Gov's 'itax' would increase price of videogame downloads

You can duck, jump, morph, shoot or fly, but no matter what level you are on or what game you are playing, you will not be able to avoid Gov. David Paterson.

The governor's proposed tax on downloadable content has videogame aficionados questioning the wisdom behind jacking up the price of what many consider a source of relaxation.

In January, Paterson announced an executive budget that attempts to curb what he labeled "the largest budget deficit in state history." The amount of cuts represents a \$1.7 billion shortfall in the current fiscal year, as well as a \$13.7 billion deficit in the 2009-2010 budget year.

BC teachers open up contracts

Supervisor commends educators for looking at 'the bigger picture'

The Bethlehem Central Teachers Association Union is in talks with school officials about the possibility of renegotiating its contract in the face of a financial meltdown that could threaten job security.

Bethlehem Superintendent Michael Tebbano told residents about the contract talks during the district's final public budget meeting on Monday, Feb. 9. He said the teachers were "willing" to have union representatives re-open their current contract with the district.

Tebbano said he couldn't specify the nature of the talks because he is sworn to confidentiality, but considering the magnitude of the district's financial dilemma, the

Grimm considers run for supervisor

Runion to decide candidacy based on town interests

N.S. passes second moratorium extension

Town considers local law to cap retail-building size

New Scotland passed its second commercial moratorium extension, preventing the construction of buildings over 30,000 square

feet, which will expire April 1.

New Scotland initially put the cap in place in May while board members mulled zoning laws that some believed better fit with the town's comprehensive plan.

Sphere Development LLC has been trying to develop land at the corner of Route 85 and Route 85A, located on the former Bender melon farm, but has been unable to follow through due to the moratorium. Sphere's plans included developing a commercial center with a 137,000-square-foot Target

serving as an anchor store.

Attempts to contact a representative from Sphere were unsuccessful.

Bob Prentiss, a member of the advocacy group New Scotlanders for Sound Economic Development, or NS4SED, spoke in favor of the extension at the Wednesday, Feb. 11, Town Board meeting.

"From day one, I've been calling for a moratorium of up to

Woman who left collision scene faces DWI charges

Bethlehem police arrested a Coeymans woman who allegedly collided with and broke a utility pole with her car before leaving the scene on foot.

Therese A. Biers, 45, of 340 Biers Road, Coeymans, was arrested Wednesday, Feb. 11, on charges of driving while intoxicated, operating a motor vehicle with a blood-alcohol content 0.08 percent or greater, aggravated DWI with a BAC of 0.18 percent or greater, among other violations.

Police said they found a vehicle on Old Quarry Road that had traveled down an embankment into a National Grid utility pole. The impact of the car broke the pole at its base, and the vehicle became

entangled in a nearby support cable.

According to the arrest report, the vehicle found was registered to Biers. Officers discovered "a single set of footprints, visible in the snow, from the driver's door to the roadway" upon investigation the crash, the report states. Police sent a marked police car to Biers' home, while another officer remained at the scene of the accident.

While at the scene, police said Biers' son arrived with a third party and a pair of keys to the vehicle, which he said he got from his mother, who was at home.

Biers' son was able to free the vehicle from the cable and drive it back home, the report

states, and National Grid was contacted and arrived on the scene to attend to the damaged property.

Police said Biers was arrested at her home and was returned to the crash location, but, when interviewed by officers, she smelled like alcohol and "appeared to be very intoxicated and was unable to recall the events of the crash."

Biers was not hurt in the accident, but when she was asked more questions, the report states, she appeared "to be mixed up."

Police charged Biers with DWI and transported her to the Bethlehem Police Department where a chemical test revealed her BAC was well above triple the legal limit of 0.08 percent, according to police.

Biers was released to the custody of her son and is scheduled to appear in Bethlehem Town Court on Wednesday, Feb. 18.

with a BAC of 0.08 percent or greater; aggravated DWI, with a BAC of 0.18 percent or greater; unlawful possession of marijuana; speeding; failure to stop for a stop sign; and failure to keep right.

Bethlehem police said an officer saw Vanhoesen driving west on the Delmar Bypass at a high rate of speed when he attempted to make a left-hand turn onto Bender Lane and went off the roadway into a field.

The officer pulled behind Vanhoesen, and when he approached his vehicle, Vanhoesen was seen sitting behind the steering wheel of the vehicle with the engine running, according to the arrest report.

The officer on the scene could smell alcohol on Vanhoesen's breath, and Vanhoesen displayed signs of intoxication as he verbally identified himself and gave police his driver's license, the report states.

Police said Vanhoesen was ordered to leave his vehicle and perform three field-sobriety tests, which he failed, and tested positive for alcohol

before being transported to the Bethlehem Police Department for processing.

Vanhoesen's vehicle was towed and police discovered a marijuana pipe with residue under his passenger's seat when taking inventory of the car, the report states.

A chemical test revealed that Vanhoesen's BAC was over double the legal limit of 0.08 percent and he was issued several vehicle and traffic law violations before being released into the custody of a woman who picked him up at the police station, according to police.

Guilderland police arrested Nicole A. S. Gambati, 23, of 42 McDermott Road in Mechanicville on charges of DWI on Saturday, Jan. 21, according to police reports.

Hollister was arrested near the corner of Western Avenue and Windingbrook Drive and was arraigned on Thursday, Feb. 12, the report states.

County offers liquor law lessons

Seminar stresses drunken-driving prevention

Albany County District Attorney David Soares spoke on the importance of preventing DWI incidents at a free seminar to inform local pub owners about state alcohol laws.

The event was held at the Palace Theatre in Albany on Wednesday, Feb. 11.

Soares spoke about "collective accountability" and a partnership between his office and local establishments that could help prevent underage drinking and accidents.

"These are the most preventative incidents we have," Soares said. "I am going to do what I have to do to prevent that knock on the door at 3 a.m. telling parents their kid's not coming home."

He also said his office has begun compiling information related to drinking and driving accidents regarding the last location a drunk driver was before committing the crime.

Soares said his office is planning to address issues related to safety on college and university campuses in addition to measures to prevent drunken driving before it happens.

He said a newly created panel related to driving while intoxicated features a representative from Siena College, and his office is establishing a relationship with all of the area schools to take

preventative measures.

He cited the initiative by the State Liquor Authority to close down Paulie's bar in downtown Albany as an example of efforts to shut down notorious "college" bars.

"We will continue to target locations that serve alcohol to underage drinkers," Soares said.

Soares' office said the seminar is designed to inform establishment owners of the Alcohol Beverage Control laws, also known as the ABC laws.

"We expect the bars to enforce the law, and there's a lot of misconceptions of what those laws are," said Heather Orth, a spokeswoman for Soares' office. "The State Liquor Authority and the district attorney's office have the responsibility to ensure that those who are licensed to serve alcohol do so lawfully and responsibly. Educating restaurant and bar owners on their duties and obligations is the first step in ensuring all licenses are in full compliance with the law."

Jim Giacone, owner of My Place and Co. in Delmar, said it's important to keep up with liquor laws, stay informed and take advantage of the information available.

"Some things change, and you don't realize it," Giacone said. "It's nice to know what the laws are."

Giacone said he has attended several events sponsored by the Empire State Restaurant and Tavern Association, including this one.

He added there is a lot of liability and exposure for restaurants, and it is vital to be informed.

Topics discussed at the event included licensing privileges, displays and signs related to licenses, employment, acceptable forms of proof of age, "classic signs of visible intoxication," responsibilities related to fights, gambling and drug activity, hours of sale and penalties for non-compliance

with the laws.

Speakers at the event included Scott Wexler, executive director of the Empire State Restaurant and Tavern Owners Association, and Daniel Boyle, commissioner of the State Liquor Authority.

"As a former police officer and chief of police, I have witnessed firsthand the tragic consequences that far too often result from the irresponsible use of alcohol. These unfortunate outcomes are preventable, and prevention starts with proper education and training," said Boyle.

Wexler discussed how to properly handle altercations at their establishments.

"It's critically important that you document those instances," Wexler said. "How you respond makes a difference. I don't think we can emphasize this enough."

Some questions were raised about why there are not stricter laws penalizing the underage drinkers who use fake identification, while harsh penalties are placed on the establishments.

Wexler pointed to the unfortunate reality that "parents are sending children mixed messages," related to alcohol and have created a societal expectation that anyone who serves their son or daughter alcohol deserves the harshest penalties.

Orth said last year, 120 people attended an event sponsored by Soares' office and the SLA at the University at Albany, and they are planning to make the seminars ongoing.

New this year was the opportunity for one-on-one meetings between SLA examiners and bar owners, and the invitation to the event was extended to establishments from all over the Capital District, rather than just the county.

The SLA also sponsored an event in Buffalo on Wednesday, Jan. 14, and there are two other events scheduled, one for March 19 in Brooklyn, and the other for April 17 in Manhattan.

Bethlehem to upgrade meters at water plant

Devices slated to be drained of mercury instead of being replaced

The flow meters at the Bethlehem water plant slated to be replaced are now being "upgraded" and drained of mercury.

At the Wednesday, Feb. 11, meeting, the Bethlehem Town Board unanimously approved a contract to upgrade the outdated meters in accordance with state regulations imposed after two separate mercury spills that occurred in July 2006 and January 2008.

Supervisor Jack Cunningham said the actual meters would not be physically replaced with new and costly meters, but the mercury inside of the meters will be removed.

The cost will come to \$28,785.

"That's for the flow meter upgrade," Cunningham said. "They could save the meter and remove the mercury inside of the meter and use them as mechanical devices."

Replacing the meters was estimated to cost hundreds of thousands of dollars, according to the state Department of Environmental Conservation.

"It [the upgrade] is less expensive than we first anticipated, and some of the meters we are just going to remove because they aren't necessary," said Cunningham.

The issue came to light last year when DEC spokeswoman Maureen Wren announced three separate investigations into incidents at Bethlehem's New Salem Road water plant involving the release of mercury and petroleum, as well as other violations, due to flow meter leaks.

The town eventually settled with the state and signed a consent order in which the DEC fined Bethlehem \$15,000 for "mercury and petroleum reporting and handling violations" that occurred

over the past two years.

Cunningham said the town only consented to the fine at the time because it couldn't prove that less than a pound of mercury had been discharged in a single spill at its water plant.

By paying the \$15,000 and remaining compliant, the town does not have to pay an additional \$60,000 civil penalty to the DEC, according to the state's signed consent order, which said the fine could have totaled \$75,000.

The town agreed to replace all of its outdated mercury flow meters as part of the signed consent order.

Bethlehem's water supply has since been tested several times by the state and the town and found to be clear of contaminants from spills at the town water plant in New Scotland.

During the Feb. 11 meeting, the town board also agreed to sign a contract with Malcolm Pirnie, Inc. to complete a mercury investigation of the New Salem Water Treatment sump and lagoon, where the spills occurred.

The company is made up of independent environmental engineers, scientists and consultants.

Councilman Mark Hennessey called the investigation an "extraordinary precautionary measure" and stated the plant has been cleared by the DEC.

Rick Georgeson, a Region 4 spokesman for DEC, confirmed the town's compliance.

"The town is in compliance with the consent order," Georgeson said. "It had a year to replace the mercury meters, and the order was signed in June."

Cunningham stressed the cooperation between the DEC and Bethlehem throughout the investigation, stating the two were "working together" to ensure no mercury was in or near the water supply.

If the town were found to not be in compliance with the DEC consent order, it would have to pay an additional \$60,000 in fines to the state.

Labeled leftovers make for lovely lunches

During a recent fight with a roll of masking tape, the tape won. I'm pretty sure it was a brand new roll and possibly even a trick roll because I could not rip off a piece. I couldn't find the edge, even when searching with my usually dependable fingernails.

I considered my options: Throw the roll of tape across the room. Hack at the roll with a pair of scissors. Ask my husband for help. Forgo using the tape.

My husband was on his way out the door. He was driving our daughter to dance class. I did not want to delay their departure by asking Jeff to solve the riddle of the masking tape. Nor did I want to draw their attention by exhibiting any signs of violence (throwing, hacking, etc.) toward the roll.

As luck would have it, there was a nearly spent roll of masking tape in the very same cabinet where I found the trick roll. I lifted the old roll and carefully removed a small piece. I affixed the tape to a plastic lid and wrote "quinoa 2/10."

Quinoa is a whole-grain

food. It's pronounced keen-WAH. It's prepared the same way you make rice. It comes out fluffy and is high in protein. And when there's quinoa in my fridge, it's got to be labeled, just like any other leftover food.

It's simple. After we eat a meal, leftovers get stored in reusable containers. And those containers get labeled. The label starts with a piece of masking tape (you may have already guessed this from the quinoa example). We use a Sharpie marker to write on the tape.

My labels include the date and a description of the contents: "Chicken stir-fry 2/9." Jeff often writes only the date. This is a source of contention in our household.

I don't want to have to open the container to find out what's inside, especially if the date has long passed. When I'm looking for something to eat, it's faster when I can identify the food without having to remove and open containers.

Don't misunderstand. It's not that we're constantly cooking and trying to manage huge quantities of leftover food. It's that when we do cook, I don't want any food to be wasted. I don't like throwing out food, regardless of whether it's Chinese take-out or leftover pasta. And I especially don't like throwing out home-cooked food, because then I've wasted not only the food, but also my time, effort and money.

I'm dismayed when food gets "lost" in the refrigerator. I warn my husband that if he pushes the chili to the back of the fridge, we're going to forget it's there. "Everything cannot be in the front of the refrigerator," is his oft-repeated refrain.

Maybe it all can't be IN front, but it can be listed ON the front.

There have been stretches of time where I've kept a list of the leftovers on the refrigerator door. Only we forget to maintain the list. Food gets eaten, but not removed from the list. New food goes in the fridge, but doesn't get added to the list. Often no one remembers to look at the list. Or, we look at the list and say, "Let's order pizza."

The best way to avoid

wasting leftovers is to use them right away. At 7:30 in the morning, I don't feel like looking at chicken stir fry, let alone spooning some into a Rubbermaid container. So, I'll pack a container the night before, right after dinner. In the morning I can just grab my insulated cooler and head to work.

I used to marvel at people who brought lunch to work. I would look longingly at their homemade food as I consumed whatever I grabbed from the cafeteria. I was especially envious of colleagues who had multi-ingredient salads. Where did they find the time to slice cucumbers and tomatoes? Now I count myself among the group that regularly brings a homemade lunch. I'm somewhat perplexed that it took me 20-odd years to find the motivation, but I'm pleased at the results. My lunches end up more satisfying.

I find it harder to eat healthy when I buy lunch at a cafeteria. When the guy behind the counter says, "What can I get for you?" something in my circuitry goes awry. My brain is thinking, "I'll have a salad," but my mouth responds, "I'll have a large chili and a roll." And then the worker asks, "Would you like grated cheese on top?" And I answer, "That would be great."

Other times all I feel like eating is a tuna sandwich. And I feel silly when I pay five bucks for a tuna sandwich. When I order the chili, I can justify the purchase by saying that at least I'm buying a "hot meal."

Although I've been bringing lunch more often, I appreciate all the people who still prefer to buy their midday meals. They keep the cafeterias in business (much like I did


for decades), which in turn provides me with a backup for days when I don't bring food, or when I crave chili.

Which reminds me: We have a container of homemade chili in the freezer. I know this because the container is labeled "chili 12/27." It occurs to me that any leftovers stored in the freezer should be labeled with the year. Luckily I happen to know that this batch of chili is from 2008. I also know, even though it's not on the label, that it is a vegetarian chili.

Sometimes it's crucial to get specific on the label. For example, simply writing "enchiladas" is not enough in our house. A perfectly innocent leftover enchilada could be reheated and served, only to end up rejected by someone exclaiming, "Ewww gross, I'm not eating this. It's got onions." We avoid this trauma by isolating the batch that's onion-free and writing "enchiladas - no onions" on the label.

Thankfully, Jeff is largely on board with the labeling system, although he accuses me of using more masking tape than necessary. That's probably true. But in my defense, I'm not always sure what I'm going to write, and I don't want to run out of space. Perhaps he bought the trick roll just to force me to conserve tape.

"Did you put a new roll of masking tape in the cabinet?" I asked him a few days after my battle. He confirmed that he had indeed purchased the tape. "I couldn't rip off a piece," I said accusingly. He retrieved the roll, and had a section lifted in no time. And so, I can rest easy knowing our upcoming leftovers will be properly labeled.

Careys suing O.D. Heck

Advocate parents file on eve of second anniversary of son's death

Michael and Lisa Carey are suing a number of O.D. Heck officials and the man convicted of killing their 13-year-old autistic son, Jonathan, who died Feb. 15, 2007.

The Careys filed the lawsuit in federal court Thursday, Feb. 12, the eve of the second anniversary of Jonathan's death and have hired a civil rights firm to represent their case. Jonathan died while in the care of former O.D. Heck employee Edwin Tirado, who was later convicted in Albany County Court of manslaughter for improperly restraining the boy.

"John's civil rights were violated, and so were ours," Michael Carey said during a telephone interview. "There was a lot of negligence on numerous other people [besides Tirado] . . . that had knowledge of what we believe was a cover up of abuse."

Carey said he and his wife are suing Schenectady-based O.D. Heck, a state agency, for improperly training employees, allowing too much overtime for workers, improper discipline actions against employees, and poor screening and hiring practices.

When asked why he and his wife are suing now, nearly two years after their son's death, Carey said it took time to build his case.

"It was a lot of work getting all of this together and finding a good civil rights attorney," Carey said. "We are hoping this case will spur changes . . . because there's a lot of problems in the [state's] mental health facilities."

Carey said this case is on behalf of his son and the "thousands of others who are abused or neglected."

New York City law firm Emery Celli Brinkerhoff & Abady is representing the Careys. Attorney Ilaan Maazel has taken the case in the suit, which names Tirado, O.D. Heck Director David Slingerland, aide Nadeem Hall, and a dozen others.

Inviting media to his home on the anniversary of his son's death on Sunday, Carey reminisced about the boy.

"We remember today Jonathan's beautiful life, his amazing love for people, his incredible passion and love of horses and God," he said

in a released statement. "We remember Jonathan's wonderful smile that glowed and touched everyone and the incredible joy he brought to us. Jonathan is tremendously missed, and the lack of his presence has left a gaping hole in our lives."

Carey continued, saying much has been done, but more is needed.

"Because of many things that Jonathan suffered, many changes to help protect other people with disabilities have come to pass in the last two years. Jonathan's Law was signed into law within three months of Jonathan's death, allowing parents to access their own disabled children's records of incidents of harm and abuse investigation records previously denied them."

The suit alleges that O.D. Heck is responsible for Jonathan's death due to gross negligence.

"[The] defendants' repeated failure to take any action against Tirado was just part of a broad institutional failure at O.D. Heck that enabled and proximately caused Jonathan's death," according to language in the suit.

Bethlehem gives veterans a break

Town OKs property tax reduction for those who served during the Cold War

Bethlehem has joined Albany County and several surrounding municipalities in offering its veteran residents a little tax relief in recognition of their service.

In a unanimous vote, the town board voted the exemption into law at its Wednesday, Feb. 11, meeting.

Under the amendment, qualifying veterans will be exempt from 10 to 15 percent of property taxation for a period of 10 years, without exceeding \$12,000.

However, town officials said only one exemption can be used by local veterans. If an individual is already receiving a veteran exemption, they cannot receive a second.

A Cold War veteran is any person who served on active duty in the United States armed forces between Sept. 2, 1945, and Dec. 26, 1991, and was released or discharged under honorable conditions.

Those armed forces include the Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Air Force and Coast Guard,

and "active duty" refers to full-time duty, not active duty for training.

Also eligible for the exemptions are spouses of Cold War veterans and surviving unmarried spouses of deceased Cold War veterans.

The local law was adopted by Albany County last summer to recognize the veterans' sacrifices and services. Each municipality then has the option to implement the property tax exemption for Cold War veterans.

Since the law was passed by the county, neighboring Town of New Scotland has adopted the amendment.

Councilman Sam Messina, who could not attend the meeting, had a statement read by Town Clerk Kathy Newkirk during the public hearing. Messina, a Vietnam veteran, said he supported the measure and believes more incentives and initiatives should be available to veterans.

Councilman Kyle Kotary and Supervisor Jack Cunningham both spoke in favor of the Cold War Veteran tax exemption during the board meeting.

It's not just the thought that counts

This week, *The Spotlight* brings you news that the Bethlehem Central Teachers Association Union is in talks with school officials about the possibility of renegotiating its contract in the face of a global financial catastrophe that is threatening jobs in every market.

Good for them. Times of crisis — times of great financial constraint and potential job loss — are the very times when unions and administrators need to understand each other, and the simple fact that the BCTA is willing to revisit its contract shows that it understands dire times are ahead for our educational institutions and the children who attend them.

As Bethlehem Superintendent Michael Tebbano told *The Spotlight*, "There is no guarantee that this will go any where, but it's a start."

BCTA's contract with the district calls for an average of a 3.23 percent salary increase until 2010 with a "step increase" for each position, which translates into a more-than 5 percent salary increase.

Similar contracts exist in most of the school districts in *The Spotlight's* coverage areas. However, Tebbano believes Bethlehem is the only school district re-opening a union contract and certainly the only district in the Suburban Council to do so.

The teachers association's move is significant in one other aspect as well: It sets a precedent. It puts them out in front of a whirlwind of bad public relations that is sure to come about if they receive 5 percent raises while the taxpayers funding said raises are being laid off by the score.

It also puts them out in front of the employees union, which includes maintenance workers and other essential staff other than teachers, and the principals association, which has considerably fewer — but considerably higher-paid — members. If the teachers association comes out of these negotiations with a decreased pay increase or any concession whatsoever, the other unions would have to emulate that or face the aforementioned whirlwind all over again.

But what is a gesture worth in these trying financial times?

We at *The Spotlight* hope the negotiations are more than political show. We hope an understanding is met in these talks that benefits the schools and, more importantly, the children in them. What's more, we hope that the other unions follow suit, and in other school districts, as well.

What's outside your window?

The air is cold, the days are short and as the waning days of winter blanket the earth with a grayish white, the landscape has little color, or does it?

Gazing out the window, what do you see? If the answer is just "white," then perhaps it is time to consider winter interest when next choosing plant material for your yard. The possibilities are many.

For a tree with textural interest, consider the exfoliating bark of the acer griseum, the paperbark maple. Looking for architectural interest? *Cornus alternifolia*, the pagoda dogwood, is an underused plant whose sharp horizontal

branches are a camera buff's delight when laden with snow. Japanese Stewartia, *Stewartia pseudocamellia*, is a terrific choice for an eastern exposure; it is a tree for all seasons, but winter really reveals its excellent bones. The exfoliating bark highlights the pyramidal form with patches of brown, gray and rust. The beloved poster child of spring, the crabapple, has many cultivars such as Professor Sprenger and Prairefire that bear abundant crops of tiny red fruit that persist well into winter. Two classics that round out winter melting into early spring are *Cornus mas*, the Cornelian Cherry,

and witch hazel, *Hamamelis*. Both small trees bloom very early, often with snow still on the ground, and they are true harbingers of spring.

If a shrub is what is needed, the corklike bark of *Euonymus alatus*, the winged euonymus, is a wonderful candidate given its blaze of fall glory; it is aptly nicknamed the "burning bush." If clusters of red berries delight your eye, consider the deciduous holly, *Ilex verticillata*, Winterberry. When planted en masse in the shrub border, this handsome holly has clusters of bright red berries ripening in September and lasting into January. A choice for limited

space might be cotoneaster, in particular cotoneaster adpressus, creeping cotoneaster. Most cultivars stay dwarf and have a spreading habit; they remain tight to the ground with ample fruit set that persists into the winter longer than most cotoneasters. The red osier dogwood, *Cornus sericea*, has stems that develop a deep maroon color as the temperatures drop, producing a stark contrast in the winter landscape.

And then there are the birds to consider during the winter months. Many of the shrub Viburnums have lovely flowers that become a cluster of berries in late summer, ripening in the fall as taste treats for the songbirds. American highbush

cranberry, *Viburnum trilobum*, and *Viburnum dentatum*, Arrowwood, are two good choices. The flowering dogwoods, both *Cornus florida* and *kousa*, provide berries for migrating birds, but don't overlook the humble gray dogwood, *Cornus racemosa*, whose white berries are relished by the birds, and whose thick growth habit provides protective cover and nesting sites. American Beautyberry, *Callicarpa americana*, is another mid-size shrub that has purple berries in the fall that lure the purple finch and mockingbirds.

Ornamental grasses left to sway in the winter winds soften the landscape with their beige and brown hues that catch the winter light just so. There are many possibilities to add interest to the landscape during the long winter days. Consider some of the above ideas when shopping for landscaping materials in the spring.

The joys of a winter garden provide endless photographic opportunities certainly, but for most of us, it is just the pleasure of looking outside the window.



Alteri's gutted by electrical fire

Owner says he hopes to rebuild

From the ashes of a cold February tragedy, the owner of Alteri's in Glenmont hopes to rebuild.

A fire broke out early Valentine's Day at Alteri's Italian American Restaurant on Route 9W, gutting the building's interior.

Investigators said the fire, which was reported at 1:40 a.m. Saturday, Feb. 14, was caused by electrical issues and was accidental. Although fire officials deemed the structure safe, the building and its contents appear to be a total loss.

"From what I can see, everything is burned," said owner Harvey Quinn.

Route 9W was shut down for nearly six hours, while National Grid employees shut down power to the street. Bethlehem police reported no injuries from the blaze.

"I got a call from the alarm company around quarter to 2, and they told me there was a fire," Quinn said. "I was down there by quarter after 2 and there was a lot of smoke, smoke just pouring out from the back ... and then you could see the flames coming out from the roof and windows."

Fire departments from Selkirk, Elsmere and Delmar responded to extinguish the fire. Members from Bethlehem Volunteer Ambulance, Delmar Rescue Squad and Albany County

Paramedics also responded.

Bethlehem police issued the following statement:

"Through their [fire officials] investigation and based upon the physical evidence present, the cause of the fire is officially labeled as accidental/electrical. The area of origin has been determined to be the rear of the building."

"It's a pretty scary situation," Quinn said, "but I hope to rebuild, and in the best situation, be back in six months. Bethlehem is a great area, and the people are fantastic down here."

Quinn has been a vocal small business owner in Bethlehem and was at the center of a zoning dispute last June that involved a lunchtime banner displayed at the restaurant that town officials said violated town code. Quinn was cited for the banner and could have faced jail time under the former zoning regulations.

Because of the case, the Town Board voted unanimously in early June to amend the fees portion of Section 128 of the Bethlehem zoning code and reduce its maximum penalty from six months in jail to 15 days in jail and/or a \$350 fine per violation.

The reason the town decided to change the code, according to Town Attorney James Potter, is because Quinn's trial brought the stiff penalty to light.

Quinn said he wants to stay and continue the 40-year community business that he bought in 2001.

"We'll be back and have a nice restaurant for people to go to," he said. "We love the people here and hope to be back as soon as possible."

Districts await stimulus details

Superintendents in V'ville and G'land take wait-and-see approach to federal aid impact

Area school districts are waiting on the federal government to provide them with details about stimulus money designated to help keep vital programs afloat.

On Friday, Feb. 13, Congress passed a \$787 billion plan, which is slated to filter through to state school districts and help maintain services and possibly keep teachers employed.

Both the Guilderland and Voorheesville school districts are waiting on more information about the parameters for spending the federal money, and a Voorheesville representative said that information could factor in the district's decision about whether there will be layoffs next year.

Raymond Colucciello, interim Superintendent for the Voorheesville Central School District, said until more solid information can be provided by the federal government, the district is playing the waiting game.

Colucciello said the district is expecting some stimulus money, however, it is still unclear the guidelines for spending the money.

Some of the funding included is \$44,000 for building aid and \$133,000 for the special education department, but those categories, Colucciello said, are vague.

"We don't know what 'building aid' means," he said.

Colucciello said it could refer to windows, roofing, walls or a

number of other factors.

"At this point, we're still collecting information. The ink is still drying on President Obama's signature," he said. "The devil is in the details."

He said in the past the federal government has been specific about what expenses districts can put the federal funds toward.

Colucciello said the district cannot make any guarantees about who, if anyone, will be laid off, until more information is known.

He said there is a public forum scheduled for Monday, March 2, to discuss the specifics once they are made available. He said the district is welcoming online feedback as well.

Guilderland Superintendent John McGuire said his district is not making any decisions about how to proceed with federal funding until more information is gathered as well.

"We've been very cautious about making any assumptions here," McGuire said.

McGuire also said the district is still considering other cost-saving options and is considering a study to determine if there is any need for administrative restructuring.

A preliminary study by the Capital District School Development Association recommended the district take a closer look at the issue.

McGuire said the district has "rational" administrative and supervisory structure.

"We're certainly not administratively top heavy," he said.

He added the district will study the efficiency of the special education department as well.








Library showcases Lincoln

Many of us learned about President Abraham Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation in grade school: how it was the document that freed the slaves, how Lincoln waited for just the right moment during the Civil War to enact the proclamation, and how it changed history and the course of the war.

What many of us do not know is that Lincoln's original, handwritten draft — the Preliminary Emancipation Proclamation, which he issued on Sept. 22, 1862 — has been part of the New York State Library's collection since 1865.

How this vital and history-changing document came to be part of the museum's permanent collection is a fascinating story, one that you can learn by visiting the Guilderland Public Library during February, the bicentennial celebration month of Lincoln's



birth. What's more, you can also see a true-to-life replica of Lincoln's four-page draft — with handwritten annotations by his Secretary of State, William Seward — and actual autographs as well as pictures of many of Lincoln's Cabinet members. These latter items are from the collection of Lewis Warner, who is not only a member of the Capital District Civil War Round Table but also on the library staff.

This museum-quality exhibit will be on display only through the end of February, so you're encouraged to visit it soon. It is accompanied by the Lincoln/Hamlin 1860 campaign banner

from the "Wide Awakes," courtesy of the Guilderland Historical Society.



Paterson is proposing a series of taxes that include an 18 percent tax on non-diet sodas and soft drinks nicknamed "the obesity tax;" a tax on cable and satellite TV and radio services; a tax on personal services, such as salon services, massages and credit rating services; an increased tax on wine; as well as an increased tax on luxury goods.

If you are the type of person who drinks diet soda, never buys luxury items and hasn't gotten a haircut in years, the governor's tax proposals would probably not affect you. Unless, of course, you are a sucker for your Wii.

Should the governor's budget pass as proposed, both state and local sales taxes would be imposed on purchases of prewritten software, digital audio, audio-visual and text files, digital photographs, games and other electronically delivered entertainment services.

In other words, taxes would be applied to all songs downloaded on iTunes, game demos and add-ons for the PlayStation systems, and possibly even the ring tones and wallpaper photos that are currently downloadable for a few dollars.

In Paterson's description of the tax, he said, "With the passage of this bill, a book, song, album or movie would be subject to sales tax no matter if it was bought at a brick-and-mortar store or downloaded online."

The governor's office was unavailable for comment, however, many members of the gaming community, ranging in age and gaming interest, were vocal about their opposition to the governor's proposal.

"If [the tax was on] just things like add-ons, I would probably pay it," said 14-year-old Joey Cunneen, of Delmar, who was browsing the videogame section at BestBuy in Crossgates Mall. "But I still wouldn't understand why [the tax] is being employed in the first place."

Cunneen's preferred game system is the Xbox 360, and he said he typically downloads a game or add-on to his system about once a month, at a cost of \$5 to \$15.

Although the governor has not specified how much the tax would be, "I would pay \$1 or \$2 more," for downloads, Cunneen said.

His friend David Knauer,

15, of Glenmont, said even that amount is unjustifiable.

"I think even \$1 would be kind of a lot," he said.

Cunneen and Knauer consider themselves gamers. Knauer is most interested in RPGs, or role-playing games.

Both said they have been playing video games for years, but how will the governor's proposed tax affect someone new to the gaming world?

Thirty-year-old Maurice Christopher said he does not really consider himself a gamer but he does have a PlayStation 3 at home that he and his wife use. About once every three months Christopher said he downloads content on his PS3.

"[The tax] would probably decrease the amount I download," said Christopher. "Especially if it costs more for it."

Others had an even more passionate response to the proposal.

"I wouldn't buy anything online anymore," said Clement Fabre, 19, of Schenectady. Fabre also uses a PS3 and said he downloads content monthly.

"Why did he do this?" Fabre asked of the governor's proposal, adding that the cost of the tax would not determine his purchasing, but the fact that there is a tax on the content would be enough to deter him.

Fabre's friend, Pierre Cafin, 20, also of Schenectady, chimed in outside of EB Games, a videogame store at Crossgates Mall, stating that, "It's a shame that he wants to do this."

Although the tax could affect a number of gamers, it will not affect all of them because many do not rely on downloadable content to use on their gaming systems.

Zack Schongar, 12, of Troy, said he never has and probably never will download content to his PlayStation. Schongar said he likes to play sports. His father said that Schongar's sisters download a lot of content and that "they wouldn't do it as much if it cost more."

The tax on downloadable content also has the potential to affect the retailers that carry the games.

The tax could affect retailers negatively if gamers begin to lose interest in specific games that rely heavily on downloadable elements. On the other hand, the tax could promote economic stimulus in the gaming world by encouraging gamers to simply go to the stores and buy what they would otherwise download since they would be paying the same price anyway.

Town Supervisor Ken Runion said he has not decided yet if he will run for re-election and said he is concentrating on budget items and town business at the moment.

The supervisor did say he has received harassing phone calls, where the callers have made claims that if he runs again he will lose the seat by a landslide. He said he does not intend to let that affect his decision, and he won't be intimidated.

"I'm going to make my decisions based on what I can do for the town," Runion said.

He said he expects to make a final decision regarding his candidacy some time in April or May.

Runion and Grimm have been on opposite sides of a number of issues in the past year.

Grimm has accused the Democratic majority of fostering secrecy in town government. Runion said the Republican minority is only interested in attacking people

and has not provided useful suggestions to help the town run more smoothly.

Grimm, elected as one of two Republican minority members on the five-member Town Board in November 2007, said he and the rest of the Republican Party are urging anyone interested in a position to contact Chairman Ted Danz.

Danz said, so far, everything the party has done has been through word of mouth. He said with the issuing of the release calling for candidates, he is hoping to create a transparent government.

"We're committed to open and honest government, and make sure everyone has the opportunity to participate," said Danz.

He said the Republican Committee is planning to have a full slate of candidates by March.

Open offices include town supervisor, town board member, clerk, receiver of taxes and town justice.

Attempts to contact Democratic Committee Chairman David Bosworth were unsuccessful as of press time.

to the law.

CZAC was charged with making recommendations regarding the town's zoning laws, and its remaining members, Kormos and Mike Naughton, support a cap of 50,000 square feet for buildings and 100,000 square feet for retail complexes. Both are NS4SED members.

Robinson said the law calls for changes that reach beyond the size cap.

"It's just broader than it was intended to be," Robinson said. "It discourages even the smallest of retail business in our town."

Robinson said the law includes provisions that would require a special permit for all businesses in the commercial district, and would add multiple levels of red tape. It would make expanding more difficult for owners, and slow the process down for even "mom and pop" stores by months.

She said a "hasty" attempt by NS4SED to put a size cap in place and the group's role in helping to draft the law has been detrimental.

"This causes problems above and beyond the emotional size cap," Robinson said.

NS4SED founder Daniel Mackay said the draft of Local Law I was first presented by CZAC and NS4SED members Naughton and Kormos in their report to the Town Board.

He said that report included a great deal of time and research and acknowledged that individuals commenting on the green space and industrial provisions are entitled to their input.

He added, though, that the law was not rushed, but is needed to fill a void in the town's zoning code.

Kormos said, the draft was worked on over weeks, and research included studying similar documents from other municipalities.

The town also held off filing an Environmental Assessment Form, required for the Department of Environmental Conservation and Albany County Planning Board, in case there are changes to the law, Dolin said.

district doesn't appear to be looking for salary increases or raises, but would likely be looking for reductions.

"If we didn't do any reductions, the tax levy would be too high for this community to support," said Tebbano at the budget meeting. "We're not alone in this situation."

He also took a moment to commend the teachers for coming back to the table.

"This is monumental for our school district for the teachers to be willing to do this," Tebbano said. "They realize the bigger picture, and I applaud them for that."

However, Tebbano warned, just because discussions with the teacher's union have opened up, it does not mean any contractual changes with the teachers will occur.

"There is no guarantee that this will go anywhere," he said, "but it's a start."

The current BCTA contract with the district calls for an average of a 3.23 percent salary increase until 2010 with a "step increase" for each position, which translates into a more than 5 percent salary increase.

Tebbano hasn't publicly announced any reduction in teaching staff but has repeatedly warned, referring to the upcoming school budget, that the district is going to be facing many "difficult decisions." The superintendent also said Bethlehem is looking for any cost-saving measures it can find, including not replacing certain staffers, such as the soon-to-retire Elsmere Elementary librarian.

The president of BCTA, David Rounds, said the school approached the teachers about opening up the contracts.

"The board of education approached the union and the union agreed to discuss possible changes to the current contract," said Rounds. "The BCTA

teachers association agreed to discuss possible changes to the final year of our current contract to try to see if there were ways to save the district money next year, while at the same time maintaining the integrity of the teachers contract."

According to the BCTA Constitution, Rounds said two-thirds of the membership would have to approve the changes before they could go into effect and change an existing contract.

With 465 employees covered by the teacher's contract, the district's budget increases each year by hundreds of thousands of dollars just to cover the pay raises. There are two other union contracts with the district: the Bethlehem Central United Employees (BCUE) Association and Bethlehem Principals Association (BPA).

The BCUE covers 509 employees, such as maintenance workers and other essential staff and the BPA covers the district's 16 principals and administrators who typically collect the highest salaries.

One resident at the Monday, Feb. 9, public budget hearing asked if the administrators union is also in talks about renegotiating its contract.

Tebbano said he wouldn't speculate on if the BPA would begin talks, saying, "The district can only negotiate with one union at a time."

He added that the district would have to "wait and see" how the discussions went before it could move on to another contract.

Tebbano added that Bethlehem, as far as he knew, was the only school district re-opening a union contract and certainly the only district in the Suburban Council to do so.

Still, the district must not only cut back on spending, it needs to look for new revenue sources, according to the school's chief financial officer, Judi Kehoe. She told residents the current projects show a total increase of \$5.2 million in expenditures if spending continued at its cur-

rent level.

"That's if we change nothing of how we spend currently. ... We need to get the current year balanced and take a conservative view and really take a long-term look," Kehoe said. "We're looking at other revenue sources ... but we also have to do some work on expenditures."

Kehoe said taxes would not be enough to fill the budget gap.

If the district didn't look for new revenue and cut spending, Tebbano said the community would be looking at what he deemed "the scary numbers."

"You'd be looking at a 10 percent tax levy increase," he said, "and this is not reality, so that is not a solution."

Board of Education President James Lytle said some new revenue suggestions have included creating an alumni endowment fund where former students could donate money to keep certain programs afloat and even renting space for a cell phone tower on school property.

"Ultimately there are no bad ideas," he said, "but we're going to have to make some very tough decisions."

Tebbano said the school must do what it can in the face of potentially millions of dollars of lost state aid, and there's no guarantee what the federal or state government will be able to do for the school. The superintendent said he has heard from local legislators that government funding for education is going to target more inner city districts, with less for the more "affluent districts."

"There's such an injustice here on what people think school districts can afford," Tebbano said. "I have to jump through a lot of hoops with the state to get our hands on the money."

Tebbano will present his reduction budget plan at the next school board meeting on Wednesday, Feb. 25, which starts at 7 p.m. at the school's district offices, 90 Adams Place, Delmar.

one year so that the town could properly plan for its future. And at the very beginning of this process, even the Albany County Planning Board recommended a one-year moratorium," Prentiss said. "Planning for sound economic development is too important a governmental issue to be resolved by crisis management. It's complex, very detailed and, obviously, there are differing philosophical viewpoints."

Colleen Stanton, a local farm owner, spoke against another extension. She said as a capitalist, the moratorium fundamentally infringes upon property rights and prevents business in the town.

Others at the meeting echoed her sentiment, and said they are in favor of moving forward with development.

The town is also considering adopting Local Law I of 2008, which would permanently cap new retail buildings at 50,000 square feet.

The issue was first raised during discussions to adopt a zoning law that would reflect that cap, however no decision was made at that time on what an appropriate cap would be.

Supervisor Tom Dolin said that law has been drafted, and a public hearing has been officially scheduled for April 22. However, that could change if the language and details of the law are altered.

"There's probably going to be some changes to the law," Dolin said. "There is some minor discussion about how the narrative reads."

He said the Planning Board is meeting on Tuesday, March 3, and will have the opportunity to make recommendations to change the law.

Roz Robinson, former chairwoman of the Commercial Zone Advisory Committee who resigned amid conflict-of-interest allegations against fellow committee member Liz Kormos, said she is in favor of changes



Finance *in the* Spotlight

'Economic Winter' should lead to subtle signs of spring by midyear

Realistically, the first half of 2009 will be tough for the U.S. economy. If this does not qualify as the "perfect storm" for the economy, we certainly do not want to see what would! Problems in the credit market caused large portions of the domestic economy to struggle throughout 2008. Exports were the only thing that kept the U.S. economy afloat. As financial titans such as Lehman Brothers collapsed, the global economy descended into recession, and the U.S. economy declined. While many people have offered their view as to "the cause" of this economic disaster,

this economic contraction is really far too broad and severe to be neatly pinned on one factor. Rather, we think this is the end of an economic era. While that has serious and sobering implications, this has occurred before, and we survived.

Many think recessions wind down excesses that build during economic expansions. Buyers run accumulated debt too high, inventories become too high until everyone is forced to adjust back to sustainable levels. As buyers cut back to work down debt, sales drop for businesses. Businesses then cut purchases to reduce inventories. As cutbacks cascade through the system, the economy goes into recession.

Most of us are aware of the economic cycle of expansion and recession that historically oc-

curred about every four years. We are less aware of the longer-term cycles that seem to occur — with a cycle length of roughly 35 years. When shorter-cycle contractions occur as we wind down excesses of the longer-term cycle, the shorter-term contractions tend to be much harsher than they are at other phases of the longer-term cycle. That seems to be what we are currently experiencing. Historically, both the 1930s and the 1970s seemed to involve coordinated short-term and long-term contractions. While each of those periods offered significant economic and social challenges, we survived.

Typically, too, these difficult economic contractions probably pave the way for the next expansion.

Given the coordinated short and long-cycle contractions that we seem to be experiencing, we would expect the coming months to be as difficult as any we have experienced in many, many years. The unemployment rate will proba-

bly climb considerably higher. Bankruptcies will likely rise, and business firms we all know may fail. The former administration and the Federal Reserve took strong action to bring the economy around, and the new administration will do even more. We need to keep in mind, however, that it takes time to turn an economy around. It often takes a year for stimulative actions to have an impact on the economy. The medicine is being administered. We now need to see how the "patient" responds.

The signs of improvement will be subtle at first, but they should begin to appear about the middle of this year. First, we think the rate at which business sales decline or housing prices fall will begin to fall at a slower rate. Credit will become more available, and consumers and businesses will begin to spend a little more freely as they regain confidence about the future. Just as spring follows winter, recovery follows economic contraction. This will be a harsh "economic winter," but we need to keep in mind that spring will come.

So how do we get through the harsh "winter?" It may be several years before we start into the best part of the next long-term expansion, so while we need not panic, we need to recognize that the financial risks have risen. First, it appears that the price of taking on too much debt has risen. Prudent use of debt still makes sense, but debt needs to be restricted to levels that can comfortably be repaid from future resources. We need to learn to live within our means. Second, it seems likely that the United States will face increasing competition from overseas competitors in the coming years. If we want our living standards to improve, we need to invest in the education and industries that will make us more competitive in the global marketplace. A global future also means that international investments need to play a larger role in our own investment portfolios. Cold, harsh winters can be unpleasant, but the winter will eventually give way to spring. As we prepare for the spring, however, we need to keep in mind it will be a new cycle. Some of what we knew in



Held at the state museum in conjunction with the annual gem, mineral and fossil show, New York in Bloom features floral arrangements that are paired with and inspired by exhibits at the museum.

"That just leads to some amazing creativity," said Joanne Guilmette, a state museum spokeswoman. "It's always so fun to see what they come up with."

One floral designer, for example, was assigned to an area in Adirondack Hall that had a lounge chair that was used outdoors in the winter by tuberculosis patients at a sanitarium in the Adirondacks. Back then, fresh air was considered to be a treatment for the disease. So, the designer crafted a floral "quilt" using leaves, flowers and other materials.

Another display in Adirondack Hall featured a table crafted from tree bark, complete with cups and utensils.

"It was really amazing," Guilmette said.

All told, New York in Bloom, which runs Friday through Sunday, Feb. 20 to 22, will feature more than 110 floral displays put together by professional designers, garden club members and floral enthusiasts from across the state. That's just a fraction of the offerings of the museum at the weekend.

Also on tap:

More than 20 vendors at the gem, fossil and mineral show will sell and display gems, jewelry, minerals, fossils, books, videos, stone carvings and bookends.

The Capital District Mineral Club will host a mineral dig for children.

Charles Merguerian, professor of geology at Hofstra University,

will give a talk titled, "Ancient Till Discovered at the World Trade Center Site."

John Skiba, the museum's senior cartographer, will talk about map-making processes and methods for producing the museum's new geologic quadrangle map.

Michael Hawkins, the museum's mineralogy collections manager, will lead tours Saturday and Sunday of the Minerals of New York gallery, highlighting recent acquisitions. Guilmette explained that admission to the show helps buy new items for the collection, and Hawkins' tour includes pieces that were purchased with proceeds from last year's show.

Demonstrations will touch on topics such as how to grow healthy perennials; how to create edible arrangements and how to maintain an organic vegetable garden.

Artists will be on hand to offer face painting for kids, and New York in Bloom will offer "shrink art" and "flower button" activities.

"It's really great for the whole family, no matter what you're looking for," Guilmette said. "There's just a lot to do."

New York in Bloom runs Friday to Sunday from 9:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. each day at the state museum. The admission fee is \$5 for adults on Friday. On Saturday and Sunday, the fee is \$6, which also includes admission to the 16th annual James Campbell Memorial Gem, Mineral and Fossil Show and Sale. Admission is free for children 12 and under, accompanied by an adult. Tickets may be purchased at the door.

The events mark the only time the museum charges admission. In addition to funding new mineral acquisitions, the proceeds help pay for the museum's after-school programs.

Kevin Kost contributed 11 points for the Dutchmen, who wrapped up their regular season Tuesday against Shenendehowa.




