Delmar shower struggle leads to burglary, robbery charges

Bethlehem arrested a Delmar man Monday, Jan. 26, one day after he allegedly tried to rob his neighbor while she was in the shower.

Joseph A. Bailey, 50, of 82 Delaware Ave., was charged with third-degree robbery and second-degree burglary, both felonies.

He was taken into custody without incident after police recognized him walking along Delaware Avenue and apprehended him after he had boarded a CDTA bus.

Bailey's arrest stemmed from an incident at his apartment complex on Sunday, Jan. 25, in which a neighbor told police she heard a noise while showering, and "when she opened her curtain, she saw her downstairs neighbor [Bailey] ... removing a red and white zipper pouch from her bathrobe on the floor."

The pouch contained approximately \$137, according to the victim.

She said that when she saw Bailey,

with whom she was acquainted, she "exited her shower naked, and a struggle for the money took place in the bedroom," according to the report.

During the struggle, the victim was allegedly pushed into her dresser and then fell to the floor, Bethlehem police said.

Bailey then allegedly put his hand over her mouth and pulled down his boxer shorts indicating that he wanted sex, according to the report, "but did not follow through."

Bailey then allegedly got up and apologized to the victim and told her he was putting the money back in her robe, but returned the pouch without the \$137, according to police.

The victim told police that she had a relationship with Bailey about a year ago and that he could have made a copy of her key at one point because she "was sure" her door was closed and locked before she took a

shower.

The victim complained of back pain following the incident but refused medical treatment, saying she would follow up with her own doctor, according to police.

She was transported to the Bethlehem Police Department for "safety reasons" and then moved to temporary housing but could not be contacted by police the following day at Bailey's arraignment.

Bailey was arraigned by Bethlehem Town Justice Ryan Donovan and sent to the Albany County Correctional Facility in lieu of a \$30,000 cash bond, the report states. He is expected to appear at Bethlehem Town Court on Wednesday, Feb. 18.

Other arrests

• Bethlehem police arrested two men who allegedly broke into a Glenmont car wash on Route 9W and

robbed it.

Jeffery E. Vautrin, 28, of 8 Manor Sites, Cohoes, and James Clark, whose address and age were not listed, were charged with third-degree burglary and third-degree criminal mischief — both felonies — and fifth-degree conspiracy and possession of burglary tools — both misdemeanors — on Jan. 31.

Police said they responded to the car wash's burglary alarm, which was activated in the change room of the business. When officers arrived on the scene, they discovered Vautrin and Clark standing near an open door. As officers approached the two men, they ran from the building.

Bethlehem police said they pursued Vautrin and Clark in their patrol car as the two ran on foot toward Route 9W and advised them to stop, but as they approached the roadway, Vautrin ran south on 9W and Clark continued west toward the Bethlehem Rural Cemetery.

Police apprehended Vautrin on the road and returned to the car wash as two other police officers responded to the area. A short time later, officers found Clark behind the Glenmont Plaza and arrested him before returning to the car wash, according to police.

Police discovered that the change room door had been broken and that Clark had a 2007 Honda Civic parked in the nearby cemetery that was registered under a woman's name, the report states.

It was later learned that Clark was dating the owner of the vehicle and he had "borrowed" the car, according to the arrest report.

Police said they also discovered a hammer in a snow bank along Route 9W that they believed was used to break into the car wash, and after taking a statement from the owner of the business, officers took photographs of the door and the damaged change machine.

Police did not release the amount of money allegedly stolen from the car wash.

Both men were transported to the Bethlehem Police Department

without incident and arraigned by Bethlehem Town Justice Ryan Donovan before being sent to the Albany County Correctional Facility without bail, the report states.

Police said video surveillance would be secured as evidence.

• Guilderland police arrested Kavin Lamar Gailliard, 31, of 10325 Procera Drive, Rockville, Md., on felony burglary charges, Thursday, Jan. 29, according to police reports.

Gailliard was also charged with criminal mischief in the second degree and aggravated harassment in the second degree, the report states.

Gailliard was arrested at 1228 Western Ave. for the offenses that date back to Dec. 14. He was arraigned later that day.

• Jessica Quackenbush, 20, of 458 Hamilton St., Albany, was arrested Monday, Jan. 26, on a warrant for third degree criminal trespassing on school property, a misdemeanor.

Bethlehem Police said they were notified that an individual was driving with Quackenbush on Delaware Avenue and would meet with police officers to surrender Quackenbush to the outstanding warrant.

The warrant stems from an incident involving the Bethlehem Central School District, according to the arrest report.

Quackenbush was taken into custody without incident and sent to the Bethlehem Police Department where she was processed and then arraigned in court by Bethlehem Town Justice Ryan Donovan, the report states.

She was sent to the Albany County Correctional Facility in lieu of \$500 bail, according to police, and she is scheduled to return to court on Feb. 18.

• Guilderland police arrested Timothy S. Anagnos, 22, of 600 County Route 45 in Argyle, on charges of aggravated DWI on Wednesday, Feb. 4, according to police reports.

Anagnos was arrested near 1602 Western Ave. and is scheduled to appear in Guilderland Town Court on Thursday, Feb. 12.



When the tear production is poor, most people will complain of gritty, red eyes. Those who worry about excessively watery eyes are generally experiencing increased tear film evaporation. The causes of dry eye syndrome are many, including age (greater with women than in men), side effects of many medications (including those for blood pressure and cholesterol, etc.), poor diet, dehydration, or relating to a systemic disease. The first line of therapy should always be increased hydration; drink more water. If you are not taking any blood thinners and have no bleeding disorders, an Omega 3 fatty acid supplement may help with your symptoms. Artificial tears such as Systane Ultra® or Optive® are good choices, but an exam with your ophthalmologist is always advised, as dry eye syndrome may indicate a larger systemic problem, and other therapies may be required. If left unchecked, dry eye syndrome can decrease your vision, and your quality of life."

Bethlehem winds down budget talks

BC ending public budget forums, school board to begin official process

After holding four public budget hearings on its district-wide budget, the Bethlehem Central school district is gearing up to released its proposed 2009-10 budget to be voted on in May.

The district hasn't released any numbers concerning its proposed budget, as it's a work in progress at this point, but officials say the school is bracing for a possible \$2.2 million loss in state aid under the governors current proposed state budget.

Both Superintendent Michael Tebbano and Board President James Lytle said they have been holding the public budget forums in order to host a transparent process where the district can maintain a high-quality educational experience for all students at a rate taxpayers can afford to support.

The district's board of education will begin its formal budget discussion, going department-by-department, at its Wednesday, Feb. 25, meeting. The board is expected to vote on a budget proposal sometime in March and voters will get their say on Tuesday, May 19.

There has been much discussion and many questions concerning Bethlehem's salary contract and transportation department, and, according to the district's communication specialist Matt Leon, an online survey conducted in November and December showed that these two topics were among the top issues cited by residents.

Tebbano said the community forums came about through an interest to build upon the work of the Citizens Budget Group during the last two years by opening up the budget process to a "broader community dialogue."

"We have a crisis on our hands," Tebbano said last month.

"We are going to be posting the budget online, and we are going to have our contracts online, too. ... We are really trying to be transparent, and we have talked to union leaders and they thought it was a good idea."

The district has made good on the promise. Employee contracts and an assortment of other budget related items can be found on the district's Web site, www.bcsd.k12.ny.us.

At the school's third budget meeting, held at the middle school, Chief Business and Financial Officer Judith Kehoe told residents that municipal employers are typically governed by the terms of collective bargaining agreements—contracts with employee groups—and that Bethlehem is no different.

The district has three collective bargaining groups: Bethlehem Central Teachers Association, Bethlehem Central United Employees Association and Bethlehem Principals Association.

In total there are 990 employees covered by the three unions in the school district, with 465 employees in the BCTA, 509 employees in the BCUE, and 16 principals and administrators in the BPA.

Salary and benefits make up about 72 percent of the district's budget.

For those who missed the last community budget forum, it can be seen on TV-18, Bethlehem public access, on Saturday, Feb. 14, at 5 p.m.; Sunday, Feb. 15, at 4 p.m.; and Tuesday, Feb. 17, at 2 p.m.

"We are now facing probably the most challenging budget process that this district has encountered in a long time," Tebbano said. "What we learned from our experiences last year though was to engage the community at the earliest possible time and engage them as directly and as transparently as we can through the process."

Tebbano said now district officials will take what they learned from the public budget forums and apply to creating a proposed budget that holds the line on spending, maintains the district's programs and keeps a reasonable tax rate.

Canine communication

Animal trainer helps dogs understand what their owners expect of them

Mind over matter is an idea that has been at the forefront of philosophical conversation for ages. One Guilderland animal trainer has translated that strategy into a way to keep animals calm and obedient.

Patricia Marciano runs a business at a rural property near Guilderland's western border. On her property sits a house, a horse stable and a kennel of dogs.

Outside the kennel, the scent of burning wood fills the air; Marciano is petting the only dog that lives with her full time, a half-Dalmatian named Greta.

Marciano has run her dog training and boarding business since 2004 and is an avid horse rider and self-proclaimed animal lover her whole life. This love of animals translated into a career as one of the area's most respected dog trainers.

For her boarding business, she said, owners will typically leave their animals between two nights and two weeks, but she has kept dogs for as long as a month. Boarding at her kennel is \$27 per day.

Her dog training, though, is where she has really made her mark. She focuses on using body language rather than verbal commands to help keep dogs calm. There are some words and sounds that she uses, but she said the best training techniques involve getting the dog to know what you are thinking.

She demonstrated her techniques on Regen, a 4-year-old yellow lab and a real "pistol." Marciano said Regen has consistently been a "trouble dog."

"He is a very active dog," Marciano said. "He has the attention span basically of a flea."

Regen once broke his owner's rib when he chased after a rabbit

while on a walk.

Her strategy with Regen was to give him a choice to do what is correct, and what is wrong, then reward him when he does what she is asking. She stressed that he must have a choice, and it is important to start with the simple tasks.

"I'm just asking him to stay here," she said.

She tries to get him to focus on her body language, and she does not actually say much at all.

"When he has the ability to focus on me it takes out everything in the world," she said.

A large part of what Marciano does is to get the dog to focus on her head, and instead of yanking him with the leash, she allows him to follow her body and go where she wants him to without being forceful.

She said people often think that using the leash is the best way to control a dog, however that is a mistake.

"The mental leash is much stronger than any physical leash you will ever have," she said.

She also said people often accidentally reinforce bad behavior.

She said if a dog jumps on someone and that person uses his or her hands to get it down, the dog could misinterpret that as petting and think it is behavior that person is seeking.

Marciano said she started out boarding dogs when the Guilderland animal shelter was under renovation and she had taken in some animals in the interim.

She said many had issues, including one pit bull "with lots of energy." The 4-year-old would not listen to commands, and would constantly nip and jump on people. She said using her training techniques, she was able to train the animal to behave, and it was eventually able to be adopted.

"You have to see what you have. Most of it is a frustration level," she said of why some dogs seem like they cannot be trained.

She said a lot of her expertise comes from watching other trainers, reading books, experience and patience.

Marciano has watched top-level trainers and said it is

important to find the techniques that work best for the individual dog.

"Is what this person is doing something I can replicate at home?" she asked.

She said most dogs that act rambunctious are confused about the expectations of their owners. She said humans give dogs many mixed signals about how they should act.

"It's a communication issue," she said. "Every dog is a product of its owner."

Marciano said if dogs knew that their owners expected them to be calm, they would, as dogs are innately obedient.

"One of the things that I find with dogs is that they do want to please," she said.

Ironically, she said, most humans are trying to please their dogs, and end up sending the wrong message about what behaviors are expected.

Most people, she said, would love the opportunity to relax, and if they were expected to, and if they were told to, would do so.

"I'm not looking to run a marathon every day. If someone tells me to sit down and read a book, I'm in."

Susan Green, president of Guilderhaven, an animal welfare organization, said Marciano has been a great help to the group.

"We have taken advantage of her expertise over the past seven or eight years," Green said.

She said Marciano has provided advice and fostered animals for Guilderhaven.

"I appreciate her more than she will ever know," Green said.

Guilderhaven works to raise money to help the elderly afford veterinarian bills and buy food and litter. It also helps find homes for animals, as well as several other services related to animal care.

Green said Marciano has helped trains dogs that were so troubled they were rejected by a number of local agencies, and she was able to turn them into "model citizens." Many have found homes with loving families.

"She's been really, really helpful," added Guilderhaven board member Georgia Fishburn. "She has a big heart."

Land group offers spring programs

The Mohawk Hudson Land Conservancy is hosting a series of educational programs throughout the Capital District on a variety of environmental issues related to land protection. All the programs are free and open to the public.

On Thursday, March 26, from

6:46 to 9 p.m., "Avians and Aliens: What's Being Done to Control Bird Habitat and Invasive Species" will examine how habitat loss and invasive species threaten native species of plants and animals. This program will be held at the Glenville Senior Center, 32 Worden Road, Glenville.

A program on agriculture will be held later in the spring.

"Through this educational series we hope to increase awareness of the consequences of development on our local environment," said Jill Knapp, executive director of the Mohawk Hudson Land Conservancy, "We also plan to discuss actions individuals can take to reduce some of these environmental impacts."

So I kissed him. And I told him that if he was going to put his head back that way, I was going to kiss him. Every time. So we went up and down the aisles, his head bent backward, waiting for a kiss. We kissed and shopped, kissed some more, and talked about the food we would eat that week. It was love, right in the aisles at Price Chopper.

And Lucy. My oldest daughter, who grows more independent and lovely every day. She sits next to me at dinner. And watches what I do and what I eat. I grind fresh pepper on my salad, she grinds fresh pepper on her salad. Lucy loves food as much as I do, and her enthusiasm is unmatched in our house. She shares my passion for Indian, Thai noodles and dark chocolate. And I look at her love of foods as another way of being close to me. She is my comrade in the kitchen. All done for love.

My husband, Paul, is my biggest fan and cheerleader. He eats everything I cook. He even eats the bad stuff. Paul would probably recall the Gorgonzola

Grits that I enthusiastically cooked up a few years back. He ate every bite, even as the rest of us pushed it all aside and pretended it wasn't there. I knew that each of his spoonfuls were swallowed with a lot of love.

I saved my thoughts about Zoe for last because she is the one who inspired me to write this column about love and food. A few weeks ago, Zoe came in from playing outside. Cold and hungry, she immediately wanted to know what sort of dinner we would be eating. When I told her we were having chili, she raced to put her snow clothes away. She has been known to eat three bowls of chili in one sitting. Amazing for a 7-year-old string bean of a girl. So I set a big bowl of chili and a slice of cornbread down in front of her. She stared for a long moment into her bowl. And then hung her head to cry.

"You. Know. I. Hate. Tofu," she said, through bitterly disappointed tears.

The rest of the family dug into their bowls of tofu chili. But Zoe refused. Angry with me for ruining a perfectly good bowl of chili, she wouldn't even touch her cornbread.

And you may ask, Where is the love in that? Zoe's love for me, and her appreciation for my love, is more subtle. She came home from school last week with an assignment for a big project: create a building from our community. Paul and

I bubbled with enthusiasm. We started throwing ideas out for her. But she knew exactly what she wanted to build, and she was not to be swayed. Her model building would be a replica of my little commercial kitchen. To Zoe, it's a pretty important building. And a very big part of her community. In choosing this, she said all she had to say about how much she loves me.

So. Back to Valentine's Day. As a show of love and appreciation for my family, I would like them to give me a present this year. Yes, you read that right. Their gift to me will be time spent together, cooking a beautiful dinner for ourselves.

In my mind, our Valentine's Day gift will go like this: music playing, a bottle of red wine, and little bodies, busy in our kitchen. Paul will get messy, working. A little sauce will spill on his shirt. We will bump into each other as we dance around, setting the table and tossing salad.

I really wanted something that would take a few hands to put together, and ravioli is perfect for a crowd. This homemade version is easy to make with won ton wrappers, and has fresh mozzarella inside. We love the combination of the soft pasta shell and the stretchy cheese inside. The sauce is a very simple tomato sauce, pumped up a bit with vegetables. I use spinach, carrots and red peppers, but any fresh vegetable could be added with good results. I finished the sauce with half-and-half, something I don't often do. This sauce is fresh tasting, and very creamy. A nice treat.

I'd like to thank my family in advance for my Valentine's Day present. And when the day arrives, I may not be such a scrooge about giving my kids something like a small bear holding a satin heart. But for Zoe, a special Valentine's Day promise: For you, my dear girl, I will never make tofu chili again.

Fresh mozzarella and asiago ravioli

- 1 package fresh won ton skins (see note)
- 1 8-ounce container fresh mozzarella, pearl size, if larger, cut into 1/2-inch cubes
- 1 cup shredded Asiago cheese
- Water for sealing edges
- A few teaspoons olive oil

Creamy Tomato Vegetable Sauce

- 29-ounce can crushed tomatoes
- 1 cup water
- 1 large carrot, grated
- 1/2 red pepper, chopped fine
- A few handfuls fresh spinach, chopped fine
- Sea salt to taste
- 1 teaspoon rosemary
- 1/2 cup half-and-half

For the sauce: Combine all of the ingredients except the half-and-half a pot and cook over low heat, stirring. Keep warm over low heat while you cook the raviolis. Add half-and-half to the sauce before serving.

Assemble the ravioli. Place three mozzarella pearls and 1/2 teaspoon Asiago cheese in the center of one wrapper. Dip a finger into a small bowl of water and moisten the edges. Fold into a triangle. Run water over the edges after folding to ensure they are sealed. Use a fork to crimp the edges. Place on a cookie sheet, covered with a damp kitchen towel. Do not overlap raviolis or they will stick together. Assemble the rest of the ravioli. Keep covered until you are ready to cook them. Bring a pot of salted water to a boil. Add a swirl of olive oil to prevent sticking, and reduce heat to a gentle boil. Add raviolis with a slotted spoon, about eight at a time. Cook for 3 minutes, turn over and cook for another minute. Remove the ravioli, and keep in a covered dish while you cook the rest.

To serve: Ladle a bit of the sauce into a shallow pasta or soup bowl, and place the ravioli on top. Serve with extra cheese.

Note: Fresh packaged won ton skins are available in most grocery stores. Look in the produce aisle, near the tofu.

RCS implementing messaging service

Beginning Wednesday, Feb. 25, Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk administrators and principals will have a new way to convey important information to parents and staff. The district is implementing the Connect-ED telephone messaging system, which will allow the district to disseminate important information at a moment's notice.


While the Connect-ED system will be invaluable in notifying parents and staff in the case of an emergency, the district hopes to use it to contact parents about more regular events, such as standardized testing periods and daily attendance messages for middle school and high school students, as well as snow days or early closings due to inclement weather.

"This service will be an important tool to help us get information out to those who are affected in a timely manner," said interim Superintendent Michael

Johnson. In addition to its capacity for notifying large numbers of people rapidly, the system is also capable of sending messages to particular groups. For instance, calls could be made to the parents of all second-graders, to members of the PTA, or to all elementary staff, depending on the information being sent.

Through the system, district officials can reach parents and staff through up to six phone numbers and two e-mail addresses per person. Parents will receive a letter from their child's school, which will provide instructions for updating their contact information as the district works to ensure a smooth transition to the system.

No tradition without taxation

Sometimes, you have to think with your wallet instead of your heart.

Tradition, pride and a sense of identity are the cornerstones of a great community — they are the heartfelt reasons why we call a particular municipality “home” over any other.

And there is no doubt in any of our minds here at *The Spotlight* that Rotterdam Supervisor Steve Tommasone had these sentiments first and foremost in his mind when he and the rest of the Rotterdam Town Board decided to fund the ailing Rotterdam EMS instead of entering the town into an agreement with privately owned Mohawk Ambulance service.

Tommasone said the town would subsidize Rotterdam EMS with a monthly payment of \$10,000. The agreement will be effective until the end of the year, at which time the town will consider the establishment of a tax district to pay for the service. The same service provided by Mohawk Ambulance, according to its spokesman Tom Nardacci, would provide coverage to the town at no cost to taxpayers, billing patients and insurance companies instead.

Tommasone said during the Feb. 6 meeting that there are funds from the 2009 budget that will be able to cover the cost of Rotterdam EMS. However, he also said back in November, when the 2009 town budget was proposed, that “We’re holding the line on all spending for 2009 in particular,” and, “While we would like to keep the town tax to zero, it is next to impossible because you’re always going to have some increase in costs that are outside your control.”

This much is true: Towns, too often it seems, are at the budgetary mercy of too many items that are outside of their control. The decision to subsidize Rotterdam EMS, however, is not one of them.

Rotterdam taxpayers, just like taxpayers everywhere, have tough times ahead. Rotterdam taxpayers are already facing a one-time charge for an assessment error made in 2007 — one that will cost a homeowner with a home valued at \$150,000 an extra \$125. They need not be made any tougher by having to pay for a service a privately owned company can provide.

Tommasone has told *Spotlight Newspapers* that, in regard to the EMS conundrum, “private industry offers no guarantees.”

But it does, and it has to. Private industry — at least at our local level — lives and dies on the guarantee of good service. Unlike a government-run entity, a private company like Mohawk Ambulance can’t turn to its taxpayers for a \$10,000-a-month bailout.

Your role in saving hearts and lives

He is a volunteer with the American Heart Association, a Capital Region Advisory Board member, and a member of the Emergency Cardiovascular Care Committee. He lives in Colonie.

Soon it will be Valentine’s Day, and many of you have been searching for a while for the right card, box of candy, flowers or jewelry. The American Heart Association has designated February as American Heart Month, and there are a number of awareness programs you will be hearing about. The goal of the AHA, and my personal focus, is to decrease death and disability from cardiovascular disease and stroke. Now, that may sound a bit lofty when we all seem to be focused on the failing economy, but I believe that saving hearts and lives has never been of higher importance than it is today.

Sure, it’s a lot easier to shop for that card and candy compared to contemplating the concept that saving hearts and lives is your personal responsibility. The good news I have for you is that your role is both essential and will not be too difficult a task to prepare for.

In three decades of responding to patients in distress, I have been a part of the team attempting to resuscitate hundreds of cardiac arrest victims. Some were successful but many were not. I have worked in suburban communities like Colonie and Clifton Park, as well as urban areas like midtown Manhattan and Flushing, Queens. An observation I must share with you is that all of the cardiac

arrest victims we successfully resuscitated had someone on the scene who knew how to quickly access the EMS system and start administering CPR before we even arrived. In those situations where the resuscitation was not successful, in patients of all ages, often a family member simply stood by, not knowing what to do.

Success in resuscitation takes an EMS system which has strengthened all the links in the chain of survival. The chain of survival is made up of early access to a patient in cardiac arrest; early CPR, early defibrillation, and early advanced life support, as well as implemented the AHA Guidelines for the highest quality of out-of-hospital and in-hospital care.

I have spent my adult years training EMTs and paramedics to properly care for you, your family, and your neighbors. This has been a very rewarding career for me knowing that our efforts do save people’s lives. I believe that all my fellow instructors in the paramedic program do a great job at the task of preparing the rescuers to do their job.

However, it is important for everyone reading this column to clearly understand that even if you live in a community with excellent EMTs and paramedics, lots of fancy equipment and rapid access to highly trained hospital emergency department personnel, the successful outcome from a cardiac arrest that occurs in your home is still very much dependent on what happens in the first few minutes.

The AHA’s advocacy work includes our efforts to convince the governor and state legislators of the need to take 30 minutes out of the high school curriculum to train our children in CPR. If this becomes the law, we will be training the next generation of rescuers.

Why do we think it is so important for so many people to be trained in CPR? Here is some very startling data. Between 75 to 80 percent of cardiac arrests occur in the home. Research has shown that together we can double, if not triple, the chances of survival if CPR is started

within the first minutes after the patient drops. So the best way that you can be prepared to save the life of your loved ones, friends, family and neighbors, is to learn CPR. We understand that the bystander rate of initiating CPR is somewhere around 27 percent, and actually a large number of those rescuers stepping up to help others are off-duty healthcare providers. Some communities have addressed this issue head-on and trained large numbers of the public in CPR as well as strategically placing automated external defibrillators in public buildings. The benefit is tremendous ... more bystanders willing to start CPR and more survivors!

Today, learning CPR is no more complicated than learning how to brush your teeth. The AHA has made this very simple with its CFR Anytime kit which has its own blow-up manikin and a 25-minute DVD to watch as you practice the technique of CPR right in your living room. Of course, you can always take a course offered by the EMS services and fire department in your community should you prefer to have an instructor assist you.

So why not make a commitment this Valentine’s Day to the ones you love that you will learn CPR? Write it on the card you buy and follow up right away. Take half an hour and learn the lifesaving skills to help us help you help your loved ones survive a sudden cardiac arrest! You can get information about learning CPR and the CPR Anytime kit at www.americanheart.org.

While he and his friends groaned at first and resisted, thinking that they couldn't have as much fun with their friend's little sister hanging around, over time, Rightmyer started to enjoy hanging out with Judy.

"All through college, Judy became a good friend of mine. We'd write letters to each other, and on our vacations we'd always make sure to get her friends out with my friends," said Rightmyer.

"By the time I was a senior in college, I had a secret crush on Judy, but she was my friend Jim's sister and I couldn't ask her out," said Rightmyer.

However, they continued spending time together in groups, heading to the Adirondacks, skiing, swimming at Lake George, and going to movies and concerts at SPAC.

"After I graduated from college I began teaching at Notre Dame-Bishop Gibbons High School in Schenectady. I was busy teaching and coaching full time," said Rightmyer.

Judy was a junior at Plattsburgh State College. Rightmyer was getting settled into life as an adult, living in his own apartment and working full time.

"One afternoon in March I went out for a long run after school. While I was on my run, Judy drove by, rolled her window down, and we had a nice talk. She was home from college for a few days," said Rightmyer.

tral Middle School, met his wife, Patty, when they were working together as park rangers in New York City.

"We worked together for about two years, both involved with other people," said Gill.

He said those other relationships eventually faded and Patty was promoted to his boss.

"We started hanging out together as friends, and it developed into more. We thought we were being discreet, with a work relationship, but all our friends and coworkers knew. I think perhaps before I did," said Gill.

Still crazy after all these years

Like most things in life, relationships take work.

"For starters, the best way to keep a relationship alive and healthy is for couples to cultivate the ability to be aware of their dance," said

David Olsen, director for the Samaritan Counseling Center of the Capital Region in Scotia.

"Literally making that a priority despite how busy both of them might be," said Olsen.

When it comes to finding love, some of the obvious routes, such as online dating, aren't as beneficial as they seem.

"A lot of people are looking online. Unfortunately, the odds of that happening in terms of it lasting are not terribly good," said Olsen.

Instead, people should look in places where they'll meet people who share similar interests.

If you're very spiritual, Olsen suggested looking at people in the same religious community. If you love hiking, join a hiking club. If you like cooking, try a cooking class.

"Think of where you have interests and get involved with people who share those same interests, and over time, there's a way to meet people that way," said Olsen.




mendment. The Planning Board last heard the proposal in July and now has to make a recommendation to the town board, which will either grant or deny the Legends PDD.

The Planning Board also has to make a recommendation on the project's environmental review. The site is currently zoned Residential-A, according to Morelli, but needs to be rezoned by the Town Board to allow for the project's density.

Board member Katie Powers said she liked the project but was concerned about the row of houses slated to be built about 200 feet from the Thruway.

"The developers of this project appear to be responsible overall, and I want their project to succeed," Powers said. "However, the effects of prolonged exposure to high noise and carbon monoxide levels from the nearby highway needs to be investigated, particularly where, as here, the properties will be marketed to seniors and families with young children."

Morelli said developers have been cooperative with the town throughout the process. He said at one point, developers discussed the possibility of townhouses but decided on the "more traditional" single-family homes.

One concern brought up in previous meetings was the "single point of access," which can be an issue for emergency crews, but Morelli said he didn't believe a "big boulevard entrance" was necessary. There was also a discussion on the number of garages and sidewalks associated with the project.

Board member John Smolinsky said the discussion on possible air pollution comes in part because part of the requirements of a PDD is that the project meets a town code that states the site is reasonably free of "objectionable conditions" such as odors, noise, dust, air

pollution, incompatible land uses and other environmental constraints.

"As with many development projects, the Legends project has many positive points, most notably, it will fill a niche in the Bethlehem housing market for modest-priced housing, but every project also has impacts or raises questions," said Smolinsky. "In the case of this project, it has been very beneficial to have dialog about many of the important issues like those above, as well school tax impacts, sidewalks, emergency access and others, before the project proceeds to a more detailed design stage."

He concluded, "If the project proceeds, it will have benefited by the board's discussions, as well as from the ongoing input from the town's planning staff."

Smolinsky said he would like to see some general information regarding the impact of tailpipe emissions and fine particulates that can cause health problems.

"It was my understanding that the developer will continue to research the topic and report back to the planning board," he said.

Smolinsky agreed with Morelli's assessment that lengthy board discussions "often raise good questions" and help developers understand what needs to be addressed before approval.

Morelli said more information would be helpful from the developer, but that developments and housing unit along highways are nothing new. He added that there is about 200 feet of land between the proposed development and the Thruway that can be landscaped or have a berm built.

"Certainly, on one hand, you have the fact you're along a highway ... on the other hand you look along the Thruway and Northway and there's a ton of residences," Morelli said. "You have to look at the difference between emissions of vehicles driving by at 70 mile per hour and emission of cars idling at red lights in a suburban setting."

G'land seeks grant for Web site

Money would help pay for consolidation efforts with Altamont

In an effort to cut costs, the town of Guilderland is filing for an efficiency grant to consolidate its Web site with that of the Village of Altamont.

The town has to file for the state grant by Wednesday, Feb. 11, and can choose whether or not to accept the grant if it is awarded.

The Tuesday, Feb. 3, Town Board meeting featured recommendations by board member Warren Redlich to overhaul the Web site, and potentially find a new host to run the site.

Town Supervisor Ken Runion said a response to the application could be expected in the fall at the earliest.

The Town Board will then vote to choose to accept the grant. Runion stressed that the economy or the technology could change over the next few months, and that could affect the application.

Runion said the application for the local efficiency grant is an attempt to tap one of the few resources available to municipalities.

"It's about the only grant program that's left," Runion said.

He said the Village of Altamont and the town could share software to run the Web sites together and save the money they spend to individually license the software.

Yearly maintenance of the site is approximately \$3,500. The Village of Altamont pays the same amount, but under the grant, the municipalities would need to pay only one amount.

Both towns would maintain individual Web addresses, but could link to each other.

"It would appear as if the two Web sites were integrated," Runion said. He also said the town is also look-

ing to add video to the Web site to broadcast town, planning and zoning board meetings.

The broadcasts could also feature closed captioning.

He said the initial cost to run video would include purchasing an encoder, which could run close to \$11,000, however the grant application would cover \$10,000 of it.

Runion said the new video feature would allow meetings to be bulleted and chaptered, so one could watch individual agenda items without viewing the entire meetings.

Town board member Warren Redlich said he has had success with Web sites related to his law firm and blog, and said the town could provide a better Web site while spending less money.

"I'm very focused on the Internet," Redlich said. "I see the value of the Internet."

He said www.GoDaddy.com could host the sites for \$5, an address could be purchased for close to \$10 and Google video could provide an outlet to broadcast meetings for free.

He said the space is unlimited, unlike Virtual Town Hall, the service that the town is looking at using. Virtual Town Hall can store up

to 100 hours of video.

Runion said he is concerned that the free services would make it so that anyone could download the videos and tamper with them. He said Virtual Town Hall does not allow video downloads, only viewings.

"You have to have security and control over the site," Runion said. "At least you know the original hasn't been doctored."

Redlich retorted that an original copy of the meeting could be kept on file. Also, anyone could record the meetings and post tampered versions on the Internet if they wanted to.

"There's no loss of control if you post it on Google video," Redlich argued.

Redlich said the easiest way to upload videos to the Internet would be achieved by upgrading digital cameras for filming, but he is unsure how much that would cost.

He also said having a Web site where department heads, employees and even residents can add content and blog could be a potential for future upgrades.

Right now several town employees update the site and fill it with content. That would not change if the grant were accepted.

groups and individuals around Bethlehem all in the name of "kindness."

Supervisor Jack Cunningham is expected to make an official proclamation naming the last day of February an annual day of kindness. Unlike the first day of April, where you plan pranks and justify jest at others' expense, this day will require nothing more than a friendly gesture or an act of goodwill to another.

The Bethlehem Chamber of Commerce is also on board, and its president, Marty DeLaney, is teaming up with Burns to get the word and out get the community involved. A meeting was held in January and groups attended and

began brainstorming for ideas.

Burns suggested that group hold activities sometime between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. on Feb. 28, but the kindness can continue throughout the day.

"We decided to make a whole day out of it," said Burns. "When we had the first meeting and all the groups showed up, I said, 'Wow, people really want to do this.'"

The Bethlehem Sportsman's Club and Zoning Board will be making a donation to the Bethlehem Food Pantry as their act of kindness and the Selkirk Fire Department is planning a breakfast fundraiser to benefit a local child with cancer.

"We're not looking for everyone to do something big and grand and raising money is great, but it can be much simpler than that," Burns said. "You can do this as a group or on your own, all you have to do is an act of kindness."

Some of the groups participating so far include area churches, Bethlehem Business Women, the Delmar Rotary Club, the Bethlehem Chamber of Commerce and town government groups.





Entertainment *in the* Spotlight

It's not uncommon for Steve Ricci to get e-mails at the Albany Institute of History and Art asking if the museum still has mummies on display.

Co-worker Kristen Gilbank was at a conference recently when a man who used to live in New York approached her with the same question: Were the mummies still at the museum?

Suffice to say, the mummies are one of the big draws at the Institute of History and Art. On Saturday, Feb. 14, they'll be one of the centerpieces of the museum's annual Egyptian Family Festival.


"Adults remember coming to see the mummies as kids," Ricci, the institute's public relations and marketing manager, said. "They remain hugely popular."

There are three mummies at the museum. Two are people; one is an animal. The animal was originally thought to be a cat, but high-tech scanning revealed that it was actually a dog based on its skull structure.

As for the humans, one mummy is a female, who remains fully wrapped. The other is a male who had extensive hieroglyphics on his coffin that allowed researchers to learn a lot about him - including that he was not a pharaoh, a question posed often to museum staff.

"He was an everyday man," said Gilbank, the institute's education program manager.

Named Ankhefenmut, the man was a priest in the temple

of Mut at Karnak in Thebes. He was probably between 55 and 65 years old when he died.

Gilbank said Ankhefenmut provides a great opportunity for the workers at the museum to teach kids about everyday life in Egypt. The topic has proved captivating for kids as young as kindergarteners. Gilbank said, "a real love of Egypt starts around 5." She's met kids at previous Egyptian Family Festivals who were just 6 and were budding Egyptologists, the term for people who specialize in ancient Egypt.

Kids who attend this year's festival can learn about Egyptian love poems and fashion their own Egyptian amulets, which are ornamental charms. They will also have a chance to mummify an old toy or sculpture - they can bring in one of their own or make one at the institute.

There will also be tours of the Egyptian gallery led by a docent who has traveled extensively to Egypt. In addition to the mummies, the gallery includes deity statues, several coffin lids and other Egyptian objects.

Gilbank said the festival traditionally appeals to all age groups.


"So many people have an interest in Egypt," she said.

"It's a source of fascination for adults and kids," Ricci agreed.

reasons the culture has sparked so much interest is that it offers a rare glimpse into an ancient time.

"We know so much about them because of the hieroglyphics," she said, noting that the climate in Egypt has done a remarkable job preserving those hieroglyphics.

The Egyptian Family Festival runs from 10:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. at the Albany Institute of History and Art. The festival is free with museum admission, which is \$10 for adults, \$8 for students and seniors and \$6 for children 6-12. The institute is at 125 Washington Ave., Albany.




A small mummified dog, right, in the Albany Institute's collection was originally believed to be a cat, until high-tech scanning revealed the true contents.

Eagles win on Senior Night

Bethlehem defense holds Saratoga in check

Sparked by an explosive offense and a lockdown defense, the Bethlehem girls basketball team picked up a 49-32 Suburban Council victory over the Saratoga Springs Blue Streaks in front of a boisterous crowd on Friday's senior night.

The night began with a ceremony to honor the six seniors on the team — Megan Olsen, Alex McCullough, Taylor Teal, Kiersten Swete, Paula Gadoski and Catlin Dole. Coach Mark Nealon changed his starting line-

up, for the occasion, replacing Jaclyn Oskam with Gadoski.

"I appreciate everything they have done for this program," said Nealon. "We have had a special couple years, and they have, obviously, been a big part of it."

As the game got under way, Bethlehem's zone defense proved to be effective. The Lady Eagles (10-3 league, 12-5 overall) held Saratoga (5-8, 7-10) to only two field goals in the first half.

"Sometimes we shoot well, and sometimes we don't," said Saratoga assistant coach Mike Nolan. "But they (Bethlehem) were constantly on the ball. They had great pressure. I give them a lot of credit, they just out D'd us."

Saratoga managed to stay close to Bethlehem in the first half due to good foul shooting. Nealon attributed the number of fouls to poor defensive execution, saying,

"Part of the fouling in the first half is we just didn't rotate over, and we bailed them out. Sometimes we weren't quick enough, and sometimes we did get over there, we were in the right position, but we were too greedy and we'd reach and foul."

Saratoga also played good defense in the first half, not allowing many shots in the paint. Nolan said that the defensive game plan was to "just play strong defense. We played the zone, and we weren't going to worry about one girl."

Unfortunately for the Blue Streaks, that one girl was Megan Olsen, who scored 15 points in the game and also contributed seven steals.

"I like having Meg up front because she's just a great anticipator, and she has long arms," said Nealon. "When she gets a steal, you feel confident

that she is going to finish. She has a real good sense of the game of basketball, so wherever you put her, there is a real possibility of getting some steals."

But Bethlehem's offense was not the best part of its game. The defensive intensity was high throughout, especially against Saratoga's Staci McElroy. The Lady Eagles shut McElroy out of the scoring column — the first time any team had done that this season.

"Well obviously, she's our go-to girl, and we don't think she got enough shots, but that's credit to the great defense that they played," said Nolan.

"I don't think she ever felt like she could get into a flow of the game," said Nealon. "The defensive strategy tonight was good, and the girls implemented it tonight very well."


Local team travels to Portugal


Large school divisions are up for grabs



Stay safe during cold-weather outings

IN BRIEF

Information is key to helping America's seniors successfully navigate the cold weather months – a time that can pose a variety of health and safety challenges.

A common winter health problem is hypothermia, a condition marked by a very low body temperature, usually caused by being in the cold (indoors or outdoors) too long. The American Geriatric Society Foundation for Health in Aging explains that since older adults have slower metabolisms, they tend to produce less body heat. In addition, because of the way the body changes with age, it's difficult for them to tell when temperatures are too low. That's why it's important for seniors to know how to stay warm outside as well as inside their house or apartment.

When going outside, seniors are encouraged to:

- Dress in layers of loose-fitting, lightweight clothing under their coat. This can keep warm air between the layers of clothing.

- Use mittens instead of gloves. Mittens allow fingers to touch each other and generate warmth.

- Wear a hat. Between 30 and 50 percent of body heat loss occurs through the head. A scarf covering the mouth and nose can protect the lungs.

For warmth indoors, the National Institute on Aging recommends:

- Closing blinds and curtains to prevent heat loss from your home. Weather stripping or caulking around the windows can keep cold air out.

- Keeping your thermostat set to 68 to 70 degrees.

- Wearing warm clothes during the day and using extra blankets at night.

- Eating enough food to keep

top fear of aging was Alzheimer's disease, more than half the respondents worried over losing their physical abilities as they aged. Women in particular had a much higher fear of falling than men.

Experts warn against the danger of winter falls by encouraging seniors to:

- Wear non-skid boots.

- Pay attention to the walking surface

by looking down only with your eyes. Bowing your head forward could cause a loss of balance.

- Keep sidewalks clear and

apply salt or sand to icy patches. (Ask a neighbor or relative to help.)

- Replace rubber tips on canes and other medical equipment well before they're worn so they don't become slippery when wet.



Winter driving safety tips

Today's "seniors" are boomers and they don't plan to slow down their lifestyles for a little thing like getting older - or inclement winter weather.

More 65-plus drivers are on the roads as baby boomers continue to work or pursue active retirement lifestyles. Yet no matter how active and healthy you stay, your driving skills will inevitably change as you age. Your changing driving abilities, however, need not stand in the way of safe, enjoyable winter driving.

"In our fast-paced, modern world, driving is not only a privilege, it's a necessity for millions of Americans, especially seniors who rely on their vehicles to help keep them independent," commented Howard Hayes of NAVTEQ. "Many seniors don't have the luxury of staying home when the weather turns bad. But with a few safety measures and a little extra care, seniors can stay safe on the roads throughout the winter."

Senior drivers should follow universal vehicle safety practices, and take some extra precautions designed to compensate for their changing driving abilities.

Take care of your car
Vehicle maintenance is even more important in the winter, when frigid temperatures could turn a break down into a life-threatening situation. Look after maintenance items that are particularly susceptible

to malfunction in cold weather, including:

- Cooling systems - Be sure you have the right antifreeze mixture to keep the car's cooling system running smoothly.
- Belts and hoses - Cold temperatures can make these more prone to cracking and breaking.
- Tires - Cold makes the air in tires contract and could cause

a dangerous under-inflation.

- Battery -- Wintery temperatures can make a battery lose its charge. Be sure yours is in good condition and fully charged before the weather turns cold.

- Wipers and washer fluid - You'll need wipers to remove snow and washer fluid to remove sand, salt and dirt spray from your windshield. Be sure wipers work well and washer fluid flows freely.

- Oil -- For optimum performance, oil should be clean and flow easily through the engine. Consult a mechanic or your vehicle's manual to find out if your engine might benefit from thinner viscosity oil in cold weather.

Take care of yourself

Winter driving can be especially rigorous, so it's important to ensure you're at your best physically before climbing behind the wheel. Do's and don'ts for senior drivers include:

- Do have your vision checked - ideally twice a year, and definitely before winter driving season gets under way.

- Don't drive if you're tired, feeling ill or have just begun a new prescription medication.

- Do stock your vehicle with emergency supplies, including warm blankets, bottled water (kept inside the car and not in the trunk where it may freeze), nutritious nonperishable snacks like granola bars or protein-rich nuts and road flares.

- Don't leave home without your cell phone. Or, if you don't have a cell, make sure you check in with a loved one before you leave the house. Tell them where you're going, your estimated arrival and return time, and that you'll check in with them again when you return home.

Legal documents can help protect assets

Seniors should plan ahead for their later years

Winter is a good time for reflection. Like many of you, I have more quiet time to think about family and friends - how our lives have changed in recent years - while considering the possibilities ahead. This is also a good time to consider how changes in your life, and the lives of those close to you, may have affected your advance directives and other asset protection planning.

For a few years, I was a featured attorney on a local radio call-in show that focused on legal issues of interest to seniors and their family. While some of the questions were quite esoteric, most of the callers were just ordinary folks, who had worked hard and saved what they could.

Most people didn't believe they would ever need to go to a nursing home, but nevertheless, wanted to set up a plan so that their life savings would be passed to the next generation in as efficient a manner as possible. If they could do that while reducing their exposure to the costs of long-term care, so much the better.

The most important planning documents to you personally are the Durable General Power of Attorney, Health Care Proxy and Living Will. Although not very complicated, they can be very powerful tools. If you are not able to give consent, without these documents your family will be prevented by privacy laws from getting information on your condition or assisting with the payment of bills,


insurance claims or any other business.

Next, you should understand that Medicare will pay your doctors and hospitalization for acute care, but not for chronic care. For example, if an elderly woman falls and breaks her hip, Medicare covers the hospital, surgery and initial rehabilitation. However, if the woman is not progressing in accordance with Medicare's standard guidelines, (possibly because of congestive heart failure, dementia or any number of other conditions), Medicare and supplemental health insurance stop paying and the patient is then personally responsible for care costs averaging \$300 per day.

Her life savings will quickly be decimated unless there is professional guidance. With any luck, when your time comes, you will die without personally experiencing a nursing home.

Some other considerations follow. The threshold for estate tax in New York State is currently \$1 million. The federal threshold is \$3.5 million, but changing. Many readers will not be concerned with estate tax, but will be concerned that their property gets to the intended beneficiaries with reasonably little delay and complication, and in a manner which reduces professional fees. Some readers will have more complicated families - second marriage, alternate lifestyle, pets or disabled children who need to be specially provided for. Some may own a Florida home.

All of these factors, together with your personal beliefs make a difference in the planning that is right for you. When you are ready to review and update your plan, give me a call and together we will get it right.



Silver Alert helps keep seniors safe

If you've got a senior citizen in your life suffering from dementia or Alzheimer's disease, you probably worry about them wandering away and not being able to find their way home. A new law that addresses this issue is under consideration right now.

In September, the House of Representatives passed the National Silver Alert Act. Much like an Amber Alert for missing children, the act would establish a formal, public notification system to spread information about senior citizens who are missing. The bill was introduced after an 86-year-old Florida woman wandered away from an assisted living facility and was later found dead.

Visiting Angels, an organization that provides in-home care for thousands of seniors across the country, is urging everyone to call and write their senators to encourage them to sponsor the bill.

"Senior safety is first and foremost for Visiting Angels," says chief operating officer Patricia Drea. "The National Silver Alert Act would give families the peace of mind that, if their loved one is missing, the public would be notified and on the lookout for them."

Currently Silver Alert programs operate in about a dozen states and the National Silver Alert Act would provide federal support to the state initiatives and assist in the expansion of Silver Alert. The bill, S 3579, would create a Silver Alert Coordinator within the Department of Justice, who would set voluntary guidelines and monitor state Silver Alert programs. The coordinator would consult with agencies such as the Federal Communications Commission, the Department of Transportation and the Administration on Aging to develop best practices and provide federal funds to implement state Silver Alert programs.

"Reuniting missing seniors with their families requires a rapid and united response," says Drea. "With the National Silver Alert Act our communities can use and build on existing resources to help keep our

seniors safe."

Visiting Angels and other organizations serving senior citizens are asking the public to contact their senators and encourage them to become a co-sponsor of S 3579 and to support the bill when it comes

to a vote on the floor. You can find your senator at www.senate.gov.



Plan and prepare

Winter driving experts agree - don't drive in bad weather if you can avoid it. But if driving in inclement weather is absolutely necessary, take these steps to help make the challenge as safe as possible:

- Avoid rush hours, but stay on well-traveled roads. Don't try taking back roads or "short cuts" thinking you'll avoid traffic. Fewer cars on back roads may mean those routes are the last to be plowed or maintained and are not likely to be heavily patrolled by emergency services.

- Pre-plan your route using resources like Traffic.com to get the most up-to-date information on traffic and road conditions. Internet savvy seniors can log on to www.traffic.com before leaving home. Or, call (866) MY-TRAFIC (866-698-7232), a toll-free traffic hotline. At www.Traffic.com/Gift, you can download the free Traffic Gift Pack, which includes three easy-to-use personal mobile traffic services: the Traffic.com hotline, mobile Web site and text alerts.

- Travel with a companion whenever possible. There is safety in numbers, and a vigilant travel companion can help you navigate slick roads, wintery weather and traffic challenges better than you might if you were alone.

Larson packed

"It was a blessing to me," she started. "I could wheel my husband over from our apartment at Embury through the covered and closed walkway and bring him to the Evergreen Adult Day Service program. I then could go about my day without a worry. I volunteered at the Lake Avenue Elementary School. My husband loved the gardens at Evergreen, and I was a better caregiver at night because we had both had a good day," she continued. "Before, we were both homebound, and I didn't drive. The quality of our lives changed dramatically because of Embury and Evergreen. I made new friends and the staff at Evergreen made my husband happy."

After her husband passed away, Larson became a volunteer at Evergreen because, as she said, "that was where my circle of friends were."

Vicky Jupin has had a wonderful experience with Evergreen Adult Day Services. Her mom, Sadie Dekan, started with Evergreen at age 84 and was part of the program for 16 years. Jupin and her husband Joe, were both working and she remembers what a wonderful place Evergreen was for the working family.

"Being able to leave your loved one at Evergreen and have great peace of mind knowing she was enjoying their day enabled us to work without worry," she explained.

Jupin recalled how the staff treated each client's individual needs with respect and caring and said she felt that because of Evergreen Adult Day Services excellent programs and activities, her mom maintained and enjoyed a wonderful level of health until the age of 102.

Margo Larson and Vicky Jupin, two new friends speaking warmly about their similar experiences said almost in unison, "you can have a beautiful place, but it's the staff that makes the difference."


