Attorney general wants citizens to weigh in on cutting red tape and sharing services

Cutting the cost of government may just mean cutting some government all together.

Attorney General Andrew Cuomo isn't only advocating for the consolidation of villages and hamlets and for more shared municipal services — he is waging a full-blown crusade against what he sees as inefficiencies within

the state.

The state's top lawyer unveiled a proposal in December that would empower local communities across the state to reorganize

Planning Board chairman: CZAC exceeded scope by drafting zoning law

The New Scotland Planning Board chairman said at a recent workshop he is in favor of tossing out a provision on a proposed zoning law that would cap retail development at 50,000 square

Planning Board Chairman Robert Staph said the board is considering proposing a new draft of what is known as Local Law I.

He said at the Thursday, Feb. 19, Planning Board workshop that "community sized" developments should be permitted, and those could be as large as 300,000 square feet of building area.

Selkirk Bypass discussed

Planning board hears Thruway interchange proposal for town's industrial zone

Bethlehem isn't bypassing any options in its quest to connect the Selkirk industrial district to the state's Thruway, CSX

rail yard and the Port of Albany in what would be the ultimate trifecta in economic development.

The connectivity of being able to ship by road, rail and water would be a financial boom to the town, as Bethlehem would instantly be placed on the radar of any number of businesses around the Northeast.

However, residents already living in the area are concerned about how all of this could affect quality of life.

No final decision has been made regarding the language of the new draft.

Staph said the version of the law included in the Commercial Zone Advisory Committee's report exceeded its scope. He also criticized it for not addressing how to handle "personal services" business, such as accountants and consultants working from their homes. The draft included in CZAC's report suggested a 50,000-square-foot cap on retail developments.

"I think it's irresponsible for them to submit it the way it is," Staph said. "I am in favor of allowing people to have the right to develop the land in a reasonable way."

Staph said he believes "community-sized" developments are consistent with the town's comprehensive plan.

G'land residents assaulted Bethlehem Police nab 2,500 bags of heroin in traffic stop

Guilderland police are investigating a home invasion that occurred at 10 Van Wormer Drive in Guilderland Center on Wednesday, Feb. 18, at 3:18 p.m.

According to police, two men entered the residence and struck the male resident in the head, causing lacerations. According to the investigation, the victim fought back causing the intruders to flee, but an unknown amount of cash was taken during the altercation. The assailants fled by vehicle in an unknown direction, according to the report.

Capt. Cutis Cox said police now believe the vehicle in question to be a silver Grand Cherokee.

The victim was taken to St. Peters Hospital and treated for the wounds before being released. A female resident who was present during the assault was not injured.

In one of the largest drug busts in Bethlehem's history, police found 2,500 bags of heroin in the back of a Delmar man's car after he was stopped on Delaware Avenue.

Bethlehem Police arrested Eric J. Burkart of Pine Street in Delmar and seized approximately 2,500 individually wrapped bags of heroin. He was charged with first-degree criminal possession of a controlled substance and third-degree criminal possession of a controlled substance with intent to sell — both felonies.

The heroin was packaged for sale and had a total weight of 26 ounces, according to Lieutenant Thomas Heffernan, and has an estimated street value of \$50,000.

The arrest happened at 11 p.m. on Tuesday, Feb. 17, after a Bethlehem detective saw Burkart, 48, driving a 2002 GMC Sport Utility Vehicle on Delaware Avenue with an expired inspection sticker. After further investigation, police discovered he was wanted on an active arrest warrant out of Bethlehem Town Court for endangering the welfare of a child.

The endangering the welfare charge stemmed from an earlier

incident when it was discovered that Burkart was using heroin at his home while a 12-year-old child was under his care.

"One of

detectives was working and checking out area ATMs because of the recent robberies and saw him," Heffernan said. "This is one of the biggest drug arrest in recent memory."

After stopping and questioning Burkart, police found shoeboxes filled with the heroin inside of a "Thank you" bag on the floor of his back seat.

"We don't believe that he was bringing that quantity into town for his own personal use, but we believe there is a dealer he was working for," Heffernan said. "This is something that's not just an impact for the Town of Bethlehem but for the entire Capital District."

As the investigation continues, Bethlehem Police will be working with the DEA, State Police and the Albany Police on the case to investigate where the drugs came from and where they were going.

Burkart was arraigned in

Bethlehem Town Court after his arrest and sent to the Albany County Correctional Facility without bail. He is scheduled to appear in Bethlehem Town Court on Tuesday, March 17, at 4 p.m.

Even though Burkart lives near a Bethlehem school, Heffernan said there doesn't appear to be a rise in heroin use or addiction in the district's high school. However, he said there does appear to be a spike in heroin use around town and other local municipalities around the Capital District.

"The trend were still seeing in the high school is an increase in marijuana," Heffernan said. "Townwide, we've seen an increase in heroin over the past couple of years."

Bethlehem Police said the investigation is ongoing and is asking anyone with additional information to contact the department's detective office at 439-9973.

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

Keystone updates Verstandig's site plan

Condo plans moving forward

Local developers Keystone Builders said they are ready to start developing the Verstandig's site in Delmar as soon as their plans get approval from the town.

Planning Board members heard an update from Stephen Bolduc on Keystone Builders proposal to build 40 "high-end condos" on the Verstandig's Florist lot off of Delaware Avenue. Bolduc originally brought his plans to the planning board in early February last year, and a public hearing was held last March.

The units will sell between the \$375,000 and \$450,000 range, according to Bolduc, who said the plans have been three years in the making, but "in some ways, the delays have given me time to look at it [plans] and enhance it."

"We're ready to go," he said of the proposed fourphase build out.

Bolduc wants to transform the 5-acre lot at 445 Delaware Ave. into nine, two-story buildings with 40 condominiums. A little more than 2 of the 5 acres would remain green space. There are greenhouses, a florist

on the lot, which are slated for demolition in Bolduc's plans.

Owner Robert Verstandig plans to expand his Selkirk operation on Creble Road and is waiting until Keystone Builders gets final approval before he officially sells the property to Bolduc.

Saratoga Associates architectural and engineering firm is working with Bolduc · on the plans.

There will be 64 parking spaces, up from the required 60 spaces, and a circular access road to Delaware Avenue that will allow for two-way traffic. A stormwater basin is to be built underground in order to collect runoff and storm water.

The biggest concern of local residents is excessive runoff water, stormwater management and traffic. The stormwater management plan is currently being revised and should be available in the next couple of weeks.

"We are definitely aware of these concerns," Bolduc said.

Planning Board member John Smolinsky said he tinalized vanted to see the storm water plans.

shop and a home currently sites and bringing it to Verstandig's lot because one side of the property needs to be built up significantly, Bolduc said. His company has a grading permit from the town, which was granted because the requirement for erosion sediment control was met.

> Director of Economic Development and Planning Michael Morelli said Bolduc was in compliance with town code.

> "There is no excavating going on," Morelli said. "The thought was, 'Why truck it through town twice?'

> Smolinsky responded by saying, "I guess I read the zoning code differently than you," to which Morelli answered, "I guess you do."

> The hours of construction were also brought up during the discussion.

"In order to do this we have to have work hours to complete this project. ... We want it done as soon as possible," Bolduc said he proposed a 7 a.m. to 6 p.m. work schedule from Monday through Saturday. No work will be done on Sundays, and Saturday hours may be cut down some.

Dutchman Acres plan to be reviewed

Town Board members share reservations about stormwater management

Representatives from Dutchman Acres were denied a zoning change due to stormwater concerns voiced by the Town Board at the Tuesday, Feb. 17, meeting.

Christopher and Gregg Meyer, of OJ. Meyer and Son Land Surveyors presented to the board their plans to develop a plot of land across the street from Guilderland High School located near School and Depot roads.

The plans to rezone the 40-acre plot of land were put on hold when the Town Board decided to let the town planner study a revised development plan and comment on the location of the stormwater retention basin.

The Meyers came before the board hoping to change the zone from Residential-Agricultural Three, or RA-3, to a Country Hamlet. A rezoning is needed for the development to move forward.

The development is slated to have 25 single-family units, 4 twin units and 12 senior apartments, Chris Meyer said, and the residential units would range between 2,000 and 2,600 square feet. The plot features 7 to 8 acres of unusable wetlands that will not be developed.

Chris Meyer said he was hopeful for a positive outcome, and a successful rezone of the land, but he understands the Town Board has the best interests of the town in mind.

"Tm looking for ward to working with the board," he said.

The developer presented plans to have the Home Owners Association maintain the stormwater basin, however town Supervisor Ken Runion said he has reservations about giving the association the large responsibility and has seen cases in the past where the HOA could not handle similar task. If such a case were to occur, the town would then have to step in.

"I don't think we would be doing our jobs here if we allow that to be maintained by the Home Owners Association," Runion said.

Town Board Member Patricia Slavick said she supported sending the matter back to the planning board to review the updated plan.

Runion said he is especially

than if no development was there. and he is working on having that validated by the state Department of Environmental Conservation.

Chris Meyer also said he is working with Highway Superintendent Todd Gifford to possibly create a storm-water district that would be assessed, yield a minimal fee and be maintained by the town.

He also discussed the nature of some changes in the style of the units. He said the project began two and half years ago, and in April of 2008, Town Planner Jan Weston recommended the project be redesigned to closer represent a ... "hamlet" style.

Hamlet developments typically include narrow roads, less pavement, homes set closer to the street and front porches. They also generally hide the garage structures from the front of the units. The style is supposed to reflect architecture of the early 20th century.

In 2005, the town of Guilderland passed a law that created a "country hamlet" zoning designation. This is the first development that is proposing changing any zone to; that designation.


Since then we have completely redesigned all the buildings to have a hamlet look," Chris Meyer said. His brother echoed the idea.

"We've designed it so that the garages will be offset from the front of the houses, so it has that country hamlet feel," Greg Meyer said.

Meyer said Creighton Manning, an engineering firm, conducted a traffic study and they recommended access from School Road be limited to emergency vehicles only, with the main access coming from Depot Road.

He said the Albany County **Department of Public Works** is investigating the potential of a roundabout at the corner of School Road and Depot Road, and would have information in seven months, although that would not directly affect the development. Albany County is in the process of hiring a traffic consultant to study the area.

Delaware Engineering has been hired by the Town of Guilderland to review the project. They recommended there be some work on the storm-water basin, but overall they were satisfied with the project.



"There's an issue in the neighborhood on how this project will affect it," he said, "it is important whether it is a positive or negative affect."

Smolinsky also raised concerns about Keystone already bringing fill into the site before receiving planning approval.

"It's all on the up and up here. The town's fully aware,' Bolduc told Smolinsky. "We're not excavating, we're just dumping fill there."

Keystone is currently taking fill from other job

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would take two or three years to complete.

"It's going to be inconvenient. ... I'm sorry but there's going to be some inconvenience involved," he concluded.

Smolinsky said he likes the project overall, but proper discussion was needed to ensure all the angles of the project and potential impacts were thoroughly researched. "This is a very good project," he said. "It is important to have a very good project in very good neighborhood."

Bolduc said the project concerned with runoff into Black Creek, since that creek feeds into the Watervliet reservoir, a source of water for both the City of Watervliet and the Town of Guilderland.

> Meyer said he is working on an alternative to the HOA maintaining the basin, but the location will likely not change.

> "The location is pretty well locked in," Chris Meyer said. The land is at one of the lowest points. large enough and offset from the units, all requirements of a retention basin.

> Chris Myer said the HOA idea was recommended by the planner, highway superintendent and water and sewer departments, and he is actually in favor of an alternative.

> He said if the basin is properly maintained, the runoff into Black Creek would actually be cleaner

"In general, they've done a good job with the project. We're happy with it," said Delaware Engineering consultant Ken Johnson.

Dave Dodge, a resident of Neilson Road, said he is in favor of the project, but he inquired about the green space buffers, unit size and storm-water management of the project.

The proposal also includes a possible donation of land to Neilson Road.

Chris Meyer said costs to design the development have already run close to \$50,000 and to finish the work after it is approved could cost as much as \$70,000.

The entire construction process is estimated at four to six months preparation and infrastructure and two to three years construction.

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Town offers reduced work hours

Bethlehem allows workers to take cut in hours, appoints PATHs committee

The Bethlehem Town Board tackled a number of issues during its Wednesday, Feb. 11, meeting.

An agenda item to institute a voluntary work reduction program for town employees was unanimously passed. Modeled after a state program that allows workers to take reduced hours, certain workers in Bethlehem can opt for fewer hours if they wish.

The voluntary program does not cover public safety or emergency workers, according to town Supervisor Jack Cunningham.

"We're looking for opportunities to reduce our expenditures," Cunningham said. "It will give the town some needed relief in its budget."

He described it as an exchange of hours for pay. It can be beneficial to workers who have families and want to spend more time at home or take summer hours when children are out of school, according to Cunningham.

Councilman Kyle Kotary said it was in line with the town's values and bottom line.

This is a part of our continued commitment to our town employees, our most valued resources," Kotary said. "I support this."

Councilman Mark Hennessey agreed, saying it was a good program. "We listen to our residents when they come to talk to us," he added.

The state's program has been in effect since the mid-1990s.

Resident Linda Jasinski said she thought the program was a good idea and a good way to save money. She told the board that she has participated in the state's program.

The board also unanimously passed a resolution to create a PATHs committee. The new committee will be looking at ways of interconnecting pedestrian pathways and sidewalks throughout Bethlehem's residential neighborhoods and creating more "walkable communities.

Jasinski said the new PATHs committee should include residents from South Bethlehem, an area where there are little in the ways of sidewalks. She commented that residents have to pay for sidewalks that do not benefit them should be represented on the new committee.

"Once again, you seemed to have forgotten about South Bethlehem," Jasinski said, and asked why there were not sidewalk districts to help pay the cost, much like a water or sewer district.

Tough time for sex offenders

It's time for New York to get serious about sex offenders.

The town of Colonie is on the right track with its task force charged with penning a local law restricting where sex offenders could live. The task force, a group of two Albany County legislators, and three Town Board members, was created in response to Colonie becoming a "sex-offender dumping ground" for the county — there is an "over-concentration"

of offenders, according to Town Supervisor Paula Mahan, in a few of the motels lining Central Avenue.



The task force helped

design a local law that, if enacted, would force registered sex offenders residing in the town to move 1,500 feet from one another. This would be in addition to an existing Albany County law banning Level 2 and 3 sex offenders from living within 1,000 feet of schools and day-care facilities.

Now, the county law took a drubbing last week when an Albany judge tossed a residency case involving a registered sex offender who violated that ban, stating the county law was superceded by New York state law. The sex offender's lawyer argued that state law does not have residency stipulations for registered sex offenders.

And he's right, it doesn't. According to The Division of Criminal Justice Services: "The Sex Offender Registration Act (SORA) does not limit where a sex offender can live." However, information provided on DCJS' Web site states "...[T] there may be local laws in a particular county, town or village limiting where a registered sex offender may live or travel. For information regarding local laws, it is recommended that you contact the county, town or village in which you are interested."

And it should be up to municipalities, down to the most local of levels, to determine what sort of residential management should be employed for registered sex offenders who live within their boundaries.

That being said, we at *The Spotlight* feel, and have always felt, the issue at hand is not how to manage large populations of sexual predators as though they were migratory birds or untended cattle, but to avoid this problem altogether by stringently enforcing legal punishments for these predators to begin with.

Let's see — if these sexual predators are forced to live so many feet away from child-care facilities, playgrounds, libraries — and even farther away from one another — why are we fooling ourselves into thinking that they are rehabilitated enough to re-enter our society from the penal system?

We currently have real laws, with real penalties, on the books, that must be exacted to their fullest extent before we consider ways to successfully reintroduce convicted sex offenders into society.

Nerves, anticipation take center stage at audition

When the notice first appeared, hanging precariously by a lone piece of tape on the glass window stretched between the two doors of the main office, a sudden feeling of tension was palpable among a certain group of the Shaker High School students. The shift in mood was rapid, an onslaught of emotion following a post-midterm numbness.

Still, the announcement, which read, "Musical Wonderful Town': Auditions Monday and Tuesday in Auditorium, was hardly the main topic of discussion over crowded lunch tables during period 6. Rather, it was in a corner of G-wing. "the chorus room," that the lone audition sheet created some significant ripples among the self-proclaimed "chorus kids," simultaneously striking apprehension and anticipation in the hearts of each and every aspiring actress or actor.

Those feelings were echoed within me. Having auditioned twice before for the school's annual production (the first audition a train wreck; the second a success), I felt uneasy about the short amount of time I had to prepare. After hastily scheduling a quick "refresher" vocal lesson with my junior high choral teacher the day before the scheduled audition, and wavering between a few wellrehearsed audition pieces, I decided to run the, if not safe, at least mildly secure route with a soprano version of "Somewhere Over the Rainbow."

I was reasonably confident in the singing portion of the audition, but the acting and dancing segments begged for attention. However it was not feasible, nor rational, to attempt to develop such broad

skills in the short span of time I had available. I was thus forced to accept the inevitable — if rehearsing was not a viable option, then I would have to do without.

The day of the audition, however, found me a great deal less confident then I would have hoped. Fear, excitement, anxiety pervaded my every step. Reassurance returned to me in broken pieces only by the sight of several other music students, standing in small clusters within the chorus room and spilling into the hallway, clutching their sheets of music and humming their chosen songs under their breaths in a sort of desperate search for solace. In terms of fear; at least, I knew I was not alone.

A few minutes after arriving, I was led into the spacious auditorium, the lights dimmed, the stage alight before rows of velvet seats to be filled in the coming month by scores of onlookers eager to watch this year's theater production. The stage itself was bare of any embellishments that would give some indication of its role in the musical to be performed. Several lone chairs and music stands were scattered across the floor, invoking images of a full orchestra rather than show business. and the second s

Perhaps it was a lack of attention, or unwarranted nervousness, but somehow I found myself bounding out of my seat, headed straight for the stage to read my assigned lines, despite the very obvious fact that I was not one of the students who had been called to audition at that time. The assistant director had divided the group into clusters of four or five, and I had managed to delude myself into thinking I had been among the students she had called for the first round. Nevertheless, she let me stay. Perhaps she recognized my desire to conclude this portion of the audition quickly (or mistook it for over-enthusiasm).

A call-back list did appear, my name not included, leaving me to wait the next few days for the ensemble list to appear.

In many ways, the day the cast list was due to appear was reminiscent of the day the audition notice was posted, setting the musical steamrolling along its course, the weekend of its performance its ultimate destination. As I made my way toward the large glass window overlooking the main office, my stomach began twisting in knots.

Hall must often multitask when several customers place orders at once.


Hall: a 40-year-veteran of the food business and former owner of Café 333 of Delmar, said Saute's To Go provides a healthy and tasty option for dinner.






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G'land Chamber ranks concerns

Business survey shows national economy tops the list

Guilderland Chamber of Commerce members predict things will get worse before they get better; according to the results of an annual business survey.

Chamber members participated in a study conducted by Marvin and Company and the University at Albany School of Business, and many said they are not expecting the national financial outlook to improve in 2009.

Chamber Executive Director Kathy Burbank said times are tough, and even the chamber is looking for ways to save.

"We're looking to save money in ways we've never looked at before," she said.

The Business Climate Survey "asks local and Capital Region chamber members about their overall concerns for the upcoming year as well as their prediction on how their own businesses will fair for the year," according to information provided by the GCC.

Chamber members cited several concerns, according to the GCC, in order of importance. At the top of the list was the national economy, taxes and health-care costs.

The survey reported 80.4

percent of chamber members believe the Capital District's economy is stagnant or recessionary, with only 19.6 percent believing it is prospering or recovering; 42.3 percent said the Capital District will "experience little or no growth," in the next several years.

Kevin McCoy, managing director of Marvin and Company, said his biggest concern is predictions from chamber members from the entire Capital District that business will not improve: He said only 30 percent are expecting to do better than last year, a number that typically is closer to 50 or 60 percent.

They're significantly more pessimistic this year," McCoy said. "More pessimistic than they've ever been in the past."

The GCC offered programs such as group energy purchasing in response to the members concerns.

The 2008 survey listed the biggest concerns of businesses as taxes, insurance and rising supply and gas costs.

Last year, 70 percent of businesses reported rising health insurance as a significant or moderate problem, according to the GCC.

"Most businesses also predict their business will remain stable or decrease, mirroring their belief that the economy will not improve for 2009 or even beyond," according to information from the GCC.

"I have seen a change in our local businesses in the last two months; with owners saying it is getting harder to get paid by other companies or people, they are reducing staff, and business is slowing. The study shows what I have been seeing here also being experienced throughout the region," Burbank said in a written statement.

The chamber plans to address the needs of members by providing seminars and workshops on "how to save money on health-care costs; strategies for low or no cost advertising and other expensereducing tips, and the increasing importance of customer service and networking.'

The Chamber is also planning to have a membership campaign that would provide a discount to new members. The offer is slated to start in mid-March, according to the GCC.

"Businesses still desperately need us for affordable health insurance, visibility and networking, and we need to help them out if we can," Burbank said.

The survey included Chambers from the entire Capital District including Albany, Colonie, Saratoga, Bethlehem, Schenectady, Rensselaer and the Adirondack region.



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Chriopractor helps straighten out athletes

Man treats Firebirds, other local competitors

After getting knocked around, hit, tackled, trampled and bruised, an arena football athlete probably could use a good checkup.

Enter Dr. Robert Irwin, team chiropractor for the once-again Albany Firebirds, the former Albany Conquest.

Irwin has been the team's

spinal expert for five years and, he said, in such a physically demanding sport, it is vital to keep an eye on the bone structure.

Irwin graduated from Averill Park High School and went to school to study to be a chiropractor at Life University in Georgia. He also has taken courses in sports management some extra specialization in sports related injuries.

"I tend to look at people in a biomechanical perspective," Irwin said.

Irwin said a "ground up"

approach is the easiest way to explain how he examines the athletes. He said the foundation is the most important, and having even feet will lead to less knee, hip and shoulder stress.

"If you have an un-level foundation, you've got problems," Irwin said.

He said one possible solution for an uneven base is "orthotics," or shoe inserts that raise the arch of a foot and balance the weight for either side of the body.

The Arena Football League, which is similar to the National Football League in some ways, such as the 16-game-schedule, has several key differences, which add to the physical demands of the players.

The players in the NFL usually play offense or defense exclusively, allowing them to rest for half of the action. In arena football, players often play "both sides of the ball," meaning they play offense and defense.

Ir win said he often sees linemen and wide receivers, two positions that see many aches and pains from the high physical stress of the game.

Irwin said linemen will block on offense and try to rush the quarterback on defense, while wide receivers double as defensive backs, trying to deflect passes from the opposing quarterback to his receivers.

Jonathan Scherzer, vice president of marketing for the Firebirds, said the team enjoys having Irwin in its corner. He said in Irwin's five years he has received positive feedback from the players.

"He's a professional and the

does work on athletes from all over the area, including the University at Albany, and formerly held a position as coach of the Guilderland High School track team.

guys love him," Scherzer said.

Irwin also treats area runners and track athletes, and has always been an avid runner himself. He said treating runners and football players often yield a variety of different injuries, some that overlap, and others not as often.

Ir win said athletes from local colleges often schedule appointments with him and said he recently treated a runner with hip-tendonitis.

He attacked the issue with "cold laser" technology which, in essence, gives tissues cells in the muscle more energy to fight inflammation.

The treatment works the same way other laser treatments do, and changing the wavelength of the light provides different results. Ir win also trained runners as a coach on the Guilderland High School track team. The days of 12-or-more hour meets and the difficulty of slating dozens of runners for their best events are behind him, but are still a part of what he does everyday.

He is running a seminar that explains injury prevention for runners, including those young and developing, and said utilizing several measures could save runners a good deal of aggravation down the road. He includes suggestions about proper rest, warm-up, strengthening, stretching and nutrition.



Although the day has been officially dubbed "Community Kindness Day" by Town Hall in an effort to have residents perform random acts of kindness, the pitching in for the Angermeier family has more to do with brotherhood.

Vice President of the Selkirk Fire Company No. 2 Shawn Higgins said Bethlehem's firefighting community works because it works together - no matter what comes its way.

"When you walk in the door and put on your gear and go out there every day, it doesn't matter who you are, you're pretty much family," said Higgins. "It could be someone out there who you don't get along with, but when you come in here you've got to have that person's back and they've got to have your back because you never know, anything can happen."

Higgins described Angermeier as an active and talented young man whose family is deeply rooted in the Bethlehem community. His father, Joe Angermeier, is a longtime fire police officer at the Elsmere Fire Department and his sister volunteers at the Selkirk firehouse.

After getting a growth on his neck checked out, the Angermeiers' worst fears were confirmed and Angermeier was diagnosed with a rare cancer of the bone that affects children and young adults.

Now taking chemotherapy, Angermeier's immune system is wiped out and he has to remain iso-lated from as many people as possible for fear he could become sick. Higgins said this aspect could be especially hard on a young person with an active lifestyle.

"I think it's hard for James mostly because he's not allowed around other people he normally would be because his immune system is really down," he said. "When people go to see him, they're only allowed one at a time and you can't be sick or anything.'

As a junior firefighter, Higgins said Angermeier is looking to become a full-fledged member once he turns 18. There are certain restrictions for junior members, such as not being allowed on certain calls or to be put in certain situations or training.

The Elsmere Fire Department held a spaghetti dinner last week, which brought in \$7,000, and both the Selkirk and Elsmere departments held a breakfast for firefighter families that netted \$1,400.

Now opening up the cause to everyone on Community Kindness Day, Higgins said they hope to have at least \$15,000 to give to the Angermeiers. He added more events could be held later in the summer if the need should still exist.

Selkirk Fire Department No. 2 Chief Bill Asprion said he has visited Angermeier on several occasions, and the family is holding up as best they can.

"There's highs and lows," Asprion said. "He just went through a another whole series [of treatments] so I'm not sure if he'll be there on Saturday."

Several petitions have been filed with town hall against the proposed Selkirk Bypass from residents in that area who don't want truck traffic in their neighborhoods or to have their property values diminished by any possible course of action.

Town Engineer and Indus-Development Agency trial Chairman Terrance Ritz gave an update to the town's Planning Board on Tuesday, Feb. 17, on the activities of the Selkirk Yards Industrial District Focus Group.

Of the seven-member Bethlehem Planning Board, no member lives in the Selkirk area since interim chairman Howard Engel retired and current chairman George Leveille was appointed to the post. According to Town Clerk Katherine Newkirk, five members live in Delmar and two live in Slingerlands.

A possible connection to the Thruway in that area has been in the works for 20 years, according to Ritz.

The Thruway Authority is in talks about this and so is the Federal Highway System," Levielle said, adding the E-Z Pass option is "an idea they are very interested in."

The areas surrounding any possible new roadway could be considered for re-zoning, and the new connects would help reduce the cost of doing business in Bethlehem.

However, a large proposed Clapper Road development could be potentially be affected by a new interchange as well as some residents living in the area.

and consolidate the entities that govern them. In return, Cuomo believes, local taxes could be controlled, state spending would be reduced and local services would remain intact.

The magnitude and implications of the idea is just beginning to sink in for some in the Capital District.

When breaking down the proposal, Cuomo is not simply asking to reform the state's vast and complex municipal laws, he is proposing to put consolidation on the ballot and give residents the power to force a "consolidation or dissolution process for *all* local government entities."

He contends local government has become too expensive, a point that Gov. David Paterson emphatically made during his 2009 State of the State Address in January.

"Our state mandates are too cumbersome," Paterson said. "Our local governments are too expensive, and we have to find ways to make them more efficient."

Cuomo said there's too much waste.

"Simply put, our system of local government is broken. It has been outpaced by globalization, regionalization, and an ever-changing marketplace," Cuomo said when announcing the proposal. "The density of local government in New York is astounding. There are 10,521 overlapping government units, providing duplicative services, creating needless, wasteful bureaucracies."

Under Cuomo's proposal, residents can force a referendum vote to dissolve or consolidate any local government entity by gathering 5,000 signatures or 10 percent of the municipality's population, whichever is less.

Albany County Executive Mike Breslin is a supporter of the proposal.

"Over the years, many attempts to institute more efficient methods of governing through shared municipal services have been halted due to New York's arcane legal barriers," said Breslin. "Attorney General Cuomo's proposed legislation provides a process that takes down those road blocks and gives communities an opportunity to institute reform."

Breslin has been a strong proponent of consolidation and shared services, which has been met by some opposition in cases. In 20 6 Breslin proposed merging the highway departments of Albany County with the rural Town of Berne, a large town geographically that contains fewer than 3,000 residents. Since the municipality contained a hodgepodge network of county and town roads, snow removal in particular was thought of as an area where a single entity could perform the service with a lower overhead cost. While plowing, town and county workers would often cover the same roads. However, the proposal was met with local opposition with many residents citing a loss of individual identity and there was a widespread belief that local jobs would be lost to county workers, a claim Breslin denied.

ened, many of Breslin's consolidation efforts gained traction, such as the countywide storm water coalition and other municipal service sharing.

A final report by the state's commission on Local Government Efficiency & Competitiveness (LGEC) stated Albany County was looking at the possibilities of countywide health insurance, assessing and tax collecting, as well an online database and cooperative bidding and purchasing tool with Rockland and Orange counties, the Town of Cortland and Capital Region BOCES.

The county is also looking at expanding its purchasing cooperative established in 2006.

In Saratoga County, several municipalities already share services, but it's not always a practical solution.

The Town of Charlton teamed up with the towns of Malta and Ballston and the Village of Ballston Spa to purchase specialized and expensive highway equipment, which they all share.

Most of the local leaders in Saratoga County say they are open to cost-saving opportunities at this time, including entering into shared services agreements with other localities.

Many of the towns, there share services like water and sewer. Proponents of a new Saratoga County water system expected to come online in the fall say the project will save participating municipalities money by selling in bulk, for example.

"I would not be averse to getting together with neighboring municipalities," said Scott Johnson, mayor of Saratoga Springs. "I'm always open to ideas I think that would be more efficient, in any economy."

But in some cases, local leaders say consolidation just can't be done.

"It sounds good on paper, but making it actually happen would be a very difficult task," said Arthur Johnson, supervisor of Wilton. "We're right next to Northumberland and the Town of Moreau, and when you ask what could we possibly share to save costs, it was hard to come up with anything."

In Schenectady County, one town official said there needs to be cooperation in order to find some kind of middle ground.

"As the governor and the state Legislature begin another session, we understand that the economic challenges confronting these elected officials are daunting," said Niskayuna Supervisor Joe Landry. "However, we ask these state officials to recognize that local elected officials are facing these same economic realities, therefore, a solution can best be developed. through mutual cooperation between local and state representatives.' The LGEC report showed Schenectady County was considering a countywide emergency dispatch, fire department vehicle maintenance program. and highway equipment collaboration, as well as consolidating the Village of Scotia and Town of Glenville water and sewer departments. Cuomo, however, is touring the state and telling residents that consolidation may not be enough, and with more than 10,500 government entities, some elimination may have to take place.

proposition to consolidate water districts."

Cuomo's proposal lays out three voluntary measures to consolidate or disband a local government entity, which could be initiated by a county executive, a town board or residential petition. The attorney general has repeatedly said it would be entirely "up to the people" if they wanted to enact such a measure or not.

Village of Voorheesville Mayor Robert Conway said the village and Town of New Scotland have discussed potential costcutting measures, but have not implemented any plans to dissolve the village into the town.

"It is something that we talked about," Conway said. "It's not necessarily something that we're preparing for."

Conway said the two entities already share several services and pieces of highway equipment and that other consolidation, such as the City of Schenectady into the county, or the Village of Green Island into the town, might be a better fit.

He said the benefits of consolidating are not yet clear, but added that he wouldn't rule it out.

"I'm not opposed to it if I see the benefit to it," Conway said.

He also said the most important deciding factor would be the support of the residents.


It all depends on the location, the quality of services and potential benefit, Conway said.

Conway added that pride or self-interest could prevent the village and town merging.

"The big knock on it is that everyone tries to protect their own little parochial interests," Conway said.

New Scotland Town Supervisor Tom Dolin said the town does not have an official policy on the matter, but said the town and the village share a lot of services, and it seems the village residents are not in favor of a merger.

"It's usually up to the village," Dolin said.


NYSUT 24/7 Let's Go! program promotes student health By KATHLEEN DONAHUE, NYSUT Vice President

Coronary disease. Type 2 diabetes. Respiratory problems. These may sound like ailments diagnosed by a geriatrician, but not always. These conditions are rapidly becoming childhood afflictions for thousands of elementaryage children due to rising

rates of childhood obesity. Childhood obesity recently attracted welldeserved attention when Gov. David Paterson pledged to promote healthier habits among New York state children in his January State of the State address. New York State United Teachers applauds his commitment.

Since 2005, when our healthy lifestyle program "24/7 Let's Go!" launched, childhood obesity has been a top concern at NYSUT. Developed by the union's Health Care Professional's Council, the program stresses the importance of healthy eating and

exercise, offering teachers, school nurses and health care professionals an accessible, kid-friendly way to impart healthy habits. The program encourages students to stay active and eat healthy — 24 hours a day, seven days a week — both at home and at school.



A 2007 NYSUT survey of more than 600 physical education teachers found that only 11 percent of the surveyed districts offered state-mandated daily physical education classes for K-3 students. This trend could worsen as physical education classes are replaced by extra academics — a byproduct of the No Child Left Behind law that requires schools to meet academic guideposts or face federal sanctions. And our worsening state budget woes, which could threaten the number of physical education teachers in our schools, won't make things easier.

That's where NYSUT's "24/7 Let's Go!" program comes in. Endorsed by the American Cancer Society, the program gets kids moving, and promotes healthy eating habits, both at home and at.school. Kits include information on exercise and nutrition, calendars for recording student progress and pamphlets explaining the program to providers and parents. Students strive to do seven healthy things, seven days a week. Since the program's inception, more than 150,000 "24/7 Let's Go!" kits have been distributed to NYSUT members for inclusion in their lesson plans.

It's up to all of us to safeguard the health of our children; and we look forward to supporting Gov. Paterson's efforts. It is quite simply, too important not to. We'll do what we can at school to promote healthy habits — but remember, education begins at home. Set healthy examples for your children. Limit their access to sugary snacks and drinks and encourage them to stay active. Exercising as a family is a great way to both be healthy, and to stay connected with your child. Let's work together to put an end to childhood obesity.

The Executive Budget proposal for education would devastate New York's public schools and reverse the progress we've made in education, from pre-kindergarten through post-grad. New Yorkers overwhelmingly support raising the income tax on the wealthy to protect vital public services and oppose cuts to education and health care.



hen the Soviet Union collapsed, Tatiana Lichtenwalter was at loose ends.

A friend invited her to come to the United States, so she applied for a visa for a half a year and arrived in America in 1992. Seventeen years later, she's still here.

"I decided to stay for good," Lichtenwalter, who lives in Albany, said. "I was fascinated by America."

As much as Lichtenwalter has embraced her new home, though, she still feels connected to her old one.

'Russia is my motherland," she said. "I love my culture."

So, Lichtenwalter gathered up some fellow Russians and started the New Russia Cultural Center. The organization's aim is to foster an appreciation of Russian folk arts and Russian-American history and culture in the United States.

To that end, the center is sponsoring a Russian winter festival Saturday, Feb. 28, at the Crossings of Colonie. There will

be traditional music and dance performances. Russian food, Russian crafts, Russian costumes and games for children.

"It's a familyoriented event,'

Lichtenwalter said. "It's going to be a really fun time."

The festival commemorates Masleitsa, or Pancake Week, the Russian celebration of the end of winter and the approaching of Lent, the Christian period of fasting.

"It's like a Russian Mardi Gras," Lichtenwalter explained.

She hopes the festival will help introduce the Capital District's Russian population to the community. There are up to 10,000 Russian-Americans in the area, she said, noting that that figure encompasses people from a number of countries that were



"the core" of Russian culture.

"Everything comes from the folk art," she said. "When I was growing up in Russia, I was surrounded by it. When I moved to the U.S., I missed it."

Lichtenwalter, who is president of the New Russian Cultural Center, dreams of one day having a building to house the center where folk art and other items can be displayed. For now, the group is essentially a traveling one, hosting programs at local libraries and schools. Lichtenwalter said one of its most popular offerings is Russian language classes.

"Parents want their children to know the language," she said.

It's not just Russian-born parents who want their children to speak Russian. Several couples who have adopted children from Russia have enrolled them in classes so they don't lose their native language.

The New Russian Cultural Center applied for a federal grant not long after its founding three years ago, but "They said, You are just brand new," Lichtenwalter said. "We have to show we can do something."

The winter festival is one of those things. Lichtenwalter noted that organizers are hoping admission, which is \$5 for adults

once part of the Soviet Union. Peter Dzyuba, for example, is originally from the Ukraine. Q: I was recently fired and I feel it was due to discrimination. I have no employment contract. Is there anything I can do about it?

A: Yes, see an attorney who has knowledge of the law in this area. If you have no employment contract (and few do), you are generally considered an "at will" employee. In effect, that means you can leave "at will" and you can be fired "at will" or without penalty. However. The law does still protect you if you are fired due to discriminatory * reasons. These include due to vour gender, race, religious beliefs, or arising from sexual harassment. There are various federal and state laws which protect you. If you suspect the real reason you were fired was due to discrimination, contact and attorney for a confidential

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

Cutting his culinary teeth in Europe, Smith has worked at several restaurants in the Hudson Valley and Capital District, and left Nicole's Bistro before opening up Jake Moon. The restaurant is open Monday through Thursday from 6 a.m. to 3 p.m., and now offers dinner on Friday and Saturday and is open from 6 a.m. until 9 p.m.

Jake Moon is also open on Sundays from 8 a.m. until 3/p.m.

Smith makes his own jam and preserves and gets supplies from such local companies as Meadowbrook Farms Dairy in Clarksville; Champlain Valley Flour from Westport; Harney & Son Tea Trader in Salisbury, Conn.; Capital City Coffee Roasters from Castleton; and Charles Groesbeck Grassfed Beef from Feura Bush.

The Jake Moon logo was made in the image of Smith's grandfather and into a kind of "man of the mountain" theme, which was designed by none other than the famed Milton Glaser who happens



to be friend of Smith's from the Woodstock area.

Milton is the graphic artist that designed the I Love NY logo.

"It's just a very powerful brand," Smith said, "and that's not by mistake."

Smith described the menu selection as country-style comfort foods, which he hopes people won't interpret as being too faddish, but more of a reflection of his years of preparing foods as a Hudson Valley chef.

The very reasonably priced breakfast menu includes an egg with home fries and toast for \$3, as well as Jake Moon Hash, which is hand-cut corn beef hash with two eggs poached with chipotle ketchup and toast, for \$7.50.

The lunch menu items range from \$4.50 to \$7.50 and include tasty selections such as a Paesano Sandwich — grilled country sausage, peppers, onions, melted mozzarella on a hard roll - to bow tie pasta with Alfredo or marinara sauce 🕴 😁


Or even throw in a crock of homemade pickles for three bucks.





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

Follow egress . . requirements. New York state building code requires that any basement with habitable space must have second means of escape to the outside. Standard basement windows do not apply, nor does access



into a garage. Types of egress would include: basement door with walk out, or an egress window with window well that meets code.

• Dehumidify the space. Make sure to have a dehumidifier big enough to do the job. This will ensure that you won't have high humidity and musty smells in your finished basement.

 Exterior maintenance. You should extend any downspouts away from the house to keep roof water away from the foundation. Keep the soil graded away from the house, gutters clean and keep window wells clear. When choosing a contractor to finish your basement, find one you trust, who is reliable, returns phone calls and is easy to communicate with. Get references and call them, and contact the Better Business Bureau.

Economy raises question: Should I stay or should I go?

At last glance, the Dow Jones had sunk below the 8,000 mark, and the talk of cataclysm has gotten stronger. The recession has lengthened to over a year, and reviewing your account statements has gotten even more painful. In my practice, the season has turned toward tax preparation, and Ishave been hearing many of the same statements. The general feeling is of malaise and, more important, fear. What do you do to save your portfolio and your future or current retirement income?

Such a simple question with a myriad of answers: first, how did we get here? The blame game has been discussed for the last several months, so really a quick review is all that is needed. A real estate bubble, bad loans to support that bubble, credit swaps, Wall Street greed, rising oil prices, a slowing economy and out of control spending by our government and us personally. American society has had a zero to negative savings rate for over 10 years and the bill just came due. That coupled with the spending that is coming out of Washington in the name of a



stimulus may cause this problem to linger for more years than we care to. I am sure that there are many other reasons for the problems that we currently are in, and sometimes they are perceived by which side of the fence you are on. Regardless, all would be in agreement that there are issues, and we need to work together for a common good.

Joe Strummer of the Clash in the song title above uttered the words, "If I stay there will be trouble, if I go it will be double."

If you are fully invested in equities, there is no doubt that you have felt significant pain. After the middle of September when the failure of Lehman Brothers was announced, things

turned seriously ugly. Volatility soured, stocks slumped, corporate spreads widened out while in the economy, what had

been a mild recession turned into a serious one. The average portfolio in that

time has been eroded by about 30 percent. Many investors feel that things will erode further, and the market will continue to slide. I do not have a crystal ball, so I will not be answering that question; however, if that does occur, you will have wiped out the majority of the gains thatyou have received since the tech bubble. The other side of the coin is if we have bottomed out and you pull the plug now and there is a market recovery, you never have the opportunity to recoup your losses.


Investors that had used an asset allocation mix with the introduction of fixed income, **REITS and alternative asset** classes still felt pain but less so. Fixed income is where this problem started, and many were surprised to see the volatility and losses where none were expected.

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The question of what to do is a diverse one. Several questions need to be addressed. What is my time frame for needing the money? How much risk am I willing to take? How much pain can I withstand? Can I survive without this money? I also recommend that after you have this discussion with your spouse, you consult a financial planner. Spending may have to be curtailed, vacations may not be taken and retirement may be put off. Most of the talking heads on TV and in print sound a lot like Chicken Little.
