## Arctic trip saves life

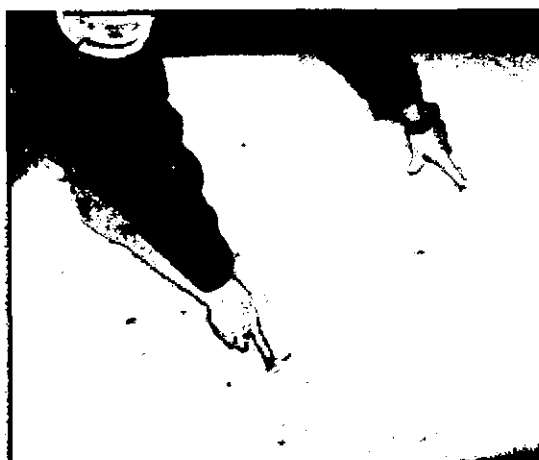

The freezing rain and snow of an Upstate winter may seem like the worst Mother Nature has to offer, but it is nothing compared to the ice, wind and cold of the Antarctic.

"When you're down there, anything can happen. It's an unforgiving continent," said Maj. Paul Bernasconi of the frigid Antarctic conditions.

Bernasconi, a member of the 109th Air National Guard Airlift Wing based out of Scotia, was on his way in mid-October to his tour of duty in Antarctica, with stops along the way in California, Hawaii and New Zealand.

## Lafarge releases mercury report

The Lafarge cement plant in Ravenna has issued a "voluntary" study of its emissions in the midst of major renovation plan to upgrade its facilities in Albany County.

Although the large smoke stack visible along Route 9W across from the Ravenna-Coeymans-Selkirk High

School is one of the largest emitters of mercury around the state, Lafarge officials say not all mercury is created equal.

John Reagan, the plant's environmental manager, said on Monday, Jan. 12, that the majority of the mercury released from the plant is elemental mercury that comes from the limestone that is harvested locally, and not directly harmful to human health.

The \$250,000 study was con-

ducted by Environmental Quality Management Inc. of Durham, N.C., which Reagan said was used as an independent and reliable testing firm. Although the plant is currently piecing together its draft environmental impact statement (DEIS) for the state's Department of Environmental Conservation to renew its permit and upgrade its facility, Reagan said

## Governor warns of 'perilous' times

Paterson gives grim report, says local government is 'too expensive'

The saying "all politics is local" is particularly true as municipal leaders dissect Gov. David Paterson's State of the State Address and his call for making local government more efficient.

In delivering his first State of the State Address to a packed Assembly Chamber at the Capitol in Albany on Wednesday, Jan.

7, the governor did not mince words concerning the financial problems that have now reached global proportions.

"So why not get right to the point, the state of our state is perilous," Paterson said in front of a joint session of lawmakers. "This is not a time for fear, this is a time for action, this is a time for courage, and this is a time for hope."

A handful of themes in the speech caught the ears of local officials in particular, including those here in Albany County, such as property taxes, state mandates and local government.

"We have to lower the cost of doing business in New York state, property taxes are too high, and we need a cap," Paterson said to a roaring standing ovation. "Our state mandates are too cumbersome ... our local governments are too expensive, and we have to find ways to make them more efficient."

Although Paterson didn't elaborate on the details of specific solutions, he laid out a laundry list of problems that plague the state, ranging from high unemployment and low consumer spending to spiraling health-care costs and a crashing stock market.

Albany County Executive Michael Breslin, D-Delmar, said he was pleased to hear Paterson addressing local issues and said he

## Former Assembly candidate arrested

A man who ran at one time for state Assembly in the 108th District was arrested for robbery, according to the Albany County Sheriff's Department.

Kenneth W. Preston, of Slingerlands, was arrested by Bethlehem police on Tuesday, Dec. 29.

The Albany Fire Department reported that Preston had recently been fired and that Bethlehem police discovered firefighting equipment in his home.

Preston was sent to the Albany County Correctional Facility on \$15,000 cash bail on second-degree robbery charges, according to Albany County Sheriff's deputies.

Preston ran for the Assembly in 2006 and came in second out of four Democrats in the September primary. Tim Gordon, I-Bethlehem, ultimately won the seat and was re-elected last November.

It isn't clear exactly what incident the charges stem from, but police said further charges may be forthcoming as the case is still under investigation.

## Other arrests

• Anna M. Ray, 59, of Watervliet, was arrested by Bethlehem police on Thursday, Dec. 18, on a warrant for fifth-degree criminal possession of stolen property, a misdemeanor.

Police said that Ray turned herself in to detectives on an active arrest warrant signed by Bethlehem Town Justice Paul Dwyer on Dec. 2.

Ray was processed without incident and arraigned by Dwyer and is scheduled to appear in Bethlehem Town Court on Jan. 20, according to the arrest report.

Her case was closed by arrest, the report stated.

## Guilderland house destroyed by fire

A Guilderland home caught fire on Thursday, Jan. 8, according to fire officials.

The fire at 28 Gipp Road in the Town of Guilderland at close to 1 p.m., according to information provided by the fire district.

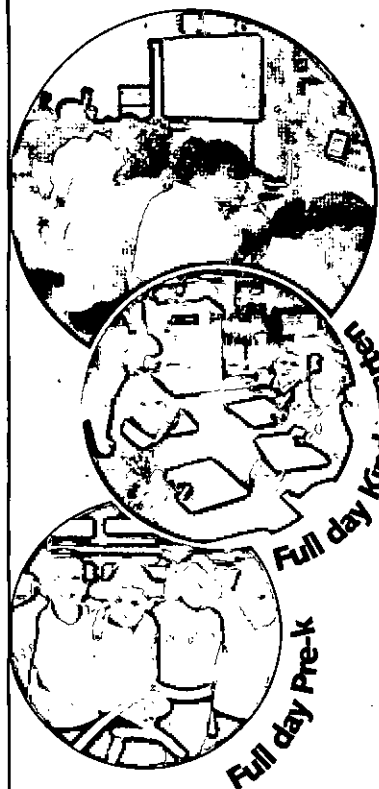
There were no serious injuries, although one firefighter was treated for minor wounds sustained during the fight.

# Glass Works on the cutting edge

Developer sees 'walkable' village as Guilderland's future

Two hundred years ago, area residents could not have imagined what it would be like to travel miles and miles in a mechanized vehicle to get a cup of milk or a loaf of bread; now people can't imagine otherwise.

Platform Realty President Daniel O'Brien, has a different vision for the future, though, and sees residential development moving toward echoing the quaint comforts of small villages.

Platform is the developer of Glass Works Village LLC, a 57-acre mixed-use development that recently was approved by the Town of Guilderland. It sits on Route 20 near the Guilderland Public Library.

Planning Board Chairman Stephen Feeney said the town of Guilderland is seeing "good growth" and the village is a large part of that.

"That's an exciting project that I hope they can pull off," Feeney said.

The development got its name from an old glass factory that used to sit on the site. Platform representatives said they consulted with Guilderland Town Historian Alice Begley to help name the village.

People have tried these types of developments in other areas, O'Brien said, and location is the most important factor in creating a "village."

Platform scoped out 10 to 15 other towns as potential locations for the village, but the Guilderland location fit the bill best, O'Brien said.

"[Glass Works] is central to Guilderland, and it has all the amenities you as a Guilderland resident would want to have," he said. "It really is a true village based on its location and a lot of the design elements."

He said the most important feature of the village is its "walkable" nature.

Within walking distance of the village is Guilderland Elementary School, a senior center, the Guilderland Public Library and a YMCA, with Price Chopper Plaza and the Western Turnpike Golf Course just down the road.

"We couldn't have created what we needed to create in another part of the town," said O'Brien.

O'Brien's wife, Lisa, a public relations representative for Platform said the village will be aesthetically pleasing, with bike trails, greenery and an

amphitheater providing residents with pleasant scenery.

There will also be a "fair space" where meetings and small festivals could be held.

"Right now, Guilderland doesn't have a town center," said Lisa O'Brien.

The village is expected to develop close to 190,000 square feet of commercial space. Nearly 100,000 square feet will be dedicated to small shops, boutiques and restaurants, 80,000 square feet of non-retail professional offices and a 10,000-square-foot day care building adjacent to the YMCA, according to information provided by Platform. There will be close to 300 residences for sale, made up of cottage homes, townhouses, condominiums and condominium lofts. All of the condominium buildings will have underground parking and elevator service. As required by the Town of Guilderland part of the residences will be designated for seniors 55 and older. Platform expects to spend close to \$100 million over a seven- or eight-year period to construct the village, according to information provided by the developer.

"There is a shortage of townhomes and condominiums in Guilderland," Platform President O'Brien said.

Glass Works Village developers intend to fill that hole and provide residents with the opportunity to live in a relatively maintenance-free environment.

There will be no lawns to take care of and residents are not responsible for waste removal and plowing.

While no official prices have been set, Platform is hoping to sell 1,000-square-foot lofts for less than \$200,000. Units for single families could also be purchased for between \$300,000 and \$400,000, depending on the extras.

O'Brien said the village will cater to a large demographic, ranging

from recent college graduates to seniors looking for a place to settle down after retirement.

"The one demographic if may skip over is the family demographic," O'Brien said. "It's mostly for young people and empty nesters."

O'Brien said families living in four-bedroom homes on larger plots of land actually have detrimental effects on the economy, costing municipalities more money per child in education costs than the residents pay in taxes. The combination of retail and other commercial buildings in the village will provide a larger tax base, and Platform representatives said it will be able to generate more taxes than will be spent on the education of the children living in the village.

"It's less expensive per square foot," O'Brien said.

Increased traffic in Guilderland, especially on Route 20 was an issue raised at numerous Town Board meetings during the Glass Works approval process. Platform representatives said they continue to address the matter. Platform studies show the bulk of the Village traffic will be on "reverse commute," meaning traffic will move toward and away from the City of Albany at opposite times of normal rush hour traffic.

Joseph Sausto, a partner of Glass Works Village LLC, also pointed out that with whatever additional traffic the village does build it will also bring with it increased commerce and growth. He added many town officials acknowledge the inevitable expansion of the town.

O'Brien said his office is already getting calls inquiring when purchases can be made, and one interested caller commented on the hopes he can cut down on his driving by moving to the village.

"I'd like to move there, and move my office there and never have to use my car again," O'Brien

recalled the caller saying.

Representatives said New York state's sluggish economy has not effected Platform's plans, and with the variety of housing options available in the village, Platform officials said they expect success.

"We're not feeling a housing crunch for this sort of project," O'Brien said.

He added that there are not many housing options for under \$200,000 in the Capital District that are so close to other community amenities.

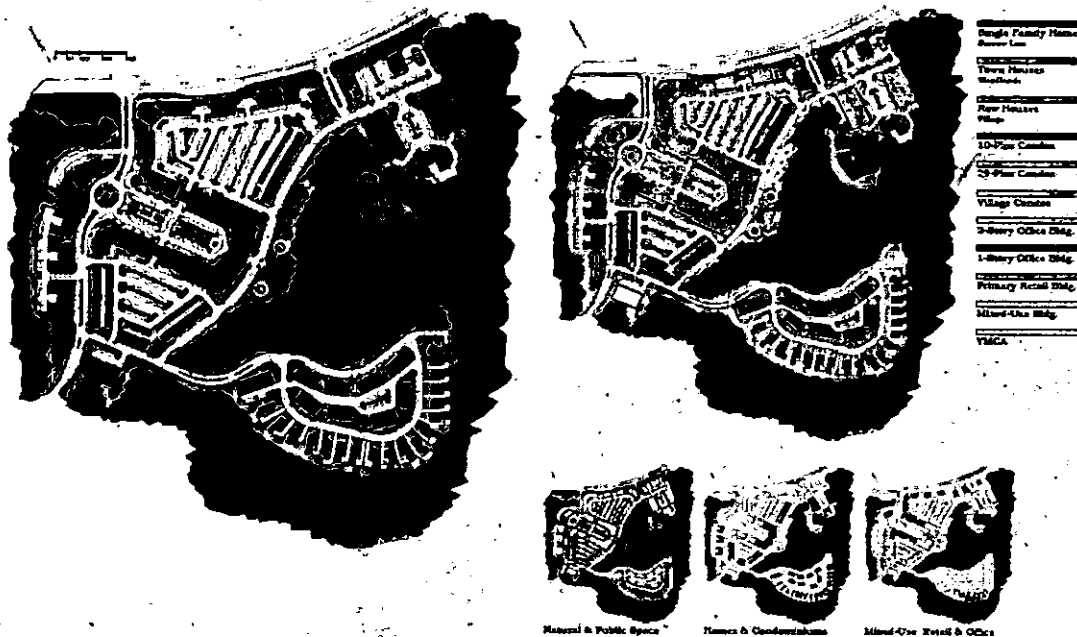
David Schultz, a former Guilderland resident, partner and president of Media Logic said public transportation will be a large part of the development.

O'Brien said there are preliminary plans to put a heated indoor bus stop in the village, with televisions monitoring weather and the location of Capital District Transit Authority buses using tracking software.

Glass Works Village has cleared most of the major hurdles to get construction under way and the Town Board passed a resolution to rezone the site as a Planned Unit Development on Tuesday, Nov. 18. The Town Board approval was the last "discretionary" approval needed to proceed.

Glass Works Village received approval from the Guilderland Zoning Board of Appeals for a height variance on one of its buildings on Wednesday, Jan. 7, and the project is now undergoing final engineering for items including water and sewer.

As the development stands now, a two-lane road behind Guilderland library connects it to the village, however the road cannot be built for at least two years. During that time, other solutions, such as improving Mercy Care Lane can be explored as alternatives, as the representatives of the library oppose the additional traffic behind it.



# Bethlehem gets organized for '09

Bethlehem's planning division got an overhaul during the town's annual organizational meeting.

On Tuesday, Jan. 6, the Bethlehem Town Board unanimously appointed Daniel Coffey as a Planning Board member to fill out the term of former Planning Board Chairman Parker Mathusa, who died in November. His appointment will expire Dec. 31, 2011.

Bethlehem's former director of economic development, George Leveille, was appointed to be the town's new Planning Board member and chairman of the board.

Assistant Director of Economic Development and Planning Michael Morelli has moved in as director for the town since Leveille left at the end of December.

Supervisor Jack Cunningham said the town would not hire a replacement for Morelli as officials try to buckle down financially.

"We are not replacing that individual position," he said before adding the Leveille was excited about sitting on the board after being involved with the planning division for several years and that he had "a lot of confidence" in Morelli.

Morelli said he is ready to tackle the new position and that his office would continue to run smoothly through the transition.

"I think Jack [Cunningham] and the Town Board did a great job," Morelli said. "Everyone's asking to do more with less in the private and public sector, and we are going to be just fine."

Morelli described Leveille's appointment as "a perfect fit."

In addition to the planning seats, Zoning Board member Leonard Micelli and Zoning Board Chairman Michael C. Hodom were both reappointed. The town board also unanimously re-appointed Suzanne Traylor as town comptroller and Josh Canlar as the commissioner of public works.

Traylor took over for Judi Kehoe who left Town Hall to take a position with the Bethlehem Central School District. (See story on Page 5.)

Councilman Sam Messina, an Independence Party member, told his colleagues he would like to discuss Town Board protocol at the Wednesday, Jan. 14, meeting.

"I would like to just make notice to the board that at the next board meeting, I would like to discuss and send some materials to you on rules of procedure that town boards, at least some of them, have chose to consider and use," he said.

Messina said he wanted to discuss things like creating an agenda and the town's appointment process, something he has been vocal about during the past year.

Other town appointments that were approved during the meeting include the following:

# Former police chief pleads guilty

Former Guilderland Chief of Police James Murley pleaded guilty to misdemeanor official misconduct on Friday, Jan. 9, and admitted to visiting a casino on town time at least 53 times, according to information provided by the Albany

County district attorney's office.

As a result of the plea he was ordered by the court to pay \$13,500 in restitution to the town, \$800 in fines and an additional \$200 in state surcharges. He has also been

ordered to attend a gambling counseling program.

According to District Attorney David Soares' office, Murley is required to give the court monthly updates and was given a "conditional discharge." If Murley abides by the court's decision, the case will remain closed, however, the conviction will permanently remain on his record.

# Thoughts of roast chicken move marathoner

This past fall, I ran a half marathon. It was hard work, the running and training. The schedule I followed slowly worked its way up, starting at a 3-mile run and pushing to a 10-mile distance in the weeks before the race, and so I spent my summer preparing for the Columbus Day race. All of that running put me in pretty good shape, better than I have ever been in my life. It was both exhausting and exhilarating. I could scarcely believe my legs would carry me that far.

The morning of the race, I set out with a carload of friends. Women who had trained all summer, and many who had worked harder than I. Excited and nervous, we didn't say much in the car. Our drive took us past the finish line, and as we drove to the place where the race would start, it became painfully real how far we would be running that day.

The starting gun sounded, and we were off. The cool, crisp October air felt good as we started. It was a beautiful, clear day. We talked as we ran, to pass the time. Occasionally we laughed. But then the running got hard. Our bodies were tired. The small talk stopped and our group stretched out.

I struggled to find something to concentrate on; I needed to focus. Not surprisingly, my mind wandered to thoughts of food. What would I eat, to reward myself for a job well done? I had a small chicken and a few potatoes in the refrigerator. I ran mile after mile,

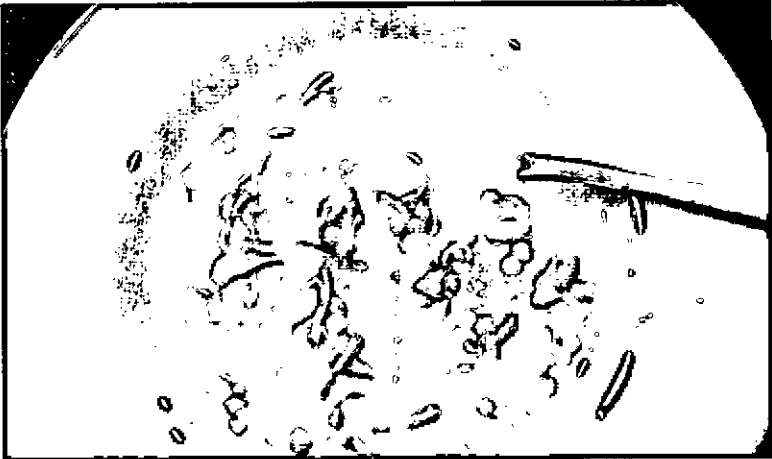

thinking about how I would roast the chicken. I could stuff the bird with lemon, shallots and butter. Or throw together carrots and onions in broth, and baste often. Then again, I could make an herb butter with rosemary, parsley and thyme to spread on the inside of the chicken and under the skin. That method produces a golden brown bird, with crispy skin and rich, flavorful meat.

I think it was at mile 10, that I started to think about the potatoes. If I mashed the potatoes, I certainly would peel them, add plenty of butter and milk. These would not be low fat potatoes. They would practically slide off my fork... or, I could slice them thinly, and roast with olive oil, sea salt and garlic. They would be piping hot and crispy on the outside, soft on the inside. I ran at least a mile, contemplating the pros and cons of roasted vs. mashed.

My family watched me as I crossed the finish line, happy and proud. They brought me water bottles and waited patiently while I limped to the car. My body was sore, and tired. Every step was agonizing. Bending down was not an option and climbing stairs produced cries of pain for three straight days.

And so it turned out that after running 13 miles I was capable

of neither roasting or mashing potatoes. The rest of my day consisted of a shower, and reading the newspaper. My kind husband made dinner for us, and it didn't matter what kind of roasted chicken it was, or how he prepared the potatoes. I know that Paul did not contemplate the pros and cons of roasted vs. mashed that day. But every single bite tasted better than the last; I don't believe I have ever been that hungry before.

It was thoughts of chicken, potatoes and the camaraderie of my fellow runners that carried me through that long run.

Just recently, my daughter and I found ourselves on a very steep and icy ski slope. She looked at me with a very determined look on her face.

"There is no way that I am going to ski down this hill, Mama. No way. I can't do it." She stopped and

wouldn't move. First, I tried the impatient approach, telling her that we had to get down, it was totally fine and just go! Remembering that this parenting technique is useless, I took a deep breath and tried to find something to distract her with. And then I remembered the half marathon.

So I started to ask her about the soup we would eat that night for dinner. Should we put rice or noodles in? And would pesto or lemon be a better flavor? By the time we reached the bottom of the hill, we had made up our minds to have Lemon Chicken Soup with Orzo. Focus and camaraderie worked again! The soup became an instant classic in our house.

We have tried this soup with big noodles, rice, tomatoes, peas, many different variations. We particularly like the combination of the zesty lemon with sweet, crisp carrots and the tiny pieces of pasta. With a salad and slice of bread, this makes an easy, light, winter meal. The recipe makes enough for lunches the next day. Zoe especially loves this soup.

Although it's cold and wintry outside, I still try to get out and run on occasion. So if you happen to see a woman running on a cold and snowy morning with a big smile on her face, don't be surprised. It's me. And I'm thinking about lemon chicken soup.

- Lemon chicken soup**
- 1 small whole chicken
  - 1 rosemary sprig (adds good flavor but optional)
  - 1 tablespoon chicken broth concentrate (see note)
  - 1 teaspoon sea salt
  - Juice of 1 lemon
  - 4 carrots, peeled and cut on the diagonal
  - 8 oz. orzo, stars or other small pasta

Remove and discard the neck and gizzards from the bird. Rinse and place in a large pot. Put enough water in to cover. Add the chicken broth concentrate and salt, cover and bring to a boil. Simmer for 20 minutes, and let rest in the pot for another 1/2 hour (slice into the breast meat to be sure it's completely cooked.)

Meanwhile, cook the pasta to al dente, drain and rinse. Prepare the carrots. Remove the bird from the pot, and place on a cutting board. Skim the fat from the broth with a large ladle. Bring the stock back to a simmer, and add the carrots and lemon juice. Cook for a few minutes, while you remove the meat from the chicken. Pull all of the meat from the chicken and shred with a fork. Turn off the soup, and add the chicken. Allow to cool for a few minutes, and add the pasta. Serve with a green salad.

*A note about chicken broth concentrate:* I buy a product called Better Than Bouillon. It adds good chicken-y flavor to pasta, soup and cooked greens when time is short. It's available in the supermarket near the canned broth. You can also find an organic version in the natural section. Also, I've tried the vegetable and beef concentrates by the same company and wouldn't recommend them. The flavor is not as good as the chicken bouillon.

# Kehoe takes top Bethlehem Central biz job

**Former town comptroller  
is district's new chief  
financial officer**

Bethlehem Central has named a new chief business and financial officer during a year of money woes as state aid to local schools is expected to be cut by Gov. David Paterson.

Judi Kehoe, the former Bethlehem town comptroller who recently took a job at Bethlehem Central, was named to the post on Friday, Jan. 9. She spent 16 years as the town's comptroller.

"We are very pleased to announce the appointment of Judi," Superintendent Michael Tebbano said. "She is someone whose professional record points not only to stellar and stable leadership in municipal and school finance, but also someone who is bringing her talents to bear for the good of her own community. She will continue to be an asset to the district."

Kehoe has replaced former Assistant Superintendent for

Business Steven F. O'Shea, who died in October. District officials said that there were 20 applicants and three rounds of interviews for the post.

Bethlehem Central spokesman Matt Leon said the top business official is responsible for all aspects of the district's finances, including budget planning and implementation, financial reporting, cash management, investing and debt service. Kehoe will be a part of a series of public forums on the school budget being held at the Bethlehem Middle School library, which began on Monday, Jan. 12.

Her responsibilities also include oversight of district operations such as food services, operations and maintenance, and transportation, according to Leon.

Kehoe's appointment comes during a time school districts are dealing with an economic crisis and a potential loss of state funding.

"The Board of Education has already had the opportunity to work with Judi Kehoe over the past several months and is delighted to make this appointment," said Board of

Education President James Lytle. "With very significant budgetary challenges ahead of us, we know that Ms. Kehoe will play a critical role in assisting the board, the district and the community in putting together a sound budget plan in these uncertain times."

Kehoe is a certified public accountant and past president of the New York State Government Finance Officers Association.

"I am very excited about the appointment and eager to continue my work at BC," Kehoe said. "Clearly dealing with the

impacts from the economy will continue to require great attention. The budget preparation process will require considerable input from the community, as we work to create a responsible financial plan that provides the highest quality of services to our students."

Kehoe has recently overseen the district's entry into a regional energy consortium, which could help the district control energy costs by locking in energy prices and undergoing a thorough audit to ensure it spends only what it needs.

She is also overseeing efforts to ensure the district's compliance with federal regulations regarding 403(b) retirement plans.

The district has now posted Kehoe's former position of school business administrator and will be accepting applications through Tuesday, Jan. 20. District officials said they hope to fill the job by March 1.

"The coming year will be a challenging time, but also an opportunity to pool our collective talents and ideas to best respond to the issues at hand," Kehoe said.

## G'land library program to look at 'silent war'

During the Cold War, nuclear submarines were used to conduct special intelligence operations to acquire much-needed information about America's adversaries. He will cover how the Knolls Lab provided much of the propulsion systems and crew training that enabled nuclear submarines to complete their Cold War spying missions.

The presentation marks the 55th anniversary of launch of the world's first nuclear-powered submarine, the USS Nautilus (SSN 571). It was the Nautilus that made the first transit of the North Pole and the first submarine to journey "20,000 leagues under the sea."

## Spotlight weighs in on trimming fat

Whether you thought it was a substantive address or not, Gov. David Paterson made a point in the Jan. 7 State of the State Address that put officials throughout *The Spotlight's* coverage area on notice:

Local governments need to trim the fat.

"We have to lower the cost of doing business in New York state, property taxes are too high, and we need a cap," Paterson said. "Out state mandates are too cumbersome ... our local governments are too expensive and we have to find ways to make them more efficient."

While Paterson's address lacked details as to how to cut local expenses, we at *The Spotlight* have some suggestions. We weighed in as to how we feel about Paterson's proposed property-tax cap when he first visited the subject last June. We think the focus should be on capping the spending these taxing entities do, rather than trying to control the taxes on the back-end of the equation. You see, if you cap school property taxes without cutting school, local and state spending, you just create a supply-side problem—the state will find another avenue to get that money.

We feel the state needs to look at cost-cutting measures, such as school district consolidation and shared municipal services, but also feel you can't regulate the flow of tax revenue and expect its demand will follow suit.

But by being in disagreement with this part of Paterson's approach to tax control, *The Spotlight* finds itself in agreement with another: Local governments need to trim the fat.

Of course, for a weekly newspaper that makes its bread and butter reporting on the actions of these local entities, this is not the most popular stance to take. We're not advocating that local governments and school districts tear down and rebuild wholesale, but we do ask that they take a long, hard look at what's necessary and what can be done without.

Over the next few months, we will hear about all of the "necessary" local government services that will be affected by any state budget cuts as municipalities strain to at least maintain the status quo in their communities and within the walls of their town and city halls.

We don't presume to think that cuts won't affect towns and their residents in adverse ways. We only ask our leaders to take into account the 19 million other people who may be affected if these cuts are not made.

## In the aftermath of the storm

I found a contractor friend who has an ultra-portable generator he promised to have over by 11 a.m. By 11, it was warming up, and we were bailing out water non-stop until our friend arrived with his generator at noon. I expected him to run a wire to our circuit breaker and perform some sort of connection magic. Instead, he said, "Go turn your main breaker off. Be sure you do that. If not, you could electrocute someone working on the line or cause a brownout in neighbors' houses and burn out their appliances and electronics." This method of temporarily restoring power is illegal, but you're not likely to find anyone reprimanding you when you're facing financial disaster from flooding.

With the breaker off, he plugged his generator into an outdoor outlet and, to my amazement, pumped power into the house on a trunk line that included our sump pump, downstairs furnace and some lights. "I can leave this for four hours and then I've got to bail out basements of other people as desperate as you."

After several minutes of frantic calls, I found there were portable generators available at a Home Depot in West Springfield. I arrived in 80 minutes and bought one of the last three generators. I also consulted a rug expert who said, "After three days, mildew sets into a wet carpet and you can throw it out. Without industrial vacuums, heaters and fans, you can't suck through the rug to get the water out of the pad. You've got to tear out your rug, pull it back to uncover every bit of wet

padding, rip the padding out, and then get fans and heat on the carpet."

I raced back to Delmar with a 5,700-watt generator, desperate to return before the loaner was removed, severe flooding started on this warm afternoon, and tens of thousands of dollars in damage resulted. As I pulled into the driveway, my wife came out and told me, "The power went on five minutes ago."

Almost to the hour, three days had passed with our carpets wet. I tore out our beautiful carpet from all the walls, perforating my fingertips repeatedly on the furring strips, until I pulled the rug back far enough to expose every bit of wet padding. My wife and I ripped the padding out with abandon, using spackle knives to scrape it free from the cement where it had been glued. Then we aimed our fans and electric heaters on the wet cement. We just barely avoided mildew.

Monday morning arrived with a "Dawn of the Dead" feeling to it. I was sore, but warm, and had no intention of getting up until my wife announced, "You've got to call a plumber." I left a message with my plumber, and by the time Joel, a third-generation plumber, returned my call a day later, the basement floor was dry. I laid the rug back on the floor. Aside from its lumpiness — some with padding, some without — it looked OK and smelled... well, not quite right.

An insurance adjuster arrived Monday night — a young, exhausted man ready to check out our damage.

"You've got a \$500 deductible. I always advise homeowners to throw wet pads and rugs out, so I can write you up for well over \$2,500 and you'll get your full \$2,000."

"When can we expect a check?" I asked.

"Right now," he said, and wrote the check.

Three days later Joel assessed our plumbing situation. Joel loves to talk plumbing. "I go to my suppliers to discuss the latest equipment. Whenever I talk about flooded basements, I ask my dealers what can go wrong. Invariably they say, 'The pump can fail.' 'Yeah,' I reply, 'but what else?' Sometimes someone will say, 'The electric can fail.' 'What else?' I ask and draw a blank. There are three things that can fail and lead to a flooded basement. You can have a pump fail. You can lose electric. And you can have a

blocked drain line."

Joel showed us how we could back up everything in the event of a failure. We have two drain lines — one to the town underground catch basin and one to an overflow pipe leading outside the house. Our hydraulic pump was, indeed, not functioning. "It's in the worst possible environment, very damp, where equipment can gum up and malfunction."

We were advised to buy a flexible pipe to attach to the overflow pipe which protrudes from the house. "If you don't run the water away from the house, it will soon drain right back into the basement," Joel said, adding, "Even more important, buy a high-water alarm, available at plumbing and home supply stores. It looks just like a smoke alarm, only you attach a wire at the level where your back-up pump is. When the water hits the wire, a loud alarm goes off. Unless you spend all your time staring into your sump hole, this is the only way you'll know your basement is about to flood."

When I asked Joel if we should buy an extra electric sump pump, he said, "Sure, but don't store it in your garage or basement. Keep it somewhere dry and warm or you may find that when you need it, the humidity has gotten to it and it doesn't work." He showed me how to replace it, which requires unscrewing the present pump from the PVC piping and screwing in the new pump. Idiot proof.

With our power back on, we knew our main pump was working and the town line was clear because water was emptying readily. Joel will now replace the hydraulic pump. But this will have to wait until sump pumps, like generators, can be found in the Capital District. With high winds and more storms on the way, the run on emergency equipment continues, driven by the fear of tens of thousands of us vividly recall from the ice storm.

"Once we've got our water alarm, our new hydraulic back-up pump, two ways to drain off water, and a generator wired into our circuit breaker, are we safe forever?" I asked, wondering if we would have our carpet cleaned and re-padded or install one of many mildew-resistant, synthetic floor coverings.

"Well," Joel smiled, "forever is a short word but a long time. Sooner or later, a basement that has flooded once will likely flood again. Don't spend a lot on the flooring."

Truth is, to hear my water alarm means I can never leave my house again.

## No way to spin failed Five Rivers deal

Editor, *The Spotlight*:

This is in response to Mr. George E. Leveille's letter in the Dec. 31 edition of *The Spotlight*, "Beth. Planning Department supports whole community."

Mr Leveille states that the Planning Board recommended to the Town Board that Mrs. Richards fulfill her parkland set-aside requirements by providing (donating) a 20-foot-wide corridor from Fisher Boulevard to Five Rivers.

It seems to me that Ms. Richards' willingness to sell 24 to 25 acres to the Open Space Institute for ultimate resale to New York state as an addition to the Five Rivers Center for the absolute bargain price of \$50,000, more than meets the spirit, if not the letter, of any parkland set-aside requirements.

Mr. Leveille also states "the purpose of this conveyance would be to permanently protect the land from development, to expand the land holdings of Five Rivers and to provide appropriate pedestrian access to Five Rivers from Fisher Boulevard."

The deal as proposed by Mrs. Richards, with exception

of pedestrian access, meets those purposes.

Two out of three isn't bad, especially when viewed in the larger context that this deal would have cost the town and the citizenry nothing up front or in the way of ongoing maintenance and upkeep.

The pedestrian access would have required paving, snow removal, mowing and signage; and may have caused parking issues on Fisher Boulevard and really would only benefit those living in the adjacent Fisher Boulevard neighborhood, a very small percentage of the town's population.

I'm sorry, Mr. Leveille, but it appears to me that the best interests of the citizenry were neglected in favor of a power struggle, which was ultimately lost.

There is no addition to Five Rivers, no pedestrian access and the land parcel in question remains very vulnerable to development, all because of an unwillingness to compromise over 0.2 acres.

I can't see any way to put lipstick on this pig.

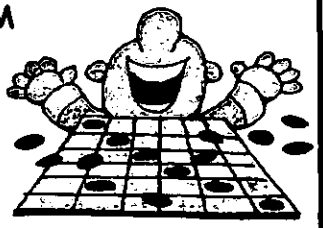

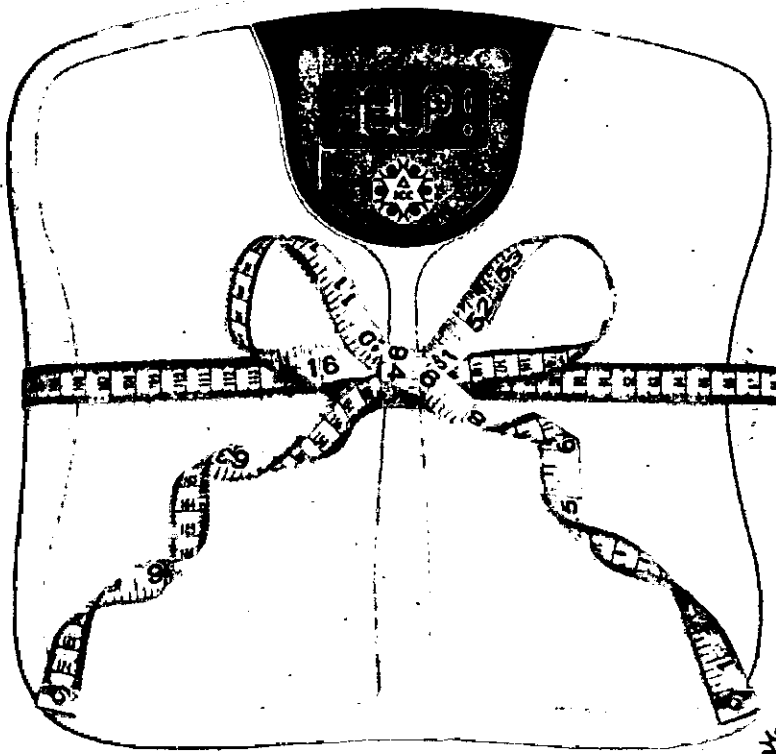

# Ethics panel clears Guilderland town attorney

**Republicans claim more transparency needed in review process**

Guilderland Town Attorney Richard Sherwood was cleared of accusations that there was a conflict of interest regarding his role in discussions about lowering the assessment of the Walgreens at the corner of routes 155 and 20.

The Guilderland ethics committee announced its determination at the Thursday, Jan. 8, Town Board meeting that Sherwood was not in violation of any ethics code.

Republican Town Board members Mark Grimm and Warren Redlich had earlier accused Sherwood of having a conflict of interest in the settlement of litigation involving the assessment. Grimm and Redlich said Sherwood's relationship with the co-owner of the store, Kenneth B. Segel, was suspect because Segel is the CEO of the real estate developer Schuyler Companies and a former partner with the law firm Segel, Goldman, Mazzotta & Siegel, P.C., who Sherwood worked for at one time.

The ethics committee, though, did not find it was Sherwood's legal responsibility to disclose his relationship as former partner in the firm, and had nothing to gain from a lowered assessment.

"We did not find a conflict of interest," said Robert Roche, the attorney hired to counsel the ethics committee. "Neither an economic, financial or professional relationship."

In discussions that took place in an executive session at a June Town Board meeting, the assessor at the time, Carol Wysomski, recommended a decrease in the assessment of close to \$500,000, and 3-to-2 vote by the board approved the settlement.

At the June executive session, councilmen Grimm and Redlich were the two dissenters to a lowered assessment and said Sherwood seemed "anxious" to have it lowered.

Roche said the ethics test Sherwood needed to pass was two-pronged and thoroughly conducted by the review committee. First, the committee examined if Sherwood had a conflict of interest, and secondly, if he had the "appearance" of a conflict of interest.

"This is a test that is very searching," Roche said.

Roche said Sherwood passed both tests and did not violate any portion of the town ethics code.

Roche said an appearance of a conflict of interest exists only if the accusing party does not make a "minimum non-invasive investigation" of Sherwood's relationship with Segel.

Sherwood said he does not work for the company, and has no financial stake in it, although he was formerly an associate from

1991 to 1995.

He also said Segel retired three years ago.

Sherwood maintained he had "absolutely no conflict," throughout the matter and he suspected the ordeal might have been a result of political retaliation for a letter he sent to Runion regarding Redlich's role as board member and attorney practicing in Guilderland town court during the budget process.

Redlich and Grimm questioned Roche on several aspects of the ethics investigation, including the nature of Sherwood's relationship to Segel, Goldman, Mazzotta & Siegel, P.C. as listed on the firm's Web site.

Runion disagreed, stating those sources are not updated regularly.

"Internet Web pages are not a reliable source of information, especially if you're going to use them to prosecute someone," Runion said.

Grimm said the most important issue is not whether or not Sherwood had anything to gain from the deal, but whether or not he had the responsibility to disclose any relationship he had to Segel.

Redlich pointed out that Sherwood is also listed in the Red Book, an informational pamphlet that lists legal counsel, as working at the same law firm as Segel.

Roche contested the accuracy of the book and said a closer look "evaporates" any suspicion the two are connected.

"Using the Red Book for that sort of inquiry is like asking a cop to check the phone book for his local criminals," Roche said.

Democratic Town Board member Paul Pastore said the two names appearing on a Web site are not enough to fault Sherwood.

"There were no underlying facts to support that there was a conflict," added Pastore.

The Republican board members asked Roche if the committee also investigated Sherwood's financial connection to Walgreens, and Roche assured them he has none at all.

"I didn't even find he bought his Halloween candy there," said Roche.

Grimm and Redlich also questioned why the ethics committee meetings were not made public, as mandated by the open meetings law.

Grimm said that while most advisory committees are not subjected to the open meetings law, committees mandated by "stature of law,"

must be open.

Roche disagreed and said he interpreted the law differently.

Executive Director for the New York State Committee on Open Government Robert Freeman said he interprets New York state's open meeting law as requiring the meetings to be public, but it would be within the ethics committee's right to conduct the entirety of its business privately in executive session.

Grimm added that the Town Board should have been able to handle the matter without hiring Roche.

"We could have handled it without hiring a high-priced attorney," Grimm said. "I believe it was a waste of taxpayer money. I believe it then, and I believe it now."

Roche charged the town \$165 per hour, but has not billed the town yet, Runion stated.

The Town Board has the final say on how to handle all ethics matters, and could have sanctioned Sherwood if it saw fit.

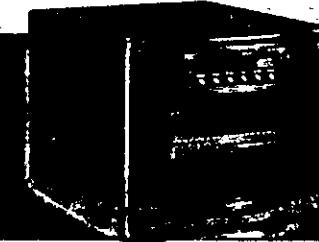

# Workers rally to keep jobs

**PEF, CSEA lead union protest of governor's budget**

At the same time Gov. David Paterson addressed the economic state of New York, thousands of state workers lined up outside the Capitol to address another issue — the governor's executive budget.

Members of the Public Employees Federation and the Civil Service Employees Union, state employee unions, rallied outside the Capitol in the freezing rain and snow to protest proposed cuts in civil service jobs on Wednesday, Jan. 7.

CSEA representative Brian Cornelius said the workers are not to blame for the current economic climate, and should not be held responsible.

"We are hoping that the governor, the senate and the Legislature listens," Cornelius said. "It's not the workers."

Union member Vinny Castadò said the state is to blame for the mismanagement of funds, not civil service employees.

Initial hopes for the rally were to march 10,000 workers, but bad weather may have contributed to the number of attendees coming in at about half that.

One CSEA protestor said the governor is obligated not to cut state jobs.

"We got a contract and you got to stick to it," the worker said.

He said there has to be other ways to save money than to lay off hard-working employees.

Assemblyman Jack McEneny, D-Albany, said his constituency

has many state workers in it and he has had several conversations with representatives from the unions. He said many would not mind tightening their belts if other expenses were handled first, like expensive and burdensome "consultants" to state agencies.

Assemblyman Tim Gordon, I-Bethlehem, echoed the notion that the state is hiring consultants at a considerable rate, and could look to cut them first, before eliminating jobs.

"This is being abused and the numbers are being inflated above reason," he said. "They are just a substitutes for civil servants who are more capable of doing the job."

Albany County Executive Mike Breslin acknowledged the issue is a concern, and he said he is looking into the matter.

"Somehow there has to be cost savings, but I understand there are some disagreements between the unions and what the governor has proposed."

McEneny said not all consultants can be cut, but it is a good place to start to keep jobs for workers.

McEneny added that cutting state jobs will eliminate paychecks and those workers use that money as a "stimulus" to keep the economy moving. He also said he supports a 3 percent raise for state employees.

McEneny said a possible solution to the budget deficit would be early retirement packages.

He acknowledged that the deficit is not simple, and will take a multifaceted effort to eliminate.

Spotlight attempts to reach Gov. Paterson were unsuccessful.

has been a longtime advocate of government consolidation and increased efficiency.

"I thought he gave an excellent presentation, and is aware of the huge challenges that face us," Breslin said. "On the county level, he is aware of the property tax situation."

Breslin said he was also glad to hear Paterson's initiatives on health care and energy. Albany County is currently involved in several cost-saving consolidation efforts such as a countywide health insurance consortium and a storm water management consortium, said Breslin, adding that he is also looking at a possible countywide property tax assessment consortium.

The county executive wasn't without concern though.

"I am concerned there are some reimbursements that we may not get in the future that will make our services more expensive," he said. "We'll see how the budget plays out."

In Bethlehem and Guilderland, the town supervisors both listened to the State of the State Address with interest.

"One of the things that I'm concerned about is the drum beat for a tax cap," Bethlehem Supervisor Jack Cunningham said. "We [towns] don't have any other means to raise revenues, like taxing sugared sodas."

Cunningham said he was "all for efficiency" but was skeptical state government would have the answers.

"I can't imagine that the state of New York can come up with a more efficient solution before the local municipalities," he said.

Pointing out that the county initiatives mentioned by Breslin were "bottom up" concepts, Cunningham said a tax cap could potentially affect essential "direct" services to local residents.

"A percentage cap is not necessarily a good thing," he added, stating that a 4 percent raise of a school or county tax is much more money than a 4 percent raise of a local town

tax.

Next door in Guilderland, there was a similar skepticism about the efficiency issue.

"I think that when you look at efficiency, you'll find that local governments are the most efficient," said Guilderland Supervisor Ken Runion. "As far as spending and controlling cost, we get burdened by the state."

Runion said he suspected Paterson was referring to the multiple layers of local government that cause the most waste, such as town, village and county services that overlap and could be consolidated to cut spending.

State mandates require funding that the municipalities often do not have time to budget for, Runion said, citing retirement funds, storm water management and election costs as burdensome mandates.

"I don't think we're different from the other Capital Region municipalities I've spoken to," Runion said.

The state's only Independence Party assemblyman, Tim Gordon, I-Bethlehem, said he was happy with a number of initiatives mentioned by Paterson, such as the "45-by-15" clean energy program. The program would set a goal for the state to meet 45 percent of its energy consumption through renewable energy by 2015.

However, Gordon said, some proposals would have to be reviewed.

"While some spending cuts in even the most sensitive areas are clearly needed to deal with the multi-billion-dollar budget deficit, some of the governor's proposals are troubling," Gordon said. "We need to take a close look at the education funding cuts so we don't jeopardize our children's futures or shift property taxes that would increase the burden on working families."

The governor already released his proposed \$121 billion budget five weeks before it was due, which is what governors traditionally discuss during the State of the State Address. Other points of the governor's address included a Healthy Food/Healthy Communities Initiative, along with a sugared soda tax; a commitment to complete infrastructure projects like the Tappan Zee Bridge; a higher education loan program; and the continuation of an Upstate Revitalization Fund.

Still, as thousands of state workers protested outside in the cold on the capitol steps, Paterson warned in his speech that lean times are ahead and the burden would have to be shared.

"The pillars of Wall Street are crumbling," he said of the financial institution that delivers one-fifth of New York's total revenue. "If we can't spend more, we have to spend more efficiently."

elemental mercury couldn't be completely filtered.

"There's no existing technology out there to filter elemental mercury," he said but added about the proposed upgrade, "with this new technology the mercury will be in an oxidized form which is water soluble ... we expect the emissions would be greatly reduced, if not eliminated."

The report estimated that about 146 pounds of mercury is emitted from the Route 9W plant each year. Testing sessions were done over five months, but plans for the testing began about a year ago, according to Reagan. The study shows that testing was conducted in and around the plant's smoke stack but was not conducted at distances downwind of Lafarge.

The DEC oversaw some of the testing.

"The DEC reviewed and approved our work plans and were on-site to oversee some of the testing," Reagan said. "We decided to undertake this process on our own after hearing concerns from the public."

Once the element enters the water, mercury can be transformed into the toxic methyl mercury, which has been known to cause developmental problems in children. It primarily en-

ters the body through the consumption of tainted fish after the mercury falls into a waterway, according to the state's Department of Health.

Reagan said his company is expected to finalize its DEIS by late February or early March and pointed out that the Ravena smoke stack emissions are far lower than many of the other cement plants of its kind around the nation.

Keri Powell, an attorney with Earthjustice, a non-profit environmental law firm, has repeatedly rallied against Lafarge and other mercury emitters around the state by asking the state to step up its regulatory powers.

"New York's cement kilns are the state's silent mercury polluters," Powell said last March. "For years, the Lafarge cement kiln has gotten a free pass from the federal government, which has neglected to set a national standard limiting mercury pollution from the cement industry. It's time for New York to step in and stop Lafarge from spewing this incredibly toxic poison in our air."

Reagan commented that although "existing cement plants in the U.S. are not regulated ... new cement plants are" and that Lafarge's plant has come in at or below the regulated totals emissions of the new cement plants.

Approximately 220 employees work at the Ravena Lafarge cement plant.

## Altamont ready to improve trails

**Grant-funded developments could begin in two months**

The Village of Altamont has finished the planning stage and is getting ready to develop walking and bike paths, according to Altamont Mayor Jim Gaughan.

The Capital District Transportation Committee awarded the village a \$27,000 grant as part of its Linkage Program to be used to improve walking and biking trails.

Village officials designed a Pedestrian and Bicycle Master Plan based on the 2006 comprehensive plan and will use the grant money to make those plans a reality, Gaughan said.

He said the public has had the opportunity to write in recommendations and comment in person, with the last public comment period on Thursday, Jan. 8.

Gaughan said the village could begin implementing the recommendations within two months.

"It will be dictated by our financial situation," Gaughan said.

He also said the long-term plans for the village include a "creative" way to connect Altamont to Voorheesville, possibly connecting to the rail trail that will extend from the Port of Albany into Voorheesville.

"This is not going to happen overnight," Gaughan said of bridging the 8 miles between the two municipalities.

Another long-term goal will be the creation of a historical

walking tour.

Some short-term goals include improving the safety and signage along the existing trails, installing more bike racks and increasing the connectivity of walking and biking paths.

Jason Purvis, senior transportation planner for the Capital District Transportation Committee, said Altamont is one of seven "priority areas" designated for the CDTC's linkage program. The program offers assistance in "regional-local planning initiatives that link transportation and land use," according to information from the CDTC.

Altamont was awarded the grant in the spring of 2008 and hired Alta Planning and Design in June to help figure out how to execute the linkage plan.

Purvis said 75 percent of the grant is federal funding, while the remaining 25 percent is local.

Alta, the Village of Altamont and the CDTC are the primary driving force behind executing the plans.

"We are right there. Those three parties run the program," Purvis said.

However, Purvis said, the public and an advisory committee, which includes Albany County officials, the New York State Department of Transportation and Mayor Gaughan, discussed the direction the pedestrian and bike plan would take.

"The scope of work is hammered out before the consultant is hired," Purvis said. "The public input really drives the process and comes up with the plans."

## Former G'land principal to head Troy school

An embattled former Guilderland High School principal will serve as interim principal for Doyle Middle School in Troy, pending a Board of Education vote that is scheduled for after *The Spotlight* goes to press.

Michael Paolino was originally scheduled to appear before the Troy board on Wednesday, Jan. 7, however that meeting was canceled due to inclement

weather.

Paolino instead is scheduled to appear at a Monday, Jan. 12, meeting to determine if he will hold the position of interim principal. The meeting was held after *The Spotlight's* deadline.

The appointment would pay per-diem, and would last until June 30, according to school officials.

Paolino resigned from the Guilderland position amid

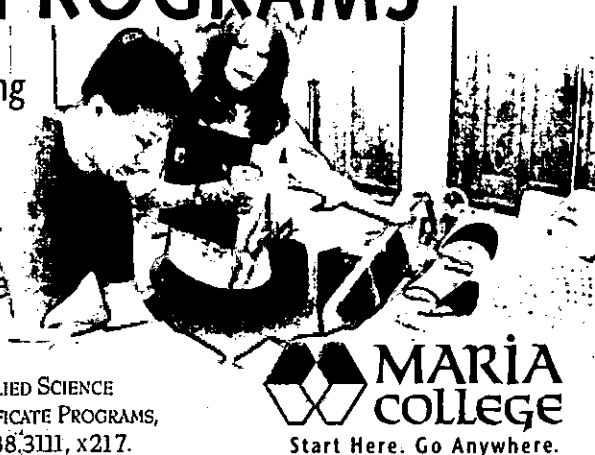
accusations of racist and homophobic language, although the district never took any formal action.

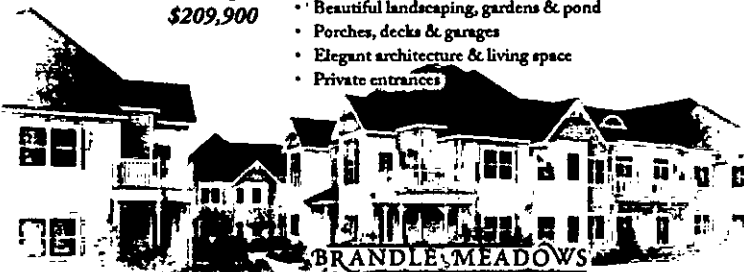

## The new frontier of surgery: Robotics

By David M. Kimble, M.D.

The year is now 2009, and robots are being used in operating rooms across America. In fact, the Capital District has three high tech robots at St. Peter's Hospital, Saratoga Hospital and Albany Medical Center. My first contact with robotics in the OR was about 8 years ago when I was asked to trial what now is viewed as a very cumbersome robot. Its name was ESOP and it responded to verbal commands by the surgeon. I spent countless hours teaching ESOP my voice and various commands. The robot was never formally used in the Capital District and soon lost favor across the nation

as it provided little benefit to the patient or surgeon. Next came Zeus, which was also cumbersome and provided no defined benefit.

Over the past year, I have had the privilege to be one of very few gynecological surgeons in New York to be credentialed in the use of the most technically advanced robot, the Intuitive da Vinci. This advanced robot was launched in the OR about 5 years ago and has revolutionized the surgical approach to very challenging types of surgeries. I use the robot to accomplish complicated surgeries that would traditionally require large incisions and long recovery times. I now perform most fibroid removals,

hysterectomies of large uteri and prolapse correction procedures with the da Vinci robot. Patients go home the next day, experience minimal pain and return to normal lives quickly. My urology associates perform prostate removal, kidney removal, and bladder surgery for cancer and other benign conditions with the robot. Female reproductive cancers are treated surgically with the robot.

So, who is doing the surgery, human or robot? The Intuitive da Vinci robot is solely an extension of the surgeon's own capabilities, thus why few are credentialed in its use. One must possess the advanced skills necessary to use

the robot. It will not replace the surgeon in the OR. It should be viewed as another tool to provide safety and the best possible outcomes for patients.

Will robots diagnose and treat our ailments? The answer to that question lies in the future. However, no robot can replace the trust, care, and relationship a physician develops with his or her patients. Nearly two decades of Physician Residents at Albany Medical Center have given me awards for my humanistic approach to patients and I have always advocated the power of the human touch during my graduation address to the Chief Residents. Robots do not possess

this capability.

The need to perform more advanced robotic surgeries and focus on incontinence and pelvic prolapse treatment was the main reason I relocated my practice and helped develop the Capital Region Institute for Pelvic Medicine. Drs. Murray, Yamada, and I have combined our skills to provide the most comprehensive women's healthcare in the Capital District. This ever-changing field of medicine requires focus and dedication to advancing treatment options and robotic surgery is just one of those options.

If you stop adding salt while you cook or when you sit down at the table, you can cut your sodium intake as much as 30 percent.

## Take these simple steps to reduce sodium in diet

Salt is simply everywhere, from frozen dinners to canned soup, and fast food to fine dining fare. Even if you never touch the salt shaker while cooking or sitting down to eat, you may still be consuming a high salt intake that might work against you if you have heart disease. For anyone, following a low-sodium diet can be a challenge.

Many health conditions - most notably high blood pressure or heart failure - call for reducing your daily consumption of sodium, the main ingredient in salt. If you've recently suffered a heart attack or been diagnosed with heart failure, your doctor likely wants you to reduce your

sodium intake because heart failure causes the body to retain sodium. Extra sodium can cause fluid to build up in your body, and extra fluid makes your heart work harder - not a good thing for a muscle already under strain.

A low-sodium diet means restricting your daily sodium intake to just 2,000 to 3,000 milligrams (mg) - a little more than one teaspoon per day. We get sodium either from table salt or from other food items. Many of us get sodium and salt confused. Sodium is a component of table salt and represents about 40 percent of the content of salt. Certain kinds of salt, like sea

## Dentistry, anxiety and sedation

Most people don't really like going to the dentist, but they go for many important reasons. Some of us have such dental anxiety that we cannot go to the dentist even when we are in pain.

If you are afraid of the dentist, sedation dentistry may be what you need to relax in the dental chair. There are different types of sedation techniques, which include inhalation conscious sedation (laughing gas), oral conscious sedation (pills) and intravenous conscious sedation (I-V).

The most common type of sedation used is laughing gas (nitrous oxide sedation). Approximately 35 percent of U.S. dentists use it. It is easy and convenient. Most people who use it recover promptly and can leave the dental

office unescorted and resume normal activities, like driving, immediately.

Oral conscious sedation is becoming more prevalent and the dentist must have a state license to provide this service. It is the use of oral medications taken before the dental appointment and sometimes nitrous oxide (laughing gas) is used during the dental appointment. There are numerous medications used to relieve anxiety. The dentist evaluates each individual patient to determine the medication to use. This technique works very well for most patients. One negative is that patients receiving oral conscious sedation are not permitted to drive a car or operate a motor vehicle for 24 hours following their appointment.

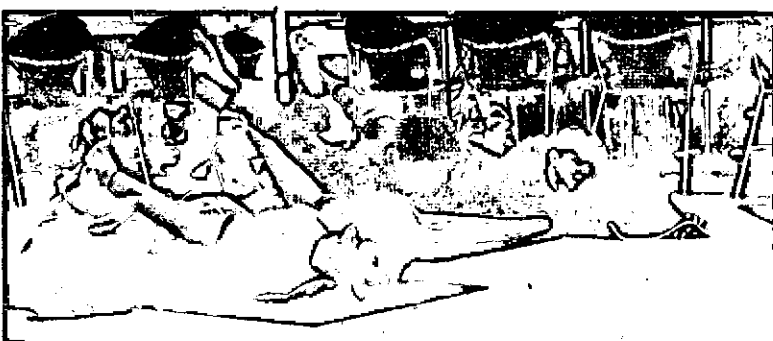
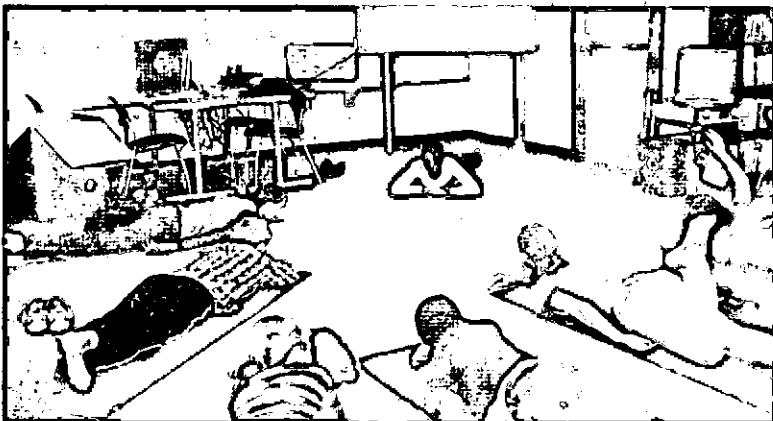
I-V sedation is another effective technique for management of

more severe levels of anxiety. Most oral surgeons have training in this area, but few general dentists have this training.

The general dentists at Bethlehem Dental Arts are trained and have their license to administer oral conscious sedation. Oral conscious sedation works well for patients with high anxiety, a severe gag reflex, difficulty getting numb or for long dental appointments. The best part is that appointments seem to go very fast for the patient who is sedated and that most patients remember little or nothing about their dental appointment.

If you have not been to a dentist out of fear or other problems in your dental past, oral conscious sedation may help you to keep your teeth a lifetime and avoid pain and discomfort.

## Public hearing to be set for retail size-cap law

The New Scotland Town Board is scheduled to set a date for a public hearing regarding a local law that would limit the size of retail developments in the town's commercial zone, according to Supervisor Tom Dolin's office.

The Town Board will hold its next meeting at 7 p.m. on Wednesday, Jan. 14. They are expected to schedule the hearing at that time.

"The limitations incorporate the concepts and goals set forth in the town's Comprehensive Land Use Plan and the Citizens' Zoning Advisory Committee Report. They prohibit large, regional-

drawing, retail projects and instead encourage community-focused, economically viable development," said Daniel Mackay, spokesperson for New Scotlanders for Sound Economic Development.

According to NS4SED the law is co-sponsored by Town Supervisor Tom Dolin and Town Board Member Doug LaGrange, and would change the Zoning Law to limit new retail or wholesale buildings at 50,000 square feet for individual developments and a group of retail or wholesale stores at 100,000 square feet within the commercial zone.

It was in Hawaii where members of the 109th learned they would attempt the daring rescue of Rooke, traversing Antarctica in the longest trip its transport plane has made down there.

...

Members of the 109th include locals from Saratoga, Schenectady and Albany counties, and they fly out of the Stratton Air National Guard Base in Scotia.

The crew made the dangerous rescue on Nov. 5, and, along with members of the Australian Antarctic Division, helped get Rooke, a chef and part-time medic with an Australian scientific research team, to safety despite 80 mph winds and subzero temperatures.

Rooke's injuries were from an all-terrain-vehicle accident that broke several bones and punctured his lung. The team's medic kept him alive for nearly two weeks until the 109th was able to respond, but he was not healing well and needed treatment at a medical facility.

"It was a rewarding mission to do, and it was a success," said flight commander Maj. Dave Lafrance, a Saratoga native and mission commander.

The crew regularly shuttles supplies, tools and equipment to research locations in the South Pole using an LC-130 transport plane, also known as a "Hercules."

"They have the most amount of science down there," Bernasconi, co-pilot and Delmar native, said of the necessity to fly so many missions.

The team works closely with the National Science Foundation, which oversees operations for NASA in addition to other scientific outfits. The NSF actually owns four of the transport planes used by the 109th; the Department of Defense owns the rest.

In the southern hemisphere's summer months, October through February, the crew flies in Antarctica, and from April through September, they fly transportation missions in Greenland.

The flight time from New York to McMurdo Station in Antarctica was 41 hours. From McMurdo Station, on the southern tip of Ross Island to Davis Station, where Rooke was located, was five additional hours. Rooke was then transported to Hobart, Australia, to receive medical care at a local hospital, Bernasconi said.

The landing strip at Davis Station was a 10,000-foot-long, scraped off patch of ice on top of the sea and had dangerously "shallow" water underneath it.

The runway was hastily made by the Davis crew to handle the massive plane.

Air was the only way to get Rooke off the continent, since the nearest boat was two weeks away, and there was no guarantee he had that long.

The crew said there is no data for the minimum amount of space needed to take off in the massive transport plane since the conditions for every takeoff are different. Typically, pilots need 6,000 to 8,000 feet, Bernasconi said.

Lafrance said that the weight of the plane pushing down against the landing strip could force water toward the ocean floor and then send a wave back toward the plane, which could crack the ice.

"If you land your taxi wrong, you



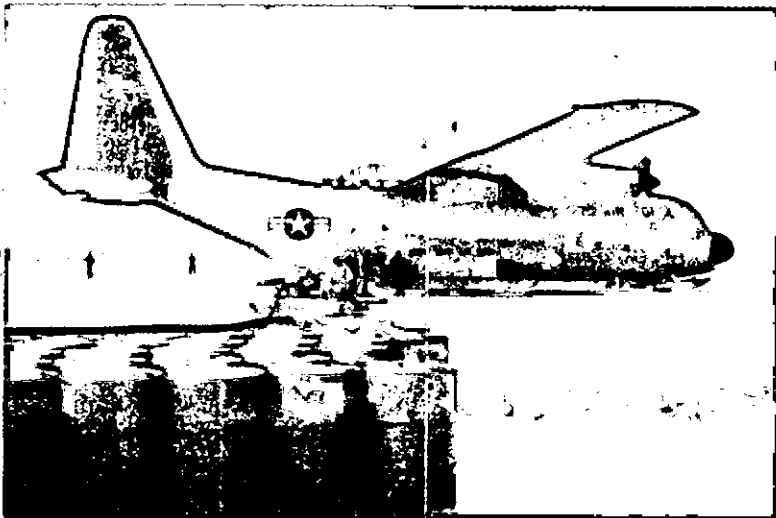

can break your runway," said Mark Lecours, also of Saratoga and the navigator on the mission.

If that were to happen, the safety of those on board, let alone the mission, were at serious risk.

"A \$52 million plane is lost and hopefully we get out with our lives," Lafrance said of a crack in the runway.

All of the crewmembers needed to be sharp in order for the mission to succeed, the crew explained, and a lot of teamwork was involved.

"Everyone here is highly experienced. They put us together because they thought it was the best mix," said Lafrance.

Lecours said a lot of factors come into play when flying a mission of this magnitude.

"This is the longest leg I've ever flown in a Herc[ules]," Lecours said.

A Hercules has never made the trip from Davis Camp to Australia.

Among some of the responsibilities the crew has to deal with are checking fuel levels, ensuring safe landing sites and maintaining the status of all four engines.

"The odd places we were going, you have to worry about the next step," Lecours said.

He said winds can affect the flight path, and often picking up a

tail-wind to save fuel could mean going a longer distance. The crew used the East Indian Ocean pressure trough to help get them to the landing site.

"If we flew in a straight line, we would have ran ourselves out of gas," Lecours said.

They spent 13 hours on the ground at Davis Camp, where the crew needed to rest and refuel. They used 55, 92-gallon barrels that were set up and ready to go by the Davis crew, Bernasconi said. He also said the medical technicians that accompanied the crew, eight in total, spent some time stabilizing Rooke before the 10-hour flight to Australia.

During the flight back, the crew kept a close eye on Rooke.

The crew's engineer, Senior Master Sgt. Mark Olena of Guilderland, said another important factor in the rescue flight was cabin air-pressure. Olena said it had to be monitored strictly, and the plane's elevation had to be limited to 4,000 feet to help control Rooke's breathing.

Also part of the crew were loadmasters Master Sgt. Jamie Hill and Tech. Sgt. Joe Axe of Stillwater and Glenville respectively; and medical technician Tech. Sgt. Jennifer Ray of Clifton Park.

Rooke remained at Launceston General Hospital in Australia as of Friday, Dec. 19, according to media

outlets.

Spotlight attempts to reach the hospital were unsuccessful.

## The state of your bank account: Catch the upside of the downturn

**T**raditionally, January is the month of fresh starts, resolutions and politicians grabbing airtime to speak about the state of our union and the state of our states.

This year, the theme for all of these is consistent—money. As in we must get our financial house in order...and do so quickly.

Fortunately for most Americans, developing a plan for managing our finances is easier than it is for the government. Unfortunately, the actions of our government and the mismanagement of some of our country's most important institutions has destabilized

critical markets, which has created a fear that has hit our bank accounts with a resounding and defeating thud.

However, the future outlook is not so bleak.

Downturns have their bottom, and many prognosticators are forecasting that 2009 will move us away from the current one. In fact, the Wall Street Journal recently published an article by Alan Murray titled, "2009 Could Be Better than You Think," stressing that great financial opportunities will be available in 2009 for those who are well positioned and not afraid to go after them.

### Protect your assets and keep them close at hand

Among the positive moves the government has made to bring stability to the financial market is to increase FDIC Deposit Insurance Coverage from \$100,000 to \$250,000 per account owner. With so much concern over the health of many banks, this ensures that your money is fully protected and safe. As the FDIC says on its Web site, "Since the FDIC was established, no depositor has ever lost a single penny of FDIC-insured funds."

If you are still concerned about your bank being at risk of insolvency, Moody's, a glob-

ally well-respected debt-rating agency, provides financial reports and analysis of commercial and government entities, including banks, as well as their credit worthiness. You can register for free access to Moody's reports at <http://v2.moody.com>. It's better to do a little research than to make uninformed snap judgments.

On a personal note, stay liquid. That is, make sure you have access to cash. While doing so may be difficult, having six months worth of expenses available in either your savings or checking account can help you get through a difficult time and keep your credit score intact. Money market accounts are good options also. They

are similar to a traditional savings account with the exception that they offer higher interest rates and require a minimum balance. They also have a limitation on the number of monthly withdrawals you can make from the account.

Another good option for your money, if you can afford to not touch it for a short period of time, is a certificate of deposit (CD). CDs, also known as time deposits, are federally insured investments in banks. They are deposit accounts, not unlike savings accounts, that provide a fixed rate of return for a fixed period of time—as short as 30, 60 or 90 days. The primary difference between the accounts is that a savings account is a liquid account and a CD is not, meaning that you cannot make additional deposits on CDs and you cannot make withdrawals without penalty. CDs offer higher rates of return, and they are good investments because they are safe and short-term enough for you to catch the market on the upswing.

### Look for rays of light

The financial markets will not stay down forever. After the financial hit many of us took during the latter half of 2008, that may not be particularly uplifting. However, the worst investment decision you can make in a down economy is to get out of the game.

As Murray states in his Wall Street Journal article, "a smart strategy will be to put some money in the market today, and keep doing it over the course of the year."

Eventually, the market is going to be a good investment again. It probably already is. It's just in your best interest to tread carefully and be conservative. That means diversify the investments you do make and continue to save money. Reassess your goals, and work with your

financial advisor to ensure that your current and future needs are being addressed.

### Being smart today will make you stronger tomorrow

There is good debt and there is bad debt. Good debt nets a return. Examples are student loans, real estate loans and business loans. Bad debt declines in value. Clothes and electronics, charged to your high-interest rate credit card fall into this category. The key is to avoid the bad debt. Do not borrow more than you can afford to repay. If you are currently carrying bad debt, pay it off—as quickly as possible. # Entertainment *in the* Spotlight

**R**ich Morello was about to get his big break.

"Beatlemania," the Broadway musical revue, needed a new Ringo Starr, and Morello was in line for the part.

Before he ever took the stage, though, the show shut down.

That could have marked the end of Morello's dream. But when "Beatlemania" ended, Morello and Alan LeBoeuf, who played Paul McCartney for much of the show's run, resurfaced in "Beatlemania Again," a touring Beatles stage show that stops at the Linda-WAMC Performing Arts Studio in Albany on Saturday, Jan. 17.

Morello is the group's manager, and he also plays the drums as Starr.

"It's a lot of work, but it's a lot of fun," he said. "It's a labor of love."

Part of Morello's work includes finding venues for New Jersey-based "Beatlemania Again" to perform. The group has never been to Albany, so Morello called Howard Glassman, the Linda's manager, and made his pitch.

Glassman was intrigued. The Linda has hosted Elvis tribute bands and The Clash tribute band, he said, but it's never had a Beatles show. He checked out "Beatlemania Again's" promotional material and told Morello he had a deal.

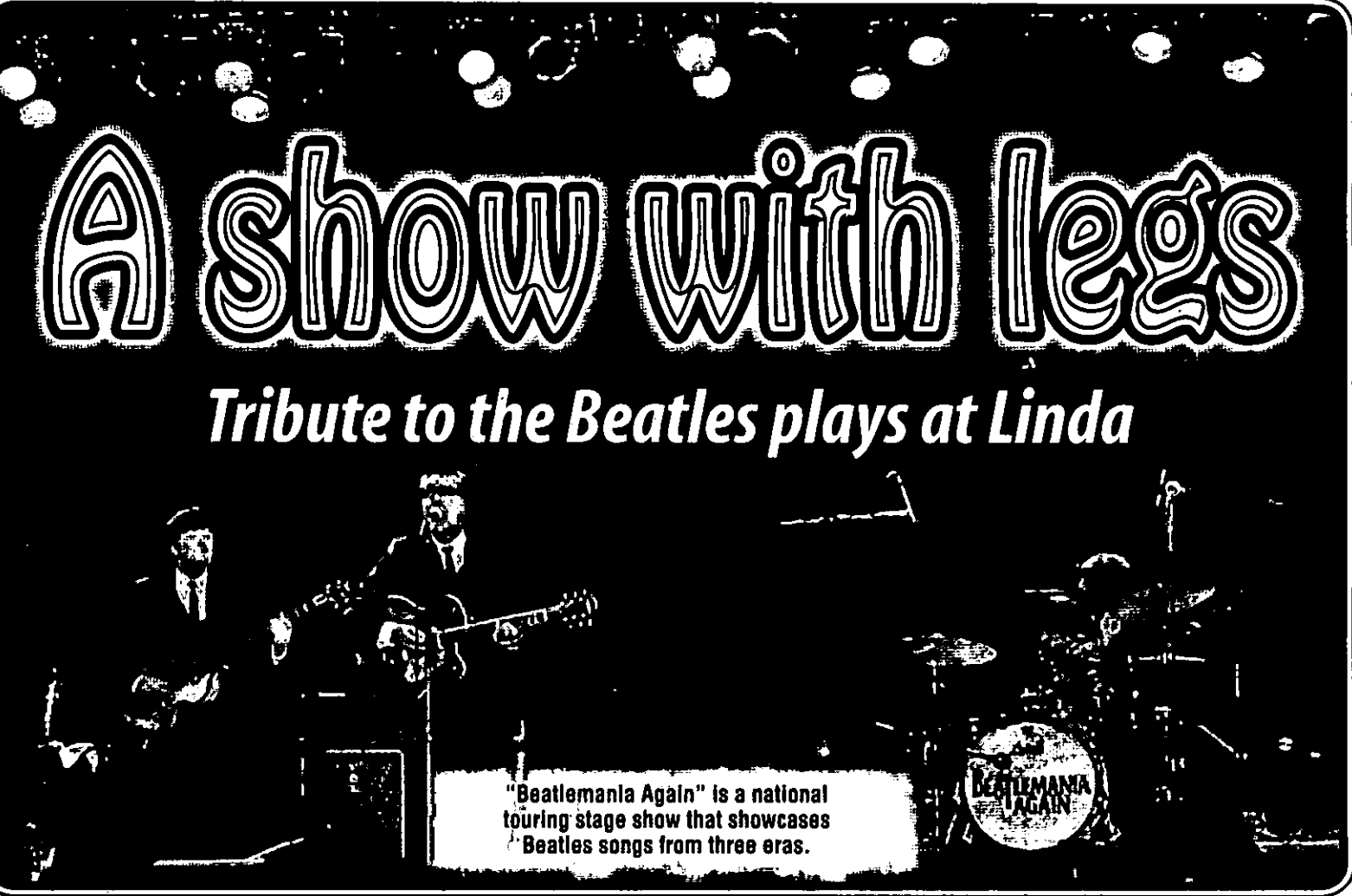
"Everybody loves the Beatles," Glassman said.

That love of the Beatles is what fuels Morello and his castmates. Morello was just a baby when the Beatles stopped touring, so he never saw them live. But he and the other members of "Beatlemania Again" have watched hours upon hours of video of Starr, John Lennon, Paul McCartney and George Harrison, closely studying everything from the band's accents to their footwear.

"All the idiosyncrasies, we try to capture," Morello said.

That attention to detail differentiates the group from Beatles cover bands that simply play the group's songs, he said.

Shows are broken into three acts. The first act, "Meet the Beatles," features actual



instruments and amplifiers used by The Beatles, and the cast wears the group's signature boots and black velvet suits. The songs in the first act are from 1963 to 1966.

In 1967, the Beatles recorded "Sgt. Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band," the inspiration for "Beatlemania Again's" second act,



"Sgt. Pepper." The act includes silk costumes, makeup and facial accessories.

Shows close out with "Get Back," which showcases Beatles' songs from 1968 to 1970.

"It's a pretty elaborate production," Morello said.

"Beatlemania Again" draws all ages, and including some older folks who did have a chance

to see the Beatles perform live during their heyday, Morello said. The group's gotten plenty of compliments from young and old alike.

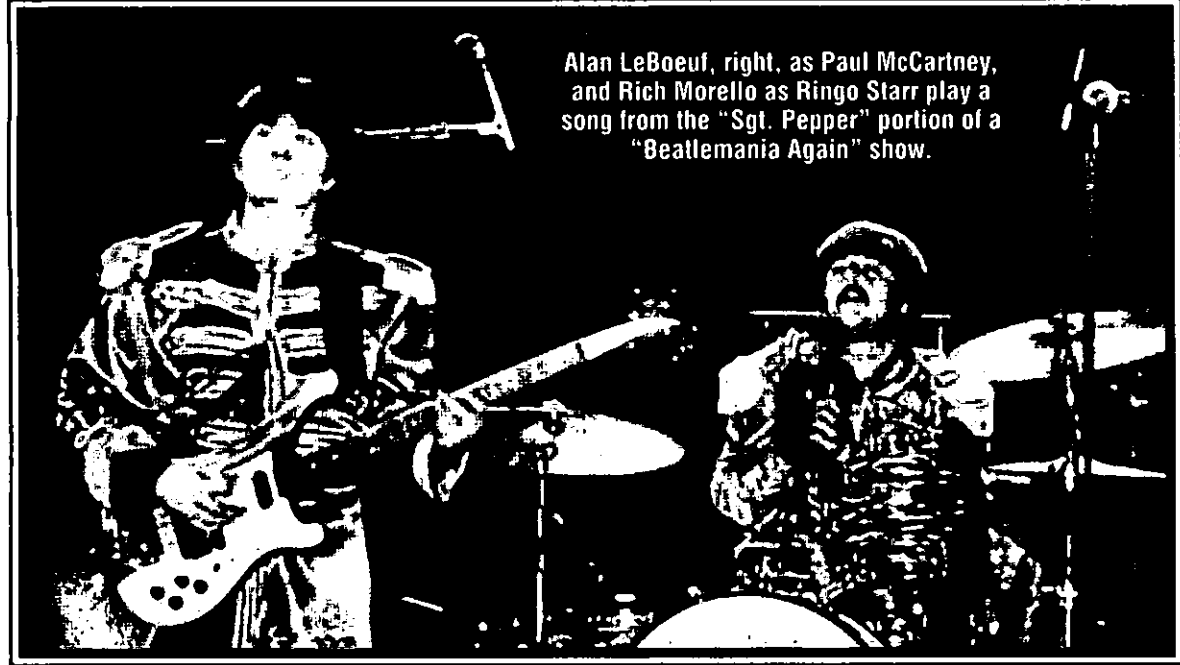
"They'll say, 'Wow, we thought you were really from England,'" Morello said.

But the real star of the show, according to Morello, isn't the men portraying the Beatles - it's the music itself. Morello thinks the Beatles are unmatched by today's musicians. Their songs had a melodic quality that modern artists just can't duplicate, he said.

"The music is timeless," he said. "It gets better as time goes by."

"Beatlemania Again's" success is testament to the songs' staying power - the group first took the stage in the early 1990s. Over the years, certain songs have emerged as fan favorites, Morello said, including "I Want To Hold Your Hand" and "Twist and Shout."

"Beatlemania Again" will appear at The Linda-WAMC Performing Arts Studios, 339 Central Ave., Albany on Saturday, Jan. 17, at 7 p.m. Tickets are \$20 and can be purchased online at [www.wamcarts.org](http://www.wamcarts.org) or by calling 465-5233, ext. 4.





Spagnuolo is hired by one of several NFL teams that are looking for a head coach, there goes one key piece of the coaching staff.
