green Party on the New York ballot in 1998 for four short years. Without my key vote, the Green Party has failed to ever make it on the ballot since (well, technically my vote and about 9,999 other votes since the party was around 10,000 votes short in both 2002 and 2006).

In all seriousness though, my first exercise in civic

responsibility proved to be a very good lesson, one that I still carry to this day.

Although I cannot say I am a fan of New York's strict political party participation rule, where you only get to vote for candidates of your party and only if you're enrolled in a party, I do like our process to get third party candidates on the ballot.

New York is unusual in that even if you're not on the ballot, if you can get enough signatures, you can still run with the big boys.

Grandpa Munster taught me the value of having choices. Even if those choices don't have a chance in hell of becoming a reality, it's still nice to have a choice (and for those of you who were wondering, Grandpa Al Lewis was cremated and buried in his favorite cigar box on Feb. 18, 2006).

And what's more American than choice?

I mean, if former WWF wrestlers and foreign actors can become governors (or governorators), why not a Munster?

I'll tell you why. Because New York simply wasn't ready for a Munster in Albany, that's why. The timing was all wrong. In a year when an ambitious congressman named Charles Schumer ousted the powerful Republican Sen. Alfonse D'Amato and a time when Americans biggest worry wasn't a Wall Street crash, but what the president was doing with his intern in the Oval Office — we just weren't ready for that type of change.

But if Grandpa Munster were Eliot Spitzer's right-hand man after he got caught with his pants down, boy would things be different today. And don't get me wrong, I think Gov. David Paterson is doing a

fine job, especially considering with what he's inherited, it's just that he's no Munster.

The point that I'm trying to make is that Munster or no Munster, we should have as much choice as possible, and if it takes a pop icon to create a new political party that is officially recognized by the board of elections, so be it.

Choice is good for everyone in the political process and for everyone in general. With a legitimate multi-party system,

you will not long hear the cries of "spoiler" when a third-party candidate actually has a presence in an election.

Part of the change can come about by allowing people to put candidates on the ballot instead of the parties. The party process is fine as long as those who do not participate or endorse the major parties are allowed to take part in the nominating process.

I think nationwide, the federal government (and I can't believe I'm actually saying this) needs to take New York's lead in the political party process and open up the two-party system into a three- or even four-party process.

Although the smaller parties may not be able to compete head to head with the two big parties, they can use their influence to cross endorse and collectively oppose political ideals and candidates.

Let national candidates seek signatures and get on the ballot, too. If you need 50,000 votes here in New York where we have 11.4 million registered voters, why not make a requirement that you need 1 million signatures to get on a national ticket? There are an estimated 201.5 million registered voters in this country, after all.

At least that's what Grandpa Al Lewis would do.

Wasteful lunch gear is garbage

Editor, *The Spotlight*:

Eagle Elementary School's new "try it" policy of completely disposable lunchroom gear for our children seems like it is really on the wrong track.

It has been estimated that, on average, a school-aged child using disposable lunch gear generates 67 pounds of waste per school year, or 18,760 pounds of lunch waste for just one average-sized elementary school. Add to that disposable trays, plates and cutlery and you have nearly double the size of the garbage pile.

It really seems like this is the wrong approach for our school system to take in a time when all Americans, especially those tasked with educating our children, should focus their energies and finances on sustainable solutions to our everyday needs.

In addition to the extra garbage, what kind of message are we sending our children with this new policy? That washing dishes is too expensive, too difficult or too troublesome?

The actual costs of using disposable products at this level are significantly higher than the cost of the merchandise, because of hidden or uncharged fees, and downstream costs are incalculable. As our children get more educated, they will question our decisions and our right to have made them. And they will be right.

Since I think most people make money-smart decisions when it comes to their personal income, this feels to me like

someone made a decision that reflects "not in my backyard" feelings — it's OK to dispose of tons of avoidable garbage as long as they don't have to claim responsibility.

So, I invite the decision makers here, whoever they may be, to defend their decision. Tell us what their decisions will do for our children and what the children will learn from being a part of a disposable culture. Tell me why tax dollars are being spent this way, and why we offer this to a community that can, in the majority, afford the initial costs, especially since they are quickly offset by long-term gains.

In a time when children are being told to reduce, reuse and recycle, adults in our own community should be making decisions that reflect the efficient means of living, including finding ways of decreasing the amount of garbage we produce and of getting the most from our hard-earned money.

Bethlehem is such a gifted community, supported by a large constituency of smart, educated and caring people. Using this collective power, I am sure that we can find a better way to feed our children school lunch — a better way to show them how to make well thought out decisions — than by offering them Styrofoam trays and disposable cutlery.

New Scotland schedules ethics code hearing

CZAC members, size-cap advocate say there is nothing to hide

The Town of New Scotland has set a date to hear arguments regarding a potential violation of the town ethics code by a member of the Commercial Zone Advisory Committee.

Town Supervisor Tom Dolin said the town will hold a meeting Wednesday, Oct. 29, to discuss ethics questions surrounding Commercial Zone Advisory Committee member Liz Kormos.

Kormos has been cited as having a conflict of interest in her role on the committee to draft new language for the town's zoning laws because she once acted as a consultant for a prospective buyer of the Bender melon farm, the site of a proposed development that has resulted in a temporary retail building moratorium.

CZAC Chairwoman Roz Robinson drafted the formal conflict-of-interest allegations, Dolin said.

In addition to her committee seat, Kormos is also a member of New Scotlanders for Sound Economic Development, known as NS4SED, and a supporter of a 50,000-square-foot size cap on retail developments in the town of New Scotland.

A temporary moratorium on new retail buildings larger than 30,000 square feet has been in place since May to allow officials, through recommendations by CZAC, to draft zoning laws that better coincide with the town's comprehensive plan. The moratorium was enacted in response to a commercial development proposed by Syracuse-based Sphere on the Bender melon farm property that would include a 137,000-square-foot "anchor" store.

Peter Lauricella, Kormos' attorney, said Kormos has not yet decided if she will waive her right to confidentiality at the Oct. 29 hearing. He said all ethics hearings are confidential unless

the subject chooses to waive that right.

He also said there is some confusion about statements Kormos previously made about waiving her right to confidentiality regarding the matter.

"She never had any confidentiality to waive," Lauricella said.

He said that since there had been no formal charges made at the time of Kormos' statement, she still has the option to maintain her confidentiality at the meeting.

"She has nothing to hide," Lauricella added, maintaining that Kormos.

Lauricella also said that Sphere has been openly critical of Kormos and said their actions regarding the matter "call into question their motives."

NS4SED President Daniel Mackay also took issue with Sphere, and town officials, stating that there was a push for Sphere's development before any word of it was made public.

Mackay cited meetings held

in December, January and February between Sphere and town officials, which he said featured a request by town officials to the town engineer to set up an escrow account to cover the costs of engineering for Sphere's proposed development well before any public notice was made about developing land in the commercial zone.

Mackay took issues with the idea that "people were intending to move forward," by early February, before any discussion in front of the Town Board occurred.

"All of that was being set into motion before it was discussed in public," Mackay said.

Greg Widrick, a managing partner at Sphere, said no such agreement was struck.

"We never wrote a check," he said. "We would never do that [before a deal was made]."

"[Mackay] is trying to stir the pot when there is nothing to stir," Widrick said.

Widrick said NS4SED members are "irrational," and

"think they can bully the town."

He also said NS4SED has communicated with a small group of dissenters of another project Sphere is undertaking in Hamilton and has become "obsessed" with Sphere.

Widrick added that Sphere would be content with a 100,000-square-foot cap on retail buildings, if there were "incentives" attached to it that would allow developers to exceed the cap in exchange for providing services to the municipality. Widrick said this is common in other municipalities.

"We don't need 219,000 square feet. We're not fighting for Wal-Mart here," Widrick said. "We're flexible, the other group [NS4SED] is not flexible."

He said he is hopeful that the moratorium will come to a close as soon as possible, to eliminate the uncertainty about developing land in New Scotland.

A six-month extension of the moratorium, as previously discussed by town officials, is still on the table.

Dulcimer dreams come true

Nina Zanetti of Guilderland wins national folk music award

A biology teacher at Siena College played her heart out on her mountain dulcimer last month at one of the country's most difficult folk music competitions, and her efforts won her first prize.

Nina Zanetti, of Guilderland, took top honors in the National Mountain Dulcimer Championship, Friday, Sept. 19, in Winfield, Kan. Zanetti played four pieces on her mountain dulcimer, including "Danny Boy" and "Cool Water."

Zanetti said her interest in the mountain dulcimer was sparked one day about 15 years ago when she came across a picture of a woman under a tree playing the dulcimer. Zanetti said she was inspired by the woman's gracefulness.

"I fell in love with the look of the instrument," Zanetti said.

She said she initially tried her hand at the instrument, but it did not stick. Then, about five years ago, Zanetti said, she was looking for something new and positive in her life and thought she could try the instrument again.

"I found myself needing something new to do, I was kind of in a dark place," she said.

She started attending meetings of the Dulcimer Association of Albany in Latham.

Zanetti said she heard some extremely talented players and decided she wanted to take lessons.

She started taking lessons with Susan Trump, a well-known teacher. After a good deal of practice, dedication and guidance, Zanetti said she was the one being asked to give lessons at various festivals around the country.

"The dulcimer community is really, really welcoming and accepting," she said. "It very

quickly became a big part of my life."

Sue Carpenter, a friend and dulcimer teacher who recently moved to Texas, offered to drive with Zanetti to the Winfield, Kan., competition if Zanetti could get down to her.

Zanetti said she was at first apprehensive about taking time off from work, but she was able to get a few days off.

"The fates were conspiring," she said.

Zanetti said her approach to the competition was less of a focus on winning, and more of an emphasis on bringing her particular style of playing to a new audience.

"It's music that speaks to me. It's not the traditional style," she said. "In its simplest form [the dulcimer] is very accessible. You can make it as complex as you want, though."

That approach worked, as she took first prize and won a cash prize, a trophy and a new, hand-made mountain dulcimer.

Zanetti said she recently released an album "The Sum of the Parts," in June with her playing partner Bill Collins.

El McMeen, a guitar player and owner of the Piney Ridge Music record label, said Zanetti is a gifted and evocative dulcimer player.

McMeen said Zanetti's CD is "one of the finest instrumental recordings I've had the joy of experiencing ... a glorious celebration of how wonderful this instrument can sound."

"She's a wonderful human being and it comes out in her music," McMeen said. "She's got a great heart for music."

McMeen also said Zanetti is a talented singer and has the rare ability to bring that vocal element to her dulcimer playing. He said it is difficult to elicit a vocal element with a plucked instrument like the dulcimer, but Zanetti manages to do it nonetheless.

McMeen, who alluded to Zanetti's modesty numerous times, said her win in Kansas is "a big deal," although it is hard to get her to admit it.

Zanetti said she loves the instrument because of what it means to her to play it, and that it helps her to "maintain perspective."

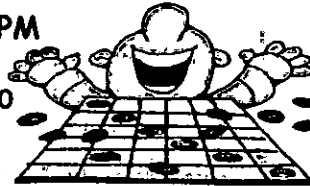

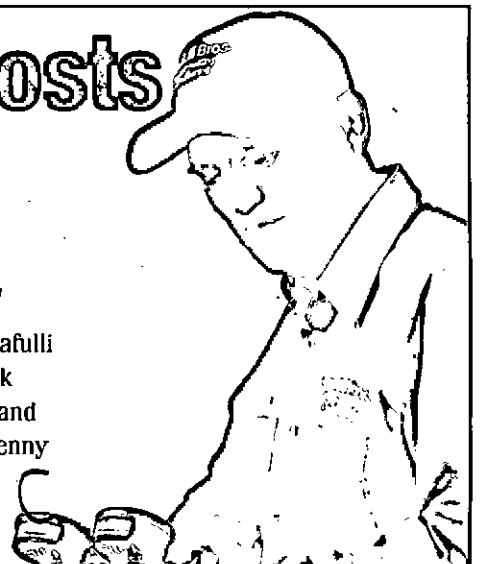

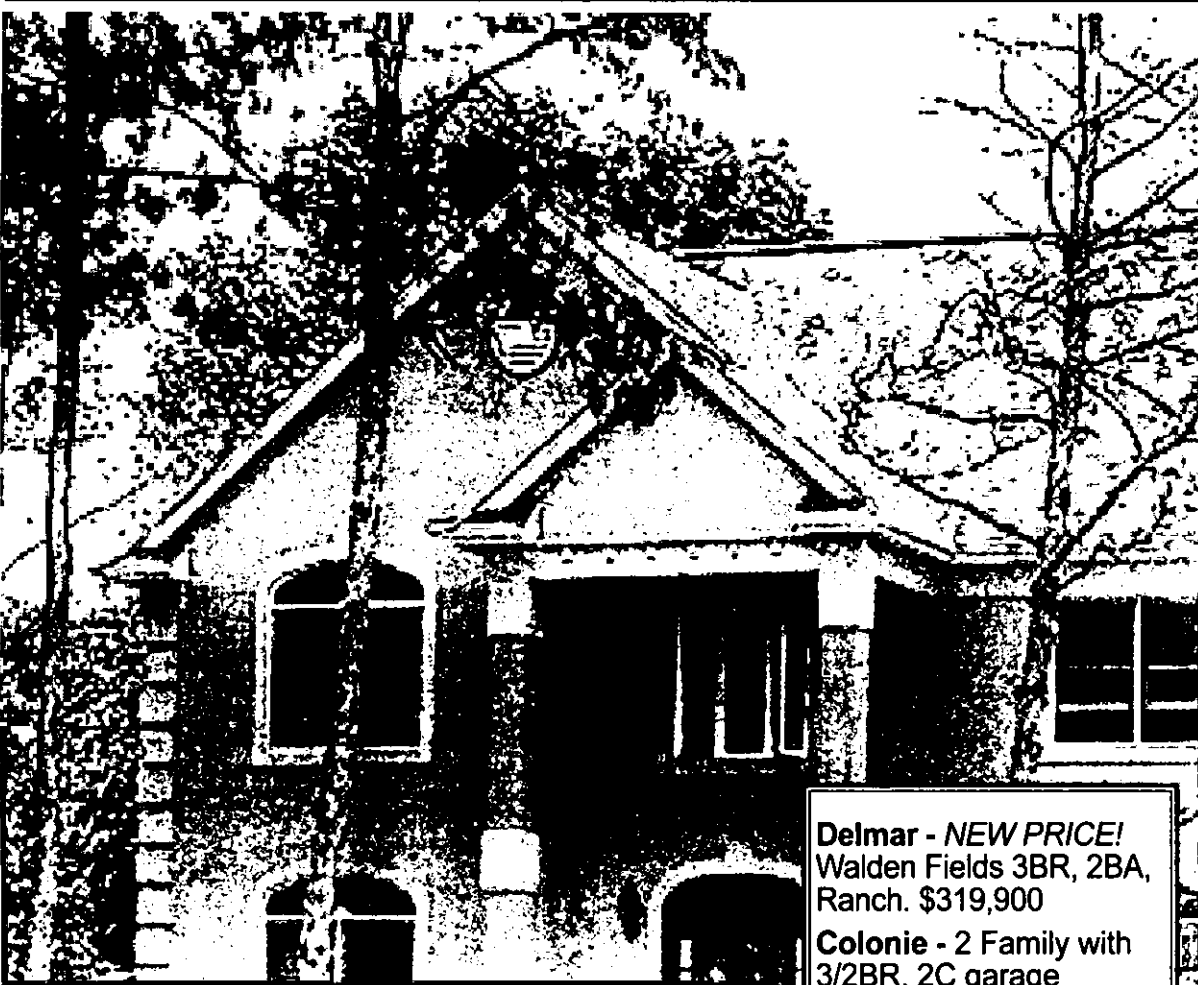

perennial position on the ballot."

Currently there are five perennial political parties in New York that get an automatic four-year ballot line: Conservative; Democrat; Independence; Republican; and Working Families.

According to the state's board of elections, "An independent nominating petition for candidates, to be voted for by all the voters of the state must be signed by at least 50,000 voters, of whom at least 100 shall reside in each of one-half of the congressional districts of the state."

However, even if you don't have the backing of an "official" New York party, Clyne said, you can still create an independent political party. It's not as common for statewide offices where one needs to garner 50,000 voters or more, he said, but it is quite common in local elections.

"It's not normally seen in bigger positions ... it's hard to do this on a countywide basis or a legislative basis," said Clyne. "But if you get the minimum number of signatures you can select that party's name and select your party's logo."

The minimum number of signatures for county elections is 1,500, and they can be signed by anyone from any party. However, Clyne said, the catch is that the signatures cannot appear on any prior designated petitions for office from other candidates or they could be ruled invalid.

"Anybody could sign it, but they are subject to the same review as every petition," Clyne said. "We look at the petitions and its face, if it appears valid, it is accepted."

Clyne said the board of elections acts as an "administrative" body, not a watchdog group. That, he said, is left up to the political parties and the candidates seeking office.

"It is up to the parties and the candidates to police this stuff," said Clyne. "You can nominate yourself ... but if you don't have enough signatures or too many are invalidated, they can knock you off the ballot."

Locally, Roger Cusick of the newly created Integrity Party is an example of this process; he gathered 2,157 signatures and survived a legal challenge to run for Albany County District Attorney, according to the county's board of elections. Cusick is challenging incumbent District Attorney David Soares.

Assemblyman Tim Gordon, who is Bethlehem's Independence Party chairman, said he wasn't enrolled in a party before joining the Independence ranks in 2001.

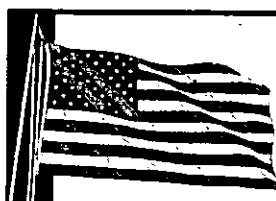
"Being in the Independence Party you have a very important role. It's like you're a super voter," Gordon said. "Sometimes it can make the difference in winning or not winning an election."

Gordon said there is a political philosophy in his party of working for the common good that appeals to voters.

"There's a phenomenon with the Independence Party in that we often get more votes on our line than we have members of the party," said Gordon. "Other parties only get a fraction of their enrollment to vote."

Third parties also give major party members a chance to vote for another candidate while saving face.

"It allows a Democrat or a Re-

publican to pull the level for another party without having to say 'My granddaddy would role over in his grave if he knew I was voting for a Democrat or Republican,'" Gordon said. "Sometimes people are partisan and just can't pull the lever of the other major party."

When a non-perennial third-party candidate is placed on the ballot, they are "placed on the floor," Clyne said, meaning they are the lowest lines on the voter's ballot.

The current New York political parties had to earn their spots on the ballot.

In 1994, a billionaire from Rochester named Tom Golisano helped put the Independence Party on the New York ballot when he ran for governor against former governors George Pataki and Mario Cuomo.

Although Pataki beat incumbent Cuomo, Golisano secured the Independence Party a place on the ballot, where it remains today.

The Conservative Party of New York was founded in 1962, according to the state board of elections, by a group that included J. Daniel Mahoney, Charles E. Rice and Charles Edison, who became frustrated with the state's Republican Party.

James Buckley was elected as New York's senator in 1970 on the Conservative line, but he ran for re-election in 1976 on both the Republican and Conservative lines, ultimately losing to Daniel Patrick Moynihan who was eventually succeeded by current Sen. Hillary Clinton.

The Working Families Party was originally founded in New York in 1998 and has spread to Connecticut, South Carolina, Massachusetts, Oregon and California. It was created by a coalition of labor unions, ACORN, community organizations and members of the former New Party.

The party cross-endorsed gubernatorial Democratic candidate Peter Vallone in 1998 and received more than 50,000 votes. The party has since elected Patricia Eddington to the Assembly in 2000 and because it also cross-endorsed former Gov. Eliot Spitzer in 2006, the party will remain on the New York ballot until 2011. The party garnered more than 150,000 votes in the Spitzer election, according to the state board of elections.

"It's basically a two-party system, but I'd have to say it's not too hard to get 50,000 votes statewide if you had the money to spend,"

Clyne said. "You could get just about anything on if you had a credible candidate and wanted to spend the money."

The Green Party made a brief four-year appearance on the state ballot from 1998 until 2002 when former actor "Grandpa" Al Lewis garnered 52,533 votes running for governor. Lewis attempted to be placed on the ballot as "Grandpa Al Lewis," but that designation was denied by the board of elections.

The party was dropped from the ballot in 2002 when gubernatorial Green candidate Stanley Aronowitz only received 41,727 votes, according to the state board of elections. The party failed to make the ballot again in 2006 when gubernatorial Green candidate Malachy McCourt got 40,729 votes.

A big role that third parties play in New York, which isn't allowed in most other states, is the cross-endorsement of political parties for one candidate.

"That's not the norm, most states want to protect the two-party system," Clyne said off political cross endorsements. "There's a lot to it, but it can form a weird combination of parties, even if they have nothing in common philosophically."

For example, the Conservative Party has endorsed Congressman Michael McNulty, D-Green Island, but no Republican has won a statewide office in New York without the Conservative Party support since 1974, according to state records.

Clyne described the cross-endorsements a "marriage of convenience to achieve a common result."

He added that sometimes the creation of third-line political parties allows for candidates that "aren't fit to deliver a newspaper," but they still influence elections.

"They really have an impact on the political landscape at this point ... particularly on the local level in Upstate New York," Clyne said. "It's hard to run three lines to one, I don't care where you're running"

However the major parties are subject to the same rules as the minor ones.

"Actually the Republicans came dangerously close to not getting on the ballot," Clyne said about a gubernatorial race in the 1980s.

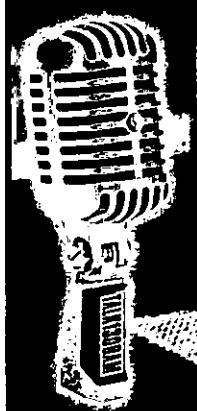

Bus boss runs a tight ship

Facility upgrades and strict maintenance schedule keep things rolling along

Although that yellow school bus pulls up every day without fail, Al Karam knows exactly what goes into keeping 143 buses and 116 routes running smoothly and safely.

He also knows exactly what goes into getting outside at 3 a.m. to check on road conditions during a potential snow day before reporting back to the district superintendent.

Karam is Bethlehem School District's transportation director, and it is his job to oversee every one of the 3.2 million miles traveled by Bethlehem buses each year, which are driven by 133 drivers and assisted by 34 bus attendants.

As a former Marine, Karam runs a tight ship, and he works

with what he describes as a dedicated, hardworking and tight-knit staff. On a Tuesday, Oct. 14, tour of the district's facilities, Karam walked through a day in the life of his busy transportation department.

"We've got 170 people working here, and the only time you'll see them all here at one time is when we have our monthly training meeting," Karam said, walking through a break room complete with a dispatcher headquarters. "There are 632 mandates ... that we have to adhere to."

The room was recently expanded as part of a new capital construction project for the district. A new fully automated bus wash was also added to the facility.

Before the bus wash, each bus had to be washed by a single pressure washer, and there was no way to properly wash the undercarriage of the vehicles, a place where salt and other chemicals can wreak mechanical havoc.

Karam said something as simple as keeping the buses

clean can save a lot of money in maintenance in the long run.

The bus garage consists of three large bays where seven mechanics with 67 years of combined experience work on and maintain all 143 buses.

Maintenance and safety is the key priority there.

"Our goal is to get to at least five large buses a day," Karam said of the rigorous 21-day inspection schedule needed to maintain each bus. On top of the district's inspections, the state's Department of Transportation sends an inspector every six months to school's transportation department to do its own inspection.

Bethlehem now also touts a 2.4 percent DOT out-of-service rate for 2007-08, which is among one of the best in the state, according to Karam.

"Before I got here in 2000, they had a high of like 24 or 26 percent out-of-service rate," Karam said. "That means that one out of four or so buses were down for one reason or another. That's not good, it should be below 10 percent."

He credits the addition of two mechanics to the staff and community support for the department with helping the district get the rate down so radically in less than a decade.

The district recently restructured its bus routes, which on an average year takes 732 hours to map out for a coming school year, in order to maximize the number of children on buses and find the shortest routes possible.

During a Wednesday, Oct. 1, board of education transportation department presentation, Karam answered the question frequently asked of why the buses spotted around town don't seem full of students.

Karam said that it often depends on where on the route the bus is, whether it is just starting or ending, and the driver may also be between routes.

"You can only transport so many students over that time and distance and still make it to school on time," he told board members.

When it comes to alternative fuels Karam said he has spoken

with Superintendent Michael Tebbano about the possibility of hybrid or other types of buses to be added to the fleet. However, Karam said, the district doesn't want to invest in first-generation technology, and that it could cost just as much to replace a single battery pack as it would to buy a whole new bus.

Tebbano agreed, saying it is something the district will keep an eye on.

"This is something that we are certainly going to continue to look at as time goes on and these technologies develop," Tebbano said.

Fuel prices do continue to be volatile, Karam pointed out, adding that it can make budgeting very difficult. For example, in 2002 the district was paying 68 cents for a gallon of diesel as opposed to \$3.46 this year.

However, Karam quickly pointed out, there is only one thing that is the most important aspect of the school bus for any parent.

"Riding on the yellow bus is eight times safer than being in a personal car," Karam said.

pounds, and knew that he had to do something. That change began one day when he was in a Subway shop reading its nutritional information and Fogle said he thought if he ate two sandwiches a day and walked at least 30 minutes a day, then he could lose the weight.

He lost more than 90 pounds that first month, he said.

Fogle now travels the country as his full-time job speaking to students and other groups about the benefits of a healthier lifestyle. He said his No. 1 priority is to speak out against childhood obesity, a cause near and dear to his heart.

Fogle said he endorses the

American Heart Association's call for the New York Legislature to pass a calorie-labeling bill introduced by Assemblyman Felix Ortiz, D-Brooklyn, and state Sen. Kemp Hannon, R-Garden City.

Subway currently labels the calories of its items in its menus in New York City, and Fogle said the restaurant chain plans to do it nationwide. The legislative bill calls for calorie labeling in chain restaurants throughout the state.

The American Heart Association cited a study that shows people who see calorie labeling generally order 52 fewer calories than those who do not.

"Hamagrael is also a participant in the American Heart Association's Jump Rope for Heart program, which is celebrating its

30th anniversary this year," said a release from the Heart Association. "In three years, Hamagrael students have raised just under \$30,000 through Jump Rope for Heart."

Fogle jumped rope with students at Hamagrael during his visit, and although he no longer eats only Subway, he said he still focuses on making healthy choices.

"This is the old me," Jared said, pointing to pair of 60-inch waist jeans. "I don't want you to ever put yourself in the position of having to wear a pair of pants this big."

Last year, based upon Hamagrael's participation in a variety of heart-healthy programs and initiatives, it was named the American Heart Association's "heart-healthiest" school in the

country. Prior to Jared's presentation, American Heart Association Regional Director for Youth Markets Jeffrey A. Masline congratulated students on the honor.

"We didn't give it to you; you earned it," Masline said.

Jared said he is planning on walking at the North Country Start Heart Walk on Saturday,

Oct. 25, at the Saratoga Race Course in Saratoga Springs. The walk is also being sponsored by *Spotlight Newspapers*. be used.

"We also closed off the concept of paid field trips," Tebbano said in a telephone interview, but added that field trips paid for by student fundraising would continue, as well as athletic trips and other programs such as the science lab trips.

After consultation with the board of education and district administrators, Tebbano announced the "non-essential spending guidelines" in a memo to all staff members on Friday, Oct. 10. The restrictions in the memo included moving curriculum development sessions after school and making them voluntary; close scrutiny by the superintendent and assistant superintendent for educational programs of any new hires, equipment or supplies, and conference requests, with only the most essential being granted; and the cancellation of field trips, with certain exceptions.

"In the current economic crisis, business, families and governments at all levels are making difficult financial decisions. BC is no different," Tebbano wrote to staff. "We must take proactive and precautionary measures to hold down spending and identify cost avoidances wherever possible."

The Bethlehem Board of Education agreed with Tebbano's action and said that taking financial precautions was necessary.

"We support Dr. Tebbano's decision to take this difficult but important step," said Board President James Lytle. "Although the board fully expects that the

governor and the legislature will keep their promises to our students and to our taxpayers and will not consider any mid-year reductions in the state's commitment to our schools, the freeze is a prudent decision that will place the district in the best position to address whatever fiscal challenges lie ahead."

The restriction that will be the most apparent to students and families is the cancellation of a number of field trips, according to district officials.

There are certain exceptions to this restriction: Nature's classroom, grant-funded trips such as Elementary Children's Theater, athletics; select Lab School field trips; and previously scheduled and paid for trips will be held as planned at this time.

The current economic climate combined with the fiscal uncertainties at the state and federal levels mean the district must be extra cautious, Tebbano said.

"We don't want to jeopardize our core academic program because we failed to be proactive right now," he said. "It is the first phase of complete budget freeze - but we're OK. I don't want people to think the sky is falling."

Tebbano said other area schools have begun to, or are planning to, take similar measures.

The district said it will continue to closely monitor the economic climate and its budget implications, particularly at the state level - an approach Tebbano called a "wait and see" process.

In the memo to staff, Tebbano wrote that further spending restrictions may be necessary.

The festivities begin at 5 p.m. and end at 9 p.m. There will be costume contests for children and adults; with prizes given for scariest, most original, funniest and the most historical.

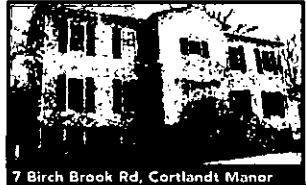
From 5 to 6:30 p.m., there will be games, a hayride around the town of Berne and pony rides. At 6:30 p.m., the hayride turns haunted.

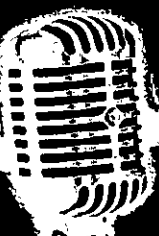

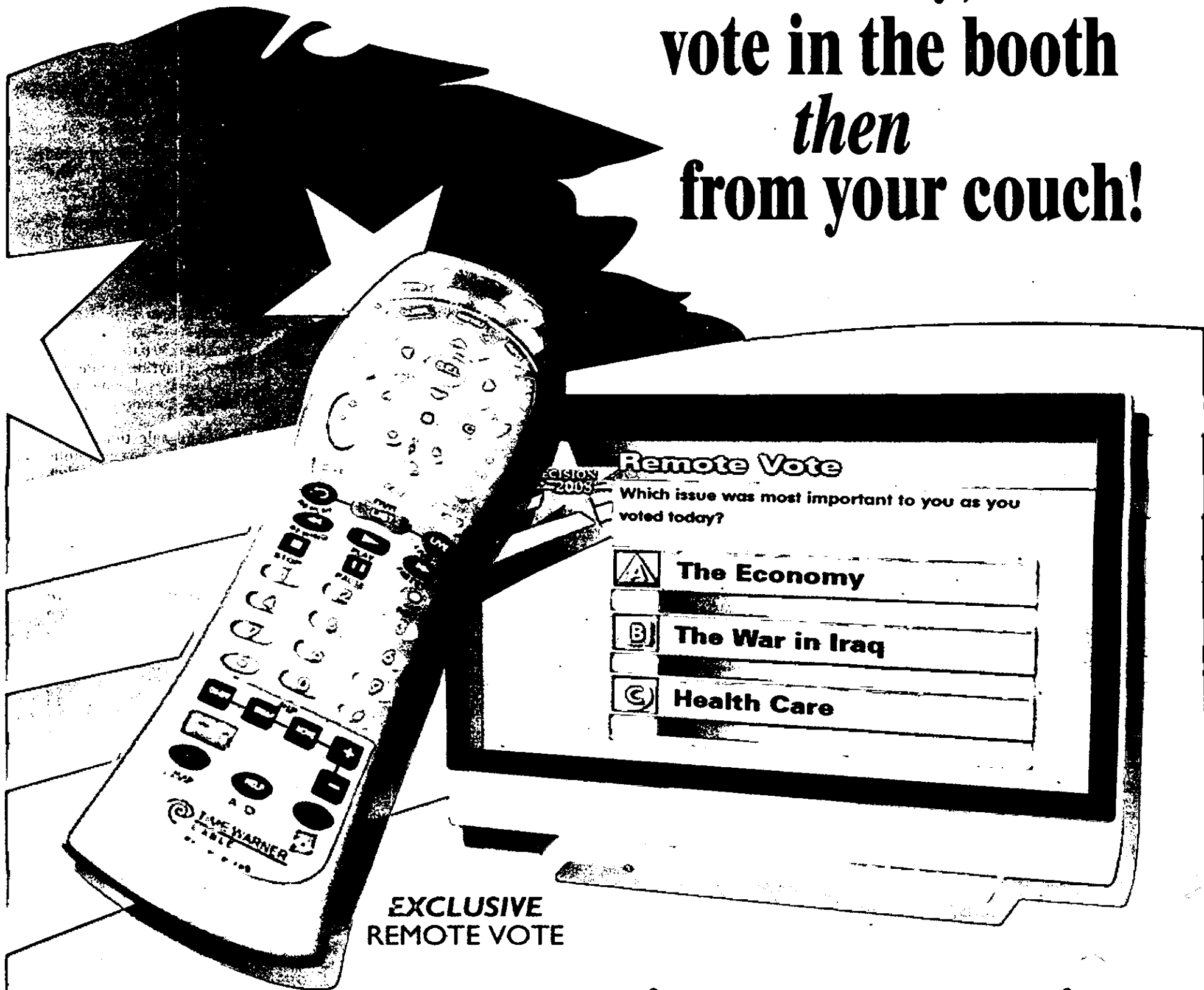

Preparing for winter

Steps taken this fall can help evergreens survive a long, hard season

Fall is a season of great transition in the garden. Cutting back and dividing perennials, raking leaves and preparing the garden for winter. Winter can be difficult here in the Northeast, especially for our evergreen plants. One way we can reduce winter damage to our evergreens is to provide some protection against the cold drying winds and bitter temperatures.

Winter protection can come in the form of "covering up" our plants. You have probably seen the A-frame structures standing over landscape plants along the foundation of houses. These structures provide shelter to the plants from snow sliding off the roof tops.

This is particularly important on slate roof houses. Sometimes I see these same structures standing over deciduous plants in the middle of the yard, and I'm not sure what they're doing.

When the ground freezes and our plants are no longer able to take up water, water loss becomes very important. Winter winds can cause the desiccation of plant tissue, causing it to die. You can protect your plants by putting up a wind screen, usually placed on the west and north sides of the plant. A simple screen can be constructed by installing wooden stakes around the plant and wrapping them with burlap.

Burlap can also be wrapped directly on the plant. This method also reduces the sunlight's ability to heat up the leaves. Overheated leaves need to cool themselves through water loss, not an option available to the plant when the ground is frozen. Burlap will breathe and not heat up as plastic would in the same situation.

Another option to help prevent water loss is to spray your evergreens with an antidessicant product. Antidessicants, also known as antitranspirants, help plant tissue retain moisture. Antidessicants are often used when transplanting nursery stock, transporting plants and for winter protection. These products can be very helpful whenever water

loss, and the plant's ability to replace it, is an issue.

Foliar sprays of an antidessicant reduce transpiration rates and thereby reduce a plant's water loss. Plants "transpire," or lose water, through stomatal pores in the leaf tissue. These pores are opened and closed by guard cells. Most plants have their stomata pores on the underside of the leaf.

Antitranspirants or antidessicants reduce this water loss in a variety of ways. Some antidessicants act by reflecting the sun's radiation from the plants surface thereby reducing leaf temperatures and

water loss through transpiration. Some products are an emulsion of wax, latex or plastic which form a thin film to keep water vapor from

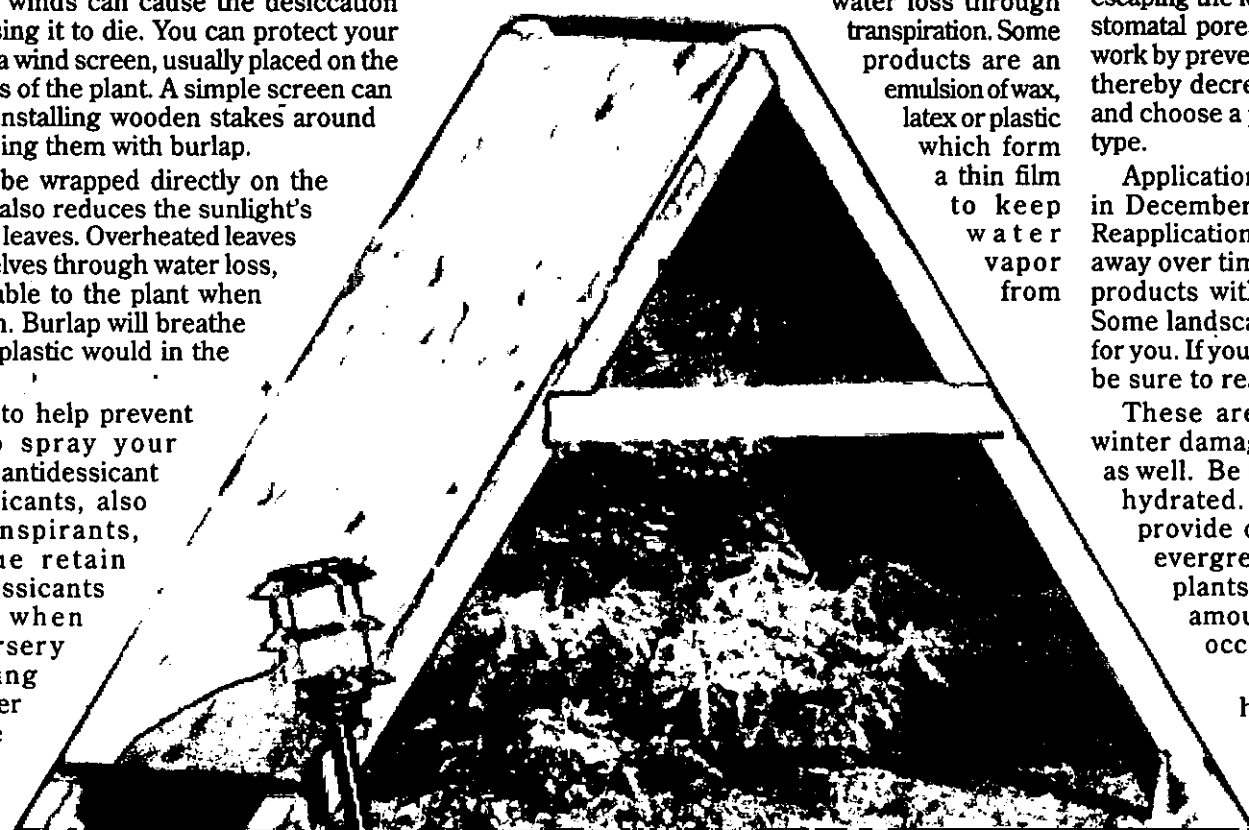
escaping the leaf tissue. This thin film partially blocks the stomatal pores reducing the water loss. Other products work by preventing the stomatal pore from fully opening, thereby decreasing water loss. Read the product label and choose a product that best fits your needs and plant type.

Applications for winter protection generally begin in December, with repeat applications in February. Reapplication is necessary as the product will weather away over time. Care must be taken in applying these products within 24 hours of freezing temperatures. Some landscape contractors can provide this service for you. If you chose to use an antidessicant this season, be sure to read and follow all label directions.

These are a few suggestions to help prevent winter damage; you may have others that work just as well. Be sure your plants go into the winter fully hydrated. If the seasonal precipitation doesn't provide one inch of rain per week, water your evergreens until the ground freezes. If your plants don't enter winter fully hydrated, no amount of covering will prevent injury from occurring.

The 2009 Miss Festival of Nations contestants in their native dress with Festival of Nations chairman Manoj Ajmera. This year's festival is Sunday, Oct. 26, from noon to 5 p.m. at the Convention Center at Empire State Plaza in downtown Albany.

Almost 45 years ago, Manoj Ajmera came to America from India to study for his master's degree at the University of Wisconsin.

But Ajmera has never forgotten his roots. When local ethnic groups put on a Festival of Nations in 1972, Ajmera took part, representing India as a dancer.

Today, Ajmera is chairman of the festival, and he delights in sharing not only his own culture, but that of more than 20 other countries.

"It's like a small United Nations," he said. "It's the easiest way to get a glimpse of the world."

That first Festival of Nations, featuring just 10 or 12 countries, was held at Hudson Valley Community College. There was lots of dancing – and lots of people.

"There was just such a response, we had to turn people away," Ajmera said.

The next year, the festival moved to the field house at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute. Since 1978, it has been held at the Convention Center at Empire State Plaza. This year's festival is Sunday, Oct. 26, from noon to 5 p.m.

The facilities aren't the only aspect of the festival that has grown. The countries that take part now showcase ethnic foods and arts and crafts in addition to dances. Attendees can sample such fare as Turkish dumplings called manti, Israeli challah bread pudding and Colombian corn pies with cheese.

The varied menu is one of

the festival's top selling points, Ajmera said.

"You can try all that good food in one place," he said.

The participating countries are represented by local nonprofit groups.

Maria Ginter, the festival's treasurer, got involved in the Festival of Nations through her church, St. Basil Greek Orthodox Church in Troy. Members serve Greek dishes like moussaka (eggplant), pastichio (pasta and meat) and baklava (phyllo, chopped walnuts, syrup, spices), and the church's youth dance group puts on its annual show at the festival.

"The kids are very comfortable performing," Ginter said, noting that some of the dancers started performing with the church group when they were just 5 or 6.

Ginter, like Ajmera, said that being involved in the festival is a good way to stay connected to her heritage, and that the young dancers have embraced that mission, too.

"They know that they're doing something that's inborn in their families," she said. "It's all about maintaining your ethnicity in this hodgepodge of so many."

Those ethnicities are also celebrated in the festival's "Miss Festival of Nations," which Ajmera stressed is not a beauty contest. Instead, contestants are judged

on their personality, community service and knowledge of their countries. Judging began Wednesday, Oct. 14, with a pageant at the Marriott Hotel in Albany, and a winner will be selected from five or six finalists at the Festival of Nations.

The festivities begin with a parade of nations. Representatives from each country will wear national costumes, and national anthems will be played. Then, the stage is taken over by dancers.

Ajmera is hoping for a good

turnout, noting that many people come back to the festival year after year.

"It's like the Fourth of July," he said. "The fireworks are the same, but people go every year."

The festival's biggest competition, he said, is traditionally football games. But this year, the NFL's schedule may work to the festival's advantage.

"The Giants play at 4 o'clock," he said with a laugh. "So people can still come to the festival and then go home and watch them."

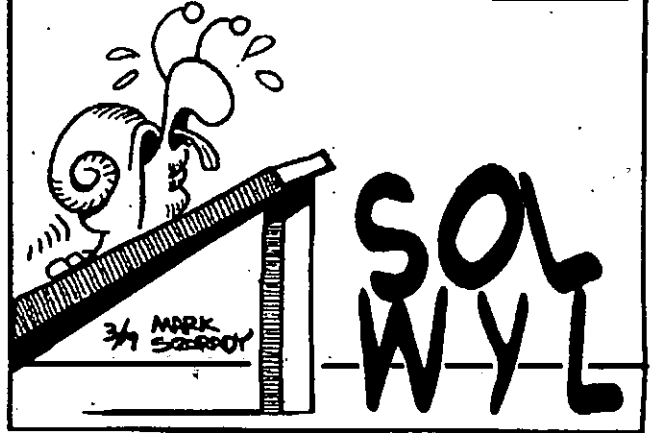

18-0 overall) will have the No. 1 seed for Sectionals after capping their perfect regular season last Friday with a 5-0 Suburban Council victory over Guilderland.

"We played very well against Guilderland," said Bethlehem coach Tom Rogan. "We moved the ball very well."

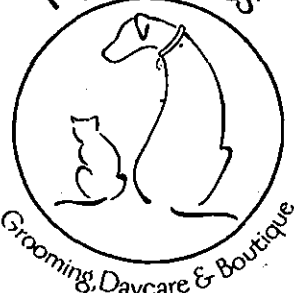

The scenario is a familiar one for the Bethlehem football team.
